HIS is Belafonte's first new calypso album in six years. The earlier album,* which sparked an international calypso craze in 1955, was the first album in history to sell over a million copies. It still sells strongly.

As a youngster in the West Indies, Belafonte first learned about the abdication of the King of England from a calypso song being sung in the streets. Calypso was a musical newspaper which carried spontaneous accounts of the events of the day with sharp comments, even criticism. Over the years it has become highly sophisticated in its satire and archly adept at pricking the balloons of accepted institutions.

The greatest concentration of calypsonians per square inch occurs in Trinidad during Jump Up Carnival. The weeks prior to this festival, held during the Mardi Gras season before Lent, are one long calypso contest. Out of


the steady procession of songs and singers in

the calypso "tents" one man and one song emerge, and the king is crowned before a crowd of thousands in a final celebration.

A large percentage of the songs in this album have been heard in these competitions. Each maintains the basic calypso ingredients

of fun and high spirits for victim and victor. The lovesick young man singing a poetic ode to his *Gloria* wants her "like a cop wants a wanted man." An empty stomach leads to salvation in *Goin' Down Jordan*. The vocabulary of the *Sweetheart from Venezuela* seems limited to a single word—"si."

West Indian ballads (Land of the Sea and Sun, Kingston Market, Bally Mena) are programed with the calypos. The Baby Boy is a delicate Christmas song from the Caribbean. These were included because they too are a persuasive part of Island music.

Another fascinating aspect of this album is the bittersweet sound of an authentic West Indian steel band, used here for the first time in combination with modern instrumentation. The steel band was quite literally *invented*. After World War II, departing Allied troops abandoned large quantities of empty steel oil drums. Someone with a flash of ingenuity discovered the oil drums could be made into melodious, interesting musical instruments. The oil drums were sliced off in different sizes. Their circular heads were retained, and—when

heat treated, marked off into pitches and hit with rubber mallets—it was found they could make beautiful music together. Belafonte's use of the steel band adds new, evocative colors which will be of particular interest to high fidelity and stereo devotees.

During the years between his earlier calypso recording and the present album there was a constant clamor for more calypso albums by Belafonte. His firm resistance seemed perplexing to some, foolhardy to others. The real reason is simple and almost without precedent.

His original calypso album was intended as but one in a series of recordings based on the rich variety of music from widely assorted folk sources. The enormous response to that album was unexpected, especially by Belafonte. Yet Belafonte made the hard choice of sticking to his original broader direction. In the years which followed he has produced many varied types of albums—chain-gang music, Christmas songs, blues, spirituals, two live concerts recorded at Carnegie Hall.

Now, after six years, here is the long-awaited new calvpso album.



N imaginative critic once advanced the idea that Richard Rodgers did not compose Oh, What a Beautiful Mornin'. The melody, the writer claimed, had simply been floating in the air, waiting for someone to pluck it out. The same might be said of many of the beloved hymns and carols of Christmas; their words and music are so apt, so fitting, that it is strange to think of men, however inspired, sitting down to write them. The origins of some carols are lost in the mists of time—who knows today the composer of The First Noël or Adeste Fideles or God Rest Ye Merry, Gentlemen? But the stories of many other carols are known to us, and help to illumine the beauty of the Christmas season.

In 1867, for example, a young rector named Phillips Brooks spent Christmas in the Holy Land, and was deeply moved by the experience. The next year, after his return, he wrote a poem for the children of his Sunday school. The children loved the poem so much that they urged Lewis Redner, the organist, to compose a tune for it. Redner promised to deliver the music within a week, but was unable to find the proper melody. Night after night he sought inspiration, without avail, and was dismayed at the thought of disappointing the children. Then, early Sunday morning, he awakened suddenly from his sleep and felt, rather than heard, the melody. Leaping from bed, he wrote it down at once. And so, that morning, the children of Holy Trinity in Philadelphia heard for the first time the carol known as *O*, *Little Town of Bethlehem*.

It Came Upon the Midnight Clear also began as a poem. The Rev. Edmund Hamilton Sears published his charming work in the Christian



Register in 1850. The next year Richard Willis, a Boston composer, happened across the poem in a reprint, and hastened to write his own setting. His is the music sung throughout the world today.

Hark! the Herald Angels Sing was more than a century in completion. The words were written in 1739 by Charles Wesley, brother of John Wesley, founder of the Methodist Church, and were widely esteemed. One hundred and one years passed, and in distant Leipzig Felix Mendelssohn presented his cantata called "Festgesang," which contained a remarkably joyous melody. Then in 1855 Dr. W. H. Cummings, organist of Waltham Abbey in England, conceived the happy idea of joining the words and the music, and presented the hymn for the first time on Christmas day of that year.

A similar story is connected with Joy to the

World. Isaac Watts wrote the words in 1719 for inclusion in a book called the *Psalms of David* and did not intend them to apply to any special day of the church calendar. An unknown composer attempted to set them to music without success, and it was not until 1830 that Lowell Mason put them to a section of Handel's "Messiah."

Many carols are very old. The First Noël has been traced by scholars as far back as 1500 (although the song itself did not appear in print until 1833). The first known manuscript of Adeste Fideles is dated 1751, and Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming was first published in 1600.

The cheerful old English carols are the most difficult to trace, partly because of their origins in the customs of Yule, a pre-Christian winter festival. Among them are *Here We Come A-Wassailing* (sometimes called *Here We Come A-Carol-*



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

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

the nation's best-selling comedy albums. An increasing number of record collectors have been discovering that a Dave Gardner album is guaranteed to be the life of any party.

In AIN'T THAT WEIRD?, recorded live before an obviously delighted audience in Fort Worth's Will Rogers Memorial Auditorium, Brother Dave follows his well-received pattern of playing his act (literally) by ear, changing and redirecting his subject matter according to the response it gets.

He zeroes in on a number of varied subjects—the state of the Union ("There ain't nothin' wrong with the country 'ceptin' the city"), the Depression ("Bad? People was eatin' ground!"), the police ("Television makes 'em look terrible"), grammar ("Y' know, ah always preferred the word ain't to arsen't")—plus hilarious comments on the New Frontier, supermarkets, the population explosion, the international situation, ad absurdum.

Have the best seat in the house for one of America's funniest new funnymen.

ing), Deck the Halls with Boughs of Holly and The Holly and the Ivy. In many of these carols the holly represents the young men, the ivy the maidens.

Of considerably more recent origin are such carols as the gentle *Gesu Bambino*, composed by organist Pietro Yon in 1917, and M. Leontovitch's *Carol of the Bells*, introduced in the United States in 1936.

But the loveliest carol of all has the most cherished story. On Christmas Eve of 1818, Franz Gruber, organist of the little church of St. Nicholas in Oberndorf, Bavaria, discovered that the instrument would not work. But special music was required for the celebration. He called upon the vicar, Joseph Mohr, to write some verses, which Gruber then hastily set to music. The hymn was sung on Christmas day in a three-part arrangement, accompanied by a guitar. It has since become the most treasured single piece of music of all time, and its title, of course, is Silent Night, Holy Night.
