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

BLACK RADIO & SISTER ROSA

ith the Conference little more than a month away, there are many front-burner concerns and details which occupy every moment of my day. But a recent conversation with Jesus Garber, A&M's dynamic VP of R&B Promotion-and a Co-Chair of BRE Conference '89—caused me to pause for a moment of reflection.

Jesus had shared with me his dismay at the lack of response from black radio to the single, "Sister Rosa" by the Neville Brothers recently released by his label. This news was very distressing to me, particularly in that I had been struck by the artfully contemporary way in which the singular contribution of Rosa Parks to the freedom now enjoyed by black Americans had been handled by this veteran New Orleans-based band. As a father and one who has been black

long enough to understand fully the impact of "the back of the bus," I was amazed that black radio would not take advantage of this opportunity to educate their young audience about the "Mother of the Civil Rights Movement." Not in a preachy, heavy-handed way, but through an add which would not compromise their quest for competitive programming.

Unfortunately, the rejection of "Sister Rosa" has an all too familiar ring. Most of us are just too comfortable with where we are (or *think* we are) in a society which increasingly feels that it has paid all its dues for our generations of free labor. But it is frighteningly true that a people who forget where they have been will not know where they're



going. Bottom line—I stand by my personal credo (exercised in the Long Beach decision and countless other equally painful ones) that if you don't stand for *something*, you'll surely fall for *anything*.

Yes, Jesus, "Sister Rosa's" catchy rhythms and compelling message will be played in my home for my nine- and eleven-year-old son and daughter to enjoy, along with their father. I want them never to forget that they have a fuller and richer life today because a weary, but courageous black woman refused to ride in the back of a Montgomery bus more than three decades ago.

And a special thanks to my friends, the Neville Brothers, for placing their commitment on the line and to A&M for supporting the project. Now it's your turn, black radio. "Sister Rosa" deserves to be heard. 'Nuff said.

NAJEE—THAT'S THE WAY OF THE WORLD—EMI—Written by Maurice White, Charles Stepney and Verdine White and originally performed by E.W.F., Najee gives this song a jazz flavor that enhances and resurrects an oldie from the archives of time, turning it into a contemporary hit once again. Najee gives exciting, new dimensions to this song on sax. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.

PEABO BRYSON—SHOW & TELL—CAPITOL—Peabo could be compared to Johnny Mathis in his ability to sing almost anything and make it sound great, and this song is no exception. This remake of an Al Wilson hit is excellent. Alex Brown—who created the vocal arrangement—has given this song new life as it takes you back through time, riding on the melodic tenor voice of Peabo Bryson. Demos: Adults.

CHERYL "PEPSII" RILEY & FULL FORCE—EVERY LITTLE THING ABOUT YOU—CBS—This collaboration of "Pepsii" and Full Force is another great effort. Released as a new single from her LP *Me Myself and I*, it's the creme de la creme of ballads. Full Force's Bow-legged Lou sings male lead and no other female could do justice to this song like Ms. Riley. Demos: All.

BIG DADDY KANE—RAP SUMMARY (LEAN ON ME)—WARNER BROTHERS—Produced by Marley Marl as part of the original motion picture soundtrack, this rap version of "Lean on Me" is as powerful as they come. This single has hard-hitting antidrug lyrics performed in a manner that all can relate to. His clean delivery set to a solid instrumental track make this a must. Demos: Teens, Young Adults.


ALBUMS

ALTON "WOKIE" STEWART—ALL OUR LOVE—EPIC—Wokie is off to a good start with a compilation of tunes produced by himself and Timmy Gatling (plus other songs by the duo of Allen George and Fred McFarlane). His title cut is great as is "She's So Cold." Check out the dynamic ballad "This Song Is For You." This is an LP that gets better and better as you listen. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.

ST. CLAIR PINCKNEY—PRIVATE STOCK—ICHIBAN—Once a member of Fred Wesley & the Horny Horns, St. Clair Pinckney jumps into jazz with both feet-first. The title cut "Private Stock" gives a strong, but laidback serenade, while songs like "Stranded" express a lot of fun with the fat sound of Ted Dortch, Alfred "Pee Wee" Ellis, Fred Wesley and St. Clair. And the fat sound doesn't stop there. Jazz lovers, this is a must! Demos: Quiet Storm, Adults.

NO TWO—NO TWO—A&M—This duo, consisting of Robert Ferris and Khris Kellow, are dynamic and determination written all over their work. "Listen to the Words" and "Several Exceptions" are both good uptempo grooves offset by the mellow sound of "More Than A Minute." We think you'll love it. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.

M. WALK PRODUCTIONS FEATURING THE UNION—VARIOUS ARTIST—CAPITOL—This is a compilation of L.A.-based artists united by Mark Walker (whom we hear from in "Def Tunes" and "Take it to Em." Check out "The Way it's Done" by Quiet Storm and Danny (DDN). It's definitely hip-hop with an L.A. groove! Demos: Teens.

ver since its American debut two years ago, Virgin Records has made no secret of its aim to become a force to be reckoned with in Urban Contemporary music. In order to do that, Sharon Hey-

music. In order to do that, Sharon Heyward, the label's Vice President of R&B Promotion, was aware of the need to build an artist roster that not only would attract potential record-buyers, but also appeal to black/urban radio and retailers.

"Virgin's entry into the American music market was dominated by bands of British origin," said Heyward. "As I look back over the past two years, I can say Virgin has certainly maintained its reputation for being a progressive company. We have developed our roster

with the signing of a variety of acts such as Paula Abdul, whose LP is now platinum. Our A&R department has sought to bring out young and innovative artists like E.U., whose new single is going 'Buck Wild.'

"Some of our goals for the future will involve the continued building and expansion of our artist roster, with an emphasis on artist development" she added. "Virgin, like any other successful company, believes in positioning. Because of the commitment we have made in marketing our new acts thus far, we feel that we will attract superstar talent in the future."

Working toward that end, Virgin currently has a roster that runs a broad gamut. Their acts include the Reggaepowered Ziggy Marley & the Melody Makers, Senegalese singer/musician Youssou N'Dour, and Go Go masters such as the Washington, D.C.-based E.U. (of Livin' Large LP fame)...

There's the burgeoning young U.S. Rap artist Red Head, and super-bad Britishers like "Don't Take My Mind On A Trip" Boy George and Gospel wailer Lavine Hudson. Then there's your gotto-be-real R&B acts like the newly-signed Cheryl Lynn, the Teddy Riley-produced Deja (whose new LP, Made To Be Together, ships this week), After '7' (a group related to and produced by the L.A. Reid & Babyface production duo), sultry song stylist Lia, and Lalah Hathaway (daughter of the late Soul genius Donny Hathaway)...

And in the platinum category, of course, there's Paula Abdul. A chore-

ographer who has dreamed up flashy steps for everyone from Janet Jackson and George Michael to Luther Vandross and Z.Z. Top, this pretty, "Straight Up" Popster has also made scoring hit after crossover hit look like child's play.

Last year when E.U.'s "Da Butt"—a funky little track from the "School Daze" soundtrack—became a massive hit on the EMI label, several major labels were quick to offer the unsigned band a record deal, according to lead singer Gregory "Sugar Bear" Elliot. But when Jeff Forman, Virgin's Director of A&R/R&B, approached the group, it was a "done deal" as far as E.U. was concerned.

"We looked at Virgin as being a company that's aggressive, young and growing. One that wouldn't sign us and just put us up on the shelf," Elliot told BRE. "Virgin is going to make a lot of noise in black music. It's going to have a real impact and we wanted to be a part of that."

E.U. drummer Ivan Goff, whose shortterm goal is to produce a record for labelmates Boy George and Paula Abdul ("or any rappers!"), credits the popularity of his group to the dearth of strongly accented Funk music during much of the '80s.

"Black people have been hungry for the true Funk and producers like Teddy Riley and L.A. Reid & Babyface are bringing it back," he said. "School Daze' was a big break for us, and Spike Lee has us doing another track ('Party Hearty') for his new movie, 'Do the Right Thing.' But even without 'Da Butt,' I feel that our time was coming because the time is right for the music we're doing."

Good timing and intelligent marketing are behind the Grammy-winning success of Ziggy Marley & the Melody Makers, a group whose Urban Contemporary re-mix of "Tumblin' Down" became the first #1 Reggae hit ever on the black charts.

"We want the music to keep getting better," said Ziggy in 1987, shortly before the release of the group's debut Virgin LP, Conscious Party. "We want to sing to more people. We want to add something new and mix other things with Reggae. Since my father (the late Reggae pioneer Bob Marley), Reggae has stopped growing. We want to make it grow again."

New talent is the lifeblood of a record label, one of the key elements in making

sure that it grows and prospers. Some of the new faces at Virgin include U.K.-based Neneh Cherry (stepdaughter of Jazz musician Don Cherry), whose "Buffalo Stance" single is described by NME as "an electro cherry bomb that bursts with energy, character and confidence."

Detroit group Inner City is another new act that's made a solid showing on the Dance charts thanks to hit singles like "Big Fun" and "Good Life," while Lalah Hathaway is currently putting finishing touches on what promises to be one of the most eagerly anticipated debut LPs of the year. Working with producers Angela Winbush and fellow Virgin recording artist Gary Taylor (a producer/composer hitmaker for artists such as The Whispers and Anita Baker), Hathaway—like Ziggy Marley & the Melody Makers before her—is sure to live up to the musical legacy established by her father.

Whether it's with Boy George—whose "comeback" is credited to American black radio—or Paula Abdul, whom the Los Angeles *Times* predicted "may turn out to be the most popular dance music artist since Janet Jackson," Virgin continues to churn out the hits. One of its latest is the "Slaves of New York" soundtrack that features Boy George, Ziggy Marley & the Melody Makers, Inner City, Nenah Cherry and Maxi Priest, prompting *Glamour* to tag it "Soundtrack of the Month" in its May '89 issue.

When asked by BRE Contributing Editor David Nathan what it was that prompted her to sign with Virgin Records, Lavine Hudson noted that it was "the only company that offered me complete artistic control."

It isn't every label that could be so described by one of its artists, particularly a newly-signed young singer with a non-existent track record (regardless to how gifted that artist might be). But Virgin has distinguished itself by daring to be different, while also providing nurturing, unqualified support to its roster.

It is that kind of free-spirited corporate mindset that inspires artists to deliver their best music—and it's a policy that ensures that a label will thrive... particularly when a successfully different approach such as Virgin's has made 'Livin' Large' in '89 a reality.

April Declared "Back Announcing Month"

WASHINGTON, DC: April has been designated Month" Announcing members of the Recording Industry Association of America. As part of an ongoing campaign to make radio stations aware of the importance of identifying the songs and artists they play, the recording industry has rallied to support radio listeners' demands to let them know what they're playing. Radio stations have, in the last several years, emphasized long "music sweeps" at the expense of song and artist identification.

Jason Berman, RIAA president, cited a recent independent survey indicating listeners' overwhelming support for consistent song and artist identification. "Ninety percent wanted to



know the name of the artist and the song when a disc jockey failed to identify them. We live in a culture that wants as much information as possible about what is current. The survey results confirm that.

"The New York-based Radio Advertising Bureau estimates that 230 million Americans listen to radio an average of more than 15 hours per week," he added. "If you apply the survey results to that estimate, you've got about 140 million frustrated radio listeners."

The National Association of Recording Merchandisers (NARM) is also participating in the "When You Play It, Say It!" campaign. Its affiliates across the country are circulating petitions to gather support from radio listeners and they will be taken to radio stations. RIAA representatives also have been contacting hundreds of stations across the U.S. during April to build support for song and artist identification.

Next week in a special report, BRE will feature responses from black/urban radio and record label figures on this issue.

Grand Blvd. It will be a black-tie affair designed to encourage and acknowledge Michigan's talented performers, and "assist them in positive directions," according to MRAA president Bishop.

Red Alert, Kurtis Blow and Public Enemy will present awards to the winners, while Robert S. of Next Plateau is scheduled to perform at the event. For ticket information, call: 313/567-6788.

NAB Joins TEAM To Fight Alcohol Misuse

WASHINGTON, DC: The National Association of Broadcasters (NAB) has joined TEAM (Techniques for Effective Alcohol Management), a unique coalition of public and private sector organizations committed to curtail the misuse of alcohol, particularly in and around public assembly facilities.

NAB will use its satellite and direct communications services to disseminate information relating to TEAM. According to a TEAM official, "We are committed to making drinking and driving socially unacceptable. The support of the nation's broadcasters can only help convey that message to more people more often."

RIAA: Abdul & Guy Mine Platinum, Williams Gold In March

WASHINGTON, DC: The Recording Industry Association of America, Inc. announced that Paula Abdul's platinum LP, Forever Your Girl, produced her first platinum single, "Straight Up," which also certified in March. Vanessa Williams also achieved her first gold LP with The Right Stuff.

Other gold achievers were Karyn White for "The Way You Love Me" and New Kids On the Block with their "You Got It (The Right Stuff" single from their platinum Hangin' Tough LP. LeVert earned a gold single for "Casanova" while their Just

\$18 Billion Time-WCI Merger Approved By Justice Department

NEW YORK: The U.S. Justice Department has given the goahead to the \$18 billion Time Inc./Warner Communications, Inc. merger just 33 days after the deal was announced. While industry insiders predict that Time-Warner will become a world leader in feature film production/distribution, book and music publishing, recorded

music and network/syndicated/ cable programming, the Justice Department has concluded that the merger will not adversely affect competition in any relevant market.

WCI chairman Steve Ross had stated publicly that a merger between the two companies was necessary in order to compete with European, Australian and Japanese conglomerates in the global marketplace. The merger will reduce risk inherent in both companies by spreading costs over a broader range, thus reducing the chances for financial loss by either company.

An announcement will be made soon regarding approval of the merger by Time and Warner shareholders.

Summer will soon be here and thousands of youngsters will be out looking for summer jobs. If your record label, radio station, production company, etc., can, then please hire our kids. Superstar rapper Ice-T said in a recent interview: "Get out of the ghetto takes money and education. The system says you got to know how to fill out a job application, you got to look and dress a certain way. All these kind of things often shut these kids out from a job. People gotta realize that when these kids come asking for a job, help them! If they don't look the part for a certain job but are willing to work, take the kid aside and say, 'Look, I'll give you the job and work with you on getting the proper attire this job may require.' But people don't do that. If you don't have that suit and tie clean-cut look, you're out. When a person is dirt poor, they can't afford that kind of look. It's not their fault.

"I remember looking for jobs and not having nice clothes to wear, too. You know what's a real ironic and sad thing I often hear some guys say? They say, 'Hey man, I'm just gonna hustle enough so I can go look for a job.'..."

CHICAGO'S LAST BLACK MAYOR— The Death of Harold's Legacy in Chicago

Last week, Chicago blacks literally gave away the seat of power they were so justly proud of with the election of Richard Daley as Mayor. Yes, they gave it away the same way they acquired it. Black Chicago demanded that the office be vacated by a black. There were those who demanded an election to oust Mayor Eugene Sawyer who won the seat by an election by law of the City Council. Then there was the great silent majority who stood by and did nothing. Had Tim Evans won the election by the city council we would still have a black Mayor because the losers would have taken the defeat with dignity and regrouped for the 1991 campaign.

Here's a brief history of Chicago politics since 1983:

1983—Harold Washington defeats sitting Mayor Jane Byrne and Richard Daley because of the force of a united black community and a split of the white vote between Byrne and Daley.

1987—Washington defeats Richard Daley and Ed Vrdolyak in part for the same reasons as in 1983. In addition to proving that he was a capable Mayor.

1988—Mayor Washington dies. The Cook County Democratic Committee decides that a black should finish the term of Mayor Washington. Three days after Mayor Washington's death Alderman Eugene Sawyer gets the nod after all aldermen vie for the office as Acting Mayor. In respect to the late Mayor, Sawyer delays the City Council vote until after all memorial services have ended. Knowing that Sawyer had the votes to be Mayor, Alderman Tim Evans' cronies turn a memorial service for Washington into a rally for Evans, who claimed that he was Washington's hand-picked successor. The cry at the rally was that Sawyer had been bought by the white faction of the City Council. On the evening of the rally there had not been an election by the City Council. The polling of the City Council had not been made public before the rally.

The day after the rally, City Hall is besieged by Evans supporters demanding that he be elected Mayor. Inside Aldermen Sawyer, Evans, and Danny Davis meet with other Aldermen trying to gain their vote for election. Sawyer

is photographed through the windows of two doors as a white Alderman shakes his finger at Sawyer with his head in his hands. This is construed as a white man telling a black man what to do.

After over 12 hours of politicking, Sawyer finally decides to accept the position of Acting Mayor to complete the term of Harold Washington.

Upon the election of Sawyer, Evans goes to court and calls for a general election to select a Mayor to complete Washington's term. Evans begins a campaign to discredit Sawyer. Evans' supporters among the Aldermen use their offices to fight Sawyer. Sawyer strips the Aldermen and women of their committee assignments. Sawyer gives the seats to white supporters.

With his quiet demeanor, Sawyer starts enjoying increased popularity. One of Sawyer's staffers is caught spewing anti-semitic remarks. Sawyer takes too long to fire the aide and gets bad marks in the press. The Jewish population loses faith in Sawyer and then some blacks side with the aide. The Mayor loses points.

For ten months Evans runs a bitter campaign against Sawyer. The courts finally rule in favor of Evans and an election is scheduled. There is a rally held for Dukakis and Evans busses supporters to the rally and demands that he sit on the stage with the Presidential candidate and the Mayor. This proves to be the biggest mistake in Evans' war against Sawyer. He showed absolutely no respect for the office he wanted so badly. This one incident splintered the black community between regular Democrats (Sawyer) and the Harold Washington Party Democrats. Evans formed the third party so that two blacks would not run in the primary. Evans chose to run in the general election.

December 1988—Richard Daley (son of the late former Mayor who controlled the city for years) enters the race for Mayor. Whites make sure that Daley is the only white candidate to run against a black. The race is between Sawyer and Daley with Evans campaigning in the black community against Sawyer.

Talk radio finds that the campaign is a hot subject and it dominates the

airwaves. Callers to the white and black stations offer their opinions and beliefs that eventually become very racially

Daley runs a campaign against name-calling and racial hatred. But the black community makes it very racial by saying that the city was going back to the days of Daley's father. Liberal whites and Hispanics feel that the election is totally a black cause. Sawyer tries to run on the issues and his excellent record as Mayor for one year. Evans' supporters demand that blacks vote against Sawyer. On election day there were reports that pro-Evans forces had physically stopped people from voting.

After Sawyer's loss in the primary, the hatred between black voters for one another made it impossible for Evans to win. I don't think this climate among blacks will end any time soon. For another black to have a chance to win the Mayor's seat he or she will have to come from the private sector. I don't think there is one black politician who was not affected by this race—making it virtually impossible for them to run in a city-wide election.

Epilogue: When a black leader dies, it seems that black people try to create a carbon copy of the dead leader. I recall that when John Kennedy was assassinated, Lyndon Johnson was sworn in as President during the flight back to Washington. Standing next to him was Jackie Kennedy in her bloodstained clothes with the body of her husband in the back of the plane. As soon as Johnson took the oath a reporter remarked: "Now begins the Johnson era." The change of power was swift and absolute. As well loved as Kennedy was, no one looked to Johnson to carry on the Kennedy legacy.

But when Martin Luther King was assassinated, we immediately looked for the next Martin. Andy Young, Jesse Jackson, Hosea Williams and Ralph Abernathy were touted to pick up where Martin left off. And waiting on the next Martin we eventually lost a lot of our hard-won gains.

While waiting, Andy Young went on to become Andy Young, Jesse Jackson became Jesse Jackson, and so the story



Made in Medina: Lakim Shabazz & the 45 King



Lakim Shabazz's debut LP Pure Righteousness (Tuff City, 212/262-0385) hits like a ton of Korans on a Sabbath morning. Shabazz takes the Islamic influences of rappers like Rakim, Big Daddy Kane and Chuck D a step further by donning traditional garments and dissing sucker M.C.'s not simply because he's better, but because he's the "first in existence" standing "in a square of pure righteousness" guiding them "down a path that was layed by Elijah" because, as he says, "my mind is my third eye."

Shabazz's emphasis on religious tradition is a new and provocative element for hip-hop, whose consciousness-raising has mostly been directed toward social and political ends. Those are addressed on this LP, but from a fresh perspective by a rapper whose versatile rhymes can inspire as well as instigate change. The first single, "Black Is Back," was released with a black-and-white video whose quick cuts and fast action mirror Shabazz's rapid-fire delivery. This is a rapper who bears a message and is one to look out for.

D.J. Mark, The 45 King produced the album and created nine pumping beats (one a club mix) to go along with Shabazz's relentless lyrics. It's a perfect

combination—a match made in Medina. 45 King produces tracks that mix heavy percussion, often with giddy, timewarping noise. He's also been getting busy: his own Tuff City LP Master of the Game features one side of his beats and another of him with a hyped Shabazz on the mike. (His fierce beats to "The 900 Number" is a must for any hip-hop DJ or programmer.) He's also produced Chill Rob G's thumping anti-crime tale "Court Is Now in Session" single (Wild Pitch, 212/262-0385) from Rob G's upcoming LP Can't Wait.

Party People

Arista Records hosted a luncheon on April 6 in their offices to preview **Bobcat Ervin**'s upcoming solo debut LP. As we mentioned here two weeks ago, Bobcat is on the move. His work with **L.L. Cool** J and **K-9 Posse** has established Bobcat as a strong musical force. The first single, "I Need You," is a ballad cut from the same mold as L.L.'s ground-breaking "I Need Love." The song and video will be out in a few weeks; the LP is in the final stages of mixing and should be out by June.

Jive/RCA Records hosted a party at the Mars Club that night to promote **Too**

Short's LP Life Is... and KC Flightt's Planet E. Both performed. Too Short tempered his hardcore rhymes for the music industry crowd as he intro'ed himself by saying "I've been asked to keep it clean." Jive should be complimented for offering a wide range of hip-hop artists in their large and growing stable that includes D.J. Jazzy Jeff & the Fresh Prince, Boogie Down Productions, The Wee Papa Girls and Kool Moe Dee, who made a special appearance at the party. His long-awaited single from his forthcoming LP will be out very soon.

The next night, April 7, also at the Mars Club, PolyGram Records held a party to promote their first entry into the world of hip-hop: **The Cookie Crew**'s debut LP Born This Way. As the party kicked into full gear, **Dr. Dre** of **Original Concept** was rocking the turntables and showed why OC's Def Jam/Columbia LP Straight From the Basement of Cooley High sports some of the wildest, most relentless DJing around.

Hailing form South London, The Cookie Crew (two rappers, one DJ) are part of London's exploding hip-hop scene, which has given rise to such artists as The Wee Papa Girls, Derek B, Asher D & Daddy Freddy, The She Rockers, Einstein and others. Their first single, "Born This Way," produced by Daddy-O of Stetsasonic (whose LP will be out in early June), is a dense, action-packed track that bumps and bounces its way out of speakers and onto dance floors. Definitely one to check out.

S.U.R.E. Record Pool hosted a party for First Priority Records on April 8 to salute the label's community work. The line-up included First Priority artists M.C. Lyte, Audio II, Alliance, Positive K, and Urban Rock Records artists The Dismasters, KAM and The School Boys and Frank L. S.U.R.E. boasts such alumni as Afrika Bambaata, Timmy Regisford, Rick Rubin, Also Marin, Afrika Islam and others. It has its own studio and has become in the words of director **Bobby** Davis "a university for street DJs to learn their craft." Membership now includes over 125 DIs in the New York tri-state area. Doug Steele, host of "Coast To Coast" since its debut in 1981, is taking the week off to attend the Soul Train Music Awards in Los Angeles!


WVOL Goes Heart & Soul







"YEARNING FOR YOUR LOVE"

If this single and the LP truly represent this artist's talent, you will be hearing a lot more from him. Mike Austin, what a pick! Demos: Those who love great music.

CHAKA KHAN "BABY ME"

This is definitely my favorite jam right now. It's gotta take Chaka back to the top. The song shows the new Chaka, but with flavorings from early on in her career. The phones are hot and the listeners love it. too.

SLICK RICK "CHILDREN'S STORY"

This is a smash Rap offering for sure. The single could work in an earlier day-part as easily as it could in evening drive. A good cut from an LP that should garner lots of single releases.

TONY! TON!! TONE! "FOR THE LOVE OF YOU"

I loved this song from day one. I saw the group perform it live here in Dallas. It was a hit with the crowd and I knew it would be a smashing single release. Programmers, don't sleep on this one! It's back to the top for TIT.

JODY WATLEY "REAL LOVE"

I think this is her best effort since her first solo hit, "Looking For A New Love." The song is bound to be another smash. The video is sharp and this single will surely shoot up to the top of the charts.

CHERRELLE "AFFAIR"

Cherrelle's best uptempo performance to date (minus Alexander). This talented lady is definitely holding her own on this one.

KARYN WHITE "LOVE SAW IT"

I saw her live recently at Reunion Arena in Dallas and got to meet her. A real true entertainer. Lots of phones. (I don't think Babyface hurts the song either.)

MID-ATLANTIC



K.J. HOLIDAY WJDY/Salisbury, MD

ATLANTIC STARR "MY FIRST LOVE"

This song hits it right on the nose. Most people refuse to admit having to let go of the past. Smooth sound and instant phones.

THE O'IAYS "HAVE YOU HAD YOUR LOVE TODAY"

This song has that youthful LeVert sound, but listen carefully. It's true O'Jays material. Good telephone response.

OHIO VALLEY



K.C. IONES WVKO/Columbus, OH

ROACHFORD "CUDDLY TOY (FEEL FOR ME)"

It's a "slam bam, thank you, ma'm" song. A hard-driving, funky tune that has excellent hit potential. Britain's Roachford is going to make his mark in America!

GRADY HARRELL "STICKS AND STONES"

I don't know if the kids would necessarily get into this song, but the upper demographics—particularly 30 to 49—should really love it. We tested the single and it did so well that we added it immediately. We think it's right for the upper demo groove.

RENE MOORE "NEVER SAY GOODBYE TO LOVE"

I love it, I love it, I love it! We're basically an adult black urban radio outlet in Columbus. We target for those higher demos and Rene Moore will get the older listeners as well as the young with this second release from his solo LP. I'm very taskoriented. I wear so many hats around here, but when I heard this song it immediately grabbed my attention.



Using the Portable Multitrack Recorder

Multitrack recording has been the rage within the recording industry since the '60s—but with the development of synthesized instruments and samplers, the need for such equipment among professional and amateur musicians has risen. Amateurs can use small multitrack recorders for making demos at home and professionals can use them for composing and arranging new material.

For that up-and-coming recording star, the self-contained or integrated system is a blessing. These units can save lots of money in expensive studio time and become that first step in putting together the kind of demo tape that will make a record label aware of your talent.

Considering the fact that studio time can run from \$50 to \$150 an hour, there is no time for practicing with the clock running. You must know what you're going to do the moment you walk through the door! Also, your time and money can be saved by having a good basic understanding of multitrack recording. The basics of operation can be learned and practiced on at home (on your own time).

The seasoned pro can use these machines to work out difficult arrangements at home without having to spend countless hours in the studio. Of course, a person working on a *third* successful LP can afford their own studio at home, but many do not want the bother of dealing with mountains of equipment—thereby exhausting their creative juices on technical skills rather than on the music they're composing. These machines are not toys; they are authentic tools of the trade. All of the units discussed here are 4-track recorders.

The Fostex Model X-30



Fostex has become popular over the last ten years for making small multitrack recorders at a good price for home use. The Model X-30 features 4-track record-

ing with Dolby B and C noise reduction and equalization (with mike and line inputs). This is a pretty basic unit which sells for about \$500.

Yamaha MT100 & MT2X



The Yamaha machines have one particular feature that I personally like and that is the fact that they both have the ability to record on all four tracks at the same time—a feature only found on the more expensive machines. Also, even their least expensive machine, the MT100 can record at two speeds: the standard cassette speed of 1% I.P.S., as well as 3¾ I.P.S. The higher speed gives you somewhat better quality, especially when mixing your material down to another deck.

The main difference between the two machines is that the MT100 has four inputs and no equalization, while its big brother—the MT2X—features six inputs with equalization. Both machines have effects sends for adding just about any type of digital audio effect unit available. The MT100 sells for around \$500 and the MT2X for \$850.

The Tascam "Porta" Studio Line

Tascam has three entries in the ministudio equipment line. They are the Porta One, Two and Five. Of course, Tascam makes other home-type integrated studios—both cassette and reel-to-reel—but we are talking about units for under a thousand dollars. The main difference between the Porta One and Five is that the One has equalization with no effects sends and the Five has effects sends, but equalization only on the output. Both machines have four inputs and you can record on two tracks at the same time.

The unit that is my personal favorite is the Tascam Porta Two. This is the most professional looking and sounding machine of all. The Porta Two has six inputs, records at 3¾ I.P.S. and features equalization, plus effects sends on all of its inputs. My ears detect a crisper

sound from the Porta Two when compared to other units in the same price range.

The Porta Five sells for around \$500, the One for \$650 and the Porta Two at about \$950. By the way, all of the Tascam machines feature DBX noise reduction.

A Great Training Tool

I should mention that all of these machines make a great training tool for young musicians and recording engineers. While mastering the operation of these machines, the teen or even preteen can learn the basics of multitrack recording while also learning to master their instrument.

If that youngster is planning a career in music, these machines can give them a jump on the competition and a creative edge in learning music. I'm sure that you've noticed that the successful musicians of today possess a strong technical ability, along with the ability to play music.

Yes, this LP has that unmistakable aura of major label product. Ed's own contribution to the art of rap is seen in the intelligence and playfulness of his approach. For a teenager who whimsically lists his favorite hobby as thinking, it's clear that Ed will be provoking a lot of thought this year. Allinall, avery interesting debut. Check it out.

Bryant Records (313/862-5456) artist Shawnda Lynette Barnes, a/k/a "Smiley," is bustin' out on urban radio with her debut single," Freak Out" b/w "I Don't Have To Sack To Collect." Smiley's experience in the rap arena began while receiving her education at Detroit's Cooley High School (yes, folks, there is a real one...). She combined her singing talents with her school assignments, recalling: "If there was a report to be completed, I rapped it out." While exercising her writing, singing and dancing skills, Smiley earned her way onto the stage as an opening act for the 'Don't Believe The Hype' concert that featured acts such as Public Enemy, Boogie Down Productions, MC Hammer and Today. Don't underestimate her—she's got talent.

Habor Light Records (212/465-1560), owned by veteran songwriter George

Kerr, has just released an answer to Tone Loc's "Wild Thing," entitled "I'm Not Your Wild Thing," that's t-o-o hot. The artist's name is Antoinette Black, a/k/ a Dizzy Dee. If you know Dizzy, then you are well aware of all of the rap competitions she has won. Her original style has earned her such honors as opening for the 1988 Dance Wars as

well as radio and TV appearances. She's got one serious attitude. The flip side of the 12", entitled "Biting The Stone Fox," is also getting much attention from radio stations around the U.S....This young lady is destined for success. Check out her new single or inquire by calling the above number.

Richard Rogers, a new male vocalist

on **Sam Records** (718/335-2112) has a fresh new piece of wax in the streets entitled "Crazy In Love." This 19-year-old male vocalist has a style all his own. After one listen to Richard, you realize that his natural style and phenomenal range put him in a class with some of

black music's best R&B vocalists. His entrance into the music industry came while he was attending De Paul University on a classical music scholarship and was spotted performing locally. The quality in the final mixes can be credited to **Rod Hui** at **Greene Street Recording Studios** in NY. It's on an indie label but it is truly happening. Check it out for yourself.

Alton 'Wokie' Stewart: On the rise at Epic

ast September, I was watching Stephanie Mills and New Edition on the television—this year, I'm in the studio working with

I'm in the studio working with them!" New Yorker Alton 'Wokie' Stewart is amazed at his rapid rise as a recording artist, writer and producer. With his Epic LP, All Our Love beginning to take off, the man (whose nickname came from waking up his whole household as an infant!) is gearing up for a long musical career...

HIS BACKGROUND

"I've been singing since I was nine years old as part of the Boys Choir of Harlem and later as lead singer for The Ecstatistics who were voted the No. 1 gospel quartet in the New York area for five years straight. When I went to a soldout concert by Luther (Vandross) at Radio City Music Hall, that's when I knew I wanted to perform at a place like that before an audience of my own fans."

AN IMMEDIATE HIT

"I was hanging out with Timmy Gatling (former member of Guy) and we were both looking for a deal. He heard me sing at a Kool Moe Dee session and he wrote 'She's So Cold' for me. I added a rap part and we put it on tape. A small independent label called Jump Street was releasing it, but somehow a cassette of the track ended up with Tony Grav at KISS-FM in New York and he started playing it in heavy rotation. That's when the companies started calling and we decided to go with Epic."

ON THE FAST TRACK

"Working with Timmy has meant that I've been running like crazy producing. We did some work on the next Keith Sweat LP, we're doing tracks for solo LPs by members of New Edition, we did some things with The Force M.D.'s,

we're working with Jasmine Guy for Warners and we're also finishing Timmy's first LP. It's sofunny—when I tell my family that I just came back from Stephanie Mills' house, they say, 'boy, p-l-e-a-s-e!,' like they don't believe me. The truth is hard for me to believe too!"



Sherry Winston: A method to the 'Madness'



ith Love Madness, her second LP for Headfirst Records eclipsing the success of ber debut LP

(Do It For Love which made the No. 1 slot on BRE's jazz charts), highly talented flautist Sherry Winston is rapidly gaining a strong following for herself. Continuing her work as a CBS executive at the same time, Sherry is a very busy lady these days...

MAKING HER FIRST LP

"I had intensified my pursuit of a record deal a few years ago and I got many rejections from major record companies. Then a friend of mine suggested I make a record myself so I wrote six of the seven songs. I was the excutive producer and the co-producer and I



assumed every aspect of financial responsibility for the project—right down to hiring the photographer for the LP cover and doing promotion on it myself. It was a labor of love but when the company I licensed it to originally went

out of business, I re-licensed it to K-Tel.**

THE SECOND TIME AROUND

"The situation with the second LP was very different from the first because I got a budget to work with and that took a lot of the pressure off. From a creative standpoint, I wanted to make this LP more accessible to the general market which is why there are cuts like 'Shall We' (featuring Jocelyn Brown) and 'That's The Way Of The World' which are geared more towards the urban contemporary market."

THE CLIMATE FOR INSTRUMENTALISTS

"With urban stations gearing towards the 'quiet storm' format and the arrival of new adult contemporary stations, the climate is much better and there's more possibility for instrumentalists like Najee, Kenny G. and Gerald Albright to cross over. There are other flautists out here but I think the real struggle is not so much with what instrument you play but just getting record companies to be open. Sometimes, raising your own funds and doing that first project on your own is what it takes!"

SPECIAL ED YOUNGEST IN CHARGE **PROFILE**



As they boast their way through this LP, rappers Special Ed embrace a style of hip-hop that is laid-back compared to Public Enemy or Big Daddy Kane. Judging from the popularity of Eric B. & Rakim and EPMD, laid-back rap is becoming more and more successful. Appropriate for Black and Power formats. Demos: Teens, Young Adults.

SINGLES

CURTIS MAYFIELD I MO GIT U SUCKA CUSTOM

Despite a few modern touches, the soul veteran and one-time member of The Impressions—who is known for such solo hits as "Superfly," "Move On Up" and "Freddie's Dead"—remains true to his roots. To borrow Nelson George's term, "I Mo Git U Sucka" is definitely "retro nuevo"-soul music that is at once traditional and contemporary. Recommended for Black and Power formats. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.

STEADY B NASTY GIRLS JIVE/RCA

Tone-Loc's "Wild Thing" is the obvious comparison on "Nasty Girls," the latest single by Philadelphia rapper Steady B. Formats: Black, Power. Demos: Teens, Young Adults.

WHIZ KID CUT IT UP, WHIZ

NASTYMIX

If Nastymix's name sounds familiar, it's because the Seattle-based label put out Sir Mix-A-Lot's gold Swass LP. "Cut It

Up, Whiz" is a hardcore boasting rap song with an emphasis on turntable tricks. Demos: Teens, Young Adults.

SA-FIRE

THINKING OF YOU/BOY I'VE BEEN TOLD **CUTTING/MERCURY**



Sa-Fire is among the most popular voices in the salsa-influenced Latin dance music genre, which has also given us Expose, The Cover Girls, Noel, Denise Lopez and Nayobe. Although Sa-Fire has made her mark in dance clubs, the pop ballad "Thinking Of You" shows another side of her. "Boy I've Been Told," however, is the type of upbeat, Latinized dance tune with which she is usually identified. Appropriate for Black and Power formats. Demos: Young Adults, Adults, Dancers.

INFORMATION SOCIETY REPETITION/SOMETHING IN THE AIR TOMMY BOY



"Repetition" is a mid-tempo technopop item in the Human League vein. "Something In The Air" also has that techno-pop flavor, but it samples James Brown's "The Big Payback" and has funk as well as pop appeal. "Something In The Air" is especially appropriate for Black formats. Demos: Young Adults.

THE O'JAYS

HAVE YOU HAD YOUR LOVE TODAY

EMI

This upbeat techno-funk number marks a change of direction for The O'Jays, abandoning the Philadelphia International/Gamble & Huff flavor generally associated with the group. Produced by Eddie Levert, Sr., Walter Williams and Terry Stubbs and coproduced by LeVert members Gerald Levert and Marc Gordon, Demos: Young Adults, Dancers.

JAZ HAWAIIAN SOPHIE/PUMPIN' EMI

Hip-hop has been fused with heavy metal, pop, blues, jazz and reggae, but "Hawaiian Sophie" is probably the first rap number to incorporate Hawaiian melodies. "Pumpin" is a hardcore boasting song. Demos: Teens, Young Adults.

PATTI DAY INCH BY INCH **STARWAY**

Under the production of Michael Zager—a dance music veteran who is best known for his 1978 hit, "Let's All Chant"-Patti Day delivers an upbeat dance tune with strong club potential. Demos: Young Adults, Dancers.

CHET BAKER ALMOST BLUE NOVUS/RCA

The late trumpeter/vocalist Chet Baker-who was a leader of West Coast jazz or "cool jazz"—was the last person you'd expect to record a song written by rocker Elvis Costello. Nonetheless, "Almost Blue" lends itself to "cool jazz" interpretation in Baker's hands. Recommended for Jazz and Ouiet Storm formats. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.

SUPERSONIC SID KEEP YOUR BOOTY CLEAN (SCRUB THAT BUTT)

Like De La Soul's "A Little Bit Of Soap," this is a humorous hip-hop ode to the importance of good hygiene. Despite its title, "Keep Your Booty Clean (Scrub That Butt)" is radio programmable. Demos: Teens, Young Adults.


Miles Jaye: Simply 'Irresistible'

The multi-talented Mr. Jaye (who co-produced cuts on Teddy Pendergrass' most recent gold LP, and toured with Keith Sweat, Levert and Regina Belle) says he was inspired by the public's response, and his creative juices have been flowing—as evidenced by his new LP, Irresistible...

THE RESPONSE TO HIS DEBUT

"The LP definitely went beyond what I expected. As a new-comer, you try to cut your losses and not to set yourself



up for a disappointment—although you do keep your fingers crossed. Everybody was surprised at just how well the LP was received and I think when 'I've Been A Fool For You' started to kick in, I realized that something was really happen-

ing with the record. It was particularly gratifying because I could see that the public was accepting me with a ballad. When you put out an uptempo tune, it could be that the groove or hook is what is getting people to respond."

APPROACHING IRRESISTIBLE

"My approach to the second LP was very simply to do more of the same as we'd done on the first one, but dig a little deeper musically. I really did sit down and map out my goals for the project, and I wanted to make sure that there was a musical consistency. By writing eight of the nine tracks, I was able to put that consistency into the record."

THE MUSIC ON THE NEW LP

"After you hear the first two cuts—the title track which has almost like a rock edge to it and 'Objective' which has a jazz-like feel to it—you won't know what to expect! Take 'Neither One Of Us': I could have approached that the predictable way as a gut-wrenching ballad but Gladys Knight & The Pips already did that, so we decided to have some fun with the song."

The Controllers: Always in control!



labama-based quartet The Controllers scored big in 1975 with their classic, "Somebody's

Gotta Win, Somebody's Gotta Lose." Three LPs with MCA, as well as their concert tour with Anita Baker in 1986, exposed them to national and international audiences. Today the group has a new LP on Capitol Records, Just In Time, that lead singer Reginald McArthur and baritone Lenard Brown are justifiably proud of...

THE MCA YEARS

"We look at that time as a period of growth. It was productive—we had three LPs out between 1983 and 1987 and Stay (the second set) was probably the most successful.

Being with a major label, we got exposure to audiences both here and overseas; plus we got a chance to have videos out on our product which definitely helped establish us."

BEING BALLADEERS


"Our singles have almost always been ballads, but we never intended it to be that way. With this new LP, people will find out that The Controllers are a double-bladed act. We can be fiery, uptempo cats too as 'Temporary Lovers' shows. But we still have those special ballads for our fans—'Just In Time' is the one that lets them know that we haven't abandoned them."


STAYING TOGETHER
