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

GUEST COMMENTARY

HANK YOU for eighteen years of BRE. Publishing ain't easy, I know from first hand experience. Having been the owner/publisher of Soul Newspaper for twelve years, I am often in personal conflict as to exactly what the role and responsibility of a publicist actually is.

Many times I've threatened to do a publicity campaign on myself but it just doesn't feel right. I come from the old school of thought that a publicist's job is to promote the client from behind the scenes not in front of the mike or camera. I've always felt that a publicist's job was to help a reporter obtain a quote not to be quoted themselves.

During the ten years that I have worked as a publicist, I have tried to hold to the concept that a publicist's job is, "The work or business of preparing and disseminating information, promotional material, etc., to the notice of the public."

Things have gotten out of control. Many have become media stars themselves. Every time I pick up a publication, I see quotes from publicists as spokespersons for their clients. Too often I read a publicist's quote rather than what the artist has to say, in his or her

own words.

Part of a publicist's responsibility is to help create an image for their client and teach them how to be interviewed and to communicate with both the media and the public.

Publicists too frequently attempt to manipulate the media rather than service the media. This manipulation goes beyond music, entertainment and politics but encroaches upon hard news as well. In the race for high ratings and broad circulation, the press has often exploited celebrities thus establishing a climate of distrust and an environment in which publicists frequently serve as buffers. The end result is a disservice to the artist and to the public.

I take pride in my work and am tired of apologizing for expecting a high professional standard of integrity for myself and for those with whom I work. My word and my reputation is the most important thing that I have to offer. It is painfully obvious that too many of my colleagues have forgotten that the role of a publicist is to serve; the client, the media and lastly themselves.

Execs at Virgin Resign

Ken Berry, chairman and chief executive officer of the Virgin Music Group Worldwide, has announced the resignations of Jeff Ayeroff and Jordan Harris, co-chairmen of Virgin Records America Inc., effective immediately. Berry has named Phil Quartararo president and chief executive officer of Virgin Records America Inc.

Ayeroff and Harris, co-managing directors of VRA since the founding of the company in 1986, were named co-chairmen following last year's merger of the Virgin label Charisma Records Inc. with VRA.

Quartararo joined VRA in 1986. In 1990 he went on to launch Charisma Records, serving as president of that label until rejoining VRA as president following the 1992 merger.

Berry commented, "I'm sorry to see Jordan and Jeff leave the company after all these years. We've been both colleagues and friends. However, I am pleased to be able to place the company in the capable hands of Phil Quartararo. Phil's leadership qualities have been a valuable resource to Virgin for many years, and I am confident that his vision will ensure the continued success of the company.

"We are enjoying our most successful year ever, with three albums and three singles currently in the Top 10. Virgin is stronger than ever and we're looking forward to an outstanding future."

At the present time no major changes are expected to take place at Virgin. Phil Quartararo, pres & ceo of, Virgin records America com-

mented, "One glance at the charts will tell you that we're incredibly hot. We certainly don't plan to alter the formula that got us here. What we will do is continue to break new artists as well as furthering the careers of the superstars on our roster."

While this past year at Virgin has been alternative dominated, with the exception of Janet Jackson and Tina Turner, releasing such artists as Smashing Pumpkins, Biggy Pop, Curve and Verve, the first quarter of next year will be more R&B oriented. Releases from Lalah Hathaway, Loose Ends, Redhead Kingpin (now called Private Investigators), The College Boys, Paula Abdul, Soul II Soul and Bridgette McWilliams are scheduled to become available. 375

Arbitron to Increase Sample Base

Following five months of extensive discussions with the Arbitron Radio Advisory Council and over 400 stations, groups, advertisers and agencies, Arbitron has shifted its focus from survey reconfiguration (the 18-week rolling average) to a plan that increases the metro target sample by 70 percent against the 1993 base.

The Arbitron Company's new proposal calls for 30 percent more metro diaries in 1994 and increasing the metro target sample a total of 70 percent by 1996 for continuously-measured markets, with no change in the current quarterly survey schedule. Non-continuously measured markets are slated for a 40 percent metro increase over the same three year period. Non-metro measurement in

the Winter and Summer surveys will be eliminated.

The effect of the change on black radio stations is expected to be negligible. While the number of diaries sent will ultimately increase by an estimated 360,000, the ethnic proportionality or formattic preferences of respondents is not expected to be significantly altered. A higher target sample should result in increased stability and reliability of Arbitron surveys. This increase will also allow for more software to become available that will help radio stations sell advertising time.

"The new proposal reflects broadcasters' continued preference for quarterly measurement and significantly higher target sample", said Dick Williams, gm, WIL-FM St. Louis, Council Chairman.

In presenting the new plan, Steve Morris, pres of Arbitron, said "Arbitron and broadcasters need to form a partnership in order to move forward with increased sample while maintaining the current quarterly survey schedule. That partnership includes Arbitron's bearing a majority of the cost while asking broadcasters to pay a 2 percent rate increase beginning in 1994 and an additional 2 percent annual rate increase beginning in 1995. The increase will be based on the net market report rate of January 1994." Stations will have to sign an addendum to authorize the 2 percent rate increases. It is hoped by Arbitron that this will not be a problem. ∃₹E

ECO Paid Tribute to Recording Industry

The Earth Communications Office paid tribute to close to 200 recording artists and music industry executives for eliminating the CD long box during a luncheon at the Westwood Marquis Hotel and Garden.

Among the attendees were the Red Hot Chili Peppers, Stephen Stills, John Stewart, CEMA pres Russ Bach, Atlantic Records vp Danny Goldberg, Capitol records pres Gary Gersh, Jimmy Iovine-Interscope Records, E! pres Lee Masters, Hale Milgram, Jerry Moss, Geffen pres Ed Rosenblatt, U.S. Congressman Howard Berman, U.S. Congressman Henry Waxman, The Rainforest Action Network and others.

The CD long box was officially banned as of April 1, 1993, after intense lobbying by the Ban the Box coalition of which ECO was a founding member. "We are proud to have been part of the coalition, working with

caring people in the music industry, and proving that successful business leaders can incorporate environmental factors into their decision making," said Bonnie Reiss, exec director of ECO.

Commenting on the new campaign, Reiss said, "In 1992, 400 million CDs were sold. By eliminating the long box, the music industry has saved 332,500 trees, 1,303,205 gallons of oil and a half million continued on page 41

Wylie was a co-founder and Board Member of the L.A. Music Relief Committee, which was developed by record-industry executives to collect and disburse aid to record retail businesses damaged during last year's civil unrest in Los Angeles. The committee has to date raised more than \$130,000, collected from all across the country.

Eddie Gilreath, senior vp, marketing, UNI Distribution Corp., says "We are deeply saddened to hear of the loss of our friend and colleague Hank Wylie. Denon Supports National Public Radio

Denon Records and National Public Radio announced today that Denon will donate 5,000 compact discs to public radio stations this fall in support of their local fund raising efforts.

The CD's will be free to the more than 100 stations expected to participate in a coordinated fund raising period from October 23 through October 29. The CD's will be offered to listeners as premiums, or thank-you gifts, for their contributions. Stations in New York, Boston, Chicago, Atlanta, Seattle and Houston are among those committed to participating in the coordinated week.

Half of the CD's will feature upand-coming classical musicians. The remaining CD's will feature digitally remastered selections from the recently-revived Savoy jazz collection. Denon is renowned world-wide for its jazz and classical recordings, and for its pioneering efforts in digital audio.

Radio Revenues Up

The radio industry hit the halfway point of 1993 posting double-digit monthly revenue in many regions. Combined national spot and local radio advertising revenue gains came in at nine percent through June. Local revenue is up nine percent for the first half of the year, with national up 7 percent, as compared to the same sixmonth period in '92.

Growth was fueled by double-digit gains in June, with national revenue up fourteen percent, exceeding a ten percent revenue gain on the local level. Combined national spot and local revenue was up eleven percent for the month.

"The kind of growth we've seen so far this year is no fluke—it's the result of advertiser and agency confidence in radio's ability to effectively deliver an advertising message," said RAB pres Gary Fries. "In a world where new advertising and consumer media options continue to materialize at an alarming rate, the fact remains that radio advertising works. Few other media can boast of the audience and results-oriented track record that allow

radio to make that claim "

These figures are based on the Radio Advertising Bureau (RAB) Radio revenue index of more than one hundred markets.

With each new artist or act, there must be that foundation to build upon and most artists have the intention of sustaining. One of the strongest and most influential cornerstones of R&B music today, is the mighty O'Jays.

Over the years, the O'Jays had developed what so many strive to achieve, but so few accomplish, a true and distinct sound. That signature was based on the passionate baritone and tenor vocals of Eddie Levert and Walter Williams—a relationship and blend that was over thirty years in the making. Added, was the smooth harmonies of Sammy Strain who has since left to return to his former group, Little Anthony and the Imperials. With this foundation built, the O'Jays, as have many of the long standing veterans, have been the cornerstone to many younger contemporary acts. Not including Levert's cloning of his powerful vocals through his sons' Grammy winning group of the same name, The O'Javs have been sampled in many of today's most popular songs. Queen Latifah, for instance, used The O'Jays "For The Love Of Money" and LeVert as the strength of her New Jack City soundtrack single. Their sound has been emulated, duplicated and manipulated in other artists' songs and styles for as long as they've been making hits.

he husky and hearty laugh of Eddie Levert bellows as he comments about being copied. "Naturally, it's the truest form of flattery. What it means is The O'Jays haven't been just spinning their wheels. In other words, we've done something right that caused them to want to do that (O'Jays) sound. I think it's great. I love all the young entertainers. 
ith Heartbreaker, their newest release on the EMI Records label, there is a new dimension the group is reaching for. They have taken the skills acquired over the years and applied them to







It took lifelong fan Quincy Jones, the combined Gil Evans Orchestra and George Gruntz Concert Jazz Band and the lure of Montreux, site of Davis' original glory with Gil Evans, to change his mind for one last crack at some now-classic arrangements. "Maids of Cadiz," "Orgone," and "Solea" are among the highlights of this performance. The Gershwin standard "Summertime" jumps in the hands of the 50 musicians present. The CD's 14 selections recapture the early '50s when Evans first blended symphonic and jazz values with Davis' improvisational genius. Davis mustered enough life and chops to deliver this material decades later. Banton's gravel-like vocals are apparent throughout with "No Respect," an instant headrocker being a classic example of his rough man style. "Make My Day," Banton's current release features and shows why programmers love the blend of soul and toasted lyrics. Other winners of a very good album include the midtempo and peaceful "Searching", and "Red Rose." Add "Wicked Act," and the strong Afro-Carribbean sounding groove, "Willy Don't Be Silly," and you have an album that's laden with winners Demo: Reggae/World Beat Fans.

Epic's Luther Vandross returns to familiar turf as he returns with this week's most added song, "Heaven Knows." Vandross proves that he hasn't lost any of his old magic at radio. BLOODLINES

MAURICE JOHN VAUGHN: Blood Red Blues

NEW CHICAGO BLUESMAN is on the scene and his music is solid dirty blues. He sings, plays guitar and tenor saxophone mainly, but he also plays drums, baritone sax, and clarinet. His expertise on the saxophone is a definite plus for him because he overdubbed the reed work. His guitar work is smooth and tasty. Although he hasn't entered the stage of being a towering, dominant figure on the guitar or vocals as of yet, he is on his way. All he needs to do is take the next step because the potential is plainly there. Vaughn's selection of his original songs and their arrangements are excellent.

A quiet family man who now lives in Michigan City, Indiana, Vaughn was raised in Chicago and went to school at Juliet Low on the South Side of the Windy City, where there are clubs on almost every corner and blues and R&B streaming out of juke boxes and radios all over the city. Chicago is a city with a lot of heart and its musicians have added to its mystique. With blues, R&B and jazz stars in abundance in its populace. Chicago has virtually nurtured these arts, becoming a center

of recording activity that has produced numerous greats like Muddy Waters, Howlin' Wolf, Little Walter, Chuck Berry, Sonny Boy Williamson, Bo Diddley, Jimmy Reed and many more. Vaughn incorporates his influences well in his latest Alligator CD, In The Shadow Of The City, with all songs written by him, Vaughn is fast becoming prominent in this business of the blues.


Vaughn is clever with his lyrics, which are sometimes tinged with sardonic humor and other times glaring the hard edge of reality with a solid and decidedly funky rhythm section backing him up.

Vaughn kicks off "Can't Nobody" on his guitar playing a funky bassline for four bars and the band joins in with the horn section sounding a lot like the Memphis Horns for twelve bars, allowing plenty of time to establish the groove, then Vaughn's vocals resound in a cool manner, at times smoothly sounding the Howlin' Wolf howl.

Robert Covington's smooth drum rolls sound almost like someone tearing paper (that's the way it's supposed to sound) on "I Want To Be Your Spy" The beat is solid and rocking, heavy on two and four and Vaughn takes a funky solo

The horn section excels in tightness on the intro and in sections of "(Everything I Do) Got To Be Funky" and Vaughn harmonizes with himself on vocals, allowing himself a funky solo after his horn section sizzles a solo

His low baritone narration on the intro of "Blood Red Sky" is sexily set to the cleanly funky background of slick guitar licks, tight horn harmonies, earth-shaking



basslines and rock solid drum rhythms and when Vaughn begins to sing on perhaps his best vocal endeavor on this album, he is convincingly honest.

The beat is slowed down and the atmosphere is subdued on "Game Over." **Allen Batts** provides good work on the organ and Vaughn sneaks in a quick guitar solo.

The band is funky and rocking on "Love Bone."

Vaughn sings and his guitar is his only accompaniment on "Treat Me So Bad." He does a good job in the old tradition

His vocal harmony and the band arrangement highlight "Watching Your Watch" and Vaughn takes a stirring solo on tenor sax.

"Eager Beaver" offers some good advice for young lovers. Vaughn gives his strongest guitar solo on this one.

"Are You Satisfied" is the question asked millions of times everyday and Vaughn seems genuinely concerned because his sweet thang is gone and he just wants to know. The band is tight as usual.

Keyboardist Professor **Eddie Lusk**, one of Vaughn's earliest employers, committed suicide, shattering the Chicago blues world and stealing from Vaughn a treasured friend. Vaughn's "Suicide Is Not The Way" is his gift to those who may be stumbling down the same path.

Jimmy Walker's boogie-woogie piano on "Small Town Baby" is set to a rocking shuffle beat and Vaughn's vocal is in the style of the great **Big Joe Turner ∃₹**€

MERCENARY PRODUCTIONS JINGLING COINS

ARRIORS AND MERCENARIES take their Coca Cola seriously. A trio of modern day mercenaries have boosted the popularity of the drink which it hasn't enjoyed since World War II when thirsty G's had crates of the beverage delivered to the front under the wing racks of fighter planes.

Today, the hot payload is the 'Always Coca Cola' jingle written, composed and produced by Los Angeles-based Mercenary Productions. It's an astounding success for the songwriting/production team of Terry Coffey, Jon Nettlesbey and Michael Hudson, first-timers whose jingle was picked from a competitive field of top recording artists and producers. Their melody has become as globally known as the drink it sells.

"We'd never done a jingle before," said Coffey. "We approached it like we were doing a song. We were contacted by the Creative Artists Agency and given one word: "always." We were told You guys take it from there,' and 'We need it yesterday.' We came up with something in two days which we thought was good.

Then the next word we heard was 'Congratulations!"

Since its February '93 release, the jingle currently airs in 50 countries, in musical formats ranging from pop, salsa, country, Urban, a cappella, World Beat, to Australian and several symphonic versions, all produced by the trio. Although "Always Coca Cola" is a 60 second spot, radio is beckoning for a four-minute version due to the surge of requests for the tune. "A lot of stations are plugging it," added Coffey.

Nettlesbey, 31, wrote the lyrics, while Coffey 30, composed the music for the popular jingle. Hudson, 34, adds a cappella flair and handles the administrative end of their operation as Executive Producer. The trio has

produced hits by balladeers Keith Washington and Howard Hewett, songstress Miki Howard, and for their acknowledged mentor, composer Quincy Jones.

"It all goes back to what Quincy told us," continued Coffey. "If your name is going on something, you're going to have to live with that the rest of your life.' We try to keep musical integrity and musical quality in everything we do. We want to maintain the musicality in our work. We don't use a lot of sampling."

Coffey and Nettlesbey attended high school in Chicago, before moving to Los Angeles. They met Hudson in 1988 and the trio formed Mercenary Productions shortly afterwards. Their first foray into commercial jingles won't be their last, after the experience of producing all the variations of the "Always Coca Cola" theme. Plus, there are five artists signed to their company to groom and look out for.

"We just finished Keith Washington's new album," continued Coffey. "CAA is planning 33 new commercials for their '94 campaign. They were pretty excited about our work. The jingle made the top ten charts so

we may have to do that four minute version."

No doubt this is one trio of mercenaries who stand to make out like bandits doing something they love. ∋₹€

ON THE MEDIA MOGUL

OU CAN WORK HARD, study long hours, make contacts and take time to develop your skills, but in the end there is no real substitute for being talented. In the case of Don Tracy you have a true radio talent, as well as someone who was willing to work hard. These qualities led to him finding success in radio as well as television.

When opportunities arise you can take advantage of them or they can end up slipping through your fingers. Tracy received an opportunity to get into radio, and when it came he ran with it. He explains, "I got into radio by accident. I was at a radio station congratulating a friend, T.J. The DJ, who had gotten a position at WKND/Hartford, CN. We were there talking when the GM Richard Carlson walked by. He said I had a great voice and recommended that I get into radio. At the time I was planning on being a CPA and was majoring in accounting at Roger Williams College."

Tracy took the advice of Carlson and began working at WKND in '68. He was originally brought in to do a two hour weekend jazz show, but was later given T.J. The DJ's R&B show after T.J. left KND to go to another station.

Tracy was a big hit at KND and his performance prompted WPOP/ Hartford, CN, which had a general market radio, "Boss" format, to offer him a position which he took. Tracy was able to distinguish himself at POP and he became a well known air personality who was killing the competition in the ratings.

WNHC/New Haven, CN, wanted to challenge POP and one way they planned to do it was by having Tracy join their staff. He didn't want the job because he was happy where he was, so to make them leave him alone he made what he thought was a ridiculous offer. He wanted a 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. radio shift, plus they had to put him on the television station that they owned, which to his surprise they agreed to do. His

television assignment was as a weatherman on their eleven o'clock news show.

Someone had obviously taped his



radio show and sent it to Jim Randolph, who was the national pd of Tracy Broadcasting. When Randolph was in New York on business he saw Tracy on television and was sold. He sent Tracy a telegram saying, whatever the price, he would bring him to Los Angeles and their station, KGFJ. In '69 California was the golden state and a position at a station in Los Angeles was a dream come true, so Tracy resigned from WNHC and made the drive to LA.

When Tracy got to LA he made a big impression in the LA market. Always an astute businessman, he opened a broadcasting school with Bill Shearer and Jim Maddox. In '73, he also began doing an R&B show for Armed Forces Radio.

"In '75 I sold the broadcasting school and left local radio. When I did go back to working full time I went to channel 7 KNBC, about a year later. When KDAY's pd, Jim Maddox, found out I was

back in the business he offered me an announcer's position, which I accepted. Maddox is very intense and the situation became so stressful that I felt it was best for me to leave KDAY, which I did in '77. Then Maddox left KDAY to go to KMJQ/Houston, TX, and JJ Johnson became the new pd at KDAY. JJ rehired me and I was full time at KDAY for about a year," explains Tracy.

In '79 there was a recession and a lot of structural changes in the radio business. These changes caused Tracy to wonder if continuing in radio was what he wanted to do, so he left the United States and went to Germany.

Although he was working in Europe there was still a buzz about him in the US. In '80 Tracy decided to come back to the US and began working at KDAY for the third time. In addition to his work at KDAY, Tracy started his own radio syndication company, Advance Radio Entertainment. He split his time between his company, KDAY and Armed Forces Radio. Everything remained like this from '80 to '89. Then in January

'89, Tracy was feeling burned out and he decided to retire from local radio. Talent like Tracy's is hard to come by. Although continued on page 41

YUL ANDERSON: System Shock

THEORY, SOUNDS, WORDS, thoughts and ideas never fade. The words and thoughts of a Socrates remain omni-present. The ideas of Einstein would also hold true under this theory. But, the sounds of Cole Porter, Jimi Hendrix and even Bob Dylan, have attached their melodical hooks into a new musical vehicle by the name of Yul Anderson.

With contemporary black music on a constant search for new sounds and new approaches to appeal to the masses, it is evident that we have forgotten the basics. Simplicity. Anderson has gone back to basics and has added only a drum and bass to his guitar, making what has become a complicated industry race for freshness, an almost solo effort to remind us what music was all about.

On his second and latest venture, Nighttrance, on the Nouveau Music and Entertainment label, the writer/pianist/ guitarist/singer/producer joins with his band; Helge Solberg on bass and Bjorn Uglebjerg on drums, to take you on a euphoric musical journey filled with profound thought, memories and most of all, bottom-line real music. Clearly Hendrix-influenced, Anderson takes his ax and relaxes you with hypnotic guitar suggestions, floating you away into his Nighttrance so to speak. And like any normal homosapien—at first you fight it off like the shock of a drug that has been slipped into your drink unknowingly. It's only natural, we're not used to hearing

unsynthesized, unadulterated, pure music. Quite frankly, it's a shock to the system. But, then it kicks in and you find yourself becoming lost in its power, relinquishing your control and accepting the fact that, "Damn, I'm enjoying this!" Even though Hendrix-influenced, there is nothing copied here. Anderson has simply decided to bring back what so many have forgotten, what music sounded like before the samples and synthesized technology smothered it behind computer circuits and outboard equipment.

Anderson studied and perfected his craft at the University of California at Davis, playing piano and performing on the campus Quad, totally amazing his peers and fellow students. At the time, he concentrated on playing classical jazz and singing original and charted compositions. In an attempt to express his talents to a wider arena, he packed his belongings for a European jaunt. While in Denmark, it was apparent his talents were appreciated on a much broader scale, and so for now, there is where he remains—only now, more emphasis on his guitar and blues to communicate his talents.

Speaking on behalf of New World Management, was



Beatrice Fakhrian who said, "It is difficult to try and describe the music of an artist such as Yul Anderson, because it changes definition and mocks any classification. What can be definite is that the music of this talented piano/guitar/vocal performer is unique and comforting.

"I sincerely believe that when you listen to Yul's music, it does something to the spirit. But, the spirit does not care who rides upon its wings and plays in the open mind of music, as long as it is done with unconditional LOVE!!!"

Americans have always been innovative and leaders of the "First to" club. We have been the designers of many formats and styles, from cars to clothes, from marketing to music. We have always been proud of the fact that others copied our ingenuity but, can we actually be proud to say we've allowed a talent like Anderson slip away, only to regret it deeply in the future? OCKETOWN RECORDS, named after the section of Chicago where Mary Hill, Pocketown's owner, ran a successful travel company, may be a new label. They may even be a small label, but there's no denying Pocketown is definitely a gusty label

In little over six months Pocketown has gone from relative obscurity to its current status of having its first release knocking on the door of heavy rotation. How come? 





NABRS UNITING THE POOLS PART 2

AST WEEK BRE SPOKE with **Sir T.**, director of the Jamz City Record Pool, (150 S First St #174, Kerman CA 93630, 209-846-8220, 40 members). He expressed some of his grievances as to the way black record pools across the country were treated, and explained that his pool along with 40 other black record pools had joined forces to form a coalition called The National Alliance of Black Record Spinners (NABRS).

"By forming the organization, we as record pools have given ourselves a little more power in the way that a union has power in any business," mentions **Eardrum**, a NABRS member and head of the Tables Of Distinction Record Pool (630 Sheridan St #218, Hyattsville MD 20783. 50 members) "Without sounding threatening, we (NABRS) can definitely affect a song's chances if we feel that we are being neglected." Sir T agrees by saying, "We can easily boycott a record and tell our jocks to do likewise. We take it very seriously and fine any jock up to \$100 if they break our agreement and play the outlawed product."

As Sir T. mentioned last week, some labels get on great with the pools. Says Sir T., "We have a monthly meeting that we usually have sponsored by a label. Columbia Records was a recent sponsor which shows that some labels do appreciate the work we do."

Like any organization the NABRS are fussy about rules and membership and screen all potential members. "We're not like some of the pools who are greedy and sign as many jocks as possible. We have members who are trusted," says Sir T. "Once signed to the NABRS, a pool must follow the NABRS guidelines. Sir T. states, "For example, if a pool with 100 members only receives 50 pieces of product, we'll insist that the label send the amount needed or we won't make it a priority release," He adds, "A priority release is usually a release we want our jocks to go all out on and push. To inspire the jocks to push a record we sometimes have prize money for them to help make the song a success in their area."

Among the artists Sir T. feels his pool was instrumental in helping

have success in the Kerman/Fresno area are Onyx, SWV and Shai. "Even though we currently don't have a black radio station in this market, we watched how the records grew on the street through our jocks before making their way to CHR," he proudly states.

One of the many goals of the alliance is to stop the perception that black record pools are B-Listed or second rate. "Quite often I think we're regarded as a bunch of vinyl junkies," Sir T. explains. "To lose this image we've signed only the best pools in the country." Among the top pools affiliated with the NABRS are Triangle Pool Ltd., headed by Frankie Smokehouse (2520 Ole Garner Rd, Lot 86. Raleigh, NC 27610, 919-833-1586, 50 members), **Bobby G's** Soul Disco Record Pool (2187 Market St. 2nd Fl, San Francisco, CA, 94114, 40 members) J.R Dino's The Million Dollar Record Pool (2459 Roosevelt Hwy # B-1, College Park, Ga, 30337, 404-766-1275, 100 members), Tyrone Bradley's United Dance Music Report (4816 Seminole Detroit, MI, 48214, 313-923-2724, 40 members), and Rico Casonaova's The Pros (440 Grand Ave # 5, Oakland, CA, 94610 410-839-3000, 100 members). With each pool having large memberships, they feel that one of the strengths of NABRS is that together they can become an important tool in record promotion, not just in their region but, nationally.

J. R. Dino is well suited for his position as the director of NABRS, and is pleased to be a part of such an organization. "I feel that we can only grow stronger together. We have great board members who are committed to pulling together and improving the relationship between the street record pool, the label and the retailer," states Dino. "Now we can sit down with the label and iron out our problems together," says Eardrum who adds, "without an organization like this, it would be nearly impossible to do."

Many of the NABRS members have experience from working in radio, and know how important pools are. NABRS is trying to educate, inform and create an organization that will address the issues and needs of this viable support group in conjunction with radio. Hoping to dispel any negativity associated with record pools, NABRS looks

to grow into a reputable organization that jocks all over the country can recognize as a lifeline to their profession. 375

IVORY'S NOTES

POP MUSIC AS FOOD: Where's The Flavor?

HILE LISTENING TO THE radio one day for several hours, we got to thinking about food—don't ask why—as a musical metaphor. We quickly came to the conclusion that if a lot of the urban sounds ingested by listeners were digestible, it would be fast, processed food.

Think about it. Fast food joints offer food that looks good. It might even smell good. However, take a bite, and it is clear that this stuff was prepared not in a kitchen but in a laboratory. Same thing with much of what's on the black

music charts. A soulful vocal on top makes this stuff appear to be the real thing—after all, "singing," so says the concensus, "is back" (they don't mention that a lot of it is off-key, but that's another column)—but listen closely. That music track, a mesh of computerized synthetic sounds, is as stiff and tasteless as cardboard.

A lot of productions today remind us of Velveeta, Cheese Whiz and other incredible edibles that can only be referred to as "foodstuffs" or "food products" (even the creators of this gook restrain from passing it off as real nutrition). It looks like cheese. smells like cheese, even vaquely tastes like cheese. But it's something else. Likewise, for a lot of today's black music. Often, what starts out as a great idea—a good song, strong hook, interesting B-section-ends up as R&B from concentrate. Instant groove. Just add water. Guess Tang really was one of the most significant inventions of the 20th century after all. Some of the productions currently in the black top 40 make that powder taste like oranges from the Garden of Eden.

Before the angry mob hoists us up, please understand that we have nothing against technology. In fact, we applaud how efficient computers, sequencing tech-

niques and other gadgets have made the modern recording process. And, indeed, the savvy producer knows how to glaze that machine sound with the nuance of real instruments. It's called craftsmanship. But McDonald's, we dare say, will never make a burger to match that big, sopping thing you make at home—a gastronomical delight with big meat, fresh toppings, perhaps a slice of cheddar cheese, all of it crammed between two lightly toasted buns (we're vegetarian, and that sounds good even to us)—and Robby The Robot will never create the kind of record that is Funkadelic's Cosmic Slop or Natalie Cole's Unforgettable. This music, like homemade peach cobbler, cinnamon-laced and created with real peaches and an unforgivable amount of butter, was made with an ingredient vital to any great record: heart and soul. Musicians put feelings, warmth and occasionally, erratic timing, into a production, all of which is what you're feeling every time you hear that record. Since when did Sara Lee get into the music business? Gospel bellowing aside, many of today's records literally sound like they came from the frozen food section. Kraft-manship, if

you will. Let's face it: few things in life are more disconcerting than an ill-executed synthetic cymbal smash.

Thank God that a new generation of artists understand what it is to truly sing on a record. However, until all the rudiments of pop music-making are fully embraced, we will never truly be back to "real music."

All that ranting about food has given us an appetite. We think we'll put on **Will Downing**'s lush new Mercury LP, *Love's The Place To Be*, kick back, and dig in. Bon Appetit.

MEANWHILE, BACK AT THE RANCH: Speaking of Downing, he's just one of the male vocalists in the Ladies' Man sweepstakes. Considering LPs either on the way or just out from Babyface, Luther Vandross, Brian McKnight, Aaron Hall, and Damian Hall, you can count on a male vocalist signing trend among labels not unlike the dance floor diva/girl group rush of the late 80s. Among the key contenders: Keith Washington, whose new Qwest album, You Make It Easy is bound to both please his core fans and make new ones. That the LP would be filled with solid state ballads is a given, but during a punchy version of Frankie Beverly & Maze's "Before I Let Go" and the funky, attiude-laden "Trippin," Washington manages to groove with the best of 'em, which is usually difficult ground for balladeers to cover. Washington's '91 debut, Make Time For Love, sold just short of a million units, so the new LP should be a big record, something Qwest's distributor-Warner Brothers—can especially use right about now. The album is a sterling collection of supple, sultry soul, and Washington sounds better than ever... 37E
