Milan Williams Departs Commodores

The clamor surrounding an unrealized South Africa concert generated an unmendable breach within the Commodores as the group ousted founding member/keyboardist Milan Williams, a sombre Willams told BRE in an exclusive interview prior to a scheduled press conference at The Hollywood Roosevelt Hotel Wednesday, July 26. Williams unraveled a sad tale of the breakup of "friends and brothers" over a moral issue "whether or not we could climb on the backs of our brothers in South Africa just to make a buck."

The Commodores were approached to perform in South Africa's Sun City last May and the group "had generally discussed it, but the contract was viewed much like any other playdate," Williams said "until the actual paperwork arrived." Then the keyboardist recalled "feeling disturbed" when he saw the visa stamped South Africa and realized that he "couldn't do this."

This decision went against the feelings of the others in the group according to Williams, creating virulent disharmony. The discord increased when

news of his decision leaked to the press and Williams responded to inquiries from members of the media, "I found out a good reporter can find anyone they are looking for...and you all were looking for me."

Williams noted breaking the long-standing cultural boycott against Apartheid-ridden South Africa had been justified with a plan to donate money to various organizations in South Africa, such as the African National Congress. This offer was immediately rejected by the ANC as were offers to all subsequent Africa organizations.

Williams dismissed the contention that he felt "morally superior" to the others in the group because he had decided not to go, calmly offering that he only reacted to the "dicates of my own conscience."

Williams did, however, reveal his opinion that the reason other members of The Commodores wanted to play South Africa were "strictly financial" pressure from outside influence—not his internal pressure—caused the group not to go.

So intense was the feeling against his stand, Williams said

that the people he had known for more than twenty years (William King and Walter Orange) refused to talk to him. "I couldn't believe it." Williams had his attorney send them a letter "begging" the Commodores not to go after he had tried for weeks to get everyone together for a meeting to further discuss the issue. Finally, the group convened a meeting at 11 a.m. on July 14 and two hours later Williams received a handdelivered letter telling him he was expelled from the group.

Last week in New York, social activist Johnny Clegg called for an intensification of the cultural boycott. The publicist from Sun City noted that the Commodores performance would not end the cultural boycott, but would effectively "pry open the door."

The Commodores were at the peak of their career at the turn of the decade, while the group personnel still consisted of its original members Lionel Richie, Milan Williams, Thomas McClary, Ronald LaPread, William King and Walter Orange. Only the latter two remain in the current group lineup.

The award-winning composer will also serve as a judge during the festival.

The Popular category is one of seven divisions open to non-professional songwriters. The winners in each classification will receive \$5,000 plus an opportunity to win the \$25,000 grand prize. Additionally, Capitol Records will record and release the winning tunes in the Country, R&B, Latin and Jazz categories.

All entries for this year's contest must be postmarked no later than July 31. Entries are to be submitted only on an audio cassette and must be accompanied by an official entry form. Sparse But Vocal Black Participation at NMS

Despite the fact that the first several years of the New Music Seminar captured an impressive number of what could then truly described as new music—Rap, as the gathering approaches its maturity, black participation has failed to keep up with its original pace.

Convention organizers quote a figure of 7,650 participants, most of them more evident during the wild showcase nights, where nearly 300 bands performed. That is not to say, however, that the 80-plus panels were not well attended. They were and it is there that some vocal opinions were expressed.

The Africenticity panel saw

Spike Lee offer that blacks in the entertainment business should control their own destiny thereby not have to depend on white America to open doors.

Tone-Loc and Ice-T seemed to enjoy the artists panel, directing the conversational flow toward their own ends. Loc repeated his current posture of retiring soon. While T, while protecting his right to say anything he chose on record, wished for more constructive and useful messages.

Controversy seems to follow Chuck D these days. It followed him right into the panel where he accused the media of biased reporting when the subject is black musicmakers.

SHORT TAKES

Earlier this year, newsman Larry Carroll observed, "My goals are less toward being an anchorman at Channel 7 than they are toward building a media power that represents our community and every community in a fair and comprehensive way." Carroll is likely to have that opportunity when he assumes the news anchor/reporter slot at KHJ-TV next month. Carroll is a 20 year veteran of electronic media in L.A.

James Brown is out—at least in a new LP entitled, Soul Session—Live, released this week. Scotti Brothers/CBS Associated Records had sent out the soundtrack from Brown's Cinemax TV special. The package contains performances with Wilson Pickett, Robert Palmer, Joe Cocker and a duet with Aretha Franklin.

The issue of "sampling" continues to careen along. As noted in BRE several weeks ago, this issue will be heating up the courts this summer in search of a judicial consensus/ruling. Almost everyone rappin' about the legal status of excerpting parts of other songs to include in new product is spouting rhetoric. Lawsuits continue to crop up, the latest involving De La Soul's "Transmitting Live from Mars." This lawsuit, brought on behalf of the Mark Volman and Howard Kaylan, members of the rock group the Turtles asks for \$1.7 million in exemplary and punitive damages. Attorneys say permission was not sought, nor given and no royalties or payments for use have been made to the plaintiffs. In a recent panel on sampling, many offered the opinion that it is legal, as long as royalties are paid. The basis for further legal determination is likely to come on the question of what percentage of a song determines what royalty. Meanwhile, how does the Fair Use Doctrine apply to any of this?

Record Labels Post Happy Second


Quarter Figures

Even the accountants in the music business were happy this week as the second quarter figures for WCI Music and MCA, Inc. were released.

For the quarter ending June 30, Warner Communications Inc. reports a hefty increase in second-quarter profits for its music and music publishing divisions.

Those divisions posted an operating profit of \$98.7 million, 35% over last years. For the first six months of this year, music group profits went up 49% to \$214 million.

WCI's labels include Warner Brothers, Atlantic, Elektra, Sire, Reprise and Geffen. Titles pushing earnings up to this high point include those from Madonna, Paula Abdul and this year's success story, Prince's "Batman" which sold a million units nearly faster than those accountants could count them.



MCA's music division is singing a happy song also. That division noted a 51% gain in operating income up from \$10.3 million a year ago to \$15.5 million this year. Titles pushing

MCA's numbers up came from Bobby Brown, Fine Young Cannibals and the recently certified Guy.

CBS Records second-quarter statement has not been released.


THE JACKSONS 2300 JACKSON STREET EPIC

Black music's reigning family act partakes in a midtempo R&B tune from the LP of the same name. This autobiographical track about unity, co-produced by Teddy Riley, is an about-face from their smash "Nothin' (That Compares 2 U)." The group's sweet, reflective harmonies are caressed by a sweet sax part. Demos: Young adults, Adults.

ALBUM OF THE WEEK

ZIGGY MARLEY AND THE MELODY MAKERS ONE BRIGHT DAY VIRGIN

Marley and his cohorts, who struck gold and drew praise for their *Conscious Party* debut LP, are back spreading their special brand of pop-inflected reggae. Chris Frantz and Tina Weymouth (Talking Heads, Tom Tom Club) once again assist with production on tunes that range from social observations ("Justice") to visionary whimsy (the title track) to party themes (the single "Look Who's Dancing"). Ziggy takes another step here toward filling the shoes of his late, legendary father. Demos: Young adults, Adults.

ROACHFORD—FAMILY MAN—EPIC—This artist tears out a page from the Rolling Stones' scrapbook, updates it and adds a little more soul to create an R&B rocker. This assured performer is at no loss for attitude on this song about a young man making the transition from bachelorhood to marriage. Demos: Young adults.

REGINA BELLE—BABY COME TO ME—COLUMBIA—Belle comes up with a melodic and romantic piece that's influenced by equal parts Chaka Khan and Anita Baker. Narada Michael Walden presses the buttons on this bubbling, understated charmer. Belle delivers another nugget from the fine "Stay With Me" collection. Demos: Young adults, Adults.

CHERRELLE—CRAZY (FOR LOVING YOU)—TABU/CBS—Third single culled from the Affair project is a grandiose change of pace for the demure singer. Cherrelle exercises her agile vocal chops on this soaring ballad about an ambivalent love affair. This tune bears the Flyte Tyme stamp of quality. Demos: Young adults, Adults.

32PHREEZE—FLESH—SOLAR/CBS—R&B-funk outfit debuts with an uptempo track about a young man on the prowl. Hyperactive drum programming and a wall-of-synthesizers sound makes this tune cook. Big things should be in store for this act, which sounds a little like recent Bar-Kays. Demos: Teens, Young adults.



D'ATRA HICKS—D'ATRA HICKS—CAPITOL—This highly touted R&B-pop vocalist is said to be Capitol's answer to Whitney Houston. Narada Michael Walden, Nick Martinelli and Jellybean Benitez help out with production as D'Atra, 21, faithfully belts out her material with plenty of zest. The best results are the single "Sweet Talk" and "Everything I Feel." The LP also contains three duets, including one with Peabo Bryson, and a cover of Al Green's "Love and Happiness." Demos: Young adults, Adults.

REDHEAD KINGPIN AND THE F.B.I.—A SHADE OF RED—VIRGIN—New East Coast rapper and his posse hit the scene bolstered by the production and mixing muscle of Markell and Teddy Riley and Gene Griffin. Supercharged by the righteously minded single "Do the Right Thing" (not affiliated with the Spike Lee film), this ten-tune package packs the frenetic "Do That Dance," the boastful "Speaking of Everything" and "Pump It Hottie," which is a musical synthesis of Kraftwerk and J.J. Fad. Demos: Teens, Young adults.

THE D.O.C.—NO ONE CAN DO IT BETTER—RUTHLESS—Another powerful rap effort of from the Eazy-E and N.W.A. camp, this 13-cut disc sizzles without overdosing on gratuitous profanity or obscenity. The inclusion of real instrumentation and singing, particularly on the bluesy "Comm. Blues," the rocking "Beautiful But Deadly" and the raw "The Grand Finale," adds to this LP's success. Demos: Teens, Young adults.

THE FUNK CLUB—FUNKY AND THEN SOME—SCOTTI BROS.—New R&B-funk band delivers contemporary grooves in a Bobby Brown/Ready For the World vein. Heavy beds of synthesizers, synth horn punctuations and a plucking bass are the crux of their sound. The single and theme song, "Go Funk Club," the Cameo-influenced "We Rocked" and the lilting, love ballad duet "Your Love" are the cream of this crop. Demos: Teens, Young adults.







ALL WOKE UP TO LOVE

erhaps when Alton Stewart was a little boy, his dreams were so full, he could only sleep a little while. His mother, Alberta, remarked that the child was "woke" when she went to bed and "woke" when she got up—so much she took to calling him "Wokie."

Back in the Bronx there did seem to be a lot to keep a young boy wide awake—and just thinking he was dreaming. Wokie was singing at age nine—it was strictly gospel. Imagine singing in the internationally renown Boys Choir of Harlem! Then think about becoming lead singer of the Ecstatistics. Then imagine dreaming of winning a competition sponsored by the Gospel Music Assn. Wokie's group did, not once but every year for five years straight. During other waking hours, young Alton taught himself guitar, keyboards and drums.

During this time the young man was listening to another group of young singers, the Jacksons. He idolized Michael Jackson, but never seriously considered moving from gospel to secular music. Then came the galvanizing experience of attending a sold-out concert at Radio City Music Hall by Luther Vandross. Wokie remembers, "I was so moved by his performance.

the sound. the production, the excitement. There was Luther in his sequined jacket, just singing the house down!" Another dream presented itself to Wokie. He wanted to take that position on center stage at Radio City Music Hall himself. What a dream. When that comes true, Wokie says, "It will be the happiest day of my life."

Meanwhile, an all grown-up Wokie is living in the midst of a dream come true. In the summer of 1988, Wokie met Timmy Gatling, a former member of Guy. Hanging out at Kool Moe Dee's recording session, Timmy heard Wokie sing and said he had just the song Woke should sing.

That tune was, "She's So Cold," and the combination of Timmy's music and Wokie's vocals and original rap was another dream come true for the programmer at New York's powerful urban station WRKS. He was so impressed he added the song to his playlist in cassette form before any deal had been made.

Wokie wanted to go to Epic because "Michael and Luther are there." His wish came true and Wokie woke up to All Our Love, his debut LP.

As to the future, it doesn't look like Wokie's gonna have any extra time for napping either. He and his friend Timmy have formed "No Joke Productions," looking to be the "next super-

hot producing team," he says. There are a host of projects in the works, "the songs are built around the artist, so they will fit like a glove. We hang out with them so we'll know how to do just that. We don't want people to hear new product and say 'oh, that's a Timmy/Wokie record."

Among the production chores, Wokie says, "for a range of artists including Jasmine Guy, two MCA acts—Body and Sue Ann, plus three members of the New Edition Ronnie, Michael and Ricky, recording as BBD. The pair also produced a cut on Stephanie Mills and Christopher Williams.

Wokie expects to work with Keith Sweat again. Keith co-wrote "Reflections" for Wokie and the pair coproduced "I Can Make You Sweat" for Keith's LP.

Wokie can't wait to get started on his new LP, "I've got great management—Cassandra Mills believes in me and the record company trusts that I can deliver product, so I'm starting in two or three months...it's early but this LP is going to be much more me, a strong production with some new school music and some ballads, it's going to be slammin'."

Perhaps Wokie should take a nap. He may need it to pull off all these productions.





Well, the New Music Seminar 10 convened here last week and delegates from all over the world rubbed shoulders with the known, the not-as-known and the unknown at this international music meet. Everybody in New York showed up—from Tone-Loc to De La Soul, from Millie Jackson to Spike Lee. But it was probably Spike Lee in his effort to "do the right thing" who caused the most noise as he dissed Arsenio Hall during the panel titled "Afrocentricity: The Revolution Must Be Marketed."

Spike shocked those present by calling Arsenio an "Uncle Tom Negro" apparently because Arsenio was hesitant in having him on his late night talk show. Spike said that when he did appear on the show, Arsenio had the audacity to try to 'read' him about making such a controversial movie as "Do The Right Thing": "He's hugging white women every minute—and I have nothing against white women—and I get on and he wants to assassinate me."

It was a thrill to see a lot of the BRE '89 conference attendees at the NMS. appendicitis attack. Jay is doing well after a brief stay in the hospital.





100.3 JAMZ In The Ratings

KJMZ 100.3 (JAMZ) made a big jump in the Arbitron ratings. It vaulted from the 13th-rated station in the Dallas/Fort Worth market to the seventh. The winter book showed a 3.4 share, while the spring book revealed a 4.3. What makes this even more significant is that KKDA (K104), which was the No. 2 station last book, dropped down to No. 5 in the market with a 5.9 share in the spring book; down from 8.5 in the winter rankings. AC station KVIL continues to hold the No. 1 spot, while three country stations occupy the 2nd, 3rd and 4th places.

KJMZ also improved in its overall 18to-34 demographics, going from 5.2 to 6.5. It also drastically jumped from 8.2 to 14.8 in the 12-to-17 demographics, which, according to PD Elroy Smith, puts it at No. 2 in the market for teens. Smith said he was ecstatic when he saw the numbers and credits the entire staff who have worked so hard and struggled ever since the station went on the air about seven months ago.

KJMZ has also been very busy with various promotional campaigns lately. On Friday, July 21 the station had a "Better Switch Party" at the grand opening of a new Dallas club called "Grand Central Station." The place was packed and people were looking forward to a performance by Def Jam recording artist Alyson Williams later on that night. Besides the majority of KIMZ's staff, Roland Edison of RCA Records, Michele Johnson of Epic Records, E.J. Sayles of CBS, Paris Ely of A&M and Keir Worthy of Def Jam were also in attendance.

Williams didn't disappoint. She had the audience jamming to the max as she thrilled with her superb vocal ability on "Just Call My Name." Her background singers, Lee Truesdale, George Morton and Chuck Stanley, drove the ladies wild. During her current single, "My Love Is So Raw," Alyson easily belted out the rap portion of the tune. That part is usually done by Def Jam's first official female rap artist, Nikki D, but she wasn't present due to recently giving birth to a baby boy. After performing, Alyson gave away posters, LPs and tapes to fans in the audience.

On the gospel front, 100.3 JAMZ sister station KHVN is officially part of Summit Broadcasting. A new control room has been built for KHVN inside the KJMZ building. KHVN plays traditional contemporary black gospel and is 970 on the AM dial. Warren Brooks is the newly appointed operations manager for KHVN and Joe Bagsby remains as the ever-popular morning man and program director.

NEW DAWN RECORDS

This LP is smoking. Look past the recording quality and focus on the hot music delivered by this choir. For starters, check out "Pray About It"; "His Hand Is Outstretched Still"; "Victory In Jesus" and "Till The End."

JON GIBSONBODY & SOUL FRONTLINE

Stevie Wonder sound-alike Jon Gibson's third LP is of a more laid-back nature than his two previous releases. Gibson and producer Bill Wolfer incorporate a sparse, acoustic sound which is noticeable on the LP's first single, "Father, Father." Wonder himself adds some hot harmonica licks on Gibson's rendition of soul great's "Have A Talk With God."

WITNESS I'VE COME TOO FAR TYSCOT

This Detroit-based group followup their successful debut LP, Keep Looking Up, with this pleasing effort. These four talented ladies show that they can handle ballads as well as up-tempo material without any difficulty. Another strong production effort from Commissioned keyboardist Michael A. Brooks. HIT PICKS: "Without You In My Life";

"You'll Never Be Alone"; "I'm Gonna Make It"; "I've Come Too Far."

MIN. THOMAS WHITFIELD AND THE THOMAS WHITFIELD COMPANY

...AND THEY SANG...A HYMN SOUND OF GOSPEL

This is a masterpiece. Whitfield has done a tremendous job of incorporating the sound of today's music to some of the classic hymns of the church. That along with the unique sound of one of the country's top choral aggregations, the Thomas Whitfield Company, make this LP a valued addition to any record collection. HIT PICKS: Every cut is strong!

REV. TIMOTHY WRIGHTWHO'S ON THE LORD'S SIDE SAVOY

Rev. Timothy Wright is on a roll, having been associated recently with hit recordings from Jerome Ferrell and Myrna Summers. On his first LP in a while, Wright again delivers his own brand of power-packed, hard-driving traditional gospel with a contemporary flair. Check out the title cut along with the rocking "I've Been Born Again."

P.I.D. HERE WE ARE GRACELAND

Of all the rap artists popping up in gospel music today, these three MCs are the most authentic sounding. P.I.D. (which stands for "Preachers In Dis-

guise"), tells it like it is on their debut LP. Strong arrangements, scratching—the works—are included here. Kool Moe Dee, Tone-Loc, L.L. Cool J, watch out for these guys. HIT PICKS: "Just Say No"; "What's His Name"; "Here We Are"; "Let Me See Your Fruit."

THE MISSISSIPPI MASS CHOIR

LIVE IN JACKSON, MISSISSIPPI MALACO

Malaco has been moving away from its image of a "quartet label by releasing more choir-oriented projects. This LP happens to be one of the best in this line. Get ready to have church soon after putting this disc on the turntable. Rev. Milton Biggham, Huey & Frank Williams of the Jackson Southernaires and Rev. James Moore make guest appearances throughout. HIT PICKS: "Call Him"; "Near The Cross"; "I'm Pressing On"; "We Shall Meet Again"; "All In His Hands."

THE MIGHTY CLOUDS OF JOY NIGHTSONGS

REJOICE

After a brief hiatus from the recording scene, as well as suffering the death of original Clouds member Johnny Martin, the group is back in rare form. A new look and support from former Motown producer Frank Wilson seems to have brought out the best in the Clouds. You can even hear a choir backing the group on a tune or two.





The Laser Video Disc is Here

Remember a few years back when it looked like the laser disc would become the home video medium—and then all of a sudden the good ole VHS cassette took over. Many people thought the laser disc would go the way of the 78 RPM record. Well, it's baaaaack! Actually, it never left although the laser disc as of late has been an industrial video medium.

A few years ago I was walking through a video company's warehouse and I spotted about 50 laser disc machines, all brand new in their boxes. I laughingly asked the owner of the company how much he paid per pound for the stuff and he told me that they were all brand new machines that were going to be distributed nationwide to a major fast food chain to show training films to new employees on how to prepare food.

The machines continued to be popular because they were more reliable and the discs don't wear out the way VHS cassettes do. In the long run, companies

were saving money with the laser discs and the video/audio quality was far superior.

If you bought one of those video disc players a few years ago, hold on to it: The medium is being revived. There are several reasons for this, one being that per unit the video disc is cheaper to mass produce (as compared to the cost of duplicating video cassettes). As of now there is a limited amount of product available, but expect that to change in the near future.

You may have noticed that the Pioneer Electronics Company has started a national sales campaign for their laser disc machine. This machine not only plays the 12-inch laser discs, but the 5-and 3-inch CDs, as well.

The Pioneer CLD-1070 is the machine that is in most of the TV ads, but they have a more sophisticated machine called the CLD-3070. It comes with an 8-bit digital field memory and advanced programming features. The price is about

\$1,200, with the smaller unit selling for about half that amount.

In all, I feel that this medium is far superior than the current VHS system and I feel that by the end of the century video stores will have video discs for rent instead of tapes. If you add up the advantages of the disc—including the fact that, like CDs, they don't wear out—you will see that the disc is the only way to go in the area of home video. I sure hope that Pioneer starts making faster strides in this area!

Canton Auto Sound Mainframe System

Canton is a company located in Minneapolis that manufactures some of the finest quality speaker systems that I have ever seen or heard. I have seen their speakers in the studio, but mainly they make home stereo speakers for the audio perfectionist.

I don't think it's necessary to mention that their stuff is rather expensive, but they do come out with a line of auto amplifiers that are rather reasonably priced. (Please note that I use the word "reasonably," because they still ain't exactly cheap!)

The system is called the Auto Sound Mainframe System. This is designed for the car stereo nut who wants only the best. The mainframe has built-in electronic crossovers for bi-amping and a clean, compact design. One thing I found interesting is that each module can be individually programmed to play either front left, back left, front right or back right. Once programmed, the amplifier can be plugged into any position in the mainframe base unit.

The five-port mainframe retails at \$325 and each 50 watt module is \$300. As I said, they ain't cheap, but if you want the best sound in your car, check these babies out. For more information, call Canton (612/333-1150) and ask for a catalog. They'll send you a booklet that's a work of art in itself!



CONTINUING THE THEME

been the most successful."

WRITING & PRODUCING

"I was doing pre-production on the material: MCA really liked what they heard and they

really pushed me to be involved with the entire production on the new LP. My manager wanted me to do that earlier in my career but I just didn't think I was ready. But I took that step forward and I'm not as 'green' as I used to be. I actually worked hard doing a lot of writing, in all different styles, for this LP, although ballads are still my forte. It was kinda like writing a book and a lot of songs went into the garbage can. I'm saving some of the songs that didn't make it for the next LP which, hopefully, won't be three years away!

BEING LABELLED A BALLADEER

"Well, yes, people have put a label on me as a balladeer and I guess that singers like Luther, Freddie Jackson and Teddy are the folks I'm competing with. But I realize that no one's going to be hot all the time and everyone has to cool off eventually—so there's room for all of us."

The Dramatics: Staying 'Positive' in the '80s



he Dramatics have been making great music since they first appeared on the recording scene

in the '60s in Detroit. Best known for their '70s run of hits ("Whatcha See Is Whatcha Get," "In The Rain," "Get Up And Get Down" and "Hey You! Get Off My Mountain" among others), the group disbanded in 1983 but came back together for 1986's Somewhere In Time LP with Ron Banks, Lenny Mayes, Willie Ford and L.J. Reynolds (joined by new member Steve Barnett).

Now they've signed with Volt Records (distributed by Fantasy) and according to L.J., the group is busier than ever, thanks to their new LP, Positive State Of Mind...

THE IMPACT OF THEIR NEW LP

"It's like a comeback situation for us and the LP is really starting to generate a lot of work for us.

"We put our best foot forward and did an LP that we felt not only our audience could get into but one that could attract new audiences too."

RE-GROUPING

"Getting the group back together was as easy as counting money. We'd talked about it for a few years and the suggestion was made to Fantasy that it could be a lucrative situation for everyone involved."

"Basically, when we disbanded, it was because we were tired and we had some business problems—we weren't happy about the way things were going. Plus we all



had other things we wanted to do in music, like make solo LPs, which we will still do."

THE POPULARITY OF STAND-UP GROUPS

"There are some good new groups—like The Force M.D.s, New Edition. But honestly, it's never been too hard for us to work, especially overseas.

"In Japan, we were really well treated last year and for some groups like us, The Dells, and so on, you don't have to have a record deal to work. Of course, we all like that record money!"



THE CHANTELS: One of the Girl Group Greats



Of all the female groups of the late '50s and early '60s, The Chantels made some of the most beautiful music and slickest ballads of the century. Their style was inspired by 'Gregorian Chants,' a rhythmically free, liturgical chant originating from the Roman Catholic Church.

As young ladies, they attended the St. Anthony Padua School on E. 166th Street in the Bronx, NY. They were all born in the Bronx/Manhattan area and basically grew up together. The original members were Lois Harris, Renee Minus, Sonie Goring, Arlene Smith and Jackie Landry Jackson. "We all sang together in the choir, and we started singing R&B/ Rock 'n Roll during choir practice in the 'Gregorian Chant' style that was being taught to us. I remember Sister Marie couldn't ever remember the phrase Rock 'n Roll. She said we were singing 'Skip 'n Jump'...so we were put out of the choir," Jackie told me with a laugh.

Explaining how the group got its name, she said: "We were in junior high school at a basketball game against another Catholic school named St. Francis de Chantel. We all liked the name, so that was it." (Jackie laughed again when I asked her who won the basketball game!)

So how did the group get discovered? According to Jackie, they were all "dressed alike when we went downtown to do an Alan Freed Rock 'N Roll Show. On the corner of 59th and Broadway,

we met Richard Barrett who asked if we sang. We said yes, so he asked if we'd sing for him. We did...and we never made it to the show. Our parents couldn't believe we were going to actually start recording." Barrett—who handled another '50s doo wop group, The Valentines—became the girls' manager. Later, he formed The Three Degrees.

The girls were between the ages of 13 and 15 when they landed a record deal and first entered a recording studio. "We'd practice on Sunday afternoons. We weren't allowed to have boyfriends and our parents went on the road with us. There were tutors also on the road with us and we attended a professional tutorial school. And yes, we all completed school."

Success came fast for the group and they were constantly working: "Our tours were booked for six week outings and we traveled by bus. We did shows in every region, except for Los Angeles and San Francisco," despite the fact that The Chantels' records were big sellers all along the West Coast.

"Maybe," released in 1958, was the group's biggest hit (and it was recorded years later by the Three Degrees). Other hits included "Every Night" and "Look In My Eyes" (with lead vocalist Annette Smith, who replaced Arlene Smith). Slow jams like "He's Gone" and "My Plea" were popular releases trom the group and it was Arlene and Richard Barrett

who wrote most of their tunes.

So why did the group disband? "Well, Spider, it was the same old story about royalties. We recorded for three different record companies and today there is a company in New York that is attempting to regain some of the lost royalties we should have earned.

"All of us turned out well," Jackie was quick to add. "Some of us went on to college. We all have great families and good careers. Arlene and Sonie (who now lives in Florida) became school teachers. Lois is a nurse. Renee is a columnist/editor for the Amsterdam News. And I'm a court reporter."

The group name legally belongs to all of them: "Arlene still performs occasionally and does use the name. We all wish her well and wouldn't do anything to try and stop her. There was an attempt about eight years ago to reunite. Producer Buzz Willis recorded a production that might've brought us back as a unit, but the project was halted indefinitely."

It was good to hear the freshness, excitement and positive attitude in Jackie's voice as she explained that she still communicates daily with her former group members. "It would be nice if we could all unite and do just one last concert. We stopped without really saying goodbye." Here's hoping it happens, Jackie!



Bob Marley meets the O'Jays epitomizes the musical lean of this trio's debut LP. With a stellar band that includes Sly Dunbar on drums and Robbie Shakespeare on bass (do they ever work individually?), this act probes issues encompassing spirituality ("Freedom For the Black Man"), politics ("Re-Unite Jamaica") and personal statements ("Happiness & Contentment"). Be sure

to give the moving title selection a spin. Demos: Adults.

BILL WOLFER

AND IT RAINED ALL THROUGH THE NIGHT NOUVEAU/K-TEL

Producer/songwriter/arranger/musician, who has worked with Michael Jackson, Stevie Wonder and Diana Ross, serves up his label debut of keyboard-dominated instrumentals. Flowing from funky jazz to cool new age, Wolfer instills all 15 tracks with a quality that's seductive to the ear. Check out the bouncy "The Way She Walks" and the remake of the Academy-Award nominated theme song from the film "Bagdad Cafe," "Calling You." Demos: Adults.

DOUG E. FRESH & THE GET FRESH CREW

SUMMERTIME DANYA

The man who makes music with his mouth is back with an upbeat and carefree cut, not to be confused with the "Porky and Bess" classic, that urges us to play in the sunshine. This track's happy-go-lucky message and sound makes for a very atypical rap number. Todd Terry's mix gives it all a hiphouse flavor. Demos: Teens, Young adults.

ANNE G. HEART DONOR ATLANTIC


Capable and attractive singer/songwriter/producer offers the second single from her debut LP, On A Mission. This mid-tempo R&B-dance track is considerably more accessible than her previous single, which barely dented the charts. Demos: Young adults, Adults.

ROBERTA FLACK SHOCK TO MY SYSTEM ATLANTIC

TEEN DREAM RING MY BELL

MUSCLE SHOALS SOUND

Anita Ward's late '70s disco classic gets a funkified, hip-hop reworking by this female act. Other than the chorus, this version scarcely resembles the original. This is a good example of who to freshen up an old song with music rather than sampling. Demos: Teens, Young adults.

CHRIS BENDER

BABY GIRL EPIC

Vocalist tries to win over a special young lady on this standard R&B-dance track. When the singer gets warmed up, he sounds a tad like labelmate Terence Trent D'Arby. Demos: Young adults, Dancers.

KWAME

THE RHYTHM ATLANTIC

Rapper follows up the zany hit "The Man We All Know and Love" with this moderately paced track characterized by a minimalist rat-tat-tat snare and panting. This boastful and relaxed tune recreates the atmosphere of a small club. Demos: Teens.
