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

Rountree Suspects Charged

Three men, all age 20, have been charged with murder in the shooting death of Roderick "Kahlil" Rountree, tour manager for Boyz II Men. Two of the suspects were arraigned and bail was set at a quarter of a million dollars. The third suspect was denied bail due to previous encounters with the law.

Rountree was killed in Chicago at the Guest Quarters hotel in what was an apparent robbery attempt. He was in Chicago with the group, as part of the Hammer tour. The incident occured in the early hours of Monday morning, the night after the group had just finished a successful concert at the Rosemont Horizon.

According to Lt. Stevens, commanding officer of the Chicago violent crimes unit, Rountree was attempting to bring the suspects into the custody of the hotel's security forces when the situation took a turn for the worst. Stevens confirmed that Rountree was armed.

"Apparently they (the suspects) were causing a disturbance on the floor where Rountree and his party were staying," said Stevens. "He is a tour manager and often provides security. He was attempting to bring the situation under control when it escalated from a disturbance to a death."

Rountree's assistant, Qadree El-Amin, said Rountree was awakened about 5 a.m. by the noise of three men in the hall beating on doors. A struggle began and Rountree called for help and was assisted by El-Amin.

Quadree said, "...three guys were trying to break into his room...out of all the rooms on the floor." Rountree handled large sums of money, for cashing checks for the performers on the tour. He sometimes carried a gun due to the fact that he handled large sums of cash. "I doubt if they grabbed his," said El-Amin.

"Khalil was just explaining to me," El-Amin stated, "that he caught three guys trying to get in his room and we were going to try and take them downstairs to the security. That's when they started swinging and the firing started." El-Amin was shot in the knee.

Lawyers for the man charged with shooting Rountree have contended that their client shot Rountree in self defense. The lawyer says his client was being beaten by Rountree and fired a gun handed to him by one of the two other defendants.

Members of the group Boyz II Men said, "Khalil was more than just a tour manager. He was a father figure and friend to us." In a statement released by the Bust It organization, Hammer said, "I am shocked and outraged at the violence...and hope the responsible persons are quickly apprehended."

Funeral services for Rountree were held over the past weekend in Newark, NJ. The Hammer tour resumed on schedule in Minneapolis, minus Boyz II Men. The group is expected to rejoin the tour at a later date.

Freedom Williams Breaks From C&C; Sues For \$10 Million

Freedom Williams, performer/songwriter for the award-winning group C&C Music Factory, has filed suit in the Supreme Court of the state of New York against his former producers, their production company and the management company, charging the producers with total failure to perform their obligations under their recording contract, and failure to pay Williams the substantial publishing, recording and merchandising royalties due him, and all parties with breach of fiduciary duties.

Williams is demanding that half the publishing royalties due on songs written and performed by Williams for C&C Music Factory be paid to him directly, as well as at least one-quarter of the royalties for C&C Music Factory's first album. According to the complaint, the production company has yet to account to Williams for his recording services.

The complaint asserts that Cole and Clivilles falsely promised to promote Williams as a solo artist and thereby induced him to enter into an unfavorable recording contract, which contractually also required him to enter into management and copublishing agreements with Cole and Clivilles or someone designated by them. Once Williams was under the control of Cole and Clivilles and their various companies, they reneged on that promise and breached their contract, states the filing.

As lead performer in concert, in music videos and on television, and as co-writer of such C&C Music Factory hits as "Gonna Make You Sweat (Everybody Dance Now)," "Here We Go, Let's Rock N' Roll" and "Things That Make You Go Hmmm," Williams claims he has played a significant role in establishing the group's international success.

C&C Music Factory's debut album, Gonna Make You Sweat, was released in December 1990 and featured five songs co-written by Williams, including all three of the group's hit singles (the only C&C Music Factory recordings to achieve top 10 status on the pop singles charts). The album was certified gold in March 1991, platinum

in April and recently went triple platinum. Sales have now reached the four million mark in the U.S. alone and are approaching six million worldwide.

In live performances, Williams, along with longtime associate and choreographer Jamal Graves, also had a role in creating the group's visual image on stage and on video.

As a solo artist, Williams has now severed his relationship with Cole and Clivilles and their related management companies, and has entered into a personal management agreement with Scott Welch of Platinum Management, Inc.

Prior to recording with C&C Music Factory, Williams performed on recordings by Grace Jones, Paul Shaffer and Seduction. He scored his first crossover as lead rapper on the Crew's "Get Dumb."







Sandy Graham: Unqualified Elegance



world of music that few artists are able to create, veteran jazz vocalist **Sandy Graham** has finally debuted her solo recording project. Self-titled and on the Muse label, Graham has finally made her wonderful vocals available to the entire world.

Working primarily on the West Coast (her home is in Los Angeles), Graham has garnered plenty of credits during her busy career. She's shared audiences with some of the best name talent in the business, including the Duke Ellington Alumni, Dizzy Gillespie, Poncho Sanchez, Wild Bill Davis, Jimmy Woode, Butch Ballard and Gerald Wilson.

"I've always been a very quick study," boasts Graham, who's also garnered television music credits on programs such as "Today's FBI," "Kate Columbo," "Hawaii Five-O," "Secret Agent Boy," "Riker," and numerous others. An artist whose solo chance came after a lot of the proverbial dues-paying, Graham's first album sounds less like an introduction than most.

Coming from a musical family, Graham has always had an immense respect for the music arts. Her father was noted saxophonist and arranger Garland Graham. It was his training and nurturing that helped Sandy hone her natural vocal talents. "I was introduced to jazz at a very early age," she comments. "Because of that experience, I've been able to develop my skills in that area of music."

Two years in the making, Sandy Graham was exec produced by John Howard with Bill Wagner as line producer, and is an enlightening collection of songs that feature the work of a vocalist dedicated to the honest splendor of quality music. In the tradition of Carmen McCrae and Sarah Vaughan, Graham demonstrates a warm continued on page 42




n 800-number can be so enticing—it's a commitment-free invitation that is hard to resist. And in the case of Mike Davis, don't hesitate. Dial 1-800-888-2548 and you'll be party to the sensuous stylings of Davis' debut single on Jive, "When Only A Friend Will Do." His personal message assures you he's a friend you can lean on. Leave a message, he says, "I'll call you back."

True, it's a ladies-only marketing tool but not so with the rest of Davis' album of the same name, which is on the streets now. His smooth, commanding vocals move easily from emotion-laden ballads like "Friend" to more groove-oriented dance tunes like "Never Get Enough of Your Love" and the remake of McFadden and Whitehead's 1979 anthem "Ain't No Stoppin' Us Now."

Davis admits he's a balladeer at heart, though. "I prefer ballads because they usually communicate something you can't say. It's like a message from the heart—the song connects with feelings and emotions you have inside."

A desire to sing uplifting, inspirational music was probably nurtured early on, as Davis first started singing in church—at his mother's urging. "I liked to sing," he says, "but when I saw that it got girls, I started singing even more."

Davis' early offerings met with

approval from his immediate family and friends, but it was his first big audience experience where he caught the show business bug. Making his debut as part of the amateur night competition at the world famous Apollo Theater, Davis went on to be an eight-time amateur night winner. With a positive response there, Davis says he knew he was on his way. "The Apollo audience can be cruel," he says, "but I always got good response. After that I knew there was nothing I couldn't do."

The "Friend" single is doing well at radio, gaining steady adds in the past four weeks. Programmers in the South have been first to pick up on this smooth Quiet Storm cut, perhaps due to Davis' performance stint at southern colleges like Georgia Tech, Morehouse, North Carolina State and West Virginia.

As he waits for his inevitable shot at stardom, you'll find Davis crooning down at his usual haunts, Cafe Wha, Small's Paradise or The Baby Grand in NY. And in case you see him as heir apparent to the tradition of balladeers like Teddy, Marvin and Donny Hathaway, don't be surprised to hear his version of rock classics by the Doors, Elton John, or Elvis, or even some cabaret style singing.

Mike Davis is on a mission to entertain you and uplift your spirits with his music. Isn't that what friends are for? ⇒₹€

ENEC PROFILE

DENISE BROWN-NOEL BALANCING THE SCALES

HEN IT COMES to signing that almighty recording deal, an astute attorney is an artist's best ally. Balancing the scales and, in a few rare cases, even tipping them in the artist's favor is the ultimate goal.

As black artists become more adamant about getting their fair percentage of the pie, entertainment lawyer Denise Brown-Noel has stepped to the task. And she doesn't mind exposing a particularly Afrocentric agenda.

Noel represents Maxi Priest, Sister Souljah, Dougie Fresh, Little Shawn and a host of other artists and producers who make their homes on urban playlists. With her recent merger with the full service entertainment firm of Levine, Thall and Plotkin, Noel is not only poised to bring her artists maximum multi-media exposure but to also afford them quality representation by an African-American—a request that Noel says is on the rise.

"Black entertainers want to use black professionals," says Noel. The rationale for this "new guard" line of thinking, says Noel, is no less than a menacing reality. "A lot of youngsters are having to deal with the racism in this industry head on," she says. "They see the struggle first hand."

Noel points to her clients Sister Souljah and Leaders of the New School as just two examples of this new breed of clients who want to be surrounded by black support personnel. "The self-confidence level in the rap community is really high," she points out, "and they're not going to take the B.S. I admire that. And in fact, without that attitude, I wouldn't have been able to survive in the arena I'm in. I tell my artists all the time that I feel empowered by them.

"Souljah was one of my first clients," she continues. "She's very political

and militant and her feeling is, 'If you want to deal with me, you have to deal with my people.' "

Confidence of this sort, in an



arena dominated by white males, is not easily won. Piggybacking off her early training as a classical pianist, Noel took up music business at NYU. She leamed the ins and outs of college promo and marketing as well as A&R and administration while inteming at CBS Records International. After law school and a stint at the prestigious law firm of Minter & Gay, Noel started to develop her own practice.

On Wall Street the dues paying got heavyweight. Noel made financial history while practicing corporate law with Lewis & Clarkson, general counsel to the TLC Group, an investment company owned by millionaire Reginald F. Lewis. Noel assisted Lewis in two major leveraged buyouts, one the largest ever outside the U.S., making them two of the first blacks to be privy to such major money moving deals.

Noel admits it's no cake walk in the down and dirty world of major deal making. 'The comerstone of my practice has been

the development of new and groundbreaking talent. But once you've played A&R, and determined if it's worth becoming involved with an act, it's an attorney's obligation to be realistic," she says.

Noel says one of the biggest fallacies she encounters relates to promotional budgets. "In standard contracts there is no commitment as far as promotions dollars," she says. "It's a vital aspect of an artist's career, after recording, yet it is next to impossible to get a label to commit to a fixed dollar amount. It's a misconception, but there is no line item in the contract—especially for a new artist. It's something an attorney cannot promise an artist and it's the one thing I would change if I could."

Breaking ground in the good old boy network of the music industry takes committment, something Denise Brown-Noel has in abundance. With


her confidence and expertise, she'll have no problem tipping the scales in favor of more black on black representation. ⇒₹

All well and good for some, but it certainly doesn't show any interest in encouraging "minority" ownership if the big boys can increase their share of the pie, what with their big bucks and all....Until next time...stay focused! ■₹€

IVORY'S NOTES

The Wrath Of Khan

HEN QUNICY JONES called on Chaka Khan to sing on his Grammy Award-winning 1989 album Back On The Block, he knew exactly what he was doing. "I'll Be Good To You," the LP's first single, in fact combined three of the most important musical elements of Q's career. Though he'd already found fame as a bandleader, TV/film scorer and pop producer (Leslie Gore's '60s smash, "It's My Party"), "I'll Be Good To You" was the first hit from the 1976 Jones-produced Brothers Johnson debut A&M LP, and its success marked the beginning

of Q's legacy as a hitmaking R&B producer. Block's version of "Good..." featured Ray Charles—another Jones good luck charm, with whom, years earlier, Q had cut his teeth as an arranger—and Miss Khan.

Chaka gave Jones a hit back in 1976, with her appearance on his hit "Stuff Like That." At the time, Jones' record sales as an artist weren't what he wanted them to be, and before commencing production on the *Stuff* LP, he half-seriously mentioned that if the album didn't go platinum, he'd stop making records of his own.

That fateful night at Hollywood's Cherokee studio, Jones, engineer

Bruce Swedien and Ed Eckstine, the kid who ran Jones production company, sat in the control room as Nick Ashford and Valerie Simpson laid background vocals on "Stuff," which they'd written. A young lvory's Notes was there too, then simply eager to be anywhere music was being created.

Chaka was to come in and lay down a lead, but she was nowhere in sight.

"I don't want to finish this thing without her," Jones lamented. Ashford and Simpson had just about finished up when, as if on divine cue, Chaka walked in. She came into the control booth and offered salutations, and then went out into the studio with Ashford and Simpson. While she mulled over the lyrics, Swedien played the rhythm track from the top so she'd get the feel of the song.

After a couple of listens, she lit up the biggest unfiltered cigarette we'd ever seen and said, "Let's do it." Khan then proceeded to sing the hell out of a song she'd never heard before, as if she'd written it. From the time she walked into the studio until she finished, maybe an hour lapsed.

After the session, Jones was walking around the studio



with a big smile, hugging anyone who would submit. Notes didn't understand it, but Jones knew. In a matter of a couple of takes, he'd gotten everything his career so badly needed at that point. Chaka Khan did it again. A champagne bottle was uncorked. Photographer **Bobby Holland**, himself just a pup, recorded the moment. Chaka hung just long enough to hear the playback, and was gone.

That's the kind of singer Chaka is. She can make a song happen simply by singing it. To be sure, Khan has

endured her share of bad nights, but with a crack band and with the moon just right, we've seen her practically burn down a venue. That's why it is particularly good to see the singer with her current Warner Brothers album, The Woman I Am, a project, that from all indications, appears to be shaping up into something big. The lady's an innovator who has influenced more than a few vocalists. She deserves a hit right about now.

MEANWHILE, BACK AT THE RANCH: Some time ago in this space the question was asked whether Babyface had left the Sony-distributed Solar for his own LaFace label. Well, he has left Solar, but will record his

next solo album for Sony directly. Epic to be exact. He's shooting for an August single. In the meantime, 'Face' and partner L.A. Reid are finishing up soundtrack chores for "Boomerang," the upcoming Eddie Murphy flick directed and produced by the Hudlin brothers. L.A. and 'Face have written and produced tracks on LP participants Boyz II Men, Johnny Gill, Keith Washington and Aaron Hall and the team uses the soundtrack to introduce new LaFace artist Toni Braxton, with whom 'Face shares a duet. Other soundtrack artists include A Tribe Called Quest, P.M. Dawn, and The LaFace Cartel, which is actually LaFace acts TLC, producer Dallas Austin's group The Highland Place Mobsters and Damian Dame. Look for L.A. and 'Face to produce two new tracks on an upcoming Aretha Franklin Arista Greatest Hits package as well....What a difference a year makes: Last year, at the prestigious Kentucky Oaks races, Hammer's top filly, Lite Light, won the race, but the entertainer's brother, business partner and manager Louis K. Burrell and party were searched. This year, at the Kentucky Derby—where their horse Dance Floor came in a remarkable third—Burrell and party got a police escort everywhere they went. 375



"We were down in Westwood Village (near the UCLA campus) and happened to run into John McClain," says Coffey. "We talked with him for hours and it turned out to be a great encounter for us because the conversation was both inspiring and informative."

Following up on their encounter with McClain, Nettlesbey and Coffey surged forward in their quest for a deal. Their tenacity, not to mention ingenuity, found them again at the door of A&M Records, where McClain was working at the time.

This time, armed with a demo tape that just wouldn't quit, they cornered McClain. Recalling his conversation with the two, McClain listened. Soon, word spread about the talented new producers and their services came to be in great demand.

"Truth Inc. is one of those music acts that transcends categories," comments McClain, who is currently A&R exec for Interscope. "This recording act offers quality music that is so diverse that there's something for everyone on their debut album. It's rare to find such talented musicians and producers these days and we're happy to have Terry and Jon, as well as their incredible band, here at Interscope."

Listening to the music of Truth Inc. is a lesson in creative indulgence. Their riveting style defies traditional radio formatting because of their extreme range in genres of music. "Because we've been blessed with so many different musical experiences, we didn't want to restrict ourselves to only one style of music," says Nettlesbey.

The result of their conviction is a vibrant rainbow of sound that covers the entire music spectrum. From R&B ballads to funk to rap fused with rock, their music blurs traditional boundaries in a non-forced way. The artistic dynamics behind their work is a testament to Truth Inc.'s focussed commitment to their work and Interscope's unwavering faith that quality music will always find a home.

"We hope that radio will offer their audiences the opportunity to listen to our music," comments Coffey. "We think we've got something special and we want everyone to hear what we're all about. We're about quality music, and that's what we want to deliver."

And that's the Truth!

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

New Sony Music Disk To Debut In Fall

UST AS THE WORLD was becoming comfortable with abandoning its obsession with LPs and tape cassettes in return for the high tech conveniences of the CD, a newer and more revolutionary device is in the final stages of completion before it hits retail stores by the end of September this year. Smaller than the Walkman, and with a sound to match the compact disc, the MD (Minidisk), Sony's newest technological breakthrough, is expected to quickly capture a wide share of the teenage and young adult market of music buyers, in much the same way that the original Sony Walkman did several years ago.

The miniature diskettes are smaller in size than the CD, and are comparable not only in sound, but in price as well. Retail price for each diskette will initially average between \$12 and \$16, but is expected to drop as demand increases. While prices for the MD player have not been finalized yet, one insider confessed, "The major challenge that we face between now and the release date is to make the MD player as affordable as possible for the young

buyer because if the player is too expensive and teenagers don't purchase it, it will put a damper on the diskette sales as well. Therefore, we are trying to keep the price in the \$500 range. It's important," he continued, "that we target the teenager because they are the primary consumers of foreign and domestic music sold in Japan."

Although initial pressings of the MD diskettes will be essentially limited to popular urban and pop acts such as Michael Jackson, Mariah Carey, C+C Music Factory, Michael Bolton and New Kids On The Block, a select variety of hip-hop's most exciting groups like Public Enemy, Shabba Ranks, Joe Public, Kris Kross, Naughty By Nature and Queen Latifah will also be included. While the majority of industry analysts are predicting the future success of the MD in Japan, there are still heavy doubts about whether it will attract the same degree of customer support in the U.S., Europe and other areas of Asia

The main challenge that the MD will face in its attempt to break into the overseas market will be Matsushita's new digital tape cassette

(DCC), which will also be introduced this fall. Since the DCC is ecompatible with the analog cassette tape, music buyers will have the choice of buying the new mini-disks or staying loyal to purchasing and using tape cassettes. Another strong point about the DCC is that it will be able to record both digital and regular cassette tapes interchangeably. The MD, on the other hand, will not be compatible with tape cassettes and other digital compact disks.

Despite the fact that the DCC Deck system will be non-portable much more expensive (\$700-\$1000), and bigger in size than the MD, it has already gained undivided support from all of the six major recording labels. On the other hand, besides Sony's own music label—Sony Music Entertair ment—the only other major record label that has agreed to make its software available for the MD project is EMI Music.

Just as in the past, Sony has again chosen to stick to its instincts and play the

NAB Board Endorses FCC Ownership Rules

The National Association of Broadcasters' (NAB) radio board voted to support modifications of the radio ownership rules adopted by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) in March. The radio board adopted the following recommendations that will be made to the commission in a petition for reconsideration of the rules:

Concerning audience share and Arbitron data, the board said the use of the audience share data, as well as the use of Arbitron or any similar data, system, should be eliminated in the determination of the number of stations in a market.

It was also agreed upon that national ownership limits should be

set at 25 AM/25 FM, with a total of 30 stations allowed where the additional five stations are minority-controlled. Regarding ownership, limits should be set at 2 AM and 2 FM stations in all markets with 15 or more stations. (This system contrasts the multi-tiered approach that allowed ownership of up to 6 stations in the largest markets.)

The measures will also provide: added flexibility for small market radio broadcasters; limits in markets with fewer than 15 stations should be set at three stations, no more than 2 of which are in the same band; three commonly-owned stations cannot represent more than 50 percent of the stations in the ownership and should be included where the public interest would be furthered.

On the matter of determination of

markets, the number of stations in a market should be defined as all post-transaction commonly-owned stations plus all commercial and non-commercial stations whose principal city contours overlap any of the commonly owned stations.

"Much of the radio board's discussion centered on the needs of small market broadcasters, who, since the majority of new stations were placed in small markets, are suffering the most in this economy," said Richard Novik, radio board chairman, NAB.

"We believe these recommendations will help ensure small market radio receives maximum benefit from modification of the radio structural rules," he added.



Sherrill went on to explain, "What prompted me to take on this crusade was a seminar I did at a junior high school. I played **Harry 'Sweets' Edison** and **Oscar Peterson** for the predominantly white student body, when a 10-year-old student approached me and said, 'This jazz is much better than the jazz my daddy listens to on WNUA.'"

John Gehron, station manager of WNUA-FM, refuted Sherrill's statement by saying that BEE is not keeping up with the new sound of jazz that is now being produced. "The music that we play," Gehron said, "is the jazz for a new generation and Sherrill is right, we don't play traditional jazz music."

Sherrill stated, "We play **Betty Carter, Tony Williams**, the **Harper Brothers**, **Mulgrew Miller** and **Marcus Roberts**, artists that are performing everyday. NUA does not play these artists. Many of these artists are under 30 years old. They are artists for the future. As long as NUA uses the word 'jazz' in its promos, I will campaign to all jazz institutes and societies until they either play real jazz or drop the word."



deadly game of "winner take all," which has worked favorably in making it a global leader in the vast field of commercial electronics. However, the war about to be launched between Sony and its biggest electronic competitor, Matsushita, will perhaps be its deadliest ever. Inasmuch as Sony suffered a major defeat against Matsushita years ago when the VHS format gained mass acceptance over the Beta system, another defeat of the same

magnitude could be fatal, especially at a time when the quarterly earnings of all of Japan's major electronic companies have suffered from the effects of a slight economic downturn.

At any rate, at a time when new technologies are vital to a steady growth of jobs everywhere, the success of both the MD and DCC music systems would be the ideal cure for some of the world's economic woes.

shower of melodious notes which ring true throughout her entire album. The attractive singer brings a sensual resonance into each selection on the CD and her accompaniment provides the perfect mixture of harmony as a backdrop as she works her magical resonance.

Joining Graham on her debut are several music veterans who are also close friends. And the sincere relationship between musician and vocalist becomes immediately apparent, for the web of harmony approaches the uncanny. Kenny Burrell plays guitar, while Gerald Wiggins fingers the ivories. On the saxophones and flute is Herman Riley, and Bob West plays bass, with Harold Mason keeping pace on drums. Also joining in on selected cuts is guitarist Ron Anthony.

"This album was a collaboration and labor of love for me," she says. "Everything was done in the studio and it was recorded live. The group of people involved with this project have made the recording an experience to be remembered. The whole

thing was done with such a warmth that it was kind of sad when we were finished."

The album has been receiving critical praise by the industry and earned three pre-nominations for the '91 Grammys in three categories: Best Jazz Vocalist, Best New Artist, and Best New Composition.

As a prelude to her first album, Graham headlined a European concert tour, "Just Jazz International." The tour stopped in Germany, Italy and Switzerland. "I had a wonderful time during our tour through Europe," she recalls.

Graham's music style is straight ahead in presentation, as well as style. There are no glitzy frills attached to this package. Sandy Graham is simply a quality piece of musical artwork in the true jazz tradition that offers hours of sincere listening pleasure. It should not be missed.

Currently, Graham is in Los Angeles, preparing for her second album. On June 15 she'll be featured with Bill Berry's L.A. Big Band, performing at the Moonlight Tango Cafe in Los Angeles.

TECH TALK

THE BACK-UP STUDIO (PART 2)



AST TIME, "Tech Talk" discussed just how inexpensive and easy it can be to set up a back-up studio. Now let's take a look at actually using it in case of an emergency. Remember, all personnel should be briefed, and instructions should be posted to make the move easier, especially in the event of the absence of the chief engineer.

Creating a scenario, let's say that there is a fire in the building next door, and the fire department has requested that your building be evacuated. Naturally, the first thing that must be done is to call the chief engineer. It is a good idea to have all emergency numbers programmed

into an auto-dial phone to speed up the process of making calls during an emergency. Also, you should have an emergency priority call sheet posted in the studio.

The next problem is avoiding dead air during the transition. Remember, in Part One we discussed having a cassette deck at the remote site that can be started from a touch tone phone. Well, now is the time to fire it up. The engineer should have the system wired so that when this cassette deck is fired from the touch tone phone, the line from the studio is automatically interrupted.

Once this is done, it's time to grab as much of the music, commercial carts and CDs (and, of course, the copy book) as possible, then haul buns! Of course, in an extreme case such as this one, you may not have

time to take much with you, so it's a good idea to keep a basic music library at the alternate site. A good collection of greatest hits CDs will do just fine. If you have the copy book, you may be able to get some of the commercials on the air. In this extreme emergency you will lose some spots, but the idea is to not lose your audience. If you have the time you can pull a couple of hours worth of commercial carts.

Now, it's off to the alternate studio. When you arrive, take your time and get everything turned on and set up. When you are ready, simply stop the cassette machine and continue your show.

This scenario is assuming that the emergency happened at night or on the weekend, but as you know this type of thing can happen at any time. It is a good idea to assign jobs to other personnel at the station to speed up the process. You could assign the receptionist to grab the commercial carts, a secretary can grab some music CDs, and so on. The better the planning, the less commercial time or even air time will be lost.

The necessity of having an alternate music library pays off in the worst case scenario such as a power failure at the studio site, or even worse, a fire in the building. Then it will be necessary to leave immediately. Here is

where the benefit of the touch tone phone-triggered cart machine really pays off. You will be able to start it from a cellular phone, or from a phone booth.

ANOTHER OPTION

If building an alternate studio site is impossible, then here's another way to do it. Just about every radio station has a production studio. It is easier than you think to team up with another station in town for a mutual back-up plan. Dedicated broadcast lines to your transmitter can be set up from their production studio, and vice versa. If the worst happens, then you can go on the air from their production studio. This sounds pretty strange, but it has been



successfully done. Both stations will equally benefit from a plan such as this. Another way is to go in with the other station on constructing a back-up studio. It would be rare that both stations would have an emergency at the same time, but in the event of an earthquake, hurricane, tornado or some other natural disaster, a team effort may pay off...stranger things have happened!

OTHER THINGS TO HAVE AT THE ALTERNATE SITE

In a natural disaster, the jock may have to spend a long period of time at the alternate studio. It is advisable to have a supply of water and some type of non-perishable food on hand. Also, it would be a good idea to have a police scanner and a TV set on hand. In such a case, it is our job as broadcasters to keep the public informed, so the more input, the better.

Here's a great suggestion: If you have the back-up studio at the local city hall or in a public building, staff members could hold after school instruction sessions for kids who are interested in broadcasting, or you could hold Sunday community affairs shows from the location...the possibilities are endless.

As you can see, this project can pay off in many ways, but most importantly you can eliminate costly down time that can pop up at a moment's notice. **3?E**

Carter Commands The Blues

VERYTHING CLARence Carter does on record, from his twanging blues guitar pickin' to his big, barrel-chested vocals to his sly streetwise chuckle to his steamy lyrics, is right on time and his public loves every bit of it. With the sureness and authority of a gifted, young, oldtime Baptist preacher. Carter delivers his message of the blues life to his mesmerized listeners. Humor, despair, hope, lust, suspicion, cheating, self-assuredness. love and joy are the blues avenues Carter trods with the magnetism of a Pied Piper


Grabbing you with his intensely vivid portrayals of all too

human problems that everyone shares, Carter commands your sympathetic attention from the beginning to the end of his *Snatching It Back* LP by crooning, squalling, moaning, preaching, talking and playing the blues.

Carter was born on January 4, 1946, in Montgomery, AL, where he grew up and learned to play guitar listening to **John Lee Hooker**, **Lightnin' Hopkins** and **Jimmy Redd** records. He later earned a music degree at Alabama State College in Montgomery.

The multi-talented Carter composes and arranges in braille and also plays piano. After recording several 45s with Calvin Scott, Carter hit the charts in '68 with "Looking for a Fox," and six months later had another hit with "Slip Away." Carter's "Tell Daddy" was a crossover hit for Etta James and "Slipped, Tripped and Fell In Love" was a hit for Ann Pebbles.

Now let's talk about the album. "Step By Step" leads, with the organ and piano playing a traditional gospe! intro in unision and the duo of Clarence and Calvin harmonizing. "I Stayed Away Too Long" sports a horn section intro while C&C chime in for the title verse, then Clarence takes the lead for a powerfully commanding performance. Next is a rocking "Tell Daddy" with the small horn section sounding big with the baritone sax holding the bottom down. The drummer fills the track up with his funk, and Carter, on his first solo recording, is perfectly comfortable in his new role. His guitar pattern reminds of the great **Lowell Folsom**'s "Tramp" and is perfect for the song. A strong two-bar intro from the electric piano with the horns and rhythm section



joining in and Carter's sly chuckle pervade until he explains why he's "Looking for a Fox." Again, Carter is flawless in this funk factory of a song.

The guitars enhance the rhythm section, the bassline is strong with the piano playing an almost verbatum pattern. Carter harmonizes with himself in a joyful romp in funk. A quietly soothing horn intro leads Carter into blessing his woman's departure by explaining why "I Can't See Myself" cryin' over you. Carter's guitar pattern on his bass strings is a prominent feature and the slide guitar solo is especially greasy and nasty on "The Road of Love.

Hit is written all over the moderate rocker "Slip Away," as Carter asks his married woman to try to join him somewhere and satisfy his needs. Blues and humor are kin in "Back Door Santa." "That Old Time Feeling" begins with a four-bar electric piano intro and Carter thanks his woman for her goodness and tells her why he wants her to return and bring it on home. Again, hit permeates "Too Weak to Fight" and Carter seems to be at his level best on moderate tempos where he has time to settle in and "sell" the lyrics.

Sweet guitar licks, strings, vibes and organ set the feel for a slow "I'd Rather Go Blind." Carter again masters the situation. This song was also a hit for the great Etta James. "Making Love (At the Dark End of the Street)," a slow ballad, provides Carter an opportunity to preach about human sexual foibles in the first part of the song, and in the latter part he sings the crescendo in a most powerful fashion.

Due to lack of space, we cannot adequately praise Carter's whole album, but you get the picture. His biggest hit is "Patches." With an excellent arrangement complete with strings and background singers, Carter begins by narrating his beginnings in Alabama and his relationship with his father, who entrusted him as a youngster to pull the family through. A harmonica whines in the background for added effect.

Snatching It Back is a great collection of material by one of our great artists and you will love what you hear and feel. 37E
