




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THE YBPC

ESTERDAY, the Young Black Programmer's Coalition was a dream-a fertile idea in the minds of its creators. They conceived an organization that would fill the void in the national black radio community created by the demise of NATRA.

It would hold regular meetings as a source for training programs and continuous dialogue. It would facilitate better communication among its members who share a common bond. And, above all, it would recognize the basic need for black broadcasters to have a structure which would enable them to capitalize on the principle of strength in numbers, while refining their skills and keeping abreast of what's happening now in an ever changing, fast-paced industry.

And so the YBPC came into being...

TODAY, the YBPC has grown in membership and serves the needs of its constituents with regular meetings and seminars which sharpen the tools needed for survival and growth in the communications industry. The convening of the Eleventh Annual YBPC National Meeting this week in Houston, which will attract hundreds of participants from every sector of radio and records, bears witnesss to the viability of the organization today. And the fruition of the dream.

But what about TOMORROW?

As publisher of Black Radio Exclusive, let me say at the outset that I have supported the YBPC from day one. But as we project the future of the YBPC, we need to concentrate on ways in which the organization can sustain itself by attracting more members. Naturally, the YBPC should and will-with increased membership—be able to offer more benefits. Increased membership will also give the organization more power and respect.

I hereby challenge the YBPC to implement a three-point plan to stimulate and promote growth:

- 1. Drop the word 'Young' from the name of the organization. The resulting "Black Programmers Coalition," or BPC, opens the door for increased membership attraction. I am sure that even charter members must have a problem with the name in their mature years.
- 2. Increase the membership dues thereby allotting funds for life, health and unemployment insurance.
- 3. In addition to the two national events currently held each year, hold four regional meetings in various parts of the country (such as Atlanta, Los Angeles, Chicago and Washington, D.C.) to attract new members and national participation.

As new leadership is being chosen this weekend, there is no more appropriate time to consider these proposals. The (Y)BPC must be positioned to survive and thrive as our industry faces the challenges of the future.

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

GEORGE BENSON—TWICE THE LOVE—WARNER BROTHERS—Benson gets funky with an electronic slant on this slick Preston Glass production and Shep Pettibone remix. From the album of the same name, this one will keep the master guitarist where he belongs...in the national spotlight. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.

Z'LOOKE—CAN U READ MY LIPS—ORPHEUS/EMI—This strong cut has been picking up adds across the U.S...Boasting a killer mid-tempo beat that's due to hard hitting drum and percussion programming, the song lies stylistically between Keith Sweat and early Club Nouveau, with melodic vocals and hookish refrains. Demos: Young Adults, Dancers.

GARY SHIDER—BEAUTIFUL—MCA—Bootsy Collins and Mico Wave helped write it, George Clinton produced it and in all likelihood you're gonna be tappin' your foot to it! The funk is back in Black. From the upcoming album titled George Clinton Presents Our Gang Funky. Demos: Young Adults.

THE TODD TERRY PROJECT—JUST WANNA DANCE—FRESH (212)724-1440—Terry is blasting into the future of popular music with his innovative production styles. This latest is another Fresh hot shot, with wierd effects and radical mood changes keeping the interest at a peak. Up-beat and danceable. Demos: Dancers, Teens.

CHERRELLE—AFFAIR—TABU/EPA—Here's the long-awaited LP from this talented Pop/Soul songstress. With Jimmy Jam and Terry Lewis producing nine out of the thirteen tracks along with Cherrelle, they create a Jazz flavored R&B offering that grooves on cuts like the smash hit "Everything | Miss at Home," and the beautiful upbeat duet with Alexander O'Neal "Keep It Inside." Demos: Young Adults and Adults.

RODNEY FRANKLIN—DIAMOND INSIDE OF YOU—NOVUS/RCA—Jazzy keyboardist Franklin has assembled an incredibly deep and diverse cast of talent to back him on this self-produced winner. Lee Ritenour throws down cool guitar riffs on "Malibu Shuffle" and Jennifer Holliday offers soul-stirring lead vocals on the first single "Gotta Give It Up," a smash hit. Go for the Luther Vandross and Nat Adderly Jr. cut, "Stop To Love" or "Shasta Wind" featuring Gerald Albright's alto sax work. A stunning album! Demos: Young Adults, Adults, Jazz lovers.

SARAH DASH—YOU'RE ALL I NEED—EMI—Soul diva Dash has performed with acts as diverse as Patti LaBelle and Rolling Stone Keith Richard, and demonstrates her readiness for the prime time with this excellent solo debut. Patti herself joins Sarah on the appealingly funky and soulful title track and Ray, Goodman & Brown make a cameo appearance on "Don't Make Me Wait." "Feel Good" is a standout with strong radio and dance potential. Demos: Young Adults, Dancers.

7A3—COOLIN' IN CALI—GEFFEN—These three young Hip Hoppers from the L.A. area via New York are back after an exciting debut on the "Colors" soundtrack. Biting a hard driving groove from Kool & The Gang's "Hollywood Swingin'," the crew have what will surely be their biggest hit yet with the LP's title track. Dig deeper, you'll find Dr. John's "Right Place, Wrong Time" backing the hard rhymes of "That's How We're Livin'." Demos: Teens, Dancers, Young Adults.



eople have been falling in love—and making love—to Roberta Flack's lush, sophisticated romance music for a long time. If you need any proof of the enduring appeal of her music, you need look no further than to Al B. Sure! and Robert Brookins/ Stephanie Mills, all of whom have cut recent covers of her mood-enhancing, past hits ("Killing Me Softly" and "Where Is the Love," respectively).

Signed to Atlantic Records for the past

Signed to Atlantic Records for the past 19 years, Flack has always recorded the kind of songs that made you feel that love is more than just one of the many pleasant options that life either offers or withholds. It's a downright neccessity.

"I am a romantic," Flack admitted in a recent phone interview. "I do have that reputation! I'm the type of person who used to hide love stories inside my school books and read them in class.

"I look at songs as stories that I try to interpret, and I enjoy having other artists cover them. I don't look at my songs as being sacred."

Her new LP, Oasis, is filled with stories, some of them classically romantic (the title cut—which is also the first single—and "My Someone to Love") and some of them contemporary-styled ("Shock to My System"). Flack described the people she worked with on the LP, including Quincy Jones (who acted as executive producer of the Marvin Hamlisch/Siedah Garrett-written track, "All Caught Up In Love") and Maya Angelou (with whom she co-wrote "And So It Goes") as: "the best group of people I've ever worked with on one LP."

Oasis is Flack's first LP since her collaboration a few years ago with Peabo Bryson on Tonight I Celebrate My Love, and Sylvia Rhone, Atlantic's vice president, black music division, considers it "the best LP she could have come back with. Roberta is known as the soulsearching balladeer' who comes up with gorgeous standards like 'The First Time Ever I Saw Your Face'; in fact, each of her LPs has contained at least one track that has gone on to become a classic.

"I love her new LP because it's got the kind of ballads that will please longtime Roberta Flack fans, and uptempo tracks like 'Shock to My System' that will draw younger listeners," said Rhone. Flack co-wrote the cut "Ycu Know What It's Like" with Barry Miles and one of her favorite singer/composers, Brenda Russell. "Her music wears me down to the ground," she enthused. "I just loved 'Piano In the Dark." Another song she co-wrote on the LP, "(His Name) Brazil," was inspired by yet another one of her favorite singer/songwriters: Djavan.

"I've always been enamoured with his music. His melodies are unique, his sound is so sensitive and sensual. And he has these natural blue eyes and dark brown skin that are very attractive."

When the Brazilian-born jazz/pop artist came to New York this year to play his first major concert, Flack was there to meet him backstage with a cassette tape of the song she'd penned in his honor: "And the batteries were dead!" she exclaimed, still mortified by the memory. "He put the earphones on, listened a while and handed i: back to me with a frown..." Despite that inauspicious beginning, "(His Name) Brazil" still ranks as one of the LP's most attractive cuts.

Back in the '60s, Flack first made a name for herself as a club singer in a Washington, D.C. nitery called Mr. Henry's. Stars like Bill Cosby Woody Allen, Burt Bacharach and Les McCann would frequent the club on a regular basis to hear her perform folk songs, pop standards and the blues on an old, acoustic piano.

It was jazz artist McCann who arranged for her first audition at Atlantic Records, and he wrote the liner notes for First Take, her 1969 debut LP. "We, as black people, still remember that first LP of Roberta's," said Sylvia Rhone. "She had the most unique voice of a female vocalist in the business—and she still does."

"What makes Roberta Flack special is the depth and sensitivity she brings to a song." While the '60s was the decade that

While the '60s was the decade that produced so many brilliant artists who put black contemporary music on the map, Flack isn't of the opinion that black music of the '80s is little more than a faded footnote: "No, the 'death of R&B' philosophy isn't one I subscribe to. I don't insist on purity because music is constantly changing.

"Music reflects the changes in the world. Twenty years ago, it was Martin

Luther King, Jr. whose message excited and motivated us. Today it's Jesse Jackson. It's a different kind of passion and the music reflects that."

While some of her signature hits have been the romantic ballads she's recorded with Peabo Bryson and the late Donny Hathaway, one of the best cuts on her new LP—the uptempo "Shock to My System"—teams her with white pop/soul singer Simon Climie.

"Do you think it works?" she asked, then added: "I think it does. He really does sound like that," said Flack, referring to Climie's distinctively quirky vocals. Her creative merger with Climie, who co-wrote the Aretha Franklin/ George Michael "I Knew You Were Waiting For Me" mega-hit "turned out well, even though it's never been my idea to sing with other people. But two heads are better than one and it can be inspiring to have that type of collaboration."


One of her favorite LPs is still her 1977 Blue Lights In the Basement (which contained "The Closer I Get To You," her hit duet with Hathaway). "I love that LP because it reminds me of a time when we didn't 30 out to nightclubs. We'd go down to the basement to dance. And you had to have a red light, or a blue light, or a towel thrown over the lightbulb" to create a dreamy, romantic aura, the singer explained. "I associate that period in my life with wonderful music: 'In the Still Of the Night,' 'Stay In My Comer'..."

Today, Roberta Flack can be counted on to continue her own tradition of making 'wonderful music,' although she said, "It's so hard to judge your own work. In my opinion, a song like 'Jesse' is one of the best songs I've ever done even though it wasn't a hit. When you put a record out there and it doesn't succeed commercially, it really does make you wonder."

Sylvia Rhone, for one, has no doubts about the commercial viability of *Oasis*. "It's a great record, one that really shows that Roberta has stood the test of time. She's one of our top artists here at Atlantic, and the fact that next year marks her 20th anniversary at this label is nothing short of remarkable."

Asked to describe Roberta Flack in 20 words or less, Rhone said simply: "She's a legend."

Def Jam Launches R&B Label

NEW YORK: Def Jam Records, one of the industry's premier rap labels, has created Black Gold, an R&B-oriented label to be distributed by Columbia Records. Four of the five acts signed to the new company were formerly on the Def Jam roster. Veteran vocal group Blue Magic is the fifth signee.

According to Russell Simmons, Black Gold president, the new company will approach the promotion and marketing of its artists in an "artist-driven, gutsy" manner. Simmons, also president of Def Jam, is noted for his aggressive promotion of that label's artists, which include LL Cool J, Public Enemy and Oran "Juice" Jones, the latter artist of which has moved to Black Gold.

Several Def Jam staffers will move to the new label, and the company's debut product will be singer Alyson Williams' Raw, Gutsy R&B LP, set for Jan. '89 release.

RIAA to Change

NEW YORK: The sharp decline in record sales has resulted in the Recording Industry Association of America's decision to have the certification requirements for gold and platinum singles. Just five gold singles have been awarded gold this year, including "Push It" by Salt-N-Pepa (Next Plateau Records) and "Pump Up the Volume" by M/A/R/R/S (4th & B'Way Records).

Currently, most singles regarded as top-sellers peak at 400,000 sales. As of Jan. 1st, singles will be eligible for gold certification with sales of 500,000 units.

CD-E are slated to officially

NEW YORK: Roulette Records may be sold to KB Communications for \$4.5 million. Morris Levy, the label's president, was recently sentenced to a 10year jail term due to his extortion of a Philadelphia record distributor. (See BRE, Nov. 11.)

While KB Communications did not meet either the September or October deadline to finalize the deal, the company has "exclusive rights" to purchase Roulette, according to sources.

FCC Addresses Duopoly Rules

WASHINGTON: FCC commisioners have voted unanimously to revise signal contour rules affecting one-to-amarket station ownership. Broadcasters had previously been prohibited from owning stations whose millivolt per meter contours overlapped.

A new ruling will vary according to soil conductivity and regions, while the distance between a 5 kw AM station in the middle of the band could be cut from 120 miles to 60 miles. Commonly owned FM stations can now be spaced 17 miles apart, down from the previously set 30 mile distance.

Smokey Robinson Honored By ASCAP

LOS ANGELES: William "Smokey" Robinson was presented with the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP) Founders Award, the highest honor awarded to its members, at a reception held at Chasen's Restaurant in Los Angeles. Other members of the performing right licensing organization are Stevie Wonder (a past Founders Award winner), Wynton Marsalis, Quincy Jones, Lionel Richie and Prince.

Robinson, who was recognized for his long-standing achievements as a Motown recording artist/writer, has songwriting credits that include: "My Girl," "The Tracks Of My Tears" and "Ooh, Baby, Baby."

Robinson told the gathering of over 200 industry figureswhich included Mary Wilson, Mary Wells and Natalie Colethat Motown founder Berry Gordy is the man who initially taught him how to write songs that contained commercial, "hit" potential. Gordy, who joined ASCAP president Morton Gould in the presentation, referred to Robinson as a "friend as well as an associate." and noted that he owed much of his success at Motown to the artist's musical contributions.

NARM Pushes For Song IDs

NEW YORK: The Retailers' Advisory Committee of the National Association of Recording Merchandisers will launch a consumer petition drive to urge radio stations to back-and-front announce all records that air.

The initial campaign will involve record stores in Chicago, with plans to expand nationwide if the drive in that city is successful.

Record label executives have long contended that radio airplay doesn't translate into record sales if potential recordbuyers don't know the names of artists receiving airplay. "As a record company we're definitely in favor of NARM's efforts in this area," said Tom Corson, executive director of product development, A&M Records.

"The move would be good for the artist, good for the record companies and good for radio," Corson told BRE. "Without the money that's generated by record sales, there'll be no music to program. And unless you want nothing but talk-radio formatting, that's not the way to go."

Senate Addresses Record Rental

WASHINGTON: Passage of the Omnibus Trade Act, an extension of the Record Rental Law, was one of the last pieces of business accomplished at the last session of Congress. The law gives the copyright owner of a sound recording the exclusive right to authorize record

rentals, a law which was set to expire last year. The new bill extends the law for eight more years.

The Trade bill requires U.S. government involvement in the music industry's international anti-piracy efforts.

Virgin Music to Make Urban Inroads

LOS ANGELES: Virgin Music, ranked third among the world's most successful music publishers, is "aggressively seeking young, black songwriters" in order to expand its presence in the U.S. urban market, according to David Steel, vice president, Virgin Music East Coast.

Steel told BRE in a recent interview: "I'm from Philadelphia and it's artists like the O'Jays and LaBelle who inspired me to get into the music business in the first place. Personally, I've always liked urban music and while Virgin Music is open to all styles, we are looking to sign more black artists."

Richard Griffiths, president of the company's U.S. operation, has stated that emphasis will be placed on "talent acquisition," as opposed to buying catalogues: "We sign artists," he said, "we don't inherit them." Recently added to Virgin Music's roster is one of the record industry's hottest songwriting duos, Teddy Riley and Gene Griffin; Terence Trent D'Arby, Miles Jaye, Loose Ends, Afrika Bambaataa and Gary Taylor are also signed to the company.

Virgin Music, originally based only in England, has gained a reputation for "taking the long view" and nurturing its artists, according to director of a&r, Danny Goodwin. "We signed Culture Club and suffered through many turn-downs before they got a record deal. We will often act as a bank, helping to support our artists while they're still developing their material. We're not embarrassed about being their security blanket."

Creative manager Guy Eckstine—based at Virgin Music's West Hollywood headquarters—was originally a drummer in his father Billy Eckstine's band before joining the company as an executive. Part of his job involves putting writers together for collaboration projects and scouting unsigned talent.

"Rap isn't going away," Eckstine told BRE, "so that is an area in which we're looking to sign new writers. In working with any writers we also encourage them to get into production—particularly since demos of a song are often very close to what you hear on the final, recorded version."

According to Eckstine, Virgin Music's emphasis is "finding artists who are on the creative edge. We're looking for that next Terence Trent D'Arby..."

With the help of his friend Frederick Eason, a makeup artist, Briggs was responsible for helping A&M recording artists Vesta and Shanice Wilson come up with the contemporary, flattering looks they're currently sporting.

Briggs, whose body-revealing styles







CHARLES ROSS:

Bringing "Your Personal Finance" to Urban Radio

Black people are into phase two, as far as the civil rights movement is concerned. That's the opinion of Charles Ross, a 12-year broadcasting veteran and the host of "Your Personal Finance," a nationally syndicated radio program.

"We've got the jobs, we're making money," said Ross in a recent phone interview from his Atlanta-based financial/media company. "The next big hurdle is economics. What do we do with the money now that we're making it?

"Minorities, as a whole, don't have a history of earning large sums of money, so a program like 'Your Personal Finance'—which addresses consumer needs ranging from managing credit and saving money on car insurance to how to invest one's money—provides valuable information."

Starstream Communications Group, Inc. is the company that handles the station clearance and national sponsorship for Ross':90 second daily program. It currently airs on 30 of the country's top-rated urban stations. "The response to the show has been phenomenal," according to the former banking executive.

"Top 20 countdowns, 'infotainment' programs and shows like 'Radioscope,' are all great," said Ross, "but it's good when urban radio is responsible enough to offer programming that addresses the real needs and concerns of its audience."

WVEE-FM/Atlanta was the first station in the country to air "Your Personal

Finance." Ray Boyd, the station's PD, was initially sold on the program's concept "because it addresses adultoriented subject matter and it breaks complicated financial terms down to *layman's* terms. We've run the show in our early morning drive time since 1986 and audience reaction has always been great.

"Urban radio has to be about more than entertainment if it's going to really serve its listeners," said Boyd, voicing an ideology obviously shared by PD's at other leading urban stations that also carry the program, such as WILD/Boston, WTLC/Indianapolis and WEDR/Miami (the latter of which airs the show four times daily).

Ross, former vice president of the

retail securities department of Georgia Federal Bank—Georgia's largest savings bank—has taught personal finance courses at several institutions, including Spelman College. The New Yorkborn financial expert regularly conducts business seminars for civic, professional and community organizations and his "Your Personal Finance" series has received the Caber Award for best direction.

Said Ross: "In the minority community, we often don't seek the financial help we need. There's an intimidation there, an unwillingness to admit that we don't really know it all. Also, the resources are often not that available. Very few of us have access to a black stockbroker!"

And that, according to Ross, is where his program has proven its worth on urban stations: "Providing information on a variety of consumer matters, from obtaining mutual funds and paying alimony, to how to select the right checking account—and presenting it in a way that is clear and not overwhelming—is what 'Your Personal Finance' is all about.

"Urban stations that ordinarily wouldn't consider running a syndicated program are running this one," he said. "They realize that it addresses needs that haven't previously been met on black radio."

After having his own "Soul Train" dancing curtailed, Briggs began to focus on doing designs for entertainers, many of whom were introduced to him by his cousin Miguel Nunez (an actor who appears on the CBS TV series "Tour of Duty").

Natalie Cole, Vanity and the Mary Jane Girls were among his first clients, and Ola Ray—who later appeared opposite Michael Jackson in his "Thriller" video—wore Briggs' outfits on promo tours she did as a Playboy Playmate. Photo layouts of celebrity models wearing his clothes have appeared in publications ranging from Playboy and Right On!, to TV Guide and the Star.

With only three hours notice, Briggs created a futuristic look for Rockwell to

wear in his "Obscene Phone Call" video; since then his styles have appeared in videos by Jermaine Jackson ("I Think It's Love") and Michael Jackson (for his upcoming "Come Together"). And the list of TV shows, aside from "Soul Train," that have featured his clothing styles is lengthy. It includes: "Star Search," "Putting On the Hits," "The Robert Townsend HBO Special," "Throb," "9 to 5," "The Late Night Show," "Divorce Court" and "American Bandstand."

Currently, Briggs' clothing is being carried at retail outlets in L.A., including Chezare (a Hollywood-based boutique). While friends tell him that he needs to be in New York, Briggs is a diehard California fan: "Good things have happened for me here, and L.A. is really opening up in terms of the fashion

market," he says. "Now, England...that's where I'd really like to go."

Vesta, Vanity and the Mary Jane Girls notwithstanding, Briggs' mom is still one of his biggest fans. She may have lost a set of curtains, but she's gained a fashion-designing son who is rapidly becoming a name and a talent to watch. he was given a spot as a dancer on the show.

He only lasted a few years on the show as a performer (a dance he did called "The Itch" was so outrageous that it caused him to be ousted). But Briggs had proven to be such a formidable designer that he was retained in that capacity. Although his name is not mentioned in the show's credits, approximately 5,000 of Briggs' outfits have appeared on "Soul Train."

Michael Archie (I), music director, WHUR-FM/Washington, D.C., moderated a panel on "The New Technology of Radio Programming" which centered on the radio industry and the research required to operate a successful station. Among the panelists were Bill Webber (c), senior consultant, Radio Computer Services; and Terri Avery (r), program director, KMJQ-FM/Houston, Texas. Webber discussed new computerized systems used by over 700 stations that help eliminate DJ subjectivity and repetitious formats. Defending her decision to stop reporting to trades, Avery said, "It was a toss-up between spending time with my people or doing research for the other companies. It hasn't hurt us because we are still a top-rated station."



Ernie Singleton (I), senior vice president, black music marketing and promotion, Warner Brothers Records; and Dean Landsman (r), president of Landsman Media, were co-panelists addressing the issue, "Are Black Stations Losing Listeners and Advertising Dollars Because of New Formats at Pop Stations?" Singleton's answer was an emphatic, "Yes!" Panelists Zemira Jones, general sales manager, WDJY-FM/Washington explained that two of the reasons for these losses are that potential clients "don't see the value of the black dollar" and apparently think black people don't have money reflecting persistent negative value iudgements and attitudes.







LEARNING COMPUTER THEORY

In the first week of November, Los Angeles played host to the Audio Engineering Society's 85th Convention held at the LA Convention Center. There's no doubt about it: computers are very much a part of the audio business.

Computerized Boards

It still takes the human touch to create a good piece of production or to mix down a song, but the new computer-controlled mixing consoles make the job easier and more accurate. These boards are not designed to replace the audio engineer, I hope! However, if you are an audio engineer, or plan to become one, I strongly suggest learning some computer theory.

Several companies are marketing computer interfaces and software that connect to audio consoles. When doing a mixdown by normal means, you mix the multi-track tape down to two tracks and adjust the levels by hand. If you miss a fade on one of the tracks, you start over. Sometimes many takes are required to get the perfect final mix.

With the computer-controlled mixing consoles you go through the multi-track tape step-by-step using a computer mouse or keyboard programming on each fade, pan, or EQ change. Then you run the tape through and the computer does the mix automatically. All of your levels, or changes, are displayed on a computer screen.

If you don't like the mix, simply go to the place in the program and make the change, then run the mixdown again. Because of the speed of computers, the mixing accuracy is incredible. This technology grew out of computerized television editing systems and it's about time that its popularity grew in audio.

The most impressive system is the "Neve" Flying Fader Board. This board is completely automated. It is programmed pretty much like other

computer-controlled boards—except that during the mixdown the faders move up and down like the invisible man is sitting at the console! Of course, "Neve," being the Rolls Royce of mixing boards, is out of the price range for most radio stations. But there are other systems that are in most radio budget areas.

The Totally Digital Board

In the past, I have fantasized in this column about totally digital studios, and it looks like the future is upon us. All of the fancy computer boards pass analog audio. Even when a digital recording is made, it is mixed in analog and converted back to digital.

Analog Digital Synergy Inc. has announced a totally digital board called the "Synergy One." ADS has responded to an increasing demand with the use of digital signal processing in postproduction, CD mastering, and satellite up/down linking. Why require several A/D and D/A conversions when the audio can be handled completely in its digital state? The board is set up like a normal mixing console to make it user friendly, or better yet, to prevent scared audio engineers from seeking another profession. This type of equipment was previously not available or exorbitantly priced.

Now that the ice is broken, it's just a matter of time before this or some other company will come up with a completely digital system for radio. Your broadcast studio will be as quiet and clean as a compact disc. The conversion to analog will take place when the signal goes into the transmitter. Or even better, in your receiver at home.

In The Tubes

Tube power amps keep popping up here and there because some audio engineers feel that tube amps are more efficient than solid state. Carvin makes an excellent tube instrument power amplifier, but a company in Denmark (called "Lydkraft") is marketing a line of tube processors. They look like the old Ampex processors, but the similarity stops at their appearance. The new specs exceed most solid state processors. Having been a longtime fan of tube power amps, I was not surprised.

Over the next few weeks, Tech Notes will take a look at the wide range of new equipment available for radio, recording, and sound reinforcement. It's

impressive, believe me!

THE PLATTERS:

The Greatest R&B Group of the '50s

In 1953, the first original member of the Platters was Herbert Reed, a bass singer. He had difficulty keeping the group together the first year—but a local hangout on the corner of 56th and Central Ave. in Los Angeles kept him well-supplied with replacements.

In spite of early setbacks, Herbert remained determined to create a group called the Platters, regardless of how long it took him to find the right combination.

In 1954 Herbert's associate, arranger Buck Ram (who still lives in L.A.) met Tony Williams (the original lead voice of the Platters). Ram, who had arranged music for greats such as Duke Ellington, Count Basie and Cab Calloway, was instrumental in persuading Williams to join the Platters.

Initially, there were four members: Herbert Reed, Tony Williams, David Lynch and Alex Hodge. Feeling that the group was still incomplete, Buck Ram decided that a girl would be the ideal addition to the group.

A woman named Shirley Gunther brought her new group the Queens to audition for Ram. Among the six members, he found the one he wanted—little Zola Taylor. The guys in the Platters were proud, knowing that no other group on the scene had anyone like her as part of their personnel and they "adopted" Zola as a kid sister.

Yes, it was Zola who caught the eye and turned the head of all and she did it on an international level. (Including mine when the group appeared at the Apollo!) In my recent phone interview with Zola, she told me that in September 1954, original member Alex Hodge was replaced by Paul Robi; today, there are several groups who perform as 'The Platters' on both the East and the West Coast, including 'Paul Robi's Platters,' and Zola, who bills herself as 'Zola Taylor, Formerly of the Original Platters.'

While court battles continue to be waged over use of the misnomer, Buck Ram still owns the rights to the group's name. Added Zola: "As far as I'm

concerned, only the original members should have the right to use the name."

Early West Coast hits of the group included titles such as "Love All Night" and "Tell the World." By July 1955, the original line-up of the Platters had their first hit on Mercury Records, "Only You." Five months later, the group scored again with their second #1 hit: "The Great Pretender." In 1956 there were still more smashes: "The Magic Touch," "My Prayer" and "You'll Never Know."

In 1957, there was "One In A Million" and "My Dream." The following year, the group hit with "Twilight Time," "Smoke Gets In Your Eye." In 1959: "Enchanted." In 1960: "Harbor Lights." By 1966, the group had some new members and a label deal with Musicor Records. Its hits on that label included "I Love You 1000 Times," "With This Ring," "Washed Ashore" and "Sweet, Sweet Lovin'."

By 1969, Herbert Ross was the last original member to leave the group. "In 1981, original members Alex Hodges and David Lynch passed away," said Zola. "They both were very close and died approximately four months apart. I spoke with Tony Williams last week. He now lives in New York, but we're still in touch.

"As for Herbert," she said, "he lives in Boston and I'll be speaking to him very soon."

Aside from her distinction as being a member of the Platters, Zola was also the first legal wife of the late Frankie Lymon; the singer was married three times and had a child by Elizabeth Waters Lymon. Just recently, after years of legal suits, it was finalized that Zola and Elizabeth will share 50/50 in possession of the Lymon estate. According to reliable sources, that amounts to nearly 3 million dollars. Lymon's third wife was not included in the settlement.

In closing, I'd like to personally thank Zola for granting me the interview. And good luck to her on her weekend gig at KGFJ/Los Angeles!



This title track from the group's latest LP is an uptempo cut mixed with Rap. This is the *baddest* song on the LP!

New singing artist/actor Harewood comes out with a strong ballad for all demographics.

THE BOYS "DIAL MY HEART"

A number one single for sure. A hot dance number and one that's generating hot and heavy telephone requests from teens and young adults. The group is reminiscent of a very young lackson Five.

SALT-N-PEPA "EVERYBODY GET UP"

These hot female rappers are back with another big hit. The phones are ringing for this, their latest offering, which should head up to the top of the charts. Watch out for crossover action.

ROBERT BROOKINS f/Stephanie Mills "WHERE IS THE LOVE"

I usually don't like cover songs, but as soon as the needle hit the record, I went searching for love! Robert & Stephanie's warm and soothing rendition of this classic hit makes everyone want to be with that special someone.

NANCY WILSON "NANCY NOW"

This newly released LP from the great Nancy Wilson is perfect for the Quiet Storm format. Put the needle to the LP to hear hot cuts like the first single "Quiet Fire." Listeners should look out for "It's That Time Again" and "Ebb Tide." This is vintage Nancy for sure.

SURFACE: STILL 'HAPPY' AT THE TOP



he team of Bernard Jackson, David 'Pic' Conley and David Townsend, known collectively as CBS' Surface, hit the heights last year with "Happy." As songwriter/ producers (with credits that include Rebbie Jackson and Isaac Hayes), Surface has established a serious reputation. Now, with a new hit ("I Missed"), they're back with the aptly-titled 2nd Wave LP.

•Approaching their second LP

Special Co

"We wanted to come up with a real balance between sensitive love ballads and strong uptempo tracks. We all felt that our faster grooves could be stronger, representative of Surface, and yet musically into what's happening today."

•Following a smash

"We weren't worried about backing up the first LP. CBS believed in us and what we could do and we delivered an LP that we're more than pleased with. And they seem to feel the same way. We just continued with what we did before. There was a lot of spirit and love involved in doing this LP."

•The success of 'Happy'

"The song 'Happy' was one of the oldest tunes on our first LP and it actually wasn't the first single from the LP. That was 'Let's Try Again,' but it didn't do too well the first time and ended up being re-released as our third single. We had no idea that 'Happy' would be such a big smash or that it would cross to the pop charts. We just do music. We definitely don't write with 'crossover' in mind. We just do what we do."

•The road

"We did a lot of track dates on shows with artists like Atlantic Starr and Levert and we got the chance to play before 8,000 sometimes 10,000 people. In 1989, we'll be going out 'live' and we can't wait!"

LENNY WILLIAMS: HE'S GOT THE POWER!

fter a six year absence, one of the most distinctive voices in black music is back. Lenny Williams, the man with the soulful sound on Tower of Power's "What Is Hip?" and "So Very Hard To Go," plus Kenny G.'s "Don't Make Me Wait For Love," is back in fine form on "Givin' Up On Love," a prelude to a much-awaited new LP (on Crush Records).

•On sabbatical


"After my first two solo LPs on ABC (Choosing You and Spark Of Love), the company was sold to MCA when I was working on my third LP Love Current. I left MCA, went back to college and I began doing volunteer work on a full time basis with Oakland public schools. I got involved with an anti-drug campaign started by a friend of mine, Delvin Williams (running back for The Miami Dolphins and for The San Francisco 49'ers) and wrote a theme song, 'Just Say No.' I did things that I needed to do and simply put music on a back-burner."

•His current recording situation

"I got inspired after I saw Gladys Knight & The Pips perform one night in Seattle, earlier this year. I knew I was ready to get back into the business. I started writing songs with Chester Thompson (formerly with Tower Of Power) and called my longtime manager Sandy Newman. She hooked me up with K-Tel and I signed with a division of the company, Crush Records. They told me they didn't need to hear a tape. We went right in and cut 'Givin' Up On Love."

•A new LP

"Since ballads and love songs have always been my forte, I can guarantee that we'll have some great tunes. I'm also going to be calling in favors! Jesse Johnson told me that as part of the group



The Time, the guys would acknowledge that a lot of their sound evolved from

Tower Of Power—so he's one of the people I'll be calling for some material!"

ALBUMS

CHARLIE ELGART—SIGNS OF LIFE—NOVUS/RCA—Elgart takes the Fusion genre and expands on it, adding Funk, Electronic, and even Dance-flavored sensibilities to the various grooves found here. Don't think for a minute that musicianship is lacking though; hot synth, sax and bass work grace the smooth sounding LP throughout its many moods. Go for the sweet and smooth sound of "Float," which bears a resemblence to Caldera's Fusion classic "Sky Islands." Demos: Adults, Jazz lovers.

SLAVE—"88"—ICHIBAN (404-926-3377)—Ichiban's classic R&B team return with a solid sounding, and dance-oriented album. Sailing straight for the mainstream, the group presents cool mid-tempo jams like the Pop-influenced lead cut "Shine." "Because Of You" brings the tempo down to a slow boil with a happy, romantic feel and "So Fine" is a hard funker for the dancers. Demos: Young Adults.

MARK ANTHONY—JUMPIN' OFF—TABU/EPA—Anthony releases his second album produced by hit man Preston Glass and Noel Closson. "Kiss You All Over" is the first single to jump. "1919 Main Street" is a smoking Dance/Urban cut with a nice Carl Burnett guitar solo and "Be All Mine" is a Pop-flavored, mid-tempo dance jam. Good clean R&B fun! Demos: Young Adults.

SAMANTHA FOX—I WANNA HAVE SOME FUN—JIVE/RCA—Sexy super-heroin Samantha has a heavy hit with the dance cut "I Wanna Have Some Fun" produced by seasoned hit-makers Full Force. Try the House and Acid inflected beats of "Love House" and the albums only other Full Force production "Next To Me." Another winning standout is Stock, Aitken and Waterman's production of the Dance hit "I Only Wanna Be With You." Demos: Teens, Young Adults.

JUNIOR DELGADO—ONE STEP MORE—MANGO/ISLAND—Delgado had one of the best Reggae albums of last year with "Raggamuffin Year," and this follow-up release bears the same politically sophisticated and musically deep feeling. Crystal clear production makes every cut a poignant journey into the lushly beautiful regions of contemporary Reggae. Titles like "Hanging Tree," "Forward Revolution" and "Riot In A Juvenile Prison" bear witness to the artist's strong sense of social realism, while shining a ray of hope into the dark night of Babylon. Demos: Reggae lovers.

RAY, GOODMAN & BROWN—MOOD FOR LOVIN'—ORPHEUS/EMI—The talented R&B vocal trio adds 24-year-old talent Greg Willis on three of the cuts here. "Where Did You Get That Body Baby" and the album's title cut are two of those and may be the hottest selections we've found. For setting a quiet romantic mood, this is just the right thing! Demos: Adults, Females.

SINGLES

ASWAD—FEELINGS/GIVE A LITTLE LOVE—MANGO/ISLAND—Aswad goes for a sweet romantic groove on this down-tempo Reggae love song. The B-Side is equally mellow with soprano sax riffs punctuating the lyrics. Demos: Reggae fans.

ALEESE SIMMONS—I WANT TO BE YOUR LOVE—ORPHEUS/EMI—Vocalist Simmons lays down a sexy performance on this mid-paced R&B composition, showing off some soulful vocal licks that complement a smartly commercial arrangement. Dance sensibilities shine brightest. Demos: Young Adults, Dancers.

MYLEKA—CONFESS—MCA—Myleka Thompson is a newcomer with a sweet, attractive sound that's got a touch of innocence to it. The only thing this singer must confess to is an affection for straight-ahead dance music. Produced by Ricky Timas. Demos: Dancers, Young Adults.

SCOTT GERTNER—QUEEN OF THE BOULEVARD—STAR CITY/CBS—Serious vocals are the highlight of this mid-paced R&B cut. Freddie Jackson and Luther come to mind immediately as this fresh talent takes his first solo shot. Demos: Young Adults, Females.

BOB BAILEY—INNER CITY BLUES(MAKE ME WANNA HOLLER)—AIRBORNE—Bailey does Marvin Gaye right with this on-time cover version. Interesting production work and smooth vocals closely parallel the original. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.


JAMES D-TRAIN WILLIAMS—RUNNER—COLUMBIA—D-Train keeps crankin' out high quality R&B music, this time with a mid-tempo cut from the *In Your Eyes* album. Williams and Hubert Eaves produce another hit for Black radio. Demos: Young Adults, Females.

ISAAC HAYES—LET ME BE YOUR EVERYTHING—COLUMBIA—Isaac releases a slow, slow dance from the *Love Attack* album. The ballad is all Rap, and Hayes uses his well earned seductive powers to get the message across. Demos: Females, Adults.

PATRICIA HODGES—IN YOUR LIFETIME—CORNERSTONE—No flash or trash here, this fine composition from the musical "Heaven Only Knows" is pure power and talent. Hodges offers an emotional and deeply expressive performance on this inspirational ballad. Demos: Adults, Females.

ROBERT IRVING—MIDNIGHT DREAM—VERVE/FORECAST/POLYGRAM—Irving gets down to his solo career with this self-penned, produced and arranged Pop groove. Funky synths and Phil Perry vocals make this a viable radio pick for the Miles Davis associate. Demos: Young Adults.

ONLY IN THE DARK—MAKE NOISE—PROFILE (212) 529-2600—Produced, mixed and edited by Carlos Berrios, this dance jam is ready to rock Clubs and Radio with its startlingly innovative sound. Demos: Young Adults, Dancers.

SINGLES

FAT BOYS—LOUIE LOUIE—TIN PAN APPLE/MERCURY—Clocking in at over a thousand pounds, this girthful trio are back again with another whacky Hip Hop cut for the kids. Making the most out of one of Rock music's classic anthems, this one is good to go! Demos:Teens.

TONE LOC—WILD THING—DELICIOUS VINYL—Tone Loc is rapidly rising to Rap super-star status with successively more intense releases. Following up "On Fire" and "I Got It Goin' On," Loc has smashed to smithereens the format barrier by garnering immediate airplay on Urban radio. Blazing phones and concommitant Club play spell mega-smash for the eloquent MC. Demos: Teens and Young Adults.

KURTIS BLOW—ONLY THE STRONG SURVIVE—MERCURY/POLYGRAM—Coming out swinging like a terrible Tyson of Rap, Blow is not about to rest on his well-earned Hip Hop laurels. This midpaced selection lays down the law for teens who might think it's cool to hit the crack pipe. Don't do it!!!!! Demos: Teens, dancers.

FREEZE FACTOR—LAY BACK AND CHILL—EPIC—Yo, this is a rap record! The groove kicks off with a down-tempo and furiously funky beat, then gets down to business. Produced by Mtume. Demos: Teens.

K-9 POSSE—AINT NOTHIN TO IT—ARISTA—Arista jumps into the Rap arena with this premier Hip Hop release. Produced by Bobby "Bobcat" Erwin, one of the best D.J.'s on the scene and veteran hitmaking producer, the K-9 Posse gets treated to a def, Go-Go influenced production. Demos: Teens, Dancers.

SCHOOLLY D—NO MORE ROCK 'N ROLL—JIVE/RCA—Schoolly has never pulled any punches, but this latest jam has been cleaned up for radio. Dissing the likes of Bon Jovi and Prince all in the same breath, the rhymer may find those sentiments echoed by his large underground following. Demos: Teens.

ALBUMS

ORIGINAL CONCEPT—STRAIGHT FROM THE BASEMENT OF COOLEY HIGH—DEF JAM/COLUMBIA—One of this label's longest running crews comes back with a new collection. Staying true to the group's innovative sound the album contains fresh dance tracks like the hot mid-tempo cut "Legend." "Charlie Sez" is a more up-tempo and decidedly bass-heavy Hip-Hop groove and "Runnin' Yo Mouth" uses Tower Of Power's "Squib Cakes." Check out the live version of OC's hit "Pump That Bass." Demos: Teens, Dancers.

MALE VS. FEMALE—BATTLE OF THE SEXES—JIVE/RCA—Jive busts out a compilation that pits the B-Boys against the B-Girls with a side dedicated to each. 2 Live Crew offers the clean version of "We Want Some P---y" while M.C. Lyte counters with "I Cram To Understand U." Schooly D offers "Gucci Time" and X-Rated rapper Too Short discourses on the subject of "Little Girls." Demos: Teens, Dancers.

HARD AS HELL VOLUME 2—VARIOUS ARTISTS—PROFILE—This second volume of the Profile compilation series features Hip Hop acts from the ever expanding British Rap music scene. Derek B leads off the LP with his killer cut "Goodgroove" and Einstein takes on a Jazzy Jeff style with an X-rated slant on "Friday Night & Saturday Morning." Asher D & Daddy Freddy present the Jamaican style on their hit "Brutality," while Hijack kicks out "Style Wars." Demos: Teens, Dancers.









MIDEM

AN
INTERNATIONAL
BUSINESS
OPPORTUNITY

n January, 1989, members of the international music community will gather for the 23rd annual MIDEM meeting in Cannes, France—the famous Riviera resort in the south of France. At a time when black music continues to be a dominant creative force on a global level—and particularly in Europe where the music is stronger than ever—this yearly event represents the ideal environment for independent labels, music industry entrepreneurs and those involved in the creative process to establish new international relationships and open up new business opportunities.

MIDEM's U.S. representative, James Lonsdale-Hands, talked to BRE recently about the meeting's background, what MIDEM offers and how it can be utilized most effectively for new participants.

BRE: Can you tell us about MIDEM's history?

JL: Bernard Chevry, a major player in the European music industry, founded MIDEM back in 1967 as a place for industry professionals to exchange ideas and do business. Over the years, it has grown and changed with the industry and it's now considered as the international meeting place for the record and publishing business. In 1988, we had between 8,000 and 9,000 individuals or company participants in attendance.

BRE: What makes MIDEM so successful? **JL:** There's much more of an emphasis on MIDEM as an exhibition. We offer major companies a chance to meet independent labels and the independ-

ents get an opportunity to present their product. It's particularly good because the European market is made up of a number of countries and this is really the only way you can really meet the decision-makers at record labels and publishers without having to go to each country separately.

BRE: What can an indie label representative expect at MIDEM?

JL: There are a number of booths and exhibitors—about 600—all in one location. There are people from all major European labels and even representatives from major U.S. labels—presidents and vice presidents that it might be tough for an independent label representative to meet face-to-face with at home.

BRE: How can someone participate at MIDEM?

JL: You have three choices: you can go as an exhibitor with your own completely furnished booth and that costs \$4000 and up. You can be part of a booth, sharing it with other companies from \$2000 on. Or you can attend as a participant without a booth: that costs \$1200 and that figure includes coverage for four full-time employees of a company.

BRE: How long does MIDEM last and what happens every day?

JL: The event takes place over five days. During the day, from 9:00am-7:00pm, it's an exhibition and then at night, from 7:00pm-5:00am, we have 'live' showcases sponsored by various record companies.

BRE: Who goes to MIDEM?

JL: We have about an equal percentage of record company personnel and publishers, with some equipment company representatives and all the major European radio stations are represented. There are participants from over 50 countries, including Japan, Brazil, Australia, the USSR and of course, all the European countries, the U.S. and Canada.

BRE: Who are some of the major black music participants at MIDEM?

JL: There's increasing participation from the black music industry here: Solar Records, Profile Records, Luke Skywalker Records, West Coast Record Distributors, Joe Jackson Productions, WEC Industries, among others.

BRE: What makes MIDEM attractive to black music participants?

JL: There really is such a big opportunity for black music since it is so popular worldwide. As you know, the demand in Europe for black music—R&B, Jazz, Rap, Blues, Gospel—is stronger than ever.

BRE: How should a new participant prepare for MIDEM?

JL: First, try to analyze your reason for going-what do you want to accomplish? Then, target those countries you're interested in doing business with. Once you're registered, you receive a list of who will be there. We suggest that people let us know how they'll participate two weeks before they go so we can give them any additional advice. Then, once you get to MIDEM, we suggest you spend the first day just checking out who else is there by walking around to see who might be potential buyers and sellers and then make appointments with the people you want to see.

BRE: What do the various categories of participants get out of being at MIDEM? JL: Overall, for independent labels and industry entrepreneurs, MIDEM provides a lot of business opportunities. It can be very useful for an aspiring recording artist, although it can be expensive for just one individual. For radio, MIDEM offers an exchange of ideas with European radio personnel, so people can get a sense of what's happening outside the U.S. Above all, at MIDEM there's a serious level of participation which enhances opportunities for meeting people and creating new contacts.

BRE: Give us some details of the 1989 meeting.

JL: MIDEM will take place from January 21-25, 1989 at the Palais des Festivals in Cannes in the South of France. It's advisable to register as soon as possible so you can arrange your accommodation immediately as the hotels get booked very quickly.

BRE: What are some examples for the cost of travel and accommodation?

JL: Air fares can range from \$700 roundtrip from Los Angeles, \$500 from New York. We refer participants to our travel people who can arrange good rates. Hotels vary from \$60 to \$250 a night and we make those arrangements for you when you register.

BRE: How do participants register?

JL: By contacting James Lonsdale-Hands at (212) 750-8899 or writing to me at the International Exhibition Organization, 845 Third Ave, 19th floor, New York, NY 10022. Full payment is required upon registration.

In upcoming weeks, BRE will talk with some of the black music participants at MIDEM to get further insights into the meeting's impact and effectiveness for those considering participation in the 1989 event.
