PRESIDENT OF THE GO-SET THIS WEEK **PETER** AND GORDON

London-born Peter Asher, on the brink of 21, owns and operates a shock of wild bright red hair, a pair of round light blue eyes equipped with square-shaped shades, a brain brinning miscellaneous information, a five-toot-ten wiry-lean frame and a personality designed to charm birds from trees. For reasons best known to himself he loves to gorge on shails and steak, ugh!

Scotland-born Gordon Waller, now pushing 20, is the out-going extrovert and an instant turn-on for the junior misses. He wears his nut-brown hair in a long loose flop; if it were bleached blonde he'd be the perfect surfer type. He's nearly six feet high with a strong well-built body, grey eyes speckied with yellow and has a crazy crooked smile that laughs or leers with equal ease.

Both boys are dedicated non-conformists. Their music and songs imitate no other songsters. They ape no man, beast, foul, fish or insect.



Peter and Gord met at Westminster School for Boys in London where they began fooling around with guitars and voice harmonies until they were good enough for school concerts. Lock-up at the school dorm being 9 p.m., they slunk through the bushes and scaled a 12-foot spike-topped wall to work side-jobs in the local after-dark cof-



fee houses and clubs. Paul McCartney, wooing Peter's oldest sister, Jane Asher, began writing a song for Peter to get on her good side.

Later when the boys had a chance to needle a disk for E.M.I. and Capitol Records, John helped Paul complete the musical masterpiece. The rest is well-known history. *World Without Love* rocketed to No. 1 on the English charts. Two months later it did ditto on the American tallies. That blew school and the boys turned pro pronto.



Very rarely does one find a treatment more hypnotic than what Ron Williams of the Five did for a couple of Ray Charles' early blues. Pent up, strained and arms folded, he stamps out the number at Pinocchio's and dozens move about absorbed in the beat.

Eighteen-year-old, and a self-taught harmonica and guitar player, Ron is the one who writes most of their songs.

You could almost call his face Indian (Red variety) if it wasn't for a huge, amiable kid-grin and the fact that he so obviously hails from sunny Queensland.

Barry Pearson, 18-year-old lead guitarist is one of the original Five. He didn't come to Melbourne on "The Five's" first trip because of apprenticeship examinations, but this time he's with them helping to pound out the sound

Six years after migrating from England Andrew Paradise finds himself strumming rhythm for "The Five". Andrew is self-taught with an unexplained, crazy love of Brussell's sprouts. He is currently trying to discover a link between guitars and sprouts, but what prove — who knows? t'will

Both the bass player lan Jacobs and the drummer Peter Thomson have been with "The Five" from the start, too, in one way or another. After all, the group, as such, have only been going 12 months.

In a more up-tempo commercial form, the sound I have just described has been transferred to record. The music and lyrics for both sides were written by Ronnie who also wrote their previous release, "I'll be there" and "How can she know". On the 45 released last week which has been given a lot of air play so far are "There's Time" (A side) and "I Can't Find Her".

With ideas and help from the rest of the group Ron has become a fairly prolific song-writer. None of the others have seen the outside of a discotheque though, because for the most part it's far out R and B-moody. As a group they prefer to do songs the audience will recognise, since they are, of course "The Five's" primary consideration.

Their main aim, as a group is to play overseas. This is expected.
