





if you just hear her hum a phrase of music, you know it's Gladys. And when she opens up her throat and lets loose with that sweet alto, she sends shivers up and down the spine.



BMI, Lifetime Ink Deal

The lawsuits can be filed away in a drawer, under the music charts. BMI and Lifetime have agreed on a license agreement covering BMI music played on the cable channel. This follows on the heels of BMI's accord with MTV and Showtime (BRE 8/2).

What the deal does is end

all pending litigation in U.S. District Court and includes past usage of BMI music. The arrangement covers the period through June 1992, with an option to extend.

As with the MTV/Lifetime pact, neither party would reveal the terms of this agreement. BMI CEO/pres, Frances Preston did observe.

"I am pleased that we have negotiated a license for Lifetime to join the ranks of BMI's cable television licensees. I am also pleased that this brings our pending litigation to an end. This is BMI's first license agreement with Lifetime and we look forward to a long-lasting relationship."

Kravitz Sued Over 'Justify'


Singer Ingrid Chavez has sued artist/writer/producer Lenny Kravitz, in U.S. District Court, charging he defrauded her into giving up her songwriting credits for the Madonna smash "Justify My Love."

Chavez, who co-starred with Prince in "Graffitti Bridge," claims she wrote the lyrics to "Justify" in 1990. The lawsuit seeks \$50,000 in damages.

According to her attorney, Steven Kurtz, Chavez contends Kravitz talked her into giving up her songwriting credit and threequarters of her share of royalties for a \$500 advance.

Madonna's LP has sold more than 10 million copies and Chavez' royalties would likely be "in the hundreds of thousands" says Kurtz.

The lawsuit also contends a personal relationship was the reason her name was not put on the song at the time Kravitz produced the cut. "The bottom line is, based on

While actual viewer figures are not available, TNT Latin America is available to more than 700,000 households and estimates of the viewership in other countries which carry the show could project Oprah into being in 30-50 million homes on any given day. Among the 30 countries now carrying the show are France. Canada, the United Kingdom, the Netherlands, Poland, Belgium and Japan.



George Banton Woes Toronto

The recent "Soul Of Toronto" concert, featuring Keith Lyn, Kenny Hamilton, Nana McLean and George Banton, was a smash. While the audience responded

well to all the performers. it was really Banton's night. The occasion launched Banton's latest album, The Soul of Toronto Volume Two.

Six hundred music lovers, who attended the show at the Regal Constellation Hotel, were royally entertained. Opening the show was Lyn, former lead with Byron Lee and the Dragonaires. Lyn is a legendary international performer with a voice that is smooth yet powerful. He

was responsible for bringing ska (the roots of reggae) to North America.

Lyn has shared the stage with some of the world's greatest, including Bob Marley and the Wailers, Sam Cooke, Brook Benton, the Supremes, James Brown and the Drifters. He is known as a one-man band in Miami.

Lyn opened his set with Sonny and Cher's "I've Got You Babe." He also did "Lady In Red," "A Portrait of My Love," "Red Red Wine," "My Way" and "Empty Chair.'

Next it was Montreal-based Hamilton's turn to burn. This was Hamilton's first appearance in Toronto. His first song, "Personally," set the pace for a great performance. He then paid tribute to David Ruffin and sang "I Wish It Would

Rain." Hamilton covered this sona on his second album for the Toronto-based Scorpio label. But it was his rendition of "I Don't Want To Go On Without You" that brought the house down

A native of Montreal. Hamilton received a Juno nomination for his album Right Here Is Where You Belong. Hamilton's group in Montreal included notables such as Gino and Joe Vanelli. Appearing regularly at the legendary Esquire Show Bar, Hamilton and his band the Soul Masters were the opening act for performers such as Patti LaBelle, the Isley Brothers, Ben E. King, Wilson Pickett and the Young Rascals.

Following Hamilton on the micro-

phone was McLean, one of Toronto's hardest working entertainers. McLean wooed the audience with superb renditions of ballads such as Karvn White's "Superwoman," Jimmy Cliff's "Many Rivers to Cross," Bob Dylan's "Knocking At Heaven's Door" and Jennifer Rush's "Power of Love.

McLean is known primarily as a reggae performer. She was one of the first African-

Canadian artists signed to a major label, A&M, in the early '70s. She didn't let her reggae fans down that night. She had members of the audience dancing to her rendition of the reggae hit "Single Girl."

Following McLean was the headliner, Banton. The "Soul of Toronto" has a loyal following—especially among the female population. Banton opened his portion of the show with Johnny Gill's instant classic "My, My, My," This was followed with an extended version of the Chambers Brothers' hit, "Have A Little Faith."

Banton went on to perform "It May Never Be the Same," a reggae tune, "I Need a Good Woman" and "Faithful and True." The highlight of the evening was when Banton switched gears and introduced his "new jack swing" version

of Bobby Bland's "Call On Me." Banton was joined on this number by the MC. Jazze

The evening was concluded when Banton was joined by Lyn, McLean and Hamilton as they sang Bob Marley and the Wailers' "One Love." The music for the show was provided by The Soul of Toronto (TSOT) Rhythm Section, featuring Eddie Bullen, keyboards; Reggae Paul, guitar; Roy Garrett, drums; and Dean Jarvis, bass.

The show was organized by S.I.G.H.T. Productions, under the direction of Winston Clarke.

There will also be a chance to appreciate and participate at this year's WOMAD. Informative, exciting WOMAD workshops feature musical instruments, dance and voice. Among those conducting sessions will be Ethiopia's Seleshe Damessae.

The Reel World Film Series returns to WOMAD with international animation. music and political documentary, features and children's films. Among the highlights are Marian Kaplan's Songololo, featuring dub poet Mzwakhe Mbuli; the mythical animation of Ishu Patel; and films by Jacques Holender, director of "Musicians in Exile."

Among the most talked about up-andcoming performances will be Ancestral Spirits, from the United States. The New York City-based ensemble features David Robeson, grandson of the cultural giant Paul Robeson. Robeson will bring his drums, dance and acrobatic stilt-walking troupe. 375

U.S. And U.K. Artists Working Together

Here's more proof of the coming together of the U.S. and U.K. music industries: British dance duo Nomad, which is currently riding high on the U.S. charts with its dance smash "I Wanna Give You Devotion," has chosen Detroit techno wizard Kevin Saunderson of Inner City to remix its followup single, "Something Special." International artistic exchanges such as these are expanding black music and exploding it all over the globe.

The financial problems of London's Jazz FM, a 24-hour jazz radio station, seem to be over. The company has been given a much needed \$2 million cash injection with the take-over of the company by the management of Classic FM. The takeover of Jazz FM by Classic FM comes at a price, however. Classic has already stipulated the terms of the agreement to the Jazz station by drawing up, as one of their first moves, a policy which forces program controllers

Congratulations are in order for **Heavy D. And The Boyz** as their latest single, a cover of "Now That We Found Love," is inching its way steadily to the top of the U.K. charts. The cut, currently their biggest U.K. hit, is holding the No. 2 position on the national charts while still having increased its panel sales over the figure it achieved last week (in other

words, it's No. 2 with a bullet). This cut has charted above **Third World**'s version, which peaked at No. 10 on the British charts in 1980. The song, originally an **O'Jays** track on the group's *Ship Ahoy* LP in 1973, has now gone through three chart-stomping musical transitions: the song started life as a soul song, went on to become a reggae song (in Third World's version), and has now become a hip-hop, swingbeat boogie. The only thing standing in the Boyz'

way currently is Canadian Bryan Adams' ballad "Everything I Do (I Do It For You)."

'Meanwhile, also doing well on the U.K. charts, **C+C Music Factory**'s "Things That Make you Go Hmmm" climbs three places to No. 4. It's the third U.K. Top 5 national hit for **C+C** Music Factory featuring **Freedom Williams**, so they are now in the category of international celebrities in U.K. terminology.

Despite the success of the singles on her debut album, the tremendously popular **Paula Abdul** has got to ask herself what she's done wrong. Her current hit "Rush, Rush" has stalled at the No. 6 national chart position for three weeks now. Despite efforts by her record company, through advertising and so on to push the record to the top (a position which Abdul has notched three times in the U.K.), "Rush, Rush" insists on taking its time. As does **Lisa Lisa & Cult Jam**'s "Let The Beat Hit 'Em," which finds itself at No. 17 for the second week running.

But if you think that Abdul and Lisa Lisa are perplexed. think what M:C. Hammer must be going through. His single, "(Hammer, Hammer) They Put Me In the Mix,' stormed onto the charts in typical Hammer style last week, opening at No. 20 on the charts. It looked like the single would be his first No. 1 hit since "U Can't Touch This" last year. But alas, that wasn't to be. Before the Hammer-man was able to scream about them putting him in the mix, his single had slipped over the week to the No. 21 position.

New York veteran DJ Frankie Knuckles has every reason to smile. His dance track, "The Whistle Song," has become the sort of club anthem that Crystal Waters' "Gypsy Woman" recently became in London clubland. Knuckles' track is the first chart hit from the DJ as a solo artist, however, he has been featured several times on the U.K. charts as a producer and re-mixer.


Watch out for the first solo single by the original Soul II Soul lady, Rose Windross For real Jazzie B. aficionados, you already know that Windross was the classic, sultry, purring, soul voice that sang on Soul II Soul's debut single "Fairplay." Alas, "Fairplay" did not achieve the same sort of chart hysteria as the group's follow-up singles "Back To Life" and "Keep On Movin'. ("Fairplay" peaked just outside the Top 40 in 1988.) Windross, who wasn't picked to become one of the Soul II Soul frontline divas and subsequently left the group, has been keeping herself busy by running the underground dance club Yum Yum at the Soho Theatre.

With so many ladies in the running for the dance crown, here's one for N.W.A. "Ladies With An Attitude" is the debut single from house artists **Epitome** Of Hype. Maybe they're trying to tell L.A.'s chart topping gangsta rappers that they know how they did it! Also back continued on page 42





she'd been away too long, and auspicious beginnings not withstanding (she'd certainly had that benefit), most were curious as to what that inimitable voice would bring to bear the third time out.

It had been some five years since her self-titled debut LP in 1986 yielded the No. 1 R&B smash "As We Lay," and still three years since she followed it up with that other chart-topping single, "Husband," in '88. Those songs, signature Murdock pieces, caught the ear of the music world, as much for the uniqueness of Murdock's sound as for their risky subject matter.

Their success gained Murdock a national audience and the implicit, if ever present, challenge to deliver a third album with that "just right" single that would edify the first two, and add another chapter to the love story Murdock had been singing.

Now, with her third Elektra LP. Let There Be Love, Murdock takes up the challenge easily. It's an album full of love songs, naturally, and the themes are as strong as ever. But this time, Murdock is taking a bigger hand in what she has to say and sing. She co-wrote and produced six of the 10 cuts and she says the message has come full circle. "I think this album holds the whole message, from songs about the beginning stages of a relationship, to love of your fellow man, even to love of the future, which is our children."

The first single off the LP, "In Your Eyes," brings the flavor of "As We Lay" and pledges a commitment to love in its chorus: "In your eyes I see kindness, honesty, patience...I see love. "Eyes" is already looking to duplicate the chart success of the other two Murdock songs. And when positioned with "As We Lay" and "Husband," it may well serve to round out a Murdock trilogy of standard torch songs.

Writing "Eyes" with her husband Dale DeGroat was a natural progression, says Murdock. "I'd experienced a lot of growth in my thinking and in relationships, from the first album to this one. The album couldn't help but take on more of me."

The title track brings an uptempo beat to lyrics that address the problems of the down-

trodden. "It talks about lending a hand to those less fortunate and staying conscious of their struggle," says Murdock. "The beat is funky, and that will capture the attention first. But the message will hook you too." The album also gives full vent to Murdock's gospel background and let's her riff through a few jazz-inspired numbers as well

Murdock says her mentors were all very vocal people—




Stevie, Gladys and her all around favorite, Aretha, "because of her gospel influences." But she names wild and crazy writer/producer/entertainer Roger Troutman as the one who showed her the ropes of the business. "I went straight from the choir stand to singing back-up for Zapp featuring Roger. He produced my first record and when I had to tour, Roger sent his band out with me."

invaluable tenet from Troutman. "He taught me about having a serious appreciation for the fans.

"It was a family type thing" with Roger and Zapp, says Murdock. And while she was being groomed to take the spotlight, her Zapp connection was evolving into a permanent family affair. Troutman has since produced all three Murdock LPs. And her husband, an original continued on page 44

IVORY'S NOTES

Tony Haynes: Fastest Songwriter In The West

Tony Haynes just has one of those names. If you're an LP liner note freak, his is a moniker you see all the time and wonder, "Who is this guy?" However, to the R&B music community—artists, writers, producers and A&R execs—Haynes is well known.

Haynes is a songwriter. In fact, he is one of the most fruitful penmen working in popular R&B. Even if you aren't immediately familiar with his name, you certainly know the recipients of his talents: Al Jarreau; Keith Washington; Stephanie Mills: Earth, Wind & Fire: Robert Palmer; Karyn White: Troop: Tracie Spencer: Howard Hewett and the Whispers are just some of the names that

have recorded Haynes' work. Other writers, like **L.A.** and **Babyface** or **Jimmy Jam** and **Terry Lewis**, may be better known, but not even they are as productive as Haynes. The guy has some 1,600 compositions, 60 of them recorded this year alone.

"I don't know how it happened that I stockpiled that many titles," says Haynes. "I just started writing, and the next thing I know, I've got all these songs."

There is a method to Haynes' madness, however. There are at least two reasons for his ability to get so many songs recorded. Number one, as a lyricist, he writes with either the artist, the songwriter or the producer—anyone who already has access to a definite project. Number two, he's fast. In fact, the velocity with which Havnes can crank out a lyric-a good lyric-is one of his main strengths. "I remember when I was just trying to get something happening," says Haynes. "I'd walk up to an artist and say, I'm a songwriter and I want to write with you.' Then, I'd say, 'Give me a word-any word-and I'll come up with a rhyme around it, right here on the spot.

"I'd do it and they'd say, 'Here's my number, man. We gotta write together."

The biggest single Haynes has had is

Jeffrey Osborne's "She's On The Left," which went No. 1 in 1988. His success lies more in the bulk of his catalog and the amount of albums on which his work is included. "You never know who's going to have a hit record," he reasons. "The songwriter doesn't have any control over what is released as a single, but if I'm on a hit album, that's very profitable." Haynes' work has appeared on some 18 gold and platinum albums.

However, Haynes, who got his first cover back in 1981 with a thing called "Send A Little Love" on the Spinners' Can't Shake This Feeling LP, doesn't simply want to visit Tin Pan Alley; he wants to own it. That's why, in addition to writing songs, Haynes runs three companies-Haynes Entertainment Group encompasses Haynestorm Music publishing, HEG Records/Groove Asylum Productions and HEG video. (As a writer, Haynes is signed to PolyGram Music.) Indeed, Haynes' biggest payday in the music business has been as a publisher—an HEG writer, Gordon Jones, co-wrote with Bobby Brown "I Really Love You Girl," a song featured on Brown's MCA LP, Don't Be Cruel, which has sold some eight million units worldwide

Haynes has offices in Hollywood and oversees a three-person staff. Laney Stewart, his co-writer and production

partner, oversees the Groove Asylum recording studio and a staff of seven in Chicago. "When it comes to music, he's my right-hand man," says Haynes of Stewart, "Just an incredibly talented individual."

Haynes says his goal is to "do the Geffen thing on the black side. We have plans for film and video production and record production." Haynes recently teamed with music business impresario Joe Isgro, and the two have plans for a major-distributed label. "The problem with blacks in music," says Haynes, "is that we're into the art but not into the business. They don't call it music art, they call it music business. We need to know more about controlling what is ours."

He credits another entrepreneur, producer **Terry Lewis**, with persuading him to plunge ahead with his dreams. "I was trying to get people to invest in my plans, and Terry said, 'Do you believe in it?' I said, 'Of course I do.' And he said, 'Then invest in yourself and forget the other people.' That was some of the best free advice I ever got from anyone."

Songwriting still remains the heart of activity for Haynes, who says he usually awakens, writes from 6 a.m. to 9 a.m., heads to the office and is back home in time to write again from 7 p.m. to

second Warner Bros. album. When she's

finished here, Karyn will zip across town to her manager's Hollywood office, where she'll discuss some changes in the video for the album's first single, "Romantic." "I learned the first time around that with videos, it's all in the editing," she says.

Indeed. Someone should edit some more time into Karyn's busy schedule. As it is, don't pay any attention to that woman behind the curtain; its only Karyn White, doing double-duty as both the star and the huffing, star-making machinery that makes the magic.

It's just that Karyn smells blood. It's been four years since she made her solo debut, setting herself apart from that period's onslaught of dance divas with a platinum-plus, self-titled 1988 album and a year-long international tour that confirmed that her talent is live, as opposed to Memorex. And now, with *Ritual*, White is closing in for the kill.

If Karyn's initial foray onto the national charts was routine enough—before her L.A./Babyface hits "I Love The Way You Love Me" and "Superwoman," she was the voice of Jeff Lorber's 1986 hit "Facts Of Love"—then continued on next page

"I think that shows that they (Jam and Lewis) are open," says Karyn. "A lot of the songs started out as jam sessions.

The other writers and producers were honored to work with Jam and Lewis and J & L's attitude was like, 'Hey if it works, let's do it.' They weren't even supposed to do as much as they did on the record, but they heard things and got excited. They listened to my ideas and let me get involved all the way, which I appreciate. I think I'm a better singer on this album as well; I've learned from people like Luther Vandross that's it's more about feel, instead of all those 'star searchin' notes. I'm proud of what we came up with."

For White, born and raised in Los Angeles, the ritual of stardom began early with beauty learned early on that this is a business'

pageants, dance lessons and a premonition early on that she was destined to go places. "When I was in the 11th grade, I quit cheerleading because I felt like all the screaming was damaging my voice. The other kids looked at me like I was crazy—'What? Your singing voice?'—but I always thought toward the future. I came up listening to Stevie Wonder, the Isleys, O'Jays, people like that, and I was attracted to people who entertained, not just sang. That's still my aspiration today, to do a little of everything well."

N THE BEGINNING, White knocked on virtually every door. She auditioned for plays and musicals. She did session work. By the time she got the gig singing "Facts Of Love" on Lorber's Warner Bros. album, she toured as a background singer for O'Bryan and even auditioned for the slot in Shalamar continued on page 45





The beach party was fun as people danced in the sand to the beautiful sound of music filling the air. The bands were full of energy as they played reggae rhythms, with each band doing their own thing.


The show kicked off with a fashion show, complete with bikinis, which all the men loved. After that excitement died down, things got down to business, music business.

The next four days would prove to be an endurance test for even the most fit body. Each night started at 9 p.m. and lasted until 10 a.m. the next day!

The second night's theme was Caribbean. They had groups from Trinidad, Antigua, Barbados and Jamaica. Calypso and ska seem to be the new craze in Jamaica, as people danced the night away and seemed to truly enjoy these groups.

One act in particular that was a big hit with the crowd was a group from Trinidad who called themselves Taxi. They have a hit song in Jamaica right now called "Five Cent, Ten Cent, Dollar," which is also the new dance craze in Jamaica. Other groups to perform were: Vision, from Antigua; Sygnacha, from Barbados; Morvin Brooks, from Jamaica; and Soul Swinger Disco, also from Jamaica. One thing is sure about reggae music fans: they don't play. If they like you,

LTD. Their security system was great, they kept everything and everyone in order. I'm happy to report there were no fights during this year's concert.

Another outstanding performance was given by a band from Japan, P.J., who played quite a mixture of reggae, funk and Jazz. Spice & Co. tore up the stage with their show. Being from Barbados, their unique sound included reggae, calypso and ska. The mixed crowd of reggae fans loved every minute of their show, especially the lighting.

The audience seemed to get louder as Pato Banton and the Itals

each had good sets. But the real show stopper came in the early morning hours as Gregory Isaacs and the Roots Radix took over the stage. This romantic reggae singer had the women standing on their tired feet to get a good look at him and perhaps to even hear better. He did songs like "Getting Out Of My Range," "African Woman," "Don't Wanna Be Lonely Tonight" (which was a real crowd pleaser), and "Who's Gonna Pay The Consequence." Issaes brought in the new day and ended the concert to standing ovations. This was the true marathon, with the concert going on till 11 a.m.

One of the best shows of the week was Thursday night—Dance Hall Night. It seemed like everyone came out for this

Barky & Wickerman, Lovindeer, Singing Melody, Johnny P., Pinchers, Capleton, Reggie Stepper, Wayne Wonder and Tony Rebel. They saved the best for last with Cutty Ranks, Tiger and Papa San.

One sad note: Ninja Man was not there due to an arrest back in the States. Yellowman was the last DJ to perform. His act was really funny because throughout the show, most of the DJs who came on stage before him kept

rappin' about his broken jaw bone. When he came on stage he was making jokes about the other performers saying, "All they want to do is talk about me jaw, dem need to worry 'bout demselves more than me, mon." Once again it was a long night, with this one ending at 10:30 the next morning.

All the lovers came out for Singer's Night. Everyone was feeling irie as the first band took the stage. The Home T Band did a good job at getting the crowd on its feet and ready to party. Next up was a female singer (the only one on the show) Chevelle

Franklyn. She showed how sweet the Jamaican voice can sound, all the men loved her act. Next was the great singing duo who sang on Dennis Brown's latest single "Poison," Brain & Tony Gold, who had the females eating out the palms of their hands as they sang so sweetly about love and relationships.

The next three acts were just the tip of the iceberg—Ed Robinson, Coco Tea and Bloodfire Posse were all great. But the real show stopper was Third World. They were wonderful, as the enthusiastic crowd of reggae fans came closer to the stage to get a better look at this internationally known reggae group.

ON THE ADIO

LOUISE FOSTER

Classic Soul Sista' With Substance



W

orking in Urban radio in the Los Angeles area can be quite beneficial to anyone's broadcasting career. As a major market city, L.A. is also famous for

it's tight knit group of radio professionals who have all crossed paths sometime during their careers. Louise Foster—currently with Dusties KGFJ-AM—is among the select few whose very name seems almost synonymous with the institution of Los Angeles radio.

With the exception of KACE-FM, and the now defunct KDAY-AM. Foster has worked at every other Urban station in the L.A. area. Though Foster has never programmed a station, her contribution, dedication, and hard work have been more than worth while. Well-known and equally respected by her peers, this 12-

year Urban radio veteran has also traveled extensively across the world doing promotional work for radio and getting involved with politics-related community affairs.

Foster's introduction to broad-casting—like most—surfaced while in college. She recalls, "My start in radio came about back in 1978. I was a student attending the University California at San Diego majoring in mass communication. I had always been interested in radio but never quite knew how to make the first step."

That was, of course, until she was invited by a friend to attend the *BRE* Conference held in Los Angeles that year. It was there that she met all sorts of radio and industry professionals, including Ken Harris who, at the time, was gm for XHRM-FM/San Diego. The two talked for

a while and as a result, Harris took a real liking to Foster's voice and immediately offered her a position at the station.

Foster continues by saying, "I started out doing news. Then shortly after that, a music slot opened up, so I did that for a while. We would tape the shows in San Diego, then transmit from Tijuana. I also dealt with record company reps who often kept me abreast of which stations in the L.A. area were hiring."

No sooner had Foster got wind of an opening then she began to bombard the market with air-checks and in little or no time at all, she got responses and interviews from L.A. Urban radio's big three—KJLH-FM, KACE and KGFJ. After much thought and deliberation, Foster chose to accept a position offered at KJLH. She arrived there in the latter part of '79—even before Stevie Wonder purchased the station—and stayed until 1986.

During the time Foster was at KJLH, the station went through three gms, three pds and two format changes. In the beginning the format was smooth. mellow and very sophisticated, much like the Quiet Storm format we know today. Though much unlike the existing Quiet Stormers of today, the air personalities who came out of KJLH during that time were nothing short of living radio legends. Foster adds, "I was extremely fortunate to have worked with such radio greats as Rick 'The R.H. Factor' Holmes, King Oliver, Levi 'Who Loves You' Booker, Ted Terry, Tony 'T.V. in Stereo' Valdez and Lawrence Tanter, all of whom I learned a lot from and owe a great deal to." Foster also mentions that she was the station's first full-time female announcer.

A few years following that time period, Stevie Wonder purchased the station.

on the female tip is the Cookie Crew with their latest single, "Secrets (Of Success)."

Not many people remember that the Cookie Crew was the first female rap group in the U.K. to make it on record because they have been overshadowed by current New York resident, U.K. rapper Monie Love, However, the Cookie Crew's first hit. "Rock Da House," was hot way back in 1986 (the first genuine hip-house record)

and it achieved a chart position of No. 2, which is higher than Monie Love ever achieved in the U.K. "Secrets" finds the Cookie Crew (one of whom, Suzy Q/ Susan Binfield, is sister to a couple of the guys in the Pasadenas) in production tandem with the U.K.'s premier black record producer. Dancin' Danny D.

. Sony Music's Lincoln Elias, the leading black A&R man

in the country (responsible for signing Terence Trent D'Arby, the Pasadenas, Roachford and the Chimes), has been promoted to A&R director in Sony Music's latest expansion into the European market. He will now work for Sony Soho Square, which has been formed to take into consideration the massive wealth of talent on the European continent. The new label is seen as a way of taking advantage of the breaking down of the continued on page 44

Holding true to the popular slogan "We Are You," the station became even more community involved, and Foster was right in the middle of it all. She was very instrumental in the radio contribution to Stevie's campaign to make Martin Luther King's birthday the national holiday that it is today. She adds, "I participated in two radio broadcasts for King Day. along with radio news man Carl Nelson. Words cannot express how deeply dedicated I was to the cause.

"I also became very heavily involved with reggae music during that time. The social consciousness in the lyrics was what really piqued my interest "

Between 1984 and '86. Foster traveled to Africa. Jamaica and the Bahamas doing promotional work for the station. She also worked for Armed Forces Radio. She replies, "I was finishing up a one-year contract which entailed putting together radio shows to syndicate over in the Far East, I made a few personal appearances to some of the bases over there as well."

She left the station in '86, soon after Jim Maddox took over as station gm. From there she went to KGFJ. where she's been ever since.

Foster puts together what's called the "Riddem & Reggae Show," heard every Saturday night on KGFJ from 11 p.m. to 1 a.m., and the show is in syndication on the Caribbean Broadcast Network. She explains, "My show is the only reggae program being broadcast on commercial radio in L.A. I am very proud of that fact. But at the same time. I can't help but think that black radio is missing its mark by not including more reggae music in its format. After all, reggae music is black music "

In the early part of 1990 she was on the Mandela Free/L.A. Reception Committee, which was spearheaded by Congresswoman Maxine Waters.

Throughout her career, Foster has made outstanding contributions to our community, our culture, and our race as a whole. In these trying times, her existence is an invigorating breath of fresh air, fortifying the soul of black music as the struggle continues. ∃₹E

came to the attention of some rather celebrated localsformer Time-mates Jellybean Johnson, Jimmy "Jam" Harris and Terry Lewis.

"Jellybean and our manager, James 'Popeye' Greer, told Jimmy and Terry about us," says Waddell. "They came down, saw us and liked us." Like them they did, enough to sign and release Mint Condition as the second act on their new A&Mdistributed Perspective label.

The band's debut LP, Meant To Be Mint, is a diverse mixture of wide-ranging influences. Together this sixman band calls on a full range of musical styles from rock to

jazz to R&B and injects a Minneapolis-inspired groove with just enough funk to make it real. They swing easily from hard-driving rhythms to heart and soul ballads.

Wadell says they were ready when the opportunity came. "We'd played live a lot and we'd always played all originals. Most of our material we had already tried and proven before we had to record."


