

Is This The Future Face Of Music?

Unknown bands are playing on radio stations across the nation. And for the life of us, we can't figure out why.

After all, some of the most respected industry people in the country agree that 'Back Announcing' is key to keeping listeners happy and loyal.

Ed Salamon, Executive VP of Programming for both the United Stations Radio Networks and Programming Network feels that, "Giving listeners the music information they want to hear makes each one of the shows that we produce successful – when we play it, we say it."

Bill Bradley, PD at KUPL, Portland categorizes his station as "music intensive." He adds, "I have always strongly believed in identifying our music. I feel it is a major irritant to our listeners when we don't tell them who these artists are."

David Lieberman, Co-Chairman of the Board of Directors for Lieberman Enterprises, sees 'Back Announcing' as a way for radio to

"reconcile two seemingly conflicting points of view: radio is not in the business of selling records," yet "radio <u>airplay</u> sells records. Many of their listeners are our customers. A record customer satisfied is often a radio listener gratified."

So say it and take the wraps off new music once and for all. We've all got a lot to gain by giving credit where credit is due.



SINGLE OF THE WEEK

JAMES INGRAM
IT'S REAL
WARNER BROTHERS

From the sounds of mellow mood music, James Ingram has moved on to a hard-driving uptempo groove with a vocal track that will make Teddy Pendergrass fans stand up and take notice. Produced by Gene Griffin, this is the title cut from Ingram's new LP. It's danceable, it's funky, it's real...and it's a must for radio. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.

MICA PARIS SO GOOD ISLAND

The title cut "So Good" defines this LP in so many ways. With excellent production values, it offers a variety of moods enhanced by the distinctive vocal stylings of London-based Ms. Paris. Setting the tone are selections such as "Like Dreamers Do" featuring Courtney Pine and the duet performed with Will Downing entitled "Where is the Love." But Mica's hit single "My One Temptation" previewed what we could expect from an LP that is an outstanding debut by a truly talented young vocalist. Don't miss out on this one! SINGLES

ANITA BAKER—LEAD ME INTO LOVE—ELEKTRA—This is her latest release from the already multi-platinum LP *Giving You The Best That I Got* and again she does just that. Strong yet smooth vocals backed with soothing instrumentation accent yet another track from Ms. Baker guaranteed to move and groove ya! Demos: Young Adults, Adults.

RODNEY-O & JOE COOLEY—THIS IS FOR THE HOMIES—EGYPTIAN EMPIRE—Originality and good hooks on the third single from the LP Me and Joe demonstrate why these fellas are ready for serious national exposure. With Joe Cooley on the wheels of steel mixing various beats such as an E.W.F. groove and Rodney-O's smooth rap stylings (along with additional vocals by General Jeff), 'Homies' will probably be just one of many chart-busters for the group. Demos: Teens, Young Adults.

SURFACE—SHOWER ME WITH YOUR LOVE—COLUMBIA—Coming off a #1 single, this hot group should score equally well with the third release from the LP *2nd Wave*. Another well produced ballad featuring the smooth yet vibrant harmony that has become their signature, its hit potential will soon 'surface' on urban airwaves. Demos: All.

MANHATTANS—SWEET TALK—VALLEY VUE—This group has gone through many changes—the last being the departure of Gerald Alston to pursue a successful solo career. With the addition of Roger Harris as lead vocalist, the veteran balladeers enhance their repertoire with this dynamic new uptempo dance tune. A typically smooth and graceful performance demonstrates that they have stood the test of time and could well be chart-bound once again. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.

ALBUMS

DEJA—MADE TO BE TOGETHER—VIRGIN—Produced by hitmakers Teddy Riley and Gene Griffin, this is an impressive compilation of tunes performed by the duo of Curt Jones and Mysti Day. "Made To Be Together" was their first hit single from the LP—but there's more on the way via tracks such as "Dreamer," "More & More" and "Going Crazy," just to name a few. This is a format within itself. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.

OAKTOWN'S 3.5.7.—WILD & LOOSE—CAPITOL—Fresh from M.C. Hammer's performing posse, this exciting young female trio share their mentor's infectious drive. Produced by Hammer and co-produced by James Earley, this music has diverse appeal due to the use of hooks that bring back memories ranging from K.C. And The Sunshine Band's "We Like It" and the Spinners' "It's A Shame." But they throw down a serious groove in "Stupid Def Ya'll." Check it out. Demos: Teens.

TAKESHI ITOH—T.K.—COLUMBIA—This LP offers a mean alto sax performance along with a full sampler of first-rate musicianship. On the single release "Cowbell," Jeff Lorber's on piano and "This Is The Night" features excellent vocals by Marc Cohn and Lani Groves. Produced by Mic Murphy and David Frank (The System) with Randy Fredrix and Philippe Saisse (Doppelganger), this is a very satisfying air-worthy LP. Demos: Jazz, Adults

LA RUE—THERE'S LOVE OUT THERE—RCA—Producer Jay King has put his money into the mouths of the group La Rue and it's a winner. It features their hot single release "I Want Your Love," but it doesn't stop there. "Tell Me Something Good," a remake of the Chaka Khan hit and the ballad "All Of Me" are also stand outs. This album will surprise those who are leery of new groups. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.





acking up a trio of major across-the-board hits— "Please Don't Go Girl," "You Got It (The Right Stuff)" and now "I'll Be Loving You Forever"—

and with a platinum-plus Columbia Records album to their credit, New Kids On The Block can clearly be considered as one of the hottest crossover acts to have emerged in recent times. Initially created as the brainchild of producer Maurice Starr (who masterminded the formation and early development of New Edition), the five-member group has been busy criss-crossing the country, winning over both black music and pop audiences with energetic live performances and a distinctive blend of pop'n'soul.

In the summer of 1984, Starr began the task of auditioning Boston teenagers to find a core lineup for New Kids. "I was looking for charm, soul, good looks and talent," says Starr, who with associate Mary Alford chose Donnie Wahlberg as the first member of the group. Wahlberg introduced the producer to high school friends, brothers Jordan and Jon Knight and Danny Wood, with the final member Joe McIntyre added at a later date.

The group began its musical odyssey playing before all-black audiences in the Roxbury area of Boston, developing a sound that clearly appeals to both black and pop record buyers. Comments Ruben Rodriguez, Senior Vice President, Black Music at Columbia: "New Kids On The Block have been breaking all ground from urban to dance to pop to top 40 to adult contemporary: this is truly a multiformat act. It's exciting to see what has developed with this group-the sales are phenomenal. Right now as we speak, we've sold over 217,000 units in five days which takes Hangin' Tough (the

group's second LP) to over a millionand-a-half units and fast approaching two million in sales. All of us at Columbia Records know the hard work it's taken to break this act and we thank everyone at radio for truly supporting us on one of the biggest success stories of the year."

Group member Donnie, who sings lead vocals on three of the LP's cuts,

says that it was the group's second-ever show in Roxbury that helped determine that "we wanted to go for it. There were about 10,000 people in the audience and everything was going fine until some guys in the back starting throwing pebbles at us. The security people got worried—here are these five white kids surrounded by an audience of thousands of black kids—and snatched us off the stage but we came right back and the whole place went


crazy! The crowd really stuck behind us and that's when we knew we were going to do what we wanted to do and not let anyone hold us back." He credits artists like The Jacksons, The Stylistics and Elton John as main influences for the group members, "as well as rock and rap—growing up we listened to all kinds of music."

Dick Scott, who has been involved with producer Starr's activities for the past few years and has been the group's personal manager since the first of this year, states that "New Kids On The Block have the capacity and capability to enjoy the best of both worlds. Here I am, a black manager with a major pop group-a rarity in itself-and I have a different challenge: to ensure that group is a solid hit in both urban and pop markets. I feel that Maurice (Starr) has to take credit for much of what the group has achieved: he has his hands and his heart on the music of today."

In preparing the group's second LP. Donnie says New Kids wanted "a sound that was more 'us,' more for real. The first album (which was released in 1986 and yielded a re-make of "Didn't I Blow Your Mind," "Be My Girl" and "Stop It Girl") was like a project and it didn't have as much impact but when we sat down with Maurice, we said, 'let's make this LP big.' We had a lot of input on it and there's a sound on this LP that we could really relate to as ourselves which you can hear on tracks like 'You Got It (Right Stuff)' and 'Please Don't Go Girl.' It's still a young sound but a little more mature than the first record."

To create an expanded audience, the group has been touring with teen pop idol Tiffany. As Jordan Knight explains: "We've just started doing dates with a 'live' band. Before we were doing track dates on the road with Tiffany. Now we're gearing up for headlining our own tour in the fall while we'll still do some dates with Tiffany. By the time we get ready to go out by ourselves, we'll have a new album: it will be a lot like Hangin' Tough but definitely the next step up musically."

Producer Starr says that he finds working with New Kids, whose age range is 16 to 19, "very easy—they're very bright kids and they can tell when something is working musically or not," says Starr, noting that he's been giving group members pointers on production, engineering and writing while they're busy learning different instruments. Three members of the team contributed their writing talents with Starr to "My Favorite Girl," one of the LP's standout tracks on which they're



credited as associate producers.

"The sky's the limit," says manager Scott. "I want them to be major national and international stars and I think they can be. If I'd had to cast this show from central casting, I couldn't have done better." Such enthusiasm is shared by Starr who adds, "I definitely plan to make this group the biggest in the music industry."

With Columbia Records working closely with the group's producer and management, New Kids On The Block—who are particularly active in

their anti-drug stance and have performed at a number of anti-drug benefits—seem destined to enjoy a lengthy and successful career as a major crossover act. "We still act like teenagers—we have water fights, when we're home we like to play basketball and we like the response we get from the ladies!" says Jordan, who sings lead vocals on four cuts on *Hangin' Tough* including the hit, "You Got It (The Right Stuff)." "But we feel like all our hard work is paying off: we've really worked for what's happening now and

yes, we've paid our dues. No way is this an overnight success story."

Adds colleague Donnie: "We feel our music has mass appeal and kids can relate to us. That's why we make sure people know that we've been out on the streets and we've said 'no' when we've been offered drugs: we're good kids and we want to be an example for other kids in this country that they too can make it. For us, this is the perfect time to do what we're doing in music—we're still young and we have a whole lot of energy and enthusiasm."

Busby Offers Richie and Wonder Motown Deal

LOS ANGELES: Motown label president Jheryl Busby has approached Lionel Richie and Stevie Wonder about obtaining part ownership of the label in a deal that would be similar to the one that saw Diana Ross become a partner in the legendary record company.

According to Busby, the deal is being offered as an incentive to both artists to remain at the

label, and it will also serve to satisfy a clause in the Motown/ MCA agreement that calls for 20% of Motown to be minorityowned

With revenues approaching \$60 million, Motown has already tripled what it was making when MCA bought the label for \$61 million nine months ago. Aside from his label ownership deal proposed to

Richie and Wonder, Busby's short-term goals include signing new acts to develop, market and distribute to two new record labels—SONY (Sounds Of New York) Records and Apollo Theatre Records.

Busby has also stated plans to create a new publishing company and to launch a line of merchandising items featuring the Motown logo.

Dickerson/Hall Formed, Selected As Publicists For BRE Conference '89

LOS ANGELES: The principals of two local public relations firms have merged their individual agencies into one firm, and this newly-formed company will handle the promotion and publicity for the upcoming BRE Conference '89.

Dickerson-Hall is composed of Dierdre Francis-Dickerson, formerly president of the Gabay Group (which specialized in corporate public relations and special events publicity) and Carol Hall, former president of Communications Plus.

BRE publisher Sidney Miller said: "We are delighted to have the multi-media experience of

30,000 Attend Two-Day New York Black Expo

NEW YORK: Over 30,000 people attended the recent 1st Annual New York Black Expo '89 over a two-day period. WRKS.98fm broadcast live both days from the Exposition Center and conducted on-air interviews with celebrities. The station's promotion director Eric Margolis called it "the best promotion we've ever done."

The event—which was opened by Mayor Ed Koch—attracted such participants as Pepsi Cola (who acted as a cosponsor), R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Company, Air Jamaica, James McQuary Furrier, Budweiser, Howard University, 7-11, Metropolitan Life, Kentucky Fried Chicken, NAACP and McDonald's. Jerry Roebuck, promoter and chairman of Black Expo,

said: "Next year will be bigger, and we would like to have more of our children attend and see

what black businessmen and women are doing to build a future for them."

BPME's '89 Scholarship Winner Announced



Black College Radio Confab Honors WHBC And WAUG





"There will be no immediate staff changes. It's too early at this point to disrupt the staff," Anderson stressed. "We know that we have some problems, but we want to restore the station to its former greatness."

A 26-year broadcasting veteran, Anderson has also managed radio station WOCN-AM/FM in Miami.

NEW YORK, NEW YORK

Do you remember the dynamic R&B pioneer **Ruth Brown** who some credit with helping to build Atlantic Records to its prominency? Well, Ruth is very much alive and well and knockin' 'em dead in the phenomenally successful Broadway smash hit "Black And Blue." I caught her nightclub act last week at the Lone Star Roadhouse where she sings every Monday night. If you want delicacy and 'sing pretty' then Ruth is not the one—she is gutsy, vibrant and really magnificent.

One immediately is reminded of Mahalia Jackson and even Bessie Smith when Ruth takes you to church singing real rhythm 'n blues—"Miss Brown's Blues." She tore the house apart with such humorous moments as when she says of her man: "He said, 'You know I love you, baby, better than I love myself...' He was crazy about himself."...

"We bring New Orleans and Mardi Gras with us wherever we go...and we dedicate our music to freedom fighters everywhere around the world-but especially here at home," assured vocalist-percussionist Cyril Neville of the Neville Brothers as they recently performed their gumbo of a show to a packed house at the Ritz. It may have been pouring rain outside but there was the feel of the hot Caribbean sun inside. Highlights included "Yellow Moon"; Aaron Neville's falsetto on "Tell It Like It Is" and on Sam Cooke's "A Change Is Gonna Come"; and "Sister Rosa" which commemorates civil rights activist Rosa Parks...

"Welcome back, Phoebe Snow!" was certainly the sentiment of many as Phoebe's Janis Joplin/Etta James-type voice soared and swooped, pierced and caressed at the Bottom Line Friday night. Yes, after eight long years Phoebe Snow has recorded Something Real—an LP that music insiders predict may be her greatest yet. Phoebe still has that Phoebe magic. By the time she reached "At Last," girlfriend was in full gear. Songs that proved to be crowd favorites were Sly Stone's funky "Thoughtful, Thankful" and "Teach Me Tonight."

Bob Brown, one of the richest men on the East Coast (listed as one of the top five richest black men in America), his charming wife Sally and TV queen Oprah Winfrey summoned 125 intimate friends and family members of famous author Maya Angelou to his High Point,

NC, palatial estate to celebrate Maya's birthday last weekend. Oprah surprised Maya (who is working on several TV projects for Oprah) with a lifetime achievement quilt that she had commissioned noted artist **Tom Feelings** to design. (As you may know, Tom was recently at one point said to be engaged to songstress **Roberta Flack**.) The

beautiful quilt was complete with titles and excerpts of Maya's numerous career works.

Oprah, dressed in a revealing antique white-laced blouse with black silk pants and an ankle-length sash, was very much down-home and an absolute thrill as she and her beau **Stedman Graham** made everyone feel right at home. Also in attendance were **Margaret Freeman** of "The Color Purple" and movie drama coach **Defoy Glenn...**

Congratulations to fellow BRE writer **Vinette K. Pryce** who is editor of the New York-based *Gladiator*, a new black sports magazine, and to former BRE rap columnist **Raven T.** who is editor of the new entertainment mag *Cash*.

I really hate that I missed Jive/RCA artist Jonathan Butler and Najee the other night at The Apollo. Word is the showwassmokin'. Darryl Clark, Director of Black Publicity at RCA, introduced me to Jonathan a few months ago and Jonathan is really a terrific guy. He is a native of South Africa and was a teen singing idol there in the '70s. His More Than Friends LP is rapidly climbing the charts....



CHICAGO AIRWAVES: Talk, Talk, Talk...

Chicago AM radio is now touting its versatility, comparing itself to its main competition—television. Switching from station to station on the AM side you'll find a vast array of formats: all-news, talk which highlights the vast melting pot of the city, beautiful music, sports, jazz, country, rock, urban, blues, r&b. Soon to come: an all-business format.

AM, which has long been considered throw-away radio, may well be the radio of the future. The formats I have mentioned may not have the audiences that FM boasts, but that AM audience does more to set the tone of daily life than any other in media with the exception of TV.

Currently, WGN talk radio occupies the number one position in the ratings war. Cubs baseball is the only entity that pre-empts, as noted columnist Irv Kupcinet might say, "the lively art of conversation."

If you are thinking of buying a radio station, AM just might be the way to go. As the technology for transmission and reception improves, widespread use of AM stereo radio is just around the corner. If the sound quality is comparable to FM, AM radio is the bargain of the future.

But what makes talk so attractive on AM is that you really don't have to listen to conversation in stereo. With the exception of fade-out under a few overpasses there is no drawback to listening to AM in Chicago.

Talk radio had its initial impact in Chicago in 1963 when WVON-AM had a one-hour talk format hosted by Wesley South. It has kept the tradition through the years—eventually becoming all-talk. With WGCI-AM recently joining the all-talk crew, the popularity of the format has definitely been enhanced on Windy City airwaves.

MR. SMITH STAFFS UP AT GCI

Under the new leadership of PD Jimmy Smith, WGCI-FM has undergone some minor changes in its lineup and format. He has added two new part-time announcers: Armonda Rivera (formerly with WBMX-FM) and Steven J. Ross from Houston, TX. LaDonna Tittle has been put on hold. You know what that's like—eventually you hang up or get disconnected. Herb Kent's Sunday dusty record show has been shifted to an evening time slot.

Noted sports and entertainment agents Norby Walters and Lloyd Bloom have been found guilty on five counts of racketeering and mail fraud here in Chicago. They each face a maximum sentence of 55 years in jail and a fine of \$1.5 million dollars. Under the RICO Act the pair stand to lose as much as \$700,000 in assets.

Walters and Bloom were convicted of compromising the eligibility of college football players. The duo offered the players cars and money to sign contracts. Those who tried to break the contracts were threatened with violence.

Walters and Bloom signed 58 athletes from 32 schools. As many as 50 eligibilities had not expired. The pair shelled out as much as \$25,000 to a player.

Stunned and choking back tears Walters and Bloom said that they were confident that they would win on appeal.

NAB Addresses 'Technical Competitiveness' of AM Radio

The National Association of broadcasters sponsored a two-day retreat to continue to deal with the technical future of the AM broadcast band. The "AM Futures Retreat," attended by 29 invited engineers and broadcasters, was held at NAB headquarters in March.

Among the recommendations were a completion of testing of the NAB's experimental AM antenna systems, and an education process for station owners and operators concerning the benefits of AM stereo.

Of course, everyone agreed that the FCC should ensure that interference levels be lowered on the already overcrowded AM band. Among the proposals was the migration of AM daytimers from the AM band to the FM band or to new frequencies on the expanded AM band. To avoid future overcrowding of the band, these vacated frequencies would be shut down and not relicensed.

Also, the group called for stricter assignment and allocations criteria for the expanded and existing AM bands, including a requirement that all applications for new stations, or station changes, meet the more demanding technical standards.

Special attention was directed to imposing tighter controls on power lines and a wide range of electrical appliances such as lightbulbs, dimmers, computers, digital devices and motors all of which cause interference on the AM broadcast band.

Other recommendations included a close relationship with receiver manufacturers with minimum standards for receivers and a point that I find interesting: an AM antenna jack on those receivers. As of now, most if not all home AM/FM receivers have an AM "loop" antenna that attaches to the back of the tuner and an FM antenna jack.

In most cases, the AM loop antenna is not attached to the unit upon delivery and in many cases ends up in the consumer's closet (or in the trash can). Another solution to this problem is offering AM radio to cable subscribers as FM is currently offered. The committee also urged that its findings be offered to a special meeting of the FCC and appropriate Congressional committees.

I would like to stress the need for more education for the consumer on the benefits, or I should say the existence,

of AM stereo. Recently when talking with a musician well-versed in the area of electronic music equipment, I was floored when I discovered that he was not aware of AM stereo broadcasts. This is not unusual. Stations currently broadcasting AM stereo should hype their stereo broadcasts just like FM operators hyped the compact disc in the early '80s. It can't hurt!


For film and post-production work, the A827 offers an internal SMPTE time code synchronizer and parallel/serial RS232/

422 control ports for making an easy integration into editing systems possible.

For broadcasters Studer has the A729 CD system controller. This unit controls up to four of the new famous Studer A727s and/or A730s. The A729 has disc recognition capability with a capacity for recognizing up to 100 discs and storing up to three start and end cue points per disc. The A729 significantly expands the application range of the popular A727 CD player.



ERNEST P. WHITE, JR: A Gladiator for Gospel at WDCU/Washington, DC



Ernest White is community and public affairs director at radio station WDCU 90FM in Washington, D.C. He is also host and producer of Jazz 90's "Crosstalk" public affairs call-in talk show heard daily Monday through Friday from 12:00 noon until 2:00 p.m.

White has been with WDCU since its inception in May of 1982, hosting the second segment of "Blessed Assurance" and FM 90's "Gospel Spotlight" for more than four-and-a-half years. Prior to coming to WDCU, he hosted "The In-Ernest Report," a news magazine show on WUST radio for one-and-a-half years. An accomplished writer, White has written for many of the print publications in the Washington area. He has served as entertainment editor for Washington Living Magazine, and editor of the entertain-

ment/political/religious sections of the Washington Informer Newspaper.

White's efforts in the media have not gone unnoticed. He has received numerous awards from professional and civic organizations, including the 1986 D.C. Chamber of Commerce Media Award; the Public Service Award from the American Cancer Society and the National Association of Hearing and Speech.

Active in the community, he is a Trustee at the Mt. Zion Baptist Church in northwest Washington, DC, a member of the Moye Ensemble of Washington, the Capital Press Club and the Washington Association of Black Journalists.

In addition to his many activities, White is also an entrepreneur. In-Ernest Productions is a public relations,

management consulting and special events firm. White operates the firm along with his brother Ron, a print and broadcast journalist. The firm's accounts include The National Black Religious Broadcasters, Virtue Record Company and the Lee Elder Pro AM Golf Tournament. The firm also manages or books over 17 gospel artists, including Rev. Donald Vails, Pat Barnes, Robert Nawah Smith, La Barbara Whithead, Debbie Steel, The Atlanta Philharmonic Chorale, Donald Vails Salvation Corporation and others.

White is also the founder of a program which he states, "is very close to my heart": WDCU-FM Mentor's Program. The program involves black males of the Washington community who work with black boys ages 9 through 12 at the Malcolm X Elementary School. The program is designed to build self-esteem and to provide positive black role models. White states, "Between overseeing the program, performing my daily functions at the station and In-Ernest Productions, I don't have time for anything else, at least not at the moment."



"We were the 'sleeper' group of the year! But we're gonna be out here till everyone knows us. There's no truth to those rumors about us breaking up because I've been busy as a producer—we're staying together as a group."

"Ijust came backfrom England and the audiences are really enduring—they've been into what I'm about musically for a while now—and I'm going back over thereto play two sellout shows in London in May."

LISA LISA

"Our new single ('Little Jackie Wants To Be A Star') is about the American Dream—about a girl who comes to New York City to try and find fame and fortune. That's not how it happened for me but I will say that it's damn hard to get into this business and even harder to stay in it."

Something Soulful About Soul Train



was impressed with Don Cornelius for initiating the long overdue Sammy Davis Jr. Award. It was soulful, I thought. Then in the auditorium at the

Shrine, I overheard a young rapper say, "Why they givin' Michael somethin' named after Sammy Davis? He don't mean nothin." Bad rap. I resisted the impulse to grab the brat by one of his ridiculous gold chains, push him into his seat and pound him over the head with something real—like his own history.

How can the future be assessed if the past is unknown? Every door that has been opened for us to walk or moonwalk through, somebody first in line bloodied their knuckles beating against it. Often it was Sammy doing the pounding with his talent and his personal courage. That should not be taken lightly, forgotten or dismissed by anyone, ever. Is my reaction to this kind of stupidity so intense because Sammy is my friend and I love him? Everybody who thinks about putting a foot on a stage should love him, too, and study him.

You can believe the young man who accepted the award studied him. If you could ask Michael Jackson, he could tell you about the extraordinary things Sammy has done in his sixty years of performing. But since you can't talk to Michael, I'll tell you.

First, imagine back 60 years to 1929. There were no traffic lights in the intersections in New York City. Gandhi had not yet begun his campaign of civil disobedience. The 25 minutes the jury needed to convict and decree the death sentence for the first of the Scotsboro boys, Heywood Patterson, was still two years away. Poverty was taking over, the world was headed into the Great Depression. The Will Maston Trio was eking out a living. When given the opportunity, a tiny boy dazzled the club goers with his dancing. That same child made his film debut with the great Ethel Waters in "Rufus Jones for President."

Each generation has a handful of truly great dancers. In my opinion, Sammy is the greatest of his generation. He leapt and twirled and defied gravity. These days when he reaches inside the piano and pulls out his tap shoes, it's for a less athletic performance, but one no less sweet. His taps say things with the ease and elegance so many dance hopefuls wish they could convey. Michael spins and twirls and defies gravity too—especially when walking on the moon. But Sammy wasn't walking on the moon, he was walking some mean streets and having to walk in and out the back doors.

These days many black performers play Las Vegas. When Sammy first played Las Vegas, he wasn't allowed to stay in the hotel; he had to stay across town in someone's house. He wasn't allowed in the casinos and he had to eat in what was called the "Chuckwagon" backstage. But he sang and he played and he danced and he impersonated and he built an act-he became an entertainer. He found the way to mesmerize an audience. He became theatrical and he became a legend. These days, anybody can go into a casino by any door, stay in any room and those performers good enough can take the stage. But not if Sammy hadn't been there first.

His voice was compelling. Still is. He's made 40 LPs and sold millions of records. He has a legitimate voice, it doesn't rely on tricks. He just sings and when you listen you know the difference between what a producer can do to a mediocre voice and real talent. His voice may be 64 years old, but the passion and power belong to a young man convincing his beloved that his heart is true.

The young man at the Shrine's date was a blond. Nobody paid any attention. When Sammy's heart dictated marriage to blond actress Mai Britt, it ended her career and we won't deal here with the death threats and fear his actions

generated. As for his personal courage, the horrific crash that nearly killed him and took his eye only made him stronger. When he took the stage at Ciro's for his triumphant return, he turned the place out and his legend grew. Two years ago on Christmas, I sat with him in Cedars Sinai as he told me he'd be back dancing soon. This was after the second replacement. Naturally, he went back to dancing. Most recently with Gregory Hines in "Tap."

All along he was expanding his talent. The films continued—"Anna Lucasta," "Salt and Pepper," "Sweet Charity." And if "Oceans 11," "Sergeants Three" or "Robin and the Seven Hoods" were not classics, "Porgy and Bess" was and is. As for the other films, they were entertaining and Sammy had equal status with his white co-stars—back in 1960 that didn't happen that easily. As the '80s wind down, Michael can command the millions necessary to make "Captain Eo" and "Moonwalkwer."

Sammy turned to television as well. He can ride and rope and shoot and he became a cowboy at a time when there were no black faces on TV anywhere.

And then there was Broadway. There are a handful of performers who've had a Broadway hit during every decade during the last four. Sammy has. He was and is "Mr. Wonderful" and "Golden Boy." He starred in "Stop the World, I Want to Get Off," and most recently at the Gershwin Theatre where he and Bill Cosby knocked them in the aisles with their production of "Two Friends: Sammy & Cos." It may not be in Michael's nature or plans to do Broadway, but every actor will tell you it is the ultimate test of skill, so perhaps Michael will give it a go. If he does, he'll have a great example to follow.

It is most significant to note that while Michael was accepting his Sammy Davis Jr. award, Sammy was half the world away standing on stage—entertaining—60 years on.

If we project into the future, there is no doubt that Michael Jackson's name, talent and his own personal courage will have made an incomparable mark on entertainment and the world—because we've seen only a glimpse of his greatness. My fervent hope is that when the brightest star of 2049 takes the stage to accept a Michael Jackson award, no young idiot will dismiss Michael's importance.

It would be a bad rap.





THE BLOSSOMS: The *Real* Singers Behind "He's A Rebel"



Yesterday



Today

During the '50s one of the most visible female groups of the era was the Blossoms. The members of that group met while students at Edison Jr. High and Fremont High School in Los Angeles.

At aschool talent show Richard "Louie, Louie" Berry discovered the young girls and professionally introduced them to the industry.

When I caught up with Fanita James the only remaining original member of the group—she explained: "Once we completed an LP with Richard Berry, other production companies started calling and we began getting a lot of work. We worked with Sam Cooke and Lou Rawls, and we got vocal coaching by the late Eddie Beale. He's the one who took us to Capitol Records."

It was a highly impressed Capitol executive named Tom Fransend who took one look at the girls (including one white female member!) with their varying shades of complexion color and said: "You ladies look like a beautiful bouquet of flowers, so that's going to be your name...The Blossoms."

At that time, the group's most famous member, Darlene Love, hadn't yet joined the Blossoms: "She was a bit younger than the rest of us. One of our members left to get married, but when we met Darlene and heard her sing...that was it. She was in." Later, Jeannie King joined the group and the three of them—King, Love and James—stayed together as a unit for the next 15 years.

They ended up signing with ABC Records—a label that felt the time wasn't exactly right for an interracial group—so King, Love and James officially became the Blossoms. The high point of their career was when singer Jackie DeShannon (of "Put A Little Love In Your Heart" fame) introduced them to British producer lack Goode.

"He liked us very much and told us about a TV show he wanted us to be a part of: 'Shindig.' About two weeks after he told us about it, we got a call to come in and start rehearsing. Every artist who had a hit at the time appeared on that show. We became regulars for two years and that really helped our careers."

While the Blossoms never had a hit under their own name, they did sing on a #1 Phil Spector-produced smash called "He's a Rebel," although it's The Crystals' name which appears on the label: "I guess Phil was upset with them about something, so he asked Darlene if she would do the lead vocals on the track. She agreed and we came in to do the background.

"We only got a flat-out salary, never any royalties off the sound. But let's face it, when it's 1962 and someone offers you \$1,500, you don't question it. We got the check and thought we were rich," she recalled with a laugh.

Love recorded a solo LP on CBS Records last year and has become a successful actress, while Fanita James now owns the rights to the name The Blossoms and is keeping the tradition going. Today the group's members are James, Angela Lewis and Cynthia Woodard.

They are currently on a European, 62-date tour with Tom Jones and in July they'll be playing Bally's in Las Vegas. Signed to Classic Records, The Blossoms hope to have a hit in their *own* right with the soon-to-be-released single: "Lonely Friday Night." Good luck, ladies!



FROM PD TO HITMAKER

"I went to college and got a degree in communications. After becoming the college station's PD, I became a DJ at 'Power 97' in Vegas. When I went to KCEP and became the PD, I played some of my demos to a couple of young promotion guys who seemed to have an ear for what I was doing. We pressed up copies of one of the tunes ('Summergirls') around August of '87 and eight months later, it had begun to



be a West Coast hit. That began the industry buzz and 4th & Broadway picked it up and 'Summergirls' began to take off on a national level last year. That's when we had to rush in and finish off an LP."

URBAN RESPONSE TO '24/7'

"I'm overwhelmed by the response at black radio to the record. It's really gratifying for me because I've been a fan of black music since my teenage years when I used to listen to black radio and artists like The Jacksons, EW&F."

INDUSTRY PERCEPTIONS

"Going from PD to recording artist wasn't hard because making music is what I always wanted to do. It's the reason I went into broadcasting. I figured, being on the air was the next closest thing to being an artist."

versation! The black British five-member team have translated their respect and love for their heroes from the '60s and '70s into "Tribute (Right On)," now emerging as a U.S. hit on Columbia Records much to their pleasure, according to group members Hammish Seelochan and Andrew John Banfield....

THE EARLY DAYS

"We started out initially as a dance troupe called Finesse in 1983 but we were always dancing to other people's music. 'Tribute (Right On)' was one of the first songs we wrote together. We started perform-

We felt it would be a good introduction to the band and show our influences—the people we mentioned on the record like Smokey, Sam Cooke, James Brown, Otis, Aretha, Marvin, Stevie, Jackie Wilson as well as the Philly groups and groups like The Chi-Lites."

THE NEW BLACK BRITISH BREED

"We like to think of ourselves as part of a whole new set of people who've come out around the same time, including Mica Paris and Roachford. Before, the British record com-



panies wouldn't take local black acts seriously but that's started to change, which is great because we want world domination—we want to take over! U.S. success is important because this is where the roots of the music we're doing exist. We want to tour here because when people see us, they'll definitely get their money's worth!"

Whitney Houston

Those of you who didn't attend the Soul Train Awards are still probably aware

that WHITNEY HOUSTON was the recipient of embarrassingly LOUD boos and jeers when her name was announced in a category pitting her opposite VANESSA WILLIAMS, PEBBLES and the always-popular ANITA BAKER. Houston has become the ROBIN GIVENS of black music and has an image problem that only a savvy publicist (on the order of RAMON HERVEY?) could solve.

Houston, who rarely does interviews with the black media anymore, would probably do well to line up some coverage in *Ebony, Jet* and *Essence*, post haste. Meeting this problem head-on, rather than trying to ignore it, is what industry insiders feel would be one of her wisest moves at this point.

Black female singers have been having a rough time of it lately. For example, **GRACE JONES** was freed from jail on Tuesday, April 11th in Kingston, Jamaica, after a court granted her \$2,700 bail on a charge of possessing cocaine. 


