

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
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
Bill Quinn

Understandably so, since the audibly perfect technology threatens to eclipse all other formats' present capabilities. Meanwhile, CBS' new parent corporation, Sony, is the world's leading manufacturer of DAT hardware. So look for a change of heart on DAT under the new CBS management. Not so, say Sony spokesmen in Tokyo. After the purchase of CBS, they said, the record company will still be free to express an independent viewpoint on the subject.

TONY DIVERSITY By David Nathan

t a time when the musical marketplace is chock full of exciting new artists, the chance for immediate acceptance with a first release clearly depends on quality: The response to Tony Terry's initial single, "She's Fly," is a demonstration that it's still what's in the grooves that counts. It was inspired, singer Tony says, by Washington, D.C.'s "go-go" sound and is just a small sample of the wide diversity of music to be found on Tony's debut Epic album, Forever Yours.

The title track is clearly derived from the doo-wop sound of the Fifties (an unusual musical step for any artist in the Eighties) and contrasts with the funk of "Wassup Wit U," the dance groove of Terry's next single, "Lovey Dovey," and the smooth ballad sound of "Here With Me."

"That was a definite, calculated move," says Terry, calling from a three-week promotional tour that will introduce him to radio personnel across the nation. "I wanted to ensure that I didn't get categorized as a one-dimensional kind of singer—you know, just someone who does funk or just does ballads. We wanted to reach as broad a spectrum as possible this first album, focusing on as

on this first album, focusing on as many different musical genres as we could."

Tony brings to his first album a strong background in music that began when he was just eight years old. Born in North Carolina, he moved with his family to Washington, D.C., in 1968. As he recalls, "my younger sister, my cousin and I used to crash the rehearsals that my family was doing as Gospel singers! My folks thought we sounded better than they did, so we began doing three or four

Gospel programs every weekend as The Freedom Gospel Singers." Tony also became a featured soloist with the Reverend Thomas Gospel Singers and, by the age of 13, he'd begun to turn his musical attention to the more secular sounds of artists like Stevie Wonder, Michael Jackson and Donny Hathaway. "I learned every single riff of every single record until my mom would come in and tell me to stop singing!"

When Tony entered local talent shows in the D.C. area, he was a consistent winner. Inevitably, he expressed a desire to go to D.C.'s Duke Ellington School of the Arts. "To begin with, my mother was really opposed to it but, when I was about 17, she changed her mind. I started attending the school and auditioned for a lead part in the school's version of the musical 'Don't Bother Me, I Can't Cope,' which proved to be a major event in the city."

Tony's obvious vocal prowess led to a spot singing background for Gospel singer Vanessa Bell Armstrong ("I had to learn ten songs in two days!").

In 1983, a call from a friend in New York resulted in Tony's being cast in a run of "Black Nativity." "I went back to Washington, D.C., after that to wait tables at Howard Johnson's," Tony recalls. "In fact, I was training to be a manager there, when I got a call that 'Black Nativity' was going to be running again in New York."

Tony returned to the Big Apple in 1985, this time to make it his home. "After the show, I started singing as a choir member in the hit Off-Broadway musical, 'Mama, I Want To Sing.' On one particular night, when one of the leads didn't show, I was thrown into the

role and stayed with the show for almost 18 months."

A visit to hear a local band at New York's Danceteria proved particularly fortuitous for Terry when producer Ted Currier, whose credits include work with George Clinton, Lillo Thomas, Sly Fox and The Boogie Boys, heard him sing a capella. "I was hanging out in the basement dressing room and a friend told me I should just sing a few bars—I think it was a Luther Vandross tune. Anyway, Ted was standing behind me and he asked to hear some more. I guess he liked what he heard because we stayed in touch and I ended up doing backgrounds for a session he was doing for The Boogie Boys."


to kick butt!"

Terry signed with Currier's Platinum Vibe Productions and further session work included backgrounds on tracks for Virgin's Black Britain and for the New York band, Sweet Sensation. Next, Tony concentrated on making a demo of his own. "Actually, I'd never written a song before 'Lovey Dovey,' so that was quite an achievement," Tony laughs. "Ted produced the demo at the start of this year and we ended up doing a deal with Epic in the late spring."

nowing that he's regarded as a new artist, Terry was surprised but happy at the strong reaction he got for "She's Fly." "After all my years working in theater as part of an ensemble, I have to get used to being out here on my own. But, although being singled out is definitely different, I really appreciate the recognition." His second single, "Lovey Dovey," is already receiving positive responses at the radio level and Terry is confident that there's enough diversity on his album to continue to create interest. His own personal favorite is the ballad "Here With Me," which was written, he says, for his ex-girlfriend. "But she's no longer my ex, because I got her back! So the story has a happy ending."

Terry's immediate plans include returning a favor: Epic Records' vocalist Flame recorded a duet ("What Would It Take") for his album and he'll be doing a song with her for her Epic LP. Then, it's time to hit the road: "I can't wait because I'm going to be delivering a real energy-filled show—I plan to kick butt!" he laughs.

If Terry's album is any indication of what audiences can expect in 1988, then he can also be expected to deliver on that plan.



Young Black Programmers meet in Houston

HOUSTON: The annual meeting for the YBPC took place Nov. 20-22 at the Hyatt Regency, in Houston, TX. The theme, "The How To's," prompted two workshops outlining radio and record companies.

The radio workshop headed by Lee Michaels, Operations Manager of WBMX/FM, Chicago, was both informative and entertaining as radio programmers from across the country opted for answers on "The Operation of a Radio Station." Panel members included Jimmy Smith, KKDA/FM, Dallas; Donna Griffen, Account Executive, WLTS/FM, New Orleans, and Silias Lee, President, Silias Lee & Asso-

ciates, New Orleans. Most of the panel representatives advised the overflowing seminar audience to learn how to present their product. It was emphasized that they must become salesmen first. It was also pointed out that making commercials more entertaining to the listenership could turn negative listeners into positive ones.

The record company seminar, "The Development and Operation of a Record Company," included Skip Miller, President, Motown Records, Los Angeles: Cecil Vice President, Holmes. Columbia Records, New York; Sondra DeCosra, Vice President, Columbia Records, New York; Jimmy Starks, Vice President, Columbia Records, New York; Miller London, Vice President, Motown Records, Los Angeles; Oscar Fields, Vice President, Warner Brothers Records and Ernie Singleton, Vice President of Warner Brothers Records, Burbank.

Panel members described the various facets of a record company and perhaps the most entertaining subject during the seminar dealt with the fact that some programmers move records too quickly up the chart, hurting sales. Another problem facing most programmers, according to the programmers in the audience, was the reality that many of them have to go out and buy product because of poor station/record company relationships.

The general meeting was held at the Conference end to elect new officers for the upcoming vear. The winners were President Terri Avery, KMIQ, Houston; Vice President Lynn Haze; Treasurer Marcel Lee, WYLD, New Orleans; Assistant Treasurer Y-Vonne St. John, KKDA, Houston; Secretary Michelle Madison, KDLZ, Ft. Worth, TX; Assistant Secretary, Gloria Fitts, KMJQ, Houston; Sgt. At Arms, Matt Morton, WXOK, Baton Rouge, and Historian, A.B. Welch, KQXL.

During a telephone interview, new president Avery said, "I think the direction of the YBPC is as it's always been: to continue to learn, teach and grow with people in radio!"

Homeless benefit held

Galaxy of stars headline UNCF Telethon

LOS ANGELES: On the day after Christmas, the "Lou Rawls Parade of Stars" telethon will once again delight millions of holiday video viewers and, hopefully, raise millions of dollars for the United Negro College Fund (UNCF).

In addition to the show's deep-voiced host, Ben Vereen, Jody Watley, Freddie Jackson, the Whispers, Deniece Williams, Nancy Wilson, Sammy Davis, Jr., George Benson, the Mighty Clouds of Joy and Anita Baker are just some of the more than 50 headliners scheduled to appear on the star-studded seven-hour spectacular.

Now in its eighth year, the UNCF benefit will feature top performers across a wide spec-

trum of American entertainment, including many from the Jazz, Country, Gospel and Urban Contemporary music worlds. As the only telethon dedicated to increasing funds for higher education, the "Parade of Stars" supports UNCF's 42 private, historically Black colleges and universities. Proceeds from the annual event help UNCF schools keep tuition low, as nearly 90 percent of the students attending require finanacial assistance.

Joining national and founding sponsor Anheuser-Busch in sponsoring this year's event will be the Kellogg Company, American Airlines, the Polaroid Corporation and Tylenol.

CBS sells to Sony

NEW YORK: Gambling \$2 billion that diversification is the wave of the future, the Sony Corporation has just agreed to purchase CBS, Inc.'s record division.

CBS Records—which includes the mighty Columbia and Epic labels, as well the powerhouse CBS distribution arm — is the world's largest record company. Among its major artists are Michael Jackson, Wynton Marsalis, Bruce Springsteen, Cyndi Lauper, Billy Joel and L.L. Cool J.

With the CBS buy, Sony, whose profits have been falling almost as fast as the U.S. dollar, will not only diversify its holdings in the highly competitive consumer electronics industry (primarily VCRs), the Japanese giant is also expected to have an easier time leveraging a

number of its new technologies into the marketplace — chief among them, the controversial digital audio tape (DAT) system.

Atlanta-based media mogul Ted Turner, who tried an unsuccessful takeover of CBS in 1985, is reported to have commented that, ironically, CBS' board of directors "has done everything" he "was going to do" had he taken over.

In the past 14 months, CBS has disposed of all of its major non-broadcast properties, including books, magazines and now records. In the process, CBS has become a streamlined, cash-heavy operation. Sony, on the other hand, will have to commit about a quarter of all its available cash to the venture and be required to increase its borrowing to consumate the package.



SCHOOLLY D HOUSING THE JOINT IIVE

Schoolly simmered on his own label before coming to a boil with the cult smash "Saturday Night." This latest uses the toasters trademark conga and bongo grooves, casting a dark, sometimes frightening picture of a hard urban jungle on the streets of Philly. More than just a bragger, Schoolly has a tale to tell! The B side is a mix of the artist's past jams.



STEADY B BELIEVE ME DAS BAD

Don't disturb this shakin' groove from Steady B, the cut is breaking out with hot major market add action! Mixing to the maximum, the cut uses all kinds of bizzare edits and sound samples to back B's wild rhyming. Light drum sounds give him plenty of room to finesse his way through the beats as bits of classic rap riffs weave in and out of the arrangement.

SWEET TEE I GOT DA FEELIN' PROFILE

Producer Hurby Luv Bug has rocked acts like Salt 'N Pepa and Dana Dane to the top of the charts, now his latest project, female rapper Sweet Tee, busts out with a sparse soul groove. Using funky guitar picking, light drum beats, and a wicked sounding bass line, the toaster busts out a hard, confident rhyme that puts her in rap's upper echelon of talent. A must for all rap fans!

SWEET COOKIE DO YOU WANNA DANCE DANYA

Hot on the trail of female rap trail-blazers Salt 'N Pepa comes a wave of female talent. This rough, funky dance jam finds the Cookie "dissing" the dudes on the dance floor with a nasty, cutting discourse that would send the best of us straight to the bar. Percussion and horn blasts nail down the beat...it's made to dance to!

J.J. FADD SUPERSONIC DREAM TEAM/MACOLA

The L.A. rap scene is beginning to produce an interesting stylistic alternative to the dominant east coast scene, these female MC's serve up a decidedly home grown sound. Minimalistic drum programs and little else back up the team as they introduce "supersonic" speed rapping. Surely one of the fastest talking women in the world, she's getting hot West Coast add action.

EAZY E THE BOYZ-N-THE HOOD RUTHLESS/MACOLA

Another one pulling hot phones here on the West Coast is this down tempo groove from producer/artist Easy E. Associated with label mate crew N.W.A., Easy lays down a slick story of the preoccupations of urban youth. Some explicit lyrics give the song a humorous slant, but require a wary approach for radio action.

ASHER D FEATURING DADDY FREDDY RAGAMUFFIN HIP-HOP PROFILE

This blend of Jamaican toasting and New York style drum machine rhythms was recorded in London. It could be that British audiences are ready for this sound, but to our ears the cut includes a toasting style not as developed as island toastmaster Shinehead mixed with lukewarm copy of Bronx style rhythms.

NORTHERN NOTES

The 17th Annual Juno Awards have come and gone. Three African-Canadian artists walked away with the coveted prize. Kim Richardson won top honors in the Best Rhythm and Blues/Soul category for the song "Peek-A-Boo." Leroy Sibbles captured the Best Reggae/ Calypso category for the album Meanwhile and Oscar Peterson walked away with the award in the Best Jazz Album category with the LP, The Oscar Peterson Four...

This year's presentation was plagued with controversy. First, the Juno committee was under attack from the Black Music Association/Toronto Chapter (BMA/TC) for their refusal to separate the Reggae/Calypso category. The BMA/TC has been waging this struggle since the category was created in 1985.

The BMA/TC weren't the only critics of the 17th Annual Juno Awards. Toronto Star critic **Craig MacInnis** also had some choice words for this year's Junos. "Are the Juno Awards forever destined to play catch-up?" asked MacInnis in a column called "Juno Awards Caught in a Time

Warp."

Said MacInnis, "Monday night's 17th annual music industry love-in bestowed goodies on an array of artists who, if memmory serves, weren't up to much in 1987."

"Daisy Falle, executive director of the Canadian Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences (CARAS) admits that not all is right with the Juno nominating procedure."

"There's always going to be a situation where somebody falls outside the eligibility period," she says. "We really don't know how to address that."

Although Falle rightly adds that there is "no perfect system," it behooves CARAS not to get caught napping. Kids cutting their musical teeth on Much Music aren't likely to be fooled by the Juno's love affair with year-old records. And when you lose the kids, you may as well pack it in.

Plans for the Fourth Annual Canadian Reggae Music Awards are now on the way. This presentation will be a tribute to the legendary Reggae superstar, **Peter** Tosh.

It will be held on February 14, 1988, at the Skyline Hotel in Toronto. Apart from the awards presentations, the show will feature local and international Reggae stars. Also, special Awards of Merit will be presented to outstanding individuals who have contributed to Reggae music in Canada and around the world.

This year's presentation will include a Canadian Soca/Calypso category, and there will be a special Peter Tosh Memorial Award. Finally, this year's presentation will be dedicated to legendary Reggae superstar Tosh who lived from 1945 to 1987.

South Africa's Ladysmith Black Mambazo breezed through Toronto and played to enthusiastic audiences at Massey Hall. 

When Jack Harris started airing a contemporary urban soul format on his newly-purchased Columbus, Ohio, FM station, he and his staff made history.



"Our day part concepts have not really changed from day one, but we've had to shuffle some personalities to get the right formula," Harris, president and general manager, said.

"Two of our personalities, Leela Peterson on midday and Cindie Marie Harris on evenings are market leaders, pulling in ratings as high as 6.5 and 4.6 among the 18 to 34 year olds."

In the October Arbitron releases, WCKX led its three competitors by nearly a point with 2.7 overall market share; the 24-hour AM WVKO achieved a 1.9; WZZT, a 24-hour FM, reached 1.8; and the 24-hour Jazz formatted station, WBBY-FM, reached 1.8.

"We came into the market planning deep reach into the Black community. We've achieved that end with our music, information programming, and heavy community involvement," Jack Harris said.

"Even though we've moved at a good pace in three years, our aim is to be number one in the entire Columbus radio market," said the aggressive WCKX president, who also owns KBWH in Omaha, Nebraska.

With a staff representing over 125 years of broadcast experience, Jack Harris may well achieve his goal.



ARTIST PROFILE

THE JAMAICA BOYS: ALL THE WAY FROM NEW YORK CITY

Take some good ol' fashioned funk, add some soulful vocals and a strong dose of Caribbean rhythms, have three highly musical gentlemen stir up the mix and you've got the first album from The Jamaica Boys—bassist Marcus Miller, drummer Lenny White and Mark Stevens.

Speaking for the other members of the group, Miller, whose musical credits include working as co-producer with Luther Vandross on several of his albums, explains how the Jamaica Boys came into being: "The idea for the group evolved some three years ago when I talked with Bernard Wright and Lenny [White]. I've known both of them from our days growing up in Jamaica, Queens. In fact, Bernard and I were in Lenny's band back in '78 when he was just 13 and I was 19-so we go back quite a way. Anyway, the three of us were gigging together in clubs a few years ago and we thought we might like to become serious about it. We came up with a nice blend: a fusion of jazz and R&B, with some Caribbean rhythms. At some point, we felt that we'd bring in a singer. I'd known Mark [brother of Chaka Khan] for a while, so we brought him in."

Since Wright is with another record label, he isn't an official member of the group, but he's worked on the project since its initiation. Says Miller, "We started putting down some songs in the studio in 1985, and we all agreed that what we were doing sounded unusual. Well, we kept listening and then we started playing the material to some record company people."

Co-produced by Ray Bardani, who engineered a number of Vandross' albums, The Jamaica Boys' first album is a composite of funk and R&B, with some reggae rhythms thrown in for good measure. As Marcus points out, "We wanted to base it on some of the successful bands of the Seventies, which meant putting in some real musicians

and some soulful vocals. These days, everything can be so electronic. We wanted an album that would be a combination that's both raw and silk at the same time and I think we came up with just that."

Marcus says that The Jamaica Boys aren't simply a great studio band: "We are definitely going to be performing. This isn't just a side project, either. We are a group, a *real* group!"

Marcus admits that the kind of schedule that he and his fellow group members have won't permit them to work together all year long, but no doubt that this project has a high priority for him. "With all the production work I've


been doing [work with David Sanborn, Natalie Cole, Jennifer Holliday and, of course, Vandross], I'm anxious to get back into performing in clubs, going back to being a musician again. I think it's real important to create a balance when you're someone who's wearing a lot of hats."

Drummer White has a long and distinguished career, starting as a member of the legendary group Return To Forever. He feels that The Jamaica Boys are definitely a priority right now. "We want to create enough interest that we can all spend most of our time working as part of this band. Now, if someone asks me to produce them, I'll see how it fits within what The Jamaica Boys are doing at the time."

After several years of making his own albums and producing other acts, White says that he enjoys being a part of a group again. "I've always wanted to be a part of the best band in the world." Describing the group's music as "R&Bgae" (a fusion of R&B and reggae), White says that The Jamaica Boys is "a Third World sound," citing the cuts "Home," "Let Me Hold You Closer" and "People Make The World Go Round" as his own personal favorites. "But the truth is, I love the whole album!"

With the first single, "(It's That) Lovin' Feeling'" already making headway with urban radio, The Jamaica Boys look confidently to a long future together. "At some point," states White, "we'll probably do solo albums again, but right now it's all about getting this group off the ground."

WYNTON MARSALIS AT WESTWOOD PLAYHOUSE Los Angeles, Nov. 28th

When you go to a Wynton Marsalis concert, you don't go to see an entertainer; you go instead to hear jazz musicians of unsurpassed excellence doing what they were meant to do: Play Jazz. Even the straightforward manner in which the players approach the stage lets you know upfront: There will be no junk-food Jazz tonight, Mister.

Opening with the renowned "J Mood," Marsalis and band brought their uncommonly high standards to a set of songs culled largely from their recent LP, Standard Time. Particularly notable were Marsalis' round, elegant tones on Gershwin's "Foggy Day," and the energetic virtuosity displayed during his arrangement of the Ellington standard, "Caravan."

The now familiar line-up was basically the same as on his recent albums: Marcus "J Master" Roberts, piano, playing with an unparalleled rhythmic fluidity; Jeff "Tain" Watts, drums, master of metric changes and cunning cymbolwork; Robert Leslie Hurst III, bass, whose command of tempo and counterpoint set new goals for others to attain, and the skillfull saxophone fire of Todd Williams.

One special highlight of the evening came not from Marsalis, but the young, blind pianist Roberts. Just back from Washington, D.C., where he won the Thelonious Monk competition, Roberts performed a solo piece that demonstrated beyond question why he shares the stage with Marsalis.

Simply put, the men evidenced an uncompromising artistry and inventiveness, never for a moment lapsing into the pretentious, always firmly rooted in a total comprehension of Blues that Swing.

If you have ever fantasized about telling your grandchildren that you saw Armstrong, Bird, Duke or the legend of your choice, live, when they were young, developing, yet completely in command of the music...then go see Wynton Marsalis today.

NAJEE Concerts-by-the-Sea, Redondo Beach, Ca. November 19th

"The best thing you can do," Najee tells young people everywhere he goes, "is study and work hard and stay away from drugs. If you have a positive vision, follow it. Decide what you want to do, and stick with it. Nobody can see your vision more clearly than you."

Sage advice coming from a man who has captured the art of show business with his premiere EMI America album, Najee (Najee's Theme), which has thrust him into the forefront of America's music scene

And while the controversy rages over the fact that some people call his music Jazz, Najee has managed to convince all those who hear him that he is just a nice guy playing some of the best music around. His album is destined to become one of his platinum trophies.

Najee swung his way into Concerts-by-the-Sea on a wave of joy and happiness that instantly affected his audience. A number of attractive ladies were ringside to check out this most eligible of bachelors. He opened his timely set with a rousing rendition of "Betcha Don't Know What's Going On," his third album single after "Najee's Theme," and Anita Baker's "Sweet Love."

Switching from soprano sax to alto, the former reedman for Chaka Khan, Meli'sa Morgan, Melba Moore, George Benson and Kashif, served up Earth, Wind and Fire's "Can't Hide Love" and followed it with "When Sunny Gets Blue"

Midway through his one-hour set, Najee thanked the EMI America staff (Joan Scott, Jimmy Taylor, et al) for the great job they've done on promotion, and he graciously acknowledged the



importance of Black radio in his whirlwind success. He also credits the phenomenal popularity of his album to the fact that he toured extensively with the Freddie Jackson show and the predominantly female audience—fired up by the addition of Ray, Goodman and Brown—took Najee to their hearts.

Najee (which translates to "intimate friend of the Creator") was assisted by Parisian-born pianist Alex Bugnon, formerly with Melba Moore and New Edition; bassist Artie Reynolds, a Freddie Jackson alumnus; drummer Poogie Bell, who worked with Phyllis Hyman and David Sanborn, and Rohn Lawrence, who once played guitar with Jean Carne.

Najee seemed thrilled to be playing a 200-seat facility after working 5,000-seaters for most of the year. He seemed to enjoy the intimacy of the room and the rapport with the mostly Buppie crowd.

But he was most happy on the night we caught him because his mother, Mary Bickel, flew in from Hawaii with his sister to hear him play for the first time in eight years.

He closed the set with "Mysterious," a new single that is definitely in a New York groove. He moved easily through the audience as he played—thanks to sound man Keith Andes, who spends three or four hours each night setting up all the electronics that allow the musicians to work.

Najee's only problem will come when and if the power goes out. Today's musicians, for the most part, are mute without electricity. Erroll Garner never had that problem.

While music lovers the world over are embracing many different types of sounds, there seems to be a growing lot who are returning to straight-ahead lazz productions.

Reggae seems to be missing the boat for a number of reasons—none of which explain the magic of the rhythm. A gathering of "Bredren" blamed Black radio for the failure of the potent, and primitive, music to catch on with the masses of consumers. Others blame it on the strangeness of the beat and the harshness of the message that decries Babylon and all it stands for.

Fusion and other exotic sounds have held sway in their time and will continue to attract record buyers when spirits and music coincide. Punta-Rock, a new breed of animal from the shores of the tiny Central American nation of Belize, is being touted by one of the finest Reggae-Soca-Soul bands in Southern California—Dell and the Sensations.

But if you check out the BRE Top 40 Jazz Album chart, you will see that one of the fastestrising albums going now is some of the hardest, purest Jazz you are likely to hear in the persons of Donald Harrison and Terence Blanchard.

Harrison and Blanchard are two fresh, but experienced, musicians who have steadily improved with each new outing on vinyl. They first stuck their heads out of the woodshed as sidemen for the venerable and much-respected Art Blakey—the grandfather of modern Jazz. Most Jazz fans already know that a stint with Blakey is like getting a master's degree on the bandstand.

Needless to say, then, the two hornmen know more music than their peers. "Crystal Stair," a CBS follow-up to their critically-acclaimed "Nascense," is a veritable and magnificent showcase for Harrison's reeds and Blanchard's trumpet. They recorded with their working and touring crew and you won't find finer musicians anywhere in the land. They are bassist Reginald Veal, drummer Carl Allen and pianist Cyrus Chestnut.

"Crystal Stair" is taken from Langston Hughes' classic verse and basically sets an emotional mood for the musical feast that is to follow. From the standard "Softly, As In A Morning Sunrise" to the hauntingly beautiful "Grace of God," "Crystal Stair" is a rare gem of Jazz music for those who are still hung up on guys like Coltrane, Lateef, Rollins and, of course, Blakey. "Grace," written by Terence Blanchard, came out of an experience the trumpeter had with Blakey.

They were walking in a forlorn area of a town and saw many people who were down on their luck and homeless. Blakey mentioned the old adage "There but for the grace of God go I," and Blanchard—after seeing a television special on the homeless—was overwhelmed. He sat down and wrote the chart in one sitting.

Of particular note is the fact that "Forbidden Dreams," a statement on the "human ugliness of racist South Africa," was also written by Blanchard. "My wife Jackie helped me come up with the title because we both agreed that it is like a 'forbidden dream' to even dream of freedom if you are a Black South African," he told Emenari. "They can't assemble, protest or even have public funerals. The situation has got to change."

In the six years since Harrison and Blanchard arrived on the New York scene from New Orleans, Donald and Terence have been proving to one and all that they deserved to wir down beat magazine's "Talen Deserving Wider Recognition Acoustic Jazz Group of the Yea 1987."



album, Michael Jackson's Bad scored simultaneous Gold, Platinum and Multi-Platinum honors in last month's Recording Industry Association of America sweepstakes, making him the only artist to win the music business' monthly triple crown in November. So far, Bad has sold three million copies.

It remains to be seen what will happen when, as they have just agreed, the South African government will allow unrestricted distribution and uncensored screening of Richard Attenborough's anti-apartheid film "Cry Freedom." If the Pretoria regime does honor its agreement and allows the film to be seen under those conditions in integratged theaters, the film's producers have offered to donate all profits to the UNICEF fund for South Africa. The film portrays the life and death of Black Consciousness leader Steven Biko, as well as some graphic scenes of racial violence, and is certain to provoke strong responses from all who see it in Azania, regardless of color.

Last spring, consultant-researcher **L.R. Byrd** authored a study for the NAACP entitled "The Discordant Sound of Music: A Report on the Record Industry." As might be expected, Byrd found a dearth of opportunities for Blacks at every level of the music business.

In mid-November, Byrd was in Los Angeles to implement part of a 19-city effort to improve artist/manager relations with the minority business community. "We met with people who can assist us in gaining control of dollars we are losing to insensitive managers and their artists, said Byrd. "They pull dollars from our communities with no identifiable way of returning them. We are going to show them some alternatives to that situation."
