BERGAMO APPOINTED, SINER PROMOTED, ELTON PERFORMS MCA Starts New Momentum Rolling

MCA Records, along with Infinity Records, completed their first joint convention Saturday (10-14), taking the opportunity to announce key executive appointments and a new tripartite structure designed to propel the company to a newly aggressive industry leadership stance. Al Bergamo has been appointed President of MCA Distribution Corporation, while Bob Siner has been promoted to Executive Vice President of MCA Records in acknowledgement of his recently expanded responsibilities within the company.

At the convention, MCA Inc. President Sid Sheinberg described MCA Records, Infinity, and MCA Distribution as "separate but interconnected companies" and cited the new structure as strengthening MCA's overall position in the record industry. The convention was highlighted by a solo appearance by Elton John, his first live performance in two years, along with multimedia product presentations, departmental meetings, and speeches by major MCA and Infinity executives, including Ber-

gamo; MCA Records President J.K. Maitland, and Infinity President Ron Alexenburg. Over 200 personnel attended.

recently Vice President of Marketing, West Coast. Commenting on the appointment, Sheinberg stated, "After months of evaluating potential candidates, I am most pleased that we were able to secure as talented an executive as Al Bergamo for the presidency of our record distributing entity." Sheinberg added that MCA Inc. Assistant Treasurer Gene Froelich will "be of special assistance" in the tran-

sition of MCA Distributing Corp. into "an independent entity within the MCA group of record activities." (Continued on page 3)

Greater Media Buys Storer's KHTZ/LA For \$4 Million

Greater Media, the New Brunswick, NJ-based radio chain, has purchased KHTZ/Los Angeles from Storer Broadcasting for \$4 million cash, pending FCC approval. Storer recently sold KHTZ'S AM counterpart, KTNQ, to K-Love Audio Broadcasting, for \$0 million, and with the KHTZ sale is now out of Los Angeles.

Tom Milewski, assistant to Greater Media President Peter Bordes, told R&R that any comment on Greater Media's ultimate format plans for KHTZ would be premature before the sale is final, adding that the question of KTNQ and KHTZ's shared studios' disposition "is subject to final talks between the three of us" (Storer, Greater Media, and K-Love), and that new KHTZ studios may have to be constructed. Milewski cited Greater Media's recent pattern of acquiring stations in Washington, DC, Philadelphia, and now Los Angeles on an approximate twoyear basis; when asked about future acquisition plans for Greater Media, he said, "We've been taking them one at a time. I'd look for us to develop the L.A. property before we do anything else, although we're certainly not out of the market in terms of becoming a bigger company."

Wyoming Station GM, CBS Named In \$63 Million Suit

Bill Luzmoor, General Manager of radio station KRKK/Rock Springs, WY, has been named along with CBS Inc., CBS Newsman Dan Rather, "60 Minutes" producer Paul Loewenwater, and several local media figures, as a defendant in a mammoth five-count libel suit. The action asks for \$425,000 in compensation and \$62.5 million in punitive damages on behalf of Paul J. Wattaha, the current Mayor of Rock Springs.

The suit, filed Monday (10-16) in the District Court of Sweetwater County, Wyoming, charges Luzmoor and his co-defendents with "dissemination of false and defamatory accusations contained in the '60 Minutes' program about Rock Springs aired on CBS on Oct. 23rd, 1977." The program dealt with alleged corruption in Rock Springs, focusing on evidence of apparent prostitution and touching on earlier criminal charges of embezzlement against Wattaha.

Luzmoor's conflict with the city's government began when Wattaha was charged with over 70 counts of embezzlement in 1977. Although the civil portion of the case was settled, the criminal charges were, according to Luzmoor, "never pursued." At this point CBS's "60 Minutes" became interested and used Luzmoor as their local contact. Luzmoor also testified against the Wattaha Administration before a state Grand Jury.

Airing of the program provoked Rock Springs' City Council into petitioning the FCC for equal time; however, the FCC refused (R&R 3-3).

WBSM Jock Leads Property Tax Revolt

David "Cuzzin Dave" Williford, evening jock at WBSM/New Bedford, MA, filled in as host of the station's talk show last Saturday morning with some unusual results.

According to Williford, an inordinate amount of the day's calls came from people complaining about recent local property tax reevaluations. While on the air, Williford asked his listeners that if they were calling and complaining about their property tax increases, then why weren't they willing to go down to city hall Monday and demonstrate their collective irritation to the local authorities?

Williford then assured his audience that he was serious; that this was not a radio station promotion, and went home wohdering if anything would come of the incident, but determined to show up at city hall on Monday even if no one else did.

4000 Listeners Assemble Downtown

On Monday, Williford found, by his estimate, "between three or

four thousand" angry people in front of city hall. Williford claims the local Portuguese station, WJFD, had, upon hearing of the impromptu demonstration, asked its listeners to join in too.

After the crowd refused to depart without an audience with the Mayor, public address equipment was hastily assembled and Mayor John Markey spoke to the crowd from a second story vantage point, telling them that while he was concerned, revenues could not be slashed without an equal loss of services and that, furthermore, 51% of the budget was not under local control. The crowd then dispersed, leaving Williford and WJFD staffer Alfaro Antonio to plan further strategy.

Williford commented, "We don't know what the next step will be, but we've got to show them that this has got to stop." Williford also stated that Proposition 13 proponent Howard Jarvis's organization had contacted him, apparently impressed with his crowd-rousing abilities.

Promotion In Motion — Reshufflings At RCA, Epic, ABC

In what is approaching the status of an annual tradition around the pre-holiday season, significant promotion changes occurred at three major labels last week. The first reports of reshuffling came from RCA, where Ray Anderson is no longer Division Vice President of Promotion. An RCA spokesman said tersely, "The position of Division Vice President of Promotion is being discontinued at RCA. Ray Anderson is currently discussing future plans with the management of the company." Anderson told R&R: "I have the highest personal regard for (RCA President) Bob Summer, and I'm still at RCA at this time." Other RCA promotion changes are apparently in the works, with National Promotion Director Michael Abramson to become merchandising chief in charge of Grunt Records and other RCA San Francisco-based artists, and West Coast Regional Promotion Director Allan Meis exiting. Further RCA announcements should be forthcoming shortly.

FCC Wins Court Decision On Program Percentages

In a decision last Friday, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia circuit upheld the FCC's right not to force broadcasters involved in a comparative renewal hearing to meet program percentage standards. The FCC was taken to court by the National Black Media Coalition and the San Jose, CA chapter of the Committee for Open Media. The court decided that the public interest groups did not have a legal argument and that they were actually seeking a "substitution of their policy judgement for that of the Commission." Earlier this month in a more important decision involving

\$8.98 LP Price Arrives In Time For Xmas

The \$8.98 list price for single alburns has become a reality in certain cases, with CBS announcing a price hike from \$7.98 on six new or recently-released alburns (the company previously set an \$8.98 price on the soundtrack alburn for "A Star Is Born" last year), and Warner Bros. pricing its new Steve Martin album at \$8.98 as well. The CBS albums affected are by Chicago, Billy Joel, Heart, Ted Nugent, Santana, and Boston, all top-selling acts. At this point, no other companies have announced increases, but the possibility has grown stronger that some will follow the lead of CBS and Warners.

KMPC GM Spero Promoted At Golden West; Miller New GM

Stanley L. Spero, Vice President/ General Manager of KMPC/Los Angeles for 11 years, has been promoted to a corporate vice presidency at Golden West Broadcasting, becoming VP of Sports and Sports Sales. Ken Miller, Assistant GM/ General Sales Manager at the station, will become General Manager.

Spero commented to R&R, "I've been involved in sports ever since I joined the radio industry. It's been part of my responsibilities to see that our sports broadcasts (including the Rams, Angels, and, years ago, the Dodgers) were sold to advertisers and merchandised and promoted. So what I'll be doing is going into a more specialized activity where I'll be involved with all Golden West broadcasts of sports Stanley Spero

in all our markets. I'm very happy about my new position."

Miller spent eight years at KMPC as General Sales Manager, and will be replaced in that position by Local Sales Manager Norm Epstein.

B. Mitchell Reed Suffers Heart Attack

Veteran KMET/Los Angeles air personality B. Mitchel Reed suffered a heart attack last Thursday (10-12) during his air shift. Immediately following the attack, his second in recent months, Reed was rushed to the hospital by KMET PD Sam Bellamy and General Sales Manager Howard Bloom. Reed was scheduled to undergo open heart surgery (an 8-10 hour operation) this week. He stated, "My heart is now functioning at between 20 and 40% of its capacity . . . The operation will allow the 'Beamer' to come back ten times better than before." Reed, one of the nation's best-known and most-honored air personalities, has been with KMET for the past ten years, and previously was a leading Top 40 jock in New York and Los Angeles.

At Epic, National Director of Promotion Jim Jeffries has resigned his position. Jeffries will annouce future plans soon. E/P/A Vice President of Promotion Al Gurewitz told R&R, "We are looking inside the company first to replace Jeffries."

Davis had originally come to ABC last year as Vice President of Sales and Promotion, and later added supervisory responsibilities for Marketing and Creative Services. Arbitron Sets Spring Survey Dates

Arbitron Radio has set the dates for its April/May 1979 survey: April 19 to May 16, some two weeks later than last year's spring survey. Arbitron notes that the later dates will in turn cause later delivery of the results. Arbitron's announcement states, "These dates do not include the Easter holiday, an event which has been shown to increase the level of teen listening in the daytime daypart." This exclusion of Easter vacation may have a significant effect on the rating results for stations with substantial teen listeners, and the change should be carefully noted.

GROSBY APPOINTED VP IN CHARGE

Affiliated Takes Over Hercules Stations

The purchase of Hercules Broadcasting's four radio stations, KMPS-AM-FM/Seattle and KRAK/KEWT-FM/Sacramento, by Affiliated Broadcasting has been completed, and Affiliated will assume control in December, Al Grosby, presently General Manager at Affiliated's WFAS/WWYO-FM/White Plains, will become General Manager for KRAK and KEWT, and as an Affiliated Vice President will oversee the operations of the Seattle stations as well. No format changes are planned in the near future, R&R was informed; KEWT is a Beautiful Music station, and the other three are Country, with KRAK a longtime West Coast Country stronghold.

He told the audience, "The main reason I stopped was that I had lost my hunger for live shows. I always said that if I didn't feel I was giving 100%, I would quit . . . I honestly won't go back on the road until I've got that hunger back. It's not fair to yourself or to your fans to just go through the motions."

Editor's Note:

For three weeks now, the lead item for "Washington Report" has revolved around actions taken by the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit. A mere two months after opening R&R Washington offices, we noted this court's increasing importance in the daily lives of radio broadcasters in a blurb called "Learning the Ropes" (R&R, 8-4). Even then signs seemed to point to trouble. Little did anyone expect the multitude and magnitude of the Federal court's recent actions. (See Page 3 story and below.)

Commission's Brown Calls Court "Super FCC"

FCC Commissioner Tyrone Brown blasted his agency last week for its inconsistent national communications policy which has allowed the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia to become a "super-FCC."

In a speech to the Federal Communications Bar Association in Washington, Brown said, "All too often the FCC does not in fact act as an expert and independent agency." According to Brown, it is the "gap between our own promises and our performance which invites the Court of Appeals to involve itself in communications policy in ways which never were intended and which, in my judge-ment, are clearly inappropriate."

Brown said the FCC's inconsistency gives the court a legal basis for reversing the Commission and encourages "some judges to attempt to supplant the Commission in making communications policy."

"Heads I Win, Tails You Lose" Policy

Citing the broadcast licensing process as an area where the FCC says one thing and does another, Brown said that in comparative renewal cases pitting a licensee against a new applicant, the FCC has "mouthed many high-sounding principles, but the result is always the same; i.e. heads, the incumbent wins; tails, the challenger loses.

According to Brown, some judges on the Court of Appeals "appear to have lost all patience with the Commission," and as a result the Court recently has reversed several FCC decisions. The newest FCC commissioner asserts that the impasse between the FCC and the Court has led to an absence of national communications policy on many issues, uncertainty in the broadcast industry, and public confusion.

FCC Tinkers With New Program Category

Radio stations could be faced with new programming restrictions and license renewal procedures because of an inquiry begun by the FCC. In response to petitions from several church groups, the Commission is looking into public affairs programming.

The purpose of the inquiry is to decide if expanding public affairs programming to include a new category called community service, consisting of noncommercial programs produced by or in conjunction with nonprofit organizations, might stimulate more broadcasts. Also, the Commission will decide if broadcasters should be required to list the amount of community service programming a station offers at renewal time

The petitioners' original claim that TV stations are not serving the needs and purposes of nonprofit organizations was broadened when two additional public interest groups, the Population Institute and the National Organization for Women, submitted arguments supporting the proposal and requesting that radio broadcasters be included. Four large church organizations and 70 individual church communicators participated in the original petition.

The FCC says that it is including radio programming in order to consider if it should be treated differently from TV with respect to the addition of a community service category.

Radio Violations Cost More Next Week

Effective Monday, (10-23), the FCC will have the ability to extract double dollars from broadcasters who violate the Commission's rules. Last February, Congress gave the Commission the power to set a new ceiling for station fines which doubles the maximum limits - \$2000 per violation or repeat of the same offense up to \$20,000. Previously, they could only require half of each amount.

In a similar move, the FCC has extended from one to three years the amount of time the Commission has in which to find a station guilty and assess a fine. Thus the Commission will now have greater discretion in situations similar to WJPD/Ishpeming, MI's (R&R 10-13), where the FCC's only alternatives have been to renew or deny the station's license for double billing practices because the one-year statue of limitations expired prior to the Commission taking action.

they still face the "all or nothing" policy. And while stations can now request a hearing to argue about forfeitures, the FCC has said it will only grant special requests. The new approach also gets tougher with its collection policy, shifting the chores from the FCC to trial in a Federal district court.

Expenses Paid For Broadcast Critics?

The issue is money. The question is: should the federal government reimburse selected individuals and groups for their expenses in its pro-ceedings. There is great sentiment to do that. This past year, not only was there legislation introduced in both houses of Congress proposing to pay up to \$10 million in expenses to public participants, but the FCC has initiated an inquiry of its own. Both the Carter Administration and the FCC Chairman advocate adoption of the idea.

Last week, the Council on Children, Media & Merchandising filed comments with the FCC in support of using taxpayers' money for this purpose. On Tuesday, the National Association of Broadcasters and National Radio Broadcasters Association submitted their position papers.

NAB cited several reasons opposing the proposal, saying that the practice would result in: 1) the expense of adding extra staff, 2) delays in FCC proceedings, 3) an unworkable plan as demonstrated by the FTC, and 4) exercising power that belongs to Congress, not the FCC.

Extra, Extra . . .

Ralph Nader takes over reins at the National Citizens Committee for Broadcasting, a public interest law firm. Chairman's position has been held by former FCC Commissioner Nicholas Johnson. The man who is most responsible for certain safety and consumer drives for legislation will now turn his attention to the media. Johnson will stay on as chief lobbyist for the national Citizens Communication Lobby .

Audits & Surveys, Inc. of New York hired 150 telephone survey people for their New York headquarters this week. They will operate three shifts of 50 people using phones and operating CRT's . . .

Chevrolet told R&R this week of its hugh success with National Chevy Week last Sept. 15-23. Campaign which used 75% radio represented biggest single radio buy in Detroit's history. 120,000 Chevrolet cars were sold that week . .

RAB Brainstorm

New York-based Radio Advertising Bureau held two-day brainstorming session earlier this month in Chicago with 40 top broadcast executives from all size markets telling the RAB brass what they like and don't like. The purpose of the idea exchange was to evaluate current RAB services and plan for the future

According to Susan Breakfield, GM, WASH/Wash., D.C. recommendations included 1) mailing RAB material directly to advertisers and agencies and 2) making broadcasters aware of national conventions, such as the American Home Builders Association's, in order to pitch radio to convention participants . .

Joe Noring replaces Jim Holton as NBC VP of Radio News. Holton, a 25-year associate of NBC, will take charge of the network's Washington Radio News Bureau.

Former Director of Publications/Publicity for the American Women in Radio and Television in Washington, DC, Pat Ward becomes new editor of Highlights, NAB's weekly newsletter. She replaces Marilyn O'Connor, who steps up to Director of Special Projects for the association's Public Affairs Department.

nent of your trusteeship. It does not stifle robust debate. Rather, it guarantees that there will be debate." Hollings also advocated the retention of the Equal Time provision and noted that the existence of such clauses serves to improve the rapport between broadcasters and the public.

On the subject of license renewals, Hollings suggested "increasing the present three-year li-cense term." He also discussed the question of comparative renewals, touching upon the 1969 WHDH-TV decision and the recent WESH case, one that continues to trouble broadcasters. He admitted that his 1974 proposal regarding comparative renewals was "over-broad" and said that the effect of that proposal "would have been to ensure renewal of a license with too little regard for performance."

Sports Fans Listening To Radio While Watching TV

Surveys for WBBM/Chicago show that up to 74% of its audiences for Chicago Bears games were also watching television — with the sound off. Jack Buck, announcer for the CBS radio network, which broadcasts the Monday night NFL games also carried by ABC-TV, says fans around the country report their TV's have been silenced. A spokesman for ABC denied the charge, citing record ratings for this season's broadcasts. While Buck feels many fans have turned off to Howard Cosell, a spokesman for radio claims it's the detailed analysis and reporting available from radio as opposed to television's tendency to "let you watch the action rather than tell you what's going on," which is responsible for radio's increased popularity.

Aidan Day Named To Important British PD Post

Aidan Day, a longtime notable in the British radio industry, has been appointed Programme Controller (a position ranking somewhere between general manager and program director here) for Capital Radio, London's top independent radio station. Day, who has been with Capital for two years (since its founding) and the BBC for 14 years before that, was most recently Director of Programmes for Capital, having served as Music Director previously.

Sonderling, Viacom Rewrite Merger Arrangement

Sonderling Broadcasting and Viacom International Inc. have arrived at a mutually satisfactory revision of their merger terms. The merger was first announced in March this year, but recently the original arrangement for exchanging Sonderling stock was judged inadequate by Sonderling's investment bankers. The new provisions call for each Sonderling common share to be exchanged for either \$28 cash or a share of a new convertible preferred stock issue from Viacom with a liquidation preference of \$28 and an annual cumulative divident of \$2.10. The previous arrangement called for a \$25.50 cash exchange or a preferred share with a \$25.50 liquidation value and annual dividend of about \$1.91. The new deal is subject to board approval of both companies.

Study Shows 64% Get News From More Than One Source

According to a recent study conducted by the **Newspaper Advertising Bureau**, 64% of respondents said they obtained news from more than one source daily. The breakdown: radio, newspapers and television, 25%; newspapers and television, 20%; radio and newspapers, 12%; and radio and television, 7%. More dissatisfaction with TV was expressed in a finding that 67% turned to newspapers for coverage TV could not provide.

Two More Series Cancelled As TV Turbulence Continues

NBC and ABC have each cancelled one of their new comedy series, bringing the casualty total to three so far (NBC's "W.E.B." was the first to go). Heading for the graveyard are NBC's "Waverly Wonders," starring Joe Namath, and ABC's "Apple Pie," a Norman Lear Depression-era show starring "Maude" 's Rue McClanahan and "Mary Hartman" 's Dabney Coleman.

"Waverly Wonders" will be replaced by "Different Strokes " a comedy about a white millionaire adopting two black kids starring another "Maude" alumnus, **Conrad Bain**. "Apple Pie" will be immediately replaced by "Carter Country" in the ABC Saturday 8:30-9 slot, with "Welcome Back Kotter" shifting from Monday to Saturday in the former "Carter Country" time. Meanwhile, "Operation Petticoat" will move from Monday following "Kotter" for a test run on Thursday following the hot "Mork & Mindy" at 8:30. No Monday replacements have been named by ABC.

Finally, NBC's low-rated "Who's Watching The Kids" is following "Mary" into the repair shop for a few weeks' hiatus while its direction is rethought. Star **Caren Kaye** has already exited. Stay tuned for more of these goings on.

MUSIC ON TV - The second annual Tulsa '78 International Music Festival, hosted and staged by Jim Halsey, will be taped by Osmond Television, the Osmonds' TV operation. Taping November 3-5, the organization will film various concert events, featuring an international show of country-styled singers from England, Mexico, Australia, Sweden, Bulgaria, Singapore, and elsewhere; plus an American lineup later in the weekend starring Roy Clark, Mel Tillis, Roy Head, Tammy Wynette, Ray Price, the Oak Ridge Boys, Jody Miller, Barbara Fairchild, Freddy Fender, Joe Stampley, and Don Williams. ABC Records plans to record a live album from the performances, and the Halsey organization is negotiating for a nationwide radio syndication arrangement. Helen Reddy hits "Mike Douglas" October 23-25 ... Little River Band is set for an October 23 "Rock Concert" date . Andy Gibb guests on "Donny & Marie" October 20, an episode on which Donny & Marie singing "Jive Talking" and "High Heel Sneakers" among other highlights The Hudson Brothers are taping "Mike Douglas," "Dinah," and "Every Day" appearances this month . . . October 27th's "Midnight Special" features Paul McCartney & Wings, the Trammps, Exile, Anne Murray, Cheryl Ladd. Stonebolt, Evelyn "Champagne" King, Little River Band, and Linda Clifford.

ABC On Top Again In Ratings





WHY DO RESEARCH?

Music research has become increasingly fashionable recently. From focus groups to call-out record research systems, more and more PD's are turning to research techniques which have been used for years by consumer goods marketers, market research firms, and advertising agencies.

The rationale underlying the trend to more music research is easily discernible:

1) Research can determine which records the audience would like to hear;

2) The station can then add these desirable tunes to the playlist, or increase their frequency in the rotation;

3) By doing this, the station will attract more listeners;

4) By having more listeners, the station should be more likely to show a good book when Arbitron makes its sweep;

5) A good book means that the station can charge more for its advertising; hence, more revenues!

Thus, research is seen as the route to larger audiences and, hopefully, increased station profitability. More important than profits, however, may be the very survival of the format. As long as the current format is successful in generating audience, revenues, and profits, it will survive. But, as we are all too painfully aware, when the ratings and the profits fall, formats fail and heads roll.

So, the driving force behind the trend toward music research is desire on the part of PD's to improve their performance. Research is seen as a way of insuring good performance.

But is a vaguely-defined desire for "good" or "improved" performance a good enough reason to justify doing music research?

am sure that many of you have asked that question more than once. After all, research is costly, in terms of dollars or time, or both. But more inportantly, research can only come out in one of two ways: 1) It's wrong, or 2) It only tells you what you know already. So why do it — it's a waste of money. Are you convinced yet?

I certainly hope not! The objections to research mentioned above have been voiced in probably every company in the U.S., at one time or another, so you're in good company if you cast a somewhat jaundiced eye on research. But the fact remains that over two-thirds of the Fortune 500 firms (the 500 largest companies in the U.S.) maintain market research departments, and virtually all companies, regardless of size, do some form of research.

What is research, exactly? It is really nothing more than a means by which a manager (e.g., a program director) can get informaton about the marketplace. In other words, research is a way of allowing the market, the consumers of your service, to communicate back to you what they like, what they dislike, etc. While there is no substitute for the "sixth sense" or that "feel" for the market which some PD's seem to have, it is also true that even the best "intuitive" PD can benefit from sound information about the market he or she is attempting to serve.

So, granted that good research can be of assistance, how do you go about making sure that the research inputs you get are, in fact reliable?

In the coming weeks, we will be dealing with a variety of techniques which can help you in designing and implementing a reliable music research system. Many of you are already using some of these procedures, and I hope that you will share your ideas with me and your peers around the country. Research is not a magic wand which we can wave over the Arbitron ratings to guarantee a good book, but it can be a useful tool to help you make your station more responsive to its listeners and, it's likely more successful in the long run!

"Actives" And "Passives"

Sorting out the sense from the nonsense ... In the past, many radio stations have relied on record store sales or national trade sheets for information on listeners' music preferences. However, preferences for specific records or artists often vary rather dramatically across different regions of the country, so *first-hand* information on the immediate radio-listening market being served by the individual station becomes quite important. Accordingly, in recent years, many stations around the country have begun to conduct their own music research in order to determine the best mix of tunes for their playlists.

ome stations have used contests or "request lines" as a means of gathering

music preferences. However, listeners who will actually take the time and effort to call in to a station represent only a very small subset of the total listening audience. For whatever reason, these people are more "active" in their behavior with respect to radio listening. Recognizing that fact, many stations have begun doing radio listening habits. The fact that one group is more active than the other in buying records, concert tickets, etc., may not mean a thing if both groups enjoy listening to the same music on the radio. In other words, the active/passive distinction is with respect to the wrong activities! If what you are concerned with is playing music that will attract the most listeners for the longest time, then the radio listening behavior of the audience members is the relevant concern, not their record buying or their phone-line requests.

N ow there may be very real differences between actives and passives in terms of their radio listening. But, in the absence of evidence which tells you what and how large those differences are, it is best to ignore the active/ passive notion and simply view your audience as consumers of radio, and therefore of your station.

How do you determine those consumers' music preferences? That is a complex question, one that is answered differently under different circumstances (e.g., size of budget, size of market, etc.). But at least one aspect of the answer does not change, and that is the fact that you must insure that the entire potential listening audience is fairly represented in your research, and not just a small, "active," subset.

A ccordingly, you should use some form of call-out research system which gives every potential listener an equal chance of being interviewed. As part of the interview, you can ask if they have ever called in to your station with a request or as part of a contest (i.e., are they "actives"?). This will be a very small portion of the total set of call-out interviews, but over time you can begin to ascertain differences in music preferences between the "actives" and "passives." Then, and only then, can you meaningfully assess whether there are such animals as "actives" and "passives" and, further, what impact they may have on your listenership figures.

You may find out that your request line calls closely parallel the results of your call-out research. In that case, where you have two independent methods which seem to converge on the same answer, you have even greater confidence that

"call-out" research to reach the so-called "passives" which constitute the bulk of the audience. This has come to be known as "passive research," and there is much bandied about as to the supposed differences between "actives" and "passives." Actives buy more records, attend more concerts, seek more autographs, are more prone to become groupies, etc., etc. Meanwhile, the poor passives sit at home forlornly, twiddling their thumbs and listening to the radio (perhaps they are also more likely than an active to be at home when the call-out researcher phones!).

Radio Activist The Key

How important is this active/passive distinction to the program director and/or music researcher? The answer is that it depends upon how different the two groups are in terms of their you are more or less accurately representing the reality of the marketplace.

The successful PD should never rely upon only one source of information — nothing should be ignored, including sales data, requests, and your own intuition. But care must be taken that at least some of the information you use is as representative and unbiased as possible.




Is Linda Ronstadt about to accept an offer to star in a Broadway play?

It's happening again . . . each and every autumn the new releases by major acts flood radio stations from coast to coast. Just exactly why that happens every year will be the subject of a forthcoming article in R&R. In the past month new albums from Chicago, Billy Joel, Santana, Elton John, Linda Ronstadt, Al Stewart, Lynyrd Skynyrd, Van Morrison, Styx, Heart, Kenny Loggins and Neil Young, just to name a few, have been released into the open arms of radio. It makes for some interesting problems from a rotational standpoint. When you are comfortable adding three or four new songs per week and suddenly there are several so-called "proven name acts" with new product on the street, your decisions must be based on more titles than usual. In a way it's a nice kind of problem to have . . . after all, it's much easier to pick when the selection is greater. In any case, it looks like the fall book will have plenty of name-talent music to give stations familiarity and freshness at the same time. Not a bad combination.

This week, a look at &-tracks and cassettes and their ever-increasing role in the total sales picture of recorded music . . . Some impressions direct from one of the few "rock concerts" ever held at the White House . . . Promotions and those never ending "motions". Nice to see Jerry Rogers, General Manager of WSGA/Savannah, in L.A. last week. He was on his way to "the track" and dropped in for the official R&R tour. It's nice to know we've become a "must see" on the industry tour of Los Angeles. You can bet we'll be ready for everyone during Convention '79. Ken Barnes and I have already ordered our special R&R Tour Blazers, just like the NBC pages.

Check Those Tapes

In the recent study done by Warner Communications Inc. on "The Prerecorded Music Market," several interesting points were made. The first fact most of us noticed was that the 25-44 year old demographic comprises 37% of the total buyers of prerecorded music and account for a full 38% of the purchases. The reason we may have noticed this point first is because it did not fit with the stereotyped music consumer we all had pictured in our minds. According to the WCI data the 10-19 year olds were not the number one group of music buyers.

Another fact from that same study is equally interesting because it may be an area radio has been overlooking. Tape sales are up. Not surprising in the face of increased sales from all areas of the record business, but were you aware just how much tape sales have increased? The figures quoted from the WCI study indicate that a full 31% of the total prerecorded

The figures quoted from the WCI study indicate that a full 31% of the total prerecorded music sold within this country is sold in the 8-track or cassette configuration. Additionally the report said, "Current buyers (of all music) were asked whether they were buying more, less or about the same number of tapes or records as they had bought in the previous year . . . Although there is only a slight net increment in the number of people buying more proceed.

Although there is only a slight net increment in the number of people buying more records, there are substantial net increases in the buying of prerecorded tape. The excess of people who say they are buying more this year over those buying less is 2 percentiles among current LP buyers, no change among singles buyers, a 15 percentile increment among & track buyers, and a huge 24 percentile increment among cassette buyers."

What that means simply stated is tape sales are increasing while record buying is generally staying about the same. Further, cassettes are coming on very strong, as the study states: "There could be a significant increase in tape buying in the coming years and the cassette market could eventually outgrow the 8-track market, since the increase in cassette buying is coming primarily from the better-educated, higher-income segments of the population."

After pondering those facts for a while, I checked with a major record label just to see how tapes fared against records in total sales. I was informed that 33% of this company's total sales in the last quarter were in the tape configuration. Also, the sales of 8-tracks were holding steady, but the cassette sales had increased a full 3%. Checking three other Los Angeles-based labels, the story was exactly the same.

When I was programming we never checked tape sales. We would have exact information on albums and singles sold within our market, but we never dealt with the sales of tapes. With tapes coming to a full one-third share of the total sales of prerecorded music, I wondered if radio now took those sales into account.

Tape Sales Draw Blank

Back on the telephone, I contacted ten stations at random from within all three parallels of R&R's music reporters. I won't name them, but I will tell you *not one station* checks tape sales within their marketplaces. I asked each programmer I talked to, "Why not check tape sales?" The answers ranged from "haven't got time," to "aren't really a big factor." I'm not being specific about who I talked to because pointing a finger serves no purpose. But it seems clear that if one-third of the total music sales are tapes, radio should be monitoring those sales. And as that segment of the total market increases, tape sales will be even more important than they are now.

If you don't currently get tape sales information how can you go about assembling it? The same way you get your LP and single sales information. Chances are pretty good that most of the retail and wholesale outlets you call also sell a fair amount of tapes. In many cases with the larger volume stores the person who gives you LP information may not be the one to get tape information from, since two different people probably handle the ordering and stocking of the two separate entities. However, the contact you already have should be able to introduce you to the right person to quiz on tape sales. If you can get a "piece-count" (actual number

of individual sales made on any particular LP) and compare it to your "piece-count" for LP sales, you should be able to tell just how big a factor tape sales are in your market.

Another interesting piece of information to have would be how many people in your market are tape equipped either at home or in their cars. The WCI study states that 55% of the total U.S. population currently has access to both record and tape players in their homes. The study does not indicate how many people are tape-equipped in their cars. Luckily you can see into cars and perhaps even do your own survey as to what percent of your total market is indash equipped. A stroll through any large shopping center parking lot looking into cars could give you some approximate percentages of tape-equipped autos. Do that enough times in a few different locations and the picture could become much clearer.

Call a few auto dealers to find out how many new cars are being sold with radios and tape players. Check a few stereo shops to see how the sales of auto tape-decks are going. Have sales of those units increased in the last few years, and if so, how much? With tape sales up all over the country chances are good that tape-deck sales have gone up proportionately.


Input Connection

The bottom line on all of this is tapes now comprise a sizable chunk of the total music sold in America. If you aren't currently getting tape sales information, perhaps you should be. The question was raised by one programmer I spoke with: "How often do you think a tape would sell and the LP would not?" My answer is probably not very often, if ever. But suppose you had two releases you were tracking. The first one sold 100 total pieces, all LP's. The second one sold 100 pieces, 50 LP's and 50 tapes. If you were only checking LP sales, the first one would show much better than the second, when in fact they are equally popular from a sales perspective. If you weren't checking tape sales, you would have missed that. Admittedly the psychographics of who buys albums and who buys tapes may differ (just


Admittedly the psychographics of who buys albums and who buys tapes may differ (just as there is a marked difference between the 8-track consumer and the cassette buyer). Some acts may have a tendency to sell more tapes than others simply because of who they primarily appeal to. Taking those facts into account, I still feel that you're missing a bet by not checking tape sales. Any chance to increase your input should be embraced. Who knows ... a few years from now instead of hearing jocks say, "Here's a cut from the new Fleetwood Mac album," they may say "Okay, here's a track from the new Fleetwood Mac cassette!"

To say it was quite an evening would be an understatement. President Carter recently threw a "Georgia Bar-B-Que and rock concert" at the White House starring the Atlanta Rhythm Section. The party was primarily a thank-you for several hundred of Carter's young campaign workers, but the evening also was an opportunity for several key radio and record personalities to get together in Washington to enjoy the fun.

L.A. based independent promotion man Cliff Gorov has worked closely with the Atlanta Rhythm Section and was invited to attend. When he got back, I asked him to jot down his thoughts about having been with the President and Cliff came through with this very interesting perspective of an extra special evening.

Large Time

"I recently experienced a real thrill. It was something I'll probably never experience again, but the memory will be with me forever. About four weeks ago my friend Arnie Geller, who manages the Atlanta Rhythm Section, called me from his homebase of Atlanta. The call was not unexpected, since we often speak, but his was not a typical call. Arnie was inviting me to spend an evening at The White House with President Carter. I couldn't believe it!

"President Carter and his family were having a party for some visiting dignitaries and several Congressmen along with their sons and daughters who live in D.C. The theme of the party was 'a Georgia Bar-B-Que and rock concert.' The group that was to appear at the White House was ARS.

"I should mention that my partner Sam Kaplan was most jealous, but he realized that one of us should re-main in L.A. to 'watch the store'. The concert was to be Monday (9/25), and Monday and Tuesday are our busiest days calling radio stations all over the country. For me, the stations would have to wait. I was not going to pass up an invitation to see ARS at the White House.

"I figured I would need a tux . I mean, you've got to look sharp for the President, right? Wrong. The word came down that this was to be a casual dress affair and I was informed by the President's social secretary that, 'the Carter men would be wearing jeans and casual shirts.' So casual it was.

"I left Los Angeles Sunday afternoon and besides running into Dave Sholin (RKO National Music Coordinator) on the plane, the flight was uneventful. We landed in D.C. and proceeded to the hotel for some sleep. 'The next day we all gathered in the lobby for the ride

to the party and smiles were everywhere. The short ride past some of our nation's best known landmarks, the Washington Monument, the Lincoln Memorial and more all served to bring into focus the reality of being at the White House within moments. As we arrived, our photo identification and invitations were checked by the security personnel and we were directed to the South Wing lawn. We were met by a full-dress Marine who gave each guest a red dotted napkin as a memento of the occasion.

"Standing in the middle of the White House lawn, looking up at the residence of our President, was exhilirating. I don't mean to get overly corny, but here we were tasting the epitome of Americana. Patriotism was at an all-time high. It was quite a rush.

"At the edge of the lawn with the Washington Monu-

self to him, I handed him the note. He read it quickly and put it into his pocket. I hoped that one of the many photographers had gotten a shot of that, and I later found out that one had. I could see the picture framed in Julie's room already

"After greeting his guests, the President went to the stage and introduced his family. Following a few humorous remarks, he brought out the group. Ronnie Hammond, the Section's lead vocalist, presented a red-satin jacket with the ARS logo on the back to President Carter. He immediately put it on and modeled it for the crowd. I was sitting there thinking to myself . here was the President wearing jeans and a satin ARS jacket. He would have been any regular rock and roller.

"I've been to a lot of rock concerts over the years, but

ment serving as an illuminating background, long tables were filled with Bar-B-Qued beef and pork. Also loads of Southern style beans and slaw, plenty of beer and wine, and some of the finest pecan pie I have ever eaten!

About 7:15pm President and Mrs. Carter joined us outside. I moved my way through the crowd trying to get a chance to shake hands with the most important man in the world. I admit I didn't know what to expect. My image of a President was that of a very formal, staid, aloof man. Jimmy Carter was the complete antithesis of my Presidential image. He was warm and homey, loose, friendly and had a soft, charming sense of humor. this night was the most unique. The band was really 'on' and 300-400 folks were on their feet dancing and just generally having a 'large time.' It was a very emotional and warm feeling I got just watching everyone rocking out on the White House lawn.


"Two hours later the show was over. Most of the guests, myself included, didn't want to leave. Several of us lingered, walking around the White House ing the last few minutes. It was a beautiful evening and I had enjoyed it to the fullest. I was very lucky to be invit-ed to such an event and as I said earlier, I will never forget it. I am convinced there is no other country like this one. I think I always knew it, but a night at the White House sure brought it into sharp focus.'



White Warns Broadcasters

Other speakers at the NAB regional conferences, which began last week and continue into November, included FCC Commissioners Margita White and Joe Fogarty and NAB President Vincent Wasilewski. Mrs. White, whose term as commissioner has expired but who continues to serve until final Senate confirmation is given to White' House nominee; Anne Jones, told the broadcasters in Atlanta on Tuesday that their "legitimate fear is that the Commission will become a regulatory Robin Hood, robbing broadcasters of their editorial and programming discretion and redistributing their properties and financial resources in a misdirected hunt for diversity." She

said "the FCC is marching to a different drummer."

Speakers Predict Big Changes Ahead

Speaking first extemporaneously, then taking Q & A, Fogarty reiterated to 200 predominantly New England radio and TV broadcasters last Friday, his opposition to most of the proposed rewrite of the Communications Act; however, he emphasized that new technologies could make broadcasting as we know it today extinct. Fogarty also criticized the Commission's renewal procedures and, alluding to the WESH/Daytona Beach, FL case, telling the crowd that the FCC must "regain credibility with the courts."


Wasilewski, filling in for Sen. John Durkin (D-NH) who had been scheduled to address the group, echoed a theme of change for the communications industry. "In my opinion," the NAB president said, "The business of providing mass entertainment, news and information to consumers through an advertising-supported system will always exist, but it is going to change." Wasilewski then related how he views the effects of future changes upon people entering broad-casting: "If I were a young per-son today, interested in this field of communications, I would be learning first how to read and write expertly; I would stress English composition and sharpen my ability to express myself succinctly and clearly, and then I would learn as much about computers and the melding of computers and communications as I possibly could."



Commercial-Free Radio

Commercial-free hours of radio have been an AOR staple promotion for years. They are unique in that they cost nothing and make best use of a light log or slow sales period. WZXR/ Memphis has increased the idea of commercial-free hours to entire days, a promotion they will experiment with for the duration of the ratings period and perhaps beyond.

To accommodate "commercial-free Monday" WZXR's traffic department has rescheduled that day's spots to other times in the week when there are spaces available. This is contingent, of course, on the spots having been sold for any available time slot as opposed to specific hours. Even with the added spots moving to other days the station still keeps to a maximum of eight minutes per hour. As station MD Frank Kelly explained, "We charge pretty good rates for our spots, which has discouraged some of the classic bad-pay mom-and-pop operations that we were probably better off without in the first place."

Clients received the commercial-free idea enthusiastically, once they were assured the jocks would not be downgrading commercials in their plugs of the commercial-free days. Kelly said, "It was all explained very carefully to them that we were not making an anticommercial statement and would not be doing so in promoting the commercial-free days; we were just giving our listeners something special."

The commercial-free days are nearly rap-free as well, the jocks skipping one-liners and streamlining their back-announcing wherever possible. The effect is maximum music — minimum talk, and the reaction has been overwhelmingly positive. Said Kelly, "It comes off so well on the air that it gets great phone response from our audience, who are normally not heavy phone-callers."


Commercial-free days of radio: who said successful promotions have to be high-budget?

The overcrowded Denver AOR scene is changing again to accommodate a new PD and direction at KFML-AM. Ken Kohl, with a radio background in WLIR/Long Island's earliest days as well as work at KBPI/Denver and as manager of Stallion, has replaced departing KFML PD Randy Sutton. With Kohl are newcomers Larry Bruce as MD (from KBPI, KBCO/Boulder and Brown Bag Productions) and production and news director Joel Moss (WLIR, WPLJ/New York, WCOZ/Boston). Kohl spoke of the direction he'll take at the Denver AM AOR: "We are traditionally real strong in men 18-24, and now I want to take that demographic higher with a radio form that combines the essences of AOR and AM. Unlike the tight-listed AORs in town, we will continue to go deeper than the hit cut on albums, especially older albums. We hope to catch people as they tune across the AM dial to listen to what we're going to be doing." Luck to the new staffers at KFML.

Meanwhile in nearby Boulder, KBCO just finished a praiseworthy promotion that was months in the planning stages. Their fourth annual "Boulder Music Weekend" turned area musicians into local stars when KBCO aired over a hundred tapes of songs submitted by area musicians. Mixed in with the amateur efforts were songs by Boulder bands and people who have, in the past, turned pro (Firefall, Chris Hillman, Richie Furay). The tape judged best by the station was sent to A&M VP of A&R Kip Cohen for a professional critique. Climaxing the weekend was a Saturday night broadcast from not one but six area clubs who were all spotlighting local talent. A station jock at each location had headsets tuned to a sound truck where the shows were mixed for airing. Behind the mixing board was Ron Valerie of Sight & Sound location recorders. The commercial-free night of music ran from 7pm until 3am the next morning, and was highlighted by a set by local-boys-made-good Navarro and by the contributions of Firefall band members who sat in on some sets by local musicians. The local act judged most entertaining was granted opening status on an upcoming major concert bill. Response throughout the weekend, as you might imagine, was overwhelming. As station PD Dennis Constantine put it, "This should dispel forever the city's image as a cowtown." Indeed it does, and a tip of the AOR hat to the hard-working Constantine and crew for carrying out a truly imaginative promotion that celebrated the Boulder lifestyle.

The group judged the 18 finalists from the 60 entries on the air, and also promised to play the winning tune over the sound system before their area concert.

MONEY TALKS AND NOBODY WALKS: QFM97/Buffalo is giving away \$97 a day for over a month as a ratings-getter. Every half-hour the station takes a specific call number for a cash giveaway.

CARR'S GUITAR: WIBA-FM/Madison, in conjunction with Big Tree Records and the new Pete Carr album, auditioned area guitarists for musicianship and material. Five finalists played at an area club and Pete Carr chose the winner, who received a Gibson SG guitar.

MORE CONTESTS ABOUT BUILDINGS AND FOOD: WMMS/Cleveland, in conjunction with Sire Records and the new Talking Heads album, did a postcard promotion that sent the winner and guest to an expenses-paid vacation in New York, where they dined atop the World Trade Center in the "Windows of the World" restaurant. Also included: \$101 spending money for each winner, a Talking Heads album library, Broadway play.tickets, t-shirts, etc.

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Open letter to Len Ellis, WLJE/Valparaiso, Indiana; Jack Reno, Cincinnati; Larry James, WBT/Charlotte: Len: as one of the originals at the early "D.J." conventions, you've not just watched Country radio grow; you were the first to ever bring a radio station tour to Nashville, and one of the first pioneer Country radio personalities to go on to management, and now station ownership (sure glad they didn't know you were a "pioneer," they might have thought you were too old to win). Jack: Your big problem professionally has always been not knowing for sure whether you wanted to be a record star or super-jock (you've had top ten records like "Repeat After Me" in 1965-66 and great radio success in the Midwest and especially Cincinnati). But I really appreciate your outspoken honesty and strong opinions of your own, not necessarily the crowd's. Larry: Remember five years ago when you asked me if I thought you were ready for major market competition as a personality? And remember what I told you? You're a good example that "good guys do finish first." Being a practicing Christian and a big family man (5 kids) hasn't hurt you at all. You sure made me proud of you. You three guys started in three different decades of country radio, (40's, 50's, 60's) and yet you all believe in and continue to influence Country radio with a special dedication to country as a musical art form and not just a financial bonanza. Congratulations Len, Jack and Larry, you finally got what you deserve, and I'm glad!

THEY JUST MOVE TO NASHVILLE Old Country DJ's Never Die

Not all Country jocks end up in Nashville, but a surprising number do. Since this is convention week (whatever happened to "DJ Week?"), which was started by a bunch of hillbilly disc jockeys, let's talk about some who got off the air and moved to Nashville. Waylon Jennings played records in West Texas, did week-ends at the old K-HAT/Phoenix (never did get on regu-Moe Bandy, Connie Smith, and many others, played records at K-BUY/Ft. Worth, and lar) KENS (now KKYX) in San Antonio . . . George Richey left the Foggy River Boys gospel group, moved to Tucson to C&W DJ at the old KMOP, then to KAYO/Seattle and KGBS/L.A. before moving to Nashville to become a giant writer-publisher and star husband to Tammy Wynette Bill Anderson started DJ'ing in Commerce, Georgia and during his college days at the University of Georgia before whispering his way to fame in Music City ... Charlie Williams started DJ'ing in Ft. Worth before moving to KXLA and KFOX in L.A. and KSAY/Oakland, before moving to Nashville to manage Bobby Bare and (now) head Willie Nelson's Lone Star publishing Ed Hamilton (Shreveport and WENO/Nashville) heads the national promotion dept. at Willie's Lone Star records ... Frank Jones, who just left as head Nashville VP at Capi tol Records and before that A&R'ed at Columbia for 20 years, was a radio personality in Canada Shelley Davis came from WRCP/Philly, and KFDI and KBUL/Wichita, to be business manager for Mel Tillis Enterprises. Eddie Kilroy, who put Playboy country (Mickey Gilley, et al) on the map and now takes calls at MCA Records here, played radio at KENR/Houston, as did Mercury-Polydor artist Jacky Ward ... Country Music DJ Hall of Famer Joe Allison pioneered Country radio in San Antonio, Memphis, Nashville, and Los Angeles (and broadcast worldwide on Armed Forces Radio every day for over ten years!), produced Roy Clark's first hit records, Willie Nelson and Hank Thompson hits for years, now is in the antique business here "Poke Salad" Charlie Walker's DJ years at KMAC/San Antonio preceded his move to Music City on the wings of "Pick Me Up On Your Way Down"....T. Tommy Cutrer skipped from KNUZ/Houston to KCIJ/Shreveport to WSM/Nashville to WJOS/Jackson; in January he will assume his new position as a Tennessee State Senator ... Bob Neal, Elvis's first manager, came from WMPS/Memphis (he once owned KCIJ/Shreveport) to establish the Bob Neal Agency (now a Wm. Morris office) in Music Valley ... 15-year early morning C&W DJ Bob Jennings is PR head at Acuff-Rose . . . Former WCMS/Norfolk records spinner Tex Davis is a 10-year Nat'l. Promo head of Monument Records' country dept., WMAD/Madison, Wisc.'s Johnny Howard heads 50 States Records here; WIL/St. Louis and WKDA/Nashville DJ-PD Mike Haines now operates Loretta Lynn Western Stores here; Charlie Monk (WUNI/Mobile and WMTS/Murfreesboro) after seven years as director at ASCAP now heads April-Blackwood (CBS's publishing wing) music in Nashville, Tom. T. Hall DJ'ed in Virginia before paying his dues in Nashville; before establishing his giant Bill Hudson P.R.-ad agency here, Bill DJ'ed for Jack Stapp and Pat Boone at WKDA/Nashville; Early Williams, Don Howser, and Johnny "K" Koval paid dues at WENO/Nashville before becomming major domo National Promo guys with Tree Music, Caprice and Con Brio Records ... Pennsylvania Country radio's Dick Shuey now is a talent booker at Atlas Artists-Nashville, and makes records; John Conlee was a Nashville early morning rock DJ before scoring in '78 on ABC Records ... Gene Clark, head of Spotland Studio & Productions here, was a jock at WLAC . . . Ron Huntsman was PD at WKDA-FM before Nat'l. Promo VP for Joe Suilican's (former PD at WMAK) Sound Seventy Productions. Dick Kizer PD'ed at WCAW/Charleston, now promotion at Acuff-Rose; super successful songwriter-publisher-Ironsides Studio head Bob Milsap DJ'ed for years, last at Nashville's WENO: Tom Perryman, a pioneer, logged a lotta airtime at KSIJ/Gladewater and WSM before his 12-year ownership (with Mary Reeves) of WMTS in nearby Murfreesboro; and Mac Sanders's on-the-air background thrust him into Country station ownership, with his flagship station, now WJRB/Nashville. Dave Dudley DJ'ed in Minnesota (and recently WSM) until roadwork took him off-mike; Don Roy, from Albuquerque, Pueblo, and Denver radio & ad agency business, last year moved his D.A.D. (Dealer Advertising Development, Corp.) to Nashville last year. Charlie Proise, former PD-production-airman at WFAA/Dallas, KXOL/Ft. Worth and WACO radio, is VP & production genius at D.A.D.

I'm sure I've missed somebody, but this will make my point. "Old D.J.'s never die, they just move to Nashville."
