JESSE JACKSON AND THE BLACK BASE—POWER FROM THE PEOPLE



s these reflections are being written, it is the morning after the pivotal New York Primary election. Preliminary returns available at press time indicate that Jesse Jackson has garnered a super-impressive 97% of the Black Democratic vote in the state-while amassing a thoroughly respectable 37% of the overall tally.

Headlines will boldly record that Rev. Jackson trailed Gov. Michael Dukakis of Massachusetts, the odds-on favorite, by just 13%. And lest we forget, Jesse Jackson also managed to best the other remaining Democratic contender, Sen. Albert Gore, Jr. of Tennessee. Some even attribute Gore's relatively poor showing in part to an endorsement by powerful New York Mayor Ed Koch, whose vicious character assassination was the worst encountered to date by the nation's first viable Black presidential candidate.

But my point here is not just to add another voice filled with awe and pride at this accomplishment. More importantly, I want to draw a parallel which is particularly important to those of us in an industry where the same Black base which is daily catapulting the Jackson candidacy into the textbooks is being diminished as "irrelevant" to mainstream success.

Yes, we live in an era of "Urban" radio-of "Crossover" product and artists who melt into such euphemistic categories as "Pop-Soul" and other attempts to dilute the cultural and salesbase of Black music.

I have even been told that the name of this publication, BlackRadio Exclusive, is now outmoded and actually counterproductive to our growth and survival in the new "mainsstream" climate. We are even instructed by some colleagues that there is no research validity in "segregating" the charting of R&B airplay to Black stations.

Well, my answer is simply that this publication was created more than a decade ago to provide a voice and a medium of self-evaluation for Black

Radio-as well as specialized data regarding the performance on Black music on its Black Radio breaker base for the record industry. That mission remains as valid today as it was then.

So it is particularly appropriate that we chose as our theme for BRE Conference '88: BLACK RADIO-BROAD-ENING THE BLACK BASE. In this connection, the participation of California State Assembly Speaker Willie Brown, Jr., national chairman of Jesse Jackson's 1988 Presidential Campaign. as our keynote speaker this year also takes on special significance.

In our view, broadening the increasingly neglected Black base has never been more important to our political and professional survival as a people. If it's good enough for Jesse, then it's good enough for Black Radio Exclusive, And for all of those who share a fundamental understanding of the reality that the whole is always enhanced by the uniqueness and diversity of its parts.




ALEXANDER O'NEAL THE LOVERS TABU

As "on the tip" as the landmark LP Future Shock was in 1984, this album is definitely gonna be house music around our crib! 

IMPORTANT RECORDS

SINGLES

PRINCE—ALPHABET ST.—PAISLEY PARK—Here's the widely touted release from the new *Lovesexy* album, a typically sparse groove with heavy funk and classic R&B overtones. Just fresh out of the box, the song is seeing developing add action in all the markets.

THE BROTHERS JOHNSON—KICK IT TO THE CURB—A&M—Brother George Johnson teamed up with Irene Cara to pen this slam jam from the funkmaster duo. Pouring on the heavy dance sensibilities mix-wise, the cut features a melody and arrangement that rival that of the group's best hitmaking days.



STACY LATTISAW—LET ME TAKE YOU DOWN—MOTOWN—Stacy throws restraint to the winds on this heavily added production from the *Personal Attention* album, and the result is a powerfully moving ballad that has her stretching out for an intensely soulful performance. Moving up in a big way, the song was produced and written by Lou Pace.



ADA DYER—MEANT TO BE—MOTOWN—Y'all are familiar with the crankin' hit "I Bet I'll Let Ya" a kind of holdover sleeper hit originally released last year and just now seeing the explosive radio action it deserves. LA and Babyface get songwriting credit on two cuts, "I Don't Feel Like Crying" and "Lifetime Warranty" while the entire record was produced by James Anthony Carmichael.

TRACY CHAPMAN—TRACY CHAPMAN—ELEKTRA—Tracy is a serious solo artist who on the cut "Fast Car" finds herself and her acoustic guitar enough to tackle social issues and just plain old reality with a gritty sense of realism. Featuring cuts like "Fast Car," "Talkin' Bout A Revolution" and "Baby Can | Hold You" the album contains some eighties style Folk for the folks as well as Rock and R&B flavorings.

MAGIC LADY—MAGIC LADY—MOTOWN—Just jumping off initially from this new group's album is the hotly received radio pick "Betcha Can't Lose (With My Love)." Michael Stokes produces the LP, adding saxophone super talent Gerald Albright to the studio crew.







Kickin' Back To The Top

irst the bad news: For four long years their loyal fans heard little or nothing from the Brothers Johnson. Now the good news: The dynamic duo has just blasted back on the music scene with their eighth album for A&M Records, packed with sensational sounds that really kick from first cut to final groove. In fact, that's the title of the LP—Kickin'.

And there's even more good news: Their music is just as funky as it was when Quincy Jones first brought the swinging soul siblings into the fold at A&M back in '76. One listen to the lead tune, "Kick It To The Curb," is proof positive that George and Louis Johnson didn't spend the intervening years wasting time or talent; they picked up precisely where they left off in '84 with their last collaboration in Out of Control.

The favorite track of both men is the first single, "Kick It To The Curb." George wrote it together with singer/actress Irene Cara, who moved from the Big Apple to the West Coast. This collaboration is an excellent example of what George and Louis have been up to these past four years; they've both expanded their horizons and delved deep into other areas of music.

Above all, the Johnsons' interests and activities point up the fact that although they are brothers they are NOT twins. Guitarist George ("Lightning Licks") is two years older than bassist Louis ("Thunder Thumbs").

George digs the excitement and the creative atmosphere of Hollywood, while Louis prefers the family life he enjoys in a suburb of Los Angeles with his wife and children.

The Brothers agree that during their hiatus from performing they "went back to reality." After all, they had begun their rocket ride to stardom when they were barely out of their teens—a critical stage of life when sudden fame and fortune often prove to be hazardous to the health and happiness of naive youngsters.

George and Louis added their older brother Tommy, a drummer, and cousin Alex Weir, another guitarist, and performed at local parties and school affairs as the Johnson 3+1. After winning a Soul Search contest on radio station KGFJ in 1968, they cut a single and then moved up as lead act on the bill with established stars such as the Supremes, Bobby Womack and David Ruffin.

Three months after starting college in '71, George met Billy Preston, who signed him on immediately for a European tour. When Preston's bass man quit, Louis took over the slot and the brothers were on the road for a year.

Then they met Quincy Jones—"He's our mentor," explains George-and the rest is history.

Jones arranged and introduced their hit debut album, Look Out For #1, and it was "Q" who encouraged his proteges to chill out for a while and get themselves together when personal problems began to drain energy and obscure goals.

Louis plunged into session work, playing for Michael Jackson, Aretha Franklin, Stevie Nicks, and with Paul McCartney in the film, "Give My Regards To Broad Street." He put together a "Star Licks" how-to video for bass players, and also taught at schools like Bass Institute of Technology in L.A.

George recalls the pleasure of "getting my chops together technically, in the studio, as well as in terms of songwriting and arranging. The time off left me a lot of room to woodshed and to spend some time with my family." And he teamed up with Quincy to record a single, "Back Against The Wall."

Forces involved in the Brothers' reentry into the record world as a duo are the dynamic management of Steven Machat, who expresses confidence in their ability to return to the pop/funk forefront, and John McClain (A&M's senior vice president of A&R, and executive vice president and general manager of the urban department) who acted as executive producer of Kickin'.

Louis waves aside the notion that there was ever any possibility of the team breaking up. "Not as long as we're still brothers and we're still kicking! There were some family matters that had to be attended to, so we struck out on our own; now we're back together.'

Adds George, "I think the time is right for us to return."

DIANNE REEVES WOWS NEW YORK—"BOTTOM LINE"

IN NEW YORK: Throughout the years there have been great jazz vocalists such as Ella Fitzgerald, Sarah Vaughan, Marlena Shaw, Carmen McRae and Nancy Wilson. These ladies possess the prerequisite tools and raw materials—range, control, unique phrasing and improvisation—which have enabled jazz to transcend one stylistic era to the next

Jazz music has weathered the storm and since the advent of a new school of artists such as Wynton Marsalis, Gerald Albright, Miles Jaye, Sade, Anita Baker, Full Circle and Branford Marsalis, jazz music seems to be enjoying a rebirth of sorts. One new school artist who has weathered the storm and who is demanding her place in American jazz history is Dianne Reeves.

I recently had the distinct pleasure of witnessing Dianne Reeves in concert at The Bottom Line Cabaret, an old New York music landmark. The Blue Note artist's performance was par excellence! It was intimate, it was personable and after an evening with Dianne Reeves, if you weren't a jazz aficionado, she converted you—forever.

It was SRO. The audience was surprisingly young, ranging in age from 21-50. It wasn't just young "yuppies" and "buppies," but appeared to be a mixture transcending all economic and racial barriers.

The house lights dimmed and there was a moment of silent anticipation. Everyone knew that something special was about to happen. But what? Then one could hear the distant sounds of African drum beats that eventually evolved into a full Motherland crescendo.

The excitement mounted steadily. The lights came up and standing center-stage dressed in earth browns with a marcelled coiffure was her majesty Dianne Reeves—as regal as an African high priestess. She tossed her head back and like the pro that she is enhanced her contralto voice with three-and-one-half octave range vocalizations on the

opening number and from that moment on it was a performance befitting royalty.

As the set progressed, Dianne chatted very intimately with her audience before launching into "Somewhere There's Music." And her interpretation of the Ellington classic, "I Got It Bad," is the best arrangement of the tune that I have heard in years. She had the audience in a finger-popping frenzy as she belted "Yesterday" and brought the house down with "My Funny Valentine."

But highlight of the Reeves performance had to be when she and her genius of a percussionist, Ron Powell, dueted. She imitated by scatting with perfect harmony to the spellbinding

sounds made by Ron's percussion instruments. The vintage Blues tune—whose hook was "Be My Husband and I'll Be Your Wife"—was a Ma Raineytype fun song sang a capella. She ended her magical spell with her ballad "Better Days," a story of her beloved grandmother, Denver Mobley, which she dedicated to the memory of grandmothers everywhere. (I hear that currently this tune is receiving great airplay on Black/Urban radio and generating more sales from her already classic self-titled album.)

For her New York date, Dianne Reeves was accompanied by some of the best musicians around: David Torkanowsky on piano; Tony Dumas on bass; Michael Baker on drums and Ron Powell on percussion. Dianne Reeves is a jazz definition! If you don't have a copy of her LP Dianne Reeves, then run post haste to your record shop. Or be there at the BRE Black Music Awards Show next month during Conference '88, when she performs for her industry peers and the public—along with her distinguished cousin and album collaborator, George Duke, It's a must!

CONCERT REVIEW

EARTH, WIND & FIRE: STIRRING UP THE ELEMENTS AT THE UNIVERSAL AMPHITHEATRE



"In the beginning, in a solar system..." came a disembodied voice, heightening the anticipation for the stage entrance of Earth, Wind & Fire at the Universal Amphitheatre in Los Angeles at Universal City..

Your eyes didn't know where to focus first as the spectacle onstage unfolded: brightly painted "planets" in alignment, winking "stars" on an inky black "sky," laser beams of light, megasmoke explosions and then the second coming of the elements...Earth, Wind & Fire!

(Those impressed by the group's opening night performance included EW&F Columbia labelmate Eddie Murphy. Even cries of "Sit down, EDDIE!!" didn't faze the funny man as he continued to stand at his seat and check out the wonderment, his bodyguards and best buddy Arsenio Hall also following suit.)

Yes, folks, EW&F is back and as spectacular as ever! Listening to them vibe their way through their biggest hits of the early '70s through the early '80s ("Head to the Sky," "Shining Star," "Getaway," "Serpentine Fire," "Let's Groove Tonight," among them) made it possible to flash back on certain

indelible memories of your past that those songs triggered.

The group may feature some new faces, but its founding members are still in fine form. There was Maurice White wearing seemingly painted-on pants as he rocked through his trademark, hunch-shouldered dance moves. Philip Bailey, in an African Prince-like outfit, still displayed a clear-as-a-bell, angelic falsetto that seemed to ascend to the heavens.

This reunion of EW&F is actually the result of planning between White and Bailey, which began in the fall of 1986. Today, the group sports nine principal members: five who were there "in the beginning" and four new additions. Plus, three L.A. "homeboys" supply the brass, sass, and kick-some-(bleep!) horn section.

Put it all together and only the comatose could've managed to keep still as the group went through its paces:

Maurice White's yes-I'm-sexy version of "Kalimba" was too erotic, while Philip Bailey made me want to weep as he sang with a voice so sweet and pure on "Reasons" and "Imagination." Verdine White provided the fire—pure, hyperkinetic, white heat. At times, he seemed too full of energy to even contain himself, what with his heavy-throbbing bass and frantic antics. It's a wonder he didn't levitate altogether.

(On opening night, Eddie Murphy and Arsenio Hall "levitated" all the way out of their seats and onto the stage where they engaged in some wild Cabbage Patching on EW&F's closing gospelspirited number, "Touch the World.")

New members were noteworthy, too, including Sonny Emery, a hard-rocking, drumstick-twirling drummer and Dick Smith, a white rock guitarist who resembled a hipper, funkier Donny Osmond.

What is so great about EW&F is that one evening spent with this inspirational group makes you want to go out into the world and do something, no matter how small, to make it a better place. Now, how many other artists can you think of that can inspire that?

Rap Report's Duff Marlowe stopped by Hollywood's Sunset Marquis to interview founding father of Rap Grandmaster Flash. Flash is back with the original Furious Five on the Elektra Records LP On The Strength. The album's first release was "Cold," followed by the current single "Fly Girl."

BRE: What's jumpin' off next from the On the Strength LP?

Grandmaster Flash: The next thing that's going to come out is "Fly Girl" and "Cold In Effect" is the "B" side.

BRE: For a minute, let's talk about the Sugarhill days. "The Message" is probably the first Rap song that reached the masses...

GF: Yeah, well the socially conscious masses, yes. We had an earlier tune that did pretty well for us, too. But that was the killer tune

BRE: Perhaps that song, that attitude has affected Rap. A lot of rappers now have a "message" in their music. Do you think that rappers should have a message in their music or that everyone should have their own style without regard to social consciousness?

GF: Well, it's really a combination of both those elements. But I do think that once a recording artist reaches major artist status, he then becomes a prophet. OK, you start out and you're a struggling artist. You reach out and try to get that one hit. The first record is just the beginning, that second single is...well alright, we still like you. That third one, and you're still there, it's like you're escalating and once you have that major artist status and have proven yourself around the world, you are now a prophet. So you can be a prophet of frivolous matters, saying "I'm this and I'm that," but also you have to realize that this particular type of music, from a lyrical standpoint, is what I call "mentally digestible." Meaning that if you like Rap, you learn the words quickly.

Like with R&B, there's a couple of songs that I know that are great. But all I can remember is the hook. Like Keith Sweat, I love his entire album. But some of the words...I don't know what he's sayin'. But with Rap, your diction really, really, really matters. And if it's a record that you can appreciate, from a kid to an adult, they'll know it word for word. They know exactly what you said, they know what you meant. And that's the difference. And when you reach that status, you leave more room for play. As you are building, your reputation is tight, and there are certain things you just cannot do while you're building your career. But as you get to a certain status, you now leave room where you can go left or right.

With a major artist, maybe socially significant things should happen. It makes things better for us. We get more socially accepted. The masses may look at Rap as a "dirty faced" type of thing. They mean well, but their face is dirty. Like Hip Hop, from a musical standpoint, doesn't have it's own base. Meaning that you can steal a lick from Opera. You can steal a guitar lick from Rock. You can steal a bass lick from R&B. You can take a lick from Jazz or Latin. Once the elements are placed properly on top of that drum beat, it's officially Hip Hop. Unofficially, officially Hip Hop.

From a lyrical standpoint, there are

certain subjects that a Rock artist, a Jazz artist, an R&B artist...they cannot talk about. They are bound. But with Hip Hop, the subject matters that we can talk about are unlimited. They can be frivolous or negative. They can be pornographic, which is...not cool...but then again you have those that use that medium to get their point across. There are so many untapped areas. Like the school system. Some kid who goes to school, they'll know a Rap record quicker than they'll know their own studies. Someone could come out and make a scholastic Rap record!

BRE: So you're saying that Rap is able to reach a wider range of subject matter and audiences because R&B is constricted in a way...

GF: It is. Significantly, too. And Rock is even constricted, too. And you can't put a Rock guitar in a Jazz song.

BRE: So Rap is more advanced in a way because it's using *all* those elements to create...

GF: It's own! So just from that standpoint alone...there are some untapped areas.

BRE: Do you look at Rap as a separate musical genre, or is it part of the R&B thing? Or is it its own separate world...


GF: It's its own completely separate world. There may be a closest next door neighbor. For instance "King of Rock." Run-D.M.C.'s closest next door neighbor is Rock. In Hip Hop, like Eric B, the closest next door neighbor is Funk. There are so many things that we can do with it. But it does have its own musical genre. It definitely does.

BRE: OK, since it is its own genre, a lot of people think that you have to come up with the proper training as a rapper, with a proper attitude as far as being "old school" or "new school." People who have their own style, without the background, sometimes get 'dissed' because they don't have that background. Do you think that they are as valid?

GF: It's the other way around. That's what's interesting about it. Some of the more "old school" artists, the majority of them, had to go to what I call Hip Hop school. They start in the parks, capture a following, do gigs every weekend, play in areas that are somewhat dangerous, just to gain followings. Now what's unfortunate with a lot of the newer artists without a recording contract is that their career is determined by what the guy behind the desk says. Whether or not the guy likes his demo. It's really kind of sad. There should be some kind of course to determine whether this person is qualified (to make the decision) or not. But when you have to hand the tape over to the A&R person, and then they can say yes or no, that's kind of sad.

That's why I want to get into producing other artists. Nobody knows better than the artist. Even the companies that have a lot of Rap, the person who makes that final decision loses an edge because he hears so much of it that he may turn down something that could be great. But I think if the artists got behind them, that would be the next way for the newest up-and- coming artists to make a substantial mark in the recording business.

Another unfortunate thing is that Rap is what I call "a perishable item." It can't sit too long. If it sits too long either

someone will steal it and make a close facsimile to it, or it's gonna be a played out subject. Or beat.

BRE: The Indie labels—B-Boy, Tuff City, or say Danya...do you think they're doing a good job of bringing street level Rap groups up?

GF: Sure. Yes, I definitely do, because they are willing to take a gamble. And they have less money to do it with. The majors are looking down on the little guys and saying hmm...they're doing it that way, perhaps it might catch on to the point where they might not be so tight about it.

BRE: Do you like Public Enemy?

GF: I like Public Enemy. I respect them a lot because they don't care whether they make radio or not because their underground following is just so powerful. Their subject matter is really cutting close to the edge, to the point where it's gonna scare a lot of people. But as long as they have an allegiance to their underground following, they're gonna be successful every time they come out. And they ain't gonna never make the radio. The leader has a great Ringling Brothers/Barnum and Bailey ringmaster kind of voice. And on top of that track! Eric B. and Rakim, I like their style, too. Daring to be different. So I like a lot of these "new school" guys. Cool with me. I'm not into that 'I diss you, you diss me."

BRE: How do you feel about Black radio and Rap? Is it getting the play it deserves? GF: The thing about Hip Hop is that if you're a successful artist, it's fast money. But the risk factor of it being so dangerous and volatile is a lot higher. So these program directors have got to be careful about what they play because if they opened up and played more Rap records, they may be more successful.

But at the same time it might bring a little too much violence. That's the thing about this Hip Hop. It's still new. And as with any style of music, for it to get respect, it's going to cause a little bit of violence. Rock started the same way— extremely violent. You've got to realize that any type of high impact, highly energetic type of music is going to bring about a little bit of violence. Because it demands success. It demands to be respected. And if it's not respected, then somebody will pay the price. It's kind of unfortunate, but that's just the way the dynamics of Hip Hop is.

BRE: Let's talk about the beginnings of Rap, the historical antecedents of Hip Hop. Hip Hop, as we know it, started in New York...

GF: It started in the Bronx.

BRE: Yeah, the Bronx. It ain't "the bridge."

GF: (laughs) I ain't into all that. But the Bronx.

BRE: Looking back in ancient African civilization, the guys who carried the stories and the history of their civilization were drummers. They would repeat rhymes to the village regarding history and culture while they were playing the drum beats...

GF: That a deep one, yeah. Well, I take it back to as far as toasting. I take it back to Billie Holiday. To B.B. King, because they talk it more than they sing it. And James Brown. He talks more so than he sings it. All Hip Hop is, is a revolutionary version of syncopated talking to beats. We just called it Hip Hop.

BRE: When you started, who did you look to for precedents?

GF: There wasn't anybody there. There wasn't anybody there.

TECH NOTES



Pressure Zone Microphones

The basic principles of microphone design have not changed since their conception. A diaphragm vibrates with sound waves, and in turn creates electrical energy. One significant problem with the conventional mike is the fact that direct and reflected sound waves are combined within the microphone. As a result, all of the sound waves do not arrive at the mike at the same time. They arrive out-of-phase, causing an uneven frequency response. That's why, in designing recording studios, we try too hard to achieve a flat, undistorted signal. The recording studio's acoustic design mechanically controls the reflected sounds, and the remaining of the corrections are made with processors.

Two audio engineers, Edward Long and Ron Wickersham, developed the Pressure Zone Microphone (Trade marked PZM) for "Crown." They addressed mechanical and environmental problems of conventional mikes with the discovery of a thin layer or pressure zone (usually the largest horizontal plane just beneath the mike, floor, table or podium) where the direct signal and the reflected signal are in phase. They found that placing a mike in this area combined the direct and reflected signals in such a way that the result is a totally flat frequency response in just about any acoustic environment.


Basically, a PZM mike detects pressure changes, not sound waves!



Using the PZM Mike

The PZM mike's uses are unlimited. Nevertheless, I don't know of any radio stations using the PZM in the studio. I gave it a try and the results were great, except the PZM is so sensitive that it picked up everything. You could hear equipment cooling fans, my corduroy pants and pages in the copy book turning.

When I was given the job of field recording 35 school choirs for a special Christmas broadcast, the PZM mike was in order. After trying several different designs, the wedge type was selected.

Since I always seemed to arrive at each school at class change time, the hardest part of the job was getting from the van to the music room. Once there, the mikes for the left and right channels were placed as shown. The PZM's

phantom power supplies were connected and the mikes plugged into the Revox B-77. I had each choir run through its loudest song and thereby levels were set, the tape was rolled and it was like taking a picture with an automatic camera. The PZM's were so sensitive that I could hear a couple of kids whispering secrets in the back row. At one school there was a tile floor. Also, there were windows on two sides, hard ceiling, no risers and the choir was around the piano in a mob. I could not see the mikes because they were on the floor somewhere in the mob. It was a sound engineer's nightmare. When the tapes were reviewed back at the studio. I could not believe my ears. It sounded like a professional studio recording. All voices were heard, the piano was perfect. There was no distortion, and the stereo separation was perfect. Seems like the worse the conditions, the better the PZM performs.

The PZM can handle pressure levels up to 150 db. It can be connected to a bass drum, an acoustic guitar or a piano without a fear of mechanical overload. The mikes and their holding devices come in various styles. You can get more information by contacting Crown at (219) 294-8000. Radio Shack has one for about \$45 that works pretty well, but my personal preference for professional work is the Crown.







Shorter Returning From Europe For U.S. Tour



NEW YORK: With his new album Joy Ryder (Columbia) near the top of the Jazz charts, former Miles Davis and Weather Report reedman Wayne Shorter is climaxing a joy ride of his own on the other side of the Atlantic. Hitting nearly every country in Western Euorpe, as well as Hungary and Yugoslavia in the East, Shorter's six-week sojourn of club dates on the Continent comes to an end this week. Upon his return. he plans a summer tour across the U.S. Coming off of his Grammy win for Best Jazz Instrumental Composition for "Call Sheet Blues," from the award-winning "'Round Mid-night" soundtrack, Shorter has indeed had a joyful ride of it so far in 1988.

A Night In The Mix

In the Year End issue of BRE an article was published entitled "A&R NOTES: Fresh New Music Coming In The '90s" that spoke of many A&R individuals, one being Erik Nuri (RCA). His main focus is to rebuild the Black music roster for the company and I thought it would be appropriate to share some exclusive information that was obtained recently. Erik invited BRE to an exclusive sneak preview of some of his projects that are currently in production. Talk about a night totally in the mix! First we were off to the Red Zone recording facility in Burbank, CA, where RCA's new recording artist Julius was working on vocal traks for his upcoming debut LP. Writing and producing the trak "More Than A Physical Thang" is Bernard "Drama Man" Jackson, lead vocalist for the CBS recording group **Surface**. As the session got underway, the producing abilities of Bernard began to unveil, and Erik's razor sharp ears were there to listen to anything Bernard may have missed. This particular trak that they were working on is crafted after Marvin Gaye, with strong commercial sensibilities. Julius, an artist of total distinction and personality, didn't seem a bit nervous as he began to deliver a vocal that I found to be very impressive in more ways that one. I spoke to Julius briefly during his session and asked him a few things regarding his

BRE: How long have you been

singing?

Julius: Well, I've been singing since I was 12, but this is my first major recording. I also play bass, keyboards and I write.

BRE: What kind of personality or image would you say Julius wants to project?

Julius: I would say something in the vein of the old Peabo Bryson.

BRÉ: What brought you to RCA? **Julius:** Well, originally I had done a demo of a song titled "You Are My Life" which was submitted to the company by Bernard. Erik was really impressed with what he heard, so here I am.

And here he is, is right! Julius's first single will be released sometime in June and is untitled as of now. The LP will follow in August. Julius is surely an

They escorted us to one of his recording rooms that happens to be inside a diesel rig. Now don't think that just because it was a truck, it was mediocre. As a matter of fact, it was one of the most high tech facilities that I have ever seen. At this time **Bobby Brooks**, one of Stevie's



PEABO BRYSON: BACK ON TOP

eabo Bryson, Elektra recording artist, is enjoying a strong resurgence in popularity via "Without You," his recent duet with Regina Belle and his new album, Positive, following a relatively quiet period in his musical career. He describes his current LP as "Hot! It's sophisticated, diverse, accessible and above all, it's me."

On working on the new LP:

"It took a while and there were many reasons for that. For instance, three of the songs came from the Bill Cosby movie, 'Leonard—Part 6'—and that wasn't part of our original plan for the album. But when the opportunity came, I didn't want to pass it up. While the film did get a lot of mixed reaction, I think the bright spot is the music!"

On producers Michael Powell & Dean Gant:

"Michael and Dean let it be known that they were anxious to work with me and that's always a good feeling. It makes things easier when people want to work with you rather than trying to fit in with other people's schedules. To be honest, I prefer being pursued! They know how to get decent songs and that's very important for someone like me. In fact, I was amazed at just how close the songs they picked were to my own songwriting style. I feel real good about what we did together and I feel like we established a relationship that will continue in the future."

On 'orossing over':

"I resent the way people said that I was 'trying to get white' after I had a crossover hit with 'If Ever You're In My Arms Again' in 1983. It was a trip because the attitude that some Black radio stations and people in the media had toward me after that hit was allowed to fester: I found myself wondering 'where is all this hostility coming from?.' I was insulted! I resented being categorized-music is supposed to be universal.

On his last LP:

"The Quiet Storm album stands up for itself. I dare anyone not to like it if they listen to it! There were some songs on that LP that I feel very personal about. I just hope I don't have to be dead for people to appreciate the different LPs I've done!"

REBBIE JACKSON: 'TUFF ENUFFI

ebbie Jackson, Columbia recording artist, is a wife, mother, homemaker-and a member of music's First Family, But she feels proud that her current LP, R U Tuff Enuff, can stand on its own merit, without constant comparisons with records by other members of the Jackson clan. "I don't feel any pressure," she states firmly. With "Plaything" a strong single on Black radio, Rebbie's happy to talk about what's been happening in her career lately.

On the new LP:

"The thing that's different with this album is that I was much more involved with the songs. I can really identify with them—especially a song like 'R U Tuff Enuff,' which may give the impression of a woman who's going to walk all over you. But that's not what it's saying at all. It's a different kind of toughness—one that implies patience, understanding and love."

On producers Conley & Townsend (of Surface):

"The first time we worked together (on my last LP, Reaction, I found them both to be very down-to-earth. It's not that I couldn't relate to the other producers for that LP, but they seemed to plug into the direction I wanted to take with my music. Plus, they really took time to observe me, watch me, check out my personality to find out what I'm all about. We did most of the recording




for this new LP in New Jersey: I found that both the guys were real innovative and I felt like I had a relationship with them similar to the one I have with my brothers."

On her famous family:

"Michael really encouraged me when I decided to launch a musical career in my own right. Some people may compare me with other members of the family, but that's just the way it is. Sure, I'd love to hook up with other members of the family if that's what evolved in the future. I think it would be great."

On her first hit, "Centipede":

I didn't expect the kind of immediate response that the record received in 1985. I was a bit surprised at the way it took off but I felt very positive about it from the start."




