



o far, the last year and so many months have been an exhilarating experience for black music. Michael Jackson's little sister is suddenly a superstar, Cameo makes TV commercials for Cherry Coke and Anita Baker is this year's princess of soul.

Now from that gray area of dark horses and long shots emerges Nona Hendryx, whose first EMI LP, Female Touch—driven by the relentless first single, "Why Should I Cry," makes the singer/song-writer a clear contender for the title, The

Next Big Thing.

For Hendryx, the etchings of mainstream solo success is the prize at the end of the long road she's diligently travelled since the 70s break-up of Labelle, the soulfully psychedelic girl group featuring Hendryx, Sarah Dash and Patti LaBelle. Not even the artist's mild disdain for interviews (a required point of view for any Next Big Thing) can't conceal Hendryx' obvious satisfaction.

"Who wouldn't be happy?" she asks rhetorically. "After you work for years at anything, but especially music, where you are often driven to second guess what you're doing, it feels good to know that you've struck a hip chord. But we worked hard to make it happen; we deserve good results."

If this is the age of the producer, then Female Trouble boasts an all-star cast.

Two tracks, including "Why Should I Cry?" were produced by "Jellybean" Johnson and Spencer Bernard, staffers from Jimmy Jam and Terry Lewis' Flyte Tyme operation. Other tracks were handled by Hendryx with Mic Murphy and David Frank of the System, with five tracks co-produced by Hendryx and Dan Hartman, fresh from Top 10 success with James Brown. Despite the big names, Female Trouble is by no means simply a producer's workshop. Hendryx either wrote or co-wrote six of the nine songs, the quality of most overshadowing the fact that Prince—using the pseudonym Joey Coco—contrib-uted the sensuous "Baby Go Go." Hendryx, seemingly bent on keeping a secret that everyone knows, refused to discuss Prince in anything more than By Steven Ivory



vague terms, but says she knew exactly what she wanted for the album.

"The company asked me if I wanted to work with more than one producer," she says, "and I was a little concerned, because I wanted continuity. I agreed to work with producers only if I could have some input creatively. I was particularly concerned with the Flyte Tyme situation, because I knew their success has been based on the amount

of control they have in the studio. But it worked out great. They were willing to listen to my suggestions—I felt the song should go, 'Why should I Cry,' as opposed to 'Why Must I Cry,'—and I enjoyed the experience.

Hendryx' commercial appeal certainly hasn't lessened the sting of her bite socially. Lyrically, she still carries a big stick, exemplified here by the wistful "Winds Of Change (Mandela To Mandela)." dedicated to Winnie Mandela, the wife of South African activist Nelson Mandela. "You take away the movement, the political situation and the cameras and you've got this man and this woman whose lives have been forever affected by what they're going through," says Hendryx. "In the song, I try to address that. You think about the love and strength this woman must have to be able to deal with it all."

Though Nona's past solo projects were generally arty, pop/rock collaborations one step ahead of mainstream audiences, she blames their failure on the one final element to which she attributes the current album's success: "You can't have success without support from your record company," she declares. "The other company didn't get behind my work the way EMI has. A good record is just a good record until the company turns it into a hit."

Moreover, for EMI, Nona's success is more than just a hit, actually spearheading the company's commitment to black music. Says Slack Johnson, the company's VP/R&B Division, "It's good to have a power hitter like Nona go right after the black music charts, but the best thing about it is that we can't categorize her. Her look and sound cross most markets, which makes Nona the black department's first superstar launch. We've got some surprises coming on Nona's behalf that I can't even talk about now, but trust me, we're serious."

And so is Nona. "Nothing is promised to anyone in this business," she says, "but I feel good about what's going on right now. I've got a strong team in Vicki (Wickham, her manager/Take Out Productions) and EMI, and we've got a strong record. What's wrong with going all the way?"

Undoubtedly, the biggest news in the radio industry today is the return of Lee Michaels to radio station WBMX-FM for a reported 1.5 million salary plus incentives over a two year period. For the past two months rumors of Michaels coming back to Chicago have been hot and heavy. Most here thought Lee would return as station manager of the new WRXR-FM white-oriented urban format. There were also rumors that he might return to WGCI-FM. I hate rumors so I didn't write about them, and it has come to pass that they were only rumors.

Michaels returns to the station that fired him after making them number one. Lee was fired for a supposed conflict of interest which was never proven. I asked Kernie Anderson WBMX-FM station manager if the bad feelings between himself and station owner Egmont Sonderling had healed. Anderson stated: "time has a way of healing everything, and I don't think it was bad feelings between me and Lee I think it was sad feelings. I have always felt a closeness to Lee."

JS: What about the feelings between Lee and Egmont.

KA: Egmont's a business man.

JS: When will Lee assume his position.

KA: Around the middle of May. His position will be Operations Manager and Program Director.

JS: What happens to Jerry Boulding and did he have a contract.

KA: Unfortunately Jerry has been terminated and he did not have a contract with the station. Jerry will be given severance pay and Daisy Davis, our music Director will assume all of Mr. Boulding's duties until Mr. Michaels takes over.

JS: How much did it cost to buy Lee out of his contract with KMEL-FM in San Francisco.

KA: I am not at liberty to say.

JS: Would I be in the ball park if I estimated \$300.000.

KA: Maybe.

I managed to catch up with Lee Michaels at press time, and asked him, "Are you happy at KMEL-FM?"

LM: I am extremely happy out here. I have no problems. On my very first book we went from a 3.7 to a 4.4, I have a great staff and the management is very supportive.

JS: How long will it take you to get orientated at WBMX.

LM: About 32 minutes to get that station back together.

JS: Will you attempt to get your former co-workers back?

LM: WGCI is a strong station and they have some strong personalities but they are not the only personalities in the world and one of my strengths is in developing new personalities. I don't know all the people at WBMX and I am not going to say that it is necessary to bring new people in. I must first see how the staff performs and then make an evaluation. Everyone will get a chance to prove themselves.

In my view, Lee Michaels' return to WBMX-FM is a direct result of Northlake Communications not following through with the purchase of the station. I don't believe that Northlake felt secure in the price that they were paying for the station and the numbers and billing the station showed for the past few months. The sale agreement with Northlake has not been completely terminated. If Lee can bring the stations numbers and billings up, the sale may go through. If I may speculate, I can possibly see Lee Michaels eventually being an owner of WBMX. Michaels and WBMX have been

intertwined since he was an on-the-air jock. This is his third hiring and with each one he gets a little more of the pie. In any case, I must say that excitement is back in Chicago radio. Welcome back, Lee.

My spies tell me that they saw a moving van at WGCI and that Samsonite had delivered a great deal of luggage.

In town this week was Capitol Records recording artist Lillo Thomas promoting his latest album containing his latest hit "Sexy Girl." One of the most popular cuts on the album is "I've Been Loving You A Little Too Long." While in town, Lilo visited with Fletcher's, Barney's and Colorite 1-Stops. Mike Horton also got him a guest spot on the popular WGCI's, Doug Banks outrageous radio show. In talking with Lilo I learned that his album first hit in London where he did the first leg of his promotional tour.

Warner Brothers didn't pressure us because sometimes that can disturb one's creativity. We get a chance for all of our songs to be showcased at Warner Brothers."

Some say, "When it rains it pours," and with the newfound success of Atlantic Starr, this is the case. Newest lead vocalist, Barbara Weathers is the songbird of the band that has caused all the negative rain to go away. The band noted, "Wayne knew Barbara when she was in South Carolina. We listened to her and cut some demo records. At the time we needed a female singer, so we asked her to join the band."

The musical sound of Atlantic Starr is described as 'one with no limits or boundaries.' According to Atlantic Starr, "When we write, we don't write for any particular musical ear. We write what feels good. We want everybody to hear our music."







The results of the Fifth Annual American Video Awards (AVAs) are a foregone conclusion as the show was taped at the Scottish Rites Temple in Los Angeles more than a month ago. The star-studded event, like most awards programs, is designed to permit the public to view the recording and video industries, applaud the artists and technicians that each year distinguish themselves through music videos.

Because the AVA Awards program is broadcast so far after the actual taping, and the suspense is gone by the time the show airs (staggered telecasts throughout spring), the awards program's primary function is to promote the music and artists lauded during the proceedings.

It was with great irony, then, that the National Academy of Video Arts and Sciences (NAVAS), whose members vote on AVA winners, inducted Peter Gabriel into its Hall of Fame.

Gabriel, whose creative animated video to the music of his "Sledge-hammer" earned him three awards during the evening, in accepting the Hall of Fame honor, told the audience that up until now, videos have been "tied up with the advertising" business and that they've generally been regarded as

a "big piece of promotion."

He continued that he believed a day was approaching when "people will take (music videos) seriously," and begin to regard them as creative works in their own right.

Gabriel also said that he could forsee a need for a union or federation of artists and video crafts people to protect their rights as artists, inferring, perhaps, that when record companies and home video software distributors begin to increase the number of music video projects available to the home market, the creative people better have a way to share the pie.

BLUE NOTE COMES OUT AGAINST HOME TAPING

The industry furor over home taping of prerecorded music hasn't really gone away, although in the last couple of years it has taken a back seat to a more upbeat industry effort to promote itself.

But a recent batch of releases from the Blue Note jazz label is accompanied by a message urging consumers to consider the consequences of home taping.

About 20 of the artists on the Blue Note label—including Dexter Gordon, Bobby McFerrin, McCoy Tyner, Freddie Hubbard and Stanley Jordan have extended an open letter to record buyers on the subject of home taping.

The letter in part said: "Look at if from our point of view. Home taping is now so common-place, so unrestrained, it has put a sizeable dent in our incomes, is jeopardizing our recording and live appearances and has already caused record companies to limit the new artists and new albums they invest in and promote."

That this is a major issue for all recording artists is of no question, but because jazz artists rarely have platinum albums, the issue of home taping could very well be more sensitive. They, after all, deserve the financial reward for offering an enduring craft, deeply rooted in American culture. Not to be maudlin or jingoistic, but it's true that, while jazz artists are generally perceived to embrace more studied development of their craft than artists in other genres, they generally receive less renumeration.

LINER NOTES: GRP Records plans release May 24 of the *Digital Duke*, an album featuring some of Duke Ellington's most

reknown music, digitally transferred by 32-track technology. Release of the LP coincides with his passing 13-years-ago and a U.S. commemorative stamp last year...Mobile Fidelity Laboratories plan release of the BBC Jazz Classics under an exclusive U.S. distribution pact with the British Broadcasting Company. Included in the package of more than 80 selections, grouped into packages according to music characterizing the style of various American cities. The music, due for the marketplace in late May, early June, is culled from a period between 1917-1947... A rare audio bioclip featuring the late and legendary Billie Holiday rehearsing for a tour of Japan is also being offered by Mobile Fidelity. The piece, available in CD, features Holiday with her accompaniests Jimmy Rowles and Artie Shapiro in a 1954 rehearsal in New York, performing some raw uncut music; involved in some raw, sometimes heated exchanges; and some warm moments, all of which give great dimension to the public portrait of Holiday.
