





New Generation of Blacks Offer Choice To South Africa

Prominent American blacks such as actor Danny Glover, athlete/singer Shaquille O'Neal, publisher Earl Graves, attorney Johnnie L. Cochran, Jr. and Motown execs Jheryl Busby and Clarence Avant are among the investors putting up an initial \$15 million to control 75% of a Pepsi bottling venture in South Africa. Announced by Nelson Mandela at the General Assembly of the United Nations, he

emphasized the crucial needs of his country's economic development and encouraged investors to seek out his 40 million consumers.

Over thirty companies have started re-investing in the territory having previously pulled out in support of the anti-apartheid economic sanctions imposed. Mandela's trip to the U.S. this week stressed South Africa's desire to once again have these investors.

The Pepsi deal in which Pepsi provides \$5 million in start up capital towards a \$100 million investment over three years marks one of the largest re-investments in the country where Coca Cola currently controls 90% of the softdrink market.

Madonna Settles Dancer Suit

Invasion of privacy was the issue in a suit filed in 1992 by three dancers in Madonna's "Blond Amibtion" 1991 tour that was settled confidentially out of court.

According to Debra Johnson of the black women law firm of Johnson & Slaton, who served as co-counsel on the case, "We were nearly unable to pursue the claims in the case because of Madonna's superior financial resources." However, following the settlement agreement, the suit against Boy Toy, Inc., Miramax and Propoganda Films for use of personal offstage footage in Madonna's film "Truth Or Dare" was dismissed.



ASCAP Has ACE On-Line

If so, you can access ASCAP data on titles, songwriters, publishers and performers of works in the ASCAP repertory through ACE (ASCAP's Clearance Express) system, 24 hours a day, everyday, for free (except the cost of the phone call).

ASCAP ceo Dan Gold commented, "Feedback from

our test group of users has been positive—we've been praised for the accuracy and comprehensiveness of the information provided and for the ease of access. ACE will be of great value to members, record companioes, clearing houses, researchers and to our customers who wish to find out more about ASCAP music."

Outburst Records, a Long Beach independent label that exploded with native artist Domino recently, is opting to follow umbrella label RAL to Polygram distribution thereby departing from Columbia where RAL originally had ad deal when they signed Outburst.

According to Outburst president "Anti" Lewis and vp "Greedy" Greg Jessie, Outburst's decision was with "mixed emotions." "We're firmly ensconced in RAL's pipeline and at this time quite pleased with the arrangement," commented Lewis who has a fourth single on Domino currently in the streets and development groups La Rocko Tee, Mo. Ken. Stef. and Jiboh, B.G. Knoccout and Dresta ready for release.

CompuServ Archives Video and Historical Graphics

CompuServ, the online information service for personal PC users, has added two graphics sections: 1) The Archives Film Forum (GO ARCFILM), a video library covering all subjects from the beginning of civilization to the present including world history, U.S. history, Hollywood, politics, sports, the arts and current events; and 2) the Bettmann Archive Forum (GO BETTMANN), 16 million historical images dating back to the Civil War.

The Film Forum stores full motion video segments in the .AVI format for computers running Microsoft Windows allowing software to be downloaded on most systems.

The two online services available to CompuServ subscribers complement existing archives of entertainment and movie clips and multimedia and MIDI/music product support forums and the Reuters News Pictures Forum and Archive Photos Forum.



SINGLE OF THE Week

SILK-I CAN GO DEEP-JIVE

When Keith Sweat first discovered Silk, he probably didn't imagine that the Atlanta quintet would grow to become one of the top male vocal groups at black radio. Now two years later they're still as fresh as they were when they made their debut with "Happy Days." As has been the trend with many of Silk's songs, this is a slow to midtempo groove with plenty of late night qualities. Featured on the soundtrack of the forthcoming movie *A Low Down Dirty Shame*, this Mike "Nice" Chapman and Trent Thomas produced song comes in eight various mixes that all set the tempo for love. The females will undoubtedly be the song's biggest fans. Demos: Alf.

ALBUM OF THE WEEK

BARRY WHITE—THE ICON IS LOVE—A&M

White, an icon himself, returns with an album in keeping with his normal excellence. With one of the most recognizable voices in the music industry, he instantly charms you as he opens the album with his current single "Practice What You Preach," a midtempo smoothie that was co-written with Gerald Levert. A trademark White groove follows as he warbles in his quiet storm manner on the spectacular "There It Is," another "Secret Garden" in the making. Programmers should make an exception here and play all seven minutes of this song as it completely overwhelms you for the whole time. The Jam and Lewis combination works well on "I Only Want To Be With You," another slow groove that opens with White softly rapping before making way for a 70's sounding White song. The loving mood keeps coming as "Baby's Home" slows the tempo and allows White to once again start the song with a soft rap before giving his all vocally over very mellow backing vocals. The most uptempo song on the album, "Come On," is a midtempo song that once again brings back memories of the classic White style he is so well known for. The album's title track presents a gentle, slow beat with White's softly, seducing vocals backed by a complementary chorus. A faster paced "Sexy Undercover" warrants a check out as dance-styled keyboards move nicely with a pleasant string section. "Whatever We Had, We Had," should become a popular song

with the ladies as White gently says all the things they love to hear. Once again Barry White will grace urban playlists with this fine collection of songs. Demos: All.



SINGLES

LO-KEY—"TASTY"—PERSPECTIVE—Lo-Key has delivered one of those midtempo cuts that feels better and better each time you play it. Elements of funk move "Tasty" along with thick bass and percussion. Clever lyrics and vocal action should make this hot track a favorite at urban radio with the adults. Younger demos will definitely nod their heads to the single's fat grooves and beats. Delivering jam after jam, Lo-Key continues to show their potential for longevity. Produced by Lance Alexander and prof t. for Flyte Tyme Productions, Inc. Demos: All

DA BRAT—"FA ALL Y'ALL"—SO SO DEF/CHAOS/COLUMBIA—Da Brat comes back making more funky noise with "Fa All Y'all." This substantial follow-up to her platinum-plus hit "Funkdafied" should maintain her momentum and her spot at the top of your playlists. Produced and remixed by Jermaine Dupri, "Fa All Y'all" rocks with enough thick, Clinton-esqe bass to put a hump in your granny's back. Brat's catchy call-and-response party hook will have streams of listeners calling in to ask, "Who's that making that funky noise?!!?" Demos: Rap Fans

PHIL PERRY—"ONE TOUCH"—MCA/GRP—This silky new single from Phil Perry is right for late night or cruising the afternoon drive. "One Touch" soothes with beautifully arranged vocals, lush harmonies, and romantic lyrics. Adult demos especially will appreciate this smooth selection from Perry's "Pure Pleasure" album. Produced by Barry J. Eastmond, this slow-jamming steamer will put your listeners in the mood for more great love songs from Phil Perry. Demos: Adults

ALBUMS

KARYN WHITE—MAKE HIM DO RIGHT—WB—Karyn White's new album shows us this beautiful songstress is still a Superwoman when it comes to delivering great urban music. White's lead single, "Hungah," gives only the first taste of her substantial collection. An array of emotionally-charged ballads and midtempo-upbeat jams, her album was produced by a superstar team of hitmakers including Jam & Lewis, Babyface, Daryl Simmons, Jellybean Johnson and herself. The moving title track from Make Him Do Right, produced by Daryl Simmons, just may become the female national anthem with regards to relationships: "If he's gonna stay/you'd better tell him the rules...Ain't gonna be no staying out late/He'd better bring it all home to you." White keeps much of her music on the lighter, romantic side with catchy cuts like "Simple Pleasures" and "I'm Your Woman." Steamy jams like "Can I Stay With You?" and "Nobody But My Baby" will keep late-night buzzing for a long while. Demos: All

CRAIG MACK—PROJECT: FUNK DA WORLD—BAD BOY/ARISTA—When Craig Mack dropped his new flavor in our ears with his blow-up debut single, "Flava In Ya Ear," the countdown began to the release of his debut album. Now Mack's full-length set *Project: Funk Da World* has arrived, and the flavor is tastier than ever. Easy Mo Bee, who produced tracks for Miles Davis' final project *Doo Bop*, produced Mack's lead single and delivered songs of similar fortitude for the rest of his album. Others producers include Rashad Smith, Lenny "Ace" Marrow and Mack himself. Mack continues to rock parties with cuts like "Funk Wit' Da Style" and "Mainline." Even when his lyrics take a more topical turn on tracks like "Judgment Day" and "When God Comes," Craig Mack's appeal remains intact and increases his potential for longevity in the rap music arena. Demos: Rap Fans

JOHNNY "GUITAR" WATSON—BOW WOW—WILMA/BELLMARK—With his unmistakeable style, Johnny "Guitar" Watson has returned with a funky blues/R&B collection that will please his longtime fans and win new recruits as well. The title single from his album Bow Wow is already attracting attention at radio and provides the first look into the legend's latest set. Watson is in particularly funky form on "I Don't Think So." On this cut his jazz-tinged vocal style flows so raw that it must have given birth to melodic rap vocalists like Snoop and Domino. On the slow-creeping blues jam "Doing Wrong Woman," Watson opens with his trademark guitar licks, then drops vocals through a Roger-style vocoder. Other notable tracks include "What's Up With You" and "Never Too Late," a soothing groove with a catchy vocal arrangement. In general, Watson shows that he is in touch with urban music's current vibe, but delivers his timeless bluesy funk in a manner that does not compromise his artistry. Demos: Adults

THUG LIFE—VOLUME 1—OUT DA GUTTAINTERSCOPE/AG—Tupac Shakur, leader of this new rap act Thug Life, stars on an album packed with contagious rhymes and tales of gangsta life. "Bury Me A G" opens the album and is a chilling story of death as Thug Life and the crew issue their last requests. Next comes the excellent "Don't Get Twisted," an uptempo song with a fresh beat that's sure to see time as a future single release. The group's first single, "Pour A Little Liquor," reminisces about dead homies and has already attracted a strong response for its clever use of Gamble and Huff's classic "Cry Together." Not missing a beat, Thug Life keep the good grooves coming as more winners like the slow paced "How Long Will They Mourn Me," featuring the vocals of fellow west coast rapper Warren G, earns a nod. Check out the faster rhyme "Under Pressure," another strong rhyme with a synthesized, dreamy beat whose change of pace adds diversity to the album. Thug Life round out the album with "Str8 Ballin," a song that's a straight up gangsta tale of blunts and avoiding the police—all over samples of Bootsy Collins' "What's A Telephone Bill." The way the samples are utilized without drowning the song and without overusing them makes this as good a rap album as there's been in a long time. Tupac illustrates here that he's one of the most artistic rhymers on the block. Demos: Rap Fans.



The sexy video certainly added to Virgin's Janet Jackson release this week as the hottest new song at black radio. "You Want This" easily ran away with being the most most added title. From the ianet album, it continues the album's remarkable streak scoring big in all regions with over 43 adds. An easy crossover swinger too. Station adds included WJLB-FM, KMOJ-FM, WAMO-FM, WKKV-FM, WQMG-FM, WYNN-FM and WTLC-FM.

GRP/MCA's Phil Perry gets set to ignite the airwaves with the first release off his sophomore solo album. For a debut release on a new label, Perry couldn't have asked for a better start as he collected 25 adds for "One Touch" from a host of stations that included KFXZ-FM, WBLK-FM, KNEK-FM KXZZ-FM.

It's good see two veteran acts still getting their props as The Temptations and Nancy Wilson both showed that they've still got a huge audience who appreciates their music. For the Temptations, recent recipients of a star on Hollywood Walk of Fame, the 20 adds they received came for their "Error Of Our Ways" release on Motown. WZAK-FM, KIPR-FM, WCKX-FM, WAMO-FM and WEUP-AM added the song to their lists.


Wilson adds came for her "I Can't Make You Love Me" single, a cover of the Bonnie Riatt song that's also Wilson's second release off her Love Nancy album. Coming in at fourth place this week, the song was added by 17 stations that included KMOJ-FM, WBLS-FM, WJTT-FM, KMJJ-FM, KFXZ-FM and KNEK-FM.

Section 336 of the Community
Development and regulatory Improvement

signed by the President, contains the new
rules regulating the advertising of consumer leases on radio.

Radio leasing commercials are in compliance with the new radio ad leasing regulations when they contain the following information: "that the transaction is a lease; the amount of any payment required at the inception of the lease or that no such payment is required, (if that is the case, the number, amounts, due dates or periods of scheduled payments); the

Midsize Markets Lead in Duopoly Benefits

The greatest number of duopoly ownership arrangements in radio exists in midsize markets controlling an average 34.6% of audience shares ages 12+, accounting for an average 47.9% of advertising revenue share in the market. In smaller markets, duopolized stations control an average 22.7% of the audience share and account for an average 31.6% of the market revenue.

The station survey was part of James Duncan's latest survey of station ownership trends. Duncan's conclusions are based on revenue estimates from the 1993 Duncan's Radio Market Guide and audience share estimates from Arbitron's spring 1994 survey.





Houston, Miami and New York Bring New Life to Indies

VIP Serves Up Something Different In H-Town

Like their hometown NBA Rockets, VIP Entertainment, a Houston based independent, wants to be the champion in their field. The brainchild of Jamaican born entrepreneur Earl Brown, VIP Entertainment is readying itself for the release of its debut project from rappers 2nd Tyme Around. Says Gloria Grayson, VIP's a&r promo mgr, "Brown has been running his own businesses for a long time now and only recently decided that he would like to get into the music industry."

Before starting VIP, Brown ran a popular Jamaican restaurant in Houston. "His transformation from restauranteur to label owner came quite easily as he'd been throwing dancehall events and showcases that attracted a good response," Grayson comments. "He loved being around the music and the performers and, before long, people were saying 'why don't you invest in your own label.' Being the sort of person he is, he went straight to work."

To get the ball rolling, Brown entered 2nd Tyme Around on a local radio station's "pump it or dump it" show. Recalls Grayson, "To our delight 2nd Tyme Around won the show three weeks in a row."

With 60% of the 125 or so independents in the Houston loop espousing the urban genre, VIP is still confident of attaining a degree of success. "Other than Rap-A-Lot Records there aren't that many successful black owned independents so we feel we can really enter the arena with a strong chance of success," mentions Grayson.

To try and match some of the success Rap-A-Lot has enjoyed, the newly formed VIP has already signed another new act, Sess, whom they feel can really put them on the map. "We hope to add to the growing sound of H-Town," says Grayson.

Fly Records: Up, Up And Away in N.Y.

Farmingdale, N.Y. is the location of the new independent label Fly Records. Founded by a thirty year veteran of the music industry, Stan Stecker, Fly aims to become a dominating label in the years to come by featuring R&B and hip-hop on its roster. "We have an amazing agenda for 1995," says Fly's Jason St Clair. "We're probably going to spend the first few months pushing our flagship artist Selena Wilson, a vocal student of Patricia Carey, Mariah's mother. You could call Selena her protege."

Accumulating what St. Clair terms "A helluva team," Fly feels it is on its way to great things. We have several million dollars tied up in this label and also feel we have the right philosophy as everything we do is done as a top notch job." As they get ready to release product from Wilson, the label is also soliciting material for future projects. Says St Clair, "The buzz around the Fly offices tells me that we're getting ready for an incredible time in 1995 when we hope to step to the forefront of the Miami music scene."

Can Miami Handle Stress??

Over the last few years the city of Miami, FL has become a hip-hop hot bed as numerous independents like Pandisc and Luke Records have enjoyed success. Now there's a new kid on the block who hopes to enjoy its own share of the market. Behind this new label called Stress Records is self-made businessman Kenny Lurry, who states "Stress has wasted no time in its early stages, already signing four top talents." Those artists Lurry speaks so fondly of are all male vocal groups: State-O-Mind, rappers Gangsta Shorties and South Squad as well as solo male vocalist Rick Simon. "We're changing the rules as we go along," Lurry says, "but the whole business will always be about marketing and promoting talented artists here and abroad."

When Lurry says abroad, he means that the label is currently seeking distribution agreements in key demographic regions of the United States, Europe and Canada.


"Like any new label we're trying to get as much exposure as we can," mentions Jack Wolfe, Stress Records publicist. "We're certain to get that soon because our artists are going to be doing the first ever Night Of Gangsta's show with MC-Eiht and Notorious B.I.G. in Miami on October 15th.

For Lurry, a man only in his 20's who grew up on the mean streets of urban Miami, this is a chance to give back something to his city. He comments, "Hopefully I can provide Miami's R&B, rap and Caribbean music talents a label of their own." If so, then Miami's growing independent scene will have another member to add to its ranks.



Reciprocally, Virgin enthuses over its latest charge in the most glowing of terms. "He's the first artist I've met and worked with where everybody just loves this guy," says Wayman Jones, vp of R&B promotion, "And that's unique, because you're gonna have some pitfalls in this business, it's a tough business. Everybody loves this guy. And we received so many company accolades when we were able to get him. It was real pleasing for us to have the market-place, radio, general retail and other artists to call us (with

Ironically, perhaps it's Terry's artistry and compassion that have presented the conundrum for marketing experts. His two albums on Epic, Forever



praise on signing Terry)."



Yours, and Tony Terry cover a wide span of musical territory. This quality is welcomed by music fans but has caused many bottom-line industry pros to shake their heads. Moreover, he has made a concerted effort to portray himself as a sensitive, caring protagonist, swimming upstream against the abundance of "booty call/sex you up" fare.

With Virgin giving him more of a free hand in his expressions, and taking a firmer hand in the production chores, Terry expands on these tenets with *Heart Of A Man*.

"With the flood of "sex you up" records that radio currently plays," Terry says "I thought that not only was it time for something else, there's certainly room for it. I don't view women as bitches and 'hos. I view them as mothers, sisters and daughters."

Terry also explores the near-taboo subject of male vulnerability. Songs like, "When A Man Cries," "Heart Of A Man," "I'm Sorry," and a stirring cover of the Donny Hathaway classic "I Love You More Than You'll Ever Know, " lay the soul bare. He says that his mother suggested he put the Hathaway track on the album after hearing it in one of his sets.

"I wanted to put myself on the line emotionally just to prove the point that it's okay to do so," he elaborates, "You're not a punk if you do. I think men are just



as emotional, just as sensitive as women. We just tend to not show it. We all cry. We all have cried, but we'll only do it behind closed doors. That's okay, if that's what you wanna do, but I wanted just to [let men] know that when you do, it's okay.

Terry's grounding, as well as his devotion to his craft, are manifest from his roots in the church. He cites his family, who performed as The Freedom Gospel Singers, as some of his key musical influences. After they moved from North Carolina to Washington, D.C., Terry—having been bitten by "the bug"—was singing in church, weddings and doing local talent shows. At the

time, he was attending D.C.'s School of the Arts to hone his craft.

After he graduated, the young singer skipped college to pursue his professional goals. He'd heard about an audition for a part in the holiday musical "Black Nativity," based on the poem by Langston Hughes, for the Theater of Universal Images (TUNI) in Newark. At the time, he was 19 and holding down a lucrative position managing a restaurant. "To Joe Blow, he would have been laid. He would have made a career out of it. But I aspired to perform. I just was not complete if I wasn't able to do it."

Throwing caution to the wind, Terry quit the restaurant job, packed up and moved to New York City. He landed a part in the musical and stayed through a couple of seasons at TUNI, all the while, again, running around looking for opportunities to sing. From there, he landed a part in the off-Broadway hit "Mama, I Want

To Sing."

Then in '87, Terry got his big break from Epic. His debut album yielded three major R&B hits: "Forever Yours," "She's Fly" and "Lovey Dovey." The '90 follow up produced three more hit singles, "Head Over Heels," "Everlasting Love" and "With You." On the strength of this album, he was nominated for two '91 Soul Train Awards: Artist of the Year and Single of the Year. Yet, despite his consistency, he seemed to be always on the verge, but never quite going over the top. "When I first signed to Epic," he reflects, "I think it kind of took everybody by surprise. I think maybe it wasn't really

expected to work as well as it did. But it did, and I was fortunate in that regard."

Terry is hopeful that the change of scenery will be just the career propulsion that has eluded him. "It was educational," he says of his Epic experience, "I made a lot of friends that I still have over at that label. But at the time when I was about to work on my third album, a better opportunity came up. I took it." When asked if this opportunity included higher visibility, great product output and company support, he allowed in diplomatic fashion, "That was partially it." Terry is philosophical about the pace his career had taken, "It does take time. And all we can do is keep chugging away. I'm fortunate in that all of my efforts have been released. They have been moderately successful, but I have not had to have years and years and years and years of frustration. It's been gradual, but it's been upward. And to me that's building a firm foundation."

Jones says emphatically that Virgin plans on cross-marketing Terry "to any format that'll have him. We try not to tell anybody what they're doing, but we feel it's there." Terry has plans to tour in support of the album and to expand on writing and producing for other acts under his company, Double Fish Productions. "I've been fortunate thus far in my career to always have been put in the right place at the right time. And I consider that a blessing. So I want to create a situation where I can make something happen for someone else now."

For now, he has his hands full with his own release and taking his career "to the next level." He adds with pride, "This album could be a tool for the fellas to use in maybe realizing who they are emotionally or just deciding to explore who they are emotionally. And even if one brother takes it and says, 'Damn, maybe I should check myself,' then mission accomplished."



Los Angeles-based rap artist Filthy Frank is donating 20% of the retail sales royalties from his G-Vine Records debut single, "Luv N Da Hood," toward the building of a new computer learning center near his hometown of Watts. Frank and Stan Sheppard of G-Vine are currently in discussions with Senator Diane Watson and Senator Theresa Hughes with regards to the building plans for the center.

Frank was inspired to take on this endeavor while writing "Luv N Da Hood." The song addresses the detrimental impact gang violence in Los Angeles and other cities has on our communities. A hard-edged storyteller, Frank himself had been caught up in gang culture. So he understands that gang-

bangers must be shown a viable work alternative to their violent lives on the streets. Otherwise, they will continue to use the need to "get paid and survive" as a justification of their actions

"Frank came to me and said that he wanted to 'put his money where his mouth is," Sheppard explains. "So we are building this center in our area for disadvantaged teens to learn some badly needed computer skills and better prepare themselves for their entry into the job market."

Jim Hill of KCBS Sports has agreed to be the spokesperson for the forthcoming fundraising drive for the Watts computer learning center. Sheppard noted that BMG Records has expressed interest in the project and may match any charitable funds raised during the drive. 
Gerald Alston's legendary voice once carried the Manhattans to platinum successes with hits like "Kiss and Say Goodbye" and "Shining Star." Now he returns with First Class Only, a new collection of love songs with the potential to put him back on top of the charts as a solo artist. Strong hooks and grooves are found throughout Alston's

album. Tempos range from ballads to soothing midtempo jams, perfectly showcasing Alston's rich vocals. "Stay the Night" and "Just Say Yes Tonight" are midtempo invitations to love whose slamming funk elements should broaden Alston's appeal with younger demos. The album's most sizzling tracks include "Tell Me," "I Believe," and a pleasing, instrumentally-current rendition of "Kiss and Say Goodbye." Certain to be a late-night/Quiet Storm favorite, First Class Only is packed with selections strong enough to play all day. Demos: Adults.

The Manhattans Now should please longtime fans of the original Manhattans with this collection. Produced by Stephen C. Washington, these songs will nourish the listener who hungers for new music



with a classic soul vibe. The Manhattans Now give us ethereal harmonies and vocal arrangements throughout the project. "The One Who Adores You" is a butter-smooth, midtempo jam that should generate interest with a wide range of urban radio demos. Other promising selections include the uplifting songs "A Change Is Gonna Come" and "Touch the Hem of His Garment," two must-check records for inspirational/contemporary gospel formats. Jazz Notes

Radio programmers spying new releases should find some nice contemporary jazz material for their airwave arsenals.

Heads Up artist Gerald Veasley turns in a favorable performance on his new release Look Ahead. His six-string bass has a monsterous thrum that is alternately silky and melodic. Funk is the word on this new jazz jaunt, which includes guest artists Grover Washington, Jr., Russell Ferrante, Dennis Chambers, George Jinda and Chieli Minucci of Special EFX. The Street,' To "Salamanca," "Soul Seduction,"
"Tranquility Bass," "Walking Through Walls," and "Imani," could add spice to a contemporary radio format. This LP not only spotlights Veasley's fusion skills, but should boost Heads Up International's market share for '94.

GRP saxophonist Bob Berg, who released a vast scorcher with his hard-bopping Enter The Spirit LP, embraces a more exotic approach on his current Riddles project. "Riddles" largely blends World Music, Latin, Brazilian, and Eastern European sounds. Programmers not inclined to a world music approach, will probably jump on Berg's Tom Costerpenned tune "Coaster." It's a hard '70s fusion cut, largely carried by a funky, rhythmic bottom and Berg's aggressive tone on top. People who enjoyed the swinging barrages of notes on his last LP will hear less of that this time out. His hair-parting solos give way to a more sensitive mood.

Sin-Drome artist Peter White is a poltergeist who keeps on coming. This talented six-string guitarist always


have helped him dominate NAC/Contemporary charts, and last year's "Promenade" ranked among the top LPs on radio. White, who is known for making pop sounds workable and appealing, covers a collection of '70s tunes on his latest outing, Reflections. Saxophonists Boney



James and Sam Riney accompany him on "Walk On By," "Will You Still Love Me Tomorrow," "My Cherie Amour," "How Deep Is Your Love," "Wake Up Everbody," and Jerry Butler's "Never Gonna Give You Up."

Drummer Billy Cobham takes the sum of his world travels and compiles them on his new Evidence release, The Traveler. Influenced largely by Brazilian music, this fusion veteran impresses with a polished record that features a splendid balance of vocals and rhythms. Bassists Ira Coleman, Mark Mondesir, keyboardists Gary Husband and Joe Chindamo and singer Carole Rowley strengthen the sessions herein. While "Traveler" is not as brawny as some of Cobham's past fusion work, people will take notice. Best cuts include "Alpha Waves," "On The Inside Track," and "Dippin' The Biscuits In the Soup." Cobham is a fixture with the Jazz Explosion Superband, featuring Najee, Stanley Clarke and Larry Carlton. This master of technique made his bones

playing with Miles Davis, Horace Silver and the Mahavishnu Orchestra. Die hards who





remember his Spectrum, A Funky Thide (sic) Of Things and Crosswinds LPs will find that there are still some smooth rolling tricks left in him.

Fresh from his Acid Jazz forays with The Soulsonics, classical guitarist Marc Antoine oozes warmth and coolness on his NYC Records release Classical Soul. Yellowjackets bassist Jimmy Haslip lends a pleasing bass pulsation to the modern mood of "Smart But Casual." Sam Riney, Mark Maineiri, John Lewis, Lenny Castro, and Willie McNeil comprise this urban-tinged entourage, whose material should do double duty on Wave and contemporary formats. Bernadette Barlow supplied the whispery vocals on "French Dream.

"P.C.H." and "Unity" are also mind-soothing selections.

On the straight-ahead side of the street, programmers have been wondering how to place the raw, honest, quirky sound of Warner/Reprise alto saxophonist Sonny Simmons.



Although Simmons seems to have an avant-garde sense. those attuned to this mode of jazz may preceive that he is quite linear. You just have to listen and see where Simmons going.

His Ancient Ritual LP features bassist Charnett Mofett and drummer Zarak Simmons (Sonny's son). Together, they are acoustic painters of sound: seemingly disparate, but free flowing, rhythmic and spontaneous. Their music recalls the

seeking choruses of John Coltrane's latter years.

Simmons' plays his second instrument, the English horn, in a tone resoundingly similar to the oboe used in Yusef Lateef's "Love Theme from Spartacus." "Sundown In Egypt" is a modern vehicle that captures this same sort of virtuosity, and one would suspect it's an oboe until consulting the credits. Simmons' melodic choruses and relaxed trap drumming have an Eastern, hypnotic mood similar. His track "Theme For

PETER WHITE

Linda" reveals a seductive softness.

Having

recording with a variety of masters early in his career, Simmons is a veritable link to the music of Eric Dolphy, Charles Mingus, Roland Kirk and Sonny Rollins. Moffett and Zarak Simmons also hold their own in this trio. Nobody messes with the classics, you say? Well, some musicians try it all the time. Dragon Rose alto saxophonist Arthur Barron has surfaced on various jazz playlists with his ambitious Soul Messenger. With strong tra-

ditonal aptitude, Barron seeks to make cuts like Wayne Shorter's "Foot Steps" and Miles Davis' "All Blues" more user-friendly. He deletes much of their swing undergirding and marries the remainder to percussive, funk rhythms. This move is an obvious play towards all the listeners who must feel a strong backbeat to understand a cut. Not all may agree with this attempt. but it is a courageous departure. ≥=

Ivory's Notes

R&B's Honor Guard

I started listening to bits of Emperors Of Soul, Motown's comprehensive five-CD Temptations compilation, and thought back to several years ago, when none other than David Ruffin held a crowded elevator for me in the Jolly Roger building on Sunset Blvd.

Once I squeezed in, I saw that Eddie Kendricks was on board too. This was just after the two had finished the Temptations' 1982 Reunion album and tour and had taken to working as a duo.

How many people can say they shared an elevator with the men who sang "My Girl," "Ain't Too Proud To Beg," "The Girl's Alright" and "Just My Imagination?" Not Elizabeth Taylor, and she's world renowned in her own right. Not Neil Armstrong; he'll have to settle with being the first man on the moon, Riding with Ruffin and Kendricks was kinda like saying you shared an elevator with Batman or the X-Men. Same thing. Super heros, all.

Not many people in the elevator perhaps on their way to a doctor's appointment, business meeting or back to work after lunch seemed to

realize they were sharing space with virtual gladiators of song. But had I turned to the fellow-passengers and explained, "These are Temptations," you can believe all of them, young and old, black and white, racist and compassionate, could have related. But I didn't dare say such a thing. Fact is, even though I'd interviewed the fellas before-Ruffin just after he commenced a rocky solo career that produced the two marvelous singles, "My Whole World Ended (The Moment You Left Me)" and "Walk Away From Love," and Kendricks between hits like "Boogie Down," "Keep On Truckin'" and "He's A Friend"—putting a tape recorder in the faces of any of the Temptations never mortalized them for me. Hell, once I visited the Jackson's old Encino home on Hayvenhurst in the '70s and realized they too covered their furniture in plastic just like my aunt Betty back in Oklahoma-even my idols became just plain ol' flesh and blood. But not the Temps. In the elevator that day, we shook hands and then I leaned back and quietly reveled in the moment.

Over a remarkable four decades, original members Melvin Franklin and Otis Williams have recruited more good men than the Marines. However, what has kept the Temps themselves from ending up desperate or comical is that, despite years of trends and musical changes, the group has never tried to be anything other than what they were—the quintessential stand-up vocal group. In the

process they have become icons.

If you're old enough (or knowledgeable enough), whenever you see four or five polished black men in suits singing and dancing, inevitably you think about the Temptations. And when you see four or five black men standing there flat-footed with their jeans sagging and over-singing, you think, why aren't they trying to be like the Temptations. Either way, you can't help but

think back to the saga that is the Temps: Paul Williams' untimely (and some say, unresolved) death in Detroit in the '6Os; the group's everchanging line-up; the group's often bittersweet affair with the old Motown; the personal woes. Sounds like one hell of a movie to me.


Especially when you consider that, through it all, without even trying to, the Temptations, assisted by a handful of great songwriters, producers and musicians like Smokey Robinson, Norman Whitfield, Earl Dyke, **James** Jamerson and a host of others, not only made great music and turned in

electrifying live performances, but defined the R&B vocal group as an institution and supplied a musical and visual soundtrack to the art of Cool, a state and condition, no matter how many actors and musicians don leather jackets and wear their Fedoras cocked, that is inherently African-American.

Onstage and on record, the Temps were examples of soul at its most eloquent. Past members of the line-up might have had their complaints, but all have also likened their tenure to time in an exclusive calling, a kind of R&B honor guard. When you're a Temptation, no matter what's going on in your life, in the spotlight you dress a certain way, carry yourself with a certain respect and swagger. It's a pride thing that does not involve pulling your pants down onstage; you climax a show the old-fashioned way—by dancing just a little harder, and saving that big hit for last.

The other day I saw the Temptations performing on the "Today Show." It was yet another line up—Theo Peoples is the newest addition to the honor guard-but Ali-Ollie Woodson, unquestionably one of the best soul singers in the history of the genre, was laying it on thick this early in the morning.

Watching these legends—moving just a little slower but in step and in tune nonetheless—offered the reminder that if you've got something real and good, it can be good forever. Just keep gettin' up. Ladies and Gentlemen, these are the Temptations. Still.



Serious Women These Blackgirls

THEY'VE PUT IN QUITE a complex, busy seven months since Blackgirl's women first appeared on the pages of the BRE, when their Kaper/RCA debut album, *Treat U Right*, was released.

They've gained some treasured experiences during those months. There's been a round of station stop-bys, press outings and tours. They stopped in to share some of those moments with BRE.

As they settle into chairs, it's easy to note that Nycolia Turman, Pamela Copeland and Rochelle Stuart have taken on the patina of self-assurance that comes with extended exposure to a great many people. It certainly takes a strong sense of self-confidence to sit calmly in place and effortlessly deliver an a capella, yet scorchy version of their latest single.

"We've been busy, but we've had a great time," says "Tye-V," after finishing her lead chores on their current single,"Where Did We Go Wrong."

"We went on a USO tour and we feel really great about that," confided Pamela Copeland. "We felt sorry for the troops so far away from home. We traveled all over the Far East and Europe."

The guys were really happy to see us too," offers a smiling Rochelle Stuart, admitting there was a rather noisy response to the appearances of these three honeys.

"We've been working hard since the record came out, but we were working hard for a long time before then, too," says Tye-V.

If you are young, talented and in a hurry—as these three are—time is fairly relative. They came together when the exceptionally talented Darryl Simmons liked Turman's voice and thought she should put together a group of female singers who would be fresh, but also tip their stylish hat to the excellence of girl groups of the past. Things moved pretty fast after that.

Turman grabbed session singing pal Copeland; together they lined-up Stuart, another young lady with session experience.

Then came their audition at Kaper and the resulting deal. "All of it falls into place because of a place," says Turman.

"It seems like it's been a long time,

but I guess it really hasn't," Rochelle says thoughtfully.

The threesome then go into ten minutes of rapturous conversation that should be taped by the Atlanta Department of Tourism and Economic Development to lure the rest of the music business to their locale. When this observation is made, they laugh. "But the music business in Atlanta is small and like a family. It's all out there in one area," says Stuart.

"Everybody is there," says Turman who worked as a session singer for the LaFace operation as well as for Bobby Brown, Johnny Gill and After 7. In fact, one of those young producers 'just down the road', Dallas Austin, gave them their name.

Blackgirl has stilled the voices that compared them to the other girl groups. The girls think it's because both their style and sound capture the best of the old with all the heat of the new.

They do have heat. It's fueled by those excellent voices and the great production on their album. The list of producers

includes Derek DOA Allen, the team of Tricky and Sep, Christian and Arnold Henning and Darryl Simmons, the silent partner.

As they talk about the future,
Blackgirl reveals three young women with
a serious view of a future where they

"can make a difference." "I am going to be president of my own record label," says Tye-V, "and I don't mean just on the letterhead either. I plan to produce many other acts and build a strong label. This is not a business where many women have power at the top of things. I want to change that."

Meanwhile Rochelle has another direction in mind: "I am going to build a school in Watts with my own money so the government can't tell me what to do in it." Her beautiful smile appears only briefly during this discourse. "Our children are at risk and we have to get to them while they are still young and make a difference. I can do that."







BRE's creative director Lance Whitfield recently made an observation about how many artists stop in to see BRE grinnin' when they are struggling to get their careers off the ground, and then, when they become the "big" star, they only have time for the "big" magazines and t.v. A similar refrain has been heard from smaller radio stations and retailers. Knowing that I spent more time in the mainstream, people have asked me if only black artists did this. As I look back over the past sixteen years I've been in this journalism business, I find this doesn't make any difference, nor does the level of success. It's the person. Success isn't an excuse, and certain kinds of people don't use it as one. The nature of the person determines how they ultimately deal with success or struggle. None of us are fools. We know the difference when an artist is just being dragged out by the publicity agent doing a job. It shows. We all know when we are truly appreciated. Two examples this week: Rachelle Ferrell dropped by BRE and was gracious, thoughtful and no doubt equipped with the qualities that will bring her back to see us when her tenth album has just been released. (Or like Patti LaBelle, Frankie Beverly or Mavis Staples-whenever they have their hundredth!). Black Cezr also stopped in

and talked with us, very charmingly too. Artists who are good for the long run just behave differently, and, frankly, they're smarter. There's nothing all that clever about dissing fans or the press. For example, I sat and watched the Pointer Sisters at the House of Blues fest after their Hollywood Star ceremonies. They didn't eat any catfish bites the others of us were eagerly munching. They couldn't. Their fans wouldn't let them. Each sister-Ruth, June and Anita (Bonnie too)sat at different tables, endlessly signing autographs, t-shirts, scraps of paper-anything thrust at them. And I don't mean for ten minutes, either. They were still there doing it when we finished our meals and split. Remember, this is after they'd gone through the hours of the ceremony itself, performed a bit from their upcoming tour in "Ain't Misbehavin'" and taken a thousand photographs. Of course, the personality factors in. Some people get off signing autographs; others will do it knowing that fans will go to the record store and concert and keep that artist in business. 


