



Brute Bailey has been in the industry for 12 years. A Vietnam Vet who served in the 101st, 173rd and

CAPITOL INDUSTRIES MERGES TWO LABELS

Hollywood: Joe Smith, Vice Chairman, Capitol Industries-EMI, Inc. has announced that the EMI-America and Manhattan labels have merged to form a new company under the name of EMI America/Manhattan Records. The new company will be headquartered out of New York.

Bhaskar Menon, Chairman and Chief Executive Officer, EMI Music Worldwide, indicated that he was delighted to welcome Sal Licata to the EMI family. "The merger of EMI America and Manhattan will considerably strengthen both labels...The move reflects our determination to provide all EMI Music's repertoire sources with impressive executive leadership."

ISLAND RECORDS CELEBRATES 25TH ANNIVERSARY

New York: Island Records, founded in 1962, is celebrating its 25th anniversary. The cast-list includes Bob Marley & The Wailers, Jimmy Cliff, Grace Jones and Sly & Robbie.

The celebration for "Island 25" gets underway this month in the U.K. with three television specials. The first and second programs are: Island 25...From My Boy Lollipop to the Joshua Tree; and a ninety-minute documentary, Island 25...Still Touching the Soul. The culmination of this televised event will be Island 25...Alright Now. These shows will be broadcast in the U.S. in late September on MTV and Showtime.

A&M WORLDWIDE CONFERENCE IN LA

Los Angeles: A&M Records 1987 Worldwide Conference is takes place from Monday, June 22, through Saturday, June 27, at the A&M lot in Los Angeles. Some 250 participants, representing A&M's domestic operation and all worldwide affiliates, gather for business meetings, A&R presentations, performances by label artist, and other special events.

This is the first such gathering in A&M Records' 25-year history. Affiliates represented will include Australia's Festival Records (whose association with A&M dates to 1962), and PolyGram Records, A&M's licensee for Europe, Southeast Asia and Latin America.

MCA'S McKAIE MAKES HIS MOVE

Universal City, CA: Andy McKaie has been promoted to the position of director of A&R Special Markets and Products for MCA Records announced Bruce Resnikoff, Director, Special Markets.

McKaie's new duties will be to create and coordinate compilations from the label's catalog for MCA's reissue program, which includes compliations specifically for compact disc. McKaie will also develop and coordinate packages for premium, mail-order, and ancillary market distribution.

McKaie's previous experience includes serving as the Director of National Publicity for MCA since September 1983. McKaie has been in the industry for fifteen years and also served as Director of Publicity for Arista Records.

NAB UPDATES

 ANTI-TRAFFICKING RULE SHOULD NOT BE IMPOSED BY CONGRESS

Washington: NAB President Edward O. Fritts said Congress should not impose an anti-trafficking rule on broadcasters before considering other regulatory and statutory changes affecting the license renewal process. In November 1982, the FCC repealed its anti-trafficking rule which prohibited broadcasters from selling their stations unless they had owned them for a minimum of three years. The House of Representatives has introduced a bill that would re-impose the rule.

• FCC ASKED TO RETAIN TAX CERTIFICATE POLICY

Washington: The NAB has asked the FCC to continue its tax certificate policy which beneifts minorities seeking to purchase broadcast properties. The commission has implied that the policy may be unconstitutional. The tax certificates are given to eligible broadcasters that sell their stations to minorities which allows them to apply funds that are normally paid in taxes toward the purchase of a more attractive property.



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

SIMPLY RED MINES THE BASICS WITH 'MEN AND WOMEN'

Stardom is not always a smooth pill to swallow. It sometimes causes those thrust into the limelight scrutiny of the public eye to change their behavior, or adapt an image separate from their real character.

That hasn't happened to Elektra recording sextet Simply Red, whose debut album last year, *Picture Book*, earned the Manchester, England lads two Grammy nominations, some chart burning singles—the Valentine Brothers' "Money's Too Tight (To Mention)" and "Holding Back The Years"—and the respect of an often jaded industry.

You see, Simply Red, fronted by its passionate, red-tressed lead vocalist Mick Hucknall, isn't your classic pop act, most of which bring to the starry vista a wispy trend—here today, gone tomorrow.

These blokes are churnin' out R&B, tempered by their individual sensibilities which developed in the volatile milieu of the UK's working class.

Their sophomore LP in current release, Men and Women, is an apt follow-up to Picture Book: It exudes the same straight-forward, yet clever dynamics that endeared this sextet to international audiences last year.

The first single from the new LP, "The Right Thing," a robust satire, did respectable chart numbers on both pop and urban lists. And Simply Red's record company is confident that the current single, "Infidelity" will bubble up the charts.

In describing the transition from the debut LP to the current collection, Hucknall and keyboardist Fritz McIntyre note that while they've developed more style and honed their identity, the spirit and edge of the music is left intact. Much of the interview with BRE was like their music, uncompromising.

"The first album was definitely a showcase for our talents," Hucknall told BRE. "The second (album) is an example of how we've developed more style."

Hucknall added that, "We're just doin' the music, and I suppose we could have come back with some slick sound, but that wouldn't fit our identity.

"I'm in a position now where I don't have to see another record in my life, we've made so much money off the first and through touring.

"I can say anything to all of them (executives) and feel completely free to make this music," he continued.

"(R&B) is pop music," he further said, adding, "not in the sense that most people have come to understand it today. But this music connects (with people)."

The Manchester native, who has

noted that growing up in the impoverished atmosphere of that blue collar city actually provided greater inspiration for him to pursue his dream of becoming a musician, also said that his interest in R&B developed out of curiosity over where the Beatles got their sound.

"People witnessed a group that had come from humble beginnings and conquered the music world," he explained, adding, "People just wanted to know where this all came from.

"When I was a kid of about 10 I guess," he continued, "I remember discovering the 'Philadelphia Sound,' listening to people like Harold Melvin and the Blue Notes, Barry White and some others.

"I listened to a lot of R&B, collected the music and got an idea of how the Beatles came up with that sound of theirs. That became my music of choice, you might say. All the things I write about and the music I write about is what I know."

The group once again included a cover of a R&B/funk anthem on *Men and Women*, the Sly & The Family Stone standard "Let Me Have It All," further evidencing a homage to R&B music. In fact, the current single and "Suffer" were both co-written with songwriting legend Lamont Dozier when Hucknall and the former Motown tunesmith met in Los Angeles last year.

Fritz McIntyre tells a similar story, although it sounds more like the prototypical path by which many American R&B artists discover their soul. "I started out in church playing and singing gospel music. I doodled and learned the piano at home and eventually turned on to the rebellious music that was being played around me.

"I played in some guitar bands for a while, all amateurish stuff, you know, and much of the music was funky gospel," McIntyre recalled.

He added that he went to public school and was introduced to the Staple Singers' "Respect Yourself" and that experience, perhaps, galvanized his desire to pursue music, although it wasn't initially apparent.

While he felt he should develop some job skills for a regular gig, McIntyre said, "My heart wasn't really into it."

He was unemployed five years before he met the players now forming the core of Simply Red. "Manchester is a small music community," McIntyre explained, "So if you play and someone needs a player like you, then they usually know where to hunt you up."

In addition to Hucknall and McIntyre, Simply Red is Chris Joyce (drums, percussion), Tony Bowers (bass, percussion), Sylvan Richardson (guitars) and Tim Kellet (keyboards, trumpet, flugelhorn, percussion).

The band recently completed a tour in Europe to support *Men and Women* and is currently making a swing through Australia and then it's off to Japan. The six young men are set to make their rounds in the colonies in September and will probably begin the trek on the West Coast.

While the prospects of such expansive travel, the adulation of screaming fans, the aristocratic treatment that will undoubtedly be extended to the band may turn the heads of those with lesser character, for Hucknall and company, the U.S. tour is a chance to visit the land of Sam Cooke, Aretha Franklin, Diana Ross and, his favorite, James Brown.

This is a group that keeps success in perspective. As Hucknall put it, "If I remember that mountain I had to climb to get here, I won't ever be able to think that I'm better than somebody else. That feeling is not gonna go away because of a few dollars."

FRANK WILSON: "Having It All Is Giving It All"

Twelve short years ago, anyone observing Frank Wilson would have said, "This guy has it all!" But contrary to popular belief, this was not the case. And Frank Wilson, Motown producer and winner of some twenty gold and platinum records found himself in the midst of a "Damascus Road Experience" with the Lord, faced with a calling—a choice: After having it

all, could he give it all back?

Twelve years on the other side of that choice, Rev. Frank Wilson finds himself a humanitarian, producer/writer, minister of the Gospel and "fisher of men." One of the "nets he's been given to fish with is BARAC (an acronym for Black Americans Respond to the African Community), a coalition of ministers, entertainers, business people, journalists, health professionals, community leaders and concerned citizens—which raises funds to send emergency food and medical supplies to the victims of Africa's prolonged drought and famine.

Of all the outreach ministries (and there are several) that this man of influence throws his weight behind, BARAC is without a doubt, the apple of his eye. "Having it all" was not enough to fill the void.

And though he stayed in the recording business for a time after becoming an ordained minister, in 1980 Wilson just walked away from what was still a lucrative career in the recording industry.

In a conversation with BRE's gospel editor, Wilson reveals his burden, his commitment and his challenge to black radio—to black people.

BRE: What Caused your heart to turn toward Africa?

FW: A series of events: A brother from Ghana introduced himself to a small group of men I had joined for a weekly bible study and riveted the message to us that "Africa needs black America." A few months later, I was asked to attend a two-day summit, and was impacted by the information on Africa, and it dawned on me that the reason I didn't already know this was because they are black...Three million people facing starvation, and I didn't know about it! I knew I couldn't leave that meeting and do nothing.

So, I hosted a luncheon. I invited Jim Cleaver (*LA Sentinel*), Jayne Kennedy, Andrae Crouch, Stevie Wonder, Larry Carroll (KABC News), and a host of other such influential friends. After they were exposed, they felt the same way—that

we have to do something!

We realized that to turn Africa's situation around would take an effort the size of the Marshall Plan (15-40 billion dollars) and factoring in inflation, would come to about 100 billion dollars! This means that we're going to have to launch the kind of programs that will get industry and the wealth of our nation to respond. So, BARAC was organized, first of all to inform—to raise the consciousness of Americans.

Our first strategy was to go to Africa with a film team and document, come back and report with credibility, Africa through black American eyes.

BRE: With all the problems blacks in America share, are you finding it difficult for them to respond to a need, seemingly so remote?

FW: We've had problems here all the time, and we'll always have them.





Perhaps having a relationship with Africa could help us deal with our problems more effectively, we need to try that. There is an awakening happening. The ones who understand, see the vision. They give me my energy, my drive to keep going. We're picking up support steadily as we go on. The distractors—I pay them no attention.

BRE: Before the "Black Revolution" of the 60's, we didn't care to relate to Africa. FW: We still don't! American "blackism" was a response to color and not heritage. That's the difference. The problem we face now is that we don't know who we are, and that contributes to our low self-esteem—to our self-hatred and distrust among one another. We can't cut a decent business deal, because we don't trust each other. Consequently, we are scraping around at the bottom of the barrel because we cannot overcome that very basic thing.

If we understood, for instance, that the African Church was the backbone of the Church in the First Century and stood strong in the face of a multitude of heresies in that day...But we don't have that kind of information, therefore, we have no legacy to stand on, other than the fact that we are sons and daughters of slaves. There's so much more to us, as a people, than that.

BRE: Does that support your claim that giving to the African community could raise our people's self-esteem, individ-

ually and collectively?

FW: Let's look at it in basic sense: When they had the big earthquake in Mexico recently, a predominantly Mexican-American community—Brownsville, Texas—provided more goods into Mexico after the crisis than any other source. When interviewed, one man said with his hand over his heart, "It's because I feel something in my heart for my brother." A very natural response. We didn't see anything comparable happening relative to Africa by black Americans. Why? Because we've been cut off. If we see an article about Africa, it's generally always negative. It's being reinforced, even pictures we see of folks helping Africa are usually white people holding black babies. That reinforces the concept that we as a people, can't make it on our own. We must turn that around!

We've embarked upon a lifelong mission that I may never see the fruition of. We must raise the awareness and consciousness of our people about the needs of Africa; remind everyone that these are human beings and should be related to as allies; then, marshall and mobilize resources and deliver them to the continents of Africa and South America (where there are more than 50 million refugees, as compared to 30 million in North America). And we want

to help them become self-reliant. We'll take the cue from them. They are going to tell us what we can do. They know what the problems and needs are. In the same way America got help from France and England when we were trying to put this nation together—Africa deserves no less.

And while all this is taking place, because we're Christians, we will also share the Gospel of Jesus Christ. That's the most important thing we have to offer. We don't go and share Christ with you and you're starving, rather we show them Jesus Christ by helping. And in the context of the relationship that we can develop.

Another of the tasks of BARAC is to keep Africa on the minds of people in a positive way. To make it "vogue" to relate to Africa. Black radio could play a very important role. One of the things that we desire to do (and we need the cooperation of black radio) is to put out sixty-second spots called "Love Returns Updates" because we want people to be aware from our first-hand information, what is really going on in Africa. Those spots must be run nationwide, and we want all black radio to be involved. We need to perpetuate positive images of Africa.

BRE: Your whole thing is about ministering, about helping. But, as a Christian, the highest form of life is death. With that in mind, what would you want chiseled into your tombstone—to be remembered by?

FW: We are developing BARAC into a foundation that would perpetuate itself, and certainly outlast me so that there would always be in the minds of our people, a hope and a relationship among black people worldwide. Not to become a world power, but simply to come to wholeness. I'd like to be remembered as being a part of that healing.

My epitaph would be my goal in life: "For God to be in control of me." I have given myself back to God. God gave me my body, I have given it back to Him. I would like it to say, "God owned him; mind, body and soul."

The metamorphasis that has taken place in the life of Frank Wilson in the past twelve years is astounding. And the "having" and "giving" is not farther removed than when he was writing and producing his lovesongs.

The lyrics of the BARAC theme, "Love Returns" (penned by Wilson) according to him, "embody the concept that we as black Americans, products of Africa, are returning home in love and with love for our brothers and sisters. "Love returns. All around the bare, parched ground is cracked and burned. And it scarcely looks the place God took me from. Away. A slave. Love returns."

MAN ON THE MOVE

Catching up with Warner Brother's Benny Medina may be one of the toughest assignments in town. However, if you're willing to travel from one end of Los Angeles to the other, stopping off at different locations to hear some great new music, the task proves to be very worthwhile. Medina represents the new breed of aggressive, down-to-earth a&r men who don't approach their work in the traditional way. By his own admission, much of what Medina does doesn't happen when he's at his Burbank office. "I'm not here to be a corporate guy. Now obviously there are some executives who are neither inclined nor available to be in the studio, or running off to hear new songs. So I deal with that part of our reality, being available to hear what producers are doing, sitting down with artists to put together concepts, listening to new acts. I believe that the only way to be successful at what I do is to stay in touch with the creative community-writers, artists, producers. Sometimes I think people in the business forget who we're doing what we do for. My job is to bring music to the public and to let them decide."

Medina's been with Warner Brothers for a year now and during that time, he's been responsible for bringing producer/ artist Jay King to the label with Club Nouveau as well as signing Atlantic Starr, who are currently moving to a whole new level of public recognition. "I started out at Motown and developed myself as a songwriter. I was actually signed to Jobete as a staff writer." Medina's songs were recorded by The Temptations (on their Reunion LP), Billy Preston, Smokey Robinson, The Four Tops, Junior Walker and Jermaine Jackson, on whom he produced some material for the Let Me Tickle Your Fancy LP. "Gradually, I evolved from writing into production and the logical step was into a&r. I appreciated the objectivity that I got from working in a&r, where

company, he says he gained "an incredible amount of knowledge. I learned what to look for in great artists, in dealing with them, with their idiosyncrasies. It was a wonderful opportunity to discover about the whole area of artist development, about building careers," Medina says, crediting Berry Gordy as a motivating influence in his own career

development.

When approached by Warners to take on a job as an executive in a&r focusing on the area of black music, Medina accepted the challenge, acknowledging that "Mo Ostin, Michael Ostin and Lenny Waronker, the three people at Warners who hired me, opened up the door to look at what creative opportunities might exist with regards to the current black music roster at the label as well as adding a whole new breed of artists to the company. I felt very fortunate to have such a wide range of talent to work with."

As noted, Medina's first 'find' for the label came via Jay King, who had already been successful in 1986 with The Timex Social Club and Rumors. "I'd heard that lay was particularly down on a&r people who had passed on his record. Since he'd never come to me, I called him and asked him what his problem was! I was actually in the Bay Area for a 'sneak' Prince concert and I remember going for a long walk with Jay and really got a sense of where his head was at. Jay played me some material and I really felt like we could do something with it. The group had a sound and a real fresh identity. We did a deal whereby we gave Tommy Boy the 12" version and we did the 45-and then the albuma marketing concept that really solidified the group's street identity. I really believed in the product and I guess you could say that I was like a daily reminder at the company that we should stay on top of the situation and bring Club Nouveau's records home." Medina's faith in King and his music was realized when the group's "Lean On Me" became a No. 1 dance, pop and black smash, with a million-selling debut album and the only gold single so far this year.

Medina says that in spite of the many projects he's now responsible for, he continues to stay in touch with what's happening on street level. "I talk to consumers, I find out what they like about a particular record. I go to clubs. I listen to what radio's playing. I take the human survey, listening to what the public has to say, I combine that with my own musical background and I'm fortunate to be working with some of the best and most knowledgeable people in the business at Warners." Medina says that the company maintains a commitment to "artistic integrity not just sales. This is an artist-oriented company." When listening to material or looking at signing a new act, Medina says he looks for "artists who are unique and different. In music, I listen for emotion. That's the binding element for me because music has the ability to create happiness, maybe console, and just maybe explain anything."

Currently, Medina has numerous projects on the boil. "We've signed several new artists: Michael Cooper, another King Jay production, former lead singer of Con-Funk-Shun; Teen Dream, three talented vocalists from Columbus; Sherrick, a dynamic male vocalist; Nick Munday, a multi-instrumentalist from Philadelphia; Chill Factor, a great selfcontained group from Chicago; Royalty, a family of four, three girls and one guy who are really great; The Jamaica Boys-Marcus Miller, Lenny White and Mark Stevens (Chaka Khan's brother)—who will be a performing as well as recording group; The Tackheads, a group produced by George Clinton; and X2, a duo from the Bay Area. The newest major addition to the roster that Medina is really excited about is the punk-funk king Rick James, who will be going into the studios shortly to begin work on a new album for release later this year.

There are new projects from some of the labels that Warners distributes including Qwest who have a new LP due on The Winans (which features a duet with Anita Baker entitled "Ain't No Need To Worry"). The label has begun working on a Quincy Jones protege, Siedah Garrett, and there are new albums from Patti Austin and James Ingram about to begin production." He is also enthusiastic about some of the acts on Prince's Paisley Park label including Taja Seville, Tony Lemans, Jill Jones and new signings to the label include Dale Bozzio and Mavis Staples and of course, Sheila E. continues to be really successful for the label. He's also quick to point out that he's excited about the new product coming from the

With the onslaught of frightful summer weather looming on the barometric horizon, everybody will be looking for some kind of breeze to chill the scorching heat. That breeze can be real or induced by suggestive sights and sounds.

"Mimosa" is like the Sunday brunch beverage it is probably named for. The groove figuratively—and in some places literally-sizzles with polysyllabic solo runs by both players.

And then there's "Brazilian Stomp," which romps aboard a constructed pop statement. Perhaps it is a too wellconstructed pop statement, as the passionate playing and inventive arrangements are largely absent here. That could make it just right for some radio formats, though.

The title track, "Collaboration," provides a richly-textured funk groove courtesy of Marcus (The Groove Setter) Miller. It's got all the sass of a sunny seaside barbecue, complete with skimpy bikini-clad nubiles watching surfer boys just showin' off. For sure!

You couldn't ask for a better crew to sail with. In addition to Miller and Phillinganes, the key players are joined by Harvey Mason on drums, Paulinho Da Costa on percussion and Paul Jackson on rhythm guitars, Randy Goodrum, who penned the title track with Mason, also provides some support on synthesizers.

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

While flying from one station to another Don met Lonnie Tillis alias Mel Tillis.

As Eason explains, "We started talking about radio and he said that he had a station in Mobile that he was going to close. I said I would like to take a look at it. I went down and there was this big old 5,000 watt, 24 hour nondirectional station doing nothing. I then called Noble Bennet, Mack Dixon, and Earl Parnell and told them that we had a chance to get a radio station. With their situations declining I knew it was a good move for all of us. We gave Mel \$50,000 down on an overall price of \$300,000 and we were into a station very cheaply. Thank God. Mel took paper for the \$250,000 balance and we are paying notes. For the first two years we will just be paying interest. If we can make a go of this without MESBIC or any other help from a financial institution, just independent black men using their own capital, we can then go to a financial institution and secure capital to buy other radio stations.'

JS: What was the format under Mel and what will yours be.

DE: When Mel had the station it as C&W and that was probably his biggest problem because of the intense competition. The only black stations down here are WBLX-FM and WGOK-AM and we feel there is a place for us in the market.

JS: Were the facilities included in the

DE: Mel did not own the building which is a historical building built in the 1800's. He had an option to buy it which we will pick up. There is also 17 acres of land near the coastal area where the transmitter is located which we will also purchase. Most of the equipment is very good and we do not anticipate having to buy new equipment for 5 years. The transmitter which is about 8 years old is set up for AM stereo and we hope to go stereo in the near future.

JS: Is there an FM station available in the area to complement your AM.

DE: I had an offer from a guy who owns a station about 10 miles outside Mobile to buy his station. We are considering the offer.

JS: Do you have a staff as of yet?

DE: Yes! I will be doing mornings from 6 to 10 and from 10 to 3 we have John O'Day from St.Louis, then we have a young man from Mobile Andre' Williams and we have Jesse Lee 7 to Midnight and from 12 to 6 we have Denise Monique, a young lady just out of college with a degree in radio and TV and it is her first job. Our staff is integrated, we're going to be urban contemporary. We're playing whatever crosses over, what ever hits.

JS: What is the population of Mobile?

DE: The population of Mobile is about a half-million with 25% being black. We feel that the market is there to support the station, after all BLX is being supported by it and from what I understand they are making a million a year or better.


