

YBPC-RESTORING 'THE NETWORK'

nce upon a time, the men and women who plied their trade as modern-day drummers in the villages created by the technologies of broadcasting and recorded music were a family. They shared a special connection which only served to enhance the specialness of who they were and what they did as the voice of their communities. They informed as they entertained—and did not hesitate to take a stand. Even when it threatened their livelihoods. From coast to coast, black legends emerged. In Chicago, E. Rodney Jones dominated the urban airwaves. His power was as impressive as his generosity in giving counsel to young radio and record industry professionals. In this same tradition, the Windy City also

gave us a Sid McCoy; Philadelphia produced a Georgie Woods; Detroit, the late Al Perkins; New Orleans, Larry McKinley; and in Houston, there was only one Boogaloo. There were—and are—others in this mold to be sure. But as the game and the players changed in this new era of "hardball" politics, a divisive aura of competitiveness and mutual distrust crept in and threatened to permanently alter—or even destroy—that old spirit of camaraderie.

Enter the Young Black Programmers Coalition. From the ashes of NATRA and the heart of the Southern black radio base, this organization arose to restore that missing personal and professional bond. And it has worked-surviving both regional and inter-industry divisions under the able



leadership of Terri Avery, an outstanding broadcast professional (whom we were proud to induct this year as a charter member of the BRE Hall of Respect). The Seventh Annual YBPC Award of Excellence Scholarship Banquet bears eloquent testimony to the validity of the organization. As the industry gathers in Dallas this weekend to pay tribute to two of its best and brightest—veteran programmer Sonny Taylor and top Atlantic Records executive Sylvia Rhone—we note with admiration that the proceeds of this event will assist in the development of worthy successors to Sonny and Sylvia in their respective sectors. Once upon a time, people in this industry respected and cared about one another. The YBPC proves that they still do.

See you in Long Beach at BRE Conference '89 as we create "The '90s Network"—a living tribute to our past and the beginning of a new future.

BLUE MAGIC—IT'S LIKE MAGIC—OBR/COLUMBIA—Once again this group proves that good love songs will never die and reinforces the message with this smooth new single from the LP *From Out Of The Blue*. This tune has the signature touch and feel with which Blue Magic has cast its spell from the beginning. Great song! Demos: All.

KARYN WHITE—SECRET RENDEZVOUS—WARNER BROTHERS—This is the unstoppable Ms. White's fourth release from her already platinum LP and like her previous hits, this one grooves. With samples from her own material in this song (which was produced by LA and Babyface with additional remixing by T.C.), it's a club-bound dance trak. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.

KENNY G.—AGAINST DOCTOR'S ORDERS—ARISTA—This is the latest chart-bound release from the reedman's double platinum LP, *Silhouette*. Produced and arranged by Kenny G. and Preston Glass, it jumps with some swinging jazz grooves that just might make you want to get up and dance.

DINO—I LIKE IT—4TH AND BROADWAY—From the mellow mood of his debut single, the ex-DJ-turned-singer changes the pace with an uptempo, hard-driving dance groove. It shows yet another dimension of an artist who has written, arranged and produced an exciting sound for black radio. Demos: Young Adults.



JUNE POINTER—JUNE POINTER—COLUMBIA—This LP features outstanding writers and producers such as Narada Michael Walden, Kashif, Burt Bacharach and Carole Bayer-Sager. Together they've come up with a classy, creative compilation of material for June's solo outing. With her vocal expertise at the forefront, this LP is definitely a contender for a top spot on the charts. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.

LEOTIS—ON A MISSION—MERCURY/POLYGRAM—"On A Mission," his outstanding debut single, served as a great introduction to this exciting young artist. Producers like Alvin Moody, Vinnie Bell and Robert Brookins have put it "in the mix" for Leotis with some hi-tech creativity that will surely help him to fire up the charts. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.

MANIQUIN—MANIQUIN—EPIC—Diversity characterizes the selections on this group's debut LP—and the production credits reflect it. Produced by the likes of Charlie and Ronnie Wilson, Charlie Singleton and Epic's own Bernie Miller, Maniquin performs a variety of airworthy songs such as "Shine a Light," "Now and Then," and "Men Will be Dogs." Give it a listen. Demos: Young Adults.

SWING OUT SISTER—KALEIDISCOPE WORLD—FONTANA/POLYGRAM—This duo from overseas has landed on solid ground with an LP offering R&B/Techno-Pop with an English accent and some fairly elaborate musical arrangements with full strings and French horns. Check out tracks like "Forever Blue," "Where In the World," and "Waiting Game," and judge for yourself! Demos: Adults.



MICA PARIS SO GOOD!

he's been tagged "Britain's Anita Baker," compared to the likes of Dionne Warwick, Natalie Cole and Whitney Houston. Visiting the U.K. last year, none other than Prince handed

year, none other than Prince handed her the mike during an after-show party and the young lady, who got her musical training singing gospel in churches in London, wowed one and all—including The Royal One—with her version of "Just My Imagination," The Temptations' classic.

"It was really weird!" Mica recalls. "He just called me up onstage and I don't know how he knew me—I guess he'd heard about me through the grapevine. Anyway, the next day, he called and asked me if I'd join his band but I had to say 'no' because of what was happening with my career."

Just turned 20, Mica (pronounced 'Mee-sha' and an abbreviation of Michelle Antoinette) Paris is already a star in the U.K. with So Good, her debut LP for Island Records (already double platinum). She's considered by the British media as the first bona fide London-born female soul star and the delightful young lady has begun to make inroads in the U.S. via her first single, "My One Temptation," one of the classiest records on the black music charts. It's obvious from one listen to Mica's auspicious debut (produced by the British songwriting/production team of Peter Vale and Miles Waters, known as L'Equipe) that this rising star is no carbon copy of any of the women whose names have been bandied about in the attempt to compare Mica to more

established vocalists.

"I know that when people make comparisons, they mean good things," chuckles Mica, with a strong London accent. "It doesn't get me angry—I mean it's a compliment to be linked with singers who are so much older than I am." Mica, whose family background is Jamaican, expresses surprise at just how quickly the British public responded to her: "A lot of people in Britain consider that the really good music by black artists comes only from the U.S. I think they went crazy (about

the LP) because they were dying to have their own, to have something real. I worked very hard to create my own sound and I think the British audiences are proud that they now have someone who can sing the kind of material I do."

Island Records in this country is making Mica's debut LP a top priority: "She is and will be a superstar who will transcend numerous radio formats as far as we're concerned," says Rick Bleiweiss, Vice President of Sales at Island. "We started out with 'My One

Temptation' at black and adult contemporary radio and now, it's crossing over to CHR. We regard Mica as an across-the-board artist so we're marketing her music that way. Like Anita Baker, Sade or Dionne Warwick, Mica transcends just one niche."

Manager Bruce Garfield, commenting on the U.S. launching of Mica's career, notes: "We wanted to present her in an unhyped fashion and for people to accept her and digest her at their own pace. We discussed a great deal how we would present her and we even shot a different LP cover for this country as well as re-shooting her first video. We did some remixing and additional production work with Monte Moir in Minneapolis to give the country just a little more bottom for this market."

Mica, who remembers her early years "listening to my Dad's jazz collection, people like Dizzy Gillespie, Charlie Parker, and especially Miles Davis" as well as her first public performance "at seven, in front of a church group" rose to prominence on the U.K. gospel circuit as part of a quintet known as the Spirit of Watts. By the time she was in her early teens, Mica was doing session work with notable British groups like Shakatak and Hollywood Beyond and even ventured out on the road with the latter group at the ripe old age of 16. "I did background sessions for about four years and it required a lot of discipline-I guess I was a workaholic but it meant I was more professional at a young age."

She laughs at the memory of taking her demos to different British companies: "I just had a couple of songs and I wasn't expecting the kind of reaction I got from companies—they were all into the music. But I fell in love with Island because they were willing to go more for what I wanted and they didn't try to make me anything other than myself."

Much of the excellent material on So Good—which features a duet with labelmate Will Downing on the Flack/ Hathaway classic, "Where Is The Love," as well as a guest appearance by UK sax player Courtney Pine—was written specifically for Mica and she contributed to the co-writing of one track, "Don't Give Me Up." Future LPs will likely include some of her own compositions "but I'm not in any rush to put them out there," she notes.

The music on So Good (a song that Mica recorded before Al Jarreau cut it for his most recent LP) is, according to the stylish singer, "a bit of jazz, pop, funk, and soul—we've got everything in there. You couldn't try to categorize it, although I would say that I do have a gospel-based voice."

Observes manager Garfield: "One of the reasons we know Mica is going to be very successful in this country is that she hits the highest common denominator, whether young or old, white, black or brown. She's a sophisticated young lady yet a singer who can be as funky as you can imagine any artist being and she's definitely beyond her years in terms of her musicality. She's serious about her work and yet she's still a vibrant young woman."

Mica says that having her music accepted here in the U.S. is particularly important "because I want to try and spread the word that we British artists can really do it. There aren't enough of us making it here with real songs. We're usually known for one type of sound and for doing dance grooves but now, there are some real artists coming along-like Paul Johnson and The Pasadenas." Modesty might prevent Mica from adding her own name to that list but it's evident from her debut LP that singing "real songs" is one of the key factors that has brought Mica so much acclaim.


Now out on the road opening on a national tour for Ashford & Simpson, Mica spent a month rehearsing and preparing for her first major U.S. road trip. "I did one show here before (at New York's Bottom Line) and American audiences really let you know when they like you even in the middle of a song! Touring this country is something I've always wanted to do so I feel really cool about it."

As Debbie Howard, Island Records'

Sales Manager for Black Music, points out: "Mica is a phenomenal live performer. In the U.K., she's already a major star both 'live' and on record. Some artists enhance their record sales when they perform while others detract—Mica's performances will definitely enhance what we're doing here."

With the prospect of international stardom staring her in the face, Mica says she's already begun to learn how to deal with the pressures that inevitably come along with public recognition: "I just shut the door and spend time on my own and make sure I have a private life. That's the only way to get your sanity back—by just getting into yourself and who you are."

Words of wisdom from a young lady who's already making an impact with her first LP and in the words of the pop classic, Mica Paris has "only just begun."

Simpson is also the host of "Video Soul," a daily music video show aired nationally on the Black Entertainment Network.

"Simpson's natural, personal style, 21 years of broadcast experience, and tremendous popularity make him the ideal host for 'Top 30 USA,'" said Chuck Woodson, Sheridan director of entertainment programming about the show which will feature music, interviews and anecdotes in a count-down format.

On May 18th at Nirvana, One Times Square Plaza atop Sheridan's New York headquarters at Broadway and 42nd Street, STRZ will host a party celebrating Simpson's coming on board at the syndicated radio network. Coverage of the event is expected on local network news and television programs such as "Entertainment Tonight."

EMI Enjoys Greatest Sales Month Since Label's Formation



NEW YORK: In April EMI's sales figures were the highest they had ever been since the label was originally formed. The company's previous sales high was set in September, 1988 and it exceeded that by 25 percent last month.

A few of the LPs contribut-

ing to those high sales figures were Simple Pleasures by Bobby McFerrin, Day By Day by Najee, Good to Be Back by Natalie Cole, Serious by the O'Jays and Orpheus releases such as Love Season by Alex Bugnon and Pass the Salt And Pepper by female rap artist Shocky Shay.

"We had an exceptionally strong month in both pop and urban music, and that includes Orpheus Records," said Sal Licata, president and ceo, EMI. "Obviously, we find the figures encouraging and consider them a compliment to the growing strength of our artist roster."

Yes, it's true. **Diana Ross** is back! The Supreme Diva of Motown will be appearing for for the first time in five years at Radio City Music Hall from June 14-17. The word is that Miss Ross' return engagement will be, in fact, a lavish Broadway-Las Vegas-type production. I hear that they're pulling out all the stops for what promises to be Miss Ross' greatest performance to date. Now you know that this is going to be a show—only Ross can top Ross! Get yo' tickets now.

Oh, speaking of The Boss' (in more ways than one) label...as you may know The Pointer Sisters' contract with RCA has ended and they are in negotiations right now with Motown. Also, June Pointer said recently, "I'm not leaving The Pointer Sisters and they're not trying to get rid of me," as she talked about her solo LP, June Pointer. The new LP is being released this month by Columbia Records and June has worked on it with such notables as Kashif, Narada Michael Walden, David Foster and Carole Bayer Sager.

Also new at Motown is **Trouble T.** (LaTasha Rogers), the cute and dimpled young female rapper from the City of Angels that Motown is getting ready to launch. Her project is being produced by T's dad **Johnny** and her uncle **Joe Rogers**, who are known as The Rogers Connection...

"Eleanor Rigby," "Stairway To Heaven" and "Over The Rainbow" were a few of the tunes that 29-year-old jazz guitarist **Stanley Jordan** shared with his audience last week at The Blue Note.

My patience usually wears thin during such guitar performances but Stanley excited the crowd with his own technique of using two hands on the neck of the guitar, which is a keyboard-like style that allows him to play two (and sometimes it seemed like three) guitar lines at once. You may remember that Stanley (a Princeton graduate) was discovered during the 1984 JVC Jazz Festival. Sarah Vaughan plays the Blue Note for six nights after Stanley Jordan's stint. Sarah Vaughan, Miles Davis, Ella Fitzgerald, Mel Torme and many more are scheduled to perform at the JVC Jazz Festival, June 23-July 2...

Saturday night it was certainly deja vu at The Ritz as Chuck Berry duckwalked, split and straddled on stage dressed in flaming red, super-wide bell bottom pants with patent leather shoes, no less. At 62 Chuck still has that magic which made him such a hit for decades as he toured the country on one-nighters and became an instant success on such shows as Dick Clark's "American Bandstand." Chuck Berry, as has been his modus operandi for years, picked up a bar band and a horn section after he came to New York. Obviously, he and the "band" did not rehearse because there were so many missed cues-but who cares—he's Chuck Berry and there was still a whole lot of rockin' and arollin' goin' on.

It's going to be interesting to see if **LL Cool J** can do it again with his new LP, Walking With A Panther, his first effort since his 1987 smash Bigger and Deffer. I am pleased to announce that all the legal work has been completed that will make the Black Entertainment Hall of Fame a reality here in Chicago. The BEHOF will house persons honored from the recording, radio, TV, journalistic and literary arenas. Admission to the BEHOF will not be restricted to the notables of the entertainment world; the executives who have done much to enhance black entertainment by their contributions will also be included. The involvement of various companies in the industry will be highlighted as well.

For the past few months I have been beating the drum for for BEHOF and it would take the whole page to list the number of persons who have voiced their support for such an institution. Yes, institution is just what the BEHOF will become—an edifice of pride, achievement and learning for blacks and whites

alike.

The accomplishments of black music legends such as Nat King Cole, Ella Fitzgerald, Quincy Jones, Thomas Dorsey, Scott Joplinand Duke Ellington extend far beyond a song. Vivian and Jimmy Carter, Kenny Gamble and Leon Huff, Berry Gordy created more than just a record company. Don Cornelius, Al Benson, Jack Gibson, E. Rodney Jones, Scottie Andrews, Al Perkins, Hal lackson were more than announcers. Granville White, Joe Medlin and Dave Clark were more than record promoters. Ernie Leaner was more than a entrepreneur, and the lists go on.

What I have tried to do here is briefly outline the concept of just what the BEHOF will represent. With the help of people like Dionne Warwick, Jerry Butler, Natalie Cole, Barry Mayo and others the BEHOF will indeed be a source of pride for all of us.

As you know, they'll be honoring two outstanding and deserving recipients-Sylvia Rhone of Atlantic Records and veteran radio programmer Sonny Taylor. The sale of tickets will help pay for scholarships for communication students who are being trained to take their places in this industry. Our support of this very worthwhile endeavor is real networking for the future.

In addition to the award she has been selected by her peers to receive, Ms. Rhone will have an additional source of pride this weekend. The entertainment lineup will feature Atlantic recording artists whose careers she has had a hand in molding. Get ready to throw down with Paul Jackson, Jr., Bobby Lyle, Chuckii Booker (who is getting out-of-the box adds with his debut single, according to RPM Henry Jefferson of Atlantic) and Gerald Albright.

Speaking of Gerald Albright, the man with all the sax appeal performed in Dallas recently at the Arcadia Theater and literally turned it out.

SOUTHWEST SCENE

K104's **Michael Hernandez** is no longer PD at **KDKS/Shreveport**, **LA** and is not doing his airshift at K104 via satellite anymore. He has moved back to the Big D and is on the air live in the studio.

But **Tom Joyner** and the K104 morning team (**Chris Arnolds**, sports; **Cyndi B. Finer**, support; **Norman Hall**, news; and **Kerry Doyen**, entertainment reporter) were not broadcasting live from the K104 studios in early March. Their show originated at the new Disney/MGM Studios Theme Park in Orlando, FL—just one of the teams recent on-location broadcasts. It's not surprising that the station is investing the money in travel because they had a big jump in the winter Arbitron ratings. They went from a 7.2 last book to an 8.5 and are the number two station in the Dallas market.

KJMZ (**JAMZ**)/**Dallas** is currently number 13 in the market and debuted with a 3.4 share, which is impressive for a new station. Of course, they are

still carving out a niche for themselves in this market by conducting on-air research via the 'continuous music test.' Listeners call in while a song is being played and tell the station whether they like it or not. Based on the direct response, the station decides whether to keep that song on its playlist. As as with all of the JAMZ promotions, there was an SRO turnout when they recently presented **Tone-Loc** at the Stark Club.

KQXL/Baton Rouge celebrated its 6th anniversary on the air May 5th and 6th as the urban market leader in the fall ARBs. In its latest promotion, the station featured a "Winning Pair Contest" in which two listeners were sent to Las Vegas with roundtrip airfare, hotel accommodations and a cash allowance courtesy of KQXL.

Also in Baton Rouge, WXOK-AM is currently undergoing a staff realignment. Matt Morton, who recently exited the station as GM, has accepted a position at Warner Brothers on their Reprise Records promotion staff. Matt is a broadcast veteran of 13 years. Dennis Lee replaces Matt as GM and has also taken over PD duties. Ironically, Dennis began his career in broadcasting at this very station about 19 years ago. Thirteen of those years were spent at WXOK and the last six years at Epic Records as S.W. Promotion Manager. According to Dennis, "Being back at WXOK is like coming back home. It's very familiar and radio is my first love." Also at the station, the 4-8 pm airshift of Ken "Ice Man" James, PD for the last three years before his recent resignation, has been taken over by new afternoon announcer Ernest Smith.

Kevin McCormick has filled the position left open when PD Michael

Hernandez left KDKS. Kevin is very busy these days with his PD responsibilities, maintaining a 3-7 pm airshift and the added duties of MD since **Chalay Chaan** recently relinquished his Music Director responsibilities due to his becoming incredibly popular and having an abundance of requests for appearances. But he continues as part of the morning team.

When KDKS recently sponsored a big rap concert, there was a car belonging to a Shreveport resident which had just won a national championship for having the "World's Loudest Sound System." The car's sound system is 150db, which is supposed to be louder then any concert anyone ever heard. We're talking headaches and blurry vision if you get too close. And KDKS likes to get closer to 92 of its listeners each weekend by buying them lunch, gas, or the like.

At Z92/Tyler, TX, PD B.J. Williams told BRE about the station's "Mind on a Trip Promotion." Daily winners received cassettes and posters of Virgin recording artist Boy George and were eligible for a drawing for a trip for two to Acapulco. The station has also started its annual Juneteenth Celebration, which culminates on June 19th with a big picnic and parade and the crowning of Miss Juneteenth '89. By the way, Juneteenth is a holiday that is celebrated in Texas because the slaves in Texas didn't find out they were free until two years after everyone else had been freed. That freedom day finally came on a June 19th.

KALO-FM is located in the Golden Triangle area. It is licensed in Port Arthur, TX, with a broadcast area covering Beaumont, Orange, Port Arthur and is 100 miles from Houston, KALO's sister station, KHYS, has moved their studios to Houston. When KHYS moved, KALO, which has been using the Satellite Music Network's "Heart and Soul Format," decided to come in and add a current playlist. The 5,000 watt station now plays a good helping of blues targeted to the 30-and-older demographics. PD Ron Mathis says their format is referred to as "Urban Adult." They have also been getting great audience response to the gospel show hosted by Jesse Samuels daily from 6am-10am. The remainder of the programming schedule consists of Ron Mathis, 10am-2pm; Doug Davis, 2pm-7pm; and Iva Fontenot, 7pm-12midnight. On the weekends, SMN's 'Heart and Soul' format is aired from 6pm-midnight. In an upcoming issue I'll bring you a feature on the Dallas-based Satellite Music Network.

Livin' Large as the Youngest in Charge



Special Ed

Special Ed's Youngest In Charge (Profile, 212/529-2600) is an auspicious LP debut. Ed drops an easy-going, conversational delivery with a distinctive rhythmic cadence so convincingly, you sometimes think you're hearing the lyrics of an old friend. That's no easy task, especially when you're 16-yearsold and in your last year of high school. But Ed's self-confidence, knack for lyrical word games and humorous stories come across like an old pro's. Some lyrics from the album's first single "I Got It Made" sum it all up: "Listen to the lesson I preach. I talk sense, cadets, into the form of a poem, pullin' knowledge from my clothes to the top of my dome. I'm kinda young, but my tongue speaks maturity. I'm not a child. I don't need nothin' for security. I'm gettin' paid when my records get played. To put it short... I got it made.

Producer Howie Tee's beats also make this a crucial LP. Tee's credits include work with The Real Roxanne and Chubb Rock. On Youngest In Charge he throws hip-hop, house, and reggae beats into the mix and comes up with a wild collection of tracks that really sound like the culturally diverse Brooklyn neighborhood of Flatbush it was recorded in.

In addition to the single, tracks to check out are "I'm the Magnificent," which adds a reggae melody over staccato hip-hop beats, and "Club Scene," a fresh hip-house blend that will rock any club it's played in.

On the business tip, Special Ed and his LP are living large. On April 14, Profile threw a record release party at New York hip-hop club Pay Day. As **Clyde Wayne MacMillian** reported three weeks ago in his East Coast Scene column, the crowd went wild as Special Ed "ripped it" in his debut as a Profile artist. And it's not only that crowd that's hanging on Special Ed's every lyric. Upon release, Youngest In Charge shipped 58,000 units; and after the first week there were 63,000 requests for more! How's that for a start. Yo! Special Ed, show 'em Brooklyn's in the house.

SAMPLES

Kool Moe Dee's new 12" "They Want Money," co-produced by Teddy Riley, is out and kickin' hard. The jam is from his long-awaited *Knowledge Is King* (Jive/RCA), an LP that is strong enough to

be able to produce four or five singles....At Def Jam/Columbia: Public Enemy's video for "Black Steel in the Hour of Chaos" has just been released. You've gotta see it to believe it! LL Cool J is putting the finishing touches on his new LP, which will be out soon....Lakim Shabazz, Latifah, D.J. Mark The 45 King, Chill Rob G, Latee, and the rest of the Flavor Posse just returned from doing several successful spot dates in Tokyo. Latifah's LP All Hail The Queen (Tommy Boy, 212/722-2211), produced by the ever-fresh 45 King, is scheduled for a June release...Gangstarr's LP No. More Mr. Nice Guy (Wild Pitch, 212/ 594-5050) is out and making waves all around. Word is that Chicago, Philadelphia and Boston have picked up on it. The first single "Manifest" features some hypo rapping by The Guru with DJ Premier rocking the wheels of steel; look out for a vocal remix of "DI Premier In Deep Concentration."

EPMD's new 12" "I'm Housin'" b/w "Get Off the Bandwagon" (Sleeping Bag/Fresh, 212/724-1400)—from their Strictly Business LP—features a new U.K. mix by **Simon Harris** and new U.S. mixes by EPMD. The group is currently in the studio working on a new LP titled Unfinished Business; the first single, "So Whatcha Sayin'?" is scheduled for late July...**Dee Anthony** directed the video for **Just-Ice**'s "Welfare Recipients" single.

Master Ace has a solid single "Together" out on Cold Chillin/Warner Bros. Ace is scheduled to do a show May 20 for the children who participate in the Creative Arts Workshops for Children. For three years CAW, a notfor-profit community-based organization, has provided workshops in the visual and performing arts for homeless children. The show will take place on 125th Street and Lexington Avenue in Manhattan during the final week of the children's latest project—painting a mural titled "Street of Dreams." Ziggy Marley is currently in New York remixing tracks he recorded in the Bahamas for his new LP on Virgin; the LP is set for release in early July.



THE MAGNIFICENTS: They Had A 'Mountain' Of Talent



The year was 1956 and black radio in America was mostly programmed in block format: gospel in the mornings, rhythm & blues in the afternoons and evenings. This was the era of doo-wop and stand-up vocal groups and rock & roll was just starting to strongly emerge.

Back in the '50s Chicago was a city that was making a tremendous contribution to black music with groups like the Spaniels, the Eldorados and the Flamingos (remember "I Only Have Eyes For You"?). The Magnificents were another great Chicago group who had a smash on Vee-Jay Records in 1956 entitled "Up On the Mountain."

The group attended Hyde Park High School and the original members were Johnny Keyes (first tenor), Thurman Ray Ramsey (tenor), Fred Rakestraw (tenor) and Willie Myles (bass). The group's first exposure to public performing came when they sang at high school variety shows.

They didn't have a lot of money to spend on uniforms, so they chose inexpensive hats (Tam o' Shanters, to be specific) as their trademarks and originally they called themselves Tam and the Tam o' Shanters. It was legendary disc jockey The Magnificent Montague who changed the group's name after seeing them perform at a variety show.

"At that time he was Chicago's #1 morning man on WAAF," said Keys, "and he was used to having his way in the Chicago area. When we heard he was interested in us, it meant something."

Montague became the group's manager and named them the Magnificents after himself!

Without an addition Montague got them signed to Vee-Jay. He also had a hand in writing "Up On the Mountain," an all-time rock & roll/r&b classic thanks to Keyes' great lead vocals and some very hip bass accompaniment by singer Willie Myles. "I can remember playing gigs for \$150 and being on stage with the women pulling at us," Keyes laughed.

As the group continued to hone its performing skills, radio pioneer Herb Kent was an individual who was a great inspiration in the early years, along with Vee-Jay executive Ewart Abner, according to Keyes.

"One of the most exciting dates we played back in those days was at the Apollo Theatre. We rehearsed in the theatre's basement and performed four songs, but our hit was the big 'get over.' After the '50s," he said, "groups became less prominent and it was the single artists who became popular. But we had fun while it lasted."

Keyes is still active in the music business and is currently working on a book that was inspired by the Ink Spots. "My father was a big Ink Spots fan and I was fascinated by the group, too." As for the other members of the Magnificents, they all live in Chicago. Ramsey is a postal clerk. Rakestraw is a school teacher. Myles manufactures contact lenses

Just prior to the group's breaking up for good, Ramsey was replaced by L.C. Cooke (Sam Cooke's brother) and Barbara Arrington was added to the lineup. The Magnificents were active up until the early '70s.

Aside from his book project, Keyes is currently in production on a new record. And personally, I think that any day now some smart rapper is going to decide to sample some of "Up On the Mountain." Remember, you heard it here, first!

Third World Tests "Forbidden Love" in NYC

On the 200th anniversary of the George Washington inauguration, amidst massive security precautions in New York City, **Third World** celebrated their own status as reggae patriots to Long Island.

It was the last day of April. Reportedly every descendant of every president was invited to lower Manhattan to witness the reenactment of the 1789 historic event, even the George who will be leading the country into the third century: George Herbert Walker Bush.

The American president dominated the day but Jamaica's reggae ambassadors certainly conquered the night.

Their performance followed a luke-warm set from **Bob Marley**'s **Wailers** at New York's stage in the round, West-bury Music Fair. With Marley at the helm, the group headlined on virtually every continent. Without his charismatic presence the band has been reduced to playing signature hits and not quite hitting the mark. Their one champion is **Irvin "Carrot" Jarrett** who ruled supreme as one sixth of Third World.

Jarrett exploded during "Exodus," igniting the crowd which seemed to come alive with each step during his

frenzied acrobatics. Swirling his nearankle length dreads through the air, he salvaged the band from what would otherwise have been a monotone performance. Lead singer Junior Marvin makes an attempt but is not a lead singer. And it seems Al Anderson belongs in a rock 'n roll band. As for Aston "Family Man" Barrett, he is the "natural mystic" of the group.

Drummer William Stewart, bassman Richard Daley, classical specialist Stephen "Cat" Coore frontman William "Bunny Rugs" Clarke and taosterskanker-keyboardist Michael "Ibo" Cooper revived the patrons.

They sizzled at "96 Degrees In The Shade," stated their "Sense of Purpose," harmonized in five parts the upward mobility of "Jah Jah Children" and signified "Forbidden Love."

The latter track, the first single from their latest LP Serious Business, has overwhelming appeal. The crowd responded to foot-stomping accompaniment, repeating the lines "how could it be forbidden if it's love?"

Clarke asked the crowd to sing so loudly President Bush would be able to hear. It is arguable whether or not the president actually did hear, but the crowd

certainly made a hearty effort.

The lead singer took turns in acknow-ledging key individuals who had aided in the evolution of Third World. Cooper, the founder of the group shared the accolades. **Vivian Scott**, Director of A&R at PolyGram, was credited for having "special vibes." Although a newcomer to the record label it was Scott's aggressive efforts which led to the group's signing.

Former A&R director **Tony Prendatt** also received notice along with **Kenny Gamble** who wrote "Hold On To Love." Honorable mentions also went to **Stevie Wonder** and **Bob Marley**.

Third World is definitely the reggae party ambassadors. Given portfolios Cooper would be Prime Minister; Steward, Chief Justice; Daley, Consular General; Coore, Secretary of State; Clarke, Secretary of Defense; and newcomer **Rupert Bent Jr.** would of course have to be minister without portfolio.

Again, the high point was Coore's classical rendezvous directed by Clarke. This routine is still fresh no matter how many times it's tried—even if it is the "same old song."

Calypsoca Royale

Arrow, the socaman from Montserrat who had seminal success with his "Hot, Hot, Hot" recording of 1983, enjoyed sovereign hospitality recently. The 33-year-old singer was invited by none other than Queen Elizabeth II to Buckingham Palace where he was honored with a royal medal as a member of the British Empire.



JUANITA STEPHENS Meeting New Challenges at MCA



ranks as a publicist to become one of the few black female vice presidents working in that area. Named Vice President of Media Relations and Artist Development at MCA Records in January, the New York-born executive is quick to point out that her new appointment is "an accomplishment for all of us. If I am one of the first, I'm glad I've made some kind of mark in breaking through for all the other black women in publicity who have worked so hard. To me, the most exciting thing about being promoted to this level is that I feel it gives us all hope.

It was through her roommate that Juanita met Katie Valk at MCA Records, whom she describes as "my mentor in this business." When a position opened up in the publicity department at MCA's New York office as Valk's assistant, she offered it to Juanita: "For about a month, I refused to take the job. My career was pretty much mapped out as executive assistant to the president at a computer marketing firm. When I discussed the idea of working in the music industry, several people encouraged me to make the change because the basic feeling was that I was more of a 'people' person than a computer person. And I figured that I could always go back to that if necessary."

When Juanita began her MCA publicity stint in 1983, she was working with a wide range of acts: "country groups like The Oak Ridge Boys and The Bellamy Brothers and pop and rock artists like The Kinks and Night Ranger. As director of publicity, Katie (Valk) really showed me how to work with artists and after about eight months, she put me out there on my own to make my own decisions." Within another three months, Juanita had taken on East Coast tour publicity for

the entire MCA roster as well as continuing to do general pop and country press.

As MCA's r&b roster began to grow and expand, "I became very heavily involved. One of the first acts I worked with was New Edition—in 1984. They were very young and we had to handle them delicately and try to take a teen group into areas they hadn't been yet because they were essentially the first group to be compared to The Jacksons."

With Valk's guidance and support, Juanita began to "spread my wings and become more independent. I really took on working with the r&b roster because I felt I had an insight into what they were about—although I did continue working with pop acts too." As more and more acts joined the label-including The Jets and Stephanie Mills-Juanita found that the work she had done with MCA's pop artists had prepared her for giving black music artists some new publicity opportunities. "I'd built up relationships with publications like Rolling Stone and Spin so it made it easier to talk to them about the r&b artists we were acquiring."

In 1986, Juanita became East Coast director of publicity and artist development for the company, noting that the r&b roster was continuing its expansion. "When I first joined the company, MCA had just two acts and in the last few years, we've had an incredible number of hit records. Initially, there were just four employees in the New York office and the staff has now increased to deal with our success. I've seen MCA take new talent and develop it as a part of today's music in a very strong way. I must say that working with Jheryl Busby (former head of MCA's black music division) was great—he'd always tell me, 'go out there, you can do it' and provided a great deal of support."

Juanita sums up her approach to her work in publicity: "When I work, there's no grey. I know what I'm involved in and I'll go all the way. If



I don't know, I don't get involved. Once I start a project, I put my whole heart into it because I've got to know that I've taken it to the fullest before I'll stop. I don't let things stand in the way. I never want to believe that a project didn't work because I didn't try."

The most enjoyable aspect of what she does is, she says, "knowing that what I've done has been successful. With Bobby Brown, for instance: I started talking about him when the LP first came out and frankly, people weren't quite listening. But I knew there was something special about this project and now a lot of people who were saying 'let's see what he does, what happens on the charts', are now believers and that makes me feel really good."

With projects on Guy, Loose Ends, Robert Brookins and Sheena Easton among her current workload and Stephanie Mills, Patti LaBelle and Jody Watley upcoming, Juanita expects to be busier than ever. "With my new job, there's more responsibility and I feel great about this position in terms of how other black women can share in what's been accomplished here. But whatever I have achieved has a great deal to do with the fact that I'm not intimidated by anything—whatever the challenge is!"

NTRO...

New Choice: Moving up 'At Last'

reated as a group by master pro-ducer Jay King, the five young ladies who compose New Choice (Dionna Jackson, Baby "D, Pinky Harris, Bobbi Hammond and Shavel Farris) have a new LP, At Last, on King Jay/ Warner Bros. that is clearly designed for today's marketplace. With the single "People Want Bass" beginning to spark strong radio interest, Pinky says the group looks forward to a bright future...

HOW THE GROUP WAS FORMED

"Jay put us together about



two-and-a-half years ago: everyone's from Sacramento except me and Baby 'D.' (I'm from the Bay Area and she's from Chicago.) It was strange to begin with because we didn't know each other and fitting five people together

who could sing and blend well was tough. But we hit it off well and we did a couple of records earlier on—'Love Is So Confusing' for King Jay and then 'Cold Stupid' for RCA's 'Penitentiary III' soundtrack in 1987."

SHING A MEW GROUP

"There were some setbacks, but you have to hang in there and keep going at it. We got some great experience by being on the road a couple of years ago on the Def Jam tour with LL Cool J, Whodini, Roxanne Shante and Eric B. & Rakim. Although I do rap on our records, we are a singing group so being on those shows was particularly interesting and a really good experience for us."

DESCRIBING THEIR MUSIC

"Oh, I'd say the music on At Last is a little bit of everything: it's pop, soul, rap even a little taste of jazz (like on 'That's What He Said'). On our next LP, hopefully we'll have some of our own material so you'll see even more of what we can do as a group."

Liz Hogue: 'Fresh' from Philly



ith a wealth of academic and professional experience behind her (including performances as

a classical and gospel soloist during her years at Morgan State University), Philly-based Liz Hogue has recorded with the likes of Jean Carne and Norman Connors. Her debut LP, Vicious And Fresh, produced by Chris Jasper on Gold City/CBS Associated Records, reveals that the delightful young lady has a distinctive style all her own...

GETTING INTO THE BUSINESS

"My uncle was the late Norman Harris (the producer) and I was aware of what he was doing growing up but I didn't want to trade in on his name. I was singing in Philly around '85 at different clubs with a friend of mine, Spencer Harrison (who sang lead vocals on Norman Connors' last Capitol LP) and one day, Norman walked in. He said he liked my voice and I started working with him—and that led to working with Jean Carne, going to Europe and performing in other cities in the U.S."

HOOKING UP WITH CHRIS

"I signed with Jean's manager (Walt Reeder) after I'd worked with her and I'd done some demos with producers like Bobby Eli and Donald Robinson. The tapes had been circulating for a short while and Chris got one of them. He dug it out of about 700 tapes he'd been listening to and he said he really liked how I sounded. We actually never spoke or met until August when we started working on the LP."

WORKING ON HER DEBUT LP

"Chris and I worked together extremely fast. He cut the tracks in three weeks and we did the vocals in six days. I was



used to singing from doing sessions in Philly (with artists like Grover Washington Jr., Teddy Pendergrass and Jean Carne) for twelve or thirteen hours so it was fine with me! But Chris is a true producer. He's very professional, he has a perfect ear and he's great to work with."







GIGOLO TONY AIN'T IT GOOD TO YA 4-SIGHT

Released on Ft. Lauderdale's independent 4-Sight label, Ain't It Good To Ya is the type of Miami-style rap known as "bass" or "boom music"—raw, often fast and characterized by an assertive bass. Samples include James Brown, Afrika Bambaataa, the J. Geils Band and Aretha Franklin (whose "Respect" receives the hip-hop treatment). Demos: Teens, Young Adults.

SINGLES

UTFOWANNA ROCK

WANNA ROCK SELECT

This aggressive, driving rap number is primarily a boasting song but also contains some lyrics expressing black consciousness. Produced by Full Force. Demos: Teens, Young Adults.

TERRI LYNE CARRINGTON MORE THAN WOMAN VERVE FORECAST

The first single from singer/composer/drummer Terri Lyne Carrington's Real Life Story LP is a gentle, jazz-tinged ballad with a potential for exposure on black and quiet storm formats. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.

ALLMIGHTY MARSKI

LEADER OF THE FORCE

A hardcore, boasting rap song. Demos: Teens, Young Adults.

DONNA SUMMER

THIS TIME I KNOW IT'S FOR REAL ATLANTIC



The Original Queen of Disco returns to her roots on these two high energy Euro-disco dance items. Produced by the Stock Aitken Waterman team (who have worked with Samantha Fox and Bananarama). Demos: Young Adults, Dancers.

RADIANT

LET'S GO ALL THE WAY

Produced by Mic Murphy and David Frank—collectively known as The System—"Let's Go All The Way" is midtempo, high-tech R&B. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.

C.J. ANTHONY YOU ARE MY STARSHIP KMA

A major hit for Norman Connors and Michael Henderson in 1976, "You Are My Starship" remains a straight-ahead R&B ballad on C.J. Anthony's remake. Formats: black, quiet storm. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.

BOSS SKANK SOFT SIDE RISING ROCKERS



The material on this four-song single by Boss Skank, who has been a part of Los Angeles' reggae scene since the early 1980s, ranges from a political "lovers' rock" like "Soft Side" to the incisive social commentary of "On The Corner." Black stations that programmed Ziggy Marley should note the songs' definite neo-R&B slant. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.

THE STYLE COUNCIL PROMISED LAND/CAN YOU STILL LOVE ME? POLYDOR

Although the Style Council's often political soul-pop hasn't hit big in the U.S., the group has enjoyed a loyal following in its native England. "Promised Land" is a call for social justice that is accompanied by modern, high-tech instrumentation. "Can You Still Love Me," however, is more European-flavored than most of the Council's material. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.

THREE TIMES DOPE FUNKY DIVIDENDS ARISTA

Although not a rap ballad—which is what L.L. Cool J's "I Need Love" and Big Daddy Kane's "The Day You're Mine" are, "Funky Dividends" is smooth, melodic hip-hop. Demos: Teens, Young Adults.

TAR ALK

The Neville Brothers: Beyond categories



t a time when formularized madefor-the-airwaves music tends to be the way to go, it's refreshing when

an act decides to step out and make a record that's more of a personal statement. The New Orleans-based Neville Brothers have a rich tradition of making great music that doesn't neatly fit any categorization and *Yellow Moon*, their newest collection on A&M, typifies their musical diversity as Charles Neville notes...

STAYING TRUE TO THEMSELVES

"When we went to do this LP, we wanted to express our musical spirit and outlook on life. We wanted the freedom

to do what we do best, not to try and do something else to conform to the radio. A&M was in complete agreement with us and we had the good fortune to work with a producer (Daniel Lanois) whose first words to us were, 'What would you guys like to do on this LP?'"

POLITICAL OR SOCIAL MUSIC?

"Our music isn't really political. It's more about social awareness with tracks like 'Sister Rosa' (a tribute to Rosa Parks), which hasn't blossomed like I thought it would at black radio. But then our music is unique and it doesn't really fit any of radio's categories—it's not rock, it's not r&b, it's all of it. It's closest to what used to be called r&b years ago."

EXPANDING AUDIENCES

"Our audiences have been 80-90% white but that's because our black radio airplay has been limited. But with the



additional exposure we've been getting over the past four years—like on television ('Saturday Night Live, 'David Letterman' and now a Cinemax Special)—and with music on soundtracks like 'The Big Easy' and 'Rain Man' (featuring brother Aaron's classic, 'Tell It Like It Is'), we're getting more black audiences at our concerts and shows."

James Ingram: He's got to be 'Real'



s it zooms up the charts, "It's Real"—the title track from his new Warner Bros. LP (which

includes production by Gene Griffin, LeVert, Michael Powell, Thom Bell and cuts he produced himself)—represents a stylistic departure for James Ingram. But, as he explains, it's actually more of a return to his musical roots...

A DIFFERENT SOUND

"The truth is, I came out to L.A. in '74 with a group called Revelation Funk, so that's where my roots are. Before I hooked up with Quincy Jones (in the late '70s), I played keyboards and synthesizers on Carl Carlton's 'She's A Bad Mamma Jamma,' Shalamar's



Night To Remember' and Leon Haywood's 'If It Don't Fit, Don't Force It' so I was really into uptempo, funky music. I didn't try to cross over. It just so happened that songs like 'Just Once,' 'One Hundred Ways' and 'Baby Come To Me' were part of the work I did with Quincy and he's a crossover artist. Due to me, half of this LP is going back to the funk.

Ifigure if you don't like the funk, just don't play side 'A'!"

REACHING FOR TODAY'S YOUNG AUDIENCE

"I'm aware that there is a big buying market from 13-25 and it was a suggestion of my manager (Barry Hankerson) and Benny Medina at Warners to work with Gene (Griffin) and LeVert. It was a great experience working with them and the tracks we did were tailormade for me. But I know people talk about being on a producer's 'assembly-line.' I figure wherever you put me, I'm still gonna be me."

COVERING SONGS

"Aretha's 'A Natural Woman' is a song I've always loved. I don't think that the story relates to one sex and I felt it would be better that a man cut it rather than another woman trying to match Aretha's version. Actually, I think it was braver to do Donny Hathaway's 'Someday We'll All Be Free' because no one can ever touch him. It's such a strong song and still very relevant with all that's happening in the world today with drugs, violence, poverty. Since no one else had done the song in a while. I figured I'd do the dirty work and take



Whatever happened to THE CHAMBERS BROTHERS? Well, they were sighted on April 30th at a memorial service in L. A. for political activist ABBIE HOFFMAN, who died on April 12. Also present was another '60s activist TIMOTHY LEARY, movie director OLIVER STONE and actress-comedienne WHOOPI GOLDBERG.

We wouldn't have had **PRINCE** pegged as a New Age fan, but he was also sighted recently at the Only New Age Music record store in Hollywood stocking up on meditation tapes. He's also been seen studying audience reaction to tracks he's recorded for the *Batman* soundtrack LP at First Avenue, one of his favorite nightclubs in Minneapolis.

Music makes for some interesting partnerships: **SMOKEY ROBINSON** is going to produce half of Academy Awardwinning **CARLY SIMON**'s next LP, while **JODY WATLEY**'s favorite producer **ANDRE CYMONE** is helping British pop star **ADAM ANT** prepare his first solo LP...By the way, Simon is the owner of a new NYC art gallery that donated funds from its May 2nd opening to organizations that care for children who are homeless or afflicted with AIDS.

Filming is due to begin this summer on JACKIE COLLINS' super-sexy best seller "Rock Star." If Collins were doing the casting, she has said that she'd like to see either SADE or WHITNEY HOUSTON in the role of Rafealla, while GEORGE MICHAEL and MARIO VAN PEEBLES would play, respectively, the book's English rocker and black superstar characters. Should be interesting to see who actually ends up playing those parts!

And while we're on the subject of sexy

folks, *Radio Guide* Magazine polled its readers and found that **JACKIE STEVENS** of KJLH/Los Angeles has one of the sexiest voices on the airwaves.

As for **KERRY DOYEN**, a Dallas-based (K104) radio personality, she caught the eye of heavyweight champ **MIKE TYSON** at the Soul Train Awards and the two of them subsequently had a cozy dinner date. (BRE Southwest Reporter **PATRICE CAREY** confirms that Ms. Doyen has become quite a celebrity at the station.)

Tyson did manage to interrupt his nicely blossoming social life long enough to visit Central State University in Wilberforce, Ohio—a predominately black school—where he received a honorary doctor of humane letters degree. Tyson called it the "high point of all my success. There's no greater pleasure in the world than to be accepted by your own people."

THE BOYS have big hearts, too. They raised over \$8,000 for scholarships and musical therapy for the young survivors of the Cleveland Elementary School massacre in Stockton. (Five children were killed, 29 others and a teacher were injured on January 17th when a gunman using a AK-47 semiautomatic assault rifle fired 100 rounds onto the schoolyard.)

Close to 3,000 children and their families attended the Boys' fund-raising concert and one teacher praised the Motown group, saying that they had provided "...the kind of medicine we need right now."

TONY BENNETT, having already more than made his mark as a singer of note, is also earning acclaim as an artist. One of his recent portrait subjects was ELLA FITZGERALD. She got to keep the original, while a lithograph of the painting was sold to raise funds for Society of Singers.


