

TO THE EDITOR:

While he didn't go so far as to suggest a conspiracy among the Jews in the entertainment business, Steven Ivory's September 23rd article, "U-N-I-T-Y", smacks of anti-Semitism. or at the very least, insensitivity. Why was it necessary, in order to illustrate the need for unity among African-Americans in the entertainment business, to state that a "more than fair amount of the players - the CEO's who run today's powerful computer, entertainment, and communications industries are male [and] Jewish...."

I am curious to know how many Jews should leave the "powerful" media industries in order to achieve Mr. Ivory's "fair" amount. After all, suggesting that the number of Jewish "players" is "more than fair" means that the present amount is unfair. Mr. Ivory should know the reason behind Jewish involvement in the entertainment industry. During the 20's, 30's, 40's, and 50's, Jews were excluded from the managerial and executive training programs of most, if not all, of America's largest corporations. Classified ads would specify that only Christians could apply for certain jobs (was that "fair"?). Thus, since the entertainment industry was new, and did not discriminate, many Jews became involved with it. Consequently, it is wrong to imply that the industry was stolen by Jews. It was not stolen - it was created.

I find it tragic that Mr. Ivory, an African American, would make inflammatory comments about the supposed "unadulterated power and influence Jews wield in the entertainment industry," when the Jewish presence in entertainment is the result of a long history of discrimination - something to which all African Americans should relate.



Harris/Ayeroff Establish Columbia West Coast Label

As had been widely rumored throughout the industry for months, Jeff Ayeroff and Jordan Harris will take the reigns at a new Columbia Records Group label, as co-presidents.



The announcement was made by Sony Music Entertainment president and ceo Thomas D. Mottola and Columbia Records Group chair Don Ienner.

The new, yet-to-be-named label will be headquartered in Sony's

Santa Monica complex and will be operating as of Jan. 1, 1995 as the first Columbia label to be founded on the West Coast and to have its own A&R, marketing and promotion staffs. This new venture, says Sony, "will link the resources and talents of Columbia East and West Coast music companies."


"The creation of a new Columbia label," added Mottola, "reflects the strength and sustained creative growth of Columbia over the past five years. Don Ienner has consistently taken Columbia in new and exciting directions with as wide and broad a range of music as possible."

In addition to directing and overseeing its day-to-day activities, Ayeroff and Harris will actively sign artists to the label. They will report to Ienner.

The entire staff of Chaos Recordings, a Columbia Records Group label, will be incorporated into the new company, as will the artists currently on the Chaos roster

Current Chaos artists include the platinum rapper Da Brat, and world music star Youssou N'Dour, whose current album *The Guide*, has gone gold worldwide. Chaos also achieved gold success with the reggae soundtrack to the film "Cool Runnings."

Prior to their association with Columbia, the Ayeroff/Harris duo were co-chairman of Virgin Records



America. During their tenure there from '86-'93, the pair signed and/or established the careers of Lenny Kravitz, Paula Abdul, Soul II Soul, Neneh Cherry, Ziggy Marley and also signed Janet Jackson to the label.

ARBitron/Scarborough Combination Focuses On Local Marketing

Ceridian Corp and VNU Business Information Services have signed a letter of intent for Ceridian's Arbitron division to obtain an interest in a joint venture that will consist of VNU's Scarborough market research services business. In exchange, VNU will receive Ceridian's interest in the Competitive Media Reporting (CMR) joint venture that was established with VNU in 1992. The transaction is expected to be complete by year's end

The Scarborough business provides information about consumer shopping behavior, product pruchases and media usage in 58 major U.S. markets for newspapers, broadcasters, agencies and advertisers.

"The new venture combines Arbitron's expertise in local market media measurement with Scarborough's leadership in local market newspaper, consumer and retail research," said Stevie Morris, pres. Arbitron. "The result will be better research for radio stations, newspapers, television broadcasters and cable systems. The new venture will lead the industry in providing integrated measures of audiences and readers."

"Advertisers, agencies and media are becoming more sophisticated in their micromarketing strategies and sales efforts," said Chuck Leonard, pres. VNU Business Information Services. "We will now be in an even stronger position to serve the news of our clients."




Music Arrangers And Composers Honor Quincy

Jellybean's Sweet New Label/Pub Deal

John "Jellybean" Benitez and Wasserstein Perella Entertainment L.P. have pacted to form JB Music Publishing L.L. C, a joint venture established to acquire music publishing rights.

The joint venture is intended to develop a "leading worldwide music publishing concern by acquiring music publishing rights from new and established artists, as well as existing catalogs." JB Music Publishing will be based in New York.

Benitez and Wasserstein also announced they are creating a fully-staffed, full service independent record

label which will "develop and distribute music by bi-lingual, Latino artists with broad popular appeal."

The company will target mainstream and Hispanic markets by recording music for simultaneous release in English and Spanish. The company will have its offices in New York and plans to expand to Miami, Chicago, San Antonio, and Los Angeles by the end of next year.

Benitez, president of each of the new companies, said, "This is an amazing opportunity that gives me the freedom to be completely innovative and create a legacy. We're creating companies that will be big enough to

matter and small enough to care."



ANITA BAKER I APOLOGIZE ELEKTRA


Ever since Baker released her latest album *Rhythm Of Love*, this smooth ballad has been eagerly anticipated as the follow up single to the highly successful "Body And Soul." Very similar to the kind of song that propelled this Detroit songstress to international stardom initially, "I Apologize" is gentle and moves elegantly with a real kick back and relax beat which should make the song a scorcher on quiet storm formats. Already making strides up playlists, look for this to be a heavy rotation hit. Unavoidable while listening to the song is the feeling of once again being caught up in the rapture of Baker's performance. All ages can enjoy a first class song from a first class performer. DIONNE WARWICK AQUARELA DO BRASIL

If ever there was a voice suited for an album of Brazilian songs, Dionne Warwick's is it. On an album that translated means Watercolors Of Brazil, Warwick entertains with a powerful performance that hints at why she's still at the top after four decades. Described by Warwick as a "labor of love," the album opens with "Jobim Medley," a gorgeous flowing song that really grabs the listener's attention. From there Warrick quickly moves onto "Virou Areia," a song that features a strong Afro/Brazilian sound to its slightly uptempo and Spanish influenced rhythms. Using a combination of Portuguese and English lyrics, Warwick warbles magnificently on "Oh Bahia," a moody song whose sad qualities are heightened by a somber-sounding string section. Warwick's ease in making a sad song sadder is very apparent as her style adds emotion to a song about waiting for her beau to come back. Warwick uses only Portuguese vocals



to add sparkle to the uptempo "Piano Na Mangueira," a song that also features the smooth vocals of Chico Buarque. Among the hottest songs on the album is undoubtedly "Captives Of The Heart," a charmer with top rate performance on vocals and just as earcatching a horn section. Those concerned about the disappearing South American jungles should definitely check out "The Heart Of Brazil" as the song's lyrics cover how the shrinking jungle affects the country's wildlife and tree population. A soothing title track and the happy sounding "Carnival" add to an already rich album destined to prove popular this Xmas. Demos: All.

JADE—EVERY DAY OF THE WEEK—GIANT/REPRISE—Programmers are falling over themselves to add this midtempo song that's also the second release off Jade's *Mind*, *Body & Soul* album. Reminding folks of the Jones Girls, this trio as a unit with Joi, Tanya and Di are tight and harmonize in a fashion that exemplifies the depth of their vocal talents. Even stronger than "5-4-3-2- (Yo! Time Is Up)," this single does nothing but add to Jade's reputation Demos: All.



Expect big things for the best song from Shanice since "I Love Your Smile." Produced by Lance Alexander and Prof. T of Lo-Key? Demos: All.

ICE CUBE—WHAT CAN I DO?—PRIORITY—Cube launches his next album Bootlegs & B-Sides with this remix of a song from his Lethal Injection album. In typical Ice Cube form the rhymes are tough and as if he's talking down to the listener. Perhaps not the best radio song out there, it still packs enough

punch to warrant plenty of attention. Demos: Rap Fans.



TLC—CRAZYSEXYCOOL—ARISTA—It's finally arrived. First impressions are this album will be a second success for the group. Rapper Phife (A Tribe Called Quest) sets the album up with an energetic rhyme that leads straight into the first single "Creep," a song that, like its title, creeps up on the listener. "Kick Your Game" with its monster bass and young adult-aimed vocals seems destined to be a hit. The same can be said about the mellow Babyface written "Red Light Special," a multi-demographic song with the strength to be a single release. The trio keep the tempo low-down on "Let's Do It Again," a song that again features the writing skills of Babyface. The Prince song "If I Was Your Girlfriend" and "Take Our Time" both please with their simplicity and laid back qualities. To round out the album, the exciting rapping style of Dre from Outkast is featured on "Sumthin' Wicked This Way Comes," a warm, relaxing song certain to be a favorite among TLC fans. Demos: All.






It was easy to spot those taking a sneak peek at the honest-to-God film legend while waiting for the stars of "A Low Down Dirty Shame" to arrive. Watching the faces in the place, eavesdropping on some filmmakers discussing a skyrocketing budget at one table and the manager of a rock group talking about a trip to Las Vegas for the fight at another, the waiters hovered, not wanting to miss the chance to speak to the Academy Award man.

A woman dressed in sweats and a baseball cap approached the hostess desk. Like almost all the true, great beauties of filmdom, she is tiny. Jada Pinkett, who plays "Peaches," sidekick to the film's







title character, "Andre Shame," is on time and looking for Keenen Ivory Wayans.

Once seated at the table, she speaks softly, downplaying the beauty most recently displayed 20-ft wide on screen as the title character in "Jason's Lyric."

Then Wayans arrives. The air around him feels calm, even if it is filled with electricity. When he talks, you get the sense of a man who is comfortable with himself



As he launches into a discussion of film technique and favorite films, it's apparent he spent lots of time studying film, dragging his brothers to the theatre, dreaming dreams—even way back when. He watched, analyzed and decided what he'd do when he made films. It didn't seem impossible to him, although there were few black role models.



If he's driven to change that, he's not angst ridden. But he is focused. He's only been doing the Hollywood Shuffle since 1980 and he's been a man in a hurry. He partnered with Robert Townsend for the film "Hollywood Shuffle" and sent audiences into fits of laughter with the innovative, Emmy-winning series, "In Living Color," on which he was creator, star, executive producer and co-writer.

He likes wearing all those hats. He was the triple threat top gun on "I'm Gonna Git You Sucka," the parody of '70s blaxploitation films, which he wrote, starred in and directed.

Wayans also wrote, directed and stars in "A Low Down Dirty Shame."

Was it easier or harder this time?

"Easier, since I know the pitfalls," he said.

He carried the idea around in his head for a long time, he admits, looking for a way to combine all the elements he wants to see when he goes to a film. Since he wanted to play the lead, he wrote it for himself. It's the story of a former police officer-turned-detective, involved with two women, a DEA agent, a drug lord and a chance to redeem himself and claim the woman he loves.

"I got the chance to do it all in this movie—serious moments, romance, action and a lot of comedy. It allows me to lay the groundwork to do all of the different things I want to do in my career."

This Caravan Pictures' film, produced by Joe Roth and Roger Birr baum, with executive producers Eric L. Gold and Lee R. Mayes, is a departure from what the TV fans might expect to see out of the funnyman. But Wayans says they won't be disappointed. "That's why I filled the movie with a lot of funny moments. Just about every aspect of the film is fun and entertaining and very upbeat," he says. "At the same time, it's not a parody. It's taking a step in a different direction. I never want to let the audience down, but at the same time, I never quite let them know what to expect."

How did Keenen, the director, deal with Keenen, the actor? "With a lot of help from the video monitor and other places," he says, laughingly pointing to Pinkett. "She would tell me, 'stand up straight in that shot' continued on next page



LOW DOWN DIRTY SHAME continued among other things." The star doesn't mind input from the others involved? "Oh no. So much of what I do changes as we progress."

He explains how that worked with Charles S. Dutton who portrays Sonny Rothmiller, Shame's former partner on the police force and now an agent with the DEA. Dutton was always Wayans' first choice for this pivotal character. "What he did with his character in rehearsals really took it to another level," says Wayans, who attributes major aspects of the character's personality and motivation to Dutton's input.

Right before lunch is served, Wayans is approached by a man in a bright blue jacket, who tells him he's sent him a script and hopes the actor is interested in it. All gracious charm, Wayans thanks Mr. Blue Jacket and he leaves smiling. As lunch progresses, there's an easy interchange between Pinkett and Wayans, who insists he's never seen her in "Jason's Lyric" but is certain she'll look even more beautiful in "Shame.'

"All except that one spot!" she challenges.

Wayans clamps the director's hat on his bald head to assure his leading lady that she looks perfect, that there is absolutely no light shining on her forehead and that she must trust him.

"Yes, I do. I was a little nervous about Keenen's kind of comedy. In "A Different World," I was mostly just sassy. But it didn't take long to feel comfortable with what he wanted. He can be very specific. He doesn't just say, "You need to be funnier here." He can tell you want he wants."

Wayans thinks Jada's interpretation of Peaches is hilarious and perfect. "She brought an off-beat funny quality to Peaches that really helped the character. She is a very funny woman."

Lending more impact to Wayans' need to do the black action hero in the right way is how the stunt work was done. Wayans' smile spreads when he describes the film's wild final stunt. For the showdown at the end of the film, the producers took the production to Scottsdale, Arizona and took over an entire five-level shopping mall that had been closed for business. This sequence utilized several elaborate stunts including motorcycle chases, commandos rap-

pelling down from the roof of the six-story structure and then Shame is blown over a fourth-floor railing, strapped only to a bungee cord. "I wanted to be as true to Shame's character as possible. It's very difficult to camouflage when you've got a stunt double on camera," he offers. F o r the action sequences, Wayans worked with veteran stunt coordinator Charlie Picerni,

the stunt work on such hits as the second and third "Lethal Weapon" films and "Die Hard," "Die Hard 2" and "Demolition Man."

For this particular stunt, Wayans and Picerni used a special tool called a decelerator. Wayans described the sensation of falling 90 miles an hour "The action called for me to do a lot of screaming. It's a good thing

The Caravan film's poster for "A Low Down Dirty Shame" is a take-off on James Bond, the ultimate action smoothie and womanizer. Shame makes a few smooth moves himself, the movie posters picture him with sweet Peaches on one side and the sultry Angela on the other.

Which girl did our hero get? "Go see the movie," they both laugh. Wayans describes some screenings of rough cuts where his character fell into bed with Angela, played to a fare-the-well by Salli Richardson. The scene got booed and it got cut, Wayans says. This is not a man to fool around with what the public wants."Grown men were booing me, they wanted me to end up with Peaches." What does he want the moviegoers to get out

of the film. "I want them to leave the theater, having had a good time."

Lunch over, Wayans departs the restaurant and runs smack into the paparazzi and the ever-hungry news crew looking for celebrities to put on camera. This day, they got a young man who could end up making a serious impact on film. Perhaps he's even a legend in the making and will end up revered like the older movie star

in the restaurant this day.

It's certain that Wayans wants to mainstream the black action hero. He dreams of seeing himself 20-ft high, beating the bad guys. And while he doesn't say it out loud, perhaps he thinks the little kids from the Fulton projects and like places should have such a character and a dream all of their own. If this part of his dream doesn't come true, that would truly be a low down dirty shame.

ELOISE LAWS COMES to lunch hurried but not harried. Life is a bit crowded these days, the demands of motherhood mix with the stern self-discipline that gets her to the gym in the a.m. and to the studio at night working on her music. It takes an "extraordinary" amount of time for Eloise-the-perfectionist to get the songs she's working on exactly right. But however long it takes, those hours in the studio feel good to this member of the very musical Laws family. She lets it be known that this is the 'good kind of pressure.'

She looks intent as she reveals that her writing partner is the son of country legend Charlie Rich. No, she's not working on country songs, she reassures the listener, although, she admits with a small sigh, if she released an entire album of country music, people would say, "Can you imagine that jazz singer Eloise Laws has made a country record. Tsk, tsking would be heard everywhere," she says.

This thoughtful woman hates labels, or at least the kind given too quickly and without some clear understanding of what's at hand. "You know I've been called a jazz singer so much and I don't know if it's

because people don't listen or that they think my family is just about jazz."

"If people want to label me, it should be the label of entertainer. I've worked hard at earning that one, and I've had a lot of people behind me."

She spins out a fascinating story of entering a talent contest, sponsored by the local CBS affiliate in her Texas hometown. She won at the local level and went on to win the nationwide grand prize from CBS-TV, earning her a twoyear scholarship in New York. "The competition was fierce, too. Whenever I see Kenny Rogers, he makes a point of telling everybody standing around that I beat him in the national competition."

She lost any traces of a Texas drawl and

was glamoured up by the round of singing lessons, dance/choreography lessons, Vidal Sassoon make-up and hair work-ups and all the other elements offered to her in that scholarship designed to turn her into a professional performer.

"Soon I was appearing on 'The Merv Griffin Show" and other television shows. I had all the wardrobe of gorgeous gowns, big arrangements and I was working steadily all over the country and I hadn't even made a record yet!"

Her story is unusual in these days of

Some trip-up over money occurred and Eloise had to go into another dimension. "I just packed up and went to Europe where I worked, and worked very successfully for a long time."

She finally came back to the U.S. and worked in the legitimate theatre. "Yes. I love it as much as everybody who works in the theatre does."

This entertainer loves the feedback from the crowds in live performances and on "almost any kind of stage."

And, 'No,' she "doesn't hate jazz. I think a performer should be able to do a little jazz something, along with any other genre of music. It goes back to being able to entertain. The audience is different every time you step out there. So you need to have a wealth of know-how to deliver what they came for-to be entertained."

Eloise confesses with a halfsmile the only jazz she actually will go to hear is when her brothers

> Hubert or Ronnie play. "I admit it, they're my favorite jazz players. They give the audience what it spends its ticket dollars for."

Laws laments the fact that so many young performers "just don't do that. Sometimes you see an artist with a hit record act as if the audience should be happy they just showed up. It makes me a little angry to see it when it happens. Nobody has to

come and see us. Whenever an artist is up on that stage looking out at the crowd, they should deliver 150%."

Of course, Eloise thinks it all goes back to the training young performers get-or don't get. "When I make my deal and my record is out, you can believe I'm going out there to entertain these folks. To do it any other way would be breaking the Law."

Already recognized for the success they received with rapper Domino last year, Outburst has steadily built on that success to be in a position where they feel they can step to the helm as one of the major independents.

Both experienced industry vets Lewis and Jessie feel their previous experiences will help make their label better. Says Lewis, a former performer who's experienced the ups and downs of the industry, "I feel having been a performer I can sense what an artists wants and how to handle

their problems whether it be an opinion or a managerial question." On the other hand, Jessie, a former dj, feels he can also add to the label's chances of success because of his experience deejaying and also from his time in

artist management (with cousin Tone Loc), managing D.J. Quik with whom they secured a deal with Profile and later saw become a platinum artist.

Suitably impressed with Jessie's success, Lewis asked him to team up with him to get Outburst off and rolling. "We instantly hit it off and soon we were working on our first project together which was Domino," says Jessie. "A friend of ours, DJ Battlecat, brought him over to the house one day where Domino rapped a few of his songs. Afterwards Greg and I just looked at each other and agreed that he was going to be the first artist on Outburst."

Marketed and distributed by Columbia, the album was a great success. "With Domino we were lucky. The first single "Ghetto Jam" created a huge buzz on the street which didn't go unnoticed with RAL's



Russell Simmons and his partner, Lyor Cohen," says Lewis. The single was popular all over the country and Domino was awarded ASCAP's 1994 R&B Award. "That really got us hungry for more," says Jessie. "And with the crop of new acts we have we feel we can continue to make Outburst bigaer in 1995."

With new acts like B.G. Knoccut. Dresta, La Rocko Tee, Jiboh plus an all female trio Mo. Ken. Stef, both gentlemen

"Without being too modest, we feel that our all-girl trio, Mo. Ken. Stef, is going to blow up," boasts Lewis. "When you test a song and everyone says it's alright, you know it must be okey. But when everyone hears a song and collectively get's excited about it, you know you've got a bomb. That's how we feel about the girls' chances."

Another reason for Lewis and Jessie's euphoria is the fact that they recently outbid a host of major labels to sign B.G. Knoccut and Dresta. "Just through negotiating for these artists, we both learned a whole lot about the industry," comments Jessie.

"You have to learn the business as much as possible, especially if you are going to go it alone," adds Lewis. "Although right now we see ourselves as an independent record label, we definitely want to get into other ventures down the road. We're aiming to use Outburst as a springboard to get to other areas of entertainment like television and motion pictures."

To protect themselves and their copyrights and to cover all bases, the duo started their own publishing company called All In It

Music. They've carefully mapped their future and have proven they have the right business savvy from negotiating with the major players to outbidding for artists, from managing to picking the hits to make Outburst become an even bigger success story. 

THE ULTIMATE COLLECTION SADE

Probably more recognizable than many heads of state, Diana Ross who has charmed urban audiences for four decades offers this collection of her finest work. Starting with songs from her Supremes' days, this album chronicles Ross' career through to her solo days. With songs that are instantly familiar, Ross shows why on this 20 song collection she's crossed over from urban to pop formats. Opening with c assic Lamont/Dozier songs like "Where Did Our Love Go," "Baby Love," "Stop! In "The Name Of Love," "You Can't Hurry Love" and "Reflections," the beginn ng of the album showcases Ross' time as the head of the Supremes. From there the listener get to experience some of Ross' early solo hits from the seventies like the Ashford and Simpson penned "Ain't No Mountain High Enough," a song that's somehow managed to sound fresh twenty years after it wowed black radio with its excellence. From there the listener gets treated to ballads like "Missing You," "Theme From Mahogany (Do You Know Where Your Going To)" and the recently covered slow jam "Endless Love," a song that teamed Ross with labelmate Lionel Richie. As disco emerged, Ross adapted beautifully recording disco gems like "Love Hangover" and the Edwards and Rodgers song "Inside Out" with its heavy Chic

influence. Songs that did well on the pop charts as well as urban playlists are also evident as her cover of Frankie Lymon's "Why Do Fools Fall In Love" and the punchy "Chain Reaction" help bring back memories. Newer records from the artist round out the album with her inspirational house version of "Someday We'll Be Together" and the sootning "One Shining


> Moment." Listen to this album and you'll soon figure out why she was tagged the "Boss" years before Bruce Springsteen claimed the name for himself. Demos: All.




