


Power Trio In Multimedia Deal

Jeffrey Katzenberg, ex chairman of Disney Studios, super producer Steven Spielberg and entertainment mogul David Geffen have formed a multimedia partnership with a view towards a more agreeable and financially sound structuring of deals.

It's been rumored for months that the threesome were in talks and most industry participants see it as formidable move. Katzenberg is the studio chief behind both film and TV successes, such as "The Lion King;" Spielberg's Amblin Entertainment recent successes are the \$900 million-plus grosser "Jurassic Park" and "Schindler's List;" Geffen's music business savvy includes an early release from the non-compete clause that was part of his sale of Geffen Records to MCA several years ago, in a deal that made him a billionaire.

Katzenberg will run the company, which is reported to be funded at around \$2 billion; most likely some of that funding came from Geffen. The exact day-to-day involvement of the other two is not clear at this time.

Amblin Entertainment Prods. is based at Universal; Geffen's film deal with Warner Bros. is about over and his next release is the up-coming Tom Cruise movie, "Interview With the Vampire."



# Almo Sounds Like

They have signed a pressing and distribution deal for North America with Geffen Records and expect to release their first three albums in the first half of next year.

The Almo Sounds label is a division of

Almo Sounds, Inc., under the aegis of Rondor Music International, Inc. which in turn encompasses the pair's music publishing interests Almo Music Corp. and Irving

Music, Inc.

Moss, who will hold the title of chairman and president, said, "We have a successful publishing company which is doing extremely well, but I like making records and I love working with musicians. The industry is in great shape and growing bigger and bigger. It's a great time to start a new record company, which is one of the few businesses in the corporate world where an individual human being can make a difference in the lives of so many people."

The label's premiere product will come from Sherree Ford-Payne, an R&B singer from Los Angeles currently in the studio with Howie Tee, producer/songwriter, who has worked with Color Me Badd; the alternative band Angel Corpus Christi and rockers Rake's Progress.

Heading A&R on the East Coast is Howard Thompson, former A&R at Elektra. He will be assisted by Bob Bortnick. Alan Jones is the managing director of Almo, UK, where the company has concluded a distribution deal with Pinnacle.

Initially Geffen will supply marketing, sales, promotion, media and artist relations and creative services support as required.

Alpert and Moss founded A&B in 1962, sold it to Poly-Gram in late 1989, staying on board to run the company and exited in mid-93.

# **Jackson Still Thrilling RIAA Certs**

Michael Jackson's *Thriller* LP jumps to 24 million, putting him about ten million out ahead of his nearest competitors for the crown of best-selling album of all time, as the Recording Industry of America (RIAA) releases its September certifications.



Mariah Carey's self-titled LP hit the eight million mark, sharing the top-selling debut album of the year honors with Pearl Jam's Ten. In the gold singles category, Babyface's "When Can I See You" was joined by "Dancing In The Street" from Martha Reeves and the Vandellas, "This DJ" from Warren G and "Never Lie" from Immature. "Dancing in the Streets" was first released 20 years and two

months ago.

Platinum albums stats made Kriss Kross *Da Bomb*; others to hit the mark were Hammer's *The Funky Headhunter* and Aaliyah's *Age Ain't Nothing But a Number*.

There were several entries in the staggering sales numbers. The "Lion King" soundtrack hit six million; Mariah Carey's *Emotions* at four million; Michael Jackson's *Dangerous* at six million and *Bad* at eight million.

# **MCA** In Strategic Chess Move

MCA has chalked up another victory in its ongoing, long legal battle with Charly Records, Ltd. and Charly Holdings over its Chess Masters.

The United States District Court in Central California ruled last week on MCA's claims relating to its exclusive ownership of the Chess Master recordings in MCA's United States action against Charly. This case is part of MCA's worldwide campaign to halt the unauthorized manufacturing and distribution of the thousands of titles which comprise the Chess catalog.

The Court held that Charly Holdings does not now have, nor has it ever had, any right, title or interest in the Chess Masters recordings and that MCA has exclusive right, title and interest in the recordings. Consequently, all its manufacturing and distribution of the catalog were in violation of MCA's rights.

This new ruling follows the earlier California Court of Appeals decision in April of this year against Marshall Sehorn and Red Dog Express, Inc. Charly obtained the masters from Sehorn and the court ruled that he never had any right or interest in the recordings.

Further back, in November of 92, MCA Music Entertainment Group chairman and ceo Al Teller had announced a landmark court ruling regarding the Chess Masters and unveiled an aggressive campaign to

protect and enforce the label's rights.

Still pending in the case is the determination of damages to MCA caused by Charly's infringement.

MCA's action against Charly are still pending in France, the United Kingdom and several other countries around the world. But according to MCA's Lawrence Kenswil, sr vp business affairs, "This is an enormous victory that will have great value in MCA obtaining favorable judgments against Charly in the other actions pending around the world."

The Chess catalog consists of masters such as Bo Diddley, Muddy Waters, Chuck Berry, Etta James, Howlin' Wolf, and John Lee Hooker.



# White Knight For Black Station Ownership?

HOLLYWOOD-For many years this column has decried the dearth of television stations owned by African
Americans and lambasted the broadcasting industry for not opening doors.
Now aid towards black ownership may come from an unexpected source--



Rupert Murdoch. Murdoch's Fox Broadcasting will invest \$20 million in Blackstar Communications, a stake which will not exceed 20% of the company and which will help it purchase VHF television stations and convert them to Fox affiliates. Blackstar is a D.C. based firm chaired by John Oxendine which currently owns three affiliates of the Home Shopping Network. The move by Murdoch is surprising because the NAACP has filed a petition with the Federal Communications Commission to revoke Fox stations' licenses on the grounds that the company is foreign owned. FCC rules state that foreign ownership of American broadcasting stations is forbidden and to skirt that in the 1980s, Murdoch became an American citizen. But his News World International, which technically owns Fox, is still an Australian company, says the NAACP. The FCC is also being asked by other broadcasters to give a look-see into what they perceive as Murdoch's attempts to skirt another FCC rule--one which forbids any network from owning more than 12 TV stations or stations whose combined market reach totals more than 25% of the nation. Murdoch has been buying minority stakes in broadcasting companies as a means to snag Fox affiliates yet avoid that 25% ceiling. However, Oxendine and Blackstar are held in high regards by all concerned.

#### **Media Bytes**

Meanwhile, from another Murdoch corner--after much expectation, Fox Studios has decided to go ahead with the screen version of "Waiting to Exhale," the bestselling novel by **Terry McMillan**, which would have provided four starring roles for black actresses. Schindler-Swerdlow, the production entity involved, had enlisted **Forrest Whitaker** to direct and **Ron Bass**, who won an Academy Award for "Rainman," was the final of several writers to work on the script along with McMillan.... Just as director-actor-writer-producer-admitted self-promoter

Spike Lee was announcing his intentions to do a cinematic life story of baseball's immortal Jackie Robinson, Disney announced it has enlisted director Steve James and producer Peter Gilbert, the team who did the upcoming basketball documentary, "Hoop Dreams," to develop and film a biography of baseball legend Roberto Clemente. Clemente, you may recall, died in a plane crash while on a mercy humanitarian mission to his native Puerto Rico. After Robinson retired from baseball, he became involved in the Republican administration of



New York governor Nelson Rockefeller....Incidentally, James and Gilbert are also planning to film Anna Deavere Smith's acclaimed one-person show, "Twilight: Los Angeles 1992."....Writer Tina Andrews is busy polishing the script of "Trauma," which will reunite Angela Bassett and Laurence Fishburne....Until Next Time... Immediately, one of my jobs was to protect her and her art from people who, quite innocently, didn't understand what she was trying to do."

It was important to Greene that product production for Colouz Uv Sound include commercial vinyl pressings. "I wanted club DJs to have access to vinyl because club play can make all the difference in terms of sales. In that regard, I also thought it was important to take the initial focus off radio and concentrate on the

ICHIBAN/SOUL CLASSICS

Anyone who refers to eighties music as old school, take a listen to this four CD collection from four legendary acts. Encompassing the talents of Jackie Moore, Margie Joseph, Doris Troy and Patti LaBelle and The Bluebells, the set is a real treat for fans of these ladies or of the R&B sound of the sixties. Included on the set are some classics which no doubt hold fond memories for the upper demos.

Margie Joseph (The Atlantic Sessions) covers this Mississippi born soul sister's rise to the top from her 1972 hit "Let's Go Somewhere And Love" to her popular, post-disco dance groove "Ready For The Night." Sandwiched between are gems that remind this writer of sneaking onto their mom's record player to catch a listen. Joseph does Al Green's "Let's Stay Together" with style, then heads into the moving "My Love," one of Joseph's best performances whose gospel influences punctuate the mellow beat. Other notables include Joseph's popular releases "Stay Still" and "What's Come Over Me," where she duets with Blue Magic. Although she was never regarded in the same light as labelmates Aretha Franklin and Roberta Flack, Joseph had plenty of fan support all over the world.

**Doris Troy** *Just One Look* covers the artist's two years at Atlantic which began with the still incredible debut single "Just One Look," the song that made her a star. The Caribbean influence followed Troy throughout her career and like her debut single, "What'cha Do About It," featured hints of ska within its beat.


"I'll Do Anything (He Wants Me To Do)" grew to legendary status with the British Northern Soul lovers of the early seventies and is still fun to hear thirty years after its original release. Troy's short time at Atlantic is captured throughout this 21-song set and is a testament to the New Yorker's beautiful style of delivery.

Jackie Moore Precious, Precious features the Florida native's classic releases like "Precious, Precious," which is described as "a true Southern slab of storytellin' soul." Other Moore songs include "Wonderful, Marvelous" and "Sometimes It's Got To Rain (In Your Life)," her two duets with the Dixie Flyers. The party flavored "Time" illustrates the emergence of funk music as Moore warbles over slightly uptempo beats that are definitely funky. One of the album's best grooves is the 1972 song "Both Ends Against The Middle," which unfortunately only lasts for slightly over two minutes.

A young **Patti LaBelle** stars with the **Bluebells** on the last CD, *Over The Rainbow*. Popular with urban audiences, the group enjoyed success here in the U.S. and abroad in Europe. Some of their classic releases include the uptempo "Family Man" with its great horns that inject energy into a song that's already uptempo . The Judy Garland song from the Wizard of Oz, "Over The Rainbow," can be heard and is one of the first hits for the ladies. The pop sounding "Take Me For A Little While," the first successful hit on both pop and r&b charts catches the ear. Also of significance is the teaming of Nona Hendryx with Patti LaBelle on "I Need Your Love," a slow paced love song that shows why the two ladies would enjoy plenty of success years later with the group LaBelle. The older females may remember the lovely "He's My Man," and the Curtis Mayfield written "Suffer," a

# **Hiroshima Homies**



Polycultural fusion group **Hiroshima** found their own way to echo the lyric from the **WAR** tune, "L.A. Sunshine"—the one saying, "L.A.is my hometown, it's a funky town." Their new Qwest LP *Hiroshima L.A.* is meant to celebrate the cultural diversity of what leader **Dan Kuramoto** considers to be the "key Pacific Rim city of the United States." San Francisco, Seattle, Portland and San Diego must simply accommodate this distinction cheerfully.

The Pacific Rim link is important because of the co-mingling of the Japanese and American peoples over the decades, a relationship loaded with parallels. Both cultures have left seeds of themselves within the other, coralling offspring in a cusp along the way. Hiroshima took its name for the first city which saw the incandescent ruin of nuclear war. The smoking, anarchic inferno of the '92 L.A. Riots partly inspired *Hiroshima L.A.* One could superimpose the kabuki death mask from the first Hiroshima LP onto a burned-out mall site in South Central L.A. and none would be the wiser.

"We've come through storms, quakes, and fires. As humans, we all have a high stake here, a commitment to this community and its diversity," Kuramoto adds.

From the beginning Hiroshima was noted for transmitting the stormy, pulsating heartbeat of nature in its music, blending R&B, jazz, and rock guitar with traditional Japanese instruments--the koto and the shakuhachi among them--into an exciting original blend. The spirit of the Orient was apparent. For a while it was a wave shared by former bandmate **Yutaka Yokokura** with his dramatic *Lovelight* LP, and echoed in recent years by **Kazu Matsui**.

"Yutaka hated the koto," Kuramoto reflected. "He wanted to be **Dave Grusin**. The scene has changed considerably. The push has been toward a youth market. In every era, there are exciting, innovative grooves. There's a thread, a spirit that takes us full cycle. This LP has a sense of the blend, a sense of the city. We all grew up in an urban center."

The main support for the group has always come from black radio. As far back as Quiet Storm format originator **B.K.** 

**Kirkland** and **Lawrence Tanter** of KJLH-FM. It rankles a bit not to be wholly thought of as Asians in their ancestral homeland, being of third generation descent. Explains Kuramoto, "In Japan, they don't think of us as Japanese. Yet any (anti-Asian) backlash affects us."

Imagine the ironies. Kuramoto and **June Okida Kuramoto** went to Dorsey High School decades ago. Then, the school's predominately black student body had a sizable Asian minority drawn from the surrounding neigborhood. "Buddha-head" was a fighting word or a term of endearment among homies. Some Asians cloistered together, others were down with the brothers, and absorbed black culture. Kuramoto cruised in East L.A. with his Latino homeboys, mechanically bouncing down the street.

The group was discovered at the Watts Towers Jazz Festival by **Wayne Henderson**, and signed to Arista by **Larkin Arnold**. Bets that their debut LP wouldn't sell 25,000 units were squelched for good after they passed the 200,000 mark. They simply had no idea that "black music was for blacks" and that was the beauty of it. In time, jamming for New Year's Eve at L.A.'s Roxy Theatre became their annual custom. Fame spread with subsequent projects.

Hiroshima L.A. is an LP that stands up from end to end. The ballad "Love And Understanding" and cover tune "Don't Let Me Be Lonely Tonight" feature the fine vocals of new lead vocalist **Teri Koida.** "Native Soul," "Bop Hop" and "One World" transmit familiar pulsations. Besides domestic radio, the group plans to take their message to the untapped regions of Europe, South America and Southeast Asia, broadening their following beyond a loyal American cult.

"We're about what's next," sums Kuramoto."There's a healing that needs to take place here. We want to bring back passion, compassion and the spirit that lies in music. You can learn by listening. Most importantly, we're going to let the music talk, heart to heart, soul to soul."







# The Indefatigable 'Face

A few nights ago, **Kenneth "Babyface" Edmonds** and his wife **Tracy** strolled virtually unnoticed into a trendy 24-hour West Hollywood eatery for an after-hours bite to eat.

You wonder where the man found time.

In the past few months, the national charts have practically served as Babyface's playground, with the songwriter/producer working his magic on acts such as Tevin Campbell, Mariah Carey, El DeBarge, Aretha Franklin, Boyz Il Men, Gladys Knight and Karyn White, among a handful of other projects either in some stage of production or on 'Face's burgeoning schedule. It's a hell of an addendum to a career that, with former partner L.A. Reid, had already reached incredible heights, including multi-platinum productions on Whitney Houston and Bobby

Brown. Indeed, the debut quadruple-platinum-plus LaFace/Arista album of Toni
Braxton, as well as For The Cool In
You, 'Face's own current platinumplus Epic/Sony album--two of
the last projects the two produced as a team--both continue to sell briskly.

Still in recent months

Still in recent months
Babyface's musical output--with and without
frequent collaborator

Daryl Simmons--has
gone into the stratosphere. "He simply
tried to create a body
of work on his own," is
the way 'Face's manager, Ramon Hervey
recently explained it.

No kidding.

'Face's name has been associated with the upcoming projects of both Madonna and Michael Jackson, and, like the Ever Ready Bunny, he just keeps on going, currently in the studio producing half the album of Virgin vocal trio After 7.

Despite this influx, there is no cache of tunes lying around Edmonds' studio; he only writes when working on a specific project.

Quite simply, the secret to 'Face's success appears to be his considerable talent at weaving melodies and, moreover, his willingness to roll up his sleeves at this particular juncture in his career.

"He just gets in there and does it," said **Fred Moultrie,** manager of El DeBarge, half of whose current Warner Brothers LP, *Heart, Mind and Soul*, was co-written and produced by 'Face. "El and 'Face clicked both as friends and as collaborators, so 'Face moved El and his wife and kids into his place in Beverly Hills so they could write and record at will. Then he'll finish that and be on a plane to another ses-

sion. He's fast, and he's still interested in the music."

Of course, it certainly doesn't hurt that Edmonds has scored so many hits. To many acts, a Babyface tune represents the quickest route to a sure-fire hit. "There are two reasons you don't use 'Face right now," said one A&R vice president. "One, you can't afford him, or two, he's not interested in working with you. His hot streak differs from that of some of the other producers in the fact that he's writing real songs, which means they'll be covering 'Face titles through the next generation. And when he gets tired of doing it all by himself, he can just hire players to cut the tracks which would give his work a whole new dimension, still." Reportedly, After 7 tracks not written and produced by 'Face will be done by a newly-assembled production team of his.

'Face tour, the one area he's yet to conquer as a solo act. Strategically, he's traded headline dates for appearances on high-profile TV programs such as the "Today Show," where he performed 'When Will I See You Again" accompanied only by his own acoustic guitar and a cellist. When asked by **Brvant** Gumbel with whom he'd next like to collaborate, 'Face mentioned Phil Collins.

Edmond's workload does present one draw-


