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
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



A.B.C. and COMMERCIAL STATIONS TO CO-OPERATE

A USTRALIAN listeners will be better served during the 1938 Test Matches in England than on previous occasions because of the friendly co-operation of the Australian Broadcasting Commission with the Commercial broadcasting stations. The National and Commercial stations are pooling their resources to provide a common cable service from the English cricket grounds, as was done in 1934, but this year the co-operative effort is being extended still further.

A cable route from England to Australia has been reserved for the Test cables, and special arrangements are being made for direct lines from the English grounds to cable headquarters in London. Mr. E. Sholl, cricket commentator on the Commission's staff, is being sent to England to supply the cables, and he will be assisted by Mr. C. Gardner, the Melbourne "Sun's" cricket writer. When the cables reach Australia, they will be re-transmitted by telegraph circuits throughout Australia to every broadcasting station requiring the service. Elaborate and efficient arrangements have been made with the co-operation of the Postmaster-General's Department to ensure that the messages will reach all stations simultaneously, and the time between the moment of despatch from the ground until time of receipt at the broadcasting stations is expected not to exceed two minutes.

As there can be no guarantee that the shortwave transmission will remain audible, even if it does come in clearly at any stage, the organisers have arranged to maintain the supply of cables throughout the whole of each day's play. Each station's audience will depend on its individual treatment of the messages and on its own technical coverage. Many stations taking the service will broadcast the cricket story in full from 8.30 p.m. Others are arranging the broadcasts from 11 p.m., whilst some will give scores at 15-minute intervals.

The organisers of the scheme, Mr. Charles Moses, General Manager of the Australian Broadcasting Commission, and Mr. D. Worrall, Manager of 3DB, Melbourne, now report that the B.B.C. has decided to co-operate in the Test Cricket broadcasts. From midnight Australian E.S.T., if reception conditions are satisfactory, Australian broadcasting stations will re-broadcast a ball-for-ball story transmitted by the Empire Shortwave Stations which will be available to all in the Australian co-operative effort. For previous Test series, shortwave has been unsatisfactory, though some fairly good reception was found possible for the final Test in August, and even then not before about 1 a.m., but this year it is expected that the more powerful transmitter at Daventry and better receiving technique will result in much better reception.

The Commission has retained Messrs. W. A. Oldfield and A. E. R. Gilligan to give special talks from England, and 3DB has secured the services of Mr. W. M. Woodfull for similar work, but it is now decided that their talks, which will be given at lunch, tea or stumps, will be made available to all Australian stations in the scheme.

The Adventures of CAPTAIN KETTLE

SHERLOCK HOLMES, Father Brown, "The Scarlet Pimpernel" . . . these are but a few of the famous fictional characters brought to radio; now another comes to join this illustrious band . . . "CAPTAIN KETTLE."

On his first appearance in 1898, Captain Owen Kettle, the belligerent, acid-tongued, red-bearded little seaman, with his aura of blue waters and far-flung ports, found instant popularity with the public. In response, his creator, the late C. J. Cutcliffe Hyne, wrote a number of short stories through which the little captain stalked bantamlike and cocky, one hand holding a pencil for composing sonnets, and the other clutching a revolver loaded for business.

The Australian Broadcasting Commission has obtained from Mrs. Cutcliffe Hyne, rights of a number of stories featuring this lovable little rogue. Max Afford, A.B.C. playwright, is now at work adapting these stories into a serial under the title of "The Adventures of Captain Kettle." It will be programmed by various States within the next month or so. Captain Kettle finds no lack of adventures as he steps from the printed page to the microphone. Listeners will hear how he undertook to run contraband arms to the rebels in Cuba, how he became king of the island and almost lost his life in a revolution. They will be with him when he becomes embroiled in a pearl-poaching expedition in the North Australian waters; they will learn how, single-handed, he set out to obtain a republic for the ambitious Donna Clotilde . . . and how she retaliated by asking him to share it. When he refused to do this (bearing in mind Mrs. Kettle and his daughters) the resolute woman kidnapped him and held him prisoner on her palatial yacht, where she could woo him at her leisure.

Thus mystery, romance, adventure and humor thread each episode, punctuated by the rattle of a machine gun and the roar of surf on a distant coral island. Always one of fiction's most popular heroes, it seems safe to predict a similar approval when "The Adventures of Captain Kettle" begin shortly, in radio form, from the National Stations. WORLD RADIO CONVENTION IN SYDNEY

To be opened by radio by the Duke of Gloucester next month the World Radio Convention in Sydney will be yet another event in the 150th Anniversary Celebrations.

A WORLD Radio Convention, probably the first of its kind to be held, will assemble in Sydney from April 4th to the 14th in connection with the 150th Anniversary Celebrations in progress this year.

The Convention has been organised by the Institute of Radio Engineers, Australia, and is the result of two years planning and organising. It was felt that the commemoration of Australia's 150th Anniversary would be a fitting time to invite leaders in radio, from all over the world, to come to Sydney as guests of the I.R.E., to see for themselves what Australia was doing in radio, and, at the same time, to make an opportunity for them, through a convention, to present much material which would be of great benefit to ourselves and to all attending the convention.

Accordingly, invitations to attend were sent to a number, of world figures in radio and broadcasting, and most of them have been able to accept.

The official opening takes place in the Great Hall of the Sydney University on Tuesday, April 5, at 2.30 p.m. The ceremony will be performed by H.R.H. the Duke of Gloucester by wireless telephone from London. The proceedings will be broadcast from the University through a number of Sydney broadcasting stations.

The overseas guests, who have accepted the official invitation to be present, include Her Excellency the Marchesa Marconi, widow of the late wireless genius, who had, prior to his death last July, arranged to be in Australia during these celebrations and the convention.

General J. Harbord, chairman of the Radio Corporation of America, a prominent soldier and ex-Chief of Staff of Pershing's Army in France. He will be accompanied by Mr. E. S. Colling, Public Relations Officer in R.C.A.

Dr. van der Pol, well-known Dutch scientist, head of research of Philips, past vice-president of the I.R.E. of U.S.A., and a man upon whom many scientific honors have been bestowed. He will deliver a very important and interesting paper dealing with the relation of radio to other science.

Mr. J. Logie Baird, television pioneer of England, will

also be a guest of the institution and will deliver a scientific treatise on television.

Dr. J. D. McGee, M.Sc., Ph.D., will also deliver a paper on British television, his particular reference will be to the Emitron Camera, the research of which he has been engaged upon. Dr. McGee graduated as a Master of Science at the University of Sydney; is Australian born and has been in England for the past ten years. The first three he spent at Cambridge, graduating as a Doctor of Philosophy; he then took up duty with the E.M.I. Marconi television people and has been closely associated with the development of television in England.

Mr. F.-S. Hayburn, director and foreign envoy of the Marconi group of companies, with whom he has been associated all his life, and is well versed in world-wide radio matters. He will be accompanied by Mrs. Hayburn.

The Radio Manufacturers' Association of England have sent as their official delegate to the convention Mr. R. Milward Ellis, vice-president of the R.M.A. and managing director of Pye Radio in England.

The Dutch East Indies wireless authorities are also sending one of their prominent engineers, but the actual man has not yet been selected.

It is also anticipated that at least one if not two prominent radio engineers from New Zealand will be attending the convention.

Radio people from all over Australia have signified their intention of attending this convention, which is understood to be the first of its kind ever held in the world. Hitherto international radio conferences have been held, but only by Government representatives of the various countries, dealing largely with the general control of wireless.

The subjects to be discussed at this convention cover

practically every field of application of radio, and will, it is believed, be the means of assembling a very representa-tive gathering. 7#EMUSIC

SZELL, NEVILLE CARDUS, I, EVEN BRUNO WALTER, ALL MAY ERR

S ZELL, when asked whether he conducted the St. Louis (U.S.A.) Symphony Concerts, replied that he did, for two years, but that he simply forgot to mention it, because he was not a publicity man. He cannot be an expert showman, then, and we like this idea.

Neville Cardus, when talking about Szell over the air, was telling us that the "almost gipsy-like character" of the Philharmonic Orchestra in Prague needed a personality like Szell's to restrain it. Mr. Cardus is fundament-ally wrong. Szell was leading conductor of the oldest Prague Opera, whose orchestra gives also subscription concerts which Szell also conducted. Theatre and orchestra are an old institution, Mozart had many of his works performed there. Nothing gipsy-like about opera house or orchestra. There is, besides, the Czech Philharmony, a first-rate orchestra, too, of first-rate players. I heard them often enough, and could not discover anything gipsy-like in them. Szell conducted them as guest. The permanent conductor is Vaclay Talich.

Neville Cardus spoke of Bruckner. Some people here think that I am a crank to say that Bruckner's symphonies equal those of Beethoven. But then, they don't know them at all, or from one performance only, or so.

It was there that I made my mistake: There are no tubas in Bruckner's fourth (Romantic) symphony.

Bruno Walter, if he had come, would also have conducted Bruckner. We cannot quite see the point why, at a time when Szell's reactions upon Australia and vice versa have not been tested yet. another conductor has been approached. We still hope that the A.B.C. seriously wants one for good. Bruno Walter never would do, as even in Europe, whenever he was under a long contract, he had to have many months off to fulfill his guest contracts with other organisations. Walter is one of the most expensive conductors in the world. I am not so sorry that his fee was too exorbitant, as I share Huberman's view that Walter recently deals with rhythm in a rather "personal" way. Furthermore, Bruno Walter might have some ideas about the A.B.C.; whether they are justified or not we are not interested in discussing. But we must not forget that de Abravanel is a good friend of Bruno Walter's. . . .

ALFRED HILL

THERE are three possible attitudes towards music: One section of people advocates anything that wears some patina. Another section rejects everything that wears the stamp of former

times. A third section questions: Is the music good? Does it bear the stamp of personality? As I claim to belong to the latter section, I can enjoy wholeheartedly Alfred Hill's music. Truly, this music is not modern, there are "no un-resolved dissonances" in it. as Ernest Wunderlich put it. One or two escapades into the realm of light opera were noticed, for instance, the song of Mr. Kingsley, in "Auster," or the rhythm in the well-known, popular "Waiata Poi." But when these escapades are made, they are full of vigor; and I felt re-minded of Hill's thrilling rhythms of another Maori piece, "Song of the Locust." Otherwise, Hill's music sticks to the classical pattern, avoiding mostly the sleek chromatics found with some minor composers of the Romanticist period. Hill has been a pioneer of Maori music; he does not claim to have been a revolutionary himself. However, al-though the masters of the past have shaped Hill's musical form and his harmonic and melodic imagination, this imagination showed itself as being definitely personal. We thank the A.B.C. for presenting a full-length concert of Hill's works, under the composer's able and inspiring direction.

We heard at first a "Celebration" overture which seemed to be the least individual of all the works. Lionel Lawson played the violin concerto, and we think that this work should be performed more often. Its musical qualities would justify it. That Hill has a specially thorough knowledge of string instruments was evident. Followed four pieces for orchestra of which I liked

every bar, with Hill's feeling for poetical atmosphere. The last movement of the symphony in E Flat seems to lend itself better to the original scoring for chorus with the accompaniment of string quintet than for orchestra. Its music is perhaps too intimate for orchestra. About "Auster" I have spoken last week, the performance confirmed again the deep impression I had of the work three years ago. All the soloists were particularly good. There were some seats empty in the

There were some seats empty in the hall, as were also in the concert of Australian composers, in the previous week. I have seen concerts of the same kind, with only cultural, but no sensational value, less well attended in London, in Berlin, in Vienna. However, nobody was deterred from continuing such concerts.

Alfred Hill, venerable old composer, with a youthful heart and a temperament with musical and personal sincerity few possess, we congratulate you on a great success and wish you still many others.

At the same time, genius has a terrible blighting effect on anything put near it, even on honest work, and the honest workmen when they wake up reply in kind, but in the dull and dirty idiom to which honest workmen are accustomed.

Which portentous opening was inspired by a rebroadcast of the World Broadcast made the other night from 2BL. The original was at 4 o'clock in the morning, which nobody but persons interested in broadcasting could be expected to listen to. But I was tuned in by chance to 2BL in the evening and heard this recorded version, beginning with the aboriginal songs of Dr. Lethbridge, which sounded as though the doctor had grafted a nose from an aborigine on to a country schoolmaster, and then presented the country schoolmaster as an Australian aborigine.

I nearly forgot the clucking of the lyre-bird, which opened the show. Then the corroboree; that was quite good; that was excellent.

Then there were the Australian bush songs by Mr. William G. James; and if the celebrated Tosti, or the author of "Where My Caravan Has Rested," or even Mr. Albert Ketelbey, of Chinese Market Garden fame, had had to set the words Mr. James had to set and present ballads with an Australian atmosphere, they couldn't have done it better. Or not much better. And that is high praise.

Then Mr. Roy Agnew played his own compositions, "Drifting Mist" and "Rabbit Hill," and the woman who was listening with me said, as soon as he began with the rabbits, "There, I knew it'd go bumpity bump; I knew it from the title."

And then we came, as the announcer said, to Percy Grainger's "Colonial Song," and they played a few bars of this, and I said to the woman—"It's amazing, isn't it, how genius can be preserved?" and she said yes, it was, wasn't it. Then I began those mundane reflections about genius which begin my remarks.

So what we must do as soon as possible is have Grainger arrested and put in prison. He isn't in Australia now, of course, and that is not the least of his offences, as I shall show later; but what we can do is make the charges out and get an extradition warrant out for his arrest, or in some way lure him back to Australia, and arrest him when he lands.

As to charges; firstly all the evidence goes to show that his whole reputation as a composer rests on a few little pieces, such as "Country Gardens," "Molly on the Shore," "Shepherds Hey" and "The Colonial Song." These pieces are so short that they don't give the public a chance of seeing how boring Grainger could be if he wrote a symphony or an oratorio or an opera, and this is not fair to the composers of symphonies and operas.

Secondly, these pieces he puts his name on, he didn't write them at all. He just dug them up, as one might say facetiously. But an honest man might take a more serious view of a person who found an old treasure on his host's estate and took it with him at the end of his visit. From England. the trusting heart of Grainger snatched his "Shepherds Hey" and "Country Gardens." and from persecuted Ireland, as though Cromwell and Carson hadn't done enough, he pillaged "Molly on the and "The Colonial Song." Shore" There is enough evidence in this alone to justify his arrest as an Australian muiscal confidence man, and if giving an old Irish air the title of "Colonial Song" isn't absolute misrepresentation, I don't know what is.

Thirdly, the above charges might not be pressed if it could be shown that Grainger were just an irresponsible nitwit and didn't know what he was doing. He might be excused temporarily insane when the as crimes were committed, or just as another of these Australians. But the evidence is quite the other way. He made money out of his robberies, and acquired a considerable popularity. They were issued by publishing fences to the public as piano solos, orchestral pieces, pieces for string quartets, and in various weird arrangements for unheard-of instrumental combinations. They were played at public concerts, in parks on Sunday afternoons, in pictureshows, in theatres, in restaurants, in countless suburban homes by little girls with pigtails, and over the air. Fourthly, the public liked these

Fourthly, the public liked these versions, and not because they were good music, but because they were gay.

Fifthly, in spite of the fact that the pieces were gay, they had the unmitigated hide to be good music. There is no doubt about this. The orchestration is brilliant, intense and various, and this is quite obvious to anybody.

Sixthly, not only did Grainger steal these works from trusting strangers, but he added insult to injury by making the works indisputably his own by an orchestration and setting which have the unmistakable seal of his own individuality. Seventhly, he can't be got at and patronised, because he has enough money to tell you to go to hell, and this, allied to his living in America, is the most terrible crime his fellow Australians can charge him with. If we could say, oh, yes, poor old Perc., and send round the hat to end him off in cheap comfort, that would be all right.

Anyhow. that should be enough to go to Mr. Menzies with and get him to take action. There are plenty of other charges, like his experiments with musical glasses, that you could get him on; but the main thing to remember is that he's got genius and therefore is extremely dangerous.

And don't make any mistake about there being only just a little of it; it doesn't take much to make a lot of trouble. Look at broadcasting programmes; they have to put on more than 24 hours of programmes every day in Sydney, also Melbourne, also Brisbane, and it does show things up rather, when you have a good bit of work shining out of the night sessions, let alone the day sessions. I often think, if the Commission had any sense at all, it would cut down time on the air to a few hours by day and two hours at night, and leave the rest of the entertainment business to the commercial stations.

I can't see why they shouldn't. It would be hard to imagine a more shocking wilderness than a week of the Commission's present programmes. It is harder, when you consider the lonely excellence of the few Grainger pieces, to understand why so much is broadcast which can only dullen, bore, weaken, and mislead public appreciation.

And while we are talking about things being hard to understand, I bet you couldn't guess how Captain Aarons's Blunder Budget last week came out as it did. Nor can we. But we are rather proud of it, because we can't think of anything worse happening in Sydney in the past ten years. There have been more vulgar errors, but none has been more apposite. Wherefore:

TURNTABLE TOPICS

"AT THE COURT OF FREDERICK THE GREAT."

Z.760/62—AT THE COURT OF FRED-ERICK THE GREAT (DECCA). MUSICA ANTIQUA AND SPEAK-ERS.

THIS is really a little play with appropriate music, centering on the famous incident of Bach's visit to Frederick the Great at Potsdam. The King was an amateur flautist of considerable ability, and amused his leisure with concerts, in which he played to his own, and no doubt, to his court's

satisfaction, flute concertos. One evening, he was just about to commence a concerto with the Royal Orchestra when a list of new arrivals was handed to him. The concerto was forgotten, and with obvious excitement the King uttered the historic words:

"Gentleman! Old Bach is here!"

In this recording we meet Frederick, and his chief court musicians—Quantz, his flute teacher, Carl Philipp Emanuel Bach, his cembalist, and the great Johann Sebastian himself. The incident of Bach's arrival at Potsdam is treated with just the right amount of drama. but one misses Frederick's historic utterance.

Some delightful music is heard in this recording, beginning with Frederick playing with his court musicians, and executing some practice scale passages with considerable agility.

This is followed by a violin and flute duet with harpsichord accompaniment by Carl Philipp Emanuel Bach. On the next record, Frederick laments his inability to play rapid passages, and C. P. E. Bach plays an air and variations on the harpsichord. This is a very interesting little work, and is beautifully played by the soloist.

There follows a quartet by Telemann (concerning which Quantz deplores the "French influence"), and a viol-degamba solo by Carl Frederick Abel. This is played on a 'cello, and not on the old six-stringed instrument. J. S. Bach now arrives on the scene, and the King offers him a fine subject on which to build a fugue. Bach seats himself at the harpsichord, and improvises a threepart fugue-later to be developed into the famous "Musical Offering."

The recording ends with Bach's playing fading away into silence. It is a splendid issue from any point of view. The playing of the various pieces is excellent, and the spirit of the times has been happily caught by both instrumentalists and speakers.

LOX.339/41 (Col.)—CONCERTO IN B MINOR FOR VIOLA AND ORCHES-TRA (HANDEL, ARR. CASADEUS). LA CAMPANELLA (PAGANINI, ARR PRIMROSE)—W. Primrose and Chamber Orchestra, conducted by W. Goehr.

The musical world owes this concerto for viola and chamber orchestra to the enthusiasm for research in old music of Henri Casadeus, the founder of the French "Societie des Instruments Anciens," and himself a viola player of repute.

It seems rather a pity that he does not tell us in the leaflet which accompanies the records where, or how, he found the work,

M. Casadeus himself worked out the harmonic scheme figured from a and also bass. orchestrated the work, in view of which we may suppose that the original contained little more than the solo part, and a rough figured bass. Of the three movements, the second is perhaps the most appealing. It is one of the most serene and reflective of all movements, William Decision liam Primrose plays this work magnificently, with re-markably rich and sonorous tone. His technique is effortand less. his phrasing exquisite.

"La Campanella" is played as a viola solo, with piano accompaniment, and here again Primrose shows beyond all doubt that he is the legitimate successor to the great Tertis.

DOX.545 (Col.) - FANTASIA ON NORWEGIAN FOLK SONCES-Nor-

weglan Light Symphony Orchestra. The Scandinavian countries are exceptionally rich in folk-music of a most attractive nature, and this music can be roughly divided into two main divisions.

The first is strongly rhythmical, and is essentially dance music. The subjects of the songs of the second division are usually the homely ones of the country side—hunting, farming, maidens deserted by false lovers, and, of course, love-making, which in Norwegian song, is expressed with tenderness rather than with passion. There is often a peculiar eeriness in these songs (most of which are in a minor key), that may be accounted one of the chief characteristics of Scandinavian folk music. This recording contains examples of both divisions, and the playing of the Norwegian orchestra is really splendid.

> His music reveals an originality and freedom, a richness and imagination beyond any similar works up to his time, and has had an influence on nearly every operatic composer since—particularly on Wagner.

Faults there undoubtedly are in this opera—his arias are occasionally curiously difficult to sing owing to the awkwardness of the words, but despite this, "Der Freischutz" has an extraordinary power of thrilling an audience even to-day, and the music has a rapturous impulse that carried us off our feet.

After the fashion of the times, the opera deals with love and magic, and the overture gives us the atmosphere and some of the music of the dramatic work which follows it.

The sweet, and virginal heroine, Agatha, is represented in the overture by a lovely clarinet solo, all the more effective as it follows a section wherein the dark powers of nature are evoked. Another section, given to strings, woodwind, and drums, describes the scene where Casper, the villain, agrees to deliver his soul to the demon Zamiel.

The Boston Orchestra give a creditable performance, and the disc can be thoroughly recommended to those who want a cheap, but musically worthwhile recording of this famous overture,

NEW STUDIOS FOR 48H, BRISBANE

B ROADCASTING Station 4BH Brisbane is to have a magnificent new suite of modern studios and offices. A site in Adelaide Street has been chosen, and construction work has already commenced, completion being expected within a few

weeks. The total floor area to be occupied by the new Station 4BH is probably the largest of all radio stations in Queensland, and the entire premises, covering two floors, will be air - conditioned throughout.

The acoustic characteristics of each studio have been scientifically calculated, and the studios themselves have been specially designed for the various types of broadcasts.

In Adelaide Street an attractive new front will be constructed. The main entrance doorway will be of modernistic design with translucent lighting. A handsome staircase, with stepped celling, will lead to the reception foyer, which will be large enough to provide comfort for many visitors.

The offices of the manager and other executives will also be situated on the first floor.

No. 1 studio, the auditorium, will be close to the reception foyer. Equipped with special sound-lock doors to prevent the slightest noise from penetrating to the studio, the auditorium will be an ideal broadcasting room. This particular studio will be furnished with a stage large enough to present big plays, stage bands, and other combinations requiring plenty of space, and will also have accommodation for a fair-sized audience.

The presence of an audience during certain presentations has an excellent psychological effect, inspiring the players with greater enthusiasm, and adding warmth and vividness to the production. This style of studio arrangement will be an innovation to Brisbane, and should prove very successful.

On the right of the auditorium, through plate glass, will be seen No. 2 studio and the control room. Between the two rooms is the producer's booth. Glassed in on three sides, the booth is situated to enable the producer at his control board. to see into both studios and the control room, communicating his





wishes when necessary by means of loud speakers. This arrangement also is a departure from the usual style of studio lay-out.

Both studios will be furnished with the idea of creating a feeling of "atmos phere"—an important factor in obtaining the best effect.

On the second floor will be located the general offices for clerks, continuity and copywriters, etc., the programme department for the housing of records and scripts; and three more studios, one for women announcers, another for talks, etc. (to be known as the library), and the third, to be called the music room, for purely musical sessions. This type of setting out follows the plan carried out so successfully by the B.B.C. in England.

As previously, transmission will be effected through the broadcasting site at Bald Hills. The technical equipment of the new 4BH will be of the latest pattern and efficiency, and will include the most advanced devices known to modern radio. With elaborate premises and greater facilities than ever before, productions on a scale hitherto impossible will be presented through the new 4BH.

Please," at 9.45, plano recital by Roy Agnew at 10.15, news at 10.30, and dance music at 10.50 p.m. Look for recorded music from 3ME between 7.0 and 10.0 p.m., and from 6ME between 9.0 and 11.0 p.m.

Short-Wave Notes By R. N. Shaw

THILST the entertainment value IN HOT, HUMID AREAS of short wave reception cannot be too highly stressed, its value from an educational viewpoint

makes a very strong appeal to a large percentage of listeners. In these days of trouble, tribulation, and uncertainty overseas, and in Europe in particular, the value of short wave stations as informative channels cannot be over-estimated. But one feature must have appealed to the observant listener during the several crises in European politics, and that was the varying reactions apparent in the manner, so to speak, putting the news over the ether. of How every true Britisher must have felt some pardonable degree of pride as he listened again and again to the celm and dispassionate news bulletins given from London during the recent Edén-Chamberlain crisis, and what comparisons must have been made with certain other news bulletins which have been heard in English from certain foreign countries! During the past week the famous Moscow trials have provided star news items in broadcasts from most stations, but it has been most interesting to hear and compare the news as heard from Moscow, Berlin. Paris, and London. Berlin stations in particular gave very lengthy reports of the trials. In one broadcast it was hinted that such trials were rather necessary as a kind of smoke-screen to cover up the failure of the Stalin promises! On Friday afternoon the Berlin stations gave considerable time to a description of the cordial welcomes being accorded in Berlin to the new American Ambassador. This week from American stations came quite a different type of interesting but tragic news, which dealt with the disaster caused by floods around Hollywood. Some of the first news flashes from W8XK and W2XE were decidedly realistic.

ROME-TOKIO RELAYS

On two occasions Rome and Tokio were heard in contact by Mr. G. A. Stead (Newcastle), when arrangements were being made for relay of pro-grammes between the two countries. Mr. Stead, who is a new contributor, employs a dual wave "baby" receiver, but gets excellent results from London, Berlin, Paris, Tokio, and Manila. He would like a list of stations. This in-formation is available in the "Wireless Weekly" Call Sign Book, obtainable from most booksellers,

Mr. A. H. Sheens (Penrith) heard 2ME, of Sydney, operating on 18.37 metres on Tuesday afternoon in an attempt to contact Suva on 19.79 metres. Reception of 2ME was really excellent throughout, both on voice and in music. This listener was very pleased with reception of PCJ (19.7) in its special relay to Tasmanian stations on Tuesday night.

GETTING OVERSEAS NEWS

For long have we stressed the value of short wave receivers to listeners in the outback static areas. This week, from Mr. F. J. Carter, out yonder at Texas, Queensland, comes an interesting report of conditions in what he terms a very hot and humid district. Using a dual wave Pentagrid receiver, he gets a lot of enjoyment on the bands between 18 and 50 metres. As late as 10 to 11 a.m. KDKA is heard giving news and sporting shots. This would be W8XK on 19.7, which relays KDKA. The S.S. Kanimbla (49.8) provides a very pleasant half-hour of music, whilst at 9.30 p.m. he heard a station at Moscow on 24 to 25 metres (would be RNE, 25.0), with a lady announcer in English, who repeatedly used the term, "My Soviet country," but says he "who apparently was not too pleased with Herr Hitler!" Our friend heard a station on 31 band, which would be KZRM. He also heard another at 10.30 p.m. on approximately 19 metres, when reception of several musical num-bers was 100 per cent. He asks for its identity, but this is very difficult, as YDC, TPA, DJB, and DJQ, of the foreign stations, are all operating at that From the numbers mentioned time. we should say the station was YDC, of Bandoeng. Every evening from 5 o'clock Berlin is now heard excellently, and names and call-signs are desired. They are DJB (19.74), DJQ (19.6), DJE (16.8), DJA (31.38), and DJN (31.4).

DUPLEX SINGLE PLEASES

For a long time Mr. Roy Woodward, of Ryde, has read these notes, but now he has built himself a "Wireless Weekly" Duplex Single, and is pulling in stations from everywhere. Amongst those heard was Manila. the call-sign of which sounded like KGIM. It was broadcasting a sponsored session by somebody's This station perfume and soap agents. was KZRM (31.35). Just above it he heard a foreign station at 11 p.m. This would be YDB (31.36), of Java.

MOSCOW BROADCASTS

One of the most interesting, and certainly one of the most outspoken, stations on the air, if we can so describe a station, is RNE, of Radio Moscow. For some years regular English sessions are heard, and this week Mr. K. Foster, of Nimbin, writes that he has just received quite a lot of literature, postcard views, etc., from the station at Moscow. In sending us the latest schedule for the Moscow station, Mr. Foster rather aptly mentions that "short wave radio is a wonderful thing, as you never know what is going to turn up!" This is decidedly true in respect of the transmissions from Moscow, as one does not know just what fiery criticism of Germany or Italy will be heard on any evening when RNE is on the air. This station's schedule is 9 to 10 p.m. on Sun-

day, 9.30 to 10.30 p.m. on Wednesday, whilst it gives an English on 50 metres between 7 and 8 a.m. on Monday, Tuesday and Saturday. Transmissions on 25 metres have been quite good this week, but it is difficult to satisfactorily hear the station on 50 metres. Thank you, Mr. Foster, for the information and good wishes.

NEWS OF OTHER STATIONS

Czechoslovakia, on 31.4 metres, is being heard at full speaker until about 8 a.m. News in English is heard at about 7.40 a.m. daily. London on GSB (31.5) and GSD (25.5) is also very strong now until after 8 a.m. All stations show continued improvement in the morning and afternoon.

Mr. L. Lawson (Wauchope) reports hearing the Colon station, HP5K, opening quite strongly one night last week. This station was heard excellently last year, and should improve during the next few weeks. It can be heard open-ing at 10 p.m. on 49.96 metres, right alongside of 9MI.

Mr. L. J. Keast (Randwick) says that on Monday HBO, on 26.31 metres, was very fair at 6 to 6.30 p.m. It was stated that HBO would till further notice operate from 5.30 p.m., and HBJ, on 20 metres, from 6 pm. On Sunday night we heard both stations at 6.45 p.m. in a special broadcast, Australia and New Zealand being mentioned. At 7 p.m., however, talks by a lady and man were put over in foreign language. Mr. Keast found PCJ (19.71) in the Australian session almost inaudible on Tuesday night at 7.50 o'clock. On Sunday at 3.40 p.m. YDC (19.8) was very good, as was DJB (19.74) as early as 3 p.m. Again at 4 p.m. W1XK (31.35) was heard signing off, reception being fairly good. All this indicates changing conditions. The Siam station, HS8PJ, on 31.5 metres, was very good at 11.20 p.m. on Thursday, whilst a very interesting talk was heard from JZJ (25.42) from Tokio at 11.30 p.m. on cherry blossom time in Japan. Mr. Keast refers to the fearful "echo" heard at times on GSO in the night sessions, and wonders if others are annoyed also by this. Yes, we frequently hear it, and others have referred to the interference.

In North Queensland, Dr. K. Gaden (Richmond) finds the 19 band coming along excellently in the mornings, with GSD very fine on 25 metres after 7 a.m. The best on 19 metres are GSO, W2XAD, W8XK, and DJQ, and on 25 metres the best are GSD, DJD, TPA3, and W2XE. On 31 metres there are plenty to choose from, and mostly good, with W2XAF now excellent some morn-ings On 49 metres GSA is very good, DJC fair, OLR2A very good on both 49.75 and 49.92 metres. Dr. Gaden still hears the mystery station at 7 a.m., which plays the International. ZRH is now stronger than ZRK on 49.2 metres

THE Radiokes DWMS receiver has been designed with the following ideas in view:—It must be extremely inexpensive to build; performance must be of a high order and the construction and alignment must present no undue difficulties.

We have achieved these ideals in no uncertain manner, but it must be remembered that the finished receiver can be no better than the accessories used with it. We therefore recommend that the valves and speaker used with this receiver be the same as we have used in the development, i.e., Radiotron valves and Amplion speaker. If desired, the glass equivalents of the metal valve series can be used, but it will be necessary to fit valve shields on the 6A8G, 6U7G, and 6B6G. A front view of the chassis which can be built up from the "Money-saver kit-set. No great amount of skill is needed for the job, and any handyman can assemble the receiver in a few hours.

ASSEMBLY INSTRUCTIONS

(To be used in conjunction with diagram No. 1.)

Start the assembly of the receiver by mounting the valve sockets and power transformer. Continue with the gang condenser and I.F. transformers. The voltage divider is then mounted on the rear of the chassis, using the earth terminal as one mounting screw. Finally mount the padder. The dial is left until the receiver construction is completed to avoid damage.


The electrolytic condenser is fitted before the last wiring operation, as otherwise the power transformer wiring would be extremely difficult.

FIRST WIRING OPERATION-


DIAGRAM No. 2

Commence by wiring a 16-gauge busbar lead around the chassis, starting at lug No. 1 on 5Z4 socket, and ending at lug No. 1 on 6A8 socket. To this is connected lugs No. 1 and 8 of 6F6 socket, lug No. 1 6Q7 socket, earth terminal and lug No. 1 on 6K7 socket. Two lengths of 16-gauge busbar are connected between the earth lugs on the gang mounting screws and the main earth busbar.

Lug E on power transformer connects to the earth busbar, the moving plate of




A view showing the wiring of the chassis. This photograph can be used in conjunction with the picture diagrams to show the components and their correct positions in the assembly.





The start on the wiring is made by fitting an earthing bar around the inside of the chassis, and then the wiring is started in earnest with the filament circuits and the power transformer terminal board.



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

TRANSPORTABLE RECEIVERS TWO NOVEL DESIGNS

M URDOCHS of Park Street have recently introduced two new receivers which have a feature which makes them suitable for use in the home and also in the car or at the picnic or week-ender. One operates from either a six-volt battery, a 12-volt battery or the ordinary 240-volt alternating current power supply mains, whilst the other is a straight six-volt job with particularly low battery consumption, making it suitable for use in

the home as a vibrator set, as a car set or as a semi-portable.

Our photograph shows the "Midlands" Allcomer 6, the receiver which can be used from the a.c. power mains when in operation at home. It is a very sensitive and selective model, having an r.f. stage of amplification, and using a three-gang condenser with special isolantite trimmers to ensure that the peak of performance will be maintained, irrespective of humidity or other weather conditions. It is contained in an attractive cabinet of moulded bakelite which is capable of withstanding the rough usage likely to be encountered in a transportable receiver, as it will not scratch readily. This model, complete, but less the six-volt accumulator, which is not required for car use or for the set when used from power mains, is £19/19/-.

The other model, the job which works from a six-volt accumulator but needs no "B" or "C" batteries, lists at £18/18/-, with the special 113 amp-hour accumulator at £2/9/6 extra.

HOW TO BUILD THE LEX-SINGLE I-Wave Receiver ne Valve A

REPRINTED FROM OUR ISSUE OF MARCH 12. 1937.

OWING to the fact that we have received a number of inquiries for con-structional details of the popular "Duplex Single," we are reprinting this article, which, although brief, contains all the details for building this set.

As many of you probably know, the Duplex was built around the 19 type valve, which consists of two triodes in the one envelope. In this receiver one section is used as a triode detector with reaction, the other as audio-amplifier.



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



control in the form of a two or three plate midget condenser.

CONSTRUCTION

When building the set the first thing to obtain is the base, which measures 81 x 51 x 21. You may make this yourself or buy it ready punched. When wiring it will be noticed that the valve socket has six contacts, two for the filaments, two for the grids, and two for the plates. Provided you follow our wiring diagram carefully you should strike no difficulty here. The R.F. choke in our receiver was mounted on an insulated strip which makes a firm mount. As these strips are obtainable every-where we would advise builders to use them. Another point to watch is when mounting the midget condenser be sure that the moving plates are earthed to the chassis. This condenser may be mounted either on a small bracket or on the front panel if one is used. The fixed plates of this midget condenser are connected to the fixed plates of the main tuning condenser, this being the only connection above base.

COILS

The coils may be bought as a ready set or you make them yourself on fivepin formers. This should not be a difficult job, provided you follow our diagrams of coil-winding data correctly.

Connections to the batteries are made by means of a five-pin plug and socket at the rcar of the receiver. While on the subject of batteries we will advise you to make sure that the 11 volt bias battery does not short to earth.

READERS' QUERIES

T.G. (Granville) inquiries about the new msh-button tuning. A.-Generally speaking the idea is to have right buttons for the eight local stations or the eight strongest in the case of a set in a country district, but to have a switch fo throw over to a conventional dial for ordinary tun-ing. For dual-wavers the wave-change switch has a third position for push-button tuning. There is, however, one receiver on the market the Syme-E.S.M. Aristocrat), which tunes only the eight local stations on the push-buttons, and does not have a dial of any kind.

(Tempe) finds that for some months now he has not been able to hear the American "hams" on the 20-metre band, whereas last winter he used to listen to them every after-noon and evening. A.-There is nothing wrong with the receiver, at least no fault is proved by your remarks. The short-wave reception conditions vary quite considerably, and for some time now the Yankee "hams" have not been coming through at all well on the 20-metre band. Just for one night the band opened up, and they roared through, but by next night the blanket was winter, and good reception should be had al-most any day now. Some scientists predict that conditions will not be so good this year, even when the band does open up, but we doubt if there is any substantial foundation for these predictions. P.C. (Patic Paint) intends to install a car

A.—The circuit is sound, but hopelessly out of date, at least ten years behind modern prac-tice, and it would be far better to follow the circuit in our recent issue, using a screen grid valve which will not need any neutralising or stabilising apart from the usual shielding.

THE EK2 WITH SEPARATE OSCILLATOR

Dear Sir,

In reply to your request for information regarding the EK2 with separate oscillator, in your answer to C.D.M. (Bellerive, Tas.) in the issue of March 11-

I spent many hours trying to get stable reception on ten metres using the 6A7 and 6A8 pentagrids and the EK2 octode as combined oscillator and first detector, and also the 57, 6C6, and 6L7 with separate oscil-lators, but I could not get rid of slight change in tuning on the oscillator when the detector grid circuit was tuned.

However, I tried the EK2 with an external oscillator valve and got remarkable results. Not only was the oscillator stable when the detector grid was tuned, but also very high sensitivity, with low valve noise. Ease of operation was obtained to well below ten metres.

The coupling on the circuit shown herewith was found the simplest and best, after many experiments.

Headphones could be used in place of the primary of the first audio transformer of your set, and the audio ampli-fer and output valves could be omitted, as well as the two "dud" audio transformers.

well as the two "dud" audio transformers. W.D. (Hurlstone Park) wants to know if a 42 can be used instead of the EL3 in the "Local Three." A.-By changing the bias resistor to about 300 ohms the 42 could be used, but it is not nearly as sensitive as the EL3, and you would lose just that little bit of range which makes all the difference in a set of this kind. At the moment we can't find any details of superhet. colls, and anywaw we would need to know the capacity of the gang to be used, also the inter-mediate frequency, and even then we doubt if we can help you very much as the coupling on the oscillator coll is very critical, and from experience we find that most readers have trouble enough when they buy colls in matched sets, few seem to get them going pro-perly when they buy coll singly, and we feel sure that you would need a lot of patience to get satisfaction with home-wound colls.

MONTY (Casino) wants to know if head-phones can be fitted to the 1937 model H.M.Y. dual-wave receiver. A.-Yes, it is a fairly simple job to fit headphones to a set of this type, but we strongly advise you to get the job done by the local agent for the receiver, as it wouldn't do to make any mistakes when fitting head-phones to a set which is connected to the power supply mains. Reliable headphones are available from 5/6 to 26 a set.

As a matter of fact, when you buy a so-called 500 ohm resistor there is usually a tolerance allow-ance of up to plus or minus 10 per cent. so that the 500 ohm resistor may have an actual resistance of anything from 450 to 550 ohms, and even this resistance may change consider-ably as the resistance are not serious, as the resistance has a self-compensating effect as the bias developed across the resistor de-pends on the current flowing, and the current flowing depends on the bias developed. There is also more than a 10 per cent. tolerance in the plate current of valves, in respect to their theoretical ratings.

N.E. (no address) writes:--"Why does a rheostat ??? when full on?" but unfortunately we have not been able to decipher the vital word which we have replaced with the ques-

word which we have replaced with the ques-tion marks. A.-Sorry, but we were unable to read the word, and have been quite unable to make head or tail of it. However, we have been able to read about the valves, and the three types you mention are all intended for a.c. operation, not battery, although it is possible to use the 171A on batteries, but the filament needs five volts at a quarter of an ampere, and the UY224A takes 2½ volts at 1% amperes. The valves are entirely unsuitable for any of the circuits you mention.

Now turn the dial to a station at the top end of the band, and, while rocking the dial, adjust the padder until the station is at its correct point on the dial and at maximum strength.

Finally turn to a weak station at the centre of the dial and adjust the I.F. transformers for maximum strength.

Note: It should not be necessary to move the trimmers more than half a turn. The short-wave coils require no adjustment whatever.



Now I can't memorise a thing. Why, when I go out to the kids' party at the Newtown Majestic. and I'm down to sing "When It Rains," I mess up the words.

After "Sally," I played in "Good Morning, Dearie," with Josie Melville. It was while playing in "Kid Boots" that romance entered my life. Bess (Bess was in the chorus) and I were married. The whole company got a holiday. Josie Melville was one of the bridesmaids—she tripped going up the steps of the church.

Well, I nearly spent that day in the lock-up instead of going to church. My best man lent me his car. But I hadn't a licence. I drove to the church, and at a tusy intersection a policeman held up his hand. I don't know how it happened—I knew all right the signal was against me, but I put my foot on the accelerator. I crashed into a cart. I can tell you I thought that was the end. The bobby came over, so I grinned at him and said I was going to be married, and it was just nervousness. He didn't even ask to see my driving licence. Cracked a joke, and let me go.

We had a honeymoon. Two and a half days. We drove -or, rather, I drove-to Ballarat and Geelong. Only the car broke down well out of Ballarat at midnight, and we had to be towed in.

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
HANDSOME - BUT HARD TO SELL, EVEN IN LONDON !

HE announcement that the Institute of Radio Engineers has. invited John L. Baird. television pioneer, to visit Sydney at the Institute's expense, to deliver a paper on television at the Radio Convention, has focussed public attention on this branch of radio. Although Mr. Baird has stated in a cabled report that he is bringing enough television gear with him to demonstrate television to the Australian public, it is not expected, in view of the comparative lack of interest displayed in television in England, where it has been in operation for several years, that the Government will license a television transmitter, even in an experimental way. It is estimated that it has cost about £300,000 to establish one television transmitter with a range of 25 miles in London and that only 4000 to 5000 television receivers are in operation. Many types of television receivers are offered at from 50 to 100 guineas, but few are sold. On these pages we show four typical designs.

Walt Disney's salary was 39,000 dollars; which means he pays himself 750 dollars a week. It doesn't seem much for a genius who has created Mickey Mouse, Donald Duck, and Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs; especially when you notice that Buck Jones was paid 143,333 dollars. 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
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
