America's Largest Radio Convention Announced

Radio & Records and the National Radio Broadcasters Association (NRBA) jointly announced that they will combine their separate conventions to present the largest radio convention and equipment/facility exhibition in history. The event will take place at the Bonaventure Hotel in Los Angeles October 5-8, 1980. Details on the convention's program and registration arrangements will be forthcoming in future issues of R&R.

Sis Kaplan, NRBA President, commented, "We're extremely pleased to be able to announce this new arrangement with the industry's top publication, and delighted to be working with its highly creative staff. The joining of these two important radio-oriented organizations is a very exciting and positive move for radio in the 80's."

R&R Publisher Bob Wilson said. "Radio will be facing many new technological and competitive challenges during the decade to come.

It became clear that a good first step would be for all of us to pull a little closer together to assure that radio survives as a strong, viable medium. Our visions for this first unified convention and expo are quite elaborate. It became obvious that it would take

the efforts of both our organizations to bring such an ambitious plan to fruition."

Wilson also noted that the previously-planned R&R Travelling Conventions would be postponed "so that all our energies can be directed toward October, 1980."

WGNE Rewnewed In Close Call Commission Vote

After a day of oral arguments and a lengthy closed door meeting, the FCC renewed the license of WGNE/Panama City, FL Tuesday (1-22), sources close to the Commission reported. WGNE's owners Fred Lindholm and Don McCoy were under fire for rigging a contest and then deceiving the Commission. A majority of the Commissioners clearly felt it was not worth putting a broadcaster out of business for making a mistake

and then trying to cover up, but apparently the vote was close.

But in the same meeting, FCC Commissioners unanimously voted against KIFM/San Diego and granted the station a shortterm renewal. KIFM, which was KDIG at the time of its trouble in 1974, was under fire for failure to broadcast sufficient news and public affairs. But the real trouble came when the licensee in effect attempted to make up its own "composite week."

How It Happened

In the summer of 1975, WGNE-AM broadcast a contest offering a grand prize of \$1000. When there were two winners back-to-back, former PD Jack Daniels panicked, afraid a third \$1000 winner would put the station over its contest budget, according to WGNE attorney Eric Bernthal of Washington law firm Arent, Fox, Kintner, Plotkin & Kahn. Because the owners were out of town, Daniels rigged the contest so there could be no more \$1000 winners, Bernthal told FCC Commissioners this week.

When the owners returned they immediately ordered an end to the rigging, but did not inform the FCC of any wrongdoing. In January, 1976, a disgruntled former employee blew the whistle and the FCC investigated.

Even when asked by FCC investigators, both owners denied knowledge of a rigged contest. Finally co-owner Lindholm ad-WGNE/ See Page 22

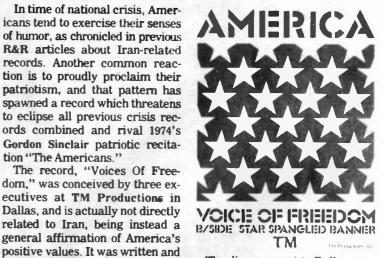
Susquehanna Makes Move In Dallas

al PD post for the chain.

Susquehanna Broadcasting had an active week in Dallas, changing KPLX-FM's format from Pop/ Adult to Country Friday (1-18) and assuming control of KLIF Wednesday (1-23) following completion of its purchase from Fairchild Broadcasting, bringing in Dean Tyler to program the station.

KPLX becomes the eighth Country-formatted station in the Dallas-

Fort Worth market. Herb Allen, PD of Susquehanna's WFMS-FM/ Indianapolis (a Country station) and a consultant in KPLX's changeover, told R&R, "The response was overwhelming in favor of the move. It seemed like the right thing to do in this market, with 24% of the audience listeners of Country music stations." KSCS-FM and WBAP shared 15.8% of the Dallas



The disc was sent to Dallas music stations, with TM explaining its idea and adding that royalties were to be donated to the Red Cross. Reaction was immediate. WBAP/Fort Worth MD Art Davis commented, "The phones are ringing off the walls since we started to play this record. People have been trying to buy it, and as yet only about 3000 copies have been available. It's an absolute smash here.

KNUS/Dallas PD Jim White told R&R, "Reaction has been unusual, sort of delayed. People would hear it and there wouldn't be instant phones lighting up. Generally, it would seem to register hours later. It's been steadily getting requests, but it's not the sort of thing that'll cause someone to run out and call up a radio station. I think it's more of a think plece; it sinks in and once it's assimilated, then they feel it's a real positive statement, and then they'll call." White said that media coverage has been heavy, and that he had been told that the record was selling as well as any single in the market. "It's probably a very good time for sentiments of that sort to be expressed." he concluded.

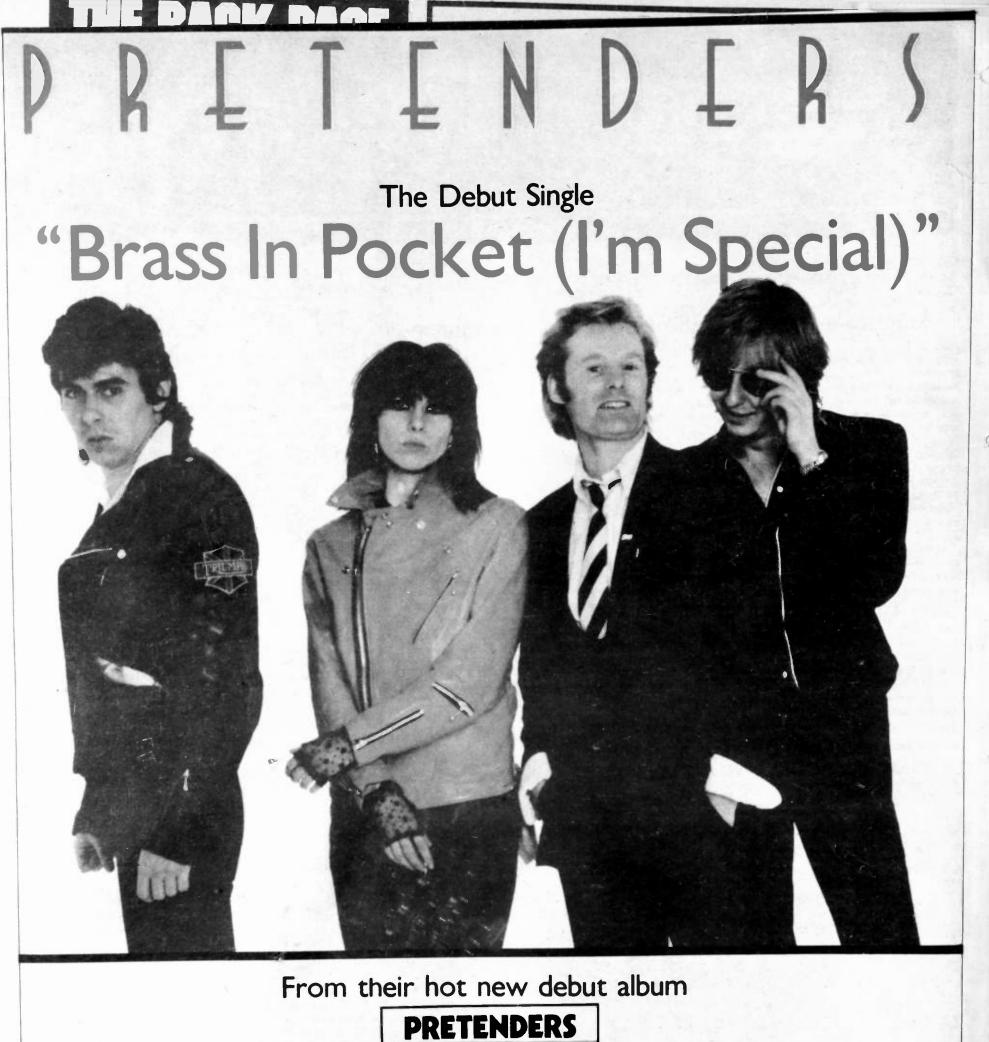

What Happened To Disco? The 3F Factor Did It In!

We recently received a letter from an extremely disappointed and somewhat discouraged Disco radio programmer. In his letter he asks, "What happened to disco and all the support?"

Disco, especially Disco radio as we experienced it, was a fad. Music about and for dancing has been around for years. It hit high points in the days of the big bands, then with the Twist, the Watusi, the Locomotion (twice), and a few years ago, the Hustle.

Throughout history, fads have sprung up, and opportunists can usually be found nearby to cash in on them. It's part of the American capitalistic system.

What was new this time around was that so many radio stations changed to a format exclusively playing this dance-type music. At the same time, record companies unleashed a vast amount of disco product including high-priced, long-playing singles. Another new factor was today's more concentrated media coverage. Fads become overexposed and analyzed faster than ever - every major magazine and TV network covered disco extensively - and then rushed to declare its death at the first signs that upward movement had stalled. Hindsight is always 20/20, and when we look back,

we might wonder where the common sense of these radio programmers went. They were playing mostly unfamiliar music by mostly unfamiliar artists, and in the beginning, extremely long versions of songs. The true mass hits surfaced, as they would have anyway. Disco was always just rock music with a change of emphasis on the beat.

It seems clear now that Robert Stigwood was the person who found the greatest success in disco. He also knew when to get out. What we should all realize now is that fads don't work as radio formats any longer than Nehru jackets or paisley shirts stayed in style.

Had Top 40 and Black radio not fought disco in the beginning and played it for what it was - a popular, closely-related musical form of the day - there probably would never have been a need for a boutique-type radio format. By the way, the "3F Factor" simply means fads fade fast. And for an in-depth analysis of the latest fads read Richard Lutz's column on Page 17.

"Captive" PD To **End Voluntary** Confinement

WOBL/Oberlin, OH PD Scott Miller, who had voluntarily confined himself to the station's studios for as long as the American hostages in Iran would be held captive (R&R 12-21), has decided to terminate his ordeal after 50 days (Monday 1-28). Miller chose the 50-day figure to tie in with the 50 hostages in Iran, among other factors, and told R&R that "inability to complete my work" was the main reason for his decision.

"I'm a wreck. It's been too much for me," Miller said. "Imagine what the hostages must be going through." The catalyst came during Miller's Monday morning (1-21) show when he punched a cart which wasn't properly cued, and then, he admits, covered up the miscue "unpro-fessionally" and proceeded to mangle a newscast intro. "Right then and there I decided I wasn't doing a service to anybody at that point.

Miller told R&R he feels he's now entering "phase 2" of his campaign to draw sympathy for the hostages. "I'm in a position to physically help now," he says. He has a number of speaking engagements lined up, following substantial national publicity on his gesture, and is hoping to arrange a meeting with President Carter to make a presentation of his activities. He has also just recorded a single called "Stand Up For The Flag Of America," and plans to donate the royalties to the hostages' families or the Red Cross.

Kendall Returns To AOR As WMMR PD

Charlie Kendall has returned to AOR radio as Program Director for WMMR/Philadelphia. Kendall, who assumed the station's programming duties Monday (1-21), most recently served as Operations Manager of Dancemusic-formatted WIKS/Indianapolis. Previously, he had been PD at WBCN/Boston as well as having held the MD post at KWST/Los Angeles.

"It's good to be back in the real world. I missed rock 'n' roll and AOR radio," Kendall told R&R, adding that the differences between programming free-form WBCN and tightly structured WMMR were minimal: "The methods were

Calling the future of small business participation in the media bleak, Rep. agencies, was in general agreement about the dwindling number of newspapers and book publishers, it was felt that concentration of radio holdings is not a serious problem

Washington Street Talk

President Carter at the National Association of Religious Broadcasters convention in Washington Monday night (1-21), talked more about religion than broadcasting. Concurrently, organized religion is continuing to flood the FCC with opposition to radio deregulation.

Meanwhile, meeting in Palm Springs this week, the full NAB Board discussed how to counter the religious assault.

Don Thurston, NAB's dedicated past Board Chairman, was named recipient of that association's highest honor: the Distinguished Service Award, to be presented at April's convention in Las Vegas.

Two of the more interesting races for seats on the NAB Board are Charlie Murdock of WLW/Cincinnati challenging incumbent Cullie Tarleton of WBT/Charlotte, and Dean Sorenson of KCCR/Pierre, SD challenging incumbent J.T. Whitlock of WLBN/Lebanon, KY.

Stations' Fines Reduced

WCIR-AM-FM/Beckley, WV was fined \$3200 on May 31, 1978 for letting an improperly licensed operator run the stations, failing to log transmitter inspections, failing to make EBS tests, and operating with excessive power. WCIR admitted the violations in part, saying the operator really had a license, but just forgot to renew it. The station added that the logging omissions were just an oversight.

WCIR's fine was reduced last week because it proved station inspections were made in 1977 or explanations logged. But the FCC emphasized the station could not be excused for failing to run EBS tests.

Saying it was no less guilty, but stressing its financial condition, the Commission reduced to \$350 WKYO-WIDL/Caro, MI's fine of \$1000 (July 1978) for broadcasting a lottery.

Two NY Stations Conditionally Renewed; **One Goes Dark** WSAY/Rochester, NY and WNIA/ Cheektowaga, NY received condi-

tional renewals for six months, and WNIA has ceased operations pending its sale. Both stations were owned by Gordon Brown. They had been cleared in an initial decision after being designated for hearings, with the licensee's character as a central issue. Later, four community groups succeeded in reopening the case.

But because Brown died a year ago, the Commission now says his estate can operate WSAY for six months on the condition a qualified buyer is found for the stations. However, the estate indicated operating two stations was too much of a burden and got approval to let WNIA go silent.

Will FCC Approve **AM Stereo?**

Manufacturers In Knock-Down, **Drag-Out Battle**

Strong rumors persist that the FCC's Broadcast Bureau favors AM stereo and is awaiting final engineering data before making a recommendation as to which of the five systems FCC commissioners should adopt. The five

proposed systems are Belar, Harris, Kahn/Hazeltine, Magnavox, and Motorola. FCC Chairman Charles Ferris has hinted at a springtime decision

Sensing the drama, system developers have been engaging in activity behind the scenes and at the FCC. On Monday (1-21) Motorola informed FCC Secretary Bill Tricarico, "We have discovered erroneous premises and conclusions in the Harris filing which are significant, and it is essential that Motorola be given the opportunity to call these matters to the Commission's attention.

Ignoring the FCC's August 3, 1979 deadline for reply comments, manufacturers continue to deliver mounds of paper to the Commission. Two weeks ago, Harris's attorney, Lou Frey (former House **Communications Subcommittee** member), asked the FCC to accept its over 50 pages of news comments and appendices and close the door on AM stereo comments.

Harris's Allegations

Harris maintains that

WDEN Renewed

Subject to periodic EEO reporting, the FCC reported this week it's renewing the license of WDEN/ Macon, GA. The Commission last fall said WDEN did not employ enough blacks, but a recent report submitted by the station showed

. very nearly equal to that of some FM systems. The Kahn system was transparent enough that quality differences between newer and older carts were evident.

'Music selections containing string instruments, fuzz boxes, and synthesizers were listened to with great attention since distortion could be more audible in those sections. Evidence of audible distortion was not apparent," according to WABC.

Radio Getting Active

A number of letters (ex parte contacts) written to individual commissioners during the past month have urged speedy approval of AM stereo. Here is a sample of what broadcasters are saying:

Tim Grant, GM, KOLO/Reno, NV: This station is AM only; we have little chance to secure a companion FM station. It seems highly inequitable for us to have full capability of filling a public need for improved AM service, but not have the necessary FCC approval.

· Ron Kazda, Chief Engineer, WHBY/Appleton, WI: Looking at 9 kHz channel spacing and AM stereo, we feel action should be taken on AM stereo first. Several years of study and testing have gone into AM stereo, and a decision should be made.

 Jim Ranger, GM, KUHL/Santa Maria, CA: Entertainment sound today is stereo, and the general public is leaning very heavily in favor of stereo sound. It's time for AM to have that added "sizzle."

· Bob Schaffer, Chief Engineer, KFIZ/Fond du Lac, WI: I would hope that the Broadcast Bureau would complete their work quickly. Broadcasters want AM stereo now

In a similar case, the Commission also designated Radio WAVS, Inc. for a hearing. The issue is whether Radio WAVS, licensee for WAVS/Ft. Lauderdale, FL. prematurely transferred control of the station to Gore Broadcasting without FCC approval and then tried to cover up the illegal transfer.

Commission Agrees, Gives KXIV A Sister

KXIV/Phoenix has won out over American International Development (AID) and Herbert Owens in competing applications for a new FM station. FCC Review Board Judge Walter Miller found Owens's application unacceptable, saying he "demonstrated such a' detachment and indifference in preparing his application that he would not fulfill his obligation as a public trustee."

About AID, Miller said one of the principals, Julia Zozaya, who is legally blind, lied to the Commission when she claimed she signed a loan commitment letter included in her application The only issue against KXIV, Inc., which owns KXIV/Phoenix, was whether the applicant exaggerated KXIV's rating for news and public affairs. Judge Miller said KXIV was ranked second in public affairs, not first as had been represented, but added the misrepresentation was an honest mistake.

Journal Star Gets KRKE

The FCC has okayed sale of KRKE-AM-FM/Albuquerque for \$4.5 million to the Journal Star Stations, owners of eight other Midwest properties. The seller was Gaylord Broadcasting, which owns seven TV and three radio operations.

Multimedia Buys WVEZ-FM

Multimedia has purchased WVEZ-FM/Louisville for \$1.5 million from Stoner Broadcasting of Des Moines. Multimedia will also exchange its two Knoxville stations, WBIR-AM-FM, as part of the deal. Multimedia already owns WAKY/Louisville, and WAKY VP/GM George R. Francis, Jr. will also manage WVEZ.

Fraudulent Billing—A Refresher Course

Maintaining correct billing practices is vitally important for radio stations. Licenses have been lost over what the FCC considers fraudulent billing, and the Commission has carefully set down guidelines for acceptable procedures. Noted broadcast lawyer and R&R consultant Jason Shrinsky outlines the FCC's standards and points out the pitfalls of double billing and other dangerous practices in the following article, a highly useful guide for radio licensees.

While Chairman Ferris and other members of the Federal Communications Commission have taken a less than enthusiastic regulatory approach to fraudulent billing practices, the United States District Court for the District of Columbia in a recent decision has admonished the Commission to "beef up" its enforcement of the fraudulent billing rules, including criminal prosecution of the individuals judged guilty. In light of the court's edict this appears to be an appropriate time for a refresher course on "double billing" and related practices.

The courts and the Commission have characterized fraudulent billing as "an extremely invidious and totally unacceptable practice" that raises serious questions as to a broadcast licensee's qualifications to hold a broadcast licensee. The court perceives "double billing" as a scheme to deceive manufacturers into paying a larger share of a local advertiser's cooperative advertising than provided for in advertising commitments with the manufacturer. Consequently, each broadcaster should take the time to read the following fraudulent billing rule:

"(a) No licensee of a standard, FM, or television broadcast station shall knowingly issue or knowingly cause to be issued to any local, regional or national advertiser, advertising agency, station representative, manufacturer,

distributor, jobber, or any other party, any bill, invoice, affidavit or other document which contains false information concerning the amount actually charged by the licensee for the broadcast advertising for which such bill, invoice, affidavit or other document is issued, or which misrepresents the nature of content of such advertising, or which misrepresents the quantity of advertising actually broadcast (number of length of advertising messages), or which substantially and/or materially misrepresents the time of day at which it was broadcast, or which misrepresents the date on which it was broadcast.

"(b) Where a licensee and any program supplier have entered into a contract or other agreement obligating the licensee to supply any document providing specified information concerning the broadcast of the program or program matter supplied, including non-commercial matter, the licensee shall not knowingly issue such a document containing information required by the contract or agreement that is false.

'(c) A licensee shall be deemed to have violated this section if it fails to exercise reasonable diligence to see that its agents and employees do not issue documents containing the false information specified in (a) and (b) above."

Don't Forget The Forms

In 1975, the FCC issued a further Public Notice reminding licensees of their responsibility to maintain the integrity of station billing practices - accuracy of station bills, affidavits, invoices, etc. The Public Notice also reminded all broadcast licensees that the only acceptable practice for billing was to use program logs rather than startorders, advertising contracts, etc. Consequently, any station that is presently using advertising contracts, start-orders, and discrepancy sheets, and is not using program logs to generate bills might well be challenged by the FCC for using fraudulent documentation to determine with accuracy the time, duration, date, and content of the advertising broadcast.

For decades, many stations have cavalierly treated the completion of network forms and affidavits. The Commission has repeatedly reminded broadcasters that the fraudulent billing rule has been revised to prohibit the practice of stations supplying a network or program syndicator with documentation containing false information concerning the broadcast of programs, commercial announcements, public service announcements, and non-commercial broadcast matter. Moreover, broadcasters have been warned by the Commission that the traditional "I had no knowledge of the practice, it was my General Manager/Sales Manager employee that was involved, and the practice is contrary to station policy" excuse is no longer acceptable.

One of the questionable areas concerns year-end rebates, vacation packages, volume discounts to advertisers, and general merchandising bonus plans. In 1976, the Commission issued a Public Notice that painstakingly pointed out that sales incentive plans required appropriate disclosure on station billings, invoices, or affidavits. In order to remove any ambiguity as to its policy, the Commission pointed out the following examples:

1. An advertiser or advertising agency qualifies for a special vacation package by purchasing \$1000 worth of airtime.

2. Rather than a special vacation package, the advertiser is to receive a color television set or a new automobile.

The Commission insists that in each of the above examples, a specific mention must be included in each billing calling attention to the "bonus" or "special consideration" provided the advertiser. Possible "catch-all" notations might be:

1. This statement does not include discount or merchandising bonuses which the advertiser may be entitled to as a result of frequency purchases.

2. This statement is subject to a frequency discount if earned.

3. This statement is subject to a frequency discount, merchandising bonus, or special consideration bonus earned.

With the January and February special merchandising package season soon to be upon us, Radio & Records suggests that station executives check with counsel to insure the proper procedures for logging, billing and general handling of the traditional trips to Europe, Hawaii and the Orient.

Remember – "Preventives are far better than remedies."

Arista, Pickwick Pen Formal Indie Distribution Pact

Arista Records and Pickwick International have announced the signing of a two-year formal distribution pact, which will expire December 31, 1981. Under the terms of this agreement, Pickwick agrees to distribute Arista product in specific markets presently held in exchange for the label's promise to continue to provide Pickwick with its product for the duration of the pact. The contract is automatically renewable unless terminated by written notice from either party six months prior to expiration dates.

Arista noted that the Pickwick pact would not affect the remainder of its distributors, but added that it plans to institute similar agreements with each of them. For this reason, the move is viewed as likely to set a precedent for the future label-independent distributor relations.



Metromedia Radio Mounts Major Ad Effort

Metromedia Radio. owners of 13 stations in nine major markets, will be conducting an ad campaign in the near future stressing its stations' involvement with the communities that they serve. The ads, the first of which is reproduced above, will appear in leading business, news, and trade publications such as Time, Newsweek, and U.S. News & World Report.



California Milk Radio Ad Budget Up 11% For '80

The California Milk Advisory Board has announced a \$10 million-plus annual advertising budget for 1980. CMAB Advertising Director Cal Krandall cited inflation as the central factor behind the budgetary increase (the CMAB budget for 1974 was \$5.4 million) with radio scheduled for a 31 percent increase in advertising from 1979, most of which will come from extensive co-op tie-ins.

Vintage Radio Shows Preserved

Nearly 400 "Screen Guild Theater" broadcasts, originally aired from 1939 to 1952 over major radio networks, were recently donated to the UCLA Radio Archives library by the Motion Picture and Television Fund. The UCLA Radio Archives currently house more than 10,000 programs on both tape and original transcription discs. Three projects are presently in the development stage, at least one of which will be shot in the U.S. Curbishley Baird Enterprise Ltd. is headed by Curbishley, Baird, and Gideon Thomson and will be based in London.

Latest Developments In Headphone Design

Whereas ten years ago most headphones not only looked but also sounded very similar, today's headphones vary widely in their construction, appearance, and sound quality. For ex-

ample, enclosures (those parts of the headphone which surround or rest on the ear) are now either sealed, semisealed or open-air. Sealed enclosures, which fit snugly around the ear, pro-

vide the utmost in listening privacy and improved bass-frequency response. However, they produce an intensity of sound which can become tiring over a period of time. The semisealed models *rest* on the ear and may have slots or vents which "leak" sound to eliminate some of the claustrophobic feeling. An open-air design generally does not enclose the ear at all, allowing still more outside sound to infiltrate as well as escape. The main advantage of open-air phones is their lighter weight.

Perhaps the most important advance in headphone technology is the type of drivers (sound-producing elements) used. They are usually either moving-coil (magnetic) or electrostatic. Moving-coil types use a coil suspended in the field of a permanent magnet. Samarium-cobalt, a new type of material used by both Sennheiser Electronic Corp. and Pickering, now allows the construction of higher-strength, lighter-weight magnets. The Technics "EAH-810," "820" and "830" feature a linear drive technology, employing a flat, aluminumcoil pattern photo-etched on film positioned between flat magnets. An audio signal causes this coil and film to radiate sound uniformly through holes in the magnets. One disadvan-



tage of this process is a greater than necessary intensity of sound. Electrostatic Drivers

Decrease Distortion Electrostatic drivers tend to decrease this difficulty by using an extremely lightweight film or diaphragm, subsequently increasing its mobility and providing a more uniform, lowdistortion sound. These electret diaphragms use fewer components, simplifying headphone design and decreasing costs. In addition, Koss's "ESP/10" and Audio Technica's "ATH-7" include adapters which connect to your amp terminals, thereby boosting voltage to the drivers. Furthermore, wireless models now available from Sennheiser and Beyer provide the listener with increased mobility as well as allowing more background noise to penetrate. With these recent developments, stereo headphones are now as varied as the music that's enjoyed through them.

Media (broadcasting and publishing) was the leading U.S. industry group for profitability over the past five years, according to the annual study published by Forbes magazine. Between 1975-79, media firms' annual profits averaged 19.6 percent of equity - the amount invested by shareholders — compared to 17 percent for oil companies. During the same period, yearly profits for media corporations averaged 15.4 percent of their total capital - equity plus longterm debt — as opposed to the oil firms' 11.9 percent.

Furthermore, over the last 12 months of available statistics, media firms averaged a 20.2 percent return on equity, while oil firms registered 22.5 percent — tops for the time period. However, this gain was inflated by soaring profits generated by small, mostly domestic gas and oil firms, as the leading oil companies lagged behind the major media firms even for this period. As for return on total capital for this time period, the oil firms trailed the media industry 14.1 percent to 16.7 percent.

Last month we wrote about how vital it is that broadcasters visit the Laurel, Maryland headquarters of Arbitron after each survey. The purpose for such a visit is to review the diaries used in processing the local radio market report for your metro. This is the one way you can be sure if the numbers in your book are correct and not influenced by any Arbitron processing errors. Now that the books are coming out, it is timely to discuss what you can mine in the way of sales and programming nuggets when you get to look at the diaries for your market.

Sales Payoffs

Because it will cost you some dollars to visit Laurel and to obtain a mechanical diary, it's important to the GM or sales department that a diary review session have some sales-oriented payoffs. Rest assured that there are many insights that will come from the diary review that will be helpful to your revenue effort. One major example is that you can glean verbatim diary respondent comperhaps you can find which zips (get at least a twobook trend) seem to be strongest for you in terms of returned diaries from your target demos. You can concentrate your sales effort on retailers in these key areas, and you make better use of your advertising/promotion budget if you zero in on specific geographic zip clusters.

Programming Lode

Programmers will find that a diary review will produce a mother lode of useful information. Among the vital items you can pull out of the diaries are:

Audience Sharing (with which station do you share listening, and when)

Audience Flow (where do your listeners come from and where do they go when they tune out)

Daily Tune-in (in your target demos, what is the heaviest day for respondent tune-in, and does the listener stay with you for another day)

ments from the diaries. Often these comments will focus on a particular personality or feature being aired by your station. Your sales staff may be able to put together a sales piece touting the show, using the diary quotes as a testimonial.

Another example is that you can note if your station is sharing audience with a station similarly formatted. You might be able to convince media buyers that they need to purchase your station because it does not share audience with the station they were going to buy.

Zip code information can be derived which can be helpful in marketing your station. If your station is at a signal disadvantage in the metro, allow you to track movement from survey-to-survey within a particular cell — help you spot undesirable trends in demographic composition before they become serious)

Station Identifiers (you can note which slogan, if any, is recorded by respondents — also can spot aberrated sets of call letters, which may mean the audience is having a hard time with your calls)

An interesting note here. Contrary to the popular feeling of many air personalities, very few (less than 1% of respondents) write in DJ's names. Only John Gambling of WOR and Dick Purtan of CKLW have continued to show well in markets which I've examined.

Q&A

Bob Ferguson, Research Director of WLAC/Nashville, called with this question: "In going to Laurel for a diary review, what should I take to best prepare for the task?"

Be sure to have a mechanical diary ordered so that you can verify the diary entries. Also be sure to take copies of the pre-survey facility form paperwork you sent in to Arbitron, and any correspondence covering flip requests made prior to the start of the relevant survey. The forms and correspondence may help clear up any dispute about whether or not you supplied to Arbitron the proper information on which it could base the editing decisions.

If, for example, your station carries Paul Harvey, but an entry to Paul Harvey is not credited to your station, show Penny Giddens the paperwork you sent in which shows that you carry Paul Harvey. Penny will see that the situation is noted and the appropriate steps taken to see that it doesn't recur. If the problem is a really serious one, ask Penny to introduce you to Lynn Christian of the Radio department, who may be able to discuss a remedy to the situation you discover.

Week In Review

Maddy Schreiber Joins Arbitron

Maddy Schreiber, VP of Research for Torbet Radio Rep, will soon be joining Arbitron's Advertiser/Agency sales division. Ms. Schreiber will hold the title of Manager. Radio Representative/Network Sales, and will work out of the New York Arbitron office.

Birch Report Expands, Adds Three Markets

Radio Marketing Research, the Miami-based firm headed by Tom Birch, tells R&R that the firm has now added Baltimore, Nashville, and Memphis to the list of markets served by the monthly audience measurement service. Birch Report is now received in a total of 12 markets. Birch tells R&R his service is used mainly for programming purposes, but is getting some limited agency usage.

Ed Christian Named To Broadcast Rating Council

Ed Christian, VP/GM of WWKR/WNIC/ Detroit, has been named to join the membership of the Radio Committee of the Broadcast Rating Council. Christian is currently the Chairman of Arbitron's Radio Advisory Council, and is the first Advisory Council member named to participate with the BRC, the organization which audits the procedures of Arbitron and other ratings firms.

The Past Is Prologue

On the Archives Building in Washington, D.C. there is a motto which reads "The past is prologue, study the past." This saying really points up why stations need to make the trek to Laurel to wade through hundreds of diaries. The past what took place in the recent Arbitron sweep in your market — may really be trying to tell you something with regard to the future health and success of your station.

The choice is yours. For a few dollars you can obtain all sorts of worthwhile sales and programming information, not to mention the in-depth reading of the market you get when you actually hold in your hands those diaries. Such data should not be ignored. Or you may believe differently and feel that the book is all that really matters, so who needs to go to Laurel? You may be okay for a while, but you may actually be flying blind and not know it until too late.

As they say on TV, you can pay now ... or you can pay later!

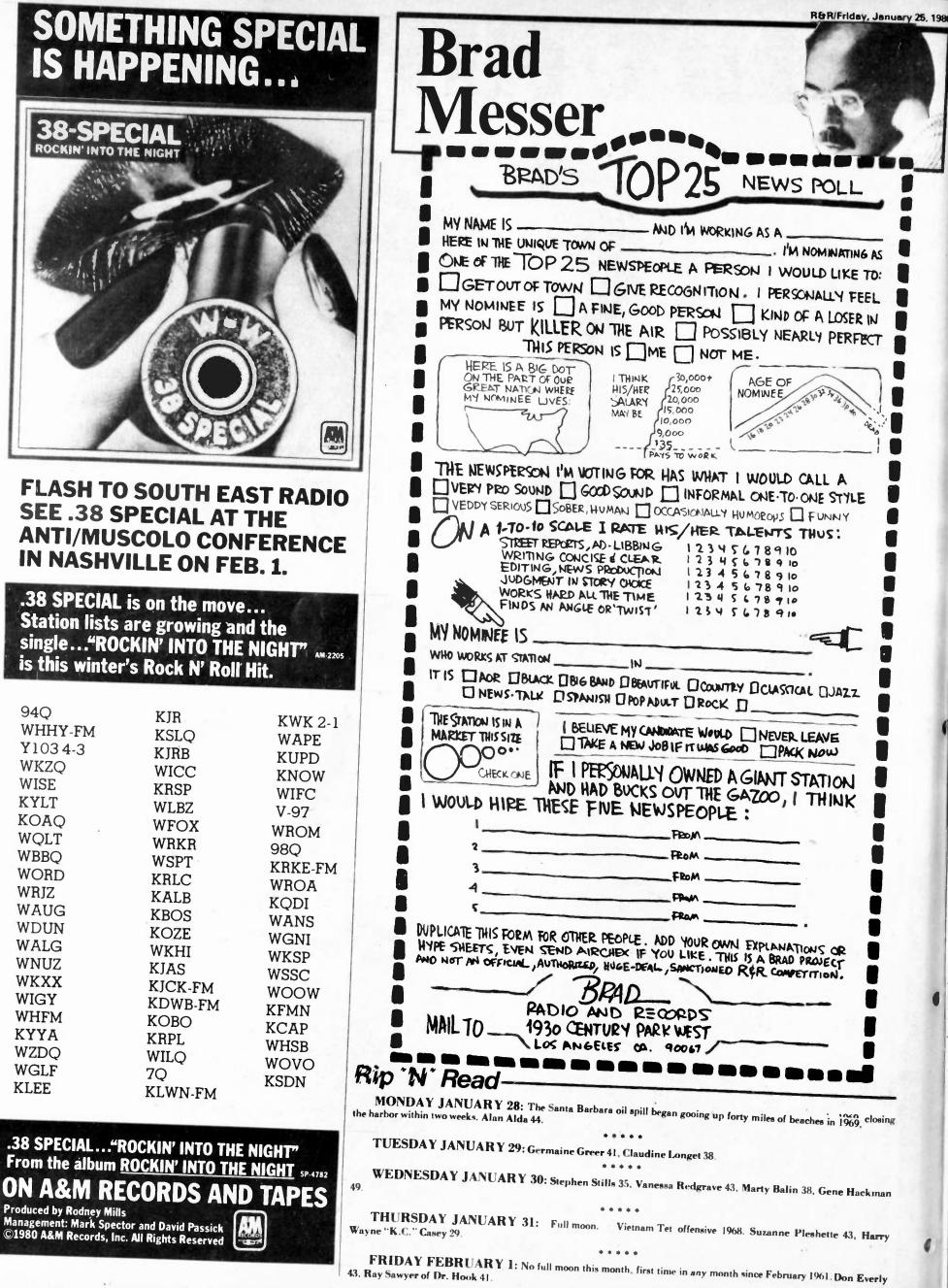

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Big Band Aid?

A recent segment of the ABC news program "20/20" reported on the current revival of the big band sound. With disco on the wane, many clubs are apparently turning to the mellow rhythms of the 1930's and 40's to attract their dancing patrons. According to the report, the switch in clubs' formats has been a resounding success, with young people flocking into the clubs with almost as much gusto as that which accompanied the disco phenomenon. Many other disco clubs, of course, have been switching to a "danceable rock" music format with successful results.

The ABC report went on to say that in response to the renewed interest in the big band sound, many radio stations around the U.S. are converting their formats into Big Band. Whatever the accuracy of this supposition, the idea can serve as a valuable illustration and hypothetical example.

Let's say Big Band was thought to be the coming format. Maybe if it were called Disco II, the basic problem would be a little easier to bring into focus. It seems that some radio stations are still seeking the "Holy Grail" after all — searching for that ultimate format which will bring them the Big Numbers. Unfortunately, Big Band would no more be the answer to their search than was Disco.

To format a radio station Big Band is to fall into the trap which everyone in radio should have learned about from the Disco experience: what plays in the club will not necessarily play on the radio. Disco is not failing as a radio

undoubtedly carve out a small niche and remain profitable — just as some Disco stations are alive and well today. But most stations which are converting to Big Band now will need a big band aid by this time next year — there will simply not be enough demand for Big Band radio to sustain these stations at a profitable level.

Clubs vs. Radio

The disco movement got people up out of their seats and back onto the dance floor, tapping into a latent need in U.S. society. Not since the early sixties did we have such a wealth of dance steps with names! (Do the Locomotion with me in my Mashed Potatoes!) Dancing once again caught the imagination of America's youth, and disco became a phenomenon.

Oddly, Top 40 radio seemingly forgot its basic dictum — "Play the Hits" — and ignored disco music to a large degree, giving rise to the emergence of the Disco format, a format too narrowly defined to be a viable long-run factor in most markets. About this time last year I predicted the demise of Disco radio on the basis of its lack of variety. Variety-seeking is a basic human activity, and the entertainment industry is inherently a variety supplier.

When someone goes to a disco club, variety is provided via many channels — not just by the music. There are many different dance steps, a variety of drinks, multi-colored lights, and of course, the fantastic array of the dancers themselves, their clothing, their faces, bodies, and scents (some would say odors). In short, the

format because of the rather odd hostility directed at disco music by various members of the music industry, but rather because the experience of going to a club to dance is dramatically different from the situations in which most people listen to the radio most of the time. One disco tune after another may work quite well in a club setting where people come to dance and strut their latest disco moves; the same may be true for big band music. But a steady diet of disco or big band on the radio is, in a word, boring for most listeners.

believe that it is one of the responsibilities of contemporary radio to keep itself and its listeners up to date. To that extent, if big band should ever become what's happening, then it should be reflected to at least some degree in the station's playlist. But to convert to an exclusive reliance on the big band sound is an extremely risky move. Not that all Big Band-formatted stations will necessarily fail; some will club offers a great deal of variety which serves to mask the lack of variety in the music itself. All of these other sources of variety are missing when one is sitting at home listening to Disco radio — thus, a radio must provide that variety itself.

Apparently the clientele of disco clubs has finally tired somewhat of disco even in the club setting, and is eagerly seeking the "variety" of a "new" form of music to which to dance. Did all these people suddenly decide to hate disco and fall in love with big band music? Or are there entirely new groups of people being attracted to big band clubs than had been frequenting disco clubs? While the answer to these two questions may be "yes" in part, I would wager that it is predominantly "no." The same people who were dancing to disco are now dancing to big bands (or "danceable rock") and to disco, if it's still available.

Thus, the re-emerging popularity of big band music offers both club owners and Dancemusic radio programmers a significant oppor-

tunity to provide even greater variety and entertainment to their respective audiences. Clubs that offer a "mix" of disco and big band music should find a receptive audience among their clientele, who simply like to dance. (Remember the good old days when rock bands would always mix in a few ballads so you could get up close and personal?)

Implications For Radio

hat does all this mean for radio? Well, what it doesn't mean is that Big Band is the Format of the Future. It may be the Fad for February, but don't expect it to be around for long. There is little reason to believe that the big band sound will fare any better as a radio format than Disco has. In fact, a more viable format possibility might be, as suggested by R&R's own section, Dancemusic Radio. Thus, a Disco station with sagging numbers might do well to mix in some big band music if that catches on in the local clubs. By broadening the playlist to include big band and disco, you would be positioning yourself more strongly as The Station That Plays The Music People Dance To (although I'm still not entirely convinced in the viability of a radio format based exclusively on dance music).

Top 40 stations should keep their collective ear to the ground in order to make sure that they don't repeat their disco mistake and ignore any big band tunes that become current hits. And don't say it can't happen — just check the sales numbers, or better yet, feast your ears, on Willie Nelson's "Stardust" album.

A Word On Strategy

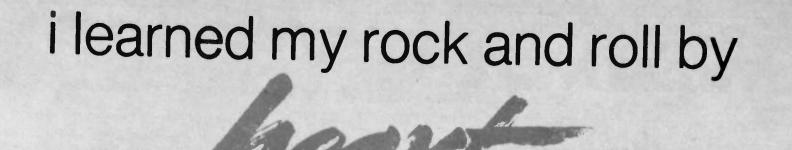
N ow, you may ask, what is the real danger in switching to a Big Band format after all, it does appear to be an emerging fad and may yield a couple of good books. The real dangers are twofold, one short-run and one longrun.

In the short-run, if you convert to Big Band and do manage to enjoy some short-run success, you probably won't get back out soon enough. You'll take a beating on at least one book before you realize that "Disco II" is over for your market. Can you afford that risk, when you know, almost as a certainty, that big band is not back to stay?

he more serious danger is the long-run one. As long as you are constantly switching formats in order to keep up with the latest fad, your station will not be building any consistent identity in the market or establishing a stable listening audience. This creates the potential for excessive fluctuation in your audience size and composition from book to book, all of which act together to make your station a very risky media buy for potential advertisers. When your audience is varying dramatically, both quantitatively and qualitatively, an advertiser's dollars may be wasted on your station. Therefore, from an overall station marketing perspective, it is much better to establish a well-defined position in the market with respect to the size and composition of the audience you can reach. This is best accomplished by deciding upon a basic format type and programming within that format in as sound a manner as is possible. Disco, Big Band, or other "fad" formats are not the long-run answer.

The other day, while eschewing my memorabilia (without anyone looking on) I came across a book titled "The Lazlo Letters." On the second page was an inscription: "Dear Gary, as a fellow answerer to Gordon Sinclair's 'The Americans,' I have one request. How about playing, 'The Americans,' a 'European Speaks Up For The U.S.' and 'The Burbankians' one after another . . . Just what America needs . . . answers. Signed, Lazlo."

Initially, "The Burbankians" was a satire on my radio show that I recorded, paying homage to the wonderful people of Burbank and how during the floods on the Yangstse River they were the first people to come to the aid of the starving and ravaged victims by sending them boxes of soaky toys. (I also received several death threats from listeners who didn't understand the humor of the piece)

Lazlo Toth is the pseudonym for one of "Saturday Night Live"'s funniest folks, Don Novello. Don is perhaps better known as Father Guido Sarducci. His book was one of the greatest bits of whimsy since early S.J. Perelman. It contains scads of put-on letters and their replies. He sent a letter to the Personnel Director of J. Walter Thompson Advertising stating that he had been reading about their wonderful company in the newspapers and would like to apply for employment. "Although I have never worked in advertising I have many of the same traits (art is my business, tape recorder knowledge, etc.)." Lazlo told them he could work in any country where they needed him but not Yugoslavia, Turkey, India, or the Balkans. He

asked them, "Do you still do the advertising for Listerine?" and moving expenses, who pays?

He closes his put-on letter by saying "God Bless Richard M. Nixon (the best!) P.S. I have many ideas ready to go ... Sincerely, Lazlo Toth."

Because I happen to be headquartered in Hollywood there isn't a week that zooms by without someone in that category wanting to break in . . . which is fine, but they usually want to do so by magic. Without proper training, and even though they are 57 years old and have been a plumber most of their life they feel they can do voices as good as Daws Butler or Mel Blanc.

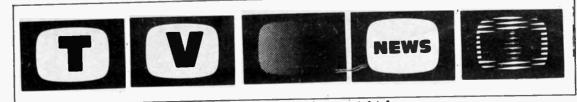

CBS Bowls Over Competition

There's nothing like a Super Bowl to add that extra ounce of ratings muscle, and CBS gamered the benefits to emerge victorious once again for the Niaisen week ending January 20. The Pittsburgh-Los Angeles showdown, which overlapped into prime time Sunday in most of the country, picked up a 46.3 rating, 13 points above the highest rated series ("60 Minutes"), and registered an 84% share in L.A. (admittedly a city with a stronger-than-usual interest in the outcome). The postgame show finished second for the week, and CBS, despite ABC's locking up half the top 20, won handily with a 22.5 average rating. ABC had a 20.2, while NBC was a distant third with 16.2.

Following the two football programs, the top ten went in this order: 3) "60 Minutes" (CBS) 4) "Three's Company" (ABC) 5) "MASH" (CBS) 6) "Taxi" (ABC) 7) "Fantasy Island" (ABC) 8) "Dallas" (CBS) 9) "Love Boat" (ABC), and 10) "Dukes Of Hazzard" (CBS). The second ten: 11) "Hart To Hart" (ABC) 12) "Little House On The Prairie" (NBC) 13) "House Calls" (CBS), benefitting from its "MASH" lead-in, the old "WKRP" soft spot (while "WKRP" is having trouble making the top 20 in its new slot) 14) "Soap" (ABC) 15) a tie between two ABC shows, "Barney Miller" and "Eight Is Enough" 17) another tie between "Real People" (NBC) and "If Things Were Different" (CBS TV movie) 19) "Mork & Mindy" (ABC), and 20) "Benson" (ABC).

MUSIC ON TV — The Operation Prime Time "network," a link-up of over 100 independent TV stations which staged the successful presentation of "The Bastard" last year, is presenting a music special called "Solid Gold '79." The show, produced by Bob Banner Associates, salutes the top 50 hits of 1979 and is hosted by Glen Campbell and Dionne Warwick. Performers include Rod Stewart, Supertramp, Blondle, the Viliage People, the Commodores, Sister Siedge, John Stewart, Peaches & Herb, Maxine Nightingale, and George Benson, plus a few TV stars to boot . . . Toni Tennilie, who substituted for Cher as cohost of the "American Music Awards" at the last minute, will get her on-andoff talk show over NBC's O&O stations in the fall of 1980. It's being produced in both 60 and 90-minute versions at this point . . . Johnny Paycheck and Mickey Gilley are on PBS's "Soundstage" February 5 . . . Mei Tillis has filmed a pilot for syndication by Osmond TV . . . And former KYA/San Francisco air personality Tom Campbell, now more well known on the West Coast for his omnipresent stereo commercials, will become well known nationally as host of a new Chuck Barris game show on CBS, "Camouflage."

VIDEOSCOPE:

BASF OPENS U.S. LVR-PLANT; PLANS MID-YEAR MARKET INTRODUCTION: BASF recently completed ribbon-cutting ceremonies at its Fountain Valley, CA facility, which was built to manufacture LVR's (longitudinal video recorders) for the consumer market. Initial units are expected to be available by mid-1980, retailing for about the cost of a color TV set. If all goes according to BASF's plans, the LVR could play havoc with RCA's "SelectaVision" and MCA/IBM's "DiscoVision" as well as VCR home distributors. One reason is that LVR recording technology is more advanced than the helical-scan system employed by the Beta and VHS formats, enabling the LVR's to be built lighter and cheaper as well as reducing the price of prerecorded software (possibly as low as videodiscs). While Toshiba also has an LVR system in the works, it is thought to be trailing BASF in development ... MAKING THE 80'S WORK

The Budget Crunch

To say times are economically uncertain is to state the obvious. The record industry has collectively moved its belt to the tightest possible notch and we've chronicled the staff cuts, roster trimmings, and extinctions. But what about radio? Are times looking bad for Dradcasters too?

Traditionally, we've been told that advertising revenue remains fairly strong during times of economic uncertainty because business must unload its bulging inventories. But we know for certain that the first quarter is without exception the "softest" time for radio revenues. Couple that fact with the continued inflationary pressures we're all facing in 1980 and you come up with a situation that may bring programming and sales departments closer together in radio stations all across America.

No-Cost Promotion

Jeff King is the Program Director of KSEL/Lubbock, TX. Lubbock is ranked 142 in metro population and has 13 radio stations with enough listeners to have their call letters listed in the annual Spring ARB. Jeff had planned to spend about \$40,000 in his spring promotional budget this year, but as the year-end 1979 sales figures were tallied at KSEL, that \$40,000 figure became increasingly difficult to justify. Finally, last week, Jeff's General Manager made the decision that KSEL, although enjoying very strong ratings, was not in a strong enough economic position to spend that kind of money just for promotion.

What did Jeff do? If you think he put all his proposals on paper in hopes that his logical presentation would change the GM's mind, you're wrong. Jeff knew that the GM wasn't chopping his programming/promotional budget as a quick way to save some cash. Jeff knew that the cutback was necessary. As he told me, "It may not be the best of all possible

situations to have your promotional budget pulled out from under you, but I'm the type of person that reacts to that as a real challenge. Meeting the challenge meant getting together with our sales manager and trying to come up with promotional ideas that would not only give me something to promote on the air, but put some more dollars into our sagging sales coffers.

"We borrowed an idea that I first heard about when it was done at KZEW/Dallas. They called it 'Zoo World' and it was simply a weekend event held in a large arena. The station's clients were sold packages of commercials and part of the package deal allowed them to set up product display booths at the station event. We designed the same thing for use here in Lubbock and sold clients 90-day schedules. The event, which we haven't named yet, will be scheduled in the middle of the second month of the time-buy and it will involve hundreds of booths and demonstrations. We have savings and loans coming to show people how to save money, stereo stores with sound booths and listening rooms, clothing shops with fashion shows; you name it, they've been contacted for involvement.

"This type of promotion gives me something to promote on the air that pertains to the listeners and, obviously, brings revenue into the station that might not have ordinarily been present during the first quarter. The ad dollars more than cover our participation in renting the arena and printing some posters, and the on-air promotion makes the thing happen. I think it's a great promotion for the station from both a sales and programming standpoint."

Meeting The Challenge

Jeff took a positive attitude to a potentially negative situation, and that is not always the easiest thing to do. Granted, Jeff's secondary market situation might not equate to what happens in a major market, but the secondary and smaller-sized markets may feel the revenue pinch first, as more and more national accounts pull back into the major markets when making 1980 buys.

Fred Holland, Program Director of WAAY/Huntsville, has continued a "no-cost promotion" that his station began three years ago. It's called the "All-Volunteer Christmas Parade" and the title tells the whole story. Each year the station throws its promotional weight behind the staging of an ever-growing Christmas parade through downtown. High school bands and cheerleaders donate their time, businesses create floats and loan other

vehicles. This year was the third annual parade, and over 30,000 people lined the streets for the event. As the event began, some of the volunteers helped the clown-faced WAAY staffers carry the banner (see photo). The crowd size is proof that the best radio promotions do not have to involve giving away giant amounts of cash and prizes.

Even the major markets are not immune to the first quarter doldrums, and in Los Angeles KRLA has designed a sales plan that involves the station's programming department. General Sales Manager Shayle Ray put it this way, "We are striving to save money for listeners as well as advertisers by encouraging advertisers to take advantage of favorable rates to which we are adding thousands of dollars in on-air promotion."

The KRLA plan involves clients willing to advertise legitimate sales with the radio station adding promos about name brand merchandise at substantial discounts. It's a good way to stimulate business for KRLA and, properly presented, it can make the listeners

feel that the station is really looking out for them by trying to save them money.

The 1960 Rate Card

An alternative to cutting rates and giving spots away during the soft first quarter was pointed out by Jeff King in Lubbock. "Our general manager often looks to me and our FM operations guy for ideas on how to make the sales department more efficient. We've done package spot deals in the first quarter before, often going two or three for one, so I came up with a different approach to the same philosophy which we're going to start on February 1. It's called "The 1960 Rate Card' and that's just what it is. We'll be selling time on KSEL using the 1960 rate card, which when you factor in inflation, comes to about 25% less than what we're getting now per spot. So, if we used to cut the rates by 50% to get clients on in February and March, this promotion, which does not involve any on-air involvement, can potentially increase our usual early year gross. The promotion lasts only until April 1, when business picks back up, and the clients get a nice break on the cost of advertising at a time when we have space for them to do so."

Give And Take

With 1980 upon us and the future of America's economy so much in question, it only makes sense that the sales and programming departments put their heads together, if only to increase their collective chances for survival. The natural animosity that can exist between these two separate functions of any sized radio station is counterproductive. If programming can be broadly thought of as the "creative" side in radio and sales can be generally tagged as the "revenue-producing" side, then it's obvious the two must coexist, if not literally join together.

As Jeff King can help his sales department become more creative and profitable, so can that same sales department help Jeff better program KSEL. Jeff told me, "I think a PD is a fool if he doesn't listen to the feedback his sales manager and salesmen can give him about what's going on out on the streets. Every single day the sales people are dealing with some of the very people I'm trying to get to listen to the station... the public! Jerry Clifton was right (R&R 12-21-79) when he said PD's should spend more time outside the radio station, but just because he was right doesn't make it possible for someone in my situation to do that. I try to stay in tune with my audience in many ways, but for me to be out of the building a lot just isn't reasonable. So, when the sales guys tell me things about the station, I listen. They are in closer day-to-day touch with our audience than I can be, so their input is not only welcome, it's valuable."

The Bottom Line

So, what is the bottom line? As always, it's "the bottom line." During economic uncertainty, radio can survive (make a profit) by offering its advertisers a cost-efficient way to reach their potential consumers. Radio can continue to be in the public eye (remain visible) without giving away trips to Hawaii or thousands of dollars in cash by using a little imagination.

Sales and programming should work together to create the kind of "no cost promotions" that have worked for years in markets both smaller and larger than Lubbock, Texas. When the Commerce Department predicts a 9% rise in radio revenue for 1980 (R&R 1-18), it doesn't take a genius to see that inflation will more than absorb that kind of increase. If the creative people of radio can apply their ideas to the potential problems facing our industry in the 80's and cooperate in implementing those ideas, then any possible economic troubles can be overcome.

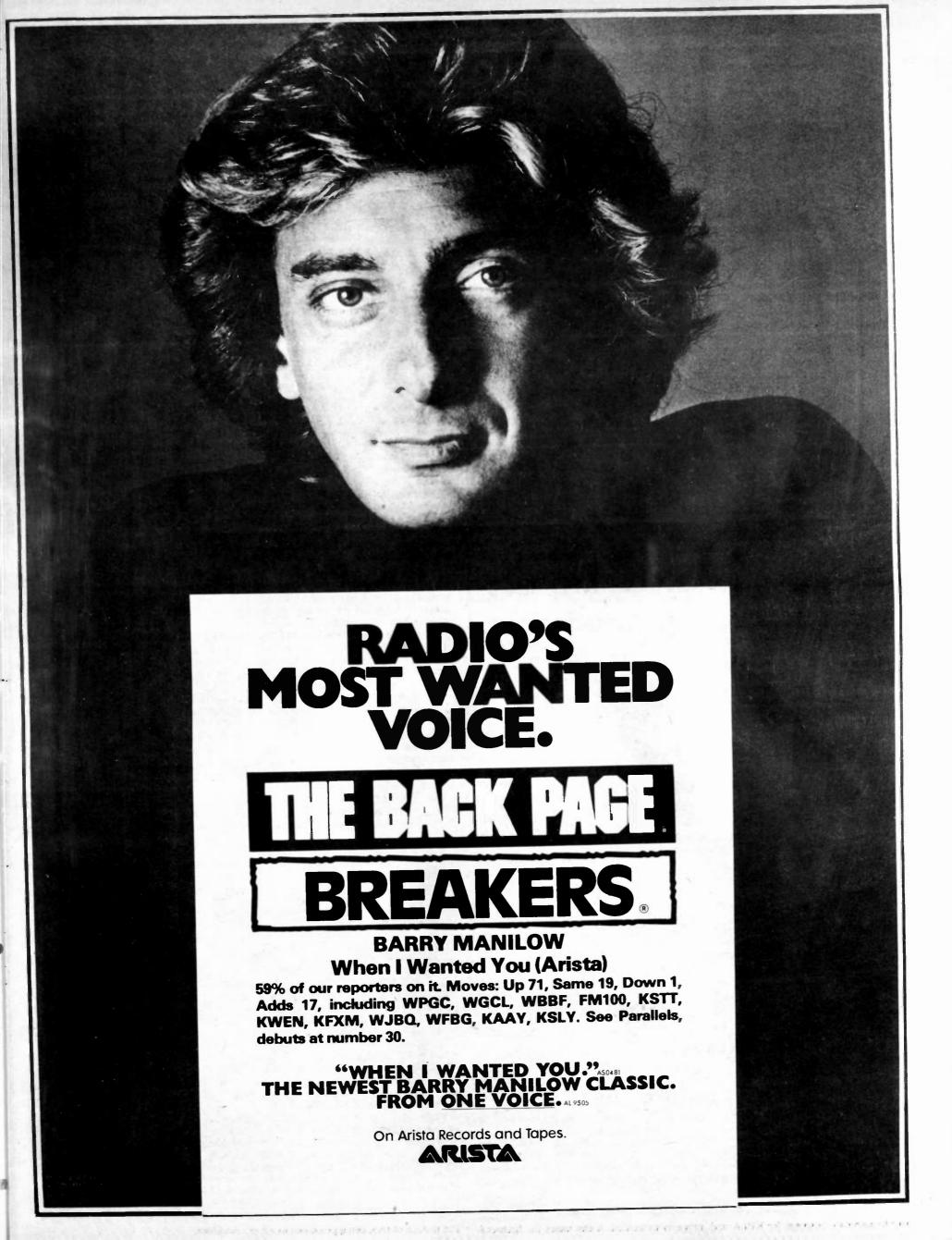

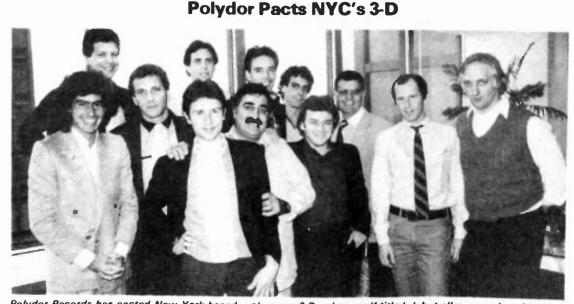

Keith Adams: An Audio Magazine For Programmers

Keith Adams recently left one of the most important programming posts in Black radio: VP/Programming of the powerful BENI (Broadcast Enterprises National, Inc.) chain. He had worked at KATZ/St. Louis and KDIA/Oakland before joining BENI, and once there established a number of modernized music and research systems. Since he resigned speculation has run high about his future plans. Now R&R brings you the first report on this talented programmer's new conception for the 80's – an "audio magazine" for programmers called Concept One. It's certainly one of the most interesting ideas I've heard in a while. Read on.



R&R: Most recently, Keith, you resigned from your position in programming with BENI. What happened?

KA: The President of the company asked for my resignation, and I gave it to him.

R&R: What do you think prompted your resignation?

KA: Well, I think the company was at a point where it needed a new direction, and he basically made some administrative shifts on the executive level, and did what, I think, he thought was best.

R&R: Well, how is this going to affect your career?

KA: It affects me in a fantastic way, believe it or not. I had sort of made up in my mind that I was going to have to do something else anyway, and luckily I had been working on the other thing that I wanted to do, so when he asked for my resignation it didn't come as a crippling blow to me.

R&R: What are these things you will be doing?

KA: Well, naturally I'll be doing programming consultancy. I've picked up a client in St. Louis. I'll be doing the FM of KATZ, but my main emphasis will be on a project called "Concept One."

R&R: What's that?

KA: Basically what it is an audio magazine, consisting of radio airchecks, interviews with prominent programmers and entertainment execs, people that shape direction. I'll be interviewing a Ragan Henry, for example, Jerry Boulding, Jim Maddox, and so on. R&R: Is this strictly for the industry?

KA: Basically it's designed for programmers. I think there is a great need for communication among programmers. I don't knock magazines; they do a very admirable job of it; but radio people are usually audio people, they aren't really print people. You have three kinds of people, audio people, visual people, and touch people; and radio people tend to be audio people. I want to have the type of mechanism that will perpetrate dialogue among programmers, and I think that the Concept One radio airchecks are the best mechanisms that I've seen.

"I think there is a need for programmers in Chicago to hear what programmers in New York radio sound like and vice versa. We can listen to a Jerry Boulding or Jim Maddox theory, but unless you hear how it's applied you don't learn how to use it."

R&R: Will these be available to buy like a motivational course?

 $K\!A\!:$ These will be absolutely free. I'm going to send them to every Black radio station in the country, absolutely free.

R&R : How do you plan to make money?

KA: I'm going to sell spots to the record companies, because the biggest complaint that record companies have is that PD's don't listen to their product. Well, I'm going to make available four spots on the tape, because I don't want to prostitute the tape, and I don't want to wear on the tolerance of the programmers that will be listening to it. It will be two spots on each side that will contain records that labels would like them to hear. R&R: Isn't that selling records in a way?

KA: The way I look at it is this: I think there is a need for programmers in Chicago to hear what programmers in New York radio sound like and vice versa.

R&R: What is the ultimate goal of Concept One?

KA: The ultimate goal of Concept One is to give programmers a tool by which they can learn more about their trade, by listening to other people put theory to practical use. In other words, we can listen to a Jerry Boulding or Jim Maddox theory, but unless you hear how it's applied you don't learn how to use it. So what I want to do is create a forum or an avenue so programmers across the country will be able to hear some of the best-sounding radio stations. I have to put the records on there because that's the only way I can circulate the tapes, but even at the same time there's information value with the records, because I'll be as selective as I've been my entire career about who I'm to accept advertising from on what product. I'm going to accept advertising, so I view that as an information vehicle also.

R&R: Is there anything else you would like to say?

KA: I could use all the support from the program directors in terms of Concept One. I'll be sending letters to them explaining exactly how the thing works. I'll be sending selfaddressed stamped cards for them to reply, and I'd like to get as much feedback as possible.

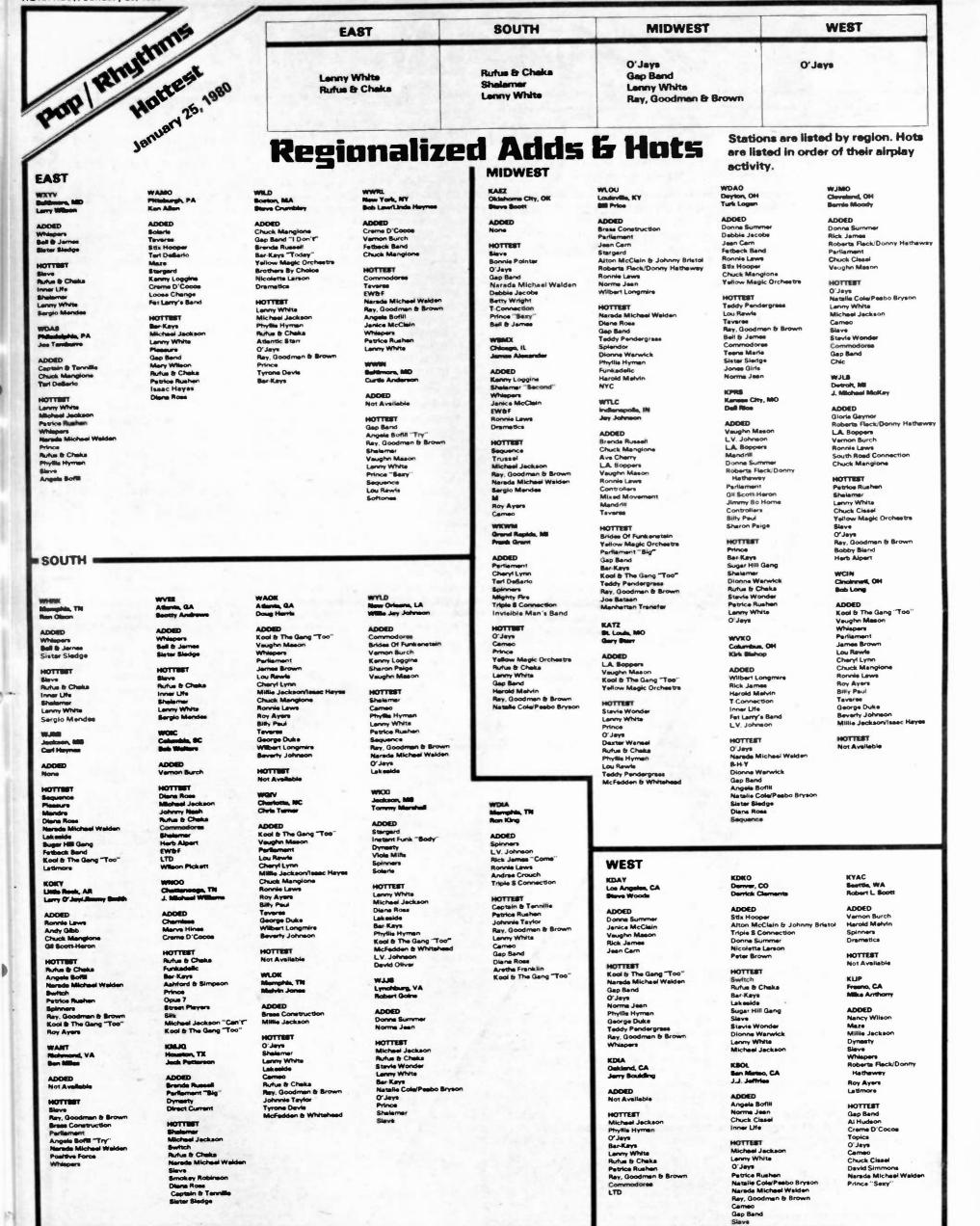

The WLPX Rock Stores

WLPX/Milwaukee listeners didn't have a hard time finding Christmas gifts for their friends this holiday season. The city's five 1812 Overture record stores were recruited as 'WLPX Rock Stores," selling station merchandise. In less than a month, the station has sold a thousand personalized T-shirts, 150 silk tour-type jackets, and assorted wallets, backpacks, gym bags and ski caps.

Walking Billboards

Coordinating the campaign is the station's Promotions Director Bernie Lucas, who joined the station at its inception two years ago. "It's the biggest promotion of any type we've ever done," he commented. "We were looking for increased visibility, so we thought first of T-shirts; they're like walking billboards, and no other station in town had been doing them." The idea grew from there into a full line of WLPX accessories that could be marketed through local retail outlets, and thus the "WLPX Rock Stores" were born.

The stores are actually retail displays of the merchandise available and the prices for same. The prices reflect a slight mark-up to include a 97-cent figure (the station is at 97 on the dial). Profits are divided between the record stores, which receive a small percentage, with the rest headed back to the station's promotional budget, making it a self-perpetuating promotion

Let Your Fingers Do The Walking

Like most radio station promotion directors, Lucas had no prior experience at merchandising. Where does a fledgling promotion director turn to find outlets for specialized printing and other manufacturing? To the phone book, first of all. "There are an abundance of pre-mium companies here in Milwaukee," commented Lucas. "I just checked the phone book under premiums and advertising specialties. And as soon as you talk to one of these companies, the others seem to find out about you. Word spread and people started calling us."

A No-Risk Promotion

Lucas is enthusiastic about the idea of station merchandise. "For starters," he stated, "it sets an important precedent with local retail outlets for future promotions with other stores. If they see that we've done well with 1812 Overture on this promotion, they're going to line up for the next one.'

He continued, "A lot of stations don't have a lot of money for promotions. This is an excellent sort of promotion for those sorts of stations because sooner or later, if you plan right, you make your money back and then some. Your money's on the line for six months to a year, but there's really no risk so long as you've correctly gauged your audience's demand for the product. If you're hot in the market, this is a great way to get even hotter.



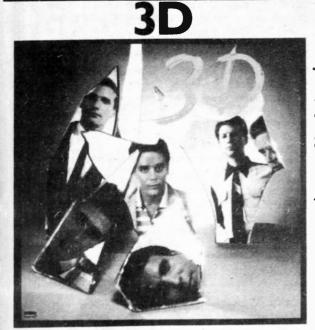

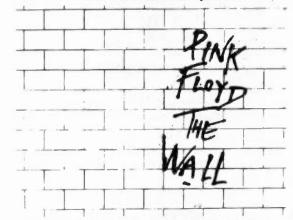

FOGELBERG, NUKES and MAC all maintained, TOP continued its upward climb while YOUNG, FEAT, ZEP, and FORBERT all held rock steady. RUNDGREN jumped way up with increases in airplay rotations. BABYS and BENATAR bounced up. RUSH was this week's highest debuting album as well as the week's most added LP, with excellent add response. 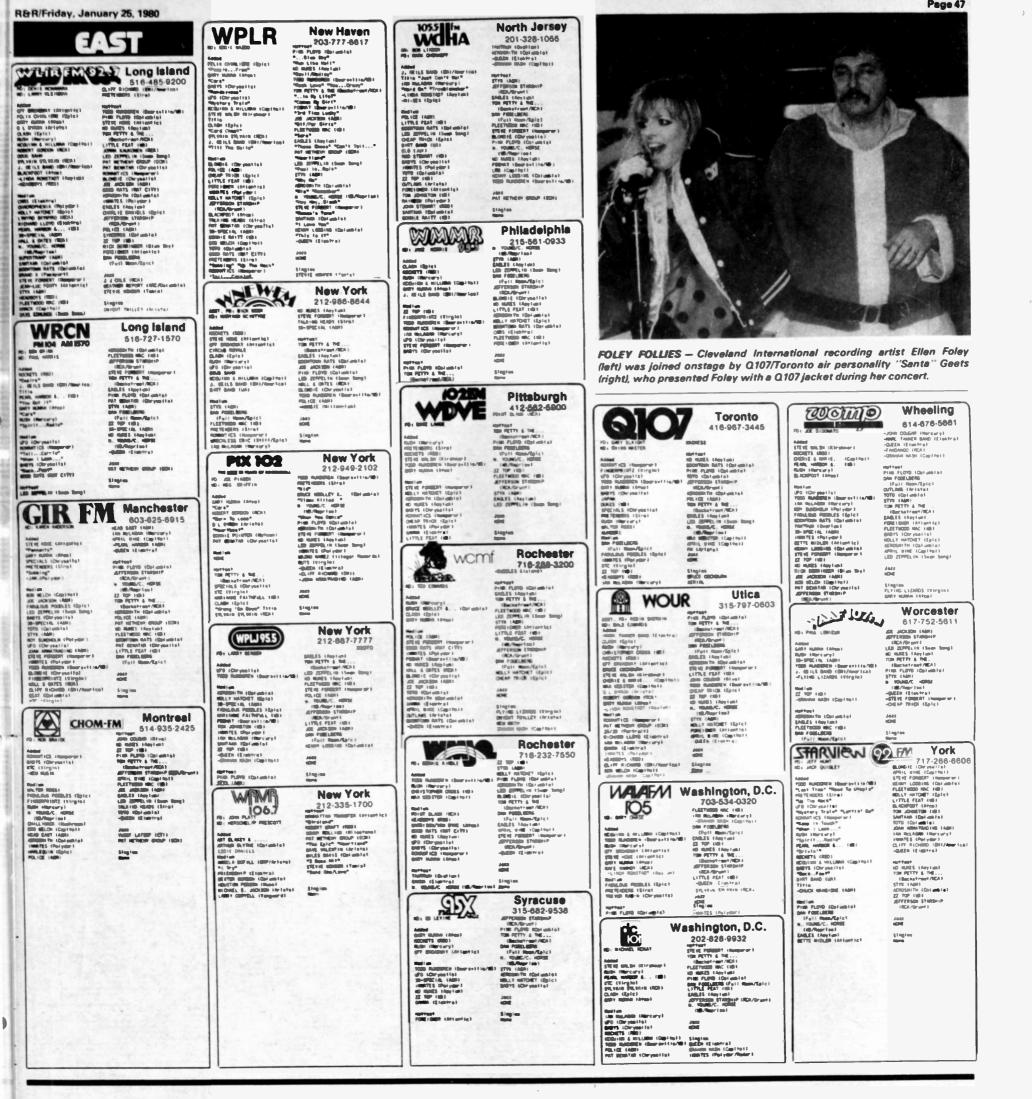

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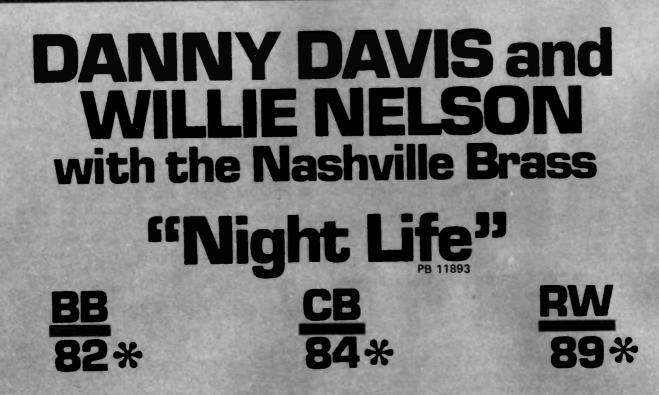

Double Your Digit — Double Your Fun

One of the most significant sets of advance figures for the Oct/Nov book belongs to the Minneapolis/St. Paul market. Actually, things remained pretty constant except for two glaring shifts of audience. Longtime Paul Bunyan of radio, WCCO (hindered by a strike), dropped eight share points (30.4 to 22.4) while new Pop/ Adult kid on the block KSTP-FM (KSTP-AM, a reporter to this section, is also P/A, but is programmed separately), under the guidance of Chuck Knapp, has taken the 100,000 watter into the joyous world of double digit ratings, going from a 6.1 to a 10.4!



We took the occasion to phone Knapp and get some insight on his highly successful

R&R: To my knowledge, this is the closest anyone's come to the impossible dream book beating WCCO.

CK: Radio has always been my first love and it can be, properly used, a terrific illusion. So much so that you can capture people's imagination with a little creativity, the right songs, the right people . . . and I mean people from the top also - the owners are the Hubbard family and they are broadcasters, not rich from another source with radio

as a tov R&R: Short of any secrets, what key ingredients did you employ?

CK: We started with the music; in our outside board campaigns we bill it as #1 Stereo

Music

R&R: Would that mean a heavy emphasis on oldies? CK: For the most part only back to 1970. We play a touch of 60's - it's pretty hard not to play "I'll Follow The Sun" from the Beatles. In morning drive I'll pop Frank Sinatra's "That's Life," but then come right back with Foghat. We don't touch things like Foreigner. We're between the music on the Back Page and the Pop/Adult list; a line right up the middle, which brings us back to illusion. Most of the illusions you paint on the air must capture their imagination.

R&R: Sounds like a really broad spectrum of music . . . CK: Our format has the most unbelievable latitudes that I've ever had the pleasure of working. We'll play Styx's "Babe" and go right in to Mancini's "Bolero."

R&R: Is the music pre-selected? CK: I don't do an advance list. We'll have meetings or write each other notes, or even talk about it on the phone if we can't see each other in person, and those are the ways we determine what it is we're looking for.

R&R: Are your air people personalities?

CK: Definitely. We have some fantastic pros and some of the new people are just superb. We've got a lady on from 6 to 10 at night and I think she's going to be as good as Si Holiday. Her name is Kim Jeffries, and she's so damn good now it scares me. All of our people are totally real on the air. And the audience has picked it up.

R&R: What about the service elements like weather, traffic, etc.?

CK: We do a helluva lot of weather. When we research, we use Frank Magid because he's terrific. The owner of the station, Mr. Hubbard, based on research, invested tons of money for our weather image. We have a full-time meteorologist, 24 hours a day seven days a week. One of the columnists here recently wrote that we have gotten him off of WCCO-AM, which he used to listen to for weather, because he no longer feels he has to do that, and other people we talk to agree. We plug it on the air as "static-free" weather - and in a thunder storm, that's a helluva plug.

R&R: Your commercial policy calls for how many minutes per hour?

CK: 12-minutes an hour, period.

R&R: Do you tailor your news for local effect or is there a balance with national and

international? CK: We talk about everything from Afghanistan to Iran, but you know, I think people should listen to the radio to feel good. And radio should make people feel good. So, we don't do blood and guts; they can get all of that in the first 10 minutes of a television newscast. I can see people shot right on TV, live, if I want it, so we don't even bother.

R&R: What other key ingredients have you used to create this illusionary concept you

CK: Well, some of it is in the way we approach our contests and promotions. We gave talk about? away gold because everybody's talking about that. We're sending people to the Olympics,

two families of four, we're putting them up in Lake Placid . . . R&R: It sounds like you're beaming your promotional activities to an area of relevance; things that are immediately relatable to people . .

CK: Absolutely.

R&R: Did you counterprogram WCCO in any way?

CK: No, because there isn't any way you can counterprogram against a giant that co-vers all bases. The only thing you can do is play a heck of a lot of good tunes, hit the "static free" weather concept, and the other things I've mentioned.

R&R: Have you had pretty much an interference-free reign at the station?

CK: Let me say that I'm a product of everything that's happened and I possess, through moving around to different stations, a lot of ideas and systems, and I consider myself blessed and lucky and most of all fortunate in that Mr. Hubbard said, "Take this, make this," and then I was left alone to be able to pass that on to the entire staff.

R&R: Chuck, you've put together a sensational situation there and again, congratulations!

CK: It's a thrill, I'll tell you that.

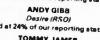

In this issue, R&R continues its policy of illuminating the approaches taken to Beautiful Music by the leading syndicators and radio stations. Our interview subject, Darrel Peters, is in a unique dual position, serving as GM of Century Broadcasting's successful WLOO/Chicago (7.4 to 8.2 in the O/N Arbitron survey) and as head of the FM-100 Plan, a syndication service with 127 station clients, including recent major market successes with KJQY/San Diego and WSB-FM/Atlanta. He has worked in the Chicago market his entire career, starting at WAIT and WEBH-FM (now WLAK), later joining NBC's WMAQ and WLOO (then WFMF) in 1968 as GM.

His recipe for success concentrates, as most syndicators do, on retaining longterm listening. Peters uses an extensive, carefully programmed music library and explicit directions to clients on all aspects of their presentation, from technical matters to station breaks. His articulate commentary on both his own service and the Beautiful Music field in general, along with an explanation of FM-100's new Beautiful Contemporary format, appears below.

Holding Your Listeners Longer — The FM-100 Plan

Part I

R&R: Are you personally involved with all the aspects of your service?

DP: Totally, absolutely. I'm completely involved in every selection that goes in the library, too. You just can't let go of that.

R&R: Let's talk about how that works now.

DP: I'm a General Manager. That's the funny part of this thing. That's the advantage I think I have over all the other syndicators, is that I'm still sitting where the station managers and the owners are.

R&R: So you understand the problems better.

DP: I'm living with the same problems: sales, the collections, the staff problems, the FCC's requirements. It's a matter of living it every day and understanding when a guy's got a problem, I'm doing the same thing.

R&R: What does your syndicated service offer?

DP: Our package is totally different than the others. We have a very large library. It's not the biggest, but what we put in is very carefully done. We have more custom product than anybody has ever dreamt of putting In. We do a lot of our own recording, but it's very low-key and people are not aware of all the things we're doing.

R&R: Where do you do It?

. DP: We do a lot of it in Chicago; we do a lot of it now in New York and in Europe.

R&R: So you do use American musicians?

DP: Oh, yes. We're strong on that. We've found a tremendous amount of Interest on the part of musicians to do something like this today.

R&R: How contemporary are your selections? Do you keep up with all the current hits and make it right into Beautiful Music?

DP: If it fits. We're not a hit maker. We'd call it a hit follower, I guess. When a song Is recognizable by the mature audience, we think it belongs in the format. Now that's In Beautiful Music. We have three formats. But Beautiful Music, we feel, is a mature audience and we do extremely well in the demographics. We do better demographically than almost anybody has dreamt of In Beautiful Music, and that's because we appeal very strongly to the conservative younger audience too. Conservative is the Important element there. We're not going to get the kids 18-24, but we do extremely well getting the women 18-34.

R&R: Now the median age of the country is changing **DP:** I think the idea that people, if they were raised on rock,

will always continue to listen to rock all their life is wrong. I have to say that. I think they mature into other sounds, and I think that the Beautiful Music field recognizes that. They're going to have a tremendous young audience. This group 25-35 is moving into the demographic more all the time now. Very strong potential there for 25 years.

R&R: How do you attract them? They were raised in entirely different times; they did grow up to rock and roll whereas no other audience did. How do you entice them to stay with you?

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DP: Beautiful Music, we think, first of all is a solid product

that is going to be around for a long, long time. But we see a need for something else. There are a lot of stations that are buried between, let's say, long-entrenched Beautiful Music stations on one side and very successful adult contemporary stations on the other. They have nowhere to go. There's no point in being the fourth or fifth Beautiful Music station, or the sixth or seventh Pop/Adult station in town. There's just no pie left, so we've come up with this new format which I think is just absolutely dynamite. We've got it booked for 24 markets already. It's called Beautiful Contemporary, and takes the advantages of both. We take the long listening approach of Beautiful Music and the contemporary feeling of the artists of today and put together a package which is actually a reversal of the Beautiful Music format. It's a 70% vocal format. It's a foreground sound, no doubt about it. All of the titles are restricted to the 60's, 70's, and, of course, the 80's now

R&R: Are these recut vocals?

DP: There are a lot of originals. We do a lot of contemporary artists. If it fits, it goes in as it is. We play a lot of contemporary artists. We do a lot of MOR artists as well.

R&R: Would you be playing Barry Manilow?

DP: Oh, yes. Barry Manilow, Anne Murray, Olivia Newton-John, Englebert Humperdinck, Neil Sedaka, some groups. We do the Bee Gees selectively. It's a very interesting sound. If it's smooth, it's Beautiful Music. We think it's going to be the format of the future. So you're looking at a younger scale. We're looking at an 18-49 total there.

R&R: Which one is on in San Diego where you just had that phenomenal book at KJQY?

DP: It was Beautiful Music

R&R: How do you explain that success? How long have you had that station?

DP: They've followed everything we've said to the letter. They're the most cooperative people I've worked with. They listen to us, they've been out here four times, we've been out there three or four times. We talk every week on the phone, and the people out there were in a very hard Progressive Country format when we went in there. They had a one share; in the market they were 15th. They were going just nowhere, and when they went with us, they said they wanted one goal, and that was to win. It's a **Heftel** station, a very fine group of people. It took two years, and every book was up from day one. I think It's a remarkably effective execution of what we know is best to do, and it works.

R&R: You said an interesting thing. They listened and did everything you said. How involved are you? Do you get involved with helping them select the local people, the engineer ing, the sales?

DP: We have got people on the road all the time, contacting and visiting our stations. Sometimes we feel It's equally important; in fact, I think it's more important to work on the winners, as well as the guys who are just starting. It's harder to work, sometimes with success than with failure, because a station that is highly rated and has the numbers tends to get the business, tends to get all the problems with abrasive commercials. To keep the control at that point is even harder than when you don't have the business.

R&R: Also keeping them probably very up to date on the newest things that you want to do can be a slight problem. They don't like to change too much, do they?

DP: That's right. But we get fivolved completely working with the commercial area, working with the announcers, working with the sales department, and very heavy in the technical. R&R: You do believe that the technical is one of the main

keys, don't you? DP: Very Important. The technical and the execution on

the station's level is everything. What we have on the tapes is our bag, but we can only give a station about 70% of the success. They've got to do their act around it.

R&R: How about the marketing and sales end? Do you have prepared plans that they just fall in with?

DP: We have recommendations in every area, and they are constantly being updated.

R&R: Let me understand the formula for this. Do you supply them everything on tape, or are there local insertions?

DP: Everything musical is totally on tape. **R&R:** Is it all prerecorded announcers as well?

DP: No, no. We don't like announcing. I think that really

produces a canned sound. The repetition of the same words and the same back-announce to me is a real negative. **R&R:** There are no announcers?

DP: On our tapes. Everything in terms of talk is done locally. We do provide, if stations want them, ideas on tape. I'm talking about the little one-liners that we use for Beautiful Music; but in terms of the mentioning titles of artists, we don't do that at all.

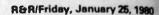
