



# AN OPEN LETTER TO RUSSELL SIMMONS

ear Russell: As we were going to press with our year-end issue, we received a copy of a letter you wrote regarding the NAACP Image Awards to Clarence Avant of Tabu Records, a Chairperson of the event. You presented an eloquent and impassioned appeal to have the organization correct what you perceived to be its failure to recognize rap music and rap artists as an authentic reflection of black urban culture.

First, we certainly share your concern about any attempt to negate or diminish the impact of the latest American art form to emerge from the mean streets of blackness to become an international music phenomenon—in the mold of blues, jazz, r&b, gospel, etc. From the very beginning, we have documented the rise of rap from a 'stepchild' of black music to a genre which found its audience early and brought the formidable power of street acceptance to bear on the marketplace.

But to return to the issues you raised in the letter, I cannot speak directly on the NAACP's actions or what actually transpired, as I was not in attendance this year. However, rap artists did seem to be among those pictured in the in the finale photos and there was at least *one* rap award presented. That is not enough, I agree—but perhaps it is a start. As for the elitist mindsets you mentioned, too many of us are just as uncomfortable with the blues. Or a spiritual that too strongly reminds us of a painful, but noble past. Yes, we've got work to do.

Toward this end, the media has a very important role to play toward raising our level of consciousness. And your criticism of the conservative approach toward rap taken by the black consumer press is well founded. But as your letter was forwarded to us and other members of the black music trade press as well, I do want to stand up and be counted among those who have been at the forefront of solid rap coverage.

Through the years, we have proudly focused on the impressive accomplishments of the innovative leader in the rap arena—Rush Productions. In fact, the newest chapters in your company's evolution into a highly successful, diversified multi-million dollar corporation are detailed in our executive profile this week on Lyor Cohen.

So, my brother, the negative perceptions will ultimately correct themselves. Nothing succeeds like success.

VESTA—4U—A&M—Vesta goes straight for the dancers with this Attala Zane Giles production. Sparkling synths and a monster drum sound drive the mid-tempo song, while the singer offers a perfectly Pop-flavored performance. Demos: Young Adults, Dancers.

**DONNA ALLEN—JOY AND PAIN—OCEANA/ATLANTIC**—This Frankie Beverly composition gets a beautiful, jazzy treatment from producer Lou Pace. Donna's gorgeous vocals give the song a sophisticated sound as it treads between Jazz and R&B. Demos: Adults, Young Adults.

**SURFACE—CLOSER THAN FRIENDS—COLUMBIA—**Surface has a fine R&B ballad with this hotly added selection. With strong multi-format possibilities, the song is a seductive slow dance that will appeal to all, especially the ladies. Demos: All.

**LEVERT—JUST COOLIN'—ATLANTIC**—Here's another winner with that devastating combination of Rap and R&B! Big-time rhymer Heavy D throws down some funky lines in between the group's melodic vocals as a Hip Hop beat backs the track. Additional Hip Hop production by Stetsasonic's Daddy O. Demos: Young Adults, Teens.

**BETTY WRIGHT**—4u2njoy—MS.B/VISION—305/893-9191—For singer Betty Wright the focus is clearly on pure soul, as she turns loose this excellent Indie release. Betty produced the cuts herself and kept an energetic, spontaneous feel throughout the album, showing her talent in its naturally soulful state. Go for the title track, or the melodic Pop/Funk cut "It's Been Real." The single "From Pain To Joy" is a sweet ballad with Gospel flavorings. Demos: Young Adults, Females.

**BUNNY WAILER—LIBERATION—SHANACHIE**—Original Wailers member Bunny teams with the rhythm section of Sly Dunbar and Robbie Shakespeare for this socially conscious collection of classic sounding Reggae. Words of Black liberation and gentle Reggae rhythms combine for an entrancing effect. Demos: Reggae fans.

# ASCAP to Mark 75th Anniversary With Concert & Exhibit

LOS ANGELES: On February 13th the American Society of Composers, Authors & Publishers (ASCAP) will mark its 75th anniversary with an exhibit that will run from February 3rd through April 1st at the Vincent Astor Gallery of the New York Public Library, and at a concert at the Shubert Theatre in Los Angeles on February 13th.

The "ASCAP: The Music of America" exhibit, which will be open to the public, will feature original music manuscripts, rare photographs and other memorabilia from famous ASCAP members such as George Gershwin, Bob Dylan, Stevie Wonder, Irving Berlin and Dizzy Gillespie.

The concert will be an unprecedented gathering on one stage of several generations of leading composers/ lyricists performing their own songs. (Proceeds from ticket sales will benefit the ASCAP Foundation.) Those slated to appear include Smokey Robinson, Steve Allen, Hal David, Burt Bacharach, Henry Mancini and Cab Calloway.

# RCA Reports \$115 Million In Gross Revenues

NEW YORK: RCA Records has reported gross revenues at \$115 million for the sixmonth period ending December 31, 1988. This is more than a 15% jump over the same period in 1987, and a whooping 40% jump over label figures two years ago.

Successful breakthroughs accounting for the continuing growth included Rick Astley, DJ Jazzy Jeff & the Fresh Prince, Samantha Fox, and Jonathan Butler, along with the ongoing sales of the Dirty Dancing and More Dirty Dancing soundtracks.

# Griffey Vindicated In Legal Dispute With Leon Sylvers



LOS ANGELES: The California Supreme Court has fully vindicated Dick Griffey in an ongoing dispute between the Solar Records chief and Al Ross (Rosy Publishing) concerning the songwriting services of producer Leon Sylvers. It was ruled by a unanimous decision that Ross was not entitled to receive any damages for alleged "contractual interference."

This ruling brings to an end over 10 years of litigation relating to the services of Sylvers, producer of such hits as The Whispers' "And the Beat Goes On," "Keep On Loving Me" and "It's A Love Thing," and Shalamar's "Second Time Around," "This Is For the Lover In You" and "Make That Move."

"When I got involved with Leon Sylvers," said Griffey, "he had been put out of the group, The Sylvers. He did not have a place to live. He was broke down and out. I offered him an opportunity to use his talents

when no one else in the industry was interested in him. As a result, Leon earned substantial sums of money from Solar and other record labels. To be sued for giving an individual an opportunity to succeed, I always felt was ludicrous and unjust.

"Fortunately, the Court agreed with me," he said.

# Adler reactivates Ode label at A&M

HOLLYWOOD: Music industry veteran Lou Adler returns to the ranks of label owner/producer with the reactivation of Ode Records—a powerhouse in the early '70s with megahit LPs by Carole King and Cheech & Chong. Ode will again be distributed by A&M and will release its first single on the Northwestbased group Cool'R at the end of this month. (See "Intro...").

Adler, whose industry interests include film ventures and the Sunset Strip landmark Roxy nightclub, cites the discovery of Cool'R at the club as a key factor in his decision to reopen the label after a decade-long hiatus. He also produced the group's LP at the suggestion of A&M cofounder Herb Alpert. Ode's has also signed and recorded the group Native.

According to the terms of the labels' multi-year deal, all Ode product will be worked through the A&M system; Ode will, however, retain creative and repertoire control.

# **BESLA Conference Calls For** "More Black Representation"

NEW YORK: The Black Entertainment and Sports Lawyers Association (BESLA) held its eighth annual conference in Puerto Vallarta, Mexico recently. Over 100 lawyers and business executives in music, television, film and sports attended the four day conference to discuss ways in which to increase black representation of celebrities and sports stars.

"We are seeing more black agents, managers and entertainment lawyers represnting black artists," BESLA executive director Kendall Minter told BRE."But it's not on a mass scale. It's still happening on a one-by-one level, and we're taking it one battle at a time."

Commmenting on Arsenio Hall's recent angry comments to the media regarding charges from the Beverly Hills chapter of the NAACP that his late night talk show doesn't have enough blacks on staff, Minter said: "I understand his defensive posture, but it has to start at the top with role models such as Hall, Eddie Murphy, Michael Jackson and the like. They're the ones with decision-making clout, and those are the artists who have to lead the way in black hiring."

At the BESLA convention banquet in Mexico, Rachel Robinson, chairperson of the Jackie Robinson Foundation, was the keynote speaker. She also received BESLA's first Award of Excellence for her contributions to the sports and entertainment industry.

# Sugar Hill & MCA To Reach Settlement

LOS ANGELES: Sugar Hill Records' long-pending suit against MCA Records and MCA Distributing Corp. is nearing the out-of-court settlement stage according to industry reports. In 1983 MCA had signed a distribution deal with Sugar Hill and bought the rights to its Chess/Checker/Cadet catalog. One of the charges levied against MCA is that it "manipulated" Sugar Hill into lowering the sales price of the catalog.

While the details of the settlement have not been finalized, the Englewood, N.J.-based Sugar Hill label is proceeding with its plans to release five new LPs and other product through independent distributors.

# LYOR COHEN Breaking Corporate Barriers at Rush

iven the radical way in which rap has evolved as a significant genre, it's no surprise that many of the principal players in the rap arena are far from

being the typical up-through-theexecutive-ladder kind of people. Take Lyor Cohen, Chief Operator at Rush Management, unquestionably the premier management operation in the field. A native of Manhattan, Lyor's background includes a degree in Finance and Marketing from the University of Miami and a stint at the Beverly Hills offices of the Israeli national bank, Bank Leumi as a financial analyst.

"I was on the entertainment committee at college and I'd always been into what I'd call 'fringe' music, especially living in Hollywood. We're talking about 1983 and I wanted to promote music that the large promoters weren't touching— Third World stuff, punk and rap," Lyor recalls. He started The Mix Club in Hollywood and finally quit his bank job at the end of the year to become fully involved in the music business.

The young entrepreneur's first major success came when he booked Run-D.M.C. at the club. "I borrowed \$800 from my mother and we made \$18,000 that night. After appearing earlier at the Sports Arena, they came down at 2:00 a.m. and did a set. Russell Simmons (founder of Rush) found out what I was up to in L.A. so I kept calling him and I became road manager for Run-D.M.C. in 1985."

Lyor recalls his early days on the road with fondness: "With Run-D.M.C., we broke down every barrier. I went out on tour with them across the country several times and made a lot of friends in the marketplace and at radio. I produced all the arena shows with 60 to 80 employees; it was my job to make sure that the whole thing went smoothly. I'd say it was an extremely important learning experience and I continued that function until the middle of 1986." Utilizing his road experience, his earlier work as a club promoter and his financial background ("that has definitely helped"), Lyor concentrated his energy on working with Simmons and the staff at Rush in building the company. "Our goal has been to represent the best in teenage talent and my job has essentially included dealing with the day-today activities of our acts' careers. One of my first objectives was to legitimize the tours, and to restructure the financial arrangements so that the groups we handle would make more money."

Certainly as significant in terms of industry-wide impact was Lyor's success in the area of merchandising and obtaining corporate sponsorships for different rap acts. "Getting those initial merchandising situations wasn't easy," he recalls. "It took a lot of convincing to get those big companies involved. With merchandising, we finally persuaded Winterland to do that for Run-D.M.C and then they had to take the rest of the groups, like Whodini, L.L. Cool J., Eric B. & Rakim and Public Enemy. Now, you can get posters, T-shirts, buttons, everything at each gig. Traditionally, inner-city teenagers weren't seen as having the discretionary income that suburban kids did when they'd go to concerts. Since 1985, we've seen growth in revenue from merchandising each year."

Facing executives at giant corporations for whom the word 'rap' symbolized something one took for messing up or something you gave a kid on the knuckles was also no picnic, Lyor says. "I see myself as a deal-maker, a deal-closer. We approached Adidas with the idea of getting them involved with Run-D.M.C after the group did 'My Adidas.' While we were quite literally thrown out of their offices to begin with, we ended up with a sevendigit deal, bigger than the kind that most athletes get. In fact, the deal wasso unique that it got a lot of attention from the entire advertising industry and coverage in major weekly publications."

Subsequent sponsorship deals that Lyor has been responsible for include hook-ups for DJ Jazzy Jeff & The Fresh Prince with Le Coq Sportif clothing, for Run-D.M.C with "New" Coke and for L.L. Cool J. with Troop clothing. "There will be an endorsement for Public Enemy shortly and there are some other very large deals currently being negotiated," states Lyor, noting: "It was very important for the street to see that their heroes could get deals like this. As it turned out the deals themselves weren't always the most important aspect. A tremendous amount of dollars have been spent in cross-marketing the groups and the brand names-that's very crucial. Coke spent almost \$22 million in advertising, for instance, on Run-D.M.C. With the rap marketplace getting more and more competitive, having a vehicle to crossmarket is even more important, as long as the creative aspect is true to the artist and the act maintains control in the area of their integrity."

Lyor says that his aim has always been "to develop a multi-million dollar business—and that's what we've been doing. The big challenge was been to pivot off the success of Run-D.M.C. and to start building an important roster. Personally, I've been responsible for signing Stetsasonic, EPMD, Roxanne, DJ Jazzy Jeff & Fresh Prince, Slick Rick and Eric B. & Rakim to the company and I've been involved with everything from scratch with those acts."





The biggest surprise was the exit of **Frank Chaplin** from Columbia Records after over 12 years with the company. As of 1/23 his slot has not been filled. **Pat Edwards** has exited WEA to return to her previous post as marketing rep with Motown Records. **Ronnie Looper** has left her job with Geffen Records to join Island Records as Midwest regional promo manager. **Tiffany Hall**, marketing rep for A&M, will assume her new duties in Kansas City as marketing rep for a three-state area.

Changes have also occurred on the radio side. **Dee Handley**, former PD for WLNR-FM, has joined WGCI as an assistant to **Sonny Taylor**, PD at WGCI. **Denise Campbell** has been promoted to local sales manager for WVAZ.

In the latest ARBitron ratings WVAZ (formerly WBMX-FM) has once again posted an upward surge. Morning drive jock **Richard Steele** has vaulted into the top ten.

Marv Dyson, president of WGCI, introduced a new talk format for the AM station. Previously the AM was used

history, Orpheus Records —a joint venture between Hush Productions and EMI Records created this past September—has already established its presence within the industry. The label's first two releases, "Can U Read My Lips" by Z'Looke and Aleese Simmons' "I Want To Be Your Lover," are both major hit records. In fact, the Z'Looke single reached the #1 position on a national urban contemporary chart this week—signalling a very strong start for the young company.

n its brief four-month

"In looking at the success of Z'Looke and Aleese, I have to say that we were right on the money. I must congratulate Varnell Johnson, VP, Urban Promotion at EMI and his entire staff for their assistance in launching our first two artists."

With an enviable track record as one of the most successful management and production companies in the business, Hush Productions' move into the marketplace via Orpheus Records is a logical step in its development as a multifaceted entertainment entity. The company's golden roster includes such major stars as Melba Moore, Freddie Jackson and Najee, artists whose success has been the result of long-term planning and career development—key factors in Hush Productions' approach in both personal management and record production.

Since Hush had already placed its artists with companies including Capitol, EMI, Epic, RCA and Poly-Gram, the opportunity to create a label to nurture new talent was virtually inevitable. It was almost a year ago that the creation of Orpheus Records as a label focusing on urban and contemporary jazz-oriented music was initiated through a series of conversations between Huggins and Joe Smith, President and CEO, Capitol Industries-EMI Inc. and later with Sal Licata, President and CEO, EMI and Ron Urban, Senior VP and GM, EMI.

Certainly the enormous success of Z'Looke and Aleese Simmons are testimony to the strength of the artists and the label's commitment to developing and breaking new music. With the imminent release of Alex Bugnon's sensational debut LP, Love Season, and the array of exciting projects forthcoming we feel we have every reason to believe that Orpheus Records will continue to emerge as one of the premier new labels in the industry.'

The creation of a topflight staff to establish the label as a potent force in the marketplace has been a priority. As President and CEO, Charles Huggins continues to set the tone for the company's growth and expansion: "We hope to develop some long term recording artists whom the public wants to hear and most importantly, whose product they want to buy. We're looking to set the trend in hit music by establishing strong production values and using the Hush expertise in the marketing of Orpheus Records product."

A&R responsibilities for Orpheus are handled by Beau Huggins with Kevin Harewood, VP and GM, overseeing all business—related affairs of the com-





pany-including negotiation and signing of contracts and administration of the label's day-to-day activities. "I have an overview of what's happening on a daily basis and with Charles. I work on the overall direction of the company from a corporate standpoint," comments Harewood.

'Orpheus is a joint venture between Hush and EMI Records and it will function largely in the entrepreneurial and creative spirit that has allowed Hush Productions to become one of the predominant management and production companies in the business. Under the leadership of Sal Licata, EMI has much of the same aggressive, entrepreneurial approach that Hush has-so it's a perfect marriage. Orpheus Records is another step in our growth as a multi-faceted creative and corporate entity.'

As Promotion VP, Rod Butler (former East Coast National Director of Black Music at Capitol Records and a ten-year veteran at the label) is naturally excited about the response to the label's initial releases. "I'm really happy with the acceptance we've had at radio for our product. I feel fortunate that we came with two great records out-of-the-box: so many fledgling labels are not able to start out with such strong product." Butler heads up a staff of four: Executive Assistant Rhonda Blackshear and regional promotion people-Al J. Wallace, who works out of Atlanta; Michelle T. Boone, based in Chicago and Derek Caldwell in Los Angeles, supplemented by EMI's national promotional staff. "We're all working to establish a permanent slice of the black music marketplace for the company."

Based on the West Coast, Walter Lee brings his years of experience at Capitol Records to his work with Orpheus. In







# FCC CLEARS FM SHORT SPACING RULES

You may remember late last year that "Tech Notes" covered the issue of the FCC's plan to allow the use of directional antennas and for FM station spacing to be shortened. Well, here's the followup: Even with all the opposition by various groups (especially the NAB), the FCC approved the issue although the final vote was not unanimous among the commissioners.

This ruling won't have any effect on small markets, but according to arguments made by the FCC it could prove disastrous in large markets with already crowded FM bands. The FCC has promised to monitor and maintain the situation carefully.

# STATE LICENSING OF **BROADCASTING ENGINEERS**

This is an issue that would place broadcast engineers (ie. chief engineer) under the same scrutiny as engineers in other fields. If a state should pass such laws it would mean that your chief, contract and consulting broadcast engineers would be required to pass a written or oral examination, in addition to being required to have a four year degree.

Passing a test is one thing, but I haven't encountered many broadcast engineers with a four year degree and I've crossed paths with quite a few engineers in my career of umpteenth years. I can only think of one that I wouldn't allow to plug in a microphone. I do know where that engineer is, but the fact that this person does not get work tells me that we're already doing a pretty good job of regulating ourselves.

to numerous different labels, Lyor has the opportunity "to flow through every record company, most majors and independents. I try to work with the labels in breaking our acts. Right now, Eric B. & Rakim have their biggest record ever and we're going to be breaking Roxanne and Stetsasonic. For the most part, the people I deal with at the labels are tremendous-there are very few slouches out there.

The broadcast engineer is a special breed of person. A chief engineer must be technically creative, an excellent problem solver and a diplomat. And after having recently moved a six foot solid microwave dish, I can add that a little muscle would not hurt.

engineer a person would attend a two year college or technical school. These schools put the main emphasis on technical subjects such as the repair of electronic circuits, a subject very relevant to everyday life as a chief engineer. Others in the field receive training in the military and while some of this training is very specialized, many fine broadcast engineers have benefitted from it. I have known some ex-military technicians who could make a transmitter get up and dance!

The four year degree engineer is trained to design electronic equipment; the tech school grad learns to repair and modify existing equipment. Of course, all of us from time to time have to design and build a black box, but the main job of the chief engineer at a radio station is to install and maintain the station's equipment. The creativity to do this cannot be taught in a classroom or proven by a test. You will find that most good broadcast engineers are in the business because they want to be, not because they have a degree and a job was open.

Personally, I believe that it would be a waste of a four year degreed engineer to do some of the work we have to do to keep a radio station on the air.

Another good point brought up by opponents is that the four year engineer typically earns about three times the

salary that a chief engineer can command. Having to deal only with those who possess a degree would put a financial hardship on small stations, not to mention many minority-owned properties. Some stations may be forced to use contract engineers to do repairs with very little preventative maintenance.

The licensing issue has been pushed in New Jersey, New Mexico, Michigan and Washington State by the National Society of Professional Engineers and the National Council of Engineering Examiners. It is being opposed by the National Association of Radio and Television Engineers (NARTE).

So far the issue has been shot down in the above-mentioned states, but other states are considering the move and Washington, DC is getting in on the deal. The hope of NARTE is to draft federal legislation to prevent states from passing licensing laws. You can help by writing your representatives-both state and federal—or by getting in touch with your local NARTE office.



In most cases chief engineers are hired on the recommendation of other engineers and I don't know of any engineers who would recommend a Larry, Moe and Curly engineering team to install even their competitor's transmitter. There's just too much pride in the profession for that!

As for those who feel that the handle "Engineer" should only be bestowed upon those with a four year degree, my feeling is that you can call me an "Electron Chaser" as long as the paychecks get signed.



# WHATEVER HAPPENED TO ...? DEBRA LAWS: She's Still 'Very Special'



Maybe it's too soon to ask "whatever happened to" Debra Laws because I learned that she has just signed a deal with PolyGram Records. (Congratulations, Debra!)

Of course, this talented lady is well known to fans and industry peers as the younger sister of the jazz world's Hubert, Ronnie and Eloise Laws. She made her own debut as a recording artist with her 1981 Very Special LP on Elektra, an LP particularly special in that it was produced by her brothers.

Now signed with Management Associates Inc. based in St. Paul, Minnesota, Debra said: "I remember listening to the radio as a child and being influenced by so many artists. The rest of my inspiration came from my family." Laughing, she noted: "I remember how, at night, my brother Ronnie would call out for my mother to 'please tell Debra to stop singing and go to sleep!' But I also remember my mother putting her ear to the door and just listening. My family has always given me a lot of support."

It is easier to climb the ladder of success when an already established artist takes you under their wing and gives you guidance, according to the young singer. However, once you get the initial boost, you have to hold your own. Debra's own fortitude was instilled in her at an early age when—as one in a family of eight youngsters—she was encouraged to participate in church functions.

A native of Houston, Debra attended a community college and studied visual arts in New York: "I had left home while in the seventh grade to live with Hubert in New York, and when he went to California I went with him." In 1971, as a teenager, she recorded her first tune ("What Do You Think of the World Now") with Hubert on his CTI Records LP, *Morning Star*; she subsequently appeared with him in support of the LP at the Apollo Theatre.

Hubert was instrumental in Debra's landing her first label deal: "Again, it's not so much what you know, it's who you know," she acknowledged. Hanging out in studios is a good way to build contacts, according to Debra. "And of course you need to put together a good demo and shop it around. If you're good, it'll eventually get picked up."

There is talk that Debra, Ronnie, Hubert and Eloise (who sings mostly contemporary spiritual music these days) may release a family LP together. "We've had several meetings on it, but currently our schedules are different. Even though we're a close-knit family, our paths in music are different. Ronnie's into jazz fusion, Hubert is strictly jazz and I'm into r&b, pop and rock."

Debra was riding in her car in Los Angeles the first time she heard "Very Special" on the radio. The LP sold a quarter of a million copies; since then there have been ups and downs in her career. "But I look at that as preparation for where I am now," she said.

Currently she is in the studio working on her upcoming PolyGram debut LP with songwriter/producer Steven Greenberg, and with any luck at all, Debra Laws' next shot at chart stardom will be "very special," indeed.

# IFE GREEN An "Arista-cratic" Approach to Promotion

s one of the bright young women in the field of urban contemporary promotion, Arista Records' Ife Green has earned a good deal of respect from

her peers and colleagues for her hard work and ability to get the job done. "I want to be the best promotion person I can possibly be," says the affable Ife, currently District Manager, R&B Promotion, S.E. Region for Arista, covering Florida, Georgia and Alabama and based out of Atlanta. "This job sometimes requires 80 hours of work a week but I really enjoy it. To me, the biggest challenge is staying on top of your market and knowing each station's needs. If a market is real dance-oriented, you're not going to give them a ballad. I like to help with programming ideas, toomaybe put a record into a 'quiet storm.'

My objective? To try to get my records on all the stations! Maybe I'm very idealistic about that but you can't let radio tell you, 'we can't play your record.' I plan out a strategy for each record and it's always different. I feel like every record has got to be treated that way."

If began her industry career after graduating from college in Chicago. "I just had to be in the record business and I started out as a clerk working for Rose Records in 1981. Back then, I was coordinating with record companies the promotions we did in the store, as well as shoveling snow," If e laughs.

In 1983, she began working with Chicago's Black Record Pool. "Essentially, I sold advertising in 'Music Business & News' magazine and ran the pool and I found working with the club jocks a lot of fun. It was at a Christmas party that I met Tom Balla, the local marketing man for Arista. Apparently, they were looking for an intern to work out of the Chicago office. The funny thing was that I had read Clive Davis' book and Arista was the one



company I had always wanted to work with."

In 1984, Ife began her stint as an intern and in 1986, she was hired as the local marketing manager. "I worked with all the acts-everyone from Billy Ocean, Whitney Houston and Kenny G. to The Monkees, The Grateful Dead and Carly Simon. When there was an opening for the S.E. promotion job in 1987, I applied and got it." Since assuming her current position, Ife has had the chance to work product by some of Arista's established artists as well as with new acts like Kiara. "The first single on Kiara was definitely a challenge in this market," she notes. "A lot of stations just didn't initially believe in it or felt that it had to be a chart-topper before they'd get on it. With Taylor Dayne's current hit, 'I'll Always Love You,' there was resistance at r&b radio to begin with but I stuck with it and now we're getting recurring play on the single and urban stations are also reacting to the LP now."

Commenting on other Arista product, Ife says that superstar acts like Whitney Houston can even run into some resistance: "You'd think it would be easy but you hear stories about 'overexposure.' Of course, once stations jump on a Whitney record, it's a hit for them." With Kenny G., she notes, "we're not seeing as much single sales action because he's

a really big album seller and the young adults who buy his music are going to buy the CD, the cassette or the LP before they buy a single."

With the movie "I'm Gonna Git You Sucka" bowing in six national markets, including Atlanta, Ife predicts big things for the Arista soundtrack which features the title track by The Gap Band and cuts by Jennifer Holliday and The Four Tops among others.

"I do find that some stations are very reactionary. With a lot of AOR stations knocking urban stations out in the ratings, some black radio people are afraid to take chances on certain product. But part of my job is to keep people at radio informed of everything that's happening with a record. I treat this as a business and these days, people want the facts and figures which is why delivering the knowledge I have on my product with honesty and integrity is so important," Ife comments.

As a young woman in what has been, until recently, a male-dominated arena, Ife admits that "there's still a different response to women who promote records. I don't find that within Arista but there is a different attitude at some radio stations. Naturally, I have a lot of admiration for women like Sylvia Rhone at Atlantic and Sharon Heyward at Virgin-if I could have the 'respect they do, I'd be doing okay! But fortunately, I'm in a region where there are a lot of other women working in promotionas well as male colleagues- with whom I can share information about the marketplace."

Of particular importance in the S.E. region are the smaller stations: "I regard them as being as vital as the reporting stations because you never know when a small station will become a reporter. Not only that, if you get plays on the smaller outlets, you can build a record. I realize that every time I go into any station, it's a new ballgame. Even though my credibility (and the label's) may be intact, each record is treated differently. Personally, I'd love to see the day when urban and pop radio are treated the same way in terms of dollars and support and time buys. That's why I always talk to promoters about the importance of giving support to the smaller urban stations.<sup>5</sup>

That Blue Note is still alive and well is amply testified to by the recent signings of such artists as singer Lou Rawls and pianist McCoy Tyner. To commemorate the golden anniversary, current Blue Note President Bruce Lundvall (Lion retired in 1969 and died in '87) recently hosted a jam at New York's Birdland Jazz Club. Many of the label's top artists were on hand, including singers Rawls and Dianne Reeves and tenorman Stanley Turrentine and Rick Margipza, who's just joined Miles Davis' band. "It was a little bit of Jazz heaven," said Lundvall. "And you didn't have to die to be there."
