CHANGING FOR THE FUTURE

hange is part of the natural order of things. As we grow older, the way we look and behave changes. Sometimes the changes are made of our own accord, like becoming more conservative in attire or adopting a more flattering hairstyle. But sometimes we have virtually no control over changes, like losing a step or two when engaged in physical recreation, or gaining undesired pounds in certain spots.

There is another type of change—one that involves the improvement of our people. The wisdom and insight we acquire with age should be used to change the condition of our society.

History has shown us that the blunders of the past repeat if the lessons of the time are not learned and steps taken to avoid them. Education seems to be one recurring theme which crops up time and again.

How many times has it been proven that knowledge is power? The old Southern plantation owners knew this and kept their slaves illiterate. The slaves finally realized this too and learned to read, gaining mighty force which later generations would use in their fight for freedom.

When people say that a little knowledge is a dangerous thing, what they mean is that it can change the way things are, especially when it comes to the oppressed. The establishment likes it when they are the only ones in the know. "It's good for the stability of things," they say. But is it good for all people or just "their thing?" I think we all know the answer to that.

The more we educate ourselves in the business of music, the better the position we are in to control our destiny. One important aspect of this is the changing of our children's attitudes about how life is, with regard to how they perceive the music industry. We must prepare our young ones for the struggle they must endure to reach the goals they set. We must let them know by showing them that there are career options on the business side of music, in addition to the creative side with which they are more familiar.

If our people are to excel, and not simply survive, we must continually present visible and accessible black role models for our children to identify with. Only when we show them that it can be done and that it has been done will things change. \square

Wilson Receives Star

Nancy Wilson's long, lustrous career was celebrated in weekendlong honors this month, culminating in her installation on the Hollywood Walk of Fame.

Wilson performed at the Wiltern with Carl Anderson. She was honored at an after-party sponsored by KACE-FM radio station and Coors Lite.

Monday afternoon the celebration was continued with Wilson's star presentation, and a plaque and a scroll proclaiming Oct. 1 as Nancy Wilson Day. Arsenio Hall, who credited Wilson with starting him in show business-Mayor Tom Bradley, State Senator Diane Watson and Councilman Michael Woo were among those in attendance as she received her star on the Walk of Fame. Bill Welsh, president of the Hollywood Chamber of Commerce, was master of ceremonies with John O. Adams, chairman of the board, officiating. Wishing to show their appreciation as well, CBS Records presented the singer with the Golden Mike Award. Most unexpected, though, was the "Then & Now 1990" trophyshowing a picture of the songstress in 1964 and nowpresented to Wilson by photographer Joe Smith.

There is no doubt that CBS Records, the Hollywood Chamber of Commerce, Woo, Bradley and Smith were looking to the past with Wilson as they honored her for outstanding achievements in the music industry, specifically, and the entertainment industry in general.

Wilson's first wave of success began in 1963 with the big hit "Tell Me The Truth." Other hits included "(You Don't Know) How Glad I Am." "I Wanna Be With You," "Peace Of Mind," "Can't Take My Eyes Off Of You" and "I've Never Been To Me." Later the songstress ventured into television appearing in such television shows as "Hawaii Five-O," "The Carol Burnett Show" and "The Sammy Davis Jr. Show" as well a her own Emmy Awardwinning "The Nancy Wilson Show" in 1975.

Black Radio

The term alone is segmented, off to itself. It's difficult to imagine any other medium with a greater responsibility. The average black radio exec must sometimes look into the mirror and ask if he or she mistakenly ran and was elected into local political office, considering the assorted pressures. ("Hey babe, I'm not your councilman, I play music.") Pop radio, they must reason, seems comparatively simple: wear the absolute grooves off 10 records from the national Top 40, throw in rambunctious air personalities who give away ridiculous sums of money and prizes to audiences that get a sadistic kick out of hearing jocks wake up total strangers by phone on the air and they've got a success

Truth be told, black radio is everyone's favorite whipping boy. Shockmeisters and hustlers posing as "artists" make lousy records and blame black radio for not playing them. Of course, if those records are played, then black radio is blamed for unravelling the fabric of society. (What isn't mentioned is that society has been wearing polyester for a long time, anyway.) Community leaders argue that black radio should give the community what it wants; black radio replies that it is giving the community what it requests—Bell, Biv, DeVoe on the hour, every hour. Scholars say there should be more newscasts dealing with black people on black radio; cynics ask just how many reports of crack busts one can endure in one week? Artists blame record company A&R people for

It is certainly true that black radio could be more adventurous in the composition of playlists. Would there be any room on today's airwaves for Donny Hathaway's insightful Extensions Of A Man LP? Is there any place for Tracy Chapman and Living Colour today? The true black artist is locked in a stranglehold—unable to express himself for fear of no airplay— and ultimately it is the audience that suffers. A radio man in Atlanta insists black radio is taking a bum rap on this. "Granted, playlists are tight all over, but listen to the stations-We aren't all playing the same 10 records. We're playing to our audiences. We're playing oldies, LP cuts. Black radio does have to diversify to meet the

needs of the people. The change is slow.

In the final analysis, we all have to agree that black radio has always been there. For better or for worse, it seems to do the best it can under the circumstances. Hey, some communities never heard BBD until the record went pop—they have no black music frequencies. Long live black radio. A good thing can only get better.

Black radio, on the other hand, has always been endowed with a heavier role "Neighborhood Beckon" and "Voice Of The People" are just two wellworn podium phrases that immediately come to mind. And, here are those words: Responsibility. Community. "Negroes In The News." If Superman's secret identity was that of a radio programmer instead of a newspaperman, even his shoulders would grow weary of the weight. Nevertheless, the responsibility is real and so is the need. Even in the video age—especially in the video age-black folks still look to black radio for more than just music. Or at least they should be able to. Any wellmeaning black radio executive already knows this.

signing soundalikes. A&R says their promotion people can't get anything played that doesn't resemble the *last* No. 1 and promotion points to black radio, which in turn points to phone lines filled with Bell, Biv, DeVoe requests. Black radio is damned if it does, damned if it doesn't.

Black community leaders have a point, but perhaps the needs of our community are just a bit more complicated now than when the **Magnificent Monique** fanned the fires of the L.A./Watts riots with the now-famous cry, "Burn, baby, burn!" We've got gangs now. We've got the homeless. We've got rampant substance abuse. Black radio is reaching out, but black radio can't do it alone. It's tough to program entertainment around the





The Meeting Coming Together



Four of the best known figures in jazz together form the act called The Meeting. Alphonso Johnson, Patrice Rushen. Ernie Watts and Ndugu Chancler have finally put together a joint recording project after years of working together. The result is *The Meeting*, a GRP Records release.

"It's something we've always planned on doing," says Rushen. "We've been working together for eight years, and we thought it was about time to put something on vinyl."

The whole idea for The Meeting came about because of a production company that was putting on a concert and wanted a name act featuring name jazz performers. "It was 1982 and Festival Productions wanted a sort of 'stars of the '80s band." says Chancler. "Once we were together, we played the Playboy Jazz Festival, the Berkeley Jazz Show and the Kool Jazz festivals in New York, Pittsburgh, and Philadelphia."

From that experience, the group found that they really enjoyed playing together as a quartet. "We had all played with each other in one form or another at different times, but this was a chance to

remain together and do some very interesting things. Because of the encounter, we ended up going on tour together. It was a tremendous experience," says Chancler.


The Meeting is described as a collective effort that allowed each group member the opportunity to explore new territory that a solo career may not have afforded him or her. "I am so glad we could do this project," says Rushen. "When you have a solo career, many times you're not given the chance to try new things. Sometimes the label executives feel that changing your sound or trying something different interferes with the 'relationship' a performer has established with her

"Personally, I feel everyone should be allowed to stretch and grow, but in the real world this is not always possible. So when I had a chance to work with The Meeting, it was like a dream come true. I'm in a position now where I can do my solo thing plus work in another direction with my music by virtue of The Meeting."







Naturally, he continued to sing in church. The roots were strong, from his preacher father, who also sings. His mother plays piano. His uncle is Johnny Fields of the Blind Boys of Alabama.

teen years but his big opportunity came through happenstance, as it is wont to do. The Manhattans were in town and needed to augment their sound equipment with some local gear. Alston's was available. Group members just happened to go along to pick up the equipment at the moment Alston was singing. When he broke and walked to the water fountain, he was approached with an offer that would forever change his life.

year of college, but Alston quit to join the Manhattans. "It wasn't as easy a choice as you might think. I knew if I left school, I was putting my feet on a road where there was no turning back. I would have to travel forward on that road," he remembers.

And for the next 17 years,
Alston learned about all the bumps
along the road. Happily for him, he
had the guidance of the seasoned members
of the group, and perhaps more importantly
for him, he listened to their advice.

"I'm a humble person. That's not to say I let people take advantage of me. I do stand my ground when I need to, but I also know the value of listening. It was time to be humble when I found myself sharing stages with the most important performers of our time—Diana Ross and Marvin Gaye—and here I was just a kid."

Free didn't know he'd stay with the group for so long. "I told them when I joined that I wanted a solo career and I guess I could have gone out on my own in 1977 instead of 1988, but I had to make certain the timing was right."

The years were good. Smash hits came to the group with the young lead singer—"Kiss and Say Goodbye," "It Feels So Good To Be Loved So Bad," "Shining Star" and half a dozen others.

out by accepting Bill Dem's invitation to join his newly-formed label as its first artist. "It was a strong debut LP," says Alston. "We had success with Take Me Where You Want' and 'I Can't Tell You Why.' It did what it was supposed to do. Before this people said, 'Oh, I know you, you're the lead singer of the Manhattans.' Now they see me and say, 'Oh, I know you, you're Gerald Alston.'"

his LP has Gerald headed in the right direction. He's one of the finest voices ever, in a class with Marvin Gaye and Sam Cooke, and he has that same quality of love. These days, so much music is denigrating to women and here is Gerald Alston passionately singing to women that they are special, perfect and to be cherished."

Alston adds, "I was given some great songs to sing and there's no doubt I'm singing them to the ladies. I can even help out the guys who want to talk to a woman—this album can get a point across."

The first single is "Slow Motion," produced by Stan Sheppard and Jimmy Varner, who also produced the debut LP. In this song, the mindset is that of a lover so desperately in love that she "makes my body come alive/And I feel the need to tell you why."

The programmers love this single. Typical enthusiasm is evidenced by Tori Turner of WIZF/Cincinnati who said, "Here is a smash right out of the box. His last project was great, but this one is soulful and just as smokin". The older females call constantly for this one. I

guess they know a good thing when they hear it."

Alston wanted Sheppard and Varner as part of the producing team for the LP, which includes Levi Seacer Jr. and James Carmichael. "Stan and Jimmy did such a wonderful job producing my first album, I just had to have them back." The duo also produced "Getting Back Into Love" and "Don't You Know." The latter shows Alston's vocals against Gerald Albright's wonderful sax lines creating a warm, sensual tune perfect as a mood setter.

The duet with Brenda Russell is a great collaboration. "It was an honor to do this song

with Brenda. She's a great artist. She has a unique style and the chops to deliver it. I love the way she sings and I loved singing with her."

On the chops tip, Steve Lukather, the brilliant Toto guitarist, is also heard on this cut.

"Tell Me," plus "I'll Go Crazy,"
"Still in Love" and "Never Give Up"
were produced by Carmichael, whose
name has been seen on major
Motown albums since he and a young
group of musicians called the
Commodores first went in the studio.
He also helped shape Lionel Richie's
solo recordings and those of Atlantic
Starr. Working in the studio with
Carmichael "was really comfortable,"
Alston confides. "He is truly a
singer's producer. He instinctively
knows not only what but when a
singer should sing."

It seems that Alston likes to throw in a classic tune on his albums. The first was the Eagles' "I Can't Tell You Why." On this album it's that Chuck Jackson standard "Any Day Now." Alston chuckled as he pointed out, "I'll bet you didn't know that 'Any Day Now' was written by Burt Bacharach! I remember this song

from my childhood—we just added a more up-tempo feel to it."

"Everybody at Motown thinks this is a great collection of songs from a great singer," says Jheryl Busby, president/CEO, Motown Records. "From the reaction at black radio, they think so too. We're looking for Gerald to top the charts."

Sammie Jordan, WMHG, Muskegon, MI, says, "Oooh Wee! This is one of those songs you put on when the lights are low and the mood is right. The ladies are calling in like crazy for this one. Guess what, the fellas are calling too. I guess the song has a strong romantic impact on women and men." It would seem the music of Gerald Alston is an *Open Invitation* that people everywhere are accepting. □

KEVIN FLEMING

Covering The Basics




s new vp, black music, Island Records, Kevin Fleming's career has been on the fast track in terms of his tenure with the company. His job titles

have changed quicker than pages on a calendar—from promotion manager to A&R director to vp in only 19 months.

As he progressed, the momentum began to build. In college, Fleming obtained jobs in the broadcast field, working on radio and television. After he completed school, he walked right into a professional radio position for WIGO in Atlanta as md and on-air personality. From there, he moved from station to station, establishing a style and reputa-

during this time that the talented programmer began to develop relationships with established vets of the radio business. With mentors such as Walt Love, Winky Simms and Bill Shear, and several close, influential friends helping, Fleming's skills as a programmer increased.

These relationships proved invaluable, resulting in his move to the major market



There's another side to this seemingly meteoric rise—that of paying dues. With grade school chums like Prince, Terry Lewis and Andre Cymone in Minneapolis, Fleming's exposure to music was inspiring. "I knew I wanted to go into radio in junior high school, but it wasn't until I was in the 10th grade that I got the chance to actually go on the radio. Once I was on, I was hooked." Beginning his music career in radio, Fleming studied broadcast management at Clark College in Atlanta.

His introduction into broadcasting led to other opportunities, one being the chance to read the community news on a commercial radio station. "I didn't get to dj, but it was a start," says Fleming.

Fleming's hard work ethic and knack for innovative programming got him noticed by people in the industry. "I was working at an out-of-the-way station in Georgia, but it was a 100,000-watter, so that gave us some range. Anyway, I programmed the station to include an interesting mix that blended our base format of R&B with carefully selected rock music. It was an innovative combination that drew the attention of a nice-sized audience."

Due to the unique programming Fleming used, the station became number one in the state on a county-to-county basis and number two in its market, behind a Country station. It was

of Los Angeles. There he programmed for several years before settling into a career on the record label side. "I was offered a position at Island in February '89, working in the promotion department. By the end of the year, I had moved to the A&R department and less than two years later, found myself working as vp of black music."

Since he's had the benefit of working in radio, promotion and A&R, Fleming is well-versed in the primary elements of the music industry. "Because of my education and experience in the business, I feel I'm in a position to make a genuine contribution to Island in my latest role as vp.



N THE ADIO

TONY GRAY Staking His Claim



ith the ever-composed demeanor that anyone who knows him is familiar with, Tony Gray continues to break new ground with regard to radio program-

ming As owner of Gray Communications, one of the largest black radio consulting firms in the country, Gray holds the key to many radio station pds' success in their respective markets.

"I would say in a nutshell that my goal is to help stations maximize their audience reach and increase their revenue potential," comments the Chicago-based consultant. Gray became a radio consultant after many successful years as a programmer. "I began in the business in 1980 as an onair personality for B-97 and reached my peak as pd for WRKS. I knew by '86 that I wanted to consult for radio stations, and that because of my experience and education, could do a decent job."

Decent is an understatement, because in the past year since he hung up his shingle, Gray has brought 15 stations into his fold, including WJLB, Detroit, KMJQ, Houston, WYLD, New Orleans; and Love 104 7, Atlanta

It was while working with Philadelphia station WUSL that he made the conscious decision to begin planning to move toward a career as a consultant. In his preparation, Gray accepted the programming job with New York powerhouse WRKS. "The plan was to exit that position a lot sooner than I did, but things began happening at the station and I didn't want to leave loose ends. So I stayed on "

Several situations that were occurring in the market—one of which included the introduction of a station (WOHT) that, because of its dance format, cut into WRKS' audience—caused Gray to remain at the station to develop and execute a plan that would allow WRKS to remain strong "You develop a lot of ties in this business and the folks at WRKS are good people. So we developed a plan and then stuck to it"

The result was a station with sturdy ratings and a respectable position in the market. Discussing problems that he usually finds with radio stations that are in need of programming guidance, Gray says, "I think the most common problem with floundering stations is ineffective promotions and marketing strategies. The stations have no clear-cut focus on whom their consumer base is. Not enough research is conducted.

"The first thing I do when I come into

a station that requests my assistance is objectively assess the strengths and weaknesses of its on-air product. I obtain a background history on its promotion and marketing strategy, and I take a close look at what, if any, research it is conducting."

Gray was upbeat on the topic of the state of black radio today. He feels that the '80s realized a transition for black stations into sort of a 'modernization' era. "That was the decade that black radio came into its own. We began obtaining the technology and research techniques that were available."

The talented programmer also balks at the school of thought that says black radio is in danger of becoming obsolete due to the growing number of "Churban" stations attempting to penetrate traditionally Urban audiences. "I'm convinced that a solidly programmed station that also has a commitment definitely has an advantage over other formats.

"The black community has a unique bond with black radio and turns to it with much more enthusiasm and loyalty than other listeners do to their own favorite formats."

WALR in Atlanta is Gray's most recent programming project. Formerly a general AC station, it has been transformed into an AC with a more focussed format. "We describe it as 'Love songs, with a touch of jazz.' The primary objective of the move is to create a broader audience base—large enough to achieve a profit."

With the growing number of black-owned or Urban-formatted stations in the country, Gray's future as a programming consultant seems secure. His advice for those wishing to pursue a career in that field: "Practical experience; you must learn and understand the day-to-day operation of a relatively successful station. In addition, I'd recommend financial preparation, because moving from a salaried position to one where your compensation can fluctuate greatly can be a very sobering experience if you're not prepared."

NABOB Adopts Resolution Concerning Japanese Insults

The National Association of Black Owned Broad-casters adopted a resolution calling for the black community to respond to the latest in a long series of insults directed at the African-American community by high ranking officials of the Japanese government.

The most recent incident involved the minister of justice of Japan, who made a public statement comparing prostitutes who infiltrate a particular section of Japan with the alleged effect that African-Americans have on the property values of residential areas of the U.S. where white Americans are the dominant population. NABOB officials stated that as broadcasters, they are

particularly concerned about the uninformed statements of certain Japanese officials, particularly because the broadcast owners are highly involved in trade with Japanese companies which produce equipment used in the broadcast industry as well as companies which own music and entertainment subsidiaries.

NABOB is sending letters to the chairmen of the most prominent Japanese-owned companies involved in broadcasting, music and entertainment advising them of the concern that NABOB has about the statements of the Japanese minister of justice. The NABOB letters request that the companies specifically make public

statements disassociating themselves with comments made by the minister of justice. The letters also ask that Japanese-controlled companies state precise steps they will take to reinvest their revenues in the African-American community as an act of appreciation for the significant revenues generated by the sale of their products.

The NABOB resolution states that if favorable responses are not received, NABOB member stations will begin educating their listeners on the need to reconsider their current support of those companies and their products.

Reginald Utley, morning ap, KMAX, won the Pauline award in the category "Best Religious Announcer." The honor was bestowed on Utley at the annual awards banquet held at the Los Angeles Marriott Hotel. The Pauline awards are given to outstanding individuals in the Christian community by the ACC Community News, a local publication in Los Angeles.

WBLS Changes

Frankie Crocker was promoted to vp, entertainment and programming for Inner City Broadcasting, parent company for WBLS, New York. In this position, Crocker will interface with all of Inner City's stations, including WBLS. He will also work with the company's syndicated programs and the Apollo Theatre.

Format Database Released, Spring '90

Arbitron has released its 1990 radio database. Among some of the findings, the data indicates that despite the fact that the number of radio stations in each format has fluctuated over the past five survey periods, the audience share of the whole has remained stable, relative to stations reported

Of the 15 formats studied, 11 showed year-to-year increases, including Urban, which leaped 1.5%. All 11 formats posted a similar increase in the number of stations reporting. Urban

stations ranked third in share of listening by radio formats for the 12-24 demo (Monday-Sunday, 6 am-midnight). Black stations earned a respectable 15.8 share, coming in third, compared to Top 40 (36.8) and album rock (16.3), ranked one and two, respectively. Urban ranked sixth in share of listening by radio formats in the 12+ demo. Urban came in with a 9.1, while the formats ahead of it were Adult Contemporary (17.7), Top 40 (14.4), News/Talk (11.4), Album Rock, (9.8) and Country (9.6).

100.3 Jamz Puts Dancers On Tour

100.3 Jamz held a dance contest at a local Irving, TX, dance club to search for female dancers to tour with Vanilla Ice. Cindy Smith was one of the lucky winners. Smith immediately joined Ice, who is touring with M.C. Hammer.



The Braxtons' first taste of singing together was in the church. This was no surprise considering that their father is a minister. The sisters all


