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

GRAMMY NODS MAKE BLACK HISTORY

ith the scrutiny that BRE readers will inevitably give to this year's Grammy nominations for the black music categories, one major and highly significant point may possibly go unnoticed: in the general categories such as 'Record Of The Year,' 'Album Of The Year,' 'Song Of The Year' and 'Best New Artist,' black music artists have emerged with the majority of the nominations as well.

Let's take a moment to digest that information. For years, the music industry at large has failed to recognize the real impact of black music in terms of its influence on the habits of the consumers. Finally—and not a moment too soon—the frequent declarations of key industry figures such as BRE publisher Sidney Miller and BMA co-founder Kenny Gamble about the cross-cultural dominance of black music may be ringing true. Caught up in the socio-economic and political realities of life in the late '80's, black America may well be truly unaware of the incredible contribution that its music artists have made to the world.

Being from another culture, yet having ongoing contact with my friends and family in Britain,

allows me a distinct advantage when it comes to talking about the global impact of the music of black America. That impact should not be glossed over or ignored or forgotten. As Black History Month approaches, it is something which should fill black Americans with a special sense of pride. And in those moments when we all lose touch with our vision of what is possible, it's useful to remember just what black music has contributed to world culture and how it continues to make that contribution.

But back to the point: The Grammy nominations may indeed be a legitimate signal that black music artists won't have to keep going outside their borders to get the kind of appreciation—and respect—that's due them. In 'Record



of The Year,' the five nominees include four black music artists: Bobby McFerrin ("Don't Worry, Be Happy"), Tracy Chapman ("Fast Car"), Anita Baker ("Giving You The Best That I Got") and Michael Jackson ("Man In The Mirror")—artists whose diverse styles reflect the expansive nature of contemporary black music. Even the fifth nominee, my fellow Briton Steve Winwood, acknowledges the impact that black music has had on his own musical development and it's obvious in his nominated song, "Roll With It."

'Album of The Year' nominees include Chapman and McFerrin, but George Michael (yet another one of my countrymen!) could walk away with an Award for an LP that made history



JEFFREY OSBORNE—ALL BECAUSE OF YOU—A&M—Jeffrey and Robert Brookins wrote this dramatic ballad with production credit going to the pair as well. Bringing into play his deep vocal talent, the singer shows why he's at the top. Demos: Young Adults, Females.

COOL'R—VICTIM—ODE SOUNDS AND VISUALS/A&M—This is a slammin' track with hot musicians behind it and killer vocal arrangements from the five man crew. Coming across with a bright, urban sound, the group should get a lot of attention with this funky, spunky debut! Demos: Young Adults.

WAS (NOT WAS)—WALK THE DINOSAUR—CHRYSALIS—This Detroit-based crew is finally getting the attention they deserve after the success of their previous single "A Spy In The House Of Love." Hard-driving, energetic and ready for airwaves and dance floors with four wild mixes to pick from! Demos: All.




ALBUMS

BOBBY LYLE—IVORY DREAMS—ATLANTIC—Lyle is a hot young keyboardist with plenty of talent, poise and sophistication. Not taking any chances with his backing band, the artist is supported by Kirk Whalum, Ndugu, Paul Jackson and a host of others. Picks include the Anita Baker composition "Been So Long," with vocals by The Waters, "Loco-Motion," a happy up-tempo song, and the funky strains of "Tropical." Demos: Adults, Young Adults.

TEN CITY—FOUNDATION—ATLANTIC—Marshall Jefferson is a producer to keep an eye on. Kicking out this one with vocal trio Ten City, he's got an appealingly innovative approach on songs like the smooth love song "That's The Way Love Is." Other hip picks include "Right Back To You," a hard electro-funker and "Close And Slow," a sensuous ballad. Also don't miss "Devotion." Demos: Young Adults, Females.

ALEX BUGNON—LOVE SEASON—ORPHEUS/EMI—Born in Switzerland, this classically trained keyboardist isn't lacking a sense of soul...he's toured with many Blues and R&B outfits including Freddie Jackson. A heavy funk bottom is fused with Jazz and R&B creating an exciting, modern album. Brenda Russell's hit "Piano In The Dark" is the first single, a powerfully emotive piece with a Quiet Storm sound. "Going Out" picks up the pace. Demos: Adults, Young Adults.

MARCUS ROBERTS—THE TRUTH IS SPOKEN HERE—NOVUS/RCA—Pianist Roberts is well-known and well-respected for his association with the Wynton Marsalis band (and the trumpet man does some excellent work on this LP, along with Elvin Jones and Reginald Veal). The no-nonsense commitment of these men to the soul of jazz is demonstrably clear. Try Ellington's "In A Mellow Tone," Monk's "Blue Monk," or any of Marcus' many compositions that are presented here. Demos: Adults, Jazz listeners.



Wave" of Success

ew York's chic B. Smith's was the site for a Columbia Records luncheon press party last week. The event attracted such label stars as Full Force, Cheryl "Pepsii" Riley, Lisa Lisa, L.L. Cool J and a

host of other celebrities. Also on the star-studded VIP list was Surface-Dave "Pic" Conley, David Townsend and Bernard Jackson-whose new LP 2nd Wave is receiving critical raves and international recognition.

Following the luncheon, Conley and Jackson took a moment to chat with Black Radio Exclusive back at Columbia's mid-town offices:

BRE: So how did this musical tidal wave originate?

BJ: We had a studio called "The Lab" in the basement of Conley's

house...and it's definitely below the surface! It was like starving singers in the basement of the dungeon. (Laughs) It was: "We've got to see the surface and rise above it."

DPC: Seriously, the group was formed in '83 with Karen Copeland as the original lead singer. Karen, who has since passed away, was one of the sweetest and most talented ladies you would ever want to meet. We will always cherish her memory and we like to pay tribute to her because of her influence on us in the beginning.
She recorded with David Townsend

and me on "Falling In Love," which has become a classic. It's a club hit, a dance record that is still played on New York radio. When she passed, David

and I brought Bernard down from Stamford, Connecticut, and we formed a new Surface.

BJ: We got together for three weekends after our first meeting and things began to happen real fast. Dave went to London to do production on High Tension, a British group. He did one of our songs and that was a trip for me because I didn't know I had a song

Shortly thereafter, we landed a song on a Nile Rodgers-produced Sister Sledge LP. At the time, he was the best producer out there, so by now I'm saying: "We're ready." A few months later we landed a song with New Edition. I threw my glasses in the air then! This was not luck...this was serious.

BRE: So would you say that it all hap-

pened pretty quickly? BJ: Well...what did happen is that

Dave had met a few people from Screen Gems/EMI Music Publishing Ltd. in London who sent us to EMI in New York. That's when we got the two songs placed. Our "Let's Be Friends" went on the New Edition LP, which went platinum. After that, all three of us were signed with Screen Gems as staff writers.

DPC: Then, Bernard and David went to L.A. looking for a record deal. Leonard Richardson, who was working for EMI then-and is now in a&r at Warner Bros.-turned Eric Nuri and Larkin Arnold onto our song "Let's Try Again." I'd call them the three people who gave us our biggest break. Because of them, we got to CBS and while our first single ("Let's Try Again") was a

great song, it didn't hit like we felt it could've. But it did well, it did what we

wanted it to do. It got us here.

Our follow-up, "Happy," became a
hit on the strength of black radio exclusively. They heard the hit potential. They supported us and we can't thank them enough.

BRE: The immediate response to that record really was strong at black stations across the country.

BJ: I didn't really realize the strength of a song, but it has been quite flattering to go to different parts of the United States and have people know who you are. I want to thank BRE, black radio stations across the country, Black Entertainment Television, Night Tracks, Ruben Rodriguez and the entire CBS promotions department. BRE: People can really relate to the music of Surface. How would you describe your sound?

BJ: All Surface wanted from jump street was to make good, positive music and still be able to hit the pulse of the young generation while appealing to the older crowd. We wanted everyone to be able to hear the significance of each song. At one time in the business, music was so sexualized. But we wanted to do something that was positive. Not necessarily gospel, but music with a rap or hip-hop beat that kids could dance

DPC: Young kids seem to especially relate to us and that really feels good. BJ: The music of Surface is not music

that's overnight. It's continuous. It's music that steals your heart. We make it hard for you not to like us because

we sneak into your hearts...as opposed to ramming our music down your throat! People like good music and in order for us to have the longevity that we want, our music has to be consistently good. We hope that our music spreads love in a positive way so that people will really stop and listen to it. BRE: Who are some of the artists you listen to and are influenced by? BJ: Dave Conley and David Townsend.
DPC: Bernard Jackson! And I'd have
to say in David's absence that he was greatly influenced by his father, Ed Townsend, the man who wrote "Let's Get It On" for Marvin Gaye and who produced half of that LP. Ed has been around for a long time. He aught David how to play keyboarcs. BRE: Well, some of that influence must have paid off in your new LP,

2nd Weve. It's really surfacing to the

top to put it lightly.

BJ: Yes you're right. The first single,

"I Missed," went to #3 on the national charts and now "Closer Than Friends" is being listed as a hot shot pick.

DPC: Sometimes the title of an LP can

be the kiss of death because if the song doesn't work, people feel that the whole LP is no good.

BJ: When you read a book you start with the first chapter. Well, this is the second LP the second chapter, for Surface. W can feel the growth with this LP because it's really a continuation of the debut Surface LP. Surface con-

tained ten songs so the first song on 2nd Weve is realy the 11th song. Again, I'd have to say that that's what the music of Surface is all about: Music that's designed to steal your heart.



Frankie Crocker Returns to WBLS

NEW YORK: Frankie Crocker—a radio veteran with one of the most charismatic on-air styles in the business—has returned to the station where he originally got his start: WBLS-FM/New York. As a young man, Crocker would camp out on the steps of the station before being given his first break as an on-air personality back in the early '70s.

Billing himself as "the eighth wonder of the world," Crock-

er's smooth delivery helped WBLS to become the #1 station in the country. During those years, the station's other noteworthy personalities included Vy Higgensen, Vaughn Harper, Ken Webb, and G. Keith Alexander, but the flamboyant Crocker was always its major star.

After leaving the station, Crocker's subsequent jobs included stints as a video host on various programs—including BRE's "Hollywood Live."

NAACP Official Sues Arsenio Hall

LOS ANGELES: Willis Edwards, president of the Beverly Hills-Hollywood chapter of the NAACP has filed a \$10 million libel suit against Arsenio Hall, charging that the comedian/actor accused him of extortion.

The suit states that in a recent radio interview, Hall said Edwards had sought \$40,000 from him in return for not publicly denouncing his failure to hire black writers, producers and directors for his late night talk show.

Hall does have a black show manager, Corky Lee, who is in charge of all hiring for "The Arsenio Hall Show." In a prepared press statement, Edwards responded to a "there are no qualified blacks" comment that Hall allegedly made concerning the low number of minorities on his staff: "I would hope that in your present position you would not let it just stop there. Instead, you could create opportunities to adequately train and utilize those who may display potential to achieve."

Hall has been quoted in the press as saying, "I'm not doing 'Soul Train.' I'm doing a show for all America. I'm a millionaire. I could just do movies. I came to this show because I

thought it was important as far as the history of the industry. I can give people opportunities."

To that end, Hall has specified that black students be referred to his show from an intern program that he has instituted through the radio/TV/film department at Los Angeles City College. Students are being allowed to train with Hall's director, Sandi Fullerton, a white woman.

In the meantime, Edwards is proceeding with his lawsuit, even while he conceded that Hall's alleged extortion comment may have been "just to get media attention."

IN BRIEF

Michael Jackson Donates Concert Proceeds to Childhelp U.S.A.

LOS ANGELES: Michael Jackson is donating the net proceeds from his final live show on January 27th at the Los Angeles Sports Arena to Childhelp U.S.A., the largest non-profit organization in the country for the prevention of child abuse.

On his 16-month-long "Bad" world tour, Jackson has set a record box office ticket gross of \$125 million (as submitted to the Guinness Book of World Records).

Black Artists Contribute to Greenpeace LP


NEW YORK: Through the efforts of Greenpeace, an international environmental advocacy group, a rock LP featuring hits by artists such as Terence Trent D'Arby, Sade, and ASWAD (along with Basia, U2 and Sting, among others) will be released in the Soviet Union. Entitled Greenpeace-Breakthrough, the double LP will be the first major release of western rock music to be marketed to Soviet youth. Sales in the Eastern Bloc are expected to exceed 10 million copies.

License Renewal Legislation A Radio Board Priority

SCOTTSDALE, AZ: The National Association of Broadcasters Radio Board of Directors passed a resolution stating that a radio license renewal bill is the "Radio Board's top priority for the NAB's legislative efforts in '89 and that NAB shall cause the radio-only bill to be introduced in the '89 session of Congress."

The Board is seeking reform in the current comparative license renewal process and codification of earlier radio deregulation by the Federal Communications Commission.

Rap Artists Affected By Louisiana Anti-Porn Law

LOS ANGELES: Under an antiporn Louisiana city ordinance, retailers who openly display LPs, cassettes and CDs by artists such as 2 Live Crew, Ice-T and Easy E—all of whom who have recorded "sexually graphic" material—have been subject to a \$500 fine and 60-days jail time.


To avoid violating the statute, retailers have been required to designate a "not for minors" bin (or to sell "questionable" materials under the counter) and to deny sale of allegedly "obscene"

materials to unmarried people under 17. Advocates of the measure are now pushing for enforcement of the law on a statewide basis.

Steve Woods Named PD At KACE/Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES: Steve Woods, an 18 year radio veteran who has served as PD at local stations such as KDAY and KJLH, officially replaces former KACE PD Pam Wells.

Woods had been acting PD at the station when she stepped down from the position last year. Currently Wells fills the midday slot at KACE.

New Artists Put Canada on the Rap Map

Without a doubt, the most widely known African-Canadian is Olympics sprinter **Ben Johnson**. Well, budding rap stars **Michie Mee** (**Michelle McColluck**) and **L.A. Luv** (**Phillip Gayle**) are hoping that their prowess in the hip-hop arena will help them attain their own level of worldwide fame.

The duo recently launched their new 12" entitled "Victory Is Calling" at a sold-out listening/dancing party at a Toronto night club. What makes the release of

this single so significant is that Michie and Luv are signed to an American (not a Canadian) label: First Priority/Atlantic Records. In Canada, WEA Music is distributing their record.

The Jamaican-born duo credit their engaging rap style to "the Jamaican 'tint.' That's what really makes it unique." A previous single, "Elements Of Style," broke through to the Top Ten Hip Hop charts in England, and it led to the pair's five year contract with First Priority.

They're also featured on the LP Basement Flavor by the First Priority Music Family. That LP's highlights are "Victory...," "On This Mic" and new music from female rapper M.C. Lyte (who also makes a cameo appearance on "Victory...," her presence serving to further pump up her sister-in-rap M.C. Michie Mee).


Street smart with a flair for classy attire, Michie has lived in Canada for most of her life. Born under the sign of Scorpio on November 1, 1970, she's an avid sports fan who enjoys soccer, basketball (and dancing). She and Luv got their first professional exposure when they recorded two tracks on an all-Canadian compilation LP, Breakin' Out.

It was produced by the late **Scott LaRock** and **KRS-One** (**aka BDP**) with Beat Factory Productions. The cuts "Run For Cover" and the aforementioned "Elements of Style" were tracks that were great promotional vehicles for the LP, earning it international recognition.

Since its inception in February 1984, Beat Factory Productions has groomed and packaged their artists with hopes of breaking them internationally. The company has always sought to launch Canadian dance, rap, house, soca and reggae artists.

The signing of Michie and Luv to First Priority Records is a major breakthrough for African-Canadian music. Other local artists and product to watch for include Ron Nelson's "B-Boy Destruction," The Get Loose Crew's "Get Loose Crew," and an upcoming LP by Kid Creole that features Slinky D, Richie Rock and Kook K.





Stop the Violence, Kick the Science



KRS-One

f, as Public Enemy's Chuck D once said, hiphop records have become black America's TV station—the only medium that reflects the full spectrum of black experience—there are signs that the programming is becoming more sharply focused on stemming the growth of black on black violence.

One group—the Stop the Violence Movement—has brought together over 14 rap artists to address issues pertaining to black youth, particularly black-onblack crime. The Movement's first collective efforts are a single "Self-Destruction" (Jive) and a video, shot in various parts of New York City, currently in the making (by Classic Concepts Productions, whose credits include PE's "Night of the Living Baseheads" among others). Members of the group, which includes Boogie Down Productions' KRS-One, D-Nice, and Ms. Melodie; Public Enemy's Chuck D, Flavor Flav, and Hank Shocklee; M.C. Lyte; Kool Moe Dee; Stetsasonic's Daddy-O, Delight, Fruit-Kwan and Wise; Just-Ice; Doug E. Fresh; and Heavy D feel that these efforts are the beginning of a continued effort to raise awareness about the needs of black youth.

As reported, the STV Movement began after a black teen was stabbed and killed at a rap concert in Long Island's Nassau Coliseum last year by another teen who had stolen his girlfriend's gold chain. The New York news media all but said outright that rap music fostered this type of violence. Only a passing reference mentioned that the security force was understaffed to ensure the safety of concertgoers. (But never was it mentioned that similar acts of violence occur at rock concerts with a consistency that, considering its ritual absence from

headlines, is all the more alarming.)

Shortly after this incident, Nelson George, black music editor of Billboard, and Ann Carli, Jive Records' vice president of artist development, initiated the Stop the Violence Movement with the idea, according to George, that "It was time for rap music to stop answering its critics. It was) time to address the community." The STV Movement contacted the National Urban League and worked out an agreement whereby all proceeds from the single and Movement's activities would be donated to the N.U.L. "to support and develop programming dealing with black-onblack crime and youth education."

George and Carli asked BDP's KRS-One to organize the rap artists in the STV Movement and to produce "Self-Destruction" because his single "Stop the Violence" lent its name to the Movement and was the first self-conscious critique of the black-on-black crime that has afflicted the rap scene and inner cities in general. The idea for that single came after a show KRS-One did at Manhattan's Latin Quarter club when, he said a riot broke out. But, he continues, "I'm not attempting to say 'Stop the Violence' just because we did a record." Citing other factors that contribute to violence such as inadequate education, the constant flow of drugs, and unemployment, KRS-One was "directing the LP, By All Means Necessary (live/RCA) at the industry to show it another aspect of rap music.

Another aspect of KRS-One, and the reason he was so much involved with organizing the STV Movement, is that he is somewhat of a self-styled rapper/ activist. Himself homeless for six years, KRS-One jumped at the chance to participate in an Election Eve Housing Now! march on Washington after only hearing about it soon before. His "Stop the Violence" single was a part of BDP's attempt to make the rap audience aware of the societal context rap is occurring in, and that all forms of violence in clubs was self-defeating. Recently, he says, he has been giving talks on youth violence in inner-city colleges and high schools, and he plans on doing a lecture tour of New York City and New Jersey high schools sometime in the future.

Other artists involved in the STV Movement, have also done similar community work. Public Enemy, for example, has given concert/lectures at prisons around the country while on tour

with Run-D.M.C. All artists, in addition to putting the STV logo on the jackets of their subsequent LP's, are planning to make this work—visiting youth centers, community groups, schools, clubs, etc.—an ongoing part of publicizing the "Stop the Violence" theme and of creating more of an awareness of youth issues in general. Two artists, **Big Daddy Kane** and **Ice-T**, who could not attend the "Self-Destruction" recording sessions because of scheduling conflicts, planned to visit schools and stores to talk to young people as a part of their 10-city tour.

Produced by D-Nice and KRS-One for BDP, with associate producer Hank Shocklee, "Self-Destruction" opens with a sampled Malcolm X speech and segues into an action-packed collection of choice anti-violence/solidarity raps that make you want to get up and move as much as it points up the futility of violence. More reasoned than preachy, the raps are a combination of short scenarios and ruminations that look at the issue from just about as many angles as there are rappers.

whose melody changes slightly to reflect the particular style of the individual rap artist on the mike at the time. Setting out to make a social statement, the STV Movement has made a highly captivating single-issue, best-of compilation of rap.

Self-Destruction," coming in the wake of other volunteer music projects like "We Are the World," represents the first time rap artists have joined together en masse for one cause. And it is one of the few times that black youth have taken collective action to help their own. Other artists, among them Afrika Bambaataa, Oran "Juice" Jones and Mtume, showed their support of the STV Movement by appearing in a group scene of the video shot in Marcus Garvey Park in Harlem.) As Kool Moe Dee said during the video shoot, "Some rappers didn't ollow through (after saying they would participate] because no money was involved. But, in my opinion, it's bigger than the money. It's about giving something back in terms of knowledge. Hopefully, the STV Movement will affect similar activist efforts of black artists in other areas of the music industry.

Joining Ruben and label execs at the Columbia press salute luncheon were: L.L. Cool J, Full Force, Johnny Kemp, Lisa Lisa, Slick Rick, Surface, Chena and Cheryl "Pepsii" Riley. Also attending were Blue Magic, representing the new CBS-distributed OBR label from Def Jam's Russell Simmons, and Alyson Williams—"the first lady of Def Jam." Providing entertainment for the afternoon was Harry Connick, Jr.

Ruben predicted that "with talent like this, I believe that in 1989 we'll be able to establish more artists than any company has ever done in one year!"





WINTER NAMM 1989—"MIDI-City"



NAMM, the National Association of Music Merchandisers, held its winter convention at the Anaheim Convention Center January 20 through the 22nd. The size of the show was enormous, and the word in the music instrument business was MIDI. As a matter of fact, the convention center could have been called MIDI-City!

Kawai Is a Winner

I had the pleasure of assisting Kawai Pianos with their display. Kawai, a leading piano manufacturer for 60 years, also builds fine synthesizers and associated MIDI control equipment. Aside from their large piano display on the main floor, they had a sound room where jazz keyboardist Rob Mullins demonstrated their synthesizers. Rob kept the Kawai booth cookin' throughout the weekend and L.A. jazz soundman Bob Ramey handled the mix.

I must say I really enjoyed working for such an innovative company, and in the near future "Tech Notes" columns will pay a visit to the Kawai plant in Compton, California, to really get some first hand insight into MIDI equipment and

how MIDI Synthesizers can help in the radio production studio.


In the meantime, here's a plug: A good starter keyboard for the production studio is the new Kawai PH-50. This is a 49 key instrument with a stereo output. It features 200 preset tones using the same sound source as their more expensive K-1 Digital Synthesizer. Also, it contains 30 outstanding rhythm patterns prepared by professional musicians. It has MIDI in-and-out ports for connection to other instruments, and it can run on batteries. The PH-50 retails at \$449.

The Australian Monitor **Amplifiers**

Australian Monitor is a company that caught my eye in the show. Their power amps are not only clean sounding, but road-rugged like nothing I've seen before. They displayed two amps at the show, the AM1600 (an 800 watt per channel amp), and a quad amp with four 200-watt channels for bi-amping purposes called the AM1200. These are

sound reinforcement amps built to take the kind of punishment equipment gets out on the road. I was impressed that you can power these amps up or down with the volume control wide open without getting that annoying electrical "pop!" that in high power sound systems could blow speakers.

One display I could not keep my eves off of was that of Bose's demonstration of their sound cannon. This baby produces bottom end like you have never heard before. It is designed for theaters, night clubs and performing arts centers.

Obviously this is a sub woofer system that handles extremely low frequencies and must be supplemented with other speakers to add full range. The Bose wave system consists of the Acoustic Wave Cannon, the 802 Series Two loudspeaker and the WSC-1 Wave System Controller.

If any of you tech types like myself think the sound cannon would be easy to build, forget it! Bose used a special speaker beefed up to take the pressure created within the tube. Conventional speakers will tear apart.

All in all, the Winter NAMM show was a big success and a good time was had by all who love exposure to stateof-the-art technology.

Larry Ferguson engineered the project and was assisted by Donnell Sullivan...LA & Babyface are scheduled to come in just as soon as Z-Looke completes their project with La Face Inc., trakking an LP for Virgin Records' newest group, After 7. Jon Gass handled the controls, aided by Donnell Sullivan.

At Elumba's sister studio, M'Bila: serious work is underway thanks to R.E.S. Records, headed by one of the industry's top black entertainment attorneys Ron Sweeney. De' La Vance, a singer/songwriter/producer, is one of the many talents to join R.E.S. and he's

BEHIND THE MIX: A Conversation with Sharon Bryant

Your mixologist is known for getting the serious scoop, and once again I have some hot, hot info. If you're a fan of Atlantic Starr traks such as "When Love Calls," "Four Leaf Clover" and "Second to None," you'll be glad to know that the lady who was up front on these traks is currently in the studio working on her solo debut LP for Wing/PolyGram Records with producers from 2-Tuff-E-Nuff productions: Thomas McElroy and Denzil Foster.

The lady's name, of course, is **Sharon Bryant**, and she's gonna be dominating the urban airwaves once again! Sharon recently took out time from her hectic recording schedule to let BRE readers know what's been going on in her life:

BRE: Sharon, what have you been doing since leaving Atlantic Starr?

S.B.: Well, woodshedding, so to speak. I got married and I just took some time out to get things together. My husband is a producer, so we've been working on material for my LP.

BRE: What was your reason for leaving the group?

S.B.: Basically, it was time to move on. With nine members, we grew to a point where everybody felt stifled. Our record company at the time was great about it and that helped a great deal.

BRE: What's your opinion of the new crop of female vocalists?

S.B.: Well, there are so many out there. Anita Baker, I love her. I think she's a great stylist and artist. About the others, I can't really say because now you don't have to be a great singer. If the trak is jamming, you can just sing it and get by, whereas when I was coming up, you had to have chops. I mean, you had to really sing.

BRE: How do you feel now that you've gone solo, and production is underway on your new LP?

S.B.: I love it! It's scary, it's every emotion. After all this time, finally it's happening.

BRE: Will you be doing any writing or producing on your LP? **S.B.:** Yes, I've already written eight of the tunes along with my husband.

BRE: Has the company decided what the first single will be?

S.B.: No, but there are a few tunes that we feel very strong about: "Feeling," "Foolish Hearts," "Old Friend," and "Let Go"—a dance trak that 2-Tuff-E-Nuff is producing.

No question as to what kind of LP to expect from this young woman because we all know that Sharon doesn't just sing...she blows! (Also, expect a new look, something very natural.) Her first single is scheduled to ship 3/89 with the LP following in April.

I have interviewed many artists during my tenure here at BRE and Ms. Bryant was one of the most pleasant. She was very down to earth, but with an overwhelming personality. Most importantly, she was totally real. Sharon, we'll be waiting for your first single to ship. From all of us at BRE, we wish you the best!

HANK TALBERT A Pro At The "New" Capitol Records

y vision is to see the fusion of various genres of music, so that everyone is exposed to all types of music. I look forward to the day when people will

have the opportunity to enjoy Cecil Taylor and Tracie Spencer, when the media embraces Etta James and B.B. King fully, when music is appreciated as not just an art form but is seen as being at the core of communication. It's the joy of introducing music of all kinds to people that provides the real excitement for me in this business."


So says Hank Talbert, Vice President, Black Music Promotion at Capitol Records, a Detroit native whose industry-wide experience spans some 20 years. "I started out working with an independent distributor, Music Merchant and moved on to Handleman Distributors, one of the nation's biggest rack-job operations at the time." Hank worked product on Polydor and Stax and it was his association with the Memphis-based label that led to his relocation to the East Coast in 1969: "I went to New York to open an office for Stax Records with Isaac Hayes' 'Shaft', 'Mr. Big Stuff' by Jean Knight and The Staple Singers' 'I'll Take You There' and that broke New York wide open for me."

Following his stint with Stax, Hank spent a year with Invictus Records, owned by fellow Detroiters Holland, Dozier & Holland, running with product by Freda Payne ('Band Of Gold') and The Chairmen Of The Board, among others. Then, in 1971, he began a four-year stay with Buddah Records as Vice President of Promotion. "Apart from the acts we had on the label itself, we distributed Sussex (Bill Withers), Curtom (Curtis Mayfield, The Impressions, Leroy Hutson) and Hot Wax (Honeycone, Laura Lee) so we had a lot of great product.' Hank joined Arista Records in 1975 to head up promotion for the label's then-small black music department. "All we started out with was Gil Scott-Heron, The Brecker Brothers and a deal with Philly Groove Records which gave us product by First Choice." In his five years with the company, Hank helped build a department and create an entire promotion staff to work with records by Ray Parker Jr. & Raydio, Harvey Mason, Martha Reeves, General Johnson and Dionne Warwick.

From 1980 to 1984, Hank operated his own production company with clients such as Freda Payne and consulted on various independent projects prior to joining Hush Productions as Coordinator of Promotion, handling marketing for the management company's roster.

In 1986, Hank began his current tenure with Capitol, where he renewed a number of relationships "with artists like Melba and Freddie from Hush, Norman Connors and Angela Bofill from my Arista days." Since assuming his post, Hank has worked with product by Bert Robinson, Suave, Marlon Jackson and recent rap acquisitions, M.C. Hammer and King Tee. He credits the black music promotion staff with giving Capitol consistent success during the past few years: "We've had many Top 10, Top 5 and No. 1 records in the urban music field and I feel that we have the best staff in the industry. Many of the promotion people have been here for seven or eight years; that's pretty amazing in itself and says something about the kind of company that Capitol Records is.'

Hank recalls that when he joined the company, he was invited by Joe Smith (President & CEO, EMI Music, Worldwide) and Step Johnson, Vice President/General Manager, Black Music "to be a part of the 'new' Capitol. When I got here, the company was in transition and I've been a part of the metamorphosis. Our president, David



Berman, has a real affinity for music and is dedicated to establishing new acts as well as exploiting to the fullest the more established artists on our roster."

Hank cites current product by Tracie Spencer (an artist he describes as "magical, a fresh young talent"), BeBe & CeCe Winans, Ashford & Simpson and Freddie Jackson as exemplary of Capitol's range of activity. "We're priming the music pump with new acts, while taking artists who have already created a following to new levels of success." He notes that upcoming this year will be an LP from Peabo Bryson, who recently re-signed with the label, and first product on Capitol by The Gap Band and Mother's Finest.

Reflecting on the highlights of his years in the business, Hank identifies the birth of industry organizations such as NATRA and the BMA as "highly significant developments. I'm very glad to have been around during a time when black music has gone through many phases—from the days of race music to r&b to the birth of innovative acts like Sly and Prince, to the inclusion of pop music acts (such as Elton John) on black radio. It's exciting to be here when technology is revolutionizing music. I see a bright future for our industry."

Bobby Lyle: Continuing his musical journey



e y b o a r d i s t Bobby Lyle has enjoyed quite an illustrious career since he began his musical odys-

sey as part of The Young-Holt Unlimited trio in the early '70s. He's served as musical director for such diverse artists as Bette Midler, Al Jarreau and, most recently, Anita Baker. Now, his own range of musical experiences is reflected in his new Atlantic LP, Ivory Dreams...

THE EIGHT-YEAR GAP

"There are a a few reasons why I wasn't as aggressive about



pursuing a new deal after my records at Capitol (in the early '80s). Jazz wasn't enjoying the kind of resurgence it has had recently; plus, I was very busy working as a musical director on some high visibility tours. I backed off from doing a new LP, I re-grouped and now I feel that I've come back fresher, rejuiced."

DESCRIBING IVORY DREAMS

"It's a musical journey. Listening to both sides, you'll hear a common theme and yet the thread is diversity. The focus is on the accoustic piano but in a number of different settings. Atlantic basically told me to just do what I do musically while including some

music that's also accessible to radio. I think we did that with the first side, with cuts like the title track and my version of Anita's 'Been So Long.'"

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

"All the people I worked with are artists whose music I really respect. Bette Midler is the consummate professional, Al Jarreau's very cool yet focused and Anita's very intense and detailed. I'd say the real highlight was a tour I did with Bette in 1982, showing that a black musical director could handle what was basically more of a pop music situation. Working with such diverse performers has allowed me to be comfortable with many different musical styles and that's reflected in my new LP.

Slick Rick: Rap with a British accent



fter a three-year hiatus away from performing and recording, one of the rap scene's most original

talents is back and, truly, deffer than ever. Slick Rick, the 23-year old British-born Bronx resident, first came to public prominence through his work with "human beat box" Doug E. Fresh in 1985. Now, with the "Teenage Love" single, his new Def Jam/Columbia LP and an upcoming tour with LL Cool J., he's truly doin' it...

HIS BACKGROUND AND INFLUENCES

"I was born to Jamaican parents in South Wimbledon, which is part of London. I was raised in England for most of my life till I was in my midteens so I heard reggae quite a lot. I listened to The Beatles, 60's music, some r&b,


Motown, which is about all they'd play on the radio in England."

BECOMING A RAPPER

"I was an art major at New York's High School of Music & Art and rap was really the latest thing. We're talking 1979. It was the thing on the streets and I wanted a piece of the action."

LP TRACKS


"Two cuts, 'Children's Story' and 'Hey Young World'-are very important to me. I'm trying to show that everybody is the same in certain situations. We all have to deal with the same temptations even though the color differentiation might make it seem that it's not that way. Then, 'Treat Her Like A Prostitute'-that title is definitely an eye-catcher! It's all about being safe rather than sorry. You see, men and women are just alike; we're all just souls. It's just this little organ thing between the legs that gets people confused!"

Moon Over Michael





One thing MI is sure of is that he's become an American pop-culture icon. Just in case no one else knew that, "Moonwalker" takes us through a host of undeniable contenders with MJ doubling as tour guide and shoo-in candidate. The intro to the retrospective segment features radio announcers mentioning the lackson 5's appearance on Ed Sullivan, MI's shrine to Liz Taylor, and culminates in ex-President Reagan telling Michael "your success is an American dream come true."

oonwalker," Michael Jackson's latest 94-minute megavideo, is difficult to characterize. Part music video. part concert film, part documentary, it's a patchwork of forms and sequences loosely strung together by fantasy and adventure. With its heavy doses of selfreflection and special effects, "Moonwalker" could be considered the highintensity visual companion to MJ's autobiography "Moonwalk."

chart-topping singles. Initially "Leave Me Alone"—a much more apologetic "Don't Believe the Hype"—tempers the grandeur by beseeching the media to "stop dogging me around." Set in a theme park with such MJ ephemera as newspaper headlines reading MICHAEL JACKSON TRIES TO BUY ELEPHANT MAN'S BONES, this segment surprisingly closes with MJ's revenge: A giant MJ, bound by little people like a pop music Gulliver, bursts loose to tower victoriously over his would-be captors.

Opening with a "Bad"-soundtracked soda ad for corporate sponsor PepsiCo ("I'm bad, Pepsi's cool"), the video slides into a live "Man In the Mirror" taped in a stadium full of fainting fans. From the outset, it's clear: this is about Michael Jackson—the man and the myths created

His last-minute triumph is later redone more fantastically when, in the nick of time, he transforms himself into a bullet-proof, mortar-shooting robot, then into a space-traveling starship, to vanquish an evil drug lord's posse. These scenes of conquering underdogs are meant to be endearing heart-wrenchers.

by and about him. As the action moves from "Mirror" to a 24-year, multi-song retrospective of

MJ's music to a kiddie-performed remake of the "Bad" video, to a highly stylized "Smooth Criminal" (good guy vs. bad

To bring his point home, MJ gives a restrained nod to Prince and to westerns enroute to a highly stylized "Smooth Criminal," a '30s dance routine that's at once reminiscent of Al Capone and Fred Astaire (to whom his autobiography is dedicated). The highly charged live "Come Together" Beatles cover would have been a surprise if MJ didn't own the rights to their music. More than any other iconic part of "Moonwalker," the Beatles reference emphasizes that beyond his aloof mystique, MI's massive appeal—like Prince's—is grounded in a revival of pop archetypes.

While the video is long, the animated sequences running through it are as captivating as any in the medium. A combination of cartoon, Claymation, and Star Wars-like effects are used at various times to reflect the images MJ has of himself, his fans and the people around him. They vividly represent the fantasy, adventure and childlike escape that is life for Michael Jackson.

by topping the black music charts last year. Could his American Music Awards victory earlier this week be an intriguing portent of the Grammy future?

'Best New Artist' will undoubtedly go to Tracy Chapman but it is truly heartwarming to see Take 6, one of last year's most brilliant arrivals, and Vanessa Williams, whose courage is matched by her talent, both being nominated.

Other black music artists who are featured in general categories include Chapman, Brenda Russell ("Piano in the Dark") and Whitney Houston (up for 'One Moment In Time' as part of the 'Best Pop Vocal Performance, Female'); McFerrin (for 'Best Pop Vocal Performance, Male') while Russell (and Joe Escovito) made the 'Best Pop Performance by a Duo or Group with Vocal' category, and Tina Turner contributes to the 'Best Rock Vocal Performance, Female' for her 'Live In Europe' set.

The response to black music in the general categories is highly encouraging, although there are—as usual—glaring omissions and controversial choices in the categories NARAS terms 'The Rhythm & Blues Field.' But that is another discussion for another time.

Let's continue on the note of what's positive from the perspective of black

Americans. Finally conceding that rap music actually is a legitimate genre in the black music spectrum (it only took NARAS five years to catch up!), the academy will award either L. L. Cool J., D.J. Jazzy Jeff & The Fresh Prince, Salt-N-Pepa, J.J. Fad, or Kool Moe Dee one of its coveted statuettes for the first time. This recognition follows the earlier inclusion of reggae among the other traditional black music categories: r&b, blues, jazz and gospel.

As a black music enthusiast of long standing, I share the joy inherent in the acknowledgement by NARAS of the fruits of a rich cultural legacy from which the world has gained so much.





I love the two Billie Holiday songs, 'End Of A Love Affair' and 'I'll Be Around'—my grandmother used to play her last LP, 'Lady In Satin' all the time


which is how I first heard them."

EUROPE

"We did 33 dates in 6 weeks, so it was pretty gruelling. Getting ready to go on the road is 95% of the hassle of touring but it's that 5% of actually performing that's an absolute joy. We went to Hungarywhich definitely had that 'Iron Curtain' vibe-Denmark, Germany, Holland, all over, Hoved Italy-especially because the guys there do have that 'macho' thing. They bring you flowers and I got a lot of invitations. And you know that's always good for a woman's stuff!"

HER CAREER

"I've started to get serious about my career. Before, I had a fear of success—but I've begun to get past that. I realized recently that it was time to s--t or get off the pot! There's still so much for me to do, even after 16 years of making records."

owatrio, the perennial Bar-Kays are at "the beginning of a new era for us" with Animal, their

ever-funky new Mercury LP. Leader Harvey Henderson says that he and partners Larry Dotson and Winston Stewart survived the mid-'80s "when the term 'funk band' had become a bad thing." Now they're ready for the '90s...

THE LP'S PRODUCERS

"We'd never worked with more than one producer, so using three teams was definitely different for us. Each of them—



Mtume, Jerry Goldstein (the producer behind all the classics by '70s group War) and the new team of Trevor Gayle and Kenny Harriston had a different approach. They all had their own way of getting

stuff out of us musically."

WORKING WITH SLY STONE

"We wrote the tracks 'Teeter Totter' with SIy and he performed on it, too. Working with him was kinda wild! He's one of the guys we grew up listening to in the mid-'60s so to actually be in the studio with him was a really amazing experience, something we never thought would happen. Tous, it was almost like coming full-circle."

THE SONGS ON THE LP

"A cut like 'Struck By You'it's the bomb! That's a fun song: if you wanna be sad, don't listen to it. 'Animal' is the kind of raw stuff that's really fun to play onstage. 'Are You Available?' is our 'pick-up' song, a tune the guys can relate to, although these days the girls can relate to it, too! We have some bleeding heart ballads like 'Someone Else' and 'Leaving You.' And 'Get Your Fingers Wet'? Well, we can't do an LP without saying something bad!"
