Arbitron Comments On Phony Diaries

In the past month, Arbitron, the leading radio rating survey company has experienced two severe episodes that have upset their recent implementation of double check systems on their in home diaries to alleviate tampering. Diaries were obtained at the post office in Memphis, Tenn. and resulted in favorable results to a radio station. Just two weeks ago a San Jose, California station obtained six blank diaries and turned them in to Arbitron. R&R contacted Larry Manuel, Vice President/General Manager of Arbitron, and we asked some very pointed questions about the security systems and related survey policies. The responses Manuel were honest and informative. Because of the importance of this information we are reporting the questioning session as it occurred.

R&R: Let's take the Memphis situation first. How could that happen? Is it not true that Arbitron is supposed to call backand check on the diary holders and make sure that everything is going well? Therefore, they should know the 6 diaries were not in the hands of the original diary people contacted.

MANUEL: I'll start at the beginning on that one. Our normal procedure is we make the placement call and then we call the household again a couple of days before the survey starts, which is generally about when they receive their diary. The purpose of the call is to ask them if they have any questions, but did you get your diary has not been part of the procedure, because it may not be there until the next day or so. We've never had the problem there before. The midweek call is not a manditory contact, it is an attempted contact and the call is made to ask again, do you have any problems, do you have any questions.

R&R: Were they made in the case of the six Memphis diaries?

MANUEL: The calls were made. One of the households was contacted, the other households were not contacted. We only made one attempt in the past. Again, it was just for a question type thing. We have always made the assumption in the past that there will be 1 to 2% lost in the mails, so it's never been a mandatory thing. That's how they could have gotten through in that case.

R&R: Are you going to change some things now, so that possibly you do check with every household?

MANUEL: In the future, we are checking every single household, to insure that they got their diaries, got the right number of diaries, and that there are the correct number of people in the household.

RER: Because of the San Jose situation, have you thought about putting a limit of the number of diaries in the household?







MANUEL: We'll allow six. At this point in time we are not changing that.

RER: In a situation like San Jose, what you're talking about is that one family, and even if it was a legitimate family that lived there with six diarles it could change the whole spectrum of a book for a radio station. MANUEL: I don't think that there's any question that a large household can impact the survey, but I'd have to believe that there are six member households around and if we limit a number of diaries in a household, then we've got a research problem there.

R&R: The person in San Jose, the name you originally called for, was a deceased person.

MANUEL: The telephone was listed in the husband's name, who happened to be dead.

R&R: But when Arbitron called and asked for the person, didn't someone say he was no longer alive?

MANUEL: Yes, but that's okay, you'd still place the household. The household, the name, whoever the remaining family member was, would still be part of the sample.

R&R: Did you not last year install new checking systems going in to look for excessive listening for a radio station? If so, why didn't it work.

MANUEL: We did in the fall of last year a study on the entire sweep of 98.000 diaries and we eliminated nine diaries. We recontacted all heavy listening and what we determined out of that, was that we would continue certain procedures, but that we would not recontact every household. It was, again, not a mandatory thing, that is evidently not enough, and we are recontacting everything that is even faintly suspicious. We are starting with this Oct.-Nov. survey, we are going to validate every single heavy listening diary and that means we will go back to the person, we must talk to that person, validate the household. If there's a heavy listening diary in a household, say there's two diaries that come from a household. one from a 25-34 or a 25 year old man, one from a 27 year old man, we must talk to both of those persons in the household before we'll use the diary, instead of just one and validating the other one, which is part of the old technique.

RER: With the different procedures that were put in, the people that are looking it over for mistakes and invalid diaries are keypunch clerks or whatever, that are getting a minimum salary an hour. It's such a valuable survey, people lose their jobs because of bad ratings. Are you counting on a 19 year old keypunch operator to locate problems.

MANUEL: No, that has all been computerized now. Every single diary is inspected by a computer, it will look for two different types of things. It will,one, look for X number of quarter hours. Every diary's counted, per quarter hour, by number of stations, and the one that we're working on now, which we do not have totally yet, but we're going to be reviewing heavy listening and large family sizes for its patterns of listening. We're programming that now, we'll have that in the very near future by the January survey.

R&R: Statements have been made a few times that to give the ultimate rating service, where everything was double checked, would be very expensive. Are you considering possibly putting in even more double checks and offering more, and having to offer it at a more expensive cost to the radio stations? Also, have you talked to the radio stations and would you be willing to see if they would pay for it, to get more complete verified data, so these kinds of things can't happen?

MANUEL: One thing you can be sure of is we'll stop it, and we'll take every means, legal and our own methods of stopping diary tampering, that's final. Whatever steps are necessary, we'll take them. The steps that we're taking now are going to cost us well over \$100,000 and we're not charging anybody for that and I have no intention of charging anybody for that. I don't believe that money can buy security absolutely. We will take every necessary step if it is absolutely necessary, we'll change every procedure we have. I've talked to radio people, especially to Stan Kaplan, about personal pickup. R&R: Well, he said he volunteered to have WAYS/Charlotte pay for that alone, by himself and he said that you people would not go along with

MANUEL: No, I told him that I'd be more than happy to test that out for himand will in fact test that out in 1977, but would not take his money for it, because I thought it was our responsibility.

R&R: What you're talking about is individual, in person, retrieval of diaries?

MANUEL: Right, it has a certain amount of problems to it, from a research point of view, in that there's a certain number of diaries that you can't get, you can't recontact homes to get them, you can't make an appropriate pickup time, so that you have tohave some of them mailed back, so you're still open to the same kind of problems. I would go to that if I felt that it eliminated 100% of the problem, if it only eliminates 90% of the problem, then I think the expense would be prohibitive.

There are probably many more questions that our readers would like to ask. Larry Manuel will appear at the R&R Convention & Expo 77 in February to answer your questions. Until then he has assured us that Arbitron will do everything possible to stop diary tampering and now double check whatever is necessary to achieve this goal.

They also stated that since United had not sought a review of the license denial earlier, the Commission's decision was final.

Home TV Taping Brings Lawsuits

A possible thorn in the side of the new Sony Betamax home videotaping system has been brought to light with both Walt Disney Productions Inc. and Universal City Studios filing suits against Sony. The complaint, filed simultaneously by the companies, claims that the use of the recorder may infringe on federal copyright laws. The suits also claim unfair competition by Sony, and that the Betamax undermines contracts that the film makers have with networks and other customers. The Betamax system allows the public to tape TV programs for later home viewing. Besides the Sony Corp., the suit also lists as defendants Sony's ad agency, Doyle Dane Bernback, and retail outlets including J.W. Robinson Co. and Bullock's Inc., along with other department store chains which recorded parts of programs for use as display in their stores. The precedent setting suit also asks that all copies of the studios material be turned over to U.S. Marshalls pending the outcome of the court case.

Geffen To WCI Assistant Post

David Geffen has left his position with Warner Bros. Inc. to become Assistant to WB's parent company Warner Communications Inc. Chairman-Chief Executive Steve Ross. Geffen remains on the board of the WCI music and film boards of directors, and will continue to be based in Los Angeles. His move from the film end of Warner Bros. to WCI's corporate staff will allow Geffen to take part in company acquisitions, as well as acting as advisor to the film and music divisions.

Sonderling Profits Close To \$2 Million

For the nine-month period just ended, Sonderling Broadcasting reports profits of nearly \$1.9 million. Profits for the third quarter rose to \$190,000. The company also said that it expects its fourth quarter to be higher than its year ago profits.

Georgia Stations Sold

Albany Radio Inc. has received approval by the FCC to acquire WALG and WWCW-FM/Albany, Georgia from Radio Albany Inc. Albany Radio Inc. is wholly owned by Allen Woodall Jr. and Bernie Barker, current owners of WDAK/ and WEIZ/Columbus, Georgia. Both Albany stations will be managed by Mark Shor. In making the announcement of purchase, Albany Radio said that WALG will have a Pop/Adult format, and WWCW will be Country.

FTC Won't Delegate Ad Authority

A director of the Federal Trade Commission has nearly completely nixed the idea that the National Advertising Review Board should take over the FTC's regulatory powers over advertising. Acting Director of Consumer Protection of the FTC Margery Smith told a NARB board meeting that the Commission itself cannot delegate the authority, and that while Congress did have those powers, her opinion was that it should not be transferred. She also stated that large advertisers could possibly gain too much control if the NARB had such powers.

Mystery Signal Disappears

A high-powered radio signal, heard most clearly in Europe and the North Atlantic, has disappeared as mysteriously as it appeared, according to the FCC. The signal, which has disrupted ship to shore, telephone, and international broadcast services, sounded like a tapping noise and was disturbing those services for the past several months.

New Christmas Mail Deadlines

Due to the current United Parcel strike, and the possibility of UPS striking in even more areas than they are now, the U.S. Postal Service has moved up its suggested Christmas mailing deadlines. All parcels should be mailed by no later than December 3rd to guarantee Christmas delivery, and letter mail should be sent by December 10th. The Service is already flooded with parcels, nearly double the usual amount for this time of year.

Return Of The Rebate

Chevrolet and Pontiac subsidiaries of General Motors have brought back "rebates" to beef up sales of their small car lines, which have had a slow start in the new model year. General Motors is doing well with their large and intermediate size cars, but consumers are shying away from smaller models since there is no current gas crisis. Chevy offers \$200 cash rebates on Vegas and Chevettes ordered by December 10th. Pontiac makes the same offer for their Astre. Radio buys in 80 markets will back up the rebate offers.

Motorcycle Ad Spending Boom

Despite a recession in the motorcycle sales business, most of the industry is prepared for 10% gain this year and next. Advertising for next year is estimated at near \$20 million. Industry leader, Honda Motor Co., introduced their new ad theme recently when they displayed their 1977 models. Theme for their campaign is "Honda, Going Strong!"

Coke Stops Comparative Ads

After a long drawn-out battle with **Pepsi** in comparative and taste-testing ads, **Coca Cola Co.** will drop its comparative theme. Coke called its turn-around "an affirmative step" for the industry. Pepsi does not appear to be following intheir competitors footsteps yet, however. While Coke was making its announcement on their new ad direction, Pepsi was constructing a taste-testing booth in New York's Grand Central Station to film comparative ads for future run.

N.Y. Jocks Ad-Lib Spots

New York radio personalities are ad-libbing their way through a radio ad campaign for Lillet aperitif drink. The liquor's ad agency, Dreyfus, Ashby and Co., submits fact sheets to stations, but leaves the content of the spot in the jock's hands. Earlier in the fall, the agency held luncheons for the air personalities so they could get first hand info on the product. Spots will run through December, and have already been placed on WNEW, WOXR and WOR.

Radio Spots For New Film

A series of 30 and 60 second spots are being used in the Los Angeles radio market to introduce United Artists' "Rocky" movie. The film makes its debut in L.A. in early December, after a 15 station radio buy.

Cashing In On Carter

Some enterprising businessmen have taken advantage of President-elect **Carter**'s peanut business. One sells bottled peanut soil at \$5 a pop, another has been selling square inches of a Plains peanut field for the same price. A Plains clothing dealer is hoping that Jimmy will wear one of his custom denim tuxedos. If he does, the dealer has over 150 of the formal suits in stock.

REPORT ON SEPTEMBER-OCTOBER DEVELOPMENTS AT FCC

The recent period of September and October were among the busiest in the FCC's history. This was partcularly true, of course, because of the large number of its political rulings stemming from the heated National Election Campaigns. However, there were also other significant FCC actions which should have a definite impact on day-to-day operations of Broadcast Stations as well as CATV Systems. Among those warranting what is necessarily only summary coverage because of their great number, are the following:

New Copyright Bill Becomes Law

Perhaps the most significant development of these months, if not the entire 1976 year, was the final enactment of a **new Copyright Act** for. the first time since 1909. The act was amended in several respects right up to its final Congressional passage so that its precise scope is not yet clear. Moreover, its specifics are yet to be detailed in the Rules and Regulations to be adopted by the new Copyright Commission it has set up. But it's already obvious that the Act will have the most profound impact on such basic matters as TV-CATV interrelationships; music and performance licensing; royalities for "juke boxes;" and other aspects that directly or indirectly affect the entire Communications Industry.

NBC's presentation of "Gone With The Wind" pushed that network to the top spot in the national Neilsen's report for the week ending November 7th, but by less than one rating point. NBC tallied up a 20.8 rating for the complete week, ABC had a 19.9 and CBS 19.0. ABC still leads in the season-to-date figures. Top 10 shows for the week were: "Gone With The Wind," "The Waltons," "Charlie's Angels," "Maude," "Bionic Woman," "All's Fair," "Baretta," ABC's film "Nightmare in Badham County," "Little House On The Prairie," and "Phyllis." Regularly scheduled Tuesday night programs did not show in these ratings due to the national elections. NBC's election coverage lead that race with a 20.6 rating, CBS second with 19.3 and ABC with 12.5.

Nielsen's early demographic breakdown of TV ratings shows ABC well in the lead with their evening show lineup. In total people, seven out of the top 10 shows were ABC's, with "Happy Days," number 1, NBC's "Big Event" movies and Monday movies also showed in the top 10, while CBS' "All In The Family" was the only show from that network to be tops in total persons. Female stars are hot with female viewers 18 plus, with both "Charlie's Angels" and "Bionic Woman" showing in that top 10. In all the various breakdowns within the 18 plus women catagory, these two shows also stood firm in the top 10, withthe exception of women 50 and over. For adult men, Monday Night Football showed consistently in the top 10 for 18 plus, again with the exception over over 50's, who's favorite show was "60 Minutes." Tops in male and female teens is "Happy Days," while the "Captain & Tennille" showed in the top 10 for both as well. In featured movies, "The Way We Were" was hot in young adult men.

FCC Reaffirms Full Disclosure As Contest Requirement The FCC has reaffirmed its previously-established practice by formally adopting a new Rule providing that a station broadcasting a contest or advertising information about it, must fully and accurately disclose its material terms; and must conduct it substantially as announced or advertised. FCC Continues Re-regulation of Broadcasting

The FCC has continued its so-called "Re-regulation" of broadcasting, by amending and up-dating certain technical rules, including what would constitute "major changes;" involving experimental operations; and covering Operator requirements, etc. But that has not, of course, precluded it from imposing other new requirements, such as the annual list of issues and programs, upon all radio stations.

New FCC Renewal Requirement For Reporting Certain Litigation

The FCC has further modified its new Renewal Form to require stations or their principal stockholders (10% or more), to report their litigation involving a finding of guilt or an adverse judgement for felonies, unlawful lotteries, anti-trust violations, fraud, discrimination, and unfair labor practices. FCC Reaffirms its AM/FM "Freeze" and Trade Press Talk Of its Extension

The FCC has reaffirmed its so-called "closed season" (or "freeze") on all radio new or major change applications in denying a waiver thereof and returning an application for a new Yuma FM station. Although FCC reiterated the promised end of the "freeze" as of 12/31/76, the trade press has indicated that the procedure has failed to achieve the FCC's desired purpose, and may well wind up having to be extended to give the staff time to process the many pending applications.

FCC Fines Unlawful Lottery On Chance Discounts

The FCC fined several Washington area stations carrying a spot promoting a variable discount on every purchase at certain stores that was determined by "spinning a wheel," as constituting an "unlawful lottery" under the Criminal Code. Station Admonished For Misleading Data As To Power And Audience Share

FCC has admoshed WAYE (Baltimore) for publishing a brochure with misleading information as to an FCC Authorization to increase its power, and its audience ranking within a certain (18 to 34) age group, in that it relied on old date although new data showing a lower ranking was available. FCC instructed its staff to bring WAYE's next renewal to its special attention for appropriate disposition, based on the station's record in the interim.

New FCC Guidelines For Community Surveys

The FCC has (a) ruled that stations may not use volunteer workers to conduct their surveys of "community leaders" to determine local needs and problems for renewals and other applications as required. It has also (b) amended its rules to make clear that stations are not required to conduct their other survey of the "general public," outside of their respective city of station license.

FCC Reaffirms More Restrictive AM/FM Non-Duplication Rules

The FCC has on reconsideration reaffirmed its new and more restrictive rules which cut down the amount of duplicated programming by commonlyowned AM/FM stations in the same local area. These new rules become effective May 1, 1977. At such time, duplication in an average week is limited to 25% in a city of over 100,000 people, and to 50% in a city of between 25,000 to 100,000. On May 1, 1979, even stricter limitations will apply the 25% duplication maximum to AM/FM stations in that 25,000 to 100,000 population category. Daytime-only AM's are not exempted, and the largest city size applies when the AM and FM are licensed to different communities.

FCC Again Rejects Department Of Justice Position On Cross-Ownership

The FCC has in several other communities such as St Louis, Milwaukee, Salt Lake City, etc., reaffirmed its earlier Fresno Ruling (now on Appeal to the Courts), and rejected the Department of Justice's demand for denial of TV License Renewals for Stations owned by local newspapers on grounds of undue concentration of local news and media advertising in the city's SMSA. FCC refused to presume anti-trust conduct along from market media concentration. It rather relied upon its recent cross-ownership rule that has "grandfathered" all existing cross-ownership situations notwithstanding that they don't conform with its new rule, except in a limited number (7) of instances in which "divestiture" of one medium was ordered since the market's one local TV station was owned by its only daily paper.

Station License Transferred On Change Of Format

Notwithstanding that FCC has previously concluded that it will not become involved in station format changes—particularly at the time of proposed sales—(which decision is now on appeal), its refusal to approve the sale of WRVR-FM (New York) because of objections to changes in its jazz format, has resulted in proposed buyer Sonderling amending his application to propose no significant change in WRVR-FM's current entertainment format, on which basis FCC then approved the sale.

FCC Shows Increasing And More Demanding Interest In Equal Employment Opportunity Programs

1. FCC rejected informal objections by a Cleveland NOW Chapter against the renewals of 10 Cleveland stations for alleged insufficient employment of minorities and females. Although the stations fell far short of a proportionate minority and female representation, FCC emphasized that—while it used statistical data of the labor market as a starting point for determining compliance—it was not the exclusive criteria, and that low EEO employment is subject to rebuttal by an Equal Employment Opportunity Program designed to correct such under-representation on a record of a station making reasonable and good faith efforts to recruit and employ minorities and women, and to place some in top positions. In such a situation, the stations "employment profile" is reviewed as whether within a "zone of reasonableness" notwithstanding the statistical disparity, on which basis FCC here denied the objections and found "reasonable compliance" with this standard.

1. In line with this same basic review approach, FCC renewed several Mississippi stations on the basis that its review of their EEO Programs demonstrated a good faith intent and reasonable efforts to comply with EEO

Rules and requirements. However, when several other Mississippi stations had only recently begun such implementation, or had not demonstrated sufficient good faith effort, while FCC denied informal NAACP objections, it did require such stations to submit additional EEO information in 1978, and with their 1979 renewals.

3. FCC denied a local community coalition objection to Berkeley AM/FM renewals, but did so subject to any action which FCC may take as a result of the final determination of their pending complaint before the EEO Commission. FCC indicated that it would defer to such other agency's actions where complaints were pending, and so condition its renewals on their outcome. It also concluded that the stations' "employment profile" and its affirmative action program indicated that the station's employment of minorities and women had been within a "zone of reasonableness," so that no further FCC inquiry was here warranted.

4. FCC renewed the license of WTLC (Indianapolis) in denying a petition by one Richard Bailey who contended that his termination for improper conduct was based upon discrimination, on its findings that the station is a Black-owned and Black-format its staff is 75% Black, including the Program Director, who recommended Bailey's dismissal, and that there was no showing of discrimination, nor any found by the Indiana EEOC to whom he had also complained.

5. FCC rejected a hearing of a renewal, notwithstanding that the station's "employment profile" showed only 7.4% females in the upper 4 job categories, although the station was admonished to increase its "affirmative action" efforts in that area. And in another case, FCC held that 26% of the station's full-time staff being women, and 8.3% in the upper 4 job categories, was reasonable, in light of the approximately 39.7% of the reading SMSA work force being female.







WONDER remains the most played album in AOR radio. The top of the chart was stable with the first six positions unchanged from last week. SKYNYRD jumped into the top 10. ROD moved up nicely. The album has resurged powerfully since AOR radio discovered the cut "Tonight's The Night," one of those rare things that the format was late for. SEGER is also on the rise. JACKSON was the week's highest debut. Stations report it very heavily requested. FOGHAT had a tremendous week. ZAPPA debuted impressively. MASON took a mighty leap. TROWER maintained. MILLER inched back up. SAYER grew. NU-GENT held. FRAMPTON resurged powerfully. KISS debuted. PARKER debuted. HEART bounced back a bit. **DANIELS** debuted. REED bounced back onto the chart. **BOZ** bounced back onto the chart. SB&Q maintained. DA-VID LAFLAMME, GATO BAR-BIERI, and PATTI SMITH almost made the chart, in that order.

This chart is based solely on airplay and does not attempt to fabricate a trend. The artists in italics are those receiving the most rapid gain in airplay.





Editor's note: Some people consider BOB PITTMAN, Program Menager of WMAQ and WNIS FM, Chi-Cago, a genius. Others say he doesn't know what he is talking about. Above and beyond that, one thing is very clear: BOB PITTMAN has proved himself to be a winner. His ideas have changed the attitudes of many programmers in Country radio. R&R thought you might find his concepts interesting.

R&R: First of all, a question I get asked a lot by a lot of people about you, very simple and basic, how old are you? PITTMAN: I'm 22

PITTMAN: I m 22.

RtaR: Let's talk about your background, where you're from, your education, radio industry experience, and so on.

PITTMAN: I started in Brookhaven, Mississippi. When I was 15 years old I started learning to fly. My parents refused to pay for it because they thought flying was dangerous, so I began looking for a job. My first choice for a job was a clothing store. They wouldn't hire me at a clothing store because I was too young. I walked into a radio station and they gave me a job working weekends. From there I went to doing the afternoon show. R&R: What station was this?

PITTMAN: That was WCHJ. Then I went to WJMB across the street to do afternoon drive five days a week for about \$20 a week, which of course was a lot of money when you're in high school. From there I went to work for Bill Tanner, who is now the National Program Director for Heftel. I worked Progressive Rock, Pop/Adult, Top 40 in Jackson. Then I went to Milwaukee and WRIT and worked for Bob Collins, who's at WGN now, Bob Sherwood, of Columbia Records was there at the time. I then went to work for Bartell at WDRQ in Detroit and ran across George Wilson. All those people greatly influenced my thinking. Then I went down to WPEZ in Pittsburgh as Program Director, when I was 19. I got my start in programming there. Education-wise, I thought I just wanted to do radio to get some money while I was in college, and was planning to be a doctor. First year you don't major in anything, but I had been leaning toward pre-med. After the first semester I decided I wanted to be a radio star, or whatever you think when you first get into the business. I changed my major to sociology.

R&R: How do you feel your sociology background has helped you?


PITTMAN: It's helped considerably. When I got to Detroit and my mind became twisted, if you will, by George Wilson, who had me thinking that you really can't listen to what other radio people say. If there's one turning point, I'd have to say it was when George Wilson convinced me that you can't believe what other people say and you can't do radio just because somebody else is doing it, you have to go out and find out what people want. That was the basic thing. I was taking all these sociology courses and I said, "Jesus Christ, that's what sociology is all about." So I began to develop a lot of research methods. Here at WMAQ we use research to build the station.

R&R: What would you consider your overall programming philosophy and why do you feel it works? PITTMAN: Overall philosophy is to give the people what they want, and the way we find that is with research. I hate to use the term "research" because so many people say, "Well, we do research too. We call record stores, or check jukeboxes." There's good and bad research. I think a lot of it being used in the radio industry is archaic. Some is very good, but I've seen a whole lot of bad research, much more than I have good research. The basic thing about our research is to find out what people want and giving it to them.

R&R: Have your programming ideas changed since you've changed formats from Rock to Country? How different are your programming now as opposed to when you were a Rock programmer?


PITTMAN: Not a whole lot different. The concepts are the same, but the mechanics change. In other words, what is human to a 15 year old is quite different from being human to a 45 year old. But the concept of being human is still a constant. I brought a lot of things with me from Pittsburgh. In Pittsburgh we did "WPEZ Is Gonna Make Me Rich." In Chicago we've done "WMAQ Is Gonna Make Me Rich" and the slogan has worked just as well here, if not better, because we've had the money to back that slogan, plus the outside ad campaign. It's probably, I'd say, one of the more successful promotions ever run in Chicago.

R&R: Speaking of different formats, is there anything that you can talk about in regards to your recent appointment as Program Manager of NBC's FM station in Chicago?



THE R&R INTERVIEW: BBBB PITTMAN by Jim Duncan

"This is a business but there are certain people who treat it like a lifestyle..."

PITTMAN: We're going to do some type of youth appeal format on the station. What it's going to wind up being yet, I don't know. We're looking at a couple of possibilities. We're looking at whether we want to automate it, and when I say automate I mean actually just put the music on automation cart machines, instacarts, and program it daily, or whether we want to go live. Of course we have problems with heavy union costs, so the more live we get the more overhead we're going to have. Right now we're in the process of doing a lot of research. I'm pulling out a lot of research we did for the AM. I want to find out what the market will stand in terms of format.

RER: OK, let's get into another area. What kind of working relationship do you have with your General Manager, Charlie Warner?

PITTMAN: Perfect. He's by far the best person I've ever worked with, for, under, or around, His background really is in sales. He was with CBS for a number of years as Vice President In charge of spot sales. When I wes in Pittsburgh he was Vice President in charge of Broedcast Properties for the company there. He is one of those people, although he is sales oriented, who is very aware of programming and always has input. Ha's one of those people that raally keeps you on your toes, always probing, questioning, "Why are you doing this, what's going on, how's it working." And more important than that, he really develops people. The one thing I've really learned here in working for NBC is the management skills necessary in a job like this. I feel Program Directors are greatly overlooked in terms of developing their management skills. That's one thing Charlie has really worked on with me and worked on with everybody in the station. He builds a very cohesive station, a station that's very performance oriented. We always find a way to get things done if it accomplishes our goal. If we need something, he's more than happy to do it.

R&R: Today, when the industry people get together to discuss music research, you're always brought up in their conversations along with a few other key people. Can you briefly touch on your music ideas?

PITTMAN: Yes. First, I'd just like to say it was really interesting when I got into Country radio how much resistance there was to research. I'd say the Country music industry is changing like crazy now. I've heard a lot of people changing their ideas. I see more young people coming up in the industry now because they have new ideas to contribute. My music philosophy is the same as the station; give the people what they want. We target the station 25-49. We also look at different types of listeners. Obviously there is no such thing as a typical WMAQ listener. Some of our listeners are hard-core Country fans, other people have never listened to Country music or Country music radio before WMAQ. We share the majority of our audience with WGN and we share 2nd most with WLS because basically Country music sounds an awful lot like Rock music used to sound. We have basically Rock disc jockeys over here who have come from Rock stations. Our approach is as we like to say "has the tightness of Top 40 but the warmth and sincerity of Pop/Adult." The only thing we really do Country is play Country music. We certainly don't have a Country lifestyle because Chicago is certainly not a Country city. It's a very urban center. R&R: What is your basic source of research?

PITTMAN: Basically call-out research. We balance according to the different people in our audience. We balance for the Rock listener who listens to us, we balance for the Pop/Adult listener, and we balance for the hard-core Country listener. Basically we find this out through our call-out research. We call a sample of people every week, probably 100 to 450 people a week, subdivided into different groups for compatibility, and we find out what these people want to hear. Then at the end of the week ve see what songs are common to all groups Which songs are big with all groups. What songs people are getting tired of. Which songs they hate. Which songs they're going to push the blitton on when it comes on the radio. Which songs they've never heard of. Which songs they find irritating. We balance the music and drop or add as needed based on the call-out research. The problem you really have with sales is when you're looking at sales research, that does not necessarily represent music popularity by the audience. Basically only 2 to 5 percent of our audience ever buys records, or buys any significant number of records. Maybe 6, 7 or 8 percent of our audience calls the request line at one time or another. So we're talking about either one of those systems being a very limited Continued on page 44






group of people. But with call-out research we can call a random cross sample of our listening audience and based on that we can tell exactly what our audience wants, and not what the record buyers want, nor what the people who call the request lines want, but the audience. We've found some great discrepancies between record sales, and our call-out research. For example, an Olivia Newton-John record, or a Glen Campbell tends to appeal to these very passive people that don't buy records, and don't call request lines. Those songs will show very very high in the call-out research, but will do just mediocre in sales and maybe mediocre in requests. R&R: Do you do a lot of day-parting

of your music? **PITTMAN: Not that much because** we're basically looking for compatibility between groups. Most of those songs we play should be compatible across all groups of people. Sometimes with some of the truckers songs we've found them to be heavy negatives with women and we'll avoid them during the day.

R&R: How about your percentage of oldias? Do you play a lot of old songs?

PITTMAN: It varies. We play probably 50% oldies on the average. Sometimes like on the over-night it goes even higher, maybe 60% oldies.

R&R: Talking about oldies, is there any cutoff point as far as time period? PITTMAN: Not really, although I'll tell you generally the oldies we play are fairly recent songs. As a matter of fact, we play "Your Cheatin' Heart" and "Cold Cold Heart" by Hank Williams, but those tend to be the exceptions rather than the rule. Most of the oldies we play are 4,5 or 6 years old.

R&R: Can you get into anything about music rotation at all?

PITTMAN: Well, I think it really depends on the station you're dealing with. We carry a lot of news, an awful lot of commercials, and a lot of programs from NBC which all tend to build our community image. so what we have built by this is a built in tune-out factor. What we want to do is to make sure they come back to us. Since we have so many tune-out factors we program the station accordingly. That means fairly tight rotation, big records all the time, and heavy repetition of songs on the station. The balance is probably the key thing, how the music is balanced, one song against the other.

R&R: Some criticism of your station

has been in the area of your air talent. Feeling that possibly it may be robotized Rock jocks playing Country music. Do you believe in strong air personalities or do you put more emphasis upon making the station the total star rather than the air talent?

PITTMAN: Not really. I don't like stars. I don't like any stars. Our people here are not to put on a show, as a matter of fact, I don't let people use prepared material on the air. I want everybody to go on the air and be themselves. To me that is real personality. That's being honest and real human. Somebody that goes in and tells just jokes is being very plastic. I can't stand to sit down and try and talk to someone that keeps zinging me with one-liners because you can never carry on a coherent conversation with them. The rule of thumb we use is that you should be able to look somebody in the eye sitting right at the desk and feel very comfortable with what you're saying. Your personality should be yourself.

R&R: You put a lot of importance on aiving the station call letters right out of a record. Can you give us your reasons?

PITTMAN: Well that's not necessarily a hard and fast rule at the station. Our people tend to do it. I just like the call letters to be prominent, not to be lost in a rap. Coming out of music tends to be the highest point of a listeners attention, as you begin to talk they begin to psychologically tune you out. Coming out of commercials we do the call letters last because as you begin to get back into music their attention begins to pick up again. We want the call letters at the two points of highest attention, which is coming out of music and going into music.

R&R: In the area of promotions, because of the money that NBC has given you for promotion, you've had a chance to experiment with a lot of different types of contests, and/or station promotions. Which have you found to be the most effective, and any that you might steer clear of next time?

PITTMAN: Most of the contests we do are for a specific purpose. Through research we'll see a particular need and we will create a contest to possibly overcome that. Perhaps we'll see a problem with maintenance, adult men, and so we'll design a contest specifically for that purpose, to help us get those men to listen a little bit longer. One thing that I know a lot of people do in radio that I don't do is

small prize giveaways. I steer clear of anything under \$60 in value bacause people tend to remember only the smallest prize given away. R&R: Surely you're aware thet you and WHN, New York, PD Ed Salemon are probably the most criticized, themost praised, most analyzed, and probably the most telked about Program Directors. PITTMAN: Most hated...

R&R: Yes, most hated sometimes, in Country music today. Do you feel that you've been justly criticized by the Country music industry?

PITTMAN: Well I think it's all opinion. I mean this is a business, and there are certain people that treat it as a lifestyle, as a personal experience. We have high overhead here, we have high sales projections, a heavy spot rate. NBC is obviously wanting to see WMAQ as a financial success. I can't afford to play around with subjective opinions. I would hope that the things I do on the radio are not my personal opinions, but are based on objective decisions, based on facts, based on research data. The disc jockeys here are thinking people and constantly give their input. Everybody treats it as a business and I think that's the basis of the criticism. I am doing a lot of things people don't want to hear and doing a lot of things people don't want me to do, but I think there are certain people that don't want Country music to change. It's got to change and it's got to grow just like every other industry and every other form of music does.

R&R: Do you have any suggestions for up and coming Program Directors?

PITTMAN: I think the thing to do is keep an open mind. Be willing to change your mind. Change your goals and your objectives. I certainly have. I've had a lot of people that have completely turned my head around. Had my mind at that point been closed I would have really missed a lot. My mind is constantly changing. I'm constantly being influenced by the research I see. As a matter of fact, most of the music we put on the air I have not heard until it gets on the air. I don't want to hear it because if I heard it and I have some opinion, positive or negative, it's amazing how much that can color the way I interpret the research. Remain as objective as possible and work as hard as you can at developing ideas that are going to give the audience what they want and not the things that are going to give you a personal ego trip or sound good to other radio people.

R&R: As one of the leaders in the radio industry, at age 22, what goals have you got for your life?

PITTMAN: I like the way you save the easy ones until last. That's a good question. I'll be quite honest, I'm limited a lot by age. Before I came here there were a lot of people that would have turned me down for jobs. Turned me down, not necessarily because of ability, but because of age. I have a General Manager here that doesn't care how old I am. He cares about how well I can handle people and how well I can program. I have certain doors that are closed to me until I put on another 5, 6 or 7, or maybe 10 years. I would eventually like to get either into TV programming, or a higher level of management. I'm perfectly happy here, and there are a lot more things I want to do here. WMAQ is on a long growth situation. We've shifted the station from the immediate numbers we had in the beginning, to trying to build the station to last. I'm very content to stay here for another 4 or 5 years. I've got another 2 or 3 years on my contract, so I'm locked in for that anyway. It's either that or do consulting. I really don't know where my head's going to be in a couple of years. Right now I'm just trying to pay my bills.
