ell, here I go again, ol' multiopinionated "Madhatter." The last piece of journalistic greatness that I tossed to the world was the great article about carted music. I ended up putting more music on cart than ever before. This time I want to deal with Reporting, particularly in response to a recent article on the editorial page of BRE pertaining to reporting to the trades.

To report or not to report? It takes too much time, it's aggravating, it's blahblah-blah, so forth and so on... What is Reporting and is it important? If all

stations stopped reporting to the trades, will record sales suffer? Will the program director and music director be aware of what is relevant and what is not relevant as related to formats of the same sort? Reporting is research; at least research used to be the key word a couple of minutes ago. The last spot set was all research and statistics will always be around.

The rocket scientists of the radio business constantly keep coming up with the "great ideas": ten-song power sweeps, no song titles, and no talk from the 'Dumb Disc Jockey.'

And now, a recent article of interest appearing in one of the trade magazines (On Radio) announces: "DI's-Endangered Species." The article gave the call letters of three stations that are now employing the 'no disc jockey' concept.

One of the program directors of one of the 'no disc jockey' stations stated: "The disc jockey is radio's second biggest irritant." Another of these PDs stated: "The DJ's are only intrusive and disrupt the mood."

If this attitude is amplified and combined with no reporting and no song titles—coupled with no record salesyou can easily see that Tom Joyner will be able to take a break.

Radio folks are in the Record Business and record folks are in the Radio Business. We are dependent upon each other for survival. If record companies can no longer sell with the aid of radio, then radio will not be able to play records if all of the companies are out of business.

Sound farfetched? As a boy (40 years ago), raised up in Central Florida, I saw thousands of whooping cranes. Today there are only 16 left in the world. Could the fate of whooping cranes as an endangered species happen in the radio business? Maybe in 30 years there will be only two stations left, one record company, no disc jockeys and no promotion men.

If blessed with an extension on life, maybe I could write an article 30 years from now entitled: "I Remember Radio Stations and Record Companies."



THE DAZZ BAND ANTICIPATION RCA

ALBUM OF THE WEEK

SUAVE I'M YOUR PLAYMATE CAPTIOL/EMI

Suave's super successful debut cut "My Girl" has all the girls going crazy over the 23 year old talent. This album release goes further, showing a multi-dimensional songwriter/artist who possesses a powerful street sense akin to that which has thrust Keith Sweat into the national spotlight. "Stop Acting Ill" and "Back Stabber" are already ample evidence of Suave's immediate Black/Urban/Pop/Dance/Teen appeal, while "Shake Your Body" and "Playmate" are solid LP picks for advance radio play. Suave is on the leading edge of R&B's new generation!

SINGLES

EVELYN "CHAMPAGNE" KING—FLIRT—EMI/MANHATTAN—This is Evelyn's strongest cut since her top five hit "Shame." The hard-hitting jam is imbued with an extra heavy layer of funkiness by hit making producer Leon Sylvers, and should make the bubbly songstress the toast of every town!

THE RIGHT CHOICE—TIRED OF BEING ALONE—MOTOWN—The Right Choice is clearly the right choice for Black radio programmers with this pumped up version of the classic Al Green hit. With Al solidly committed to the Gospel mode, we could use a few reminders of his talent, especially when they make it this easy to dance to! Adds everywhere!

GARY TAYLOR—COMPASSION—VIRGIN—Hot, hot, hot! Picking up explosive add action, this cut is well worth waiting through the longish a capella intro. When the song's absolutely killer drum programming kicks in, vocalist Taylor falls into the pocket with ease, and what a wicked pocket it is! An excellent self-penned and produced debut.





ALBUMS

PAUL JACKSON, JR.—I CAME TO PLAY—ATLANTIC—You may not know it, but you've been hearing studio and stage guitar virtuoso Jackson for some time now, he's played on mega hits by artists from Whitney Houston to Michael Jackson to Anita Baker. The title cut features brightly shining sax man Gerald Albright and George Duke. Also check the cover of Janet Jackson's "Let's Wait Awhile."

GEOFFREY WILLIAMS—HEROES, SPIES AND GYPSIES—ATLANTIC—Geoffrey has a great feel for the R&B mode on this nice debut effort. The first single "There's A Need In Me" is beginning to roll with radio adds starting to come into our reporting stations. Look for the self-penned cuts "Cinderella" and "Just For You" to bust out as well.

CINEMA—WRONG HOUSE—A&M—Cinema has the right idea. As the Rap music machine continues to bulldoze its way into the American mainstream, the group mixes those sensibilities with the R&B base. Our favorite jams are "Cinema 6" and the shockin' lowdown and nasty electro funker "Ribbon Street." The title cut is a formidable funker, too! Fresh, fresh style!!!



PAUL JACKSON, JR.:

From Studio to Stardom

he name Paul Jackson, Jr. is a familiar one to industry folk and inveterate readers of liner notes. One of the most recorded studio guitarists in the music world, Jackson's debut solo LP, I Came to Play, shows why this diminutive, L.A.-based musician has been in demand with everyone from Quincy Jones and Ella Fitzgerald to George Benson and Whitney Houston.

"I came along at a time when guys like Ray Parker, Jr. and Lee Ritenour had stopped doing studio session work and were starting their own solo careers," said Jackson over lunch in West Hollywood. "There was a void for rhythm guitarists and I was there to fill it. I've been very blessed."

Particularly noted for playing that stinging guitar break in Michael Jackson's classic 1980 rock hit, "Heartbreak Hotel," Jackson's own LP covers a broad spectrum, including rap ("To the Curb"), funk ("I Came to Play"), dreamy R&B/pop balladry ("Lost and Never Found," featuring vocalist O'Bryan) Jimi Hendrix-like rock ("Straight From the Heart") and gospel ("Great Is Thy Faithfulness").

"I may get categorized as a jazz musician simply because I'm strictly an instrumentalist. I don't sing," said Jackson. "But it would be hard for anyone to listen to my LP and pigeonhole me into any one category."

One of his favorite tracks on the LP is his cover of Janet Jackson's "Let's Wait Awhile." Said Jackson: "I always liked the message of that song. It reminds me of the peer pressure that high school kids face—that 'man, did you get over with her?' mentality. The world would be a better place if people didn't rush blindly into situations they aren't prepared to handle."

While he currently has no live dates scheduled, Jackson is in the midst of assembling a band: "I'm gonna have a seven-piece band to ensure that we can duplicate the sound of the LP." Jackson, who co-produced the LP with his old high school buddy Cornelius Mims (of the group Tease), writes most of his own

material. His songwriting credits also include Jermaine Jackson's last Motown hit, "Let Me Tickle Your Fancy" and "Maria," a cut to be included on The Jackson's upcoming LP.

Listing his musical heroes as George Benson, Earl Klugh, Lee Ritenour, Ray Parker, Jr. and Al McKay, he added, "Probably the biggest highlight of my career, aside from having my solo deal with Atlantic, is that I've recorded with all of them."

Some of the other artists Jackson has worked with include the following.

Michael Jackson/Quincy Jones: "They are totally organ zed; both of them do their homework before they even hit the studio. Michael always knows what he wants—I played that solo on 'Heartbreak Hotel' exactly the way he sang

it to me. And working on the *Thriller LP* was great in that Quincy is a believer in giving a musician creative freedom."

Ella Fitzgerald: "I worked with her and (producer) Joe Pass on some Brazilian tunes. I didn't really get a chance to talk to her a lot, but it was an honor just to be in the studio with her."

Anita Baker: "She's a nice lady, very refreshing both as a person and an artist. I worked on her *Songstress* LP and don't remember her having a lot of input, other than vocals, on that project. I like that she had the last laugh on a lot of record company executives who told her that her style was 'too antiquated' to be commercial. She proved them wrong."


Whitney Houston: "It was very hard to concentrate when I worked on her first LP because I just kept thinking, 'my God, this woman can really sing.' She is genuinely warm, genuinely talented."

Kenny Rogers: "It's interesting to me that a man that wealthy and musically gifted can be so humble. He will let you take an idea and run with it. That's a great quality."

Describing himself as a family man (he and his wife are expecting their first child) and a born again Christian for the past 10 years, Jackson attributes the success he's had thus far in the music business to preparedness. As an example, he told a story of being in a movie theatre line one night with Ray Parker, Jr. when a young man introduced himself to them as an aspiring songwriter.

"Ray said, 'oh yeah, well, I'm looking for material for my new LP. Do you have a tape on you?' The guy hemmed and hawed and said no. Ray looked at me and said, 'the guy's not ready.' When we got inside the theatre, it turned out we were sitting right in front of Christopher Cross.

"I turned to the young guy and said: 'here you are sitting next to Ray Parker, Jr. AND Christopher Cross and you don't have a tape on you?' The guy was sick. How often does an opportunity like that occur? If you're not prepared, you'll never make it."



Black Brits Export Hot Sounds Part Two

EDITOR'S NOTE: In the concluding article, socio-political and other factors influencing the unique character and diversity of Black British music are explored.

Race and other sociopolitical issues are subjects addressed directly in the music of some black British artists. Many of them are first generation Britons, the children of Caribbeans who emigrated to the United Kingdom in the mid-50's and early '60s. Like America, England suffers its share of racial tension. The black communities of England are generally poor ones and one of them-Brixton-was the scene of a riot that erupted in 1981. An LP that addressed the Brixton riot was the 1984 Making History by Linton Kwesi Johnson. Similar in style to Gil Scott-Heron and the Last Poets, Johnson writes "dub poetry"-poetry with a builtin reggae rhythm-and while he has recorded several LPs the best introduction for the uninitated is the 1980 Bass Culture.

Its tracks include "Inglan Is A Bitch," told from the viewpoint of an emigrant who came to what he envisioned as the land of promise, only to find himself drowning in the cheap labor pool, "Loraine" is a drylystated love appeal, "Di Black Petty Booshwah" is a withering indictment of black aspirants to the middle-class. All in all, Bass Culture offers a fascinating look at British life from a black Briton perspective.

Steel Pulse is also one of Britain's leading reggae exponents, a group that attracted a huge following in 1977 when it performed for punk audiences at London's Vortex club. The group's targets have included everything from the Ku Klux Klan to abortion. Whereas reggae—not unlike punk and rap—tends to be music best appreciated from an insider's vantage point, it is possible to appreciate reggae's hypnotic rhythms without embracing all of its ideology.



Steel Pulse

One of Steel Pulse's most accessible LPs is the 1984 Earth Crisis. It's worth a listen due to tracks that contain typically seductive dance rhythms "Steppin' Out", a witty depiction of attempted musical thievery (Rollerskates") and a bemused look at politician protection "Bodyguard". British reggae, once considered tepid fare compared to the reggae of Jamaica, has gained weight and credibility due to artists such as Steel Pulse and Linton Kwesi Johnson.

Black Britain (whose 1987 debut LP, Obvious, was an often brilliant concoction of politically-oriented dance music) writes songs that tackle social and survivalist concerns. Not surprising, perhaps, the group is proving to be a tough sell according to Jeff Forman, Virgin Records' director of A & R.

Forman, based in the label's New York office, said: "Black Britain is trying to forge a new direction for itself and what it's doing,

musically, is original. But it is easier (to market) a group like Loose Ends who also bring something new to the arena, but do it in a way that American audiences are more receptive to."

While many artists shun controversial topics in fear of alienating audiences, some, like the inter-racial vocal trio *The Christians*, manage to convey socio-political messages in an eminently commercial manner. The group's debut LP, The Christians, entered the British charts at No.2, making it the fastest selling debut record in Island Records' history.

Singing gorgeously harmonized songs that are a mixture of Sam Cooke and the Persuasions, The Christians' debut LP contains cuts like "Hooverville," a tale of an emigrant's journey to a falsely-advertised land of opportunity: "They promised us the world/And they promised us a roof o'er our heads/ And like fools we believed every last word they said."

While The Christians enjoy success in the U. K., the interracial vocal trio Working Week (vocally fronted by the soulful Juliet Roberts) has recorded two LPs, Working Nights and Companeros, that earned critical favor, but didn't sell hugely. The group's difficulty in getting airplay was the cause, according to Virgin's Richard Griffin: "In America, you can break a record in Boston, Miami, New York. There are so many outlets. In England, it's hard to develop a group if there's no immediate (radio) reaction."

The group's third LP, Surrender, may be the one to break them in their own country and here in the States. Formerly jazz-oriented, Working Week turned to New York-based producer Carl Beatty (past credits: Luther Vandross and George Benson) to help them derive at a sound that is polished, contemporary and mostly R & B in flavor. One of the


LARRY DAVIS:

"Around the office," says Davis, "we believe that E/P/A also stands for 'energy, promotion and attention.' As long as I remember those three words, I can handle anything that comes my way."

And a lot comes Davis' way in his new job. In addition to Michael Jackson, Cyndi Lauper, Tony Terry, James Brown, Luther Vandross,

Alexander O'Neal, Sade and Teena Marie, Davis is charged with promoting the fortunes of Gregory Hines, Mtume, Nicole, Tease, Kid Flash, Cherrelle,

Chris Jasper, Paul Johnson, Charles Singleton, Krystol, S.O.S., Tawatha, the Miami Sound Machine, the Jacksons and Poland's first and only international pop singer, Basia.

How did this man come to have this much weight on his shoulders?

The oldest of six children, Davis is originally from the Biloxi-Gulfport area of Mississippi. He remembers his mother as the "rock of the family," raising her brood deep in the seam of "the Christian tradition." Some of Davis' earliest musical memories come from listening to the all-night "Randy's Record Show" on Nashville's powerful WLAC, as well as Country & Western tunes from the same city.

Beginning in his high school days, when most other guys his age were either "pattin' the pill" or "chasin' foxes," Davis was spending most of his spare time hanging out at the local radio stations. The people at the stations enjoyed Davis' enthusiasm. Because of them. Davis learned how to handle the stations' boards and was soon deejaying on-air, as

A mover-and-shaker in other areas, too, Davis began to lobby for a Black History Club at his school. It wasn't long before there was one, founded and led by Davis, at the 85 percent White institution.

By 1975, the year he entered Altanta's Morehouse University, Davis was a confirmed media freak. He enrolled in the school's mass communications department, with an emphasis on film. Among his classmates that year were Martin Luther King III and Spike Lee. In addition to his full-time academic schedule, Davis soon found his way to the campus radio station-WAUC-and got a job there as a late night deejay. "I called the show 'Music for Lovers Only' and patterned it after a hot Atlanta jock at the time, 'Dr. Feel Good' (Marcus Boyd), at WAOK.



WAUC, which serves the six institutions of higher learning that comprise the Atlanta University Center—Morehouse, Atlanta University, Spellman, Morris Brown, Clark and the Interdenominational Theology Center—was an ideal spot for Davis to broaden both his broadcasting perspective and technique. The multi-campus complex demanded the best from its student broadcasters...or else.

Together with Lo Jelks, WAUC's owner, Davis founded the Black College Radio Association. "I got the idea in 1978," says Davis. "After I attended the BRE and Jack-the-Rapper conventions that year, I felt there was a dire need for an association composed of all the radio stations on Black college and university campuses across the country."

Today, thanks in large part to its first president, the firmly grounded organization does indeed count within its membership representatives from every radio station affiliated with an historically Black higher education institution in the United States.

After graduating in 1979, Davis was hired as the southeast regional promotion director for LAX Records, a division of Far Out Productions. The MCA-distributed label went out of business a year later and with it, of course, went Davis' gig. "I was very disillusioned with the whole business at that point," says Davis. "I had worked my tail off and the whole thing caved in anyway."

For the young college graduate, it was a time of career re-evaluation. "I wanted to do anything else," Davis remembers. "I sold cars, I worked in personnel management, I was a consultant to Black college radio..."

But Davis could ignore his calling but so long. In August of 1981, he was hired by Jerry Brackenridge at Capitol Records' Atlanta office to be the label's southeast regional sales manager. He stayed there for the next five years, not only firming up his knowledge of the industry but his resolve to survive whatever the business could throw at him from then on.


Davis then moved on the CBS Records—relocating to Washington, D.C. and becoming that company's regional promotion manager for E/P/A.

At CBS' 1987 international convention in Vancouver, B.C., Davis was the recipient of the firm's coveted "Promotion Man of the Year" award. Presenting him with the honor was E/P/A vice president Don Eason. At that point, Davis remembers, Walter Yetnikoff, CBS'

board chairman, told him: "Larry, you're going to New York."

New York City, as Davis knew only too well, was CBS' corporate head-quarters. And, as Yetnikoff had predicted, Eason approached him before the end of the convention and offered him the position within the company which he now holds. "I was not certain I was ready, either for New York or all that responsibility," Davis says now. "Oh, I knew I was good at what I was doing, but the workload in the new job, I also knew, was going to be double, triple, quadruple...."

Davis agreed to go anyway, and the rest is history. "Changes were going on aplenty in the upper echelon at E/P/A at the time," says Davis. "In A&R, Bernie Miller was brought in as v.p. for Black

Music. Don Grierson, formerly at Capitol, was brought in as senior v.p. for A&R. Jim Capparro, my old sales manager in D.C., was the new v.p. of sales. And Don Eason was named v.p. over the division. At E/P/A, they called this group the 'hired assassins'—a young, energetic, poised, knowledgeable group of 'hitmen and -women.'"

When Davis came on board, he found the atmosphere tough but stimulating. "Within the company," says Davis, "the branches are competitive but supportive. My counterpart over at Columbia, Eddie Pugh, is not hesitant to share his wisdom, as well as real friendship."

Likewise, says Davis, Epic's senior v.p. and g.m., Ray Anderson, has utmost confidence in the Black management division at E/P/A. "He gives us the

guidance and the ammo to go out each week and do our jobs as hitmen," says Davis. "And this unique group of assassins is not for hire to anyone else."

Such loyalty and dedication to the job. says Davis, comes first and foremost from his immediate boss, Don Eason. "Don is very perceptive," says Davis. "His awareness is particularly sharp regarding the elements of the street that he brings into the working environment: in other words, he never forgets where the music, the feeling, originally comes from. And, rather than being intimidated by his younger, aggressive staff, he augments our roles with a clear perspective on how the business worksand has worked—before most of us got here. He gives us a knowledge of the past, and we give him tomorrow."

And Eason reciprocates in superlatives: "Around the Epic offices, Larry and I are known as 'Double Trouble.' He's not only my 'right-hand man,' he's my 'left-hand man,' as well; I couldn't find a better support mechanism... The charts speak for themselves: Together, he and I have had more Number 1 hits than any twosome in the company's history. And Larry's not just a colleague, he's more like a little brother."

Today, Davis directs his staff with nonstop enthusiasm. He and his team formulate the marketing and promotional strategy for more than 20 super acts. All day, he is on the phone with his field staffers, staging chart moves, identifying priority records, getting the input from Black radio, monitoring record store sales patterns, general market activity and company commitment around the nation. In addition, he spends much time in A&R with Bernie Miller, deciding which singles to highlight, what the remixes should sound like, what new artists to sign, and the like.

"How do we do it all?" Davis asks with a grin. "We take our cue from a cut on the Jacksons' newest LP: There's definitely 'An Art to the Madness..."

The day this interview was conducted in Los Angeles, Davis wondered aloud whether his superiors back in New York would be upset that Michael Jackson's "Man In The Mirror" had only managed to capture the Number 2 spot on the charts. After thinking about it a bit longer, he decided that things weren't so bad, after all. "I guess they won't mind," said Davis, "since Tony Terry's 'Lovey Dovey' only beat Michael out by a slim margin."

No, that shouldn't be too hard to take back in E/P/A's New York offices.

Rhone Named Sr. VP At Atlantic

NEW YORK: Sylvia Rhone has been promoted to senior vice president of Atlantic Records, announced the label's vice chairman Shelton Vogel. With this new appointment, Rhone joins the company's senior executive staff.

Atlantic chairman Ahmet M. Ertegun noted: "Since joining the Atlantic family less than three years ago, Sylvia has proved to be a tremendously valuable member of our executive team. Under her expert guidance, our commitment to black music has seen a revitalization marked by innovation, imagination and freshness. This is a well-deserved promotion for a most gifted woman."

Added Atlantic president Doug Morris: "Her recent success with such artists as LeVert, The System, Miki Howard, Gerald Albright and others heralds the beginning of a new wave of Atlantic achievements in black music, with artist development as the keystone."

In an interview with BRE, Rhone said, "It's always a great honor to be recognized for one's accomplishments. I'd like to think that (my promotion) paves the way for other women because there is a tremendous



bank of talented women in the music industry today." Rhone credits her success as a record executive to several factors. "Firstly, this is a job I love and one that I work very hard at," she said.

"I'm very fortunate to have an extremely dedicated, loyal and talented staff, plus the support of Atlantic Records. That's very important. Combined with those ingredients is an exceptional roster of artists. Taken altogether, this is (the kind of) teamwork that produces success."

When Rhone became vice president/general manager of

black music operations for Atlantic Records in 1986—after having joined the company in June 1985 as director of national black music promotion—her biggest challenge at that time, she said "was to direct my energies toward revitalizing the roster, along with providing a creative atmosphere in which artists could grow."

Rhone's first signings were Gerald Albright and Paul Jackson, Jr., and she was involved in the pacting of First Priority, a rap label. "We've just scratched the surface; our potential is limitless," she said. Other Rhone signings included New York band Evon Jeffries and the Stand.

First releases from First Priority are due shortly and Rhone said she regards the venture as "our opportunity to test the waters with street rap. Our future plans are definitely geared toward balancing the roster with younger acts. We also want to beef up the jazz roster while continuing to look for both new and established acts of merit."

In conclusion, Rhone noted that Atlantic intends to "focus on finding what I call 'cutting edge' producers and writers."

It is a monthly press conference hosted by CABJ in which Mayor Sawyer takes a battery of questions from Blacks in radio, TV, and the print media. Questions from the listening audience are also fielded on the program which is aired on other Black radio stations simultaneously.

Chicago listeners are becoming confused as they listen to Chicago radio and call WGCI when they hear a Michael Jackson song. The problem is that when they hear one of Mike's tunes they are not listening to WGCI, but to another station. When Mike's records are played on GCI listeners are supposed to call in and win a free ticket to the Michael Jackson concert. WGCI is supposed to be the only radio station in town with free tickets to the Jackson concert.

Since **Dee Hanley** quit WLNR as PD, the sound has not been as soft. LNR was built on the "Soft Touch" sound, but lately they have been a little hard. I understand that Dee resigned because of a conflict with new sales manager Ray Hawkins. It seems that Hawkins was making programming decisions. A sales manager in programming? That's a new one on me. This bears further investigation.

I understand that the BMA meetings here in Chicago are becoming a battleground for record entrepreneurs against local radio stations. This also warrants investigation.

The biggest story this week is the return of Boogie Down Productions to the Rap arena. Busting out on big-time Rap label Jive/RCA, rhymer KRS-One moves ahead, despite the tragic death of BDP mix-master DJ Scott La Rock. KRS's eloquent, poetic style shows a depth of artistry and integrity that leaves him several cuts above the closest competition. The first single from the group's eagerly awaited second LP, By All Means Necessary is the funky groove titled "My Philosophy," a cut that is receiving immediate out-of-the-box adds. The LP is sure to engender several hot radio cuts. "I'm Still #1" lets us know who is "down" with the BDP posse, while "Part Time Suckers" makes a point of dissing those weak weekend rappers. BDP's first album Criminal Minded is moments away from Gold record status, and will surely go down as one of the best Rap albums ever recorded...B-Boy Records, the label that launched BDP, has several new releases this week, the strongest being J.V.C.F.O.R.C.E.'s happenin' jam "Strong Island," a killer mix of soul horn riffs, a buzzy guitar riff and rhymes toasting the group's home turf of Long Island. Grandmaster Flash associate Shame moves out on his own with the B-Boy cut "When Can I See You" and the Wacky Rapper uses Bob Marley riffs and Jamaican toasting on "Rub-N-Dub." B-Boy owner Bill Kamara says that Rap is "a whole separate form of expression. The best Disco producer in the world can't necessarily produce Rap, that's how different it is." In 1975 WKYS was the first Disco formatted station in the country. During its first season the station came in number three in the market. After a few sagging rating periods, WKYS faded. It was at the down period that Donnie Simpson joined the staff as program director.

At the helm of WKYS for the past nine years, Detroiter Simpson is probably the most visible air personality in the country today because of his daily national exposure as the popular host of Black Entertainment Television's "Video Soul."

According to Donnie, "I came in after the station's initial success. WHUR had a fairly good Jazz format. We were in 16th place in 1979. The station had a 1.9 share period with a 5.0 share, and that's when I came on board. I changed what's now called Urban Contemporary to Dis 'n' Dat (some of this some of that)."

The station went from a 1.9 to a 3.4 in the first book and then from a 3.4 to a 4.6 in the next. "We went up progressively and rapidly. In a year's time the station went to number one. Our ratings have been

as high as 10.4. I believe we've had more number one finishes," adds Simpson.

With a 6.5 share, WKYS is presently in the number three spot in the market, according to results of the Fall ARBitron, WGAY, an Easy Listening station, came in first place with a 7.4 share and WMZQ-FM with a 7.1 share. Within the format. **WHUR** finished the ratina WDJY with a 3.6 and WOL with a 1.7.

"The trends have been good. There's no doubt that 93KYS will be number one again. The 18-49 demographics are the ones we go after. Without a doubt this station is the leader in our format. It's a four thoroughbred race and we're looking to come out on top," says Simpson.



Now that we've looked at some budget boards and tape machines, we arrive at part three of our mini-series on building a multi-track production studio without putting the general manager into intensive care.

MICROPHONES

A good rule to follow is to have the same type of microphone in both the production and the air studios. Your overall air sound will be more professional when there's no change in sound quality between live and carted material.

Another important rule is to always use a shock mount on the mike. Motors in cart machines, and tape decks have a habit of radiating through the cabinetry—causing an annoying rumble through the mike.

Of course we all would love to have a Neumann, but unless you have an almost acoustically perfect studio, a mike of that caliber could hurt you more than it could help. Try several different mikes to find one that fits the acoustics in your studio. Most distributors will let you try mikes before purchase.

For average studio acoustics I recommend these three mikes:

- 1. Sennheiser, Model MD421-U (approx. \$400)
- 2. Sure, Model SM5B (approx. \$550 with built in shock mount)
- 3. Electrovoice, Model RE-20 (approx \$550)

SPEAKERS

I have found that recommending speakers can get you into a fist fight. There are so many variables. The room acoustics and the location of the speaker in the room can make the same system sound different. One thing to keep in mind is that you do not need a 15-inch speaker system in a 10×10 foot studio. Overkill can cause problems.

When evaluating to a speaker system, I listen for three things. One, does the bass sound solid, or does it sound like someone trying to beat his way out of the cabinet. Two, the human voice should sound natural and not mechanical. Three, cymbals should be clear, and not sound like milk bottles breaking on the front steps.

I'll stick my neck out and recommend what I feel are good radio studio monitors.

- 1. JBL 4406, 4408, 4410 Monitors—from \$200 to \$400 per speaker.
- 2. Electro-Voice Sentury 100A, or 100EL—from \$300 to \$600 per speaker.

POWER AMPS

There are more power amps on the market than Japan has micro-chips! As in speakers, do not overkill. Putting a 3 or 4 hundred watt power amp in a radio studio is a waste of money and power. Through personal experience I find the Crown D-75 to be a clean and

efficient unit for our needs. It's 35 watts per channel—both balanced and unbalanced inputs—and only takes 134 inches of rack space. The crown D-75 sells for around \$525

THE SISTERS LOVE STILL LOVING THE MUSIC BUSINESS

The 1971 record "Are You Lonely" was a unique, soulful ballad that became a top twenty hit on A&M Records. It was the only release on that label for Sisters Love: "They didn't know what to do with us,", explained Jeannie Long, former member. "There wasn't a serious marketing plan to support the Sisters Love."

The members of the hard-singing soulful unit included Vermettya Royster, formerly with the original Clara Ward Singers and the Ikettes. (Royster did most of Sister Loves' leads.) There was Jeannie Long, now working with H.B. Barnum Productions and Marlenna Shaw. The other two members were Lillian Forte and Gwen Berry. It was Forte who sang "Crying Time" with Ray Charles in 1966. Currently she is an engineer data analyst for TRW. Gwen Berry has relocated to Washington, D.C.

The man who brought "Are You Lonely" to the Sisters Love was the "Duke of Earl" himself, Gene Chandler. He also produced the song.

According to Vermettya, she was asked by Chandler if she had ever been lonely when he approached the group about recording that tune. Vermettya recalled that she'd once been locked in an apartment for a few days with no

telephone, no television and no one to speak with. So, drawing upon the emotions of that experience, she went into the studio and cut a hit for A&M Records.

Following the group's release from A&M Records, the ladies went to Motown. They all signed a Motown contract, except for Royster. Sisters Love toured with the Jacksons and appeared in the motion picture "The Mack." Plus, there was a Motown release that showed some sufficient action entitled "Mr. Fix Man."

Forte is originally from Memphis; Berry, a cousin of the Isley Brothers, was born in Cincinnati; Royster was born and raised in Jacksonville, Florida; Jeannie Long is from the great state of Wisconsin.

All the ladies were and still are very spiritual. "We would pray before each performance and rehearsal," said Long. So I asked her, if you prayed together, why didn't you stay together? She explained: "There were too many chiefs and not enough indians." (I guess that's one of the key reasons why so many groups break up!)

While talking with Long at BRE she added that she can survive in the music industry because of her current involvement with Venture Records. "I pretty much know this business of music. When we were singing they didn't tell us anything. We just sang and that was it." She suggested that every young artist should take time to learn the business of the industry in order to survive.

From the gospel hot line in Los Angeles, "The Empress of Song" Vermettya Royster is the most inspirational solo gospel singer in Southern California. Still active as a solo artist, she's now in the studio preparing for a new LP release. At the end of our interview I asked her, Can you still do it?

"I can still do it, if given the opportunity," she replied. "I will and I shall do it." She still has the spirit...and she's powerful!

Marsalis Sets Grammy Record

NEW YORK: Trumpeter Wynton Marsalis took home his eighth career Grammy when "Marsalis Standard Time—Vol. 1" won the 1987 "Best Jazz Instrumental Performance, Group" award. The honor made Marsalis the only artist—in any category—to win Grammys the last five consecutive years, and the first Jazz artist to win Grammys five years running.

"Standard Time," Marsalis' sixth album, was also nominated for "Best Jazz Instrumental Performance, Soloist." In the Classical field, his "Carnaval" album, recorded with the Eastman Wind Ensemble) also earned him a Grammy nomination for "Instrumental Soloist with Orchestra." Marsalis' total combined nominations in the Jazz and Classical fields now total 18.

The prolific brassman's next release will be double-LP recorded **live** at Blues Alley in Washington, D.C. As with the previous albums, it will be under the aegis of Columbia Records.

Gil Evans Dies In Mexico

GUERNAVACA, MEXICO: Legendary arranger Gil Evans, 75, died March 20, of peritonitis while recuperating from prostrate surgery.

Evans' most enduring legacy will undoubtedly be the three richly-hued LPs he made showcasing the melodic trumpet of Miles Davis—Miles Ahead, Porgy and Bess and Sketches of Spain—in the late '50s/early

'60s. Other major recordings include Out of the Cool and Into the Hot using the talents of a host of top-ranked jazz sidemen.

An upcoming tour of northern Europe by Evans' orchestra, plus appearances at Jazz fests in Umbria, Italy, and New York City will proceed as scheduled, according to Anita Evans, the arranger's widow. She says the band will be led by Miles Evans, the couple's son.

"Bird" Cinebio Set For Summer Release

HOLLYWOOD, CA: Actorproducer-director Clint Eastwood's filmed biography on alto saxophonist Charlie Parker is now in post-production and scheduled for July release. Actor Forrest Whittaker ("Platoon," "The Color Of Money") plays Parker and trumpeter Jon Faddis makes his celluloid debut as Dizzy Gillespie. Trumpeter Red Rodney, a contemporary of the altoist's, plays Gillespie's musical lines in the film but, since Eastwood felt that—living or dead—no one ever had emulated the inimitable "Bird's" sound, Parker's saxophonics will be performed by the master himself: Engineers have isolated Parker's horn lines from the ensemble work on his recordings classic upgraded the fidelity, using state-of-the-art digital techniques. According to Rodney, the results sounded eerily as if Bird were "playing today."

"Mingus' Man," Dannie Richmond Dies In NYC

NEW YORK: Drummer Dannie Richmond, 52, best known for his work with the late bassist Charles Mingus, died suddenly of a heart attack, March 16, in New York City. Of late, Richmond's most notable work had been heard in the Don Pulen-George Adams Quartet and, occasionally on tour with Mingus Dynasty.


CONCERT REVIEW



most effective cuts on the LP is "The Doctor," a gospel tribute Roberts wrote honoring Dr. Martin Luther King, Ir.

While Working Week has resisted being called a "jazz revitalist," 23-yearold Courtney Pine is the personification of the term. Equally adept on the saxophone, clarinet and flute, Pine is already being likened to Wynton Marsalis. But where Marsalis is all cool intellect and proficiency, Pine's playing is infused with warmth. In 1986, with the release of his debut LP Journey to the Urge Within, he became the first British jazz musician to crack the Top 40 in the U. K. Two tracks on that LP, "As We Would Say" and "C. G. C." are bright, well-sculpted pieces of music on which he blows bass clarinet, while "Children of the Ghetto"-which features American pop/soul singer Susaye Green flinging her soprano up into the stratosphere—is another earthy delight.


Pine is one of the founding members of The Jazz Warriors, a 20-piece band whose debut LP last year, Out of Many, One People, brims over with improvisational, freebop passion. Stand-out tracks include "In Reference To Our Forefathers' Dreams" and "Many Pauses," both of which are experimental jazz renderings with African inflections.

Pine and the Jazz Warriors are making young man's jazz veterans Art Blakey & the Jazz Messengers, has referred to his style as "Afro-classical music" and is getting famous for his fiery solos. The Jazz Warriors-featuring a sinuous, Bobby McFerrin-ish vocalist named Cleveland Watkiss—draw inspiration from the music of Africa, the Carribean and America to arrive at something that musically reflects its own world view.






