



AZ The Visualiza—"Sugar Hill"—EMI Records—After adding his flavor to Nas' "Life's A Bitch" on the album Illmatic, AZ drops the first single from his debut LP "Do Or Die. "Sugar Hill" is a funk ladden groove whose lyrics are about rising from the ghetto and doing something positive. AZ 's mission, in his own words, is "to shine a positive light on negative situations." This 24-year-old Brooklyn native is already an

Guru-Jazzmatazz 2-

EMI/Chrysalis—In '93 Guru put together an unprecendented album that fused hip hop and jazz. Now two years later he's back with the '95 version of Jazzmatazz 2. The album is set for worldwide release in July and features DJ Premier, Jamiroquai, Patra, Chaka Khan, Kool Keith, Me'Shell N'Degeocello, Ramsey Lewis, Ini Kamoze, Donald Byrd, Bahamadia, Freddie Hubbard, Shara Nelson, Courtney Pine, Mica Paris, Branford Marsalis, and a host of other artists. Once again, Guru, the LP's producer and lead rapper, has perfectly blended various forms of Black music. Some songs to look for include "For You," which has N'Degeocello on vocals and bass; "The Traveler," on which Donald Byrd plays trumpet; "Young Ladies" is where Patra handles lead vocals; "Watch What You Say" is with

Chaka Khan and Branford Marsalis; and Ini Kamoze comes forth on "Medicine." Those who enjoyed the first experimental hip-hop album won't be dissapointed with the second. Demos: All

King Just—*Mystics Of The God*—*Select Records*—From Shaolin, NY, (Wu-Tang's hometown and also known as Staten Island), comes another serious rapper. King Just dropped his first single, "Warriors Drum," in '94 now comes the complete album, *Mystics Of The God*. Just says of the album title, "the mystics are in everything around you—in everything I hear and see...It's everyday life." "No Flows On The Rodeo" is a warning to other MCs about the pitfalls of the industry, "Pain" tells of his state of mind before he entered the music business. Gregory Isaacs—Dreaming Heartbeat—For many years Gregory Isaacs has been one of reggae's best loved singers. Dreamin' is the latest in a long career filled with hits. The album was produced by Alvin Ranglin, who worked with Gregory in the past on such hits as "My Number One," "Willow Tree" and "No Speech." Their work on this album results in a blend of smooth vocals. On the title track Issacs sings over a updated version of Beres Hammond's "Double Trouble." There are several reworked versions of classic reggae songs including "End Up In Smoke," "Raggamuffin," "Man Of Temptation" and "No More Pain." This CD is evidence why they call Gregory Isaacs the "cool runner." Demos: Reggae/Dancehall Fans

New Career Lease For Eddie?

HOLLYWOOD—"Stars may be people, but they're not like you and me." So said (here paraphrased) the fictional character Fred Mertz in the '50s "I Love Lucy" series. He was referring to the look and charisma of stars. It might be more to the point to refer to their behavior. This comes to mind in the wake of Eddie Murphy firing Creative Artists Agency as his representation just a week or so before the one-year anniversary of his signing with them, and returning to International Creative Management, his previous agents. (Who were his agents after he left William Morris. Stay awake, please.) Now, Murphy has taken a lot of knocks in the press and amongst

industry folks lunching at Cicada and supping at Morton's about his career slide. A career slide, mind you, that was in large measure based on the fact that his films were grossing \$80 million domestically instead of \$100 million. But a slide from the ionosphere to the stratosphere is still a slide. After the move back to ICM, Murphy is now taking knocks for being, as one

source told us, "petulant," and another

source called "testy." In other words, people are only putting up with this star because they can make a buck off of him. If they had their druthers, they'd represent someone like Bill Cosby, who has been with the same agents for more than 30 years and sends birthday cards to the agents' kids.

The point of all this is that the undercurrent in Hollywood at the moment is that no one cares if Eddie Murphy fails (except,

perhaps, the studio putting up the money for his films). Few are rooting for him. Even mentor Richard Pryor was recently quoted as saying Murphy's stand-up act was "too mean." Eddie, man, you may have all the money in the world and it's the sane performer who doesn't need love love love. But bite too many hands and you'll no longer be fed. (Of course, Hollywood being Hollywood and not Passaic, New Jersey, if Murphy scores a jackpot with his next film they'll be breaking out the knee pads again. But they won't like it.)

Meanwhile, CAA did place Murphy in two upcoming projects (to be filmed after he finishes "The Nutty Professor"). Both are action films — "Sandblast" for producer Joel "Die Hard" Silver, and "Metro" for Caravan.


Another word on producer Joel Silver. He's just named Damon Lee as his vice president of production. Lee was most recently a creative executive at Turner Pictures.

Talk about a change in image. In the days of "Shaft," Hayes would have been believed taking his neck chains and using them to lasso Flipper for dinner.



On the panel: Ralph McDaniels, Video Music Box; Jay Gibbs, The Box; Richelle Davis, Class & Sass Video Promotion; Jim Gabour, Jim Gabour Moving Pictures; Pamela Lewis, P-Funk Video Promotion; and David Law, Hot Traxxs. The discussion ranged from why the Urban Video Association is needed and what its goals are, to why a black director is needed on black videos.

Davis made two things very clear to us all. The first is that record companies and directors need to stop copying what someone else has done. "Make an attempt to create something new," she pleaded. The second thing is to get artists and managers to be more respectful towards the few black female video promoters out there. Allow them to show you what they know and have learned from their years of promoting video, as well as how they can help you with a long-range plan in building your artist.

Thanks to all who attended, both on the panel and in the seats out front. I hope we made a small dent in the wall of noncommunication. So remember, tell us what's on your mind in the world of music video.



In The Box With TeamAlta

Altadena, CA, was well represented with the crew from TeamAlta Productions. In all, there were three rap acts and one R&B singerfrom the fledgling label in town. A rapper who goes by the tag Amtrak was Loc'd On The Positive Tip, as he performed cuts from his upcoming album, due to hit the streets early July.

Listen for the first single, "Price to Pay," to be followed by "Livin' With The Past" to drop any day now. "I speak on a positive level," says Amtrak, "and I'm trying to tell people to follow their own minds, to be on their own track in life." R&B, hip hop, blues, reggae is infused in the rap music of Amtrak, who feels music can also influence lifestyle. "Bob Marley changed my life," he says. "Spirituality filled his music and his life. He was looking at the world, not just one set of people. He had such a global awareness. I think sometimes Black people segregate ourselves, instead of realizing we're part of a larger universe." Now, it is through his own music that Amtrak feels he can help others. "Music came into my life when I was soul searching, searching for something, for who I was and at some point in everyone's life they're doing the same thing. I want people not too be afraid of being who they are, don't follow along someone else's track, create you own."

Though he's pushing positive rhymes

in the midst of a gangster dominated rap scene. Amtrak feels he can still reach listeners on the street. "The lyrics are about everyday life, using terms they can relate to, such as 'loc'd,'" he explains. "But it's the angle I take that makes it all positive. It's about what's real, the truth."

Truth is exactly what Amtrak's TeamAlta fellow hip hopper Brother Speaking Truth is all about. Amtrak actually produced BST's debut LP, also due out early July. The pair go back nearly 10 years, having at one time been a rap duo. "We figured we would become solo artists, put out two albums instead of one but still create together," says BST. "We've always been on the same wave length, of the same mindset." That mindset, says BST is that society must face its ills before any real progress can be made. "My first single, 'Truth Hurts' talks about how people tend to turn away from the truth, rather than accept it and the pain that may come with it, they run away from it. I want to accumulate all the knowledge I can and pass it on. I want my life to have stood for something, to have made a difference." And he, like Amtrak, feels music an bring change through using music to teach. "I talk about people like Medgar Evars, Martin Luther King, Malcolm X in my music. Great Black leaders who had a global mindset, who talked about worldwide unity," says BST. "and they were all taken out. I have one line 'genetic generated geoncide manipulating minds of the masses,' on how we're pumping people out like in a factory, how individualism isn't encouraged. It's like robots running the world. It's time for a change, some positive messages."

Malis Green is coming STR.8 Out The Suburbs with his TeamAlta release, which will be released next month. You may have heard the first single, "16 Switches," already and gotten a whiff of what Green calls "weed enchanced rhymes." His razor-sharp lyrics and high-powered delivery come with a raw, gritty flavor. In one cut, Green delves into the mental state of a hustler, going from depression and anxiety to greed and power obsession. It is Green's unique approach that he hopes will help him achieve his fiveyear goal: "To be on my fifth album earning triple platinum." -Ann Brown

Young Gun On The Rise

When you exit the elevator that opens to Bad Boy Records, the label's credo—penned by the company's president **Sean "Puffy" Combs**—is emblazoned on the wall to the right for anyone who care to look: "Don't be afraid to close your eyes and dream, then open your eyes and see."

The animus behind this deceptively simple phrase runs deeper than just trite words of inspiration. It is specifically aims at young Black people, people who Combs considers his peers. People who, more often than not, don't get the same opportunities he's had.

"There's a lack of young Black visionaries," he says firmly. "The young Black community has been discouraged through school, through society, through media from having a dream in their lives, that they could strive for something."

It's sentiment that is rooted at the center of Bad Boy. Its staff is comprised almost entirely of young Black men and women. Considering that Combs himself is only 24 years old, Bad Boy is not only one of the newest labels out, but it's also got the youngest legs making it work—the result of a conscious effort by the main Bad Boy himself.

"My peers need a chance too," he offers.



"People I grew up with, people I know who have drive and vision. I really don't go on resumes or experience. There may be, like, two people in here that have prior experience. Everybody else just has that drive, that hunger, that look in their eves."

Naysayers might question these methods if Bad Boy didn't deliver, but so far they've done nothing but deliver. In its short tenure, it has already million-selling acts in **The Notorious B.I.G.**, Grammy-nominee **Craig Mack**, and Total. "It goes back to our motto," Combs says. "'Sleeping is forbidden and losing is for losers.' And we ain't tryin' to sleep and we ain't tryin' to lose."

This drive and ambition have been key components in Puffy's success. Even if Bad Boy Entertainment didn't exist, his track record is a formidable as anyone twice his age. He has produced hit records and shared the imaging for a veritable who's who of young artists such as Mary J. Blige, Heavy D and The Boyz, Jodeci, Shabba Ranks, TLC, Father MC, Usher Raymond, and Christopher Williams. With Bad Boy, however, Combs is positioning himself to become a player in the same fashion as his mentors, Russell Simmons (Def Jam) and Andre Harrell (Uptown). In December, he was named as one of the 50 Top Black Entertainment Powerbrokers in Black Enterprise magazine.

"Puffy Combs is instantly fulfilling all of his enormous creative entrepreneurial potential that he clearly has," says **Clive Davis**, president of Arista Records, Bad Boy's distributor. "His creative awareness, his ear to the street and his keen acumen mark him as a true star executive. Bad Boy Entertainment will be a new force to be reckoned with."

Combs was born in Harlem and split his childhood between there and Mt. Vernon, NY. When he graduated high school, he attended Howard University to study business. He would later skip school to secure a full-time internship in the late '80s at the then fledging Uptown Records. He stuck out his early days as a gopher to work his way into the A&R department. Combs then set about grooming some of the most successful acts on the Uptown roster. His efforts yielded the double platinum debuts of Jodeci (Forever My Lady), Mary J. Blige (What's The 411), in addition to gold status for established artists Heavy D & The Boyz (Blue Funk) and Father MC (Father's Day).

When Combs parted ways with Harrell, he formed Bad Boy Entertainment, which he took to Arista in a \$1 million deal. "It's just a bunch of young people who aren't really in it for the money," he says. "We're in it to make music and to be makin' the most noise out on the street that moment of happiness just listening to our records.

"Right now our dream is we can put out [more than one] hip-hop record at one time and make noise," he continues. "We can put out whatever we wanna put out and in a couple of years make history. In a lot of respects, Bad Boy Entertainment is history in the making."

"Negroes and Journalism." Strange.


They say imitation is a wonderful form of flattery. All I can say is "Ouch." But couldn't it at least be literate and not quite so cutesy-poo?


