

### **CBS to air Grammy Special**







# BARRY WHITE: The Man, The Myth, The Magic

he last time most folks heard Barry White on Southern California radio, he was trying to talk some brothers out of killing each other and the community around them.

The next time they hear Barry he'll be rapping for all he's worth for music lovers who quickly recognized his genius in 1973 when they plunked down nearly \$20 million in hard cash for the soul-satisfying hits "I'm Gonna Love You," "Never Gonna Give You Up," "I've Got So Much Love to Give" and "Love's Theme."

"Sho' You Right," the first single from his debut album for A&M Records, is a right-in-the-groove, high-tech presentation of the very qualities that enabled "The Maestro" to capture male and female fans by the legion. The single will satisfy the hearts of listeners and cash registers of music merchants. And Black radio will be very much a part of the cycle of progress that will not stop until "Sho' You Right" lands at the top of the music charts.

People in Barry's old neighborhood, however, feel that music by the robust singer/arranger/composer/conductor released at this particular time of his life will enter some record book somewhere as the first single to become No. 1 in those "boom box" cars that break new product in urban communities at wallshaking decibles without regard to Arbitron ratings.

The thought that Barry White has successfully transcended two worldsthe dream world of recording and the real world of street gang action—is inspiring to Black people who idolize Barry for joining with Run-D.M.C. and radio station KDAY to call for a "Day of Peace" in Los Angeles where deadly street gang warfare has become a daily affair.

"Man, we just waitin' for Barry's music to hit the street," said the well-dressed, gold chain-laden young Black man who sat in a smartly-turned-out blue Nissan pickup truck. "Yeah, man, I've been into gangs since I was 12 and I wished that I coulda had me a friend or advisor like Barry White; somebody who has

been through it, man, but could still stand up strong and be a successful Black man in America."

The 19-year-old drug pusher was interrupted by the beeper he was wearing on his belt. He paused for a moment than added: "Yeah, man, Barry White is saying a lot of important things and we want to hear all that he's got to say because we're on a fast track that's leading to the destruction of the entire race.

'Barry liberated a lot of Black men, and men of other races, when he came on the scene as the master rapper

cloaked in silky violins, pulsing rhythms and driving arrangements," said one of the happily married Black professionals who credits White with helping him capture his spouse's attention in 1973. "Barry was sensual and could beg his buns off, but there was substance to Barry's pleas. He offered commitment and he taught us what to say to young ladies when we were at a loss for words."

So, where did Barry White come from? Basically, he came out of the church. Though born in Galveston, TX, Sept. 12, 1944, his mother returned to her Los Angeles home shortly after giving birth, and Barry eventually made his singing debut at age 8 at Tabernacle Baptist Church where his mom, Sadie

Carter, played piano and directed the choir.

"The whole community around here knows Barry White, and he's one of the most respected people in South Central Los Angeles because of his concern for the welfare of young people," said the Rev. Lester Mosley, pastor of the 90-year-old Tabernacle Baptist Church.

When his mother directed the choir under pastor E. S. Johnson, she'd let him sit at the plano with her and he helped to direct the choir as well as later on to play for the youth choir.

'He was involved in gangs himself, like others," said Rev. Mosley. "Gang activity is very high and in this area they recruit in such a way that either you belong to a gang or you get jumped on. The only other out is that you belong to the church. If you live in another area and you are going to or from church in another gang's territory nobody bothers you; most of them respect the church."

"I did what all the other teenagers who had nothing else to do did; I danced, I partied, I fought, I sang, and I hungout on 'the corner' waiting to bust somebody in the mouth if I didn't like how they looked or what they said," Barry told BRE, smiling as he remembered the time he spent a couple of months in Juvenile Hall for stealing tires. "I vowed then that I would never spend any more of my time in an institution."

Barry White came from the streets of Los Angeles and felt the time he spent "on the corner" of 51st Street and Avalon Blvd. has made his music meaningful to people in all parts of the world who made him a superstar with the purchase of millions of dollars worth of his musical product in the mid-1970s.

"Barry used to walk from South Park to Hollywood to do a recording session," said one of those who never made the move from "the corner"; one of the people who calls Barry White a real Black man. "He didn't act no different from everybody else in the Park, but he always had something in the back of his mind and he didn't let nothin' get in his way. When it came to music, Barry Continued on page 11



was gone."

A lot of people in the music industry had heard about Barry White long before his 20th Century Records debut single hit the pop chart, and many believed that had it not been for the June, 1973 month-long success of Paul McCartney's "My Love," Barry's "I'm Gonna Love You Just a Little More Baby" would have been number one. It topped out at number three and before month's end was still number four behind ex-Beatle George Harrison's "Give Me Love," Paul McCartney and Wings' song, and Billy Preston with "Will It Go Round in Circles."

In 1960, Barry White sang bass for the Upfronts, an r&b band that gained some popularity in L.A. The next year he was arranging for Rampart Records. The following year, Barry was road manager and drummer with Jackie Lee on "The Duck" which hit #14 on the charts.

After a few more years of "woodsheddin" and familiarizing himself with the recording process, Barry worked in L.A. as a&r director for Bronco Records and Mustang Records, and felt the satisfaction of a #1 record when Felice Taylor soared to the top of the charts in Great Britain with Barry's "It May Be Winter Outside (But In My Heart It's Spring)." Taylor's "I Feel Love Comin' On," another White composition, rose to #11 in England and made some noise on American charts.

Barry worked with Andrea Robinson and the group Four Sights in 1969 before he discovered the female vocal trio that was to be a harbinger of musical things to come. Diana Taylor, Linda and Glodean James were christened Love Unlimited and Barry assembled a band to back them.

"It was the greatest thing that ever happened to me," said Barry, who became their manager and mentor. "We devoted our hearts, souls, talents and goals to each other." Their efforts paid off three years later when the trio was signed with Uni Records and a debut recording of "Walkin' in the Rain With the One I Love" hit #14 on the pop charts as a million seller.

"Love's Theme," written as an overture for Love Unlimited's debut 20th Century Records LP, Under the Influence of Love Unlimited, was a phenomenal step for Barry.

"Love's Theme" topped out at #1 the week of Feb. 9, 1974. "Can't Get Enough of Your Love, Baby" charted #1 for the week of Sept. 21, 1974 and joined his second #1 single from the LP, "You're the First, the Last, My Everything," on the charts.

In 1976, Barry formed Unlimited Gold

Records and platinum records were not far behind. "The Man" was Barry's first triple-platinum product.

Fans are reminded of such stellar recordings by either Love Unlimited, the Love Unlimited Orchestra or Barry as "Just Another Way to Say I Love You," "What Am I Gonna Do With You," "Love Is Back," and the soundtrack for *Together Brothers*, a 20th Century-Fox film that reportedly had more to do with honing Barry's social consciousness than anything else in his life—save the church.

Barry's score, which included "Honey, Please, Can't Ya See," was a searing and unconventional approach for him that introduced Barry to a philosophy that remains uppermost in his dedication to the re-direction of street gang activity: "People of tomorrow are the children of today."

"The unfortunate thing about *Together Brothers* is that they didn't take the movie seriously," Barry told **BRE**, "My album was gold; the sound track went gold, and they should have taken the movie seriously."

At a time in his life when things have never been better, Barry is busier than a one-armed paperhanger. He spends his resources —"my time, my mind and my dimes"—for the future of a troubled Los Angeles, and—with his new label, A&M Records, firmly behind him—he's about to drop an album that is destined to be heard around the world.

More than 100 people joined community leaders from Altadena and South Central L.A. on the steps of the County Hall of Administration recently in a rally to demonstrate support for increased funding of anti-gang programs.

"I can't believe you're all here begging for something everybody knows the people need," Barry told those gathered on the steps. "Everybody in this city knows the crisis we're under."

Barry told **BRE**, "Right now, the greatest game going in the ghetto areas, in the poverty areas of America, is cocaine and hustling; I mean hustling of every nature and every level. First of all, the problem with teenagers is they don't trust nobody. And the last person they trust is an adult, and with good reason. We have done very little to give them reason to trust us; everything we've said has been a lie.

"I'm about awareness and education," Barry says, "That is essential to me. I believe that what you don't know will not harm you, it will *kill* you."

In October, 1986, Run-D.M.C. and Barry White called for "A Day of Peace" in L.A., asking all gang members to cease hostilities for a day in order for everyone to sit and talk about the problems of gangs and drugs.

KDAY radio—living up to its awardwinning community service reputation—stopped all regular programming during their peak hours (3 to 5 p.m. on Oct. 9) to air a special two-hour "callin" show featuring the entertainers and Leon Watkins, a regional director of the Community Youth Gang Services Project, the agency directing the negotiations. The "call-in" show aired after a gang fight left 40 injured at a Run-D.M.C. concert in Long Beach, CA.

The program elicited heartfelt cries for help from teenagers caught up in the hurricane of "crack," teen pregnancy, violence both on and off the school campus, staggering unemployment, and deadly gang activity. Gang members wanted information on how to get out, people wanted more information about drugs, and mothers wanted to know who to call upon to stop the slaying of innocents in drive-by shootings. An estimated 1,500 phone calls were logged before the phone company's entire Crenshaw exchange overloaded.

Los Angeles police, skeptical about the effectiveness of an on-air appeal for peace, reported virtually no violent gang activity the day of the broadcast, or for three days following.

"We were quite elated to have been instrumental in the gang truce that was called," said Ed Kerby, gm/KDAY, in speaking for all KDAY staffers who take community commitment seriously.

A three-hour "call-in" show featuring Barry was broadcast from Lou Dantzler's Challengers Boys and Girls Club with a live audience and a number of gang members who were joined by top celebrities.

And the on-going anti-gang campaign waged by Barry and KDAY has moved the street gang issue onto the national agenda. WGCI-FM, one of Chicago's highest rated stations, agreed to provide at least two hours of air time to deal with street gangs in the Windy City in a program modeled after the Barry White-KDAY effort.

Barry White knows that "an idle mind is the devil's workshop," and wants to do something innovative for children.

"My idea is to teach a different philosophy; for instance, I think it's important that children start learning who they are, how important they are to their life; that every decision they make—no matter what they do—when they make the decision once they are past the infancy age, it can kill them...whether they know better or not," Barry told **BRE**.

Barry sponsored little league teams from 1973 to 1983 that played in all the inner-city parks.

"It's about involvement," said Barry. "All we've done when we make a million dollars is to prove that we have come

Alpert added, since "We were doing what any responsible major company should be doing. It seems like it's the only thing to do."

Interviewed after the luncheon, Karen Kennedy praised students and employers alike, and noted that the process of contacting other potential sponsors has already started, with a goal of doubling the number of participants in 1988.

"We had some problems," Kennedy said, "but none that we didn't anticipate. There was very little experience with this type of program on either side, and in the end both supervisors and students learned a great deal from each other about the communication process. Most important, everyone who started also finished. Everyone involved should be proud of a iob well done.'

up with a formula that works that one time. But it doesn't mean that you are above everybody. It doesn't mean that you are above where your roots are. When I get a lot of stuff on my mind, where do you think I go to think? Right back to East 48th Street. I pull over there in my Rolls or my Stutz and nobody ever bothers me. And I'll sit there for two or three hours and get my mind together. What was 'on the corner' that got me the ears that I have wasn't exclusively mine alone. My fight was the struggle of the Black man; my proudness as a Black man came from that corner; my loyalty to my Black people came from that corner; my consistency to myself came from that corner. That's what I got off the corner.

"When we are poor and grow up to be grown-ups and teenagers, those who are strong are able to escape-and they don't go back. So what that tells those who are over there is that the achievers were different. Basically all of us feel inferior because there is no reminder of who we are. Where are our Jackie Robinson and Muhammad Ali statues on the corners of our ghettos? Where are the reminders of who we are? And that is nobody's fault but ours. Do you understand what I'm saying? So, I'm coming from a different perception to the human mind than other people. Other people want to remind people that they're great by their money and wealth. I would like to do it another way. I would like to expose my young Black children to great Black men and women who have contributed great things to this world and to this country; not only in sports but in every field that we have. This deep sleep has been upon us for many, many years."

Barry White keeps going back home so that he will never forget from whence he came. He is a legend in his community, but is wise enough to keep his music and philosophy in separate and distinct bags.

The Right Night & Barry White, his first LP for A&M, is a perfect example of this. The music is not social by any stretch of the imagination. It is vintage Barry White and it is music for the lovers of the world. Both Barry and A&M have a social axe to grind, but they do not meddle with the music.


"I have been in this business 27 years and I have seen the con games, the bullshit from every level," Barry told BRE. "So far, A&M is doing it absolutely right! I don't have one complaint. Gil Freisen, John McClain, Jesus Garber, Charlie Minor, Vernon Slaughter, Doug Wilkins, Bob Garcia, Bob Reitman, Chuck (Beeson), Herbie (Alpert) and Jerry (Moss), the secretaries, all of them. I've got so many friends there. Jerome Gasper is an old friend and he's coming back there now, but I knew him before he was at A&M; and I'm glad that Jerome is there. Those people have been so nice; it's unbelievable. The operators, everybody. I visit when I'm in a company. I want to know everybody in every department. Because I'm people, too. I keep my feet on the ground. I will always keep my feet on the ground."

The Right Night & Barry White, which will be released at the end of September, was produced by Barry White with an assist from associate producers Jack Perry, Doug Lambert, Bryan Loren (all keyboardists), Carl Taylor, Don Williams, guitarist Charles Fearing and John Albert. Barry White, Jr. worked as an assistant engineer and Glodean White is featured on background vocals along with Brenda Holloway and others.

Barry gives praise and thanks to his mother, Sadie; his father, Melvin; and Larry Nunes, his Godfather and Spiritual Advisor, "the man who started it all," and wrote in his liner notes: "unfortunately, most people go through life not knowing what real friends are...fortunately, I am not one of those people."

Vernon Slaughter, A&M vp/Black music promotion, is excited about Barry White: "An artist like Barry White is really what A&M is all about. A true creative talent, Barry's artistry has transcended trends in music. He's a world-wide artist and the epitomy of what super-stardom is all about."



## ARTIST PROFILE

THE MIGHTY DIAMONDS SPARKLE BRIGHTLY



Still holding their own 17 years and 17 albums later, The Mighty Diamonds stay positive about their recording future. Their latest LP, *If You're Looking For Trouble*, Live and Learn Records, is a strong, uplifting example of their

### SOUNDS OF SOWETO

June 16, 1976, the South African Township of Soweto exploded in an uprising that would last a year as Black South African students protested government regulations forcing them to be taught in Afrikaans, a Dutch-based language, considered the language of their oppressors, proponents of the crushing system known as Apartheid. The year-old riot resulted in almost 600 deaths among the protesting students.

Soweto means South West Township. Located on the southwestern boundary of Johannesburg, Soweto was built in the early part of the century under the Afrikaaner Nationalist ideal of separate development. The largest township in South Africa, Soweto has come to be a symbol of Black resistance for South Africa and the world.

Sounds of Soweto, Capitol Records, is a collection of songs that reflect the mood and sensibility of Black South Africans as the music represents a cross section of the exotic, emotionallycharged music heard on local radio stations and in nightclubs.

There are some 30 radio stations in South Africa, half broadcasting to whites, the other half to Blacks. Twenty stations are controlled by the government, twelve of which broadcast to Blacks in various languages. The stations include: Radio Sesotho, Radio Lobowa, Radio Zulu, Radio Xhosa, and Radio Setswana.

Under the system of Apartheid, songs with controversial lyrics are almost always banned, although some private stations take some liberties while cautiously skirting government interference. But like American slaves, South

continued spirit as one of the premier groups in Reggae.

Fitzroy "Bunny" Simpson, Donald "Tabby" Shaw and Lloyd "Judge" Ferguson got together in 1969. But it wasn't until 1975 that they cut their first album as a group. When The Right Time Come went No. 1 in Jamaica and Great Britain while the group went virtually unnoticed in the United States.

Bunny sees the music industry opening up to Reggae music, giving it some credibility, but the financial support for promotions and distribution isn't there in the proportions that will really make a difference.

To a man, The Diamonds feel that the only way to break into American radio is to record with a label that can provide meaningful financial support. The Diamonds, though influenced by Ska's Paragons and Heptones and r&b's Chi-Lites, Manhattans and Stylistics, somehow have not been able to build a large Black radio audience in the states. Ever optimistic, The Diamonds reveal their reception gets better with each tour to the states, even though their audiences are still majority white American and Black Iamaican.

Is there something important in their music? Says Bunny: "Listen to the message of The Mighty Diamonds. Strong lyrics. Songs about struggle. Things you see day-by-day...we sing about them. We want people to stop and listen to the words of reggae music because there's a lot of good lyrics coming out. And we also write and sing sweet love songs."

If You're Looking for Trouble, the Diamonds latest LP, is a testament to the Diamonds who have made a special brand of music for over 17 years, music destined to speak to the masses.



## SOUTH AFRICA SINGS

African artists have mastered the craft of disguising their volatile messages.

Restrictions have not stifled the music or creativity. All of the musicians on *Sounds of Soweto* are major recording stars in their homeland, and represent the full spectrum of musical expression produced in South Africa, blending the traditional (tribal drums, chants and vocal harmonies), as well as the contemporary (jazz and soul).

Many of the songs protest conditions in South Africa, and are, in fact, the music that young urban South Africans, Black and white, listen to daily.

"Asimbonanga," by Johnny Clegg and Savuka, is a tribute to imprisoned Nelson Mandela who has spent a quarter of a century in a South African prison for his struggles to bring freedom.to his fellow Black South Africans.

"Confusion (Ma Afrika)" by Condry Ziqubu, speaks to the turbulent life lived in violence and poverty-plagued townships, its message heightened by a Zulu chant, which translated means, "confusion everywhere, everything is burning."

The musicians on this powerful double-record album are: Johnny Clegg And Savuka, Brenda and the Big Dudes, Kaputeni, Mara Louw, Rex, Rabanye, Sankomota, Supa Frika, Thetha, The Winners, featuring Lionel Petersen, and Condry Zigubu.

Listen closely and you will hear more than the sounds of Africa...the influence of Afro-American artists is unmistakable.

## CONCERT REVIEW

### Jordache Jazz at the Bowl By Joy Childs

Nowadays it's rare that a concert—and especially a jazz concert—features more than two top-notch acts. Usually there's an opening act and then the act you really paid to see.

Not so September 9th at what was the last in the Jordache Jazz at the Bowl concert series.

There was someone for everyone, four name acts: the Modern Jazz Quartet, Bobby McFerrin, Carmen McCrae, and the L.A. Jazz Legends. The LAJL were, for the most part, led by an effervescent spokesman in saxophonist Harry "Sweets" Edison; but the group, which featured Red Callender on bass, John Collins on guitar, Teddy Edwards on sax, Jake Hanna on drums, Red Holloway on sax and Jimmy Rowles on piano seemed not to share Sweets' enthusiasm in its rather lackluster Dixieland version of "Just Friends." The group, which bore a faint resemblance to a younger version of the Preservation Hall Jazz Band, did redeem itself on the Billie Holiday signature "Lover Man." On Sonny Stitt's "Stoned," though, each of the seven showcased his individual talent, it was clearly the dynamic trio of saxophonists who prompted the ensuing encore.

What can one say about singer's singer Carmen McCrae that hasn't been said before? As ususal the regally clad empress of jazz and her capable trio enravished the jazz lovers who specifically thronged to the event to hear her sing standards like "I Hear Music," "Am I Blue?," and "That Old Devil Moon." McCrae, though she ain't what she useta be, proved that she still ranks with the best of the divas in her display of vocal gymnastics on "Guess Who I Saw Today?" and her personal favorite and the finale, Brazilian-inspired "No More Blues."

That Bobby McFerrin is the 1987 Grammy-award winner for Best Male Jazz Vocalist and Best Vocal Arranger is almost an understatement of this man's breathtaking genius. He was

decidedly the concert frontrunner in popularity. He arrived barefoot, in a black shirt and what appeared to be his trademark 501 jeans. His only 'instruments' were his voice and his body movements/motions. And as the audience sat transfixed, McFerrin 'played' both melody and harmony on these instruments on his awardwinning rendition of "Round Midnight." On another tune, he became all four parts of a song which ostensibly featured an old Southern Black woman dueting with Satchmo, the two being accompanied by a bass and muted trumpet. There's only one word to sum up McFerrin's finale, which was a one-man performance of the classic film "The Wizard of Oz"-classic. as that sentiment was echoed by the standing ovation he received.

Though the night belonged to McFerrin, the Modern Jazz Quartet celebrated its 35th anniversary in the business with style. And what a stylish celebration feast it was, replete with white dinner jackets and formal attire as befitted the honorees. Duke's "Rockin' in Rhythm" provided a resplendent opening number, followed by equally tasty treats like "D and E," "Minor Love," "One Never Knows" and recent addition "A Day in Dubrovnik." But it was their performance of the timeless "Django" which symbolized the durability of the venerable quartet of Percy Heath, John Lewis, Milt Jackson and Connie Kay, whose 35-year marriage is sure to live on.

## ARTIST PROFILE By David Nathan

### WILSON PICKETT: A NEW HOME AT MOTOWN



After a few years' absence from the recording scene, the inimitable Wilson Pickett is solidly back on the scene, putting his distinctive vocal stamp all over his first album in his new association with Motown Records. The legendary singer has an impressive string of classics behind him: "Mustang Sally," "99 And A Half (Won't Do)," "Funky Broadway" and the perennial "In The Midnight Hour" (recorded for his new album) form just a part of the legacy that Pickett has created in over 20 years of making downhome soul music, seasoned heavily with funk.

In Los Angeles for a week of publicity

and promotion, the living legend granted **BRE** time for a chat.

**BRE:** How did you come to be with Motown?

**Pickett:** Well, originally I was going to do a deal with Elektra. In fact, they'd spent some \$40,000 on three songs and

then apparently, Berry Gordy heard a demo of one of the songs, "Don't Turn Away," and offered us a deal. It's a very good contract, even better than the one we had originally been offered.

BRE: Had you met Berry before?

**Pickett:** Oh, yeah! In fact, there was a time when I actually looked after his kids for a while in Detroit! So we know each other going back a long way. He called me after I signed with Motown to welcome me to the label.

**BRE:** Did You find it strange working with all the new technology—computers, synthesizers and so on?

**Pickett:** To begin with, I wondered how we were going to do it. I was nervous about that pretty much all the way through. It was like going to school, getting used to all those machines. But I'm very happy with the results.

BRE: Was it tough finding songs to

"Growing up we really were inspired by the classic 'girl groups.' There was just something magical about the way groups like the Supremes and the Emotions communicated through their records and stage performances that made us want to be a part of it all," says Kathy Merrick, who along with Vivian Ross and Lisa Frazier comprise the group Lace, the debut act on the new PolyGram distributed Wing Records. **Pickett:** Yes. I got a whole lot of songs, particularly from writers that were new to me. I was very careful about what I picked. I was looking for hits but the songs had to have a worthwhile story because that's what I'm all about.

**BRE:** Whose idea was it to re-make "In The Midnight Hour?"

**Pickett:** Well, no one wants me to get away from that song! I wrote it and to be honest, it's the kind of song that you can keep the kids with—I mean, that song keeps making money. It's a classic—because it's good! (Laughs) But I guess, every artist has that one song and that's mine!

**BRE:** Why do you think the music of the '60s is still so popular?

**Pickett:** Those were happy days for people and besides, that music can never die. There's always room for new music but that ('60s) music comes from the church, it's the roots.

**BRE:** Some artists who came up when you did haven't survived. How have you managed?

**Pickett:** Well, some got strung out on dope, some weren't as strong as others and some had problems with their husbands and wives and whatever. We'll see if I can survive (laughs)...But right now, I'm doing what I'm doing for the money, not for the love of it. I loved it, a long time ago!

**BRE:** People say you're a legend. What do you think of that?

**Pickett:** Well, it's a great compliment. **BRE:** Do *you* think you're a legend?

**Pickett:** (Laughs) Yep, I'm a legend in my own time!


