


Front Page News ARBITRON UNVEILS COMPUTER IMAGING-BASED DIARY STORAGE

The Arbitron Co. is hitting the fast lane in the new move to high tech delivery, introducing a computer imagingbased system for storing and reviewing the audience ratings diaries which the company used to collect radio listening data.

The system will be used initially during the Fall Survey for 20 of the 172 markets that Arbitron measures from Sept. 30-Dec. 14. Those markets are Albuquerque, NM; Buffalo, NY; Detroit, MI; Chicago, IL; El Paso, TX;

Fresno, CA; Greenville-New Bern-Jacksonville, NC; Houston, TX; Little Rock, AK; Lincoln, NE; Minneapolis-St. Paul, MN; Monterey, CA; Nashville, TN; Omaha, NE; Orlando, FL; Pittsburgh, PA: Portland, OR; Rochester, NY; Salt Lake City, UT and Syracuse, NY. The company intends to extend the system to all markets in the Winter 1995 survey.



The radio ratings industry's first electronic diary storage and review system was developed jointly by Arbitron and IBM. It is designed to capture an exact image of every page of the radio diary and store it for easy retrieval during processing and review.

To process the diaries under the present manual system, Arbitron employs trained "editors" who check each entry against radio station information that Arbitron keeps on file. To credit each entry to the appropriate station call letters, the editors make an appropriate notation in the diary. Once all entries are clarified, the diary is passed on to a key entry department which enters the raw listening information into Arbitron's computers for tabulations. The specialists will continued to make every assignment of listening credits; the system does not use artificial intelligence or handwrit-

ing recognition software.

"We're taking the tedium out of our diary processing system, while keeping the expertise of our diary specialist," said David Lapovsky, vp, operations and research. "All our edit rules and qualification steps remain exactly the same. Station credit will be applied in exactly the same manner."

SUMMIT COMMUNICATIONS ACQUIRED BY TIME WARNER

On the heels of its sale of its seven radio stations in June, Summit Communications Group, Inc. has signed a definitive agreement to be acquired by Time Warner, pursuant to a merger. The acquisition is subject to customary conditions, including receipt of all required regulatory approvals.

Sold in June were KHNV-AM/KJMZ-FM in Dallas, WAOK-AM/WVEE-FM in Atlanta, and WCAO-AM/WXYV-FM in Baltimore to Granum Communications, Inc. for \$140 million, and WRKS-FM in New York to Emmis Broadcasting Corp. for \$68 million.

Summit still had its cable operations with systems serving approximately 160,000 subscribers in northwest Atlanta, GA and the Winston-Salem, NC area.

Pursuant to the agreement of merger, in exchange for the stock of Summit held by its stockholders, Time Warner will issue an aggregate of approximately 900,000 shares of common stock and 3.2 million shares of a newly designated series of its preferred stock, series c preferred stock. The series c will initially be convertible into common stock of Time Warner at an effective conversion price of \$48.00 per share per annum. The number of shares of common stock to be issued in the merger is subject to adjustment based on the working capital of Summit at the closing of the transaction.

Summit announced last November that the Gordon Gray 1956 Living Trust, which owns approximately 94.2 percent of the company's outstanding stock, was evaluating its investment in Summit. At that time, the trustees stated that recent events affecting the communications industry had led them to consider divesting themselves of some or all of the company's cable and/or radio assets.



News SIGERSON NAMED PRES/CEO EMI

Davitt Sigerson has been named president and CEO of EMI, it was announced by Charles Koppelman, chairman and CEO of parent company, EMI Records Group North America. Sigerson, reporting directly to Koppelman, will oversee all executive and creative functions of the three New York-based labels, EMI, SBK and Chrysalis.

Sigerson joins EMI after three years as president of Polydor Records, U.S.

In addition to his corporate endeavors, Sigerson has covered music extensively as a journalist and has worked as a musician and songwriter. Two of his solo albums have been released on Island Records.

Commenting on his appointing, Koppelman said, "Davitt is an extremely creative and talented individual. He possesses tremendous focus and leadership abilities. Having grown up in this business as both an executive and a musician, Davitt has a keen understanding about what it takes to find great music, work with artists and get their music heard by a lot of people."

Sigerson added "People and music are what I care about most. The mission of EMI, SBK and Chrysalis will be to build great careers with great artists in a spirit of honesty, respect and passion."



Tommy LiPuma has been named to the position of GRP Records president; GRP president/co-founder Larry Rosen has been named chairman emeritus and co-founder Dave Grusin will continue in his role as creative consultant to the label.

The announcement was made by Al Teller, chairman and CEO, MCA

Music Entertainment Group, who called LiPuma "a creative force and award-winning producer who is at the same time a highly respected music executive and industry leader."

LiPuma said he felt "privileged to be given the chance to carry forward the pioneering work" done at the label. Over his career, LiPuma has earned 18 gold and platinum records, and been honored with 30 Grammy nominations, while his work has sold an estimated 45 million albums.

He cut his first commercial record with the O'Jays, a regional hit called "Lipstick Traces."



News HODGES TO SR VP POST AT MCA CONCERTS

Concert industry veteran Alex Hodges has been named sr vp, MCA Concerts, Inc. The winner of *Pollstar's* "Talent Buyer of the Year" award for '93, Hodges moves to MCA from the Nederlander organization where he had been head of the West Coast concert department and vp since 1988.

In his new position, he will be responsibile for the booking of concerts at the Universal Amphitheatre in Los Angeles and coordination of the talent buying for MCA's eight other venues throught North America.

According to MCA Concerts president Jay Marciano who made the announcement, "Fred Ordower, Larry Vallon and the rest of our team are delighted that Alex Hodges will play an integral role in the future of MCA Concerts."


Hodges commented "The great potential of my new position is the

AVI ENTERTAINMENT SHAKE-UP



AVI Entertainment Group, Inc, has raised approximately \$3 million in a securities deal to an investment group led by Allen & Co. and former Motown COO, Harry Anger, who will lead the new management team at AVI.

The new investors purchased shares which represent approximately 80 percent of the company's outstanding stock, together with warrants which, if exercised, would bring their ownership to nearly 85 percent.

The remaining shares are held by public stockholders and former creditors of the company who exchanged approximately \$1 million in liabilities for common stock of the company.

AVI's business of music publishing and record producing will be aggressively enhanced by the catalog it has acquired, simultaneous with the financing. The catalog of more than 3,000 titles from artists such as Slim Harpo, Maceo Parker, Lightnin' Slim marketed under the AVI, Excello and Nashboro labels.

AVI's publishing division currently owns the copyrights for the vast majority of the titles in the newly acquired master libraries. Anger noted that the repertoire has been "virtually unexploited" and said, "This acquisition provides us with a platform for great future growth."

In addition to an initial advance of \$500,000 for the purchase of the new master libraries, the proceeds of the equity financing will be used for working capital and to fund a dividend to be paid to stockholders.



FIVE STAR—HEART AND SOUL—TENT—The Pearson family from Essex, England return with their first album since 1991. Leading off is "(I Love You) For Sentimental Reasons," a cover of the vintage tune. "Surely" follows with its lively toasted lyrics that make way for a funky track with hit potential. The moving "Writing On The Wall" is another winner whose love qualities can't be ignored. Other slow grooves worth a mention include "Got A Lot of Love," and "When You Get Home." This is definitely a more mature Five Star than the group who left Britain at the end of the 80's.

N-PHASE—N-PHASE—MAVERICK/SIRE/WB—These brothers from South Carolina really can sing and demonstrate it on this splendid debut album. Opening the album is the a cappella song "Ooh Yeah," the single that got them discovered. The R. Kelly written



and produced debut single "Spend The Night" follows and lets N-Phase display their vocal talents. Among the other notables that could see release include "Come Back To Me," with its relaxing keyboards slotted sweetly under the various ranges of N-Phase's vocals. "69 Wayz," the album's most steamy groove has a late night, real lust filled sound. On the other tip, "Mother" is a beautiful tribute to all the moms out there. To round out the album, N-Phase cover the Manhattans' "Kiss And Say Goodbye" and the Lionel Richie song "Jesus Is Love." Demos: All.



Looking around black radio this week we see that A&M's Barry White has the hottest song in the country. Collecting a total of **35** adds for his latest single "Practice What You Preach," off his *The lcon Of Love*, album White shows that he still has a huge following at black radio. 

paign advertising as part of the FCC's lowest-unit-charge rule for political spots. The rule went into effect September, 9th—60 days before the country's general elections. Radio stations must disclose discount rates and other privileges which they afford to regular advertisers. An outline of sales practices must also be made available to all inquiring candidates by fax, phone or mail.







LaBelle Salutes Season of Service

It seems slightly startling to head for the Universal Amphitheatre around breakfast time, but this past Monday was unusual on several counts. The truth is, I'll go anywhere to hear Patti LaBelle sing and secondly, I'm so tired of hearing horror stories about the current generation, I was ready to see first hand just who it was who would give up a year or two of their lives to work for a small stipend, calling it a "season of service."

The faces in the partly darkened Amphitheatre seemed to cross the usual barriers of age and color. Nearly a thousand Southern Californians happily stood shoulderto-shoulder to be sworn in as the first "AmeriCorps" volunteers at

ceremonies hosted by MCA, which is an AmeriCorps Model Corporate Partner.

AmeriCorps is President Clinton's "National Service initiative" patterned, it would seem, after President Jimmy Carter's Volunteers In Service To America (VISTA) program and its forerunner, The Peace Corps. The handout says this program is designed to help our nation's urban and rural

communities. AmeriCorp members will work in one or two-year programs and receive education awards to help finance their college education or vocational training and/or pay back student loans.

Secretary of Housing and Urban Development Henry Cisneros told them, "AmeriCorps will rise or fall with your success this year." Heads nodded; they were aware of what they were undertaking.

The event was a serious one, but the exuberance of the crowd erupted

into chants of "We Want Bill!" songs, and raps about "AmeriCorps" while waiting for the satellite hookup. There was some delay in the live feed from the White House, since the problem of the small plane crashing onto the grounds the day before had necessitated moving the feed inside.

When it came, the importance of the day was felt by the gathering of friends, family and dignitaries, including L.A. Mayor Richard Riordan, Police Chief Willie L. Williams and participants from other service organizations. The volunteers solemnly raised their right hands and repeated "I will get things done for America to make our people safer, smarter and healthier. I will bring Americans together, to strengthen our communities...."

Ernie Singleton, president of MCA's black division, observing the amazing energy and dedication in the room, was "encouraged about the program and pleased that we at MCA are involved." Singleton is concerned over the plight in



inner cities, "the lack of programs in schools that have been eliminated in budget cuts," and the attitudes of many kids who "don't understand being of service to their community." In his comments prior

to the swearing in, President Clinton said "Every generation in our history has learned to take responsibility for our future, and your generation is no exception. We look at you now, and we know you are no generations of slackers. Instead, you're a generation of doers."

The solemnity of the moment gone, it was time for the festivities. First up was MCA's young threesome, Immature, who sang two songs, including their latest single, "Never Lie."

When Patti LaBelle came out the crowd rushed to stage to stand six or seven deep at its edge, hands outstretched in hopes of touching her. LaBelle noted that she hadn't "sung this early in the morning for about 50 years" but laughingly said she didn't mind since she "liked" what they were doing. She told them "Keep on striving for the positive things in life." She noted the song "Right Kinda Lover" was on MCA, thanking her label for being part of the day's festivities.


Then came her signature song, "Over the Rainbow," which seemed singularly appropriate for the tenor of the day. She took a crowd, already captured, and enchanted them completely when she took one of the proffered ball caps with AmeriCorps emblazoned on it, placed it on her head and stood back and waved to the crowd. The pure joy on the faces of the kids was worth the daytime trek to the Amphitheatre.







IVORY'S NOTES

Man In The Box

PEOPLE WHO READ BRE use the magazine's singles and album charts for different reasons. I pursue them to find the title of a favored song that I might hear on the radio.

You see, generally, in radio today, you jar one of those thirty minute music blocks and you're lucky to catch the air personality's announcement of even half the artist and song titles. Not saying they don't announce them. But they might do it at the top of the record, when you've only tuned in at

the hook. Or they play fifteen other songs and at the end, give the line-up so fast you don't know which one is yours.

So, when I hear something I like on the radio (it does happen on occasion), I write down the hook and look for it on the BRE chart. If it is a chart record, I can find out the artist and all the other stuff.

It didn't used to be that way. Back in the day, when I was

an avid radio listener, the skilled air personality could ingeniously give you the time, the weather, jokes and whatever else and still not step on the lead vocal of that top 10 hit. You didn't learn to appreciate this simply by being a casual listener, and I wasn't. I was the nerd who came in from school everyday, changed from my "good clothes" into jeans, sat down in my family's kitchen and, against the backdrop of kids outside playing ball, riding their bicycles and just doing what kids do, I listened to the radio. As a teenager, and, I dare say, a young adult, the radio was my life. The music that came out of it was my salvation, and in my mind, it was only as good as the disc jockey playing it.


The Man in the Box.

Religiously, I stuck to a listening pattern. From about 3:30pm until dusk I listened to soul music on the tiny KBYE, a dawn-til-dusk licensee that was Oklahoma City's only black music outlet at the time. "Temptin'" **Ben Tipton** was king until nightfall. Then I'd move on up the dial to the top 40 sounds of WKY, occasionally monitoring KOMA for good measure.

The so cool Tipton and the mile-a-minute yakkers on the pop top 40 stations had on-air styles as disparate as the music they played, but what they had in common was personality. These were people in whom I had trust—much of it, oddly enough, based on the fact that they played music that I liked. But I also paid attention because they were human.

In latter years, when I moved to Los

Angeles, black jocks often fed my insatiable interest in knowing about the music by offering informative morsels about the artists and even the songwriters and producers. I'd




arrived in the city too late to hear the legendary **Magnificent Montague** forge the powerful, grand style that made audiences hang on his every word—including mistakenly taking his "Burn Baby, Burn" slogan as encouragement to torch L.A. during the '60s Watts riots (it was a term he used to gleefully celebrate the music). Personable locals like KUTE 102's **Lee Bailey** and KJLH's **Laurence Tanter** and **Rod McGrew** seemed to have as much affec-

> tion for what they played as I did. The man in the box spoke to thousands daily, yet I felt he was talking directly to me.

Today, the Man (and the Woman) in the Box as I remember him is a rarity. There are exceptions, but for the most part, I don't know these people and I feel they don't want to know me. 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Boyz II Men BACK II MOTOWN'S FUTURE

HAT MOTOWN DID way back in the beginning was redefine some music that had been only lurking around the edges of true universality and blow it up so big that nobody could doubt its truth. Black pop, some called it because it was so all pervasively popular and it was undeniably black. By any name, it changed musical history.

In the process, they created a pantheon of heroes, musical legends thousands of hopefuls worshipped and attempted to duplicate/surpass. Almost all have fallen short of the mark, way short. Who knows the reasons? Best said, probably, it's the refrain of that old Tame/Marvin gem, "Ain't Nothin' Like The Real Thing." *That's right, baby*.

Motown, too, did its share of falling short as it struggled to recapture the lost magic and find its place in the '90s.

Some of the magic breezed through from Philly, thanks to a foursome so young at the time, one's father had to come on interviews. Here they were, Nathan Morris, Shawn Stockman, Michael S. McCary and Wayna Morris. Not even Motown imitators, but young men with voices so pure, yeah, it made you wanna holler, throw up both your hands and even Shout.

Motown-watchers and historians have minutely inspected the harmony patterns of the early music, crediting much success

to those ear-pleasing, emotion-evoking blends. The rough but ready boyz of Detroit went to school on Maurice "Pops" King who taught them how to sing patterns both he and they had only dreamed in their heads. Today's Motown has no "Pops," but this new batch of Boyz went to another school. It is, after all, that new day. They had the gift, they had the soul and they learned how to deliver in the classrooms of the Creative & Performing Arts High School in Philadelphia.

So they took an old Motown tune, dusty in the vaults, "It's So Hard to Say Goodbye" from "Cooley High" reworked it into *Cooleyhighharmony* and sat back. Twenty-five years after the Tempts sang "My Girl" to the top of the charts, BIIM helped Motown say goodbye to the doldrums, and it wasn't hard at all. This was black pop for this generation, with an appeal that sliced through gender, age and national boundaries. What a debut. It sold seven million units worldwide, generated enough awards to fill an auditorium including two Grammys, three American Music Awards, two Soul Train Awards, two NAACP Image Awards and two MTV Awards.

Then, in '92, came the cataclysmic event that would change music history—again—in a way not even Berry Gordy might have imagined. Up stepped the Smokey Robinson of his generation, Babyface, and his then-partner L.A. Reid, with "End of the Road." The song did the unthinkable. It topped the pop charts for 14 weeks and knocked the King, Elvis Presley, from his long-held chart longevity title.

Revelry was put in check by reality. Could BIIM deliver like those old Motown groups who churned out hit after hit? The test would be their sophomore album. The answer is oh, yeah, *1.2.3/Easy as ABC*. It is often said about old Motown, everything was formulaic. If so, it was a formula that worked, like the current combination of combustion—a collection of producers whose credits are staggering.

Babyface, Jimmy and Terry, Dallas, L.A. and Tim & Bob understood this was to be an album about love/life in all its complexities and they came out for love and the Boyz in a big way. Babyface gave them the lush, joyous, "I'll Make Love to You," a ballad with as much dramatic content as "End of the Road." Also from Babyface is "Water Runs Dry," slightly darker, despite its lilting melody. The urgency in the message that love might be lost is emphasized by the tonal qualities of the upright bass, cello, slightly plaintive violins and Babyface on acoustic guitar. "Babyface has a musical outlook that's different from anyone else," Wanya says. "He's his own genre. He's changing music." Again.

Dallas Austin gave the group its first hit, "Motownphilly." This time, the young producer helps the group show another dimension of its vocal versatility. The song, "Thank U," influenced by the group's idols Take 6, provides a complex and compelling performance.

While it may sound strange to call Face, Jimmy and Terry or even Dallas, veteran producers, they are. Old Motown was thirsty for new producers. They were often the only ones with time to help an artist develop to the next level.

That's why BIIM is happy Dallas gave them another terrific present. It came in the form of producers Tim & Bob. "They are the next Jimmy Jam and Terry Lewis," offers Wanya. They worked in tandem with the members of the group in bringing the foursome's own visions to life. BIIM wanted to show their jazz training, thus the jazzy, intricate "U Know." Tim & Bob also worked with Wanya on "Trying Times." Wayna wanted to deal with a subject not stressed in today's all-too-sexual, explicit turn in songwriting. "Let's talk about the trials and tribulations of a monogamous relationship. Boyz II Men believes in monogamy. I'm not saying we're perfect or that all of us are always in monogamous relationships. It's just that we know there's a difference between making love and making lust."

T&B also gave Shawn the answer to one of his dreams, one night in the studio. "Long before that night, I had written a chorus. I had this picture in my mind of a room filled with burning candles. Fifty candles," Shawn says. "They played me their melody and I started singing my chorus. It fit perfectly."

Lastly, the duo produced "Vibin'," a scrumptious sliceof-studio life.

Happily those veterans Jimmy and Terry weren't too busy to participate in this project. But it was dicey there for a moment. The hitmakers had politely declined, until prevailed upon—seriously by the foursome.

Jimmy and Terry provided a song that will make every woman with a radio go stand in front of it and say "That's what I'm talkin' about. You need to beg!" Any man who wants to save his romance, might get another shot by playing this beggin-at-its-best song. How can she resist lines like "No, I don't believe our love's terminal/I'm down on my knees/begging you please." It may be a bit theatrical to say he'll "never walk again until you come back to me/I'm down on bended knee," but it'll get the job done especially when it's backed by a chorus that soars and swells and demands forgiveness.

They also contributed "All Around the World," which sharply shows the difference in the first three years of BIIM's touring itinerary from their Motown predecessors who mainly rode the East Coast's highways in their early years.

But unlike some groups, you'll get no complaints from this quartet. Mike says, "We haven't had any time off, but we're happy people want to see us, know us, hear us."

Nate adds, "It's what we do. We sing and we want the people radio and those who listen to black radio to know how much we appreciate how they feel about us."

There's a barometer for that feeling. Motown shipped 2.2 units and a million sold in the first week. Fans were on their feet and cheering like mad at the group's appearance on the MTV Awards; strong indicators all that Boyz II Men Then and Now are Back II Motown's future.







Chicago Mourns MAJOR LANCE

Legendary rhythm and blues singer Major Lance died in his sleep last week. He began recording in 1959 and had a string of hits including "Um, Um, Um, Um, Um, Um," "The Monkey Time," "The Matador," "Rhythm," "Sometimes I Wonder," "Come See," and "Ain't It A Shame." Most of these were written by Curtis Mayfield. All of Lance's records were produced by Carl Davis and recorded on the Okeh label, which Davis ran after it was re-activated by Columbia. A multi-million seller back in the day was equivalent to double platinum today.

Davis stated "He was the most positive person I ever became involved with. He never had anything bad to say about anyone and helped young kids."

At Lance's funeral there was the now traditional gathering of Chicago-based entertainers. Gatling Funeral Home auditorium, which is equipped for live recordings and videos, held many entertainers from back in the day. Most paid a musical tribute to Lance, performing a few of the songs made popular by him. Among the mourners were Davis, Jerry Butler, Chuck Barksdale of the Dells, Willie Henderson, Otis Clay, Gene Barge, Gene Chandler, Gus Redmond, Granville White and Otis Leavill. Lance died at the age of 55.

Jesse Bolden, singer with the Artistics, who recorded "I'm Going To Miss You," also died during

the same time period. The Artistics recorded for Okeh.

WVAZ-FM presented its annual "World's Largest Stepper Contest" in which 50 contestants competed for cash prizes in the amount of \$22,000. Over 6,000 fans filled the largest ballroom in Chicago, dressed in the finest attire available. Fashions included everything from Georgio Armani and Sonja Rykiel down to



J.C. Penny. Providing entertainment for the contest were Tony Terry and El DeBarge.

DeBarge's performance was notable as he had a thousand women hanging off the stage swooning on every note and smile. DeBarge's music is a favorite among the Chicago steppers crowd. It would behoove a promoter to bring DeBarge to the city in concert.

Earlier in the morning, DeBarge and Terry appeared live on the radio station pumping the event

and securing a place in the hearts of Chicagoans.

Boyz II Men were also in town performing for WGCI-FM across town. They appeared at the Riviera Night Club three miles from the V103 Steppers Contest. Opening the show for Boyz II Men were local a recording artist and a comedian.

Prior to the concert, Boyz II Men visited V103's morning show for a few antics with hosts John Monds and Bonnie DeShong. Leaving V103, the group visited Johnson Publishing. After a luncheon at JPC, the group visited WGCI and the Doug Banks Show. While at the station, Wanya, Nate, Mike and Shawn delivered a dream come true for 16 year-old Gabriele Dyson as they serenaded her with the "Happy Birthday" song.

Robin Robinson, anchor newswoman for Fox TV here in Chicago, will soon take on a new job as the 10 till 2am host of the Quiet Storm on WGCI-FM. Robinson got her first taste of disc-jockeying while guest starring for Tom Joyner after his contract was up with the station. She was among numerous personalities who took the airwaves after Tom's departure.

No word on what will happen to Mike Hudson, who currently holds the evening slot. Congratulations to Kirkeland Burke and Dina Davis on winning the promotion persons of the year at the annual WEA Convention held in Cleveland, Ohio.

The City of Chicago has also lost one of its most famous restaurant entrepreneurs with the death of Mary Coles, former owner of the famous Army & Lou Restaurant. For over 30 years, the restaurant played host to the carriage trade and entertainers from all over the world. It was a


