ISTENERS are going to be privileged to hear many interesting new Celebrity recordings this month. The lists disclose, for instance, a performance of the delightful Mozart "Divertimento No. 17 in D Major" of Mozart by the London Philharmonic under Sir Hamilton Harty. Then we have Sir Thomas Beecham giving us a really up-to-date recording of Rossini's "William Tell" Overture, also "Musette" from "The Gods Go a-Begging," and the "Minuet" from the "Origin of Design" by Handel. There is a batch of new Brahms piano solos by Backhaus, while Adolf Busch and Rudolf Serkin collaborate in the delightful "Spring Sonata" by Beethoven.

The Cologne Chamber Orchestra plays two movements from Vivald's "Concerto Grosso No. 6 in A Minor," and the Milan* Symphony Orchestra plays "Villanella," an interesting Aria Antica arranged by Respighi. These are only

some of the treats in store.

Gauguin resolved to spend the rest of his days in Polynesia. Not long before his death, however, he abandoned his Tahitian family, and left for the distant Marquesas where he died in great poverty, engaged in an undignified wrangle with the local gendarme.

After Gauguin's death, the island were scowed from his paintings and carvings. Thousands of francs were paid for his nictures. HE argument about crooners, with special reference to Bing Crosby, has developed so that it would be impossible to print all the letters which we have received; so below we print extracts from the letters, hoping to maintain the exact sense of our correspondents.

Mr. Con Conway, of Auburn (March 20) says there is no boiler-factory about Mr. Crosby. "To say Crosby cannot sing is merely a childish remark. Four years ago Crosby was unknown; to-day he is world-famous, receives a bigger fan-mail and a higher salary than any other male singer in the U.S. in films or on the radio. Crosby certainly has not achieved all this through impersonating a boiler shop or drooling horrible noises."

INFERIOR, EXCEPT BING.

Miss A. Merrick, of Croydon, read the previous arguments in silence, and now says that most crooners are definitely inferior, but Mr. Crosby, who leads them, "has a fine, melodious voice with quite an astonishing range, as anyone who heard him sing 'Maybe I'm Wrong Again' will be forced to admit." Although this record would not classify him as a crooner, yet he also "sings sweetly and huskily—crooning, as it is termed." Nevertheless, he has a good voice, pronounces his words clearly, and is sincere and painstaking. When hot singing was popular he excelled (as in 'Dinan'), and when soft singing came in he once more proved his versatility by swinging completely round and 'crooning.'" His imitators cannot compare; his brother, Bob, is nearest, but lacks 'that seductive huskiness which characterises Bing's singing."

BETS MR. STONE.

"Give us more Bing," Bellambi (March 20), does not live in Balmain, bets Mr. and suggests a ballot on Bing "just to show Mr. Leon S. Stone just how insignificant his opinion really is."

Jas. M. Klein, Cooma, addressing what seems like an open letter to Mr. Stone, says: "Personally I think you would be much better off at your knitting instead of writing obsolete and irregular articles to "The Safety Valve."

"Rabble Language," of Dulwich Hill,

also employs the direct method with: "Candidly, J. Booth, you give me a pain in the neck;" he feels that Mr. Booth's letter was "written with an effort, to fill the unenlightened rabble (among, whom I have the misfortune??? to be numbered) with awe and wonderment," but upon one who, as "a very small boy . took great pleasure in compiling sentences of such words, this made little impression, except to cause surprise that "such a LEARNED person" should resort to "the use of such atrocities as Pooh-bah and Boloney, which belong exclusively to we, of the rabble." It is then suggested that "the afore-said Booth" should "give his or her radio away to someone more appreciative of the untiring efforts of our radio personalities," who, however, are not supposed to be "visibly affected by Boothy's outpourings." As for the race-course urging, Boothy is asked to notice that "the Royal Family, and other notables too numerous to mention, indulge in the vulgar practice of attending racecourses."

BETTER FOR THE NERVES.

Marjorie Hedges, of Ashfield, says: "To a person whose nerves are on edge after a long day's work I am sure Bing Crosby would soothe much more than the discordant sound of a jazz band or a contralto whose voice won't broadcast." As to Jack Lumsdaine and Jack Davey, "these are not the only two crooners employed by the radio. It seems sus-

Leon Stone does not live in Balmain, piciously like petty and malicious personal spite on the part of 'A Crooner'" to have attacked them.

M. Featherstone, Malu Siding, Queens-land, suggests that "Mr. Booth, also, should try his hand, say, for ten minutes at the mike, and I think, and I be-lieve the public would agree, it would be enough."

"Crooner-Anti-Crooner," of Bondi, says that "Definitely-Anti-Crooner" is a "bigoted, narrow-minded fool," "laboring under a multitude of disarranged ideas." He points out that "Jack Lums-daine was attracting full houses at the Old Tivoli Theatre, Sydney, long before he ("Definitely-Anti-Crooner") had cut his first teeth," and goes on to say, with fine irony, that "probably these (Tivoli) audiences might be numbered among Carlyle's '40,000,000—mostly fools.'" As for Margaret Wagner, "Crooner-Anti-Crooner" thinks she expresses herself excellently, and can observe in the lady nothing "resembling lovesickness or sentiment."

FILLS US WITH HORROR.

"En Avant Crosby Fans," of Hamilton, New Zealand, unearths an horrific implication: "Mr. Stone indirectly implies that the heads of the radio, motion picture, and gramophone industries have deliberately conspired to give to the world a singer who fills 'hundreds, nay. thousands,' AND Mr. Stone, with profound horror."

"Dinkum Aussie," of Haberfield, says that "M.W." is quite right; Bing Crosby does not sing in a monotonous tone; "but he sings in a dull, droll, toneless howl, and as there is no art in crooning, Crosby cannot be a genius." On the other hand, "I would like to draw attention to the fact that Lanny Ross is a tenor singer, NOT a crooner, as most people term him."

Mrs. Marion J. Coleman, of Rockdala

who is "neither tone deaf nor stone deaf," would like Mr. Stone to supply titles of the records in which Bing "groans, moans, screeches, and wails, perpetrates "unmusical monstrosities, caterwauling, and noise," according to his letter in "Wireless Weekly" of February 27.

HAS HIS SYMPATHY.

E. Grace, of North Earlwood, speaks with sympathy of J. Booth: "Poor creature, he has my sympathy;" but is firm, nevertheless: "If the flow of language and ponderous words are intended to show how well educated you are they defeat you by their use." . . . "You sound rather like a Pharisee with your talk of 'rabble.' "

"Classical Crooner," of Concord, doubts if "Definitely Anti-Crooner" doubts if "Definitely Anti-Crooner" could compose "a tune of classical type, such as that which precedes Winn's sessions? Does he term that Crooner's Stuff? This piece of melody was written by none other than Jack Lumsdaine. As for Jack Davey, he is, in my opinion, a darn good announcer as well as a good crooner.

THE ONLY WAY THEY CAN.

"A Jazz Drummer Crooner," as "a modern young man with modern ideas" says it is not Australian of "Anti-Crooner" to attack Jack Lumsdaine and Jack Davey, "two Australians earning

their living in the only way they can."
"Definitely-Anti-Anti-Crooners" of jects that "Definitely Anti-Crooner" is a "beastly, horrible, unmusical monstrosity. The only difference between Crosby and Tauber is "that the former sings in a feeling, descriptive, understanding way. Any fool can sing out at the top of his voice meaningless notes." Also, "in regard to fools, we can all decide which one is the fool, Bing Crosby, earning seven hundred dollars a week, or 'Definitely Anti-Crooner' on, perhaps, £3/6/ a week."

Reyn McVeigh, of Bega, says that "Definitely Anti-Crooner" said that he was told by a friend that all the radios in his street tuned out 2GB as soon as crooning came on; and "I do not know," says Mr. McVeigh, "the name of the street . . . but I think if it is not already named it should be 'Queen Street.'

"Give Us More Bing," of Manly, says he can't believe that critics of crooning have heard a crooning record right through, and that it is "the crooning quality of Tauber's voice that makes him so popular."

FELINE SCREECHING.

Madame La Chatte, of Auburn, says that crooning can most aptly be compared with "the feline screeching that all of us are privileged to hear at some time in our lives;" only "cats are far superior to human beings" in this, because "cats make the best of the voice with which they have been naturally endowed, and they come out into the open and in a MANLY fashion expose themselves to any aqueous correction that indignant neighbors may think fit to administer."

J. D. Page, of Croydon, after considering various definitions of music, plumps for "the expression of the soul in sound." and continues, "if Mr. Crosby's soul and personal feelings are such that

his music is of a certain type, it is not for anyone to criticise him."

"Observer," of Wee Waa, says that "This is a sunny country, of open spaces and fields where the strong men reign and the weak perish," and that although crooning "may be pardonable in some cases where a weedy, empty-headed Johnny goes crooning love-songs while dreaming of some fools' paradise with a so-called modern flapper," yet "if I were given my way I guess her Johnny's larynx would be fixed so that he would croon no more."

R. Calvert, of Lakemba, says that as to the difference between Balmain and Gordon, he fails to see it, and as to "there is an excellent motto, crooning, such as 'Live and let live.'"

About Jack Davey

The winner of the 10/- prize for the nastiest remark about crooners, offered by Mr. Jack Davey, in a previous issue, is Mr. Bernie Bobbs, c/o F. Bannach, Amby, Queensland.

The remark was: "That someone wad the giftie gie ye to hear yoursel' as ithers hear ye."

"There were very many replies," says Mr. Davey. "Some made me blush; others were quite complimentary, for which I am thankful, otherwise I might have been led to take a jump in the proverbial lake, which incidentally was suggested by another writer.

"Replies were received from practically every part of Australia."

J.C.S. (Canberra), under the date of May 8, describes himself as "one of those worms of the earth, even less, if possible, who profess to a liking of crooners and their songs." And, "speaking on and their songs." And, "speaking on behalf of the youth of this country, and those of the younger middle age (that is, those who have a little of the spark of life left in them), I would first ask these highbrows why they condemn this type of song so severely?" He recommends that the highbrows "go into a party at any place of social standing, any dance hall, or any parks or gardens, and pay attention to what they hear." Concluding, without irony, that "if we are ignorant, uneducated people of the every-day world, we at least represent the greatest number of people, and therefore the song composers have to suit our tastes, and so the greater demand,"

FQUAL RIGHT.

Unselfish Listener (Young, April 5) confesses: "I am not a crooner lover myself, but I know there are hundreds of the younger class that this type of singing appeals to, and I certainly think they have just as much right to hear the class of music they like as Definite Anti-Crooner has," and adds: "Perhaps most of the lovers of crooning are young mothers, or girls who have to ironing, work in the house, cooking, polishing, or numerous other jobs,

which have to be done, especially in country homes."

"English" (Epping), who is not "a love-sick schologirl, but a married woman with a family," sheds some light on the last contention: "I have no time for crooners at all, but I consider Mr. Lumsdaine one of the best and most entertaining announcers on the air."

JEALOUSY MOTIVE.

J.E.P. (Penshurst, April 9), who is "100 per cent. Australian," admits that "we have some crooners here who are a 'pain in the neck,' and that I think is why these 'Anti-Crooners' are jealous of 'Bing' Crosby and his crooning. . The argument, as far as I can see, exists between two classes of people with opposite temperaments, with possibly a touch of jealousy added to one."

H.B. (Kilmore, Victoria, April 8) unearths a fact: "It is said that crooning, in the first instance, is only caused by a decayed brain affecting the vocal chords, and that crooners like the past, and almost forgotten, Tickle Toe cranks, Bunny Hug cranks, ragtime inartistics, and many other moaners, groaners, and squeakers, just live their little days, make their little pile, perhaps, and then cease to annoy worthy sane music and song lovers."

STIRS HIS HEART.

"We Want Bing" (Taree, April 12) strikes a sentimental note: "Romance will never die; it is the only thing in life worth while, as year in, year out, we struggle through our many worries, and there are times when we derive a great amount of pleasure to hear a voice like Bing Crosby's, which has the power to stir our hearts to the joy of ro-mance which, in spite of depression, we hope some day will be ours, and so help us to carry on in this old world of strife with a lighter heart. Who would deny us that occasionally?"

RADIO PLAYS

W RITERS of the Edgar Wallach tribe never lose an opportunity of insisting on the careful cleanliness of their stories; that they "never touch sex" is one of their chief claims to virtue, and it must be admitted that most of them are sexless. But their opponents by insisting that "Everything is sex," or that "You "Everything is sex," can't have literature without sex." are making a grave mistake, if not in fact, in tactics; first, by accepting the enemy's own battleground, and second, by admitting that there is an enemy. When a writer with the lucidity and dexterity of Edgar Wallace and the mind of a great artist began operations, he was soon recognised—there is no doubt about the success of Ernest Hemingway.

But there is success and success; probably Hemingway's earning would be no more than a word in Wallace's book, nor would his name stand very high if we were to consult the organised human stupidity which comes to a head in Customs Departments. It is a tendency of democratic institutions to reflect the vices more than the virtues of their constituents, and we should not be too hard on their officials for the censorings which are the outward and visible signs of the necessity for officiousness. If you want it, you can easily get "A Farewell to Arms."

In the same way, we should not blame the Commission for its restrictions on the subject matter of radio plays. It is true that the "suggestions" suggest away any but purely mechanical work-out dramas, and that we have protested against them many times. But gradually we realise that this is in the nature of things: except in music, there is no scope for the individual in broadcasting; the only possibility is for a folk-drama, that is, a drama in which the emotions are popular and representative rather than individual and particular. Also, the medium is unstable, and for that reason alone can have little appeal to a serious writer, whose best medium is still the stage, commercial or repertory, which has not changed very much since Sophocles, and is likely to continue till the end of humanity.

RADIO IN OTHER PLACES

TELEVISION

WRITER who makes "The Wireless World" even more interesting discussed a television stunt: A ship put to sea with television apparatus and a pretty girl; the was televised and the image was received before an audience in a London television studio - all fair and above board—and a man in the audience was so impressed that he got up, asked to be put in radio-telephone communication with the ship, picked up the telephone, and asked the girl to marry him; so were the newspapers in possession of a story when the image on the screen said "Yeah?" They were in possession of a story, and "Indeed," says this writer we are quoting, "I will go so far as to say that I might have believed it myself if the published photograph (of the gentleman in the case) had not revealed to me the features of a very old acquaintance who had been engaged to the girl in question for some considerable time."

THE London "Daily Telegraph" has begun the first regular television section; a "super cinema," equipped for television is being built in Everton Valley, Liverpool, and it is suggested that Alexandra Palace, at Green Wood, North London, may become the first B.B.C. television headquarters. This enormous building covers nearly eight acres; the facade is a long, doublestoried colonnade with a big arch entrance hall bumped in the middle, and a 145 foot tower at each end and at each other corner of the square, and since the building is 324 feet above sea-level, this gives an effective height of 470 feet without additional structures, for aerials. There is a grand central hall capable of seating 8000 people, which has 57,330 square feet, and one of the four largest grand organs in Europe.

A PARISIAN tenant brought an action against a girl tenant for leaving the lift-door open, so that he had to walk five flights to his flat. The girl said the lift interfered with radio reception. The judge ordered the landlord to fit the lift with an anti-static device.

THE Parisian public was invited to inspect 200 radio-equipped taxis assembled at the Madeleine; the receivers work only when the metre is registering, and the fare may select the programme.

AT Stockholm, on a Saturday night, there was a broadcast message that the 4000 woodworkers on strike must return to work on Monday morning. No workman who falled to turn up was allowed the excuse that he did not hear the broadcast.

ENRY HALL, the B.B.C. dance-band leader, passes judgement on 10,000 songs a year, and gets 50,000 fan letters. He has made the reputations of Phyllis Robbins, Les Allen, Kitty Masters and Dan Donovan. His band has made 300 records. He works twelve hours a day, rehearsing, broadcasting, in his office, recording, or listening to other dance bands. He is thirty-six, went through the Trinity

College on scholarship, was on the editorial staff of the Salvation Army music department at seventeen, where he learned all about music from composition, printing, publishing to performing, went to the war with the Royal Garrison Artillery, played the trumpet

in their band, and after the war played the piano, then the organ, then conducted a five-piece orchestra at the cinema. Then he did a solo-turn on the music halls for a year and a half, heard Harriet Cohen play, got the good-music bug, and went back to study at the Guildhall School of Music. But he got a job deputising for a pianist at the Midland Hotel, Manchester, and this developed into musical director of the L.M.S. hotels; ten years later, in 1932, when the B.B.C. got him, he had 32 bands at his disposal and 120 instrumentalists permanently working under him, one of the biggest dance-band businesses in the country. Married, and has a son aged six and a daughter aged ten.

THE B.B.C.'s Empire Programme Director, Captain Cecil Graves, is a nephew of the late Lord Grey of Falloden, and inherited his Northumberland estate. It is likely he will go to Newfoundland, to advise on broadcasting matters.

THE B.B.C. announces that, with a view to determining the possibility of providing from the Empire Broadcasting Station at Daventry a service at a time equivalent to evening hours (local time) in Western Canada, a series of experimental transmissions will start on Friday, March 1.

The test transmissions will continue until further notice from 2.30 a.m. G.M.T. to 3.30 a.m. G.M.T. on Sundays, Mondays, Wednesday, and Fridays, for reception primarily in Western Canada on the previous evenings (local time). Hitherto Western Canada has been the only area in the Empire which has not been provided with Empire programmes in the evening hours.

For the present, the transmissions will be made on two frequencies, GSL (49.1m., 6110 kc/s) and GSC (31.32m., 9580 kc/s), although the retention of these frequencies and the hour of transmission will depend on reports received from listeners, which the B.B.C. will

Film Publicity? Dear Sir,-A few months ago, in con-

nection with a series of talks given on the subject of films under the auspices of the National Council of Women, we were told that it was the policy of the Commission, made necessary by the clause in the Act governing their operations which prohibits advertising, not to allow even commendatory mention of any film currently being shown in the city or suburbs.

Last Sunday the Commission broadcast "One Night of Love," now on first release at the Liberty Theatre, and for to-morrow have announced a broadcast of "The Little Minister," in its second week at the State.

As the attached page from a trade organ will show, this is hailed by advertising men as a triumph of exploitation. If, instead of paying for such advertisement through B class stations. distributors of films can obtain it free through national stations, surely both B class stations, which thereby lose revenue, and also rival distributors, have a legitimate grievance.

As for the public, they have to fall back on a B class station, 2CH, for the service of unbiassed criticism, uninfluenced by advertising, of current film fare, though this service is regularly rendered in England by the B.B.C .-Yours, etc.,

The national stations, too, employ many more records in their evening sessions than they are justified in doing. Being a Government institution, they should obviously set an example. The B class stations may have some excuse, but not so the national stations.

George Edwards and Ellis Price, to mention only two, have proved that Australians are capable of producing good shows, in my opinion, that easily challenge the best American recordings. 2CH and 2UE are also putting on good plays; so why not further encourage our own authors and artists, particularly as the goods their sessions advertise are sold to Australians?-Yours, etc.,

Captain Stevens Has Definite Views

THE most important factor in the success of a women's session is to find a woman to conduct it who has a

deep, soft, sympathetic voice and who has large human sympathies. To me the woman who cackles shrilly for two hours is anathema.

The next most important thing is to find a woman who is practical and knows her job. As a casual histener to

women's sessions I find frequently a lack of system. It's just "one darned thing after another" as a rule. Nor do I consider it good entertainment to read out endless correspondence of a eulogistic nature from folk whose one desire is to hear their names called on the air.

Those who conduct women's sessions should work to a definite plan, have a carefully prepared schedule of talks on subjects likely to be of interest to women, and this schedule should be programmed and adherred to.

Long dissertations on the weather past, present and future have no entertainment value.

I would suggest as an outline for a women's session, something on these lines—

Opening Music. Children's Interests. Music. Answers to Correspondents. Music.
The Kitchen.
Music.
The Home-Dressmaker or Milliner.
Music.
Hints to the Housekeeper.
Music.
A Little Travel Talk.
Music.

Lives of Great Women. Music.

A Word to the Aged and Infirm. Closing Music.

Naturally the above items would have to be interspersed with advertising matter on a B Class station. The music introduced should suit all tastes and range from classical to popular.

I would introduce good poetry, too, the work of acknowledged masters not trite optimistic jingle by obscure beginners. I would try and build up a taste for the beautiful in art and literature and have a word to say about the garden, pets and so forth.

Child psychology, too, should

find a place.

I would invite outstanding speakers, specialists in various subjects, medical and otherwise, to participate. Nor would I neglect the important subject of sports for women. Certain days of the week would be set aside to feature some of the above-mentioned subjects.

I would certainly try to form a league or club in connection with my session, link it up with some worthwhile object and try to obtain club premises as a general meeting place for members interested.

I would try and institute definite service for country listeners and create an organisation to advise and do shopping for those outback. I would get penfriends for lonely women outback also.





"LIKE more of those connected with a broadcasting station, I have received many memos.; in fact, once when I tried to sing before the microphone I suffered an epidemic of them; but none ever caused me such inward tremors as one I found in my mail asking me to state in about 200 words how I would conduct a woman's session. A lightning conductor might hesitate to bring a weighty matter like that to earth. I flatter myself I am up to the time of going to press regarded by many lady announcers as quite nice to know, although, to be honest, I must admit I have on more than one occasion expressed my opinion of women's sessions minus 199 of the 200 words as a minimum; but then I was talking to myself.! For publication I would submit that in a woman's session all personal details should be confined to correspondence, either by letter or in the columns of a weekly periodical, which could also give all the recipes and what-not that take up so much time. All announcements made should be by record only, these being first written out and then subedited by the author, assisted by a competent critic, thus preventing the reiteration of words and phrases and ensuring a crisp, business-like presentation of the subject under discussion. Believing that the extraordinary amount of attention this branch of radio is receiving abroad will shortly be reflected here in inquiries for explanatory articles, we have decided to anticipate these demands by describing in simple language the principles of television.


T is now quite obvious that eventually we will have television. Although the most recent developments in the television line have been more political than technical there is no shadow of doubt but that the combined efforts of the many firms which are now working on television equipment will bring about steady progress.

When motor cars were first introduced there were many who despaired of ever silencing the terrific noise of the explosions taking place in the cylinders. But to-day the silencing of a motor engine is only a most minor consideration. Quite a number of modern "wonders" have been achieved only by a steady refinement of minor points and a careful assembly of small features. The recent political developments may have a far larger effect on the introduction of practical television than many of the "startling" technical "inventions" which so often leap into prominence for a few days and then fade away.

The political developments of which we speak mainly amount to such things as the recent Television Committee which was appointed by the Postmaster-General in England. This committee consisted of a representative body of

famous men, including the Chief Engineer of the British Broadcasting Corporation, several officials of the Post Office, the secretary of the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research, and others. It fully investigated the whole position of television and then tabled a detailed report.

As a result the B.B.C. is going ahead with television transmission, using two different systems for a start. This in turn has not only attracted a lot of interest from the public, but also from the component parts manufacturers. Quite a few firms are turning their attention to the production of television equipment. Their combined efforts will probably reveal many improvements in the course of the next few years.

From the report of the English committee it appears as though the television will be sent out on wave-lengths between 3 and 10 metres, the aerial will be on a mast about 400 or 500 feet high, and the effective range will be about 25 miles.

Possibly some wag will suggest that it would be simpler to put a large mirror on top of the mast, a couple of mirrors on the ground below at the studio, and than provide the householder with a telescope on his roof.

NO INTERFERENCE WITH

BROADCASTING.

It is interesting to note that the B.B.C. experiments will be conducted on a wave-length which will not in any way interfere with ordinary broadcasting and special types of receivers will be needed to receive the television. No special licence fee will be charged for the present until satisfactory service has been demonstrated. It is clear that when television does come into practice it will not make present receivers obsolete. Probably the sound accompanying the pictures will be sent out and received exactly as present broadcasting, but with the vision sent out on a low wavelength, requiring a separate receiving unit.

AUSTRALIA'S POSITION.

Australia is in a most fortunate position as regards television. As already evident, it is the intention of the "authorities" to let overseas scientists do all the groundwork, and then when a practical system of television has been demonstrated, and proved, to bring it out to Australia as a going concern.

There does not appear to be much chance of experimental work being carried out in any big way in Australia. Perhaps we are very wise to leave it to the hundreds of well-paid research workers who operate in the huge overseas laboratories and factories.

THE "TALKIES."

It is to be hoped, however, that the introduction of television to Australia does not take the same form as the introduction of the necessary equipment for "talkies." The encouragement of locally-made "talkie" equipment was not particularly conspicuous, in fact a couple of overseas interests managed to scoop practically the whole business in a way

greedy.

On the other hand the introduction of radio broadcasting to Australia has resulted in a flourishing industry being built up, providing a lot of employment and causing circulation of a large amount of money.

POPULAR FANCY.

To give an idea of the difficulties of practical television we may mention that there is considerable scope for argument in the subject "Has television any entertainment value?" At the pres-ent time mighty few people sit in front of the radio set listening to every word. The modern way to use a set is to switch it on before breakfast and switch it off when the cat goes out with the milk-jug. It is simply used to create a happy atmosphere for the home, Even if all the technical difficulties are overcome will television ever take the place of ordinary radio broadcasting?

Something pretty effective in the way of television programmes will be necessary to maintain public interest after the first novelty of the television business works off.

If complete "talkies" can be televised they should have a certain amount of attraction, but who could stand for two or three "talkies" per evening for seven nights a week?

TECHNICAL ASPECTS.

The technical aspects of television are interesting. The theory covering the subject is fairly simple and easy to un-

which many considered as somewhat derstand. There is nothing uncanny or supernatural about the television business, as some old-fashioned people imagine. It is just the natural sequence to logical development.

> For some years now television has been a possibility and no trouble has been experienced in actually sending pictures and images, but it is the refinement which is so essential. Quite a few of the television sets which have been demonstrated have been mechanical monstrosities, very costly to build and unlikely to be satisfactory under normal operating conditions in the home. But as we mentioned before, the early motor cars were also mechanical monstrosities, but the new models-well, that's a different story.

INTERESTING STUDY.

The theory of television and the careful analysis of the development of the art in various parts of the world provides an interesting study. It is therefore the intention of "Wireless Weekly" to give a series of articles on this substarting next week with a resume of the basic principles and running on through the various systems at present employed in England, Germany, and America.

The series should be a great assistance to the radio enthusiast who appreciates that television is bound to come in time, and wants to get grounding in the fundamentals before the whole business becomes too complicated to grasp.



tion. It would be almost impossible to have sufficient speakers on hand of both good and cheap types in order to test out all the different types of sets in the finals. They are almost certain to use a wide variety of field windings, and, of course, in each case it would be necessary to match the output impedances to the type of valves used.

Therefore it seems that the choice of speaker will have to be left to competitors. In some cases a set may cost £50, and then a price of about £12 will not seem out of proportion. But if a set costs only about £5 without the speaker, it would be absurd to specify a speaker costing more than twice the cost of the rest of the set. Frankly, we would not think it possible for every reader of "Wireless Weekly," or even a large proportion of readers, to spend £12 on a speaker alone. But it should be possible to design a set to give fair results with ordinary speakers, and still keep it in such a form that a good speaker can be fitted if it can be afforded.

The question, as in the case of many other points, is a very difficult one to answer with any definition, but as a rough guide we would say that the speaker should not cost more than 25 per cent. of the total cost of the complete job, as otherwise it is going to look out of proportion.



After considerable research and experimental work, a really wonderful battery, dual-wave superheterodyne has been evolved. Its remarkable range and general all-round performance is a revelation to all those who have been associated with its design and production.

When this set was finally completed, one was despatched to Gunnedah for testing, and the results have been positively amazing. Western Australian stations were tuned in quite clearly at midday, a distance of over 2000 miles, not on short wave but on the broadcast band! The achievement is the more remarkable when it is remembered that the set has only six valves. On the short waves London was tuned as clearly as the Australian stations.





In the first place the fact that "B" batteries would persist in running down meant that signal strength would commence to fall almost from the moment new "B" batteries were installed, while towards the end of the "B" battery life, signals would

have almost entirely disappeared.

Special valves and circuits have been developed to give maximum efficiency with minimum battery replacements, but until the development of the generator battery the various improvements were but slight.







VARIETY IN MORNING STATIONS

Readers with short-wave and allwave receivers who are taking advantage of our forward shortwave programmes should study these notes. While not all the programmes may always be audible, Mr. Shaw here directs attention to what is available.

TOW that winter conditions are becoming more definitely established. listeners will observe some changes in reception of stations during the middle morning hours-that is, from around 6 a.m. onward. Conditions are also becoming much quieter on the higher bands during those hours, and there will be soon a complete freedom from statie on the 49 and 50 metre bands. On several mornings during the past week quite a number of entertaining stations were heard after 6 o'clock, but conditions are not yet quite sufficiently stable to permit of a definite statement that these stations will be heard at good strength every morning. As a matter of fact, on the morning of Mon-day, April 15, there were but two stations of any value at 7 o'clock. were GSB on 31.5 and 2RO on about 31 metres. Others were audible, but not up to entertainment value. A couple of mornings earlier, however, the German, DJC, on 49.8, was being heard excel-lently from about 6.45. Strength was then R7, and at 7 o'clock DJC was heard calling Africa, the portion of the world for which this transmission is primarily intended. Language spoken was English, and many persons were called by name, in addition to which news was also given. At the same hour Moscow (RW59) on 50 metres was fair speaker (R6) in its usual English session. This latter was followed by a full news service in English at 7.30. this hour the German, DJD, on 25.5 metres, was also heard at R5 in musical numbers. The Italian, 2RO, is audible at fair to good strength every morning until after 8 o'clock. Of the two Daventry stations, GSB and GSC, both on the 31 band, the latter is slightly the stronger between 7.30 and 8 a.m., but whilst GSD is on the air previous to 7.30 it is decidedly weak, and not worth listening to. On the other hand, GSB (31.5) maintains fair strength during the whole morning session until closing about 8.45. An American on the wave-length of W1XAZ (31.35) is heard weakly most mornings until after 7.30. Towards 8 a.m. the other American, W8XK (25.27) can be heard nicely on most mornings, and is possibly at its strongest around 8. It can be followed until towards noon, and again increases in strength from 1 to 4 p.m., when it closes. It was heard splendidly from 3 to 4 on Sunday afternoon, the messages to people in the Far North being easily followed at 3.30. We kept a keen lookout for RNE (25.0) between 1 and 2 p.m. on Sunday, but its signals did not get through.

Around the Stations

Daventry's new schedule came into operation on Sunday afternoon, April 14, when GSB and GSD opened at 3.15 and closed at 5.15 p.m. It was found that in this schedule there was little difference in the strength of signals of the two stations on opening at 3.15, both being excellent speaker. Towards closing both were slightly weaker.

Moscow (RNE) on 25 metres can be still heard from 9 to 10 p.m. on Wednesday and Sunday nights, increasing from fair strength on opening to good speaker before 10. The whole period is occupied in English sessions, with addresses on various activities of the Soviet.

Around 9 p.m. on April 12 2ME, on 28.4 metres, was heard in contact with W2XAF, of New York, operating on 31.45 metres. The signals from 2ME were maximum speaker whilst testing -in fact, the signals were the finest we have ever heard from 2ME on this wavelength. Strangely enough, however, no trace could be obtained of 2ME when the actual contact was made with 2XAF half an hour later. Our popular American was not as strong as on other occasions, whilst there was also considerable noisy background on the station, Arrangements were made with 2ME for an interchange of programme with 2XAF, the programmes to comprise conversations between pupils of Sydney and New York High Schools. This will have been heard ere these notes are read.

Watch Tower P. and T. Society (Sydney).-Letter received; pleased to know information supplied was of service, and trust the big world broadcast will be successful. The Java stations are now. coming in splendidly .

H. Jackson (Perth) reports that 2RO (Rome), operating on the lower wave-length of 25.4 metres, is one of the best stations in Perth at the present time. It is maximum strength between 10 and 11 p.m., representing 8 to 9 p.m. Sydney time. It is also excellent between 5 and 6 a.m., Sydney time, on 31.12 metres. We have been unable to log 2RO yet during the evenings at our station. Have any of our eastern listeners have 2RO between 8 and 9 o'clock?

H. A. Hancock (Mosman) refers to FYA (19.6) opening at 9 p.m. in lieu of 10 o'clock, which fact was briefly re-ferred to in the "Stop Press' in last issue. A news session is given first, followed by musical programme. Strength of signals is very good, he reports. This contributor also reports good speaker signals from the other 19 metres stations, GSF and DJB, on the same evening. He also reports strong signals from W1XAZ (31.35), at 10 p.m. In the mornings W8XK (25.27) and GSB (31.5) are the best, and the latter can make his amplifier "step out" towards 8 a.in. He thinks PCJ was also operating

on the 19 band just below DJB. (We also heard this station, but could not definitely identify it.) Our friend's outfit comprises two superhet, tuners-one broadcast and one shortwave, a common intermediate and audio amplifier, the latter a high fidelity job. Thank you for complimentary references, H.A. Pleased to hear from you again.

H. A. Bulmer (Hogarth Range) has joined the short wave fans by investing in a battery all-waver, and is getting wonderful results. He is doubtful of FYA's schedule. Look for this station from 9 p.m. to about 1.30 a.m. on 19.6 metres, and again on 25.6 metres from about 10 a.m. to noon and 1 to 3 p.m. It is occasionally heard on 25.3 metres towards 8 a.m. also.

The evening of Friday, April 21, provided some excellent entertainment on various bands. At 9 p.m. the three stations on 19 metres, GSF, DJB, and FYA, were all coming through splendidly at R6 to R7, but weakened towards 9.30. A little earlier 2ME (28.4) was heard at maximum, whilst up till about 9.30 both 3LR and 3ME, on the 31 band, were being heard almost perfectly at maximum strength. Both weakened before 10 p.m. Japanese and Javanese were again numerous later in the even-

The Paris station (FYA 25.6) has varied in strength greatly during the daylight session, and on Monday afternoon was only just audible on opening at 1 p.m. On some afternoons it was excellent speaker at that hour, and could be heard well at 11 a.m.

The London (GBP) radiophone on the 28 band, and ZLT, on 27 metres, have been heard at maximum strength between 6 and 7 p.m. The former has been in contact regularly between 6 and 7 p.m. with 2ME, and many interesting broadcasts from the Winter Show Buildings at Wellington were put through, The conversations were particularly clear, and appear to excite considerable interest in Wellington.

The Japanese station, JYN, on 28,14 metres, can be heard every evening from p.m., and sometimes earlier, and is of good quality and strength. A good deal of Western music is heard in the earlier programmes.

An innovation is noticed in the news sessions from Daventry during the latter part of No. 1 transmission. For instance, when the news of the reception to the officers and staff of the Australia at the Guildhall, London, after arrival with the Duke of Gloucester, there was a momentary break, and a transmission of the actual reception at the Guildhall was heard. Similar methods have been observed in other news sessions, which tend to make the news being put over more realistic. It is, of course, obvious that a recording of the broadcast had been made and was available to inclusion in the news service at the right moment.

READERS' QUERIES

Jungling" (No Address) is another querist about the Paris Two.

A.—Coil details are given in reply to another correspondent. The 30 gauge wire could be used, although generally heavier gauge is desirable. Other types of valves may be used in the set. For inathnes, the detector can be any suitable battery triode meant for detector circuits. The output valve may be a pentode or a triode to match, and results will be obtained with them all, as long as the bias is adjusted to suit. If the output valve is not the same type as we have stated, use a separate hims battery instead of a resistor. The 5-blute condenser is quite necessary, as the set will not oscillate if the aerial is connected struck to the grid. The condenser you have aliered should be reasonably right in capacity.

P.J.W. (Mosman) has an old Reinartz Three. Q.-I find selectivity is too bad to get more than two stations without interference. Can anything be done?

A.—We would suggest using a shorter aerial, and see whether that makes any improvement. This type of set is really well out of date, and can rarely be made to give selective results in the suburban area. The shorter aerial will drop the volume, but selectivity should be considerably better.

J.W. (Strathfield) sends us a circuit of a set a has built himself.

Q.—Is it in order to earth one of the fila-ment pins? Why is the graph of the tuning scale irregular at the bottom end of the dial?

scale irregular at the bottom end of the dial?

A.—The reception is very good for a single-valve set. It is guite necessary to earth one of the filament pins, or the centre-tap of the winding, in order to cut out hum. You did guite right to make this connection. Very probably the tuning condenser you have is not quite perfectly aligned at the bottom of the dial, as indeed is the case with most condensers. This, however, is nothing to worry about, and does not concern the coil. We cannot account for the second appearance of the station, unless it is an overtone due to your proximity to the aerial.

Saul Malyn (70 Eveleigh Street, Redfern) writes:-

I have some back numbers of "Wireless Weekly" from the beginning of 1927 to the end of 1930, with very few missing. Do you think they could be of any value to anybody?

A.J. (Glebe) wants coil data for an ordinary Reinartz coil.

Q.-Can you give it, with a 0005 tuning con-enser and 0001 reaction condenser?

denser and 0001 reaction condenser?

A.—The usual coil would be wound on a 2½-inch former, the wire being 26 d.c.c. The secondary has 55 turns. The aerial coil wound at one end, spaced about ½ inch away, has 26 turns tapped at 15 turns. The re action coil is wound at the other end, and has 30 turns of the same wire. There are too many things which would stop a valve form oscillating to detail in full. Generally these would be too low plate voltage, reversed reaction coil, too many aerial turns or coil coupled too closely, not enough reaction turns, too low a grid leak value. The valve must also have its full high tension voltage.

Q.—Can you supply me with a back number containing a description of this set? If not, what were the coil details?

A.—We have no back numbers left now, but we will publish your name and address in these columns, if you wish, so that some reader who has a back number might possing let you have it. The first coil has 5 turns on the grid, and 8 reaction. The second 10 grid and 12 reaction. The third 20 grid and 15 reaction. The formers were 1¼ inches, and the wire about 24 d.c.c wire. About 1½-inch spacing is left between the coils. The tuning condenser is of .000175 mtds.

Q.-Why the three speaker connections? Is it necessary to have a special speaker? Most speakers only have two connections.

speakers only have two connections.

A.—The 19 is a push-pull valve with two plates and grid. It is necessary to have a special transformer matched for a 19 with a centre tap in the primary winding to give three terminals. The connections are then made as shown. It is best to use a permagnetic type of speaker with this valve, as its high output is often too much for the average speaker, which must also be operated with an output transformer. The test book for the Amateur exam, is the Radio Amateur's Handbook.

C.J.R. (Corio) wants to know the coil de-tails for the Straightforward Three.

Q.—Can you let me have them as I can-not find published instructions?

A—Approximate details are as follows: Secondaries are 105 turns of 32 enamelled wire, wound on 134-inch formers. The aerial coli wound over the bottom of its secondary with 28 gauge wire has 25 turns tapped at 15 turns. The R.P. primary has 40 turns wound over the end of the secondary. The reaction coil is wound alongside the other end of the secondary and has 30 turns of 38 gauge wire. The coils are enclosed in the standard type of coil cans.

Q.—Could a 1A6 be used for an intermediate amplifier and leaky-grid detector?

A.—We have never actually tried this out, but there is a possibility that it would work, the difficulty may se met with in the fact that a certain amount of coupling between the two circuits is inevitable, both sections of the valve being in the same electron-stream. This was the great trouble with the 1A6 when using the trione section for a diode detector.

C.B.C. (Charleville) is another who suggests using a battery pentagrid as a combined ampliner and detector.

A.—As a rule, the volume control in a set should be silent. The noise may be due to a fault in the control, or mean that it is in want or adjustment. The performance of your set is such that we cannot doubt it is in very good condition. But the first time you have the chance, get a service man to have a look at it. This would be advisable before replacing the control, or anything of that nature.

Q.—What are the best books to get? How can I use my meter? How could I make a Dual-waver out of my set?

A.—On theory, the best book is the Radio Amateur's Handbook. In it you will find what is really a course on the simplest of transmitters and receivers, up to date including more advanced types. We suggest that you start with a small short-wave set, and possibly build one of the small transmitters, although you can only connect it up and not actually transmit before your heense is granted. With this practical work, and perhaps the help of another ham in your district, you should be able to gain enough information to pass the exam. In addition, as you know, you will need to pass a Morse test, which means a good sending key. By listening on the sir, you will soon begin to pick up some of the slower messages which are sent out.
