



'90s NETWORKING: NEW APPROACHES

RE Conference '89 is now back on course—honorably. It was not grandstanding, but standing up for something we deeply believe in that motivated our decision to put the fate of the Conference on the line. On Thursday, we will join Mayor Ernie Kell of Long Beach and others involved in this struggle at a press conference to reinforce the powerful message that the exoneration of police officer Don Jackson sent to the watching world last week.

But now it is time to get on with the business of Conference '89. In keeping with our theme, "BRE—The '90s Network," we are planning to maximize your Conference experience in a more relaxed setting. Individual "networking rooms" will be available each day to accommodate and promote opportunities for comfortable interaction among major categories of participants: Station Owners and General Managers; Program Directors, Music Directors and Air Personalities; News and Public Affairs Directors; Record Executives; Artists, Producers and Songwriters; and Artist Managers, Concert Promoters and Tour Managers. Each of these six rooms will be set up with refreshments and accessible for meeting with your peers or colleagues from related sectors of the industry. The objective is simply to make it easier to get together—as opposed to fighting tightly programmed schedules or awkwardly trying to make contacts in the crowded lobby areas.

While the networking rooms will allow participants to create their own agendas for discussion and exchanges with their peers, the seminars at Conference '89 will be fewer in number but greater in impact. Accordingly, we are seeking more focused and targeted subjects instead of those traditionally aired—and exhausted—at industry gatherings. Last week, VP/Midwest Editor Jerome Simmons suggested that a seminar which dealt openly and candidly with the problem of coping with drug and alcohol abuse in our industry would be particularly helpful. It would provide a forum for those who have successfully dealt with this problem to come forth and help others currently facing such a struggle or seeking to avoid it. Professionals with specialized experience in substance abuse would be available for private counseling. I think we have now achieved the maturity to confront the monster head on that's destroying the lives and careers of so many of our best and brightest. Let us know what you think.

But if you're looking for a more immediate release from industry-induced stress at BRE Conference '89, remember that the Pacific Ocean and a beach with beautiful hiking and bicycle paths are directly across from both hotels. Networking by the sea too? Why not...

MILES JAYE—OBJECTIVE—ISLAND—This is one artist that you can't go wrong with. "Objective" by Miles is an excellent R&B tune with a subliminal jazz flavor. If you've heard him in the past then you already know about his smooth vocals. Take a listen and I promise you'll love it. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.

DE LA SOUL—ME MYSELF AND I—TOMMY BOY—They're young, they're fresh, and they're thumping with Funkadelic overtones. You'll find that this cut is another extension of the versatility these fellas have in their music to go along with their original rap style which gives them a wide audience appeal. Demos: All.

KIARA—EVERY LITTLE TIME—ARISTA—Gregory Charley and John Winston have definitely set out to please everyone, with five mixes of "Every Little Time" there's no way you can't like one. From the N.Y. mix to the simple single version they're all good and should be heard. Written by Arthur Baker and John Warren Demos: Young Adults, Adults.

GEORGIO—ROMANTIC LOVE—MOTOWN—Don't let the name fool you, this is not a ballad but instead a serious groove that gets better every minute you listen. With hints of music by the Boys and a bass line from a past Ohio Players' tune, this extended mix is one that you'll love. Demos: Young Adults.


ALBUMS

AMY KEYS—LOVER'S INTUITION—EPIC RECORDS—This album is chock full of good surprises! Larry Graham is back, singing a duet with Amy on "I Know What's Good For You," one of the many hits it has to offer. This album is a compilation of outstanding music only to be surpassed by the soloist herself and the melodic sounds of her voice. With great writers and producers involved in this project, it's a must ! Demos Young Adults, Adults.

JOE SAMPLE—SPELLBOUND—WARNER BROS—It's been said that wine improves with time and this also applies to the talents of Joe Sample, each song being better than the last on his new LP. Selections are excellent, but you must listen not only to the jazz stylings of Joe, but also to the vocal collaborations of Take 6, on "U Turn," Al Jarreau on "Somehow Our Love Survives," and Michael Franks on "Leading Me Back To You." Great LP. Demos: Jazz Lovers, Adults.

CHRISTOPHER MAX—**MORE THAN PHYSICAL**—**EMI**—Produced by Nile Rodgers and Christopher Max, this LP offers uptempo dance traks that have an extra original flavor that distinguishes Max from all others. The first single release "More Than Physical," is without question one of the hottest tunes on the LP not excluding the ballad "I Burn For You." He is definitely an original, and his debut LP merits attention. Demos: Young Adults, Dancers.

GRADY HARRELL—COME PLAY WITH ME—RCA—Grady Harrell is a new young artist, but from the performance on this LP, his star potential is well showcased. The duet with labelmate, Tyler Collins on the Stevie Wonder-produced cut "You and Me," is filled with a sincere performance. The first single "Sticks and Stones," is rocking the airwaves across the U.S. Also look for the title cut, "Come Play With Me," to be a single contender. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.







like their spontaneity and the chemistry they have. They're a great throwback to the days of the black, self-contained groups," said Greg Peck,

describing Atension, one of his latest signings to Island Records, whose debut single is "Let Me Push It To Ya."

As the vice president of a&r in the label's black music division, Peck had been approached by the group's manager to see the Buffalo, NY-based sextet perform. Peck was so buzzed by the band's stage savvy and energy that it wasn't long before a record deal was in the making.

"I think what really impresses me about Atension," he said, "is that their minds are like sponges. If you tell them something about attitude or the music, they pick up on what you're saying right away. I think '89 is going to be their year."

Lionel Job, who is the group's manager along with having produced Def On Arrival, their debut LP for Island Records, is equally confident: "I've worked with groups like Starpoint and Lace, and what I look for in dealing with any act is their potential for longevity. Atension is made up of six guys who are great musicians, and they have that tight, polished sound that comes from having played together for a long time. This band is crazy when they perform. When another major record executive accepted my invitation to come up to Buffalo to see them when we were scouting a deal, his enthusiastic reaction was 'damn ...!"

While that executive did express interest in signing Atension, what tipped the scales in Island's favor was that Job had worked with Peck on Starpoint product back when the executive was at Elektra:

"I have first-hand experience in

knowing what Greg can do when he really believes in an artist. He had a kind of energy and commitment that I've never forgotten. I just think he's one of the best promotion men in the business."

Job originally met Atension back in 1986 when they won a local battle of the bands competition. Comprised of Joseph (J.R.) Sayles, guitarist/background vocalist; Joe (Jake) Carter, keyboardist/background vocalist; Kevin

Delance, bass player/lead vocalist; Isaac (Ike) Scott, lead and background vocalist; Dwight (Dew) Wyatt, keyboardist, percussionist/background vocalist: and Nate Sayles/drummer, Atension drew its members from two different groups who were well known Syracuse-based rivals on the club circuit in upstate New York and Canada: The Ice Band and New World Productions.

"Me and my brother Nate were in the Ice Band," said J.R. "Kevin and his cousin Ike were in New World Productions. So weall pretty much grew up together, and that really makes a difference in the music."

There are artists who manage to score lucrative record deals primarily on the strength of a good demo tape—and no actual live performing experience—but such isn't the case for Atension, according to Delance.

"Playing live for us is the apex. We really pride ourselves on how we come across on stage because this is something we've been doing for years. Acts who haven't had that kind of background—who don't know what it is to play in front of all kinds of audiences you can tell it the minute they get up to the mike.

"The kind of raw energy we have," added Delance, "is similar to what I saw Living Colour put across when they were on "The Arsenio Hall Show.' It's real black rock 'n roll. It's the same kind of energy you get from a Bobby Brown or Al B. Sure!—but multiplied by six."

Job observes that when he went to a business meeting at a record company recently, "Let Me Push It To Ya" came on the radio and the promo guy he was talking to said: "Now, that's the (expletive deleted). Bring me a group like that."

"Man,' I told him, 'that is my group," Job laughed. National radio reaction to "Push It..." has been encouraging. According to New Yorkbased Job, the single is being played five times a day on KISS, and WGCI (Chicago) is not exactly sleeping on it, either.

"You don't know how I'm dyin' to get PD's around the country not only to hear this group's record, but to see them perform live. That's really going to be their selling point." With no hesitation, he added: "Atension is going to be one of the hot, young bands to deal with in '89. Definitely."





Thorn EMI to Acquire 50% of Chrysalis Records Business

LOS ANGELES: Fifty percent of London-based independent Chrysalis Records is being sold to the British conglomerate Thorn EMI for \$79.1 million in cash payable on completion, and a further amount of up to \$25 million dependent upon profit and volume growth over the next four years.

Thorn EMI's other holdings include Capitol, EMI and Blue Note labels, but its acquisition of Chrysalis—through its EMI Music Worldwide division excludes music publishing, recording studios and the record and video export business of that company. Current annual turnover at Chrysalis exceeds \$100 million.

EMI Music, established over 90 years ago, operates in 37 countries and, in addition to its manufacturing and distribution facilities, recording studios and music publishing operations, has a major roster of international artists, among them being Tina Turner.

EMI Music Worldwide will manufacture and distribute Chrysalis products around the world and administer the Chrysalis Group's worldwide music publishing interests in certain key territories. It also has the option to acquire Chrysalis' 50 per cent interest after March 1999.

David Geffen, chairman of the Geffen Co., had recently purchased 10 percent of Chrysalis stock, thus making him its largest individual stockholder aside from the company's cofounder/chairman Chris Ellis.

Thorn EMI's purchase is the latest in a series of major record industry acquisitions that includes CBS Records by Sony and RCA Records by the German Bertelsmann Music Group. It has been speculated that another British independent, Island Records (distributor of Delicious Vinyl) may be the next company to be purchased by Thorn EMI.

"I was surprised by the Thorn EMI acquisition," Billy Bass, former vice president of marketing at Chrysalis, told BRE: "We had thought the deal would involve BMG Music. But this is a good move for the company because the amount of money involved is amazing, and it will solve a lot of Chrysalis' cash flow problems, along with giving them the funds needed to attract and develop new acts."

Menon to Retain Thorn EMI Post



LOS ANGELES: Colin Southgate, chairman and chief executive of Thorn EMI, has announced that following the appointment of Jim Fifield as president/chief executive officer of EMI Music Worldwide (effective on April 1st), that Bhaskar Menon will continue as an executive director of the Thorn EMI main board and retain corporate responsibility. He will also oversee the company's corporate relationship with Toshiba, Japan.

Williams Elected BROADCAP Board Chairman

WASHINGTON: Wesley S. Williams, Jr.—a partner and practicing attorney with Covington & Burling—has been elected chairman of the Board of Directors of Broadcast Capitol Fund, Inc. (BROADCAP). He succeeds Donald A. Thurston, president, Berkshire Broadcasting Co., Inc.

BROADCAP is the non-profit venture capitol company established by the National Association of Broadcasters (NAB) in 1978 to assist minorities in the acquisition and ownership of broadcast properties.

Williams—a specialist in banking, financing and real

estate matters—is a founding member of the BROADCAP board. He is also co-CEO of a real estate investment, development and management company in the U.S. Virgin Islands.

As NAB board chairman in 1977, Thurston chaired a task force on barriers to increased minority ownership of broadcast properties which identified the lack of consistent conventional financing as the most significant obstable. He then became the motivating force behind the organiztion of BROADCAP and chaired its board from 1981 until Williams was elected as his successor.

Jonathan (Chico) DeBarge Sentenced

DETROIT: Beginning on April 12th, Jonathan (Chico) DeBarge, 22— a former member of the DeBarge singing group—will begin serving five years and eight months in federal prison for conspiring to take 2.2 pounds of cocaine into Michigan from California.

Although he had attempted to convince U.S. District Judge Richard Enslen of his good character by showing him press clippings that focused on his antidrug speeches at Los Angeles area junior high schools just prior to his arrest, the judge commented: "Who have you harmed by your hypocrisy?"

IN BRIEF

Morris Levy Label to Be Sold

LOS ANGELES: Morris Levy's Roulette Records label is under consideration for purchase by Rhino Records and its U.S. distributor, Capitol Records for an estimated cash payment of up to \$5 million. If the deal is finalized, Rhino will retain the U.S. rights to the label, while Capitol will market its product overseas.

Census Bureau Prepares For Census Day 1990

WASHINGTON: Within 10 days following Census Day, April 1, 1990, some 70 million questionnaires are expected to flood back to the bureau by mail. In preparation for this, years have been spent in "flow processing," a method used for the 1980 census in which each questionnaire is immediately earmarked for editing or followup action before being sent to computers for extraction of data.


The Census Bureau, which describes the upcoming census as the biggest national effort since World War II's D-Day, says the front lines of data gathering will consist of a field force of some 300,000 workers. Total costs involved in the planning, actual activities and production of the results—to be completed in 1993—will total \$2.6 billion, or \$10.40 per U.S. resident.

Lamont Dozier Re-Elected By NAS

LOS ANGELES: Renowned songwriter Lamont Dozier has been re-elected as chairman of the board of the National Academy of Songwriters (NAS). Dozier produced the Academy Award nominated "Two Hearts," and cowrote it with Phil Collins for the motion picture soundtrack *Buster* on Atlantic Records.





It was Easter Sunday. Almost midnight. The lights darkened then slowly rose on the Blue Note stage. Standing majestically attired in a rich red gown, belting "I Want To Be Happy," was the incomparable song stylist **Nancy Wilson**. As the lights grew brighter a die-hard fan screamed: "Girl, you look fabulous!" To that, Miss Wilson replied, "As long as I stand here and sing for you I will look no other way..."

On this Easter night, Wilson re-defined the word "diva." Nancy Wilson is, and always has been, the epitome of class, elegance and musical perfection. She's a star! The Blue Note and its intimate setting afforded the opportunity to really talk between songs with the clubgoers and to share some of her inner thoughts. She credited veteran singer Irene Reid for being instrumental at the start of her career and she thanked black radio for its support of her over the years. 'My career has spanned a period of 37 years." she said. No rapper will last that long. I'm talking real stuff here!"

Nancy had everyone in a spell as she sang old songs and new ones from her Columbia Records LP Nancy Now!. Her repertoire included "What A Little Moonlight Can Do," "Guess Who I Saw Today" and "Quiet Fire." She acknowledged **Regina Belle**, who was present, as were **Vaughn Harper** and **Charles Warfield** of WBLS. This ended Ms. Wilson's week-long stint at the Blue Note. Headlining throughout April are **Joe Williams, Carmen McRae, Billy Eckstine** and **Phyllis Hyman**.

Bobby & Co. Par-Tay at the Garden!

Last Tuesday, the Bobby Brown Don't Be Cruel tour took center stage at Madison Square Garden for 41/2 hours. It was not just a concert, not just a showit was a smokin' par-tay! Arista's K-9 Posse opened the show followed by the west coast record-breaking rap star Tone Loc. Tone Loc is just bad period. He performed "Wild Thing" and "Funky Cold Medina" and the crowd went wild. Then, there was Karyn White-a little lady with one of those powerhouse voices. Karyn, as you may know, is a triple threat: talent, beauty and body! Karyn set the Garden on fire with "Secret Rendezvous" and "Super Woman." Rappin' for the Homeless

Among the celebrities in attendance were Kool Moe Dee, Eric B., Boogie Down Productions, The Dismasters, DJ Red Alert and DJ Jeff Foxx from WRKS, KAM and The School Boys, Flavor Flav, Latifah, Big Daddy Kane, and Doug E. Fresh.

While we're on the rap side of things— Nat Robinson and his First Priority Records, an affiliate of Atlantic Records, are being honored on April 8 at House 107 Club for the label's involvement in worthwhile community projects. The salute features entertainment which stars M.C. Lyte, Audio II, Alliance, Positive K and The Dismasters with KAM and The School Boys, Kenny Linn, Freak L., Professor XYZ and The South Bronx Committee. The party, hosted by Afrika Bambaataa, also honors record promoter Dean Jackson.

There seems to be a lull in the hiphop album releases this time of year. Majors and indies are holding off for now, so expect a deluge of LPs and singles in the next two months—just in time for summer. One recent release that's a must for hip-hop afficionados is Def Jam Classics Vol. 1 (Def Jam/Columbia). The LP features 13 tracks by artists such as LL Cool J (with Cut Creator), Public Enemy and Slick Rick. Rush Management publicist Bill Adler's informative liner notes fill in the background of how hip hop's first major independent label began and grew.



Rob Base

Some new and noteworthy singles from either previously released LPs, or upcoming ones: "Joy and Pain (World to World Remix)" by **Rob Base & D.J. E-Z Rock** (Profile, 212/529-2600), off their nearing platinum LP, continues the dance/hip hop fusion of their chartbusting, critically acclaimed singles "It Takes Two" and "Get On The Dancefloor" started. This remix definitely makes a strong track kick even harder....



K-9 Posse

Following their 23-track LP, **De La Soul** has released a three-sided single. The "extra side" to "Me Myself and I" (Tommy Boy, 212/722-2211) is a track that's pressed on the alternate groove of one of the sides. No need to worry about mistaken grooves—only the two-sided singles will be sent to DJs and radio programmers; just the bonus ones are shipped retail. Everyone gets the main track, it's wicked "Oblapos Mode" remix, plus two more.

"This Beat is Military" (Arista), the second single from **K-9 Posse**'s self-titled debut LP, is out with versions for all kinds of hip-hop toopers—those in "Basic Training," and the "Hard Corps." Included in the *I'm Gonna Get You Sucka* soundtrack, "Military" was produced by songwriter/producer **Bobcat Ervin**, who penned K-9's previous single "Ain't Nothin' to It" and had a hand in three of L.L. Cool J's big hits: "I'm Bad," "I Need Love" and "Goin' Back to Cali." Watch out for this track, and for K-9 Posse's and Bobcat's future projects....

Grandmaster Melle Mel & Van Silk's "What's the Matter With Your World?" (Possee, 212/581-5398) is also from a soundtrack—*Police Academy 6: City Under Siege*, a film in which we're told the duo makes a cameo appearance. The song forcefully brings back what's now being called the "old school" style of rap with an updated anti-gang violence twist. Hence the rhetorical question as title.

Producer/WBLS hip-hop show host Marley Marl, and Cold Chillin's Juice Crew have hit big once again with Kool G Rap & DJ Polo's "Road to Riches" (Cold Chillin'/Warner Bros.) the first single from their LP of the same name.

Also just out and rockin' on Def Jam/ Columbia: **Slick Rick**'s "Children's Story" with a "Knock 'Em Out the Box" remix that may well knock you out your seat. The video's just been completed.



"This is a very important time for us at WPFW," said GM Leon Collins. "With the beginning of a new administration, we're gearing up for a major fundraising endeavor and we are poised to reap the benefits of the past 12 years of growth. This institution is about to enter its 'teenager' years, with all of the promise that that holds...so we have much to celebrate!"

Launched in 1977—almost 10 years after the process of establishing a radio station in this market began, WPFW is a member of the Pacifica Foundation network of public radio stations. 



THE FMX SOLUTION TO "MULTIPATH INTERFERENCE"


FM radio may not be susceptible to electrical noise (such as a blender), nor fade when you drive under a bridge, but stereo FM station operators are plagued with an annoyance called "multipath interference." That's that wooshing (or rapping-on-a-picket-fence) sound you hear, particularly when driving in the city or in a mountainous area.

Multipath interference is caused by a reflection of the FM signal which arrives at the antenna out-of-phase from the primary signal. This causes cancellation, thus giving you that aggravating "wooshing" noise.

A few years ago, a new technology popped up called "FMX." Developed by CBS labs, FMX encoded transmissions along with an encoded receiver, all of which promised to eliminate this multipath problem. (The system is compatible with regular stereo FM radios.)

To avoid another "Tech Notes" history lesson, I'll just say that basically the FMX adds a second difference signal at the same frequency with a 90 degree phase shift. The second signal is compressed in transmission and expanded in reception to reduce the noise added in the receiver during the demodulation process. (Say w-h-a-a-at?)

After the CBS technology center was closed, a company called Broadcast Technology Center was formed to continue the FMX development. The system was installed on a New England radio station and it was indicated that FMX not only improved multipath problems, but radically *expanded* the FM

reception coverage area.

However, not all were convinced. Dr. Amar Rose, a professor of electrical engineering at M.I.T., and Dr. William Short of the Bose Corporation, did some experimenting of their own and announced that FMX is an interesting approach to the multipath problem—but that the system can render even more multipath problems than the conventional receiver.


Reports are that Chicago radio station WBBM has turned off their FMX system because of listener complaints of noise, especially on headset-type radios. However, the station plans to go back on the FMX system as soon as they can check the problem out.

As of now, JVC and Alpine have announced their production of FMXequipped receivers and CBS plans to equip all of their stations with FMX encoders. Opponents and proponents are lining up in Washington, D.C. to present their arguments. And the FMX war rages on!

Closing Notes...


You may remember last year when "Tech Notes" talked about having oversized speakers in small production studios. A great solution is the NS-10M monitor by Yamaha. The NS-10M has a 7 inch woofer and a 1% inch dome tweeter. The cabinet measures 15 by 8½ inches deep. The frequency response is a smooth 60 Hz to 20 kHz, delivering a clean, transparent sound.

The NS-10M is also a fine monitor for small home studios commonly used by keyboard players and composers. The speakers come in matched pairs and sell for about \$425.



Fresh) now out on Motown Records, is a great indicator of her musical talents...

LEAVING KLYMAXX

"Honestly? I didn't actually leave—they put me out! When (executive) Jheryl Busby left MCA to go to Motown, he wanted me to do a solo LP for the company. Klymaxx decided that they didn't want me to stay with them and do a solo project, so leaving really wasn't my choice. When you spend a third of your life with a particular group of people and have had a certain amount to do with the success they've had, you think there's a kinship. When something like this happens, you have to figure that the kinship may not really have been there."

THE COOPER INPUT

"I like collaborating with other people. I wanted to work with Bernadette Cooper (producer and another former member of Klymaxx) again because we work so well together creatively. She produced and wrote two cuts, 'I'm Available' and 'I Love You.'

"SHE'S NOT MY LOVER"

"Well, I know people look twice when they see the title, but it's actually about guys who are always telling their girlfriends, 'hey, that other woman's just a friend.' With a



title like that, it could be a multi-use song! The song features Doc Box, an artist who's just been signed with Warner Bros and Hove the fact that it has a double meaning. That always perks up people's interest!"



No Two: Melting pot music

fter A&M Records executive John McClain received separate demos from Robert Ferris and

Khris Kellow, he felt that combining the two musicians with disparate backgrounds might make an interesting project and thus No Two was born. The duo's debut single, "Tourist," serves as a good indicator of what a musical melting pot can produce, as Kellow explains...

MEETING EACH OTHER

"John figured that, other than The System, there wasn't another interracial duo out there. Robert and I were both pursuing solo deals and I figured, why not try something different? I'd never heard any of Robert's material before we first met in 1987 so I didn't know what I was walking into. After we kicked around some ideas, we wrote one song together—'Several Exceptions'—and then I wrote four songs and Robert wrote five."


DIVERSE BACKGROUNDS

"I did get into Parliament/ Funkadelic and George Clinton, but I started out singing before I was playing keyboards and I used to listen to everyone from The Beatles to Dionne Warwick. Robert's musical influences also included The Beatles but he was also into Brazilian and African rhythmic concepts. As Robert says, this LP is a great combination of two very different musical styles."

NO TWO'S FUTURE

"We did this LP as a project rather than as a band. I'm also a part of the band that Randy Jackson has put together and we're currently doing an LP for A&M. But if the No Two LP sells four or five million copies..."





ROFILE

ALBERTA RHODES Working to 'Make A Difference'

XHX



n the many years she's worked in the record industry, Alberta Rhodes has built a strong reputation as a hardworking professional

well respected by her peers.

Presently, as owner of her own public relations/artist development firm, Rhodes & Co., Inc., the New York-based executive has moved from being a director of publicity at Warner Bros. who pitched such artists such as Prince, Sheila E., Vanity 6 and The Time to a rising businesswoman who pitches herself, her company and her own expertise. And while she may be competing with other such widely recognized East Coast publicists as Sheila Eldridge and Terrie Williams, Rhodes is confident: "There's enough work out here for us all."

Born in Atlantic City—"before the casinos!"—Rhodes grew up in New York where she later attended Queens College and the Interborough Business Institute. In 1972, she got her first music industry job as an administrative assistant at WWRL, "the radio station where broadcasting vets like Frankie Crocker, Gerry Bledsoe and Gary Byrd also got their start."

After having worked there for two years, Rhodes traveled west to visit friends and survey the job market. "I'd read in *Jet* that Motown had moved to Los Angeles, and because Hove Stevie Wonder," she laughed, "I decided to apply for a job with them." She was hired to work in Motown's international affairs department. "My title was international product coordinator, but it was strictly a secretarial position. It was disappointing, because I saw not a single star—except for Diana Ross, once, on the elevator."

It was Rhodes' good friend Simo Doe, herself already a solid fixture in the publicity department at Atlantic Records, who suggested that she contact John Snyder regarding a job at A&M Records/Horizon Series. "John was the creative director at the company and he brought me in to work as his assistant in developing their jazz department."

Two years later, when that label actually did fade into the horizon, the dauntless Rhodes was quick to recover. In 1978 she began working in Warner Bros.' publicity department and her initial role was to develop and coordinate media coverage for the label's jazz, pop and r&b artists.

She spent ten years at the label, eventually working her way up to senior publicist/director of media information, a position in which she oversaw the publicity/marketing efforts for a wide range of artists on the Warner Bros., Geffen, Owest and Paisley Park rosters. In those ten years, she estimates that she spent at least nine of them "on the road, and that was fine because I had the energy and the desire to do it."

While she did everything from coordinating media coverage on Prince's Purple Rain Tour to Paul Simon/Ladysmith Black Mambazo's Graceland Tour, Rhodes contends that her most satisfying assignment for Warner Bros. was one of her last. "That was when I worked on the publicity campaign for Miriam Makeba's Sangoma LP and her autobiography, Makeba: My Story. It was exciting just from a historical standpoint, and I tried hard to do the best job I could for her."

While acknowledging that "Warner Bros. was like attending school and I received an excellent education there," Rhodes first began feeling some entrepreneurial urges in 1987: "I survived three cutbacks in ten years, so I found working at the company to be a relatively stable environment. But I also felt that I had hit the glass ceiling, so to speak, so I knew that it was time to make a decisive move."

That move involved the creation of her own publicity firm. Working with her in that venture are Denise Weeks (who has served as a publicist for

Norman Winters and Marla Gibbs' Crossroads Theater) and Kim Burrell (formerly a teacher/counselor in the Bellport, New York, school system), two women she describes as "so pumped up and energetic that they constantly inspire me. We really make a good team and our company motto is: 'Conceived to Make a Difference.'"

With a client list that includes Miriam Makeba, Hugh Masekela, Ladysmith Black Mambazo, Deja, Atension and Blue Magic, Rhodes remains confident that she made the right move at the right time.

"You asked me who my mentors were and of course I feel blessed to have known people like Simo Doe who've opened doors for me, and I never take that kind of thing for granted," she said. "But the two most encouraging people in my life are not in the music business. They're my mom and dad. If it weren't for their support and spiritual undergirding, I would never have embarked upon this entrepreneurial path!"



Charlie Singleton: His 'Mission' continues



ormer Cameo group member Charlie Singleton is about to unleash Man On A Mission, his

third LP, the continuation of a basic theme he began in his previous two sets, *Modern Man* and *Nothing Ventured*, *Nothing Gained*. The Epic artist, whose musical career was launched in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, feels that the time is right for the public to respond to his distinctive sound...

HIS APPROACH TO THE NEW

"On this LP, I wanted to be aware of what was going on



musically so I could be competitive but I tried not to be enthralled with what I heard on the radio. I wanted to continue the concept that I began with *Modern Man*, being the same old crazy guy, creating fictitious characters that I could portray on wax, with each track being a story in itself."

IS FUNK STILL IN VOGUE?

"Funk is like rock and roll it's never really going to be out of vogue. It goes in cycles but it's like jazz: there's always *somebody* who's going to like it "

ESTABLISHING AN IDENTITY

"To some extent, I have created a public identity for myself although a lot of people still relate closely with me and Cameo. The truth is, I've been influenced by the group and they've been influenced by my musical contributions to them. Larry (Blackmon) and Tomi (Jenkins) did work with me on three tracks for this LP-'Spleri,' 'A Little Bit Of Love' and 'The Good, The Bad & The Ugly' (the first single). Oh, that whistle on the new single? We used to watch a lot of Clint Eastwood movies on the road and we incorporated that western-type whistle into 'Single Life' and 'Word Up.' After a while, everybody was using it so we stopped. I just felt it was time to bring it back.'

PERFORMING

"I did have an opportunity to do the European leg of Cameo's tour last year and that made me realize how much I missed performing, which is just as important as writing and producing. At any rate, I will be out there this year—I just hope it's not at my own expense!"

debut LP, spearheaded by radio and retail response to his dynamic version of the Luther Vandross tune, "So Amazing." On *Bermuda Nights*, his second set, Gerald is looking to attract new listeners with an instrumental version of The Whispers' "In The Mood"....

THE RESPONSE TO HIS DEBUT

"I was very happy with the way people reacted to my first record. When you put out an LP, you don't know what to expect but Just Between Us charted very strongly. The saxophone is a lot of people's favorite instrument and I made the kind of music that's appealing after a nine-to-five day is over, music people can cool out to."

PREPARING BERMUDA NIGHTS

"FeedbackI got from the first LP suggested that people thought I was a vocalist and saxophonist so for this new record, I took out a lot of vocals, including the backgrounds and focused more on the saxophone. My production chops are better and the material on Bermuda Nights is stronger, too. I picked up 'In The Mood' because I grew up listening to The Whispers and I've always loved their music."

BEING A 'JAZZ' MAN

"I'm a musician who plays jazz, but I'm reluctant to be categorized. People do associate the sax with jazz but I notice that in some record stores, I'm in the jazz bins and in others, I'm in the r&o bins



which tells me that my records are fairly diverse."

MAKING A LIVING

"It's easier for jazz musicians to make it these days, because there's a different complexion to the music. With the heavy bass line and heavy beats that we use, a lot more doors have opened and there's a much greater interest in instrumentalists like Kenny G., Grover, Najee and myself. Musicians these days are a lot smarter and more business-oriented. Having managers and lawyers that you can work with makes a big difference in the kind of success you can have in this business."

When WHITNEY HOUSTON guested recently on ARSENIO HALL's late night talk show, he asked her what one LP she'd take with her to a desert island, and she chose Heaven by BEBE & CECE WINANS: "They really inspire me...I've bought four copies already!" This brother/sister duo is smokin' in the U.K., also. They just won the Black Gospel Association Award in the Best Group category.

Meanwhile, Ms. Houston replaces rock group **GUNS N' ROSES** as the confirmed headliner of "A Rock & A Hard Place," the AIDS fundraising concert that is scheduled for October in New York.

And speaking of Arsenio Hall's show, don't forget to catch **M.C. HAMMER** when he performs "Turn This Mutha Out" on the program Friday, April 7th. Hammer's rep is getting hot, hot, hot. It seems that this young Oakland-based rapper has some dance moves that could make the awesome **BOBBY BROWN** sit up and take notice. Lay down 'the Hammer,' indeed!

One young male singer to watch for in '89 is **DEZI PHILLIPS**, newly signed to Tabu Records. The charismatic newcomer is said to be that label's answer to Brown and **AL B. SURE!** The label is also excited about **RHONDA CLARK**, a young lady with the "real" singer appeal of Houston and **ANITA BAKER**.

Also impressive on the rap front is **D.J. JAZZY JEFF & THE FRESH PRINCE** whose 900-909-JEFF hotline has generated more than \$4 million. While Pacific Bell pockets half of that, the remaining \$\$\$ is split between the rappers and Phone Programs Inc., the company that operates their phone-in system.


