





HE Australian Broadcasting Commission insists (there is a clause relating thereto in the contracts it issues) that all artists participating in evening broadcasts, shall dress accordingly. The commercial stations (with the exception of 2SM on musical comedy nights when the listeners are permitted to watch the show in progress) allow their broadcasters to dress as they please.


"Marigolds" is a trifle of this order—the fascinating melody came to him one night while waiting for the red light at the B.B.C. It's Victor Herbertish in texture, but Herbert was denied the colorful orchestration that can be given to "Marigolds" by a combination like Fred Hartley's Sextet. They played it one night last week, and the fluttering of the violins and the excited little wriggles from the saxophones with Hartley, that master of the piano, made it a thing of joy.

Mayerl is a prolific writer of light music. Just turned 32 years, and with more well-played compositions to his credit than years to his age. "The Jazz Master," "The Jazz Mistress," "Marigolds," "White Heather," "Bats in the Belfry," "Hollyhock," "Honeysuckle," and that very fine and colorful "Three Aces."

What workers these top-notchers are. Here is Mayerl directing a School for Syncopation with 20,000 students in England learning his methods. Still, he has time to conduct the new show, "Over She Goes," at the Saville, for which he wrote the whole of the music. In between meals he has written the music for Stanley Lupino's new film. "Honeymoon for Three," also two new films, "Cheer-up" and "Trust the Navy." Conducts also Laddie Cliff's new show with Renee Houston called "Love Laughs," and is writing the music for "Twenty to One" to go on at the Coliseum. And yet finds time for golf!

WORTHWHILE TALKS

N England," said Mrs. Linda Littlejohn, the Australian delegate to conventions, "the radio as a means of disseminating worthwhile knowledge is practically neglected. The B.B.C. is years behind all other broadcasting stations." The attack, at the British Commonwealth League Conference, is astonishing because British Broadcasting has always been considered the first and final refuge of disseminators of knowledge so much so, that the Australian talks services of the Commission follow the B.B.C. model as closely as they can.

The catch is in what Mrs. Littlejohn means by worthwhile knowledge; a great many listeners to race-broadcasts might think the relation of the scientist to society is hardly a worthwhile subject, and many interested in discussions of science might return the compliment about race-broadcasts The British radio-talks magazine, full of comforting speeches by Cabinet Ministers, nature-studies, flatulent artcriticisms, essays on where the church is going, placid book-reviews etc., has occasionally a brilliant talk in it; but mostly it encourages us to believe Mrs. Littleiohn: the B.B.C. conversationpieces tend to be smug and dull.

It is a fault of a national system, that it must flatter the vanity of politicians, and a fault of a national service that it must put out a certain amount of bureacratic stodge; in addition a national service in a country where there is a democratic government and a democratic opposition must be very careful what speakers are allowed to say; and in addition, we have had a recent example in Sydney of what the church thinks of sessioneers who loosen up a little in their expletives.

The odds are thus stacked pretty heavily against honest talking; and speakers are encouraged or discouraged into telling people what they would like to hear: thus people get what they want; they get what they deserve.

THE MUSIC CRITIC

WHAT WE SHOULD LIKE TO HAVE! NEW MUSIC

READING a few Saturday columns of the London "Daily Telegraph," I made a list of some works appearing in London which should be worth while performing in Australia. Here is an extract, in which prominence is given, naturally, to British composers:

Holst: Four songs for voice and violin. Purcell: Chaconne (orchestra). Lord Berners: Triumph of Neptune (orchestra). Bax: Festival Overture (orchestra). Bax: Overture Picaresque (orchestra). Delius; Florida (orchestra). Vaughan Williams; Flourish for a Coronation (orchestra), Fogg: Seasons (Oratorio). Walton: Viola Concerto, 1st Symphony, Festival Overture, Belshazzar's Feast. For piano: Ireland—Island Spell. Bliss—Masks. Kodalyi—9 pianopieces. Lambert—Siciliana. Ravel— Toccata.

May I give also the advice to fellowartists that at any occasion they are asked to perform "over the air," they may try to produce new music (new music that is old or new), and even if "light stuff" is demanded, something else than Grieg or Liebestraeume (often spelled "Leibestraume," which means "body dreams") may be found, something that might be light and yet new. Writer of these lines has at each time he was broadcasting done music that was new, so he may be allowed to speak from experience.

THE GREATEST LIVING COMPOSER?

Development of music does not jump; it must fulfil itself in a logical way. Haydn, Mozart, and Beethoven did not arise from nothing. They completed the development of previous times and pointed to the future. Purcell had his origin in the composers of the Elizabethan times. Since the death of Wagner, who was the pinnacle of romanticism in opera, and of Bruckner, who was the noblest, best and last representative of romanticist music in the realm of the symphony, pointing to the future by giving a new sense to musical form, music has been seeking the way forward, Strauss is retrospective; Stravinsky and Schoenberg, each in a different manner, mean the dead-end of so-called "modernism." We were waiting for the genius who would succeed in eliminating the exaggerations of the last two, who would succeed in giving a synthesis of their postive achievements with the melodic sense of former periods of music, and of Bruckner's hints of new concentration of form.

When pointing out to Sir Adrian Boult, three years ago, that I knew who it could be, he replied to me:

People don't know it yet, but I think you are right. (That was after he conducted one of the composer's works.) Three years later I read in some overseas papers a confirmation of my opinion.

His first symphony has Bruckner's sense of form. It has the rhythmical genius of Stravinsky, and it has the melody—well, of the composer. It is not "atonal," but it is modern. It has counterpoint, but no mathematics. It has—and this is the main issue—it has feeling so great, so grand, that I must agree with Prof. Dent (the "enfant terrible" of English music, as he termed himself once when talking to me), who said in a lecture at Harvard that there may be some modern composers who are as great as the classics.

William Walton, the greatest living composer, was born in 1906 in Lancashire, which has given the world many prominent musicians.

Walton's 1st symphony, together with his "Portsmouth Point Overture," will be presented at the second recital of the Sydney Recorded Music Society, June 14, 8 p.m., Saunders' Building.

THE BUDAPEST QUARTET

played Beethoven (Op. 95), Sibelius, and Schubert in its last recital. I have never heard the gentlemen play so well; if they retain this Lippy disposition they will bring the tradition of the former "Budapests" (Hauser, Roismann, Ippolyi, Son) to a new climax. The "Death and the Maiden" can never lose its wonderful charm—the performance was up to highest standards, so was their playing of Beethoven.

Re Sibelius: I have an open mind, but I do not intend to join in the Sibelius craze, which is the fashion in English-speaking countries at present. Up till now no work of Sibelius has changed my impression that he is a composer of the kind we have had many since Brahms died: From their stronghold they are looking back towards the classicist period. They try to be terribly serious by writing counterpoint which, for superficial observers, may hide the quality of the themes themselves which are often of the less noble kind. They try also to abandon the classical form (which is by no means exhausted, as shown by Bruckner and Walton) for something new which may make their works more interesting, to some people. If Schneevoigt's programmes can convince me, I shall say so. For the time being, I must state that not even the apparent very great amount of work in which Budapests had engaged to make Sibelius sound like a great composer could change my opinion. Our gratitude goes to the four gentlemen for doing everything possible in their power to make a work of average standards seem outstanding.

THE OPERA SCHOOL

of the Sydney State Conservatorium is the only one of its kind in this country; even the Melbourne University Conservatorium has none, as far as I know. Therefore, it would be unfair to compare the performance with continental standards. To put on "Don Giovanni," the most problematic work in the operatic literature (as to the technique of performing), was a formidable venture which, to my knowledge, has never been done before by an opera-school. It could not be successful throughout. possibly, and the style could not be per-fect. If there were difficulties of translation, why did one not use Prof. Dent's translation, which is simply excellent, and contains also the recitatives which, in the last twenty or thirty years, have replaced the dialogue? They are by Mozart. This translation was used in 1934 in London. All the same, it is an important musical event that the work has been given at all in Australia.

Talks On ...

BOXING

ROM 7.40 to 7.50 on alternate
Thursday evenings, from 2BL, Mr.
A. D. Barling talks on current
boxing events in Australia, and
current boxing overseas; that is, in England and America. Mr. Barling is an
Englishman; he was out here first as
an apprentice on a troopship in 1915;
and this time he has been here about
11 years. He still holds a commission
in the Naval Reserve.

He left the sea in 1926, and came ashore at Sydney. Less than twelve months later he won the amateur welterweight championship of Australia by defeating Ambrose Palmer, then welterweight champion of Victoria, at Sydney Stadium. He held the welterweight championship till 1928, when he won the welterweight championship at the National Games. Afterwards, he retired from boxing, and has since been associated with the sport as judge at the New South Wales Sports Club, at amateur contests, and as referee for H. D. McIntosh; he refereed the last Stribling fight in Sydney.

He was never a professional. When he won the championship in 1926 he had never had a lesson in boxing; "at sea everyone must know how to use his fists; that's one of the necessary qualities." He had various offers to turn professional, after he won the championship, but decided that 27 was too late an age to begin. He has refereed also at Newcastle, Brisbane, and at present referees at Leichhardt, numerous amateur tournaments, and at "Shore."

GUEST STAR OF MUSIC PARADE



Shirley Ann Richards will provide one of the high spots of "The Music Parade" programme from 2UW, 8.45 to 9.45 on Tuesday, June 8. Shirley is, of course, that winsome Cinesound star who shines in "It Isn't Done" and "Tall Timbers." In the broadcast she is to appear with Campbell Copelin in a complete radio play, "All Visitors Ashore," written by Ted Beardsley, and directed by Ken Hall. "The Music Parade" programme, as broadcast by the same sponsor on the American N.B.C. network, is M.C.'d by Bing Crosby, and introduces such folk as Edward Everett Horton, Joan Bennett, Jack Oakie, and the rest. The Sydney version is following along those lines, and featuring the local screen stars as guest artists.

"Boxing," he says, "is unfortunately very much in the doldrums at present. The sport is not lucrative enough to tempt the average boy. If there were a Boxing Commission or Board of Control, there would be more inducement for the youth to go in for it. Such a control ensures plenty of sport and fair dealing. It would be a good idea if the authorities who organise boxing in Australia promoted more tournaments, and so helped to keep enthusiasm up, so that when the State championship came along there would be a bigger entry."

"Trends in Home Building" continues the series of exclusive London radio interviews arranged by the Rural Bank, and will be broadcast through 2GB Sydney and 2GZ Orange on Friday, June 4, at 8 p.m.

EDUCATIONAL BROADCASTS

PLANS OF THE A.B.C.

M R. FELIX BARTON, in charge of school broadcasts for the Commission in New South Wales, is a B.A. of Adelaide University; he has taught in Sydney and Adelaide; has been interested in educational reform for many years, and made a study of new teaching methods in the special schools in England after the war. He was for some time an announcer at 4QG, and came to Sydney about December last to look after educational broadcasts.

"At present we have a register of between three and four hundred schools," Mr. Earton said; "and recently the Roman Catholic authorities have decided to equip two hundred Metropolitan schools to listen to A.B.C. talks, and to supplement these with talks from their own station."

"How many children will that make?"
"For the coming term the applications for talks booklets suggest about 17,000 children, and the Catholic authorities estimate that their schools may total about 40,000 children. But the figures are not yet definite."

"And what school sessions are most popular?"

"The principle adopted by the Commission is that school broadcasts are not justified unless they give something the schools do not provide themselves. Music and French are the obvious subjects—French readings by a French man or woman; there is no attempt to teach grammar. We put out a special French booklet for the children, so they may have the passages in front of them as they are read, and break the session with a recorded song, in French, of which the words are also in the booklet.

"In music, actual teaching can be done; in some cases the children are actually taught songs. Of course, all our educative sessions must have some bearing on the syllabus, otherwise the teachers might grudge the time lost when they could be cramming for examinations; but now that music is part of the regular curriculum of the High Schools, and pupils can be examined in it, lessons in appreciation and form are quite in order. On Friday afternoons at 3, there is a very popular national relay, 'Adventures in Music'; Mr. Frank Hutchens has been conducting it in Sydney, and Professor Heinze in Melbourne. Mr. Hutchens has been bringing members of the orchestra into the studio in groups, woodwind, strings and brass and so on, to illustrate the quality and effect of various combinations; Mr. Alfred Hill composed a special piece for three French horns, and Mr. Hutchens composed a number of short pieces to illustrate the blending of instruments.

"For Primary History classes three dramatisations are made each term.

These are written by Mr. Edmund Barclay and acted by the A.B.C. Players; last term, for instance, we had 'The Coming of St. Augustine.' Each term we have a travelogue for the geography sessions; last term it was 'A Trip up the Yang Tse-kiang,' a dialogue with sound effects between the captain of a boat and a boy just come out to China. Next term it will be 'Down the Ganges,'

"Another drama session we have is for the Secondary English classes; Dr. George Mackaness, of the Teachers' College, has arranged a series of scenes from famous English plays, illustrating the growth of English drama from the



At the Double Bay Public School they are particularly radio minded. Besides listening in to educational broadcasts they have their own amplifier system. Here is a pupil, June Hayter, "broadcasting" through "Station 2DB," as they call the school amplifier.

Miracle plays—the Noah's Ark and St. George plays, we had, and next will be Heywood's 'Four P's,' 'Gammer Gurton's Needle' and the best scene from Marlowe's 'Dr. Faustus'."

"How many books do you put out each term?"

"This term, three. One Primary, one Secondary, and one Secondary French. There is also a special 'Adventures in Music' pamphlet."

"And who pays for them?"

"They are issued free by the Commission."

"And what other subjects do you cover?"

"Nature study, history and geography can all do with talks by specialists. Teachers in small country schools or even in metropolitan schools, cannot specialise as scientists or naturalists, for instance, or their other subjects would suffer. For geography, talks by travellers who have been there are always an advantage.

"Another thing: we have been greatly helped by B.B.C. demonstration records of lessons given in England. Some of these were played through to teachers and others at the Teachers' College recently; and in the course of a discussion afterwards, Professor Mackie remarked that our people had to learn a lot from the technique of the B.B.C. broadcasters."

"In what way?"

"For one thing, they have more liveliness. It's a different technique. Without gesture, you have to gain the attention of the children. The teacher who can put his personality across the air is difficult to find. We want humor, too. One of the most successful sessions is 'The World We Live In.' by Mr. J. A. McCallum, of Sydney Boys' High School; this is the news of the week, two or three topics, a fifteen-minute session. It is quite simple and straightforward; yet I find it as enjoyable as any other news session on the air. It goes on at noon on Wednesdays, and next term will be relayed to all States."

"And how are these broadcasts arranged?"

"The Commission has an Advisory Council on School Education; this is largely the Department of Education and the Teachers' College; the Assistant-Director of Education, Mr. A. W. Hicks, is chairman, and Mr. E. A. Riley, ex-inspector of schools, is secretary. The council works through sub-committees which draft the programmes; and the A.B.C. has a veto. Mr. Riley has done a tremendous amount of work for the committee; and Mr. W. T. S. Crawford, the radio inspector for New South Wales, gives his advice on all technical questions, such as what equipment will be best for certain districts. Recently. the A.W.A. have designed a receiver specially for school-reception, and have lent models of this to various schools for them to test."

"And who buys the equipment for the schools?"

"The local parents and citizens' associations. If the local associations don't, or can't, buy receivers, the schools have to do without broadcast lessons."

"Do you ask children in to take part in the sessions?"

"No. We had about 70 girls from the Fort-street High School in the studio one day, singing songs; they all sat on the floor while a lecture was being given—that was a busy day! In Poland, they give broadcasting sessions, in which children ask questions; I believe they are very successful. But they are extemporary, I think; and here, everything must be written down. I don't think such a session would be successful unless it were extemporary."

SING HIGH, SING LOW!

Dear Sir.—No doubt it will by this time be obvious to your corrrespondent, Mr. Joseph P. Butta, if he has attended any of Lotte Lehmann's recitals or taken the trouble to read the Press reports on them, that she does not have to sing the saccharine rubbish indulged in by Richard Crooks to ensure large attendances at her concerts. The small number of songs that Mme. Lehmann sang in English were in good taste and of a very different order to "Song of Songs" and other songs of that type with which Mr. Crooks regaled his audiences.

The fact that Mme. Lehmann's concert at the Conservatorium consisted entirely of German Lieder, and was attended by the largest audience ever present in that building, is further proof that the public are only too eager to grasp the opportunity of hearing the very best in the realm of song presented by one of the world's greatest singers.

I would be interested to know upon what grounds Mr. Butta bases his ridi-

culous assertion that 90 per cent, of the people who attend concerts do so because it is the "right thing" to do. His statement that he watches the reaction of "most" of the audience to the various items is an exaggeration, because obviously it would be an impossibility for him to do this. People do not pay 8s 2d and 5s 5d a time in order to listen to something which does not interest them in the slightest degree merely because they think it is the correct thing to do.

I most emphatically disagree with the statement contained in the final paragraph of his letter, wherein he implies that only a trained musician is capable of appreciating fully the highest things in music. One does not have to be a musician to be able to appreciate the vast difference between "La donna e mobile"—the chief item in the organgrinder's repertoire—and Brahms's "Vergebliches Standchen."—Yours, etc.,

ECHOES

Dear Sir,—I would like to echo in some way "Franz's" rather too vehement demand for better music. Firstly, however, let us eliminate a word commonly used as a description of good music. There is no surer way of damning Beethoven and all his compositions than, by calling them "highbrow." Anything "highbrow" is loathsome to the ordinary person. Nothing with the thought, inspiration, and sincerity that the great masters reveal can be superficially classed as "highbrow."

You cannot force anyone to listen to a sonata or fugue, but you can interest him enough by explaining its formation, etc., so that curiosity will lead him to hear it, and often his interest, enlarged by a little understanding, will grow into something like love. Could not the wireless be used as a means of interesting and educating people? Therefore, I appeal to the Commission to give half an hour of its best rather than an hour of its second best. As a personal sugges-

tion, I would offer the Bach Chaconne and Chopin's Sonata in B Flat Minor for the near future.

One last appeal. Because one is a lover of the classics there is no need to condemn Harry Roy. He constitutes an entirely different mood. If one wants a hot rumba, a Bach Chorale is hardly adequate, while "South American Jo" is. However, whether we have Bach or Harry Roy, let us have their best.—Yours, etc.,

Huberman Arrives Soon

Celebrated Polish Violinist



RONISLAW HUBERMAN, celebrated Polish violinist, will be the Australian Broadcasting Commission's celebrity attraction for June in Sydney. He will arrive by the Monterey on June 14, and will give the first concert of his Australian season at the Sydney Town Hall on Saturday night, June 19.

Interest in the forthcoming visit of Huberman is intensified from the news that the great Toscanini had conducted the first performance of the Palestine Symphony Orchestra, founded a short time ago by Huberman. Some months ago the European papers announced regretfully that Huberman had expressed his intention of making Palestine his headquarters for the future, as he was eager to found there a great symphony orchestra that would serve the double purpose of making Jerusalem a great musical centre, and of absorbing a number of the refugee musicians from other countries. The fact that Toscanini journeved to Palestine for the opening concert on December 30 last speaks volumes for his faith in Huberman.

Huberman was born near Warsaw-at Czenstochova-and from his earliest childhood showed an uncanny gift for music. He studied first at the Warsaw Conservatoire, and when he made his first public appearance at the age of seven years he astonished a Warsaw audience with his performance of Spohr's Second Violin Concerto.

Later he went to Paris for further study, and subsequently received additional coaching from the great Joachim himself. Before the age of ten he had appeared in many of the European capi-

tals, and his success was so astounding that his father-a Warsaw barristergave up his own career in order to devote his whole time to his brilliant little

With Vienna as his headquarters, Huberman has consistently toured Europe and America year after year, his popularity increasing with each tour. Writing in the "Manchester Guardian" on January 30, 1933, Neville Cardus said: "There are moments when Huberman persuades us he is the most powerful violinist of them all, the most possessed by the daemonic. His tone has rare range; it goes through many gradations, from a soft sinuousness to which Huberman himself seems to be listening, or overhearing as though in the distance, to a symphonic bigness and swell, with cavalier attacks and releases of the bow. Huberman is the modern Doktor Faust of the violin-two souls to dwell within his breast, the surging romantic and the demonstrative."

Huberman has recently been appearing in America in sonata recitals with Artur Schnabel.

In addition to giving solo concerts the Commission has arranged for him to play concertos with its symphony orchestras in the various cities of the Commonwealth. Among the concertos he proposes to perform are by Beethoven, Tschaikowsky, Brahms, Mendelssohn, Bach, and Mozart. His solo programmes will include sonatas by Beethoven, Mozart, Brahms, Hindemith, Cesar Franck, Handel, and Bach. He will also bring forward a number of novelties by Szymanowski, Smetana, and Zarzycki.

parative ease of portrayal give me the stage every time. I often liken broad-casting to telling a story to children; one can never be sure that the images they see during the progress of the tale are those that one has tried to put be-fore their eyes. You remember the story of the child who wondered for years what was the 'O-She-Bear' in the fawhat was the O-Sne-Bear in the lamous lines from Gray's Elegy: For many
a gem of purest ray serene, The dark
unfathomed caves of ocean bear.' Well,
radio is like that. So you can see,"
concludes Harold Meade, "the high
quality of technical ability required, and
how every variation of tone must be watched and regulated.

watched and regulated.

"I can tell you that the nervous strain is enormous: particularly so in the shorter dramas and comedies which are the main part of radio fare. They are the main part of radio fare. They are so tremendously concentrated in themselves. I know that personally I am often as nerve-tired after a fifteen minute play before the microphone as after a long important part in a three-hour play in the theatre. Of course, I realise that the learning of a part, once it is accomplished, considerably lightens the task of the stage actor during perform-ances. Just imagine what it would be like if every night a stage actor had to play a different part after no more than two, or at the most three, rehearsals during the same day, even if he was allowed to carry his script in his hand, or

by some miraculous means could learn his part in so short a time.

"But, of course, it is largely the difficulty of radio acting that makes it so fascinating, and I for one never regret that I should have had the opportunity, not only here in Australia with the B.S.A. Players but on the B.S.C. in London to Players, but on the B.B.C. in London, to be one of the pioneer actors in what is undoubtedly an entirely new form of entertainment."

"There's about 180 of them, you know. Four-minute shorts. They're all new: they're very good; you've no idea how good they are."

"Did you write them?"

"No. Special writer. For broadcasting. The whole of Melbourne used to listen to them at seven o'clock-that's

true; everyone listened to them when they were given down there. I wonder if they'll use that bit of music to introduce them; you remember?"

He hummed the music at Miss Gale.

"It wasn't our own music; we are introduced on the record with 'The Campbells Are Coming'; this was a special record they put on before our record, a lead-in-everyone knew that music. What station is doing it?" "2SM."

"Who's down there? John Dunne, isn't it? Look, if you're seeing him, ask him to ring me at my home; I'll tell him about that music-it makes all the difference. Everyone knew it in Melhourne"

"Sure. And it's the only time you've broadcast?"

BETWEEN YOU AND ME AND THE MICROPHONE

LEADING LIP

CATURDAY night we went to Don Giovanni, and as I was lined up in the queue at the Conservatorium, a car drew up, and next thing I knew the Governor's wife was standing near me, and the Governor was standing next to her; a ruddy English complexion, I thought, and an officer was pushing feet first out of the car; he had blue lapels to his coat; and there I was with my hands in both pockets of a pair of grey flannels; so I thought, I wonder what is done? and took my out of my pockets, and they passed on: I always wonder what to do when authority passes by; once when I was up at Liverpool, I was sent up to headquarters with feeding returns. and passed a man on horseback. As I passed he nearly stood up in his saddle, and he glared.

Now, as I said last week, I am not much at faces, and if anyone glares at me, I am never quite sure whether he is glaring, or just moving his face about. So passing back from headquarters, he was still there sitting on his horse, and I thought, I'll have a good look this time, and see if he really dislikes me; so as I was passing I took a real good look at him, and I concluded that he might look like that naturally, because I had never seen him before, only it was more likely he was glaring at

So when I got back to our place, I said to the captain: "Captain," I said, "am I improperly dressed or something?"

"No," he said, "my son, not that I can see. Why do you ask?"

"Captain," I said, "going up to headquarters, I passed a man on horseback, and he looked at me as if he didn't like me."

"A man on horseback? How was he dressed?"

"He was dressed like an officer. Captain, with long boots and red on his lapels, and he had leaves on the peak of his cap."

"That was the General," the Captain said. "Did you salute correctly as you passed?"

"Salute, Captain? Should I have saluted?"

"You just passed him without taking any notice!"

"Should I have known him, Cap-

"Hell! You're lucky you're not in clink!"

It was not what he said; it was the way he said it, the quiet, good-natured Captain; and ever since I have always thought twice before passing

authority or letting it pass me; however, the Governor and his entourage went on into the hall before I could decide whether something more than taking my hands out of my pockets was required, and a chap came out and said that all the lower seats were sold out, but we could have some good five-bob seats for three bob. The Conservatorium is doing good business these days; at the Lotte Lehmann concert at the Conservatorium, Mr. Eric Burnett, the Commission's sardine-packer, got thirteen hundred people in, and it's supposed to hold some nine hundred odd.

And thus we saw the performance of "Don Giovanni" which has caused so many conflicting statements in the press; and such is the excellence of Sydney criticism, these days, what with Mr. Julian Russell talking of portamentos in the "Telegraph," and Mr. A. L. Kelly lending his authority to "The Sunday Sun," and our Mr. Prerauer comparing the performances with the music AS WRITTEN, etc., that I feel my opinion is hardly the thing to intrude; but I will say that Sally and I enjoyed the show very much; we laughed and laughed at Leporello, and thought Mr. William Mason was acting it very well, and Sally thought Miss Marie Ryan was very sweet, and had an exquisite pair of legs, and we felt for the first time the sustained beauty of Mozart's opera music, the loveliness that flows on and on past the words, but which perfectly sustains all the humor and wit of the words, and we saw the brilliant treatment of the minuet scene, as Mr. Kelly pointed out, etc.,

It was, in fact, one of the best evenings we have spent for a long while; but then, good evenings are not good criticism, necessarily. One of the happiest moments of my life was when I woke up when I was living in King's Cross one Saturday at noon; I felt well; I took till three o'clock to dress and get into town; and then I ordered bacon and eggs and ate them with the summer fans buzzing, and only a few people about; then I went to the pictures; and that was one of the happiest afternoons of my life; now, how do you account for that?

And on Sunday, last Sunday, I mean, we heard Mr. Denzil Batchelor sympathising with Australia on the occasion of his departure for Bali; and somehow this reminds me of the late Gus Bluett after a tour of the East-"I go down the gangway, women on one side, bare from the waist up, women on the other side of the gangway, bare from the waist up, women in front of me, bare from the waist up. Mumma lead me on! But do you know, after a few months, it just didn't mean a thing. I had to come back to Sydney to revive the



interest!" Which reminds me about the little Chinky-lou girls in Norman Lindsay's exhibition at the Macleod Galleries; all snarling with red months—among others—if all the girls in that room could come alive, the world-travel trips would be hard up for customers; the mail-steamers would be lacking in males.

All this punning, because I am hesitating where to bring in about this concert. It seems that on June 7, from 2BL, in Mr. Roy Agnew's session, there is to be a recital by Miss Gwen Selva of some songs composed by Mr. Curt Prerauer to words by a friend of mine; poor Ronald, hardly believes he is going on the air; but there it is in the programme; bad taste, he said; bad taste. Say nothing about it; say it's really the music; say I wrote them some time

"Stick up for your own work," I said. "No one else will."

"No genius," he said; "that's what's the matter. Not like Cleary's plays, you know. We need genius. Why you know. didn't Curt brings some genius out from Germany with him? Just little songs. But he's set them very well; the last one, the old harmonies; so simple, you know; but I don't know how it will go over.

"You know what I would like to do?" he droned on. "I would like to write a song that everyone would Just something simple sing-see? they would sing without wondering whether it was good or bad-"

"You're only a humbug," I said. 'You're doing the Honest Writer for the Great Heart of the People' you're excusing yourself in advance-

"Next time I see you," he said, "I won't see you. What I have done I have done; and I don't care what anyone thinks of it."

Saying these words more in sorrow than in anger, he shuffled out of the office, and then I heard him shuffling

"If you happen to hear them, let me know," he said, "what you think of them; I just like to check up on people's impressions."

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AUTOMATIC TUNING CIRCUITS

Probably the most common cause of distortion is the incorrect tuning of the receiver. Recent improvements have brought tuning meters and "magic eyes" into favor, but still there are people who never seem to get their set properly tuned in. To cure all this, there is a new American idea for automatic tuning, so that it is quite impossible to have incorrect tuning. It takes a rather complicated circuit, and on this account we doubt if the scheme is likely to meet with immediate popularity, but to those interested in technical radio it is a mighty interesting business. Here is an article explaining it, written by the Engineering Department of the Aerovox Corporation of America.

RESENT day receivers require very careful tuning in order to obtain the best possible reproduction of speech and music. Due to the sharpness of the tuned circuits, a mistuning of a few kilocycles will result in annoying distortion. The effect is made worse by the a.v.c. circuits which keep the volume approximately constant when the receiver is detuned. In fact, the adjustment for loudest sound is usually several kilocycles of resonance. In spite of the various tuning aids, such as the ming meter, magic eye or dimming Lht, the public appears either incapable or unwilling to take the proper care in tuing with the resulting mediocre recepon. It is therefore in the interest of te radio industry to provide some form of automatic tuning which will



make it imposible for the listener to have his receiv- operate on the edge of the resonance ceve.

There are perhos mechanical ways of obtaining the design result, but to the radio engineer the electronic methods are much more designle. The various circuits devised for the purpose all aim to solve the problem a similar manner. As soon as the bener has tuned his receiver to within few kilocycles of the desired signal, the afic. circuit shifts the tuning electrical to within a kilocycle of the correct adjustment. In demonstrations it has been hown that such a receiver when tuned to a frequency exactly midway betwee two stations 10 kc. apart, will select the louder one of the two. Also, when but stations come in equally strong, the first occasion when the modulating of the one carrier makes it become stroger than the other the circuit will adjust the self for this station and remain so.

The advantage of such an arrangement is easily seen, instead of occupying a width of 15 kc. on the dial. about 3 kc. of it usable, the same station will now be received over a fairly broad band but abruptly dropped at the edges. The system can be used to advantage in connection with automatic or remotecontrol tuning systems since the mechanical device needs to make an approximate adjustment only.

HOW IT WORKS


Assuming that the average receiver is a superheterodyne, the solution is to shift the frequency of the oscillator slightly so as to compensate for the mistuning. This means that the r.f. and detector stages may have to be operated 5 kc. or more off resonance and a rather broad preselector of the band-pass type is desirable.


Two functions have to be performed by the a.f.c. circuit. First, there must be a circuit which discriminates between too high and too low a setting of the dial and which translates the amount of mistuning into control voltages which are positive when the receiver is mistuned in one direction and negative when it is mistuned in the other direction. The control voltage must also be proportional to the amount of mistuning. This part of the circuit is called the "discriminator."

The second function to be performed is to correct the frequency of the oscillator by means of a circuit which is operated by the control voltage described above. This part of the circuit is called the "corrector."

THE DISCRIMINATOR

S. Y. White, of Loftin-White, demonstrated and described the first of the automatic frequency control circuits before the Radio Club of America, in October, 1934. He called them "Signalseeking circuits" and the part which is now generally known as the "discriminator" was called the "director" by him. White's original director is shown diagrammatically in Figure 1. It consisted of a special amplifier tube, driven by a stage of the i.f. amplifier. Its plate circuit contained two transformers with the primaries in parallel. One of the primaries was loosely coupled to two secondaries, while one of the secondaries was tuned to 5 kc. above the inter-





mediate frequency; the other transformer was tuned to 5 kc. below it. Each secondary was connected to a diode and the whole was arranged in such a way that the difference between the voltages developed by the two diodes appeared at the point A. The diode circuits employed a tube of the duo-diode-triode type, with the triode section unused.

When the correct frequency is being received, both of the "side circuits" have an equal voltage induced in them and the difference between the voltages across the diode loads is zero. If the incoming frequency is too high for the adjustment of the receiver, there will be more current in the diode circuit, L1.C1, which is tuned to 5 kc. above the intermediate frequency and the voltage drop across R1 is larger than the drop across R2 with the result that A becomes positive. Similarly, A becomes negative when the incoming signal is too low in frequency. In this system the second detector and a.v.c. circuit require another tube. When it is desired to stop the a.f.c. circuit, the point A can be connected to ground.

LATEST CIRCUITS

Since 1934 many improvements have been made in the design of a.f.c. circuits and it is now possible to obtain a.f.c., a.v.c. and detector action all from the same tube and to eliminate the "side circuits," employing a single secondary tuned to the intermediate frequency. Figure 2 shows such a circuit. Its action is based on the phase differences which occur between the voltages across the primary and secondary. In order to understand this, consider Figure 3.

The current, il, in passing through the primary of the transformer is lagging 90 degrees behind the voltage, El, across the primary. The e.m.f., e, induced

In the secondary is again lagging 90 degrees behind the current, i1, in the primary. Assuming that both transformers are tuned to the applied signal, the current, i2, in the secondary is in phase with the induced voltage, e, and the voltage, E2. across the condenser C2 is 90 degrees behind the current, i2, passing through it. The net result is that the voltage across the condenser C2 is 90 degrees out of phase with the voltage across the condenser C1. The phase relations are shown in the vector diagram of Figure 4.

When the applied frequency is too low, the current in the secondary is no longer in phase with the induced e.m.f. The circuit now acts as a condenser (with resistance in series) and the current through the secondary is leading the induced e.m.f. The voltage across the condenser again being 90 degrees behind the current, the vector relations become as in Figure 5. Here the voltage across the secondary is more than 90 degrees out of phase with the voltage across the primary.


Similarly, when the applied voltage is too high, the secondary acts as an inductance and the current lags the induced voltage. Under these circumstances the vector relations are as shown in Figure 6. The voltage across the secondary is now less than 90 degress out of phase with the voltage across the primary.


CIRCUIT CONSIDERATIONS

The circuit of Figure 2 now places the primary of the transformer in series with the centretap of the secondary. The result is that the voltage applied to one diode is equal to the vectorial sum of the voltage across the primary and one half the voltage across the secondary. The voltage applied to the second-diode is the vectorial difference between the same two quantities.

The vector diagram of Figure 7 shows these vectorial sums and differences for frequencies which are at, above and below resonance. Note how the voltages applied to diodes D1 and D2 vary when the frequency is varied which shows why the voltage applied to the diodes differs when the signal is off resonance. The diodes are again connected so as to obtain the difference between the voltages across the loads R1 and R2.


In order to isolate the secondary from the high voltage, the condenser C3 is needed. The capacitive reactance of this unit is very small for the frequency in question so that it does not alter the phase relations materially. The centretap of the secondary must now be





connected to the junction B of RI and R2 so as to complete the d.c. path for the dlode circuit. However, it should not complete the a.c. path so a choke is placed in this lead. The a.c. path is completed through condenser C3 and the primary of the transformer to B plus.

Automatic volume control and audio voltages are taken from the junction B. These can be obtained regardless of

Taking the audio voltage from the same tube has the advantage of simplicity, but the quality suffers somewhat. So-called high fidelity requires that a separate detector be employed. 

THE CORRECTOR

The corrector usually consists of a control tube, such as a 6C6 or equivalent, which is connected across a tuning element of the oscillator tank circuit in such a way as to make the tube equivalent to a condenser or an inductance. The control voltage applied to the grid of the tube varies the amount of this capacity or inductance and therefore changes the tuning.

Figure 8 illustrates how this can be done. The plate circuit of the tube is connected across the oscillator ink The current through the coil circuit. is 90 degrees out of phase with the voltage across the tank circuit which is also the alternating voltage pplied to the plate. The current through the small resistor R is in phase ith this current and therefore praocally 90 degrees out of phase with we voltage across the tank. This voyage is applied to the grid of the tub and causes a current in the plate circut 90 degrees out of phase with the oltage across the tank, which is the voltage across the plate circuit. Thu the plate current is out of phase with the plate voltage and therefore he tube is equivalent to an important in this case. lent to an impedant, in this case an inductance plus a resistance. The bias on the grid of the tube will vary the amount of inductace.

There are nucerous variations of this circuit, but they all work on the same principle. The difficulty is of course to get kactly the right amount of control wh the voltage developed by the discrimator. The circuit must be able to diff the oscillator frequency from 5 k to 15 kc. either direction, according to the ideas of the designer. Moreove it must shift the same number of diocycles at any frequency setting aroughout the tuning range of the ceiver. This last requirement is must harder to fulfill. So far this particular problem has not been completely solved by the circuits shown here.




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

One manufacturer has gone so far as to employ a double superheterodyne

which has a fixed-frequency oscillator. Applying the correction to this oscillator will result in the same amount of correction throughout the range of the receiver.

A popular variation of the above corrector circuit is shown in figure 9. Here the voltage applied to the grid is the drop across a condenser, which is in series with a high resistance, R. Therefore, this voltage is out of phase with the voltage across the combination R and C and will result in a plate current out of phase with this applied There are several other voltage. schemes, some employing two tubes.

APPLICATIONS

Several of the new 1937 receivers are supplied with a.f.c. systems, although the popular name varies. They have also been incorporated in sets with automatic tuning systems where the listener can dial his station.

The system appears to work well on the broadcast band. It is subject to several peculiarities. Besides dependseveral peculiarities. ing on the frequency of the incoming signal the control voltage also de-pends on its strength. So, if the incoming signal is weak and it fades, the circuit "drops" the station and it may not return when it fades back in because the dial adjustment may be too far off. The result will then be the usual inter station background noise. noise supression system is desirable.

Variations in the characteristic of the control tube may cause trouble, too. These tubes are generally run far below their rating to minimise the effect.

SHORT WAVES

Due to the fact that the amount of correction obtained varies with the frequency, the correction possible on short waves becomes very large. It is, for instance, possible to shift the oscillator frequency 100 kc. or more with the result that the strongest station on a short wave band becomes audible all over the band, while it becomes impossible to get weak stations. Furthermore, due to frequent fading of shortwave stations, the receiver signal may be dropped, whereupon the circuit promptly takes hold of the next strongest carrier. On the other hand, slight variations of the oscillator frequency, which are one cause of fading, are compensated for.

Whenever the amount of correction can be kept fixed, as in the double superheterodyne, the system should be very valuable on the higher frequencies.

ALIGNING

The serviceman who is called upon to align one of the a.f.c.-controlled receivers will have to follow a new One of the recommended methods is as follows: First align the entire receiver with the a.f.c. cut out. Then couple the signal loosely to the grid of the last i.f. stage, the one which drives the discriminator. This may be done by bringing the output lead close to the grid cap. Have the signal generator unmodulated and

tuned to the intermediate frequency. Tune in a station and adjust for zero beat between the station's carrier and the signal generator. Then switch in the a.f.c. circuit and retune the secondary of the discriminator transformer for zero beat. Zero beat should be obtained at both positions of the a.f.c cut-out switch. It may be necessary to go over the entire receiver again, repeating the entire performance as a final check.

5MX RECORD ATTEMPT

HE longest distance so far covered m N.S.W. on 5 metres is in the vicinity of 70 miles, and on Sunday, June 27, members of the U.H.F. section of the W.I.A. will attempt to create a new record.

The two main mobile 5 mx transmitters will be located at Port Kembla (South Coast) and Port Stephens (35 miles north of Newcastle). The station north will be using VK2ZC as a call sign, while at Port Kembla VK2WI.

The entire distance while not within visual range is over water. A line drawn between the two points passes 11 miles outside Cape Banks (Botany Bay Heads). The original idea was for coverage from Newcastle to Port Kembla, but a direct course between these two would pass two miles inland at Cape Banks, and be over 20 miles of land en route.

Bearings have been accurately plotted, and beam antennae will be used for the The distance required to be covtest ered is 120 miles, which would easily constitute a new record.

An antenna will also be erected facing New Zealand, and at prescribed periods tests will be directed to N.Z.

The transmitter at Port Kembla will use two 802's in push-pull in the final stage, and will be either Xtal or MO. controlled, the matter of the exciter being dependent on amount of power available.

In the April issue of "The Television and Short Wave World" magazine, an interesting account of French activity on 5 mx is given. F8LO, F8FI, and F3JH were successful in communicating from Cannes in France, to the Island of Corsica, in the Mediterranean, a distance of 229 kilometres (160 miles). The equipment used was of very low power, 6 watts in one case, and 1 watt in the other, and altogether was a very fine attempt.

The Port Stephens-Port Kembla test is very similar to the Cannes-Corsica effort, except that it is some 40 miles shorter. Stations, however, were located at altitudes of over 2000 feet in the French test, while the local effort will only have hills of 200 feet at the most

Other mobile stations will be out, one at The Jib, Mittagong, etc., and the final positions and transmitting times will be published at a later date.

The highlight of the evening was the attendance of a visitor, Miss Longley, VK6YL, from Western Australia. Longley gave a very interesting and informal chat on her association with the Wireless Institute of Australia in the various divisions during her trip over.

Leaving W.A. with the W.A. cricket team, 6YL played in the centenary championships at Adelaide, and since then travelled to Melbourne, and thence on to Sydney. She left on the following Monday for Brisbane, Miss Longley spoke very highly of the Institute in all States, and hoped that its future would be prosperous.

AVENTRY'S NEW T long last Daventry is in a position to compete with the best transmitters in the world, and TRANSMITTERS

tion to compete with the best transmitters in the world, and Australian listeners in particular should be fit immensely by the new order. Details of the three new transmitters were recently made public by the chief engineer at Daventry, Sir Noel Ashbridge. He made the pleasing announcement that each of the new transmitters would have a power of 50 kilowatts in the aerial. These are addiwatts in the aerial. tional to the old 10 k.w. transmitters and that of the first British short-wave station known so well to listeners in the earlier days as G5SW. The power of the latter is also being increased to 25 k.w. and it is possible that a little later on the two old transmitters will be combined to form a single unit of greater power. Ultimately the B.B.C. will have five powerful transmitters in use exclusively for the Empire service. In ordinary circumstances four of these will be in use simultaneously. The chief engineer adds these encouraging words: "As a result of these developments the stations should give a service as good as any of its kind in the world. ception should be far more consistent, and along the centre lines of the main directions of transmission the strength is expected to be four times greater than it is now. For much of the transmission time the quality, we hope, will resemble that of a local sta-tion." The aerial system at Daventry tion." The aerial system at Daventry is a tremendous affair, and an additional 95 acres of land had been secured to accommodate the new system. total area is now 153 acres. Eleven masts have been added, and in order to eliminate echo effects all the aerials of 20 metres and below, and some of the 25 and 31 metres, are equipped with re-flectors. The chief engineer warns listeners not to expect too much immediately, for at first the new aerials may be put into service with the old transmitters, and for some time also the new transmitters would probably work below maximum power. However, listeners can now rest assured that in the very near future all these improvements will become effective, and provide most satisfactory reception. We understand satisfactory reception. We understand that two of the new transmitters are now operating, but probably not on full Mr. L. J. Keast (Randwick) power. reports hearing Mr. R. Clark, one of the directors of the B.B.C., stating in an address that he was coming out to Australia to ascertain the effect of the new transmitters and aerials. We might add that, as a matter of fact, Mr. Clark is at present on his way to Australia. Mr. Keast finds that there is a great improvement in the signals from Daventry. He also writes in appreciative terms of the series heard from Daventry, "In Town To-night." As a rule, entertaining personalities are interviewed in this series, and some delightful chatty talks are heard. One of these (and mentioned by Mr. Keast)

was heard from Mr. C. Eden, of Devon, in South Africa, who mentioned that as a result of reading the poem, "Trayel," he came to Australia, but "as a result of tossing a penny I went back to Africa," he said. Another interesting personality was a flower-seller at Piccadilly Circus, who remarked on the good Coronation business, while another delightful talk was by an African chief from Rhodesia. Listeners who hail from the "Land o' Cakes" or who have a strain of Scottish in their blood might note in our short-wave panel of June 6 the fact that a real touch of the "Hielands" will be heard at 8 o'clock that night.


IN NORTH QUEENSLAND

One of our most consistent and enthusiastic listeners, Dr. K. B. Gaden, well-known on the North Coast of N.S.W., is now touring in the far north of Queensland, and writes on conditions on the short waves up there. Using impromptu aerial and earth at Townsville he finds reception generally very good. But the 25 band was disappointing, even the powerful TPA4 on 25.6 metres not being as good as expected. It was at its best at 3 p.m. Townsville is not the only part of the continent where the French station has so far been rather disappointing, except for a period between 2 and 3 p.m. At 3 p.m. GSD (25.5) opened stronger than TPA4, says our contributor, while GSB (31.5) was even better than GSD. noon GSD was only fair, and GSC (31.3) could not be heard. On the 19 band up to 11.30 a.m. Daventry was easily the best, with DJQ the best German, but by noon DJB (Berlin) was at its top form, and better than Daventry (GSF and GSI) on that band. In the early afternoon session GSO stands out as

the best station on the air, with DJE (16.8) the best German, and GSE (16.8) very weak. Rarely has he heard any-thing better than GSO in the afternoon session. At night the 31 band is excellent up north, and in contrast with conditions in the south, the Melbourne station, 3LR, is probably the best, but 3ME and the Suva station (VPD2, 31.41) are also very good. At night the 19 band is poor until after 10 o'clock, and GSH (13.97) at that time quite nice on this very low wave-length. An American just below GSH was also quite good. It looks as if the 13 metre band is going to play an important part in future broadcasting. Our friend shortly right into the Gulf country and we hope to receive news of conditions in that faraway part of Australia.

THE EASTERN STATIONS

As winter advances listeners will find themselves giving more attention to stations in the Far and Near East. Past experience has taught listeners of the older school that when our own Australian and European stations fade in the winter evenings there are many stations in Java, China, Japan, Sumatra, Siam, etc., that will provide ample entertainment during our evenings. Java, for instance, can be depended upon supply our requirements on 19, 29, 27, 31, 58, 63, and probably 96 metres, respectively. Java, on 31.36 metres, is providing a better signal than it did on 31.10 metres a few weeks ago, while on 19.8 metres it is excellent. It will probably be heard fairly well on the latter shortly in the late afternoons, and may again be heard on 29 metres in church services towards midday on Sundays. There are innumerable stations operating on low power throughout the Dutch

East Indies, and a number of them should soon become audible in the late evenings. Another station which is now being heard well in all parts of Australia is HS8PJ, located at Bangkok, Siam. It is heard during late evenings, and at present is operating on 32.04 metres. Just after 11 p.m. an English news session is heard. Mr. L. J. Keast (Randwick) at 11.40 p.m., on May 17, heard an announcement in English: "Broadcasting on a wave length of 32.04 metres . . . HS8PJ, Bangkok, Siam." The announcer then spoke in Slamese, and a native woman commenced sing-Last year this station operated ing. each Monday and Thursday evening from a little after 10.30 p.m. until around 12.30 a.m. Its power is 5 k.w. and is heard quite strongly towards midnight. Those who burn the midnight oil will find another interesting station radiating from Rangoon, in Burma, and which opens on 49.94 metres at 10 minutes after midnight. Numerous announcements in English are given. A good deal of old-time and dance music is heard as a rule, and the station closes with God Save the King. No call sign is used, the announcement merely stating that "this is the Government radio station at Rangoon." The Japanese, JVN, on 28.14 metres, is still heard strongly every night from about 6.45, while the Chinese, XGOX, on 43.6 metres, is also fairly strong from about 9 p.m. At midnight, JZJ, on 25.4 metres, opens very strongly with English announcements. Farther north in Eastern Siberia, RW15, on 70 metres, can now be heard practically free of static at full speaker strength.

NEWS OF OTHER STATIONS

Mr. H. W. McQuoid (Punchbowl) has been vainly endeavoring to log the Moscow station, RAN, on 31.25 metres, around 10 a.m. since last April. This station is difficult to log, but may improve during the next few weeks. Our contributor found our suggestion re W2XAF and the Coronation quite true, and their opening description was heard like a local. He also heard a station operating on about 60 metres. The only station we know near that frequency is PMY, on 58 metres. Our contributor finds Daventry on the low wave-length of 16.8 metres excellent.

Mr. E. W. Whitton (Waratah) heard a station on about 19.4 metres after GSF had closed at 11.30 a.m. on Sunday, May 9, and wonders if it was HAS3. We do not think so, but it may have been one of the German band, now being heard so well. How is it I am able to hear a local station on the shortwave band? he asks. Our friend is no doubt hearing the harmonic of the local. as there are several excellent harmonics of some local stations audible.

Mr. J. C. Cleary (Cootamundra) heard a strange station in the mornings which would be DJR, of Berlin. He also hears a Japanese between midnight and 2 a.m. between 40 and 47 metres. It is well nigh impossible for us to identify stations where there is such a difference as above.

W.G.B. (S. Brisbane) has been hearing the mysterious station mentioned recently and which plays the same record continuously for lengthy periods.

Readers' Queries Answered

R.W. (Chatswood) sends a circuit for ap-

proval.

A.—No, the circuit is not much good as drawn, there being several mistakes. It is a pity you did not use our mail service so that we could alter the circuit must be sarthed. The screens of the r.f. valves should be at 100 volts, with about 250 volts on the plates, not both running to the same voltage. R6 should be omitted. High tension for the output valve should run to the top of the voltage divider, not a clip. R3 and C3 can be omitted, with the cathode of the detector "carthed." We doubt the practice of leaving the r.f. stages without control, and this will probably mean overloading of the detector stage. A better plan would be to have the volume control working on the r.f. stages.

A.B. (Lambton) writes:—A few weeks back I wrote asking what to do when 2HD came in on 2GB's wavelength. You answered by saying



our valves might be sick, and also suggested we shorten our aerial. As the above sugges-tions proved no better, we have bought a new six-valve Stromberg Carison, and still 2HD drowns 2GB's reception. Is there anything we can do about it? Would you advise us to make a complaint to the station or the in-spector?

make a complaint to the station or the inspector?

A.—We would suggest you write to both, and also take up the matter very strongly with the dealers who supplied the new receiver. We don't know the technical staff at 2HD, but, according to reports about some stations, you'll be lucky if you get even a reply from the station. From the Radio Inspector you will probably be told that the Sydney stations are Sydney stations and that the local stations are there for your benefit, so listen to them, and don't eavesdrop on Sydney! It seems to be accepted policy that listeners should only use the stations provided for them. Not so much in your case, but in many others the distant stations are provided to serve only their own locality, and the department is not responsible if these stations fail to put in a satisfactory signal in a distant receiver. Nobody can play every station in Australia. There are more stations than suitable wavelengths. We wouldn't be at all surprised if you get most scertain to have encountered similar trouble in your locality, and should be able to tell you whether you have any remedy. Possibly a different intermediate frequency for the set, shielding to some of the leads, or the application of a wave-trap may be helpful. The dealer should be able to give you more concrete advice on these matters. Do your neighbors have similar trouble?

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He Once Taught in a Lunatic Asylum

An interview with the broadcaster and J.C.W. star—his most recent stage appearance being in "Lover's Leap" at the Theatre Royal. He is heard regularly in the 2CH shows, "Realm of Drama" and "Personal Column."





R. COPELIN settled himself on the arm of the chair in the 2CH waiting-room and said: "I never know what to say at

He pulled out a tin of tobacco and a pair of nail scissors and rolled a cigarette. He said: "I'm afraid there's nothing to say."

"How about how you started?"

"It's all been said." He trimmed the cigarette with the scissors. "You can say that the stage is finished. I definitely think it finished in Australia. I prefer pictures to the stage. What pictures have I played in? 'It Isn't Done' and 'Tall Timbers.' I prefer broadcasting to the stage. My favorite play? I haven't any. The only time I like the stage is on Fridays. I like a show I can go into at twenty past eight and come out at half-past.

"What have I been? Before I went on the stage? Everything. A school teacher in a luny asylum. That was in England. But I couldn't stand the racket. It was either them or me. So I left.

"I've done most things at one time or another. Except drive a steam roller. 'Bus driver? No. You can't drive a 'bus in London until you're fifty. But I've washed 'buses down.

"Why did I come to Australia? Because it was the furtherest place I thought of from England. Personal reasons. I had a passport to Parias as a matter of fact. Came to Australia at a couple of days' notice.

That was fourteen or fifteen years

"I tried sketching when I got here. But it didn't offer enough money. Then I went cane cutting for ten months. North Queensland. Yes, I made a lot of money at that. Then I went on a salvage job as diver's assistant. Pump hand. North Queensland. They couldn't persuade me to go below. Then on a sheep station. Then I had an orchard in Gippsland. That did me in financially for about six years. Then the stage. I walked into that job by accident. I just got there before somebody else who'd been sent down by Head Office."

"What about telling us the story we heard about you and an aeroplane?" "No-0000."

"About you and a bike. A police bike?"

"No."

"About swimming in evening dress in a certain pond——"

"THAT wasn't me! Oh, you can say I once pinched a bridegroom's horse and went for a ride. The bridal party were at breakfast. They were annoyed. But I returned the horse before the show. I gave them some tickets, and that placated them.

"Instead of putting down all that, it would be more to the point if you put in what I'd like to do to the bloke who pinched my fountain pen. I left it hanging round here somewhere, and it went."

ANEWART

ADIO drama is, of course, an entirely new art. Yet many an old actor used to

an old actor used to the footlights and the greasepaint and the applause of audiences. has taken kindly to radio—or have they? That is a question which many a listener must have wondered about, and incidentally it is a question that many a radio actor has also wondered about, and who could be more suited to approach for an opinion than Harold B. Meade, of the B.S.A. Players. Players.

Players.

For forty years he has trod the boards in England, America, South Africa, and Australia, with such famous stars as Lily Langtry and Edith Evans; been in at the beginning of the movies in Hollywood; appeared in many England talkie successes with stars like Jessie Matthews, and played parts in most of the recent Australian films. If greasepaint is not in his blood, it certainly should, by now, be a permanent part of his make-up. Yet to-day Harold Meade has dispensed with it all, until such time as television shall demand it of the radio-actor.

the radio-actor.

The other day we found Harold Meade waiting for his rehearsal call at 2GB studio, deeply engrossed in an American

studio, deeply engrossed in an American radio magazine.

"I have just been reading an interview with Lionel Barrymore," he explained, "and I was struck by the frank admission of this great artist of the almost insuperable difficulties attending successful broadcasting by the veteran of the stage and screen. Mr. Barrymore explains that he finds the absence of visual contact between his audience and himself the greatest bar to success, and

visual contact between his audience and himself the greatest bar to success, and he is right. That is, it undoubtedly is to one who has been an actor on both stage and screen.

"From my own experience," Harold Meade continued. "and my experience extends over about forty years, the easlest of the dramatic arts is that of the living stage, where the artist has his physical appearance, his gesture and his voice to help him, and has the confidence gained from the immediate response of the audience to every thought he can put before them.

from the immediate response of the audience to every thought he can put before them.

"You see the audience and the actor are in direct contact in the living theatre, and the actor feels their reaction to every emotion he has to portray, if not by their applause, at least by their concentration on what he is doing."

"But," we object, "how about the screen, isn't that nearer to radio?"

"On the surface it may appear to be," Harold Meade explained, "but the screen actor always has a certain audience which is visible to him, for on the set he is almost invariably surrounded by twenty or thirty technicians. Maybe some of them are stage hand and not very literary or trained in fine arts, but they have hearts, ears, and eyes, and they make an excellent substitute for the audience of


the theatre. But the poor broadcaster has none of these aids. He is locked away in a room where silence is almost audible, and the technicians can be glimpsed only through a glass win-dow that divides the

studio from the control room. Further, all his interest is concentrated on his script, and the microphone, so that even if there were an audience he would have little chance of judging its reactions, and in the place of the audience, in place of gesture, make-up, and physical appearance, he has only his voice.


proximity of his fellow players, and more than even stage or screen actor. he has to wrap himself in the character he is portraying, and he has only his brain and his voice to help him, and on top of that he has a million distracting thoughts to hinder him. He must remember and never, never forget, the extreme sensitiveness of the instrumnt before him. The rustle, however slight, of the script in his hand is translated by the microphone into a forest fire with a thunderstorm behind it. Yet if he is to give a good performance, he must relegate all thought of the instrument and of the other people about him to his subconscious mind. His conscious mind must be entirely devoted to the management of his voice; for with that alone he must make his audience see scenes and people quite different from those about him.

"Yes," says Harold Meade, biting ru-minatively at his pipe which he has let go out as he has been talking, "for com-

Listeners not present will be invited to take part in the game; the two speakers will give them over the air a minute description of the couples that will be interviewed, each one in turn, before the microphone. The "Ideal Couple" winning the contest will receive from Radio-Cite a dowry of 50,000 francs, some furnished apart-



In introducing the bill the Congressman declared that his complaint was not against the broadcasters, but against those who advertise over broadcasting stations, If passed, the bill—which is at present pending before the House Interstate Commerce Committee -would make it unlawful "for anyone to broadcast any recommendation of an article, indicating that he has used such an article, unless the individual shall, at the time of the broadcast, also broadcast the fact that the recommendation was secured by the promise of payment or payment of money or some other valuable consideration.
