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
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

# Wells To Receive Proceeds From Motor City Series

A portion of the proceeds from the *Motor City Dance Party Series* album, a compilation of newly recorded material by the original Motown artists, will go to help underwrite medical expenses for Mary Wells.

Currently, Wells, who has been diagnosed with throat cancer, is undergoing treatment at the Kenneth Norris Jr. Cancer Hospital in Los Angeles. The cancellation of health insurance from the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists (AFTRA) has resulted in an uncertain financial future for Motown's first female star.

The Motor City album

collection on Quality Records, a new independent label in the U.S., will feature contemporary recordings of past hits from such Motown greats as Martha Reeves & the Vandellas, the Contours, Kim Weston, the Miracles, Rare Earth and Wells herself, among others. The first released 12" single, "Don't Forget The Motor City" by Big Wheel and the Motormixers, is a medley of hits from many of the artists featured on the album.

In October, Quality Records will release *Keeping My Mind On Love*, a solo project recorded by Wells before she was diagnosed



with cancer.

Quality Records is a subsidiary of R-Tek Corpor-

ation, a Canadian-based entertainment company, and is headed by Russ Regan.

# At Last, Marvin's Star

The late Marvin Gaye, considered one of the seminal figures in contemporary music today, will take his rightful place among those honored for outstanding contributions to the entertainment industry on the Hollywood Walk Of Fame, Sept. 27 at 10 a.m. The ceremony will take place at 1500 Vine Street, Hollywood, CA.

Gaye's three children, Marvin III, Frankie and Nona, will accept the honor for their father. Berry Gordy, Jheryl Busby (currently Motown pres/ceo), Diana Ross, Smokey Robinson, the Temptations, Lionel Richie and many other celebrities are scheduled to be there as well.

Joining Motown in the '60s, Gaye went on to achieve

great success and record a string of hits which included duets with Diana Ross; Tammi Terrell ("Ain't No Mountain High Enough," "Your Precious Love," "Ain't Nothing Like The Real Thing" and "You're All I Need To Get By"); Mary Wells ("Once Upon A Time"); and Kim Weston ("I'm Yours You're Mine" and "It Takes Two").

After the death of his duet partner Terrell in 1970 and a year in seclusion, Gaye returned to the scene with the release of the 1971 concept album What's Going On, his personal statement on urban decay, ecology, the Vietnam War and spiritual impoverishment. It was the album that elevated him from a great vocalist to a master producer/composer and social commentator.

After 20 years and dozens of recordings, Gaye received his first Grammy award for his *Midnight Love* album and the hit single "Sexual Healing" in 1982.

In the midst of a sensational comeback, Gaye was shot to death by his father on April 1, 1984. □

# **Arsenio Goes To Europe**


pig-tailed little girl is singled out of the choir. There she is-in the rear, near the end. A twinkling star amongst a sea

of faces. Alone, Nayobe Catalina Gomez is even more

dynamic. A sure-fire talent with the ability to take parties, contests and eventually the mayor's office by storm. Her sixth grade glee club was

only the beginning.

As a youngster in her native Brooklyn, it took only a short while for Navobe to convince her father that she wanted to pursue a music career. However, before he would allow her to fully commit to such a long shot, he arranged for her to participate in various competitions and to perform before various organizations. # **KENYATTA:** Doing Something

oming from a family so heavilv trained in music, it became no surprise that Ken-

yatta grew up with a passion for music that has generated his first Delicious Vinyl project, the single entitled "I Wanna Do Something Freaky To You" off of the LP Marked For Death, the movie soundtrack. Both his parents could play an array of musical instruments and were very active in the church choir.

Born in Washington, D.C., as Keith Poole, Kenyatta moved to Winston-Salem. NC, at an early age. The

African name Kenyatta means "burning spear." It was given to him by his godfather. "I knew at an early age that I was destined to write music and perform on stage," he says.

Determined to make a name for himself, Kenyatta decided to move to Los Angeles, doing such jobs as working in fast food restaurants and dishwashing. "I look back on those times as a clear indication that perseverance pays off if you really want something bad enough," he reflects.

Eager to broaden his musical influences that already stretched from Funkadelic to continued on page 45




#### GWEN GUTHRIE MISS MY LOVE REPRISE

LISTEN UP—LISTEN UP—QWEST/REPRISE—Quincy Jones assembles a Hall of Fame of black music on this cut: Ray Charles, James Ingram, Karyn White and Ice-T are just a few superstars who lend their talents. It's a record that you only need to hear once to know it is going straight to the top. As usual, Jones deserves all the acclaim he gets. And all the featured artists know that, too. Demos: All.

**STANLEY CLARKE/GEORGE DUKE—MOTHERSHIP CONNECTION—EPIC—**What do you get when two legends link forces such as Clarke and Duke do here? Pure funky beats. The evolution of this single reads like a Who's Who—it was originally a George Clinton song; Clarke/Duke now do an excellent version, one that they produced. Demos: Funksters.

**SEDUCTION—BREAKDOWN—A&M**—These three beauties are back with their soft raps and soulful vocals. The clubs will go wild when this touches the decks. Incorporating the man with the Midas touch, Robert Clivilles, to write and produce for them, Seduction seems set up to chart well into the '90s. Demos: Rappers, Dancers.

**E.U.—I CONFESS—VIRGIN**—This midtempo jam taken off E.U.'s *Cold Kickin'* It album is already arousing interest on the airwaves, so it shouldn't be long before it gets played in clubs. Although it should get most of its interest from teenagers, it could—with enough airplay—become a high chart entry and a hit with all ages. Demos: Teens, Young Adults.



**GEORGE BENSON—BIG BOSS BAND—WARNER BROS.**—Benson presents a tribute to the late Count Basie, backing up a promise he made to the bandleader. His vocals are magical over the sound of the Big Boss Band. From "Without A Song" through to "Basie Bae," this album takes a magical journey into the extraordinary era of big bands. Demos: Jazz.


TODAY—THE NEW FORMULA—MOTOWN—Here is an excellent album from a great new band for the '90s. The album features Today's massive hit "Why You Get Funky On Me" along with their current chart entry "I've Got The Feeling." Some other songs worth noting are "Let Me Know" and "Gonna Make You Mine." All songs are good—looks like Today has the right formula. Demos: All.

MAC BAND—LOVE U2 THE LIMIT—MCA—With "Someone To Love" already steaming up the charts, the Mac Band has released this LP filled with some magical cuts. "I Could Never Say Goodbye" should be the next single as it is superb. If they do release it, watch it eclipse "Roses Are Red" in the success stakes. The title track should also do very well. With catchy songs that are uptempo, the Macs look like they will have yet another big album. Demos: Young Adults, Adults.

TRACIE SPENCER—MAKE THE DIFFERENCE—CAPITOL—Already having phenomenal success with "Save Your Love," Spencer seems headed for even more. The album starts with another excellent cut, "This House," and moves into some dance and Quiet Storm gems. The hook for "Tender Love" will bring pulses to fever pitch as it gently caresses one's ears. Whatever the tempo, Spencer seems able to adapt without any problems. Demos: All.

# Robert Cray Strolling In Success



Kickin' the sounds which meld jazz, blues, R&B, rock and gospel into sweet bars of music. **Robert Cray** and his band now feature the down home sounds of the **Memphis Horns.** Cray's latest project, released on Mercury/PolyGram, is entitled *Midnight Stroll*.

A down-to-earth fellow, Cray says he owes much of his creative abilities to his upbringing, which had him embracing music at an early age. "My parents had good music and they would play it often." he says. "When I was growing up, I was inspired by a lot of the greats, such as Howling Wolf. James Brown and Jimi Hendrix. I enjoy all good forms of music."

The diversity of his exposure to music resulted from his experiences while learning his craft. Cray feels it was that blend of knowledge which helped his music become so accessible to listeners. "Just to give you an example of the types of music I've been exposed to.

my first professional gig was in Norfolk, VA, at a go-go club. Now that was an experience," the guitarist comments.

Cray says he's pleased with the way Midnight Stroll came out. "We're really happy about it. A lot of the material in it deals with relationships and I draw on my own experiences and create from them," he says.

The recording artists responsible for Midnight Stroll-produced by Dennis Walker-were Cray and bassist Richard Cousins, keyboardist Jimmy Pugh, drummer Kevin Hayes and Tim Kaihatsu on guitar. Accompanying the Robert Cray Band are trumpeter Wayne Jackson and Andrew Jackson on saxophone. Together forming the Memphis Horns, they provide another dimension to the distinct sound already rendered by Cray's group.

"One of our strongest points is our band," points out Cray. "We're very close continued on page 42

# Sam Dees: "The Show Must Go On"

Artist, composer and producer is the perfect title for a brother in the music industry who has earned it. The public knows him as an artist and great artists, like Larry Graham, know him as a great writer. Sam Dees wrote the classic "One In A Million You" for Graham in 1980. As an artist during the disco era in 1975, he hit with "The Show Must Go On," released on Atlantic Records. Dees has

also written hits for Rosetta Johnson ("A Woman's Way" Atlantic) and Bill Brandon ("This Merry-Go-Round' on Mercury Records). These early productions gave him credibility as one of the hottest writers in the music industry. What is even more important to record companies is that his songs go pop and sell millions.

"I was born in Birmingham, AL, and naturally started singing in the church choir at age 10," remembers Dees. "I had lost all shyness by singing in variety shows. While my mother wanted me to sing, my dad felt a regular job was more appropriate at the time. His attitude was understandable because it was the '50s and our family of 11 was not very well off." Dees also recalls the racism and the hurt that can cause deeprooted anger. couldn't understand racism and as a young man it made me very angry.

Dees, at age 14, was singing in night-clubs "I dropped out of school while in the 10th grade and began working." He recalls one frightening but positive experience while performing at the old 2728 Club in Birmingham. "Two police detectives came to the club and approached me. I was then six feet tall and they spoke to the manager and said, 'This kid is a minor and if he can't sing we are going to take him to jail.' It was

explained that after each performance I went back to the dressing room. They were not convinced and asked me to sing. The song I chose was, 'Tobacco Road,' a favorite of one of the officers. They were pleased and I kept on appearing.

"By the time I was 21 I was performing all over the South. I met **Dennis Edwards**, formerly of the **Temptations**. I also met

Jessie J. Lewis and Clinton Moon who would join the 'Moon Song' music catalog. Of the 250 songs they have, I wrote about 90 percent of them. The proper compensation is still unresolved but the show must go on."

Between '72 and '73, it was Atlantic Records' executive **Henry Allen** who contacted Dees and requested that he come to New York and record

an album. The album, entitled *The Show Must Go On*, was Dees' first LP as an artist. "After my deal with Atlantic I left the music industry because of the negative politics that I felt were unfair to me. If you write and help staff producers complete a production, then it is only fair that there be compensation and a share of the credit. My wife and I took a break and went into

the Black Angus cattle business. Shortly afterwards. I realized my real vision and we relocated to Los Angeles in 1978.

The list of artists that Dees has written or produced for is extensive and includes Loleatta Holloway and John Edwards, who is now lead vocalist for the Spinners. There are so many others.

"I've traveled with the best and recorded with some of the biggest record labels in the country. There's so much to share of my professional experience."

Today, Dees lives in Sepulveda, CA. He constantly works in his 24-track recording studio, which he built in his home. Now signed with RCA, he has a new release, "After All," which is being aired and distributed in Europe and Japan. He will be touring in Japan in the spring. Other current production activities are with Gladys Knight and Garland Green. Pending is a new tune

he wrote, "Lower For Life," which may appear on Whitney Houston's next LP. "For me a successful writer should always carry a cassette player because you never know when a hit idea can come at you. I was driving from Atlanta to Birmingham when the song 'The Show Must Go On' came to me."

Dees, an articulate musical industry leader is still doing what he loves best…and doing it well. □



# Anita Bakeri Composition of A Star

HE'S TINY, BUT PACKS A POWER PUNCH because she is propelled by emotion. Her small feet are firmly planted along the road of legends, following in the footsteps established by living legends Aretha Franklin and Nancy Wilson and the trail left behind by the late, great Sarah Vaughan. Anita Baker is also taking a road less traveled in her latest Elektra LP, Compositions. There are shadows and flavorings of these other great ladies, but Baker the writer/producer shows that Baker the singer is composed of all that and more.

Born in Detroit and raised on a healthy diet of blues, gospel and jazz, Baker is creating her own legacy and, in doing so, has become the inspiration of every serious young female ballad singer in the country. "I do what I do because of the way I feel. It's been a part of my life for as long as I can remember," she says.

Compositions departs from both the traditional Baker LP and that of most recordings produced these days. She notes, "It's different because we tried to capture a live feel by laying the rhythm

# FAR EAST PERSPECTIVE

The Tokyo jazz scene was in full swing this summer with over 30 outdoor festivals providing eager fans with some of the most prodigious jazz talent imaginable. Over 200,000 people streamed to ski resorts, parks, college campuses and

open plains to catch stellar performances put on yearly by favorites such as Al Jarreau, Joe Sample, Wayne Shorter and Omar Hakim. Despite it being one of the hottest summers ever, the fans preferred to suffer from heat exhaustion rather than turn on their heels and miss what only comes once a year.

The big disappointment was **Miles Davis**' absence from playing in Japan's jazz festivals this year. Asked why he didn't accept the offer to perform this summer, Davis retorted, "It's too damn hot, that's why!" Known as a consummate jazz musician who is always stretching his wings to attain new musical horizons, Davis' summer concerts have continued to be the top draw here.

Davis' most memorable moment was captured two years ago and nationally broadcasted on NHK, Japan's most powerful television network. Leading band members young enough to be his grandchildren, Davis prodded and enticed them to play beyond the call of duty. As the last song began approaching climax, Davis put down his horn and went on to challenge his dynamo sax wizard **Kenny Garrett** to play one of the funkiest, loosest and lowdown solos ever imposed on the back-beat of jazz. Usually reserved and reticent, the crowd couldn't hold back their excitement and,

by the song's end, were jumping and clapping deliriously to the music while Davis stood in the shadows snickering like a young boy who had just set off a string of firecrackers. Immortal moments in jazz such as these are what

Davis is best remembered for. His scheduled return next summer should be the most anticipated jazz event of the year.

On a different note, Dizzy Gillespie kept up a busy pace by playing at both the Tokyo and Osaka Blue Note Clubs. Dressed to kill in his authentic Nigerian tribal outfit, the Father of Bop plowed into several of his timeless masterpieces with youthful vigor. His new 1990s rendition of "Night In Tunisia" was the crowning point of the evening and showed that jazz is as fresh as ever. One of the biggest jazz festivals hosted was the Budweiser Fest, which was held in the cool mountains of Nagano Perfecture. With beer being guzzled from morning until sunset, this threeday music marathon was more like a party than a serious jazz affair. Jonathan Butler and Patti Austin

turned out to be the strongest crowd pleasers. This is a sure sign that future jazz festivals will continue inviting urban contemporary crooners to attract a wider cross section of jazz and popular music lovers.

Recently, more and more real estate companies are plunging into the tour promotion business to take advantage of the growing black music boom. With practically no experience with black music and lots of yen to throw around, these newcomers are giving even the well-established promoters like **Udo** and **Kyodo** a hard time bidding for the best black acts.

The newest and most formidable kid on the block is the Pax Theatre, which was built on 25 acres of land in the heart of Tokyo. With one square meter selling for over one billion yen, this feat alone is like walking on water. Pax officials have boldly claimed that they intend to control all of the best black groups coming into Tokyo and, since their grand opening

three months ago, have done just that. With what seems to be unlimited reserves of cash, they were capable of bringing **Soul II Soul** here by dishing out close to a half-million for only four nights. For other major affairs, they lured

several, female celebrities by sending them rock-sized diamonds. And just to create a pleasant ambiance in their exquisite restaurant located on the second floor, they hung a portrait of **Michael Jackson** worth one million dollars. Although Pax has become an overnight sensation by bringing black entertainment to Japan, it is doubtful at most that they will remain committed to promoting black music over the long haul. As is often common practice with real estate investors, trends are discarded on a yearly basis.

On the other end of the spectrum, several black American promoters are becoming recognized for their commitment to hang in through good and bad times and bring the best in black music, dance and drama. One of these companies is Borderstep, owned by attorney Elizabeth Wilkason. After receiving her law and business degree from Harvard, Wilkason decided to come to Japan two years ago and establish a promotions company that would bring dance, drama and classic black music. Since that time, she hasn't looked back. With the cooperation from many major Japanese sponsors, she has taken on a mission to educate Japanese audiences about the black experience through the arts.

Her last promotional dynamo was the **Shadow Vignettes**, a 26-piece jazz big band ensemble that erupted like a

volcano. The group received three standing ovations. Her next project coming up this fall will be **Sweet Honey In The Rock**, a thunderous a cappella quartet which became world renown for the civil rights continued on page 43





tracks and the vocals in the studio together. Since we were all in there at the same time, I knew the people sitting in had to be of a special caliber." Because of this, Baker chose players she knew could do the job. "There are few musicians who can actually perform well in a live studio situation and I'm glad I got the group of people I did."

That hand-picked group included Greg Phillinganes, Steve Ferrone, Nathan East and Ricky Lawson. "I want to also offer a special thanks to Kenny Kirkland, who played on one version of my song 'Lonely.'" Unfortunately, that one-which featured the acoustic piano talents of Kirkland—is not on the Compositions album. "I wish that everyone could have heard that version in addition to the one which is on the album. Although they're the same song, the moods are different and it would have made a fine addition to the final project."

But unlike the realm of jazz, where it is not uncommon to have two or more versions of the same song, R&B does not hold the same tradition. This serves as one source of bother for Baker, whose creative limits stretch the boundaries of her musical genre. "There are a lot of things happening in the

music world which are disturbing," she comments. "I see a blatant disregard for music and what it stands for. There are people who receive music credits on a project who weren't even involved. To me there's a certain disrespect for the craft when this sort of thing goes on." You can be sure the credits on *Compositions* are exactly right.

"Cutting the record in the way it was done, was a bold concept, but one that works; it comes across brilliantly on the tune 'Fairytales.' In years to come, this LP will be singled out as a particularly important body of work," says Doug Daniel, vp, Urban Marketing and Promotion.

Sherwin Bash, Baker's manager, agrees, saying her abilities as a singer, writer and producer continue to grow by leaps and bounds. "Anita is the yard stick by which other record labels gauge their performers," he says. "One of the ways you can tell she is on the right track is through the reputation she's developed around the world.

"In many of the countries she performs, English is not the spoken language. The audience may not speak the language, but they hear her and feel the music which is incredible. Personally, I

# **BAILEY COLEMAN**

**Doubling Up** 



s pd/md/ap for twin AM stations KRIZ and KZIZ, in Seattle and Tacoma, WA,

respectively. Bailey Coleman finds herself doubling and even tripling up on duties for the simulcasted stations. "It's very challenging for me to keep things going here at the stations." Coleman says, "but I must admit that it is one of the most satisfying aspects of my life."

Before beginning at the station eight years ago, Coleman had become interested in radio soon after college. "I studied theatre and music in school, and when I finished I began doing work in television advertising—from in front of the camera.

"But I became less interested in that business over time and one day I happened to be relaxing with friends at a park where a radio station was doing a live remote. From that experience, I knew I wanted to try the profession. The skills I had as a television actor and my background in

music fit right in with the radio career that I chose, and everything worked out."

KZIZ (5,000 watts) and KRIZ (1,000 watts) are within broadcast distance of each other, so in some areas of the Seattle/Tacoma market the stations are actually competing "That sounds a bit strange, I know, to have sister stations which are both on the AM dial and in the same markets, but it serves a purpose."

Coleman says that because of the hilly region and power limitations, there is a restricted range. "With two stations which

happen to overlap a bit, we're now in a position to cover two markets.

stations, which are the only two black-owned frequencies in the state of Washington," she says. "He's done a tremendous job of creating a situation where we can be competitive. He's also the owner of KBMS in Portland."

When Coleman first began at the stations, she worked first as a part-time on-air personality. Within six months, the talented dj moved into the overnight slot, then on to work middays. After a time, Coleman matured into the morning drive position, where she is currently. "I guess I sort of grew out of my midday position," she says.

Working as one the country's only female morning air personalities, Coleman says she attributes landing that lucrative spot to hard work, a perky personality and "an inner drive to wake up in the morning while it's still dark. I feel lucky to be able to have this," she says. "And I'm doing my best to balance my dj duties with the rest of the hats I wear as well."

As program director and music director, Coleman feels it's sometimes to her advantage to have both jobs. "First of all, I get a chance to listen to all of the product and not just the

songs the md feels should get to my ear.
Plus, I get the chance to spend time with
all of the label reps and really get to know
them."

Commenting on the music which comes across her desk, she says, "I'm encouraged with what I've been hearing lately. But overall, comparing the music of today with what was being played 15 years ago, I think the labels then were probably more quality-conscious with regard to their acts than today.

Hogan started with WNER less than a year ago, first doing weekends, then moving to mornings and finally settling in at her air post during middays.



performers who are not true singers. The advances we've made in recording studio technology is part of the reason, but I also feel there was a certain mind-set coming out of the '70s and continued through the '80s which put less emphasis on the creative side of the recording business in favor of the bottom line, which was profits. I'm hoping that this current infusion of 'real' singers being produced is more than just a passing thing and that we're going back to putting a priority on quality artistry.

"I'm also disturbed that only a select few producers are getting the plum jobs, at

the expense of other qualified, but lesser known producers. What we're beginning to hear are different artists, but the same sound. I think the labels should take that into consideration when selecting producers for projects.

Overall, Coleman remains optimistic about the music industry and her role in it. "I'm so glad I got the chance to become involved with such an exciting industry. And I'm glad I've been able to move into a position where I can actually make a difference and affect people. The future of the radio business is bright, and I hope to continue to help make a difference."

by storm when she dominated and won the club's talent show, and the club which provided the impetus for the film "Krush Groove." Nayobe was immediately signed to Abbatiello's Fever Records and in 1985 released her first single. "Please Don't Go." The song. featured on the "Krush Groove" soundtrack, not only became the No. 1 dance record in the New York tristate area and Canada, but it found its way to the top of Florida's dance charts as well

"But I must also thank radio programmers," Nayobe says, widening her eyes and smiling. "I appreciate their support because those who were playing I Love the Way You Love Me' in the beginning were taking a big risk. I'm glad that they had enough faith because who's to say that the song wouldn't have been a flop?

"I guess quite a few good things have been coming my way recently," she continues. "It was a miracle we were able to get Teddy Riley to contribute to this album."



Her self-titled album went on to generate five top 10 dance hits, including "Please Don't Go," "Second Chance For Love," "Good Things Come to Those Who Wait" and "I Guess I Fell in Love."

Now comes *Promise Me*, Nayobe's debut on WTG/Epic. The first single, "I Love the Way You Love Me" has already found its way into black radio's top 20. Though she says Billie Holiday provided early inspiration, Nayobe sometimes reflects the vocal quality of labelmate and later inspiration Teena Marie.

Let there be no mistake—however. Nayobe may have already arrived. It was no easy task switching from dance music to R&B. As a matter of fact, the production perfection of Teddy Riley, Mic Murphy and David Frank (a.k.a. the System), and Les Pierce and Frankie Blue (of Louie Louie and Earth, Wind & Fire fame) is what helped give this project the urban push that she and the label were looking for.

Ironically, when Nayobe was recording dance cuts for her first LP on Fever, Teddy Riley and Keith Sweat, as a songwriting team, went to Fever with the intent of contributing songs to her album. When the duo found out that the label was only interested in more dance music, the two shopped their ideas and eventually found success elsewhere.

Fortunately enough, this album has allowed Nayobe to attain an even higher achievement-success on a national, not just a regional, level. Perhaps that's because there weren't as many obstacles this time around, not as much hard work. Yes, there are still the club dates and the travel, but those are only to help perfect the craft, to hone her skills for what has yet to come. With plans to venture into Latin music, one can only wonder what heights Nayobe will achieve as she takes on the task of fulfilling yet another of her musical dreams.

It was while performing one night in such a club that two djs and impresarios-to-be, Matt Dike and Michael Ross, first saw Kenyatta. They were impressed with the way he stirred the crowd with his lively act.

After meeting Ross and Dike, Kenyatta decided to teach himself to play keyboards and the drums. It was also during this period that his songwriting talents began to flourish, to the extent that rival record labels were lining up to sign him.


Kenyatta claims that what swayed him toward Delicious Vinyl was "the instant rapport" that he had with Ross and Dike. Also, Delicious Vinyl was looking for a new artist with definite '70s appeal to boost an already successful label. When Kenyatta heard that, it was only a matter of time before he
