

Here's to the little lady of soul.



Ratings numbers? Improved circulation? Perhaps the news directors of the networks who didn't get the most watched interview of Michael Jackson have to do something extra. Aren't news reporters aware or don't they care that they are being used to fan the flames? After the work is done, they can sit calmly and claim First Amendment Rights. What about the rights of people who can be vilified and passed judgment upon? Oh, that doesn't matter, all that matters is grabbing the most headlines? Ask yourself who is creating the scandal, really.

Isn't it time the press let the judicial system work? Or perhaps it's high time, the judicial system turned its focus on members of the media who stand on the edge of the line of libel and slander, teetering towards the edge but not quite crossing it (protected from doing so by their legions of lawyers). The press should respect the judicial system for all American citizens and not prey on the superstars because they are easy targets (and good headlines). Meanwhile, the King of Pop, Rock and Soul continues to make music that makes people happy—at least the 8 or 9 millions who've gone out and paid hard-earning money for HIStory. At Epic, Sweeney will be responsible for overseeing all aspects of A&R, mktg and promo for the label's Black music dept.

Over the last 15 years, Sweeney's West Coast-based law offices have represented such people as producers Jimmy Jam & Terry Lewis, co-owners of Perspective Records, rap group Public Enemy, Bad Boy CEO Puffy Combs, Queen Latifah, and Clarence Avant. At the same time, Sweeney has served as chairman of Avant Garde Management, handling Color Me Badd and Klymaxx.

Brandy Sweeps Lady Of Soul Awards

Atlantic recording artist Brandy swept Soul Train Prods.' inaugural Lady Of Soul Awards, winning "Best R&B Single, Solo," "R&B/Soul Song Of The Year" (both for "I Wanna Be Down"), "Best R&B/Soul New Artist" and "R&B/Soul Album of the Year, Solo." Brandy's self-titled double-platinum debut album was released in Sept. '94.

Other winners at the ceremony, which took place at the Santa Monica Civic Auditorium in Santa Monica, CA, Aug. 6, and was hosted by Gladys Knight, Brian McKnight and model/actress Tyra Banks were: TLC for "Best R&B/Soul Single, Group, Band or Duo" and "R&B/Soul Album of the Year, Group, Band, or Duo"; Mary J. Blige for "Best R&B/Soul Music Video"; Geri Allen for Best Jazz Album"; Da Brat garnered the "Best Rap Album" award; and Helen Baylor took home "Best Gospel Album" honors.

Stevie Wonder presented platinum rapper Salt 'N Pepa with the "Entertainer Of The Year Award" and Debbie Allen

received the "Lena Horne Award For Outstanding Career Achievement." Allen was presented the award by attorney Johnnie Cochran. Among the presenters were entertainment reporter Arthel Neville, Jody Watley, and Tisha Campbell of "Martin." Rap group Naughty By Nature opened the show which was broadcast live to several cities across the country. Other performers included Brandy, Mary J. Blige, Brian McKnight, CeCe Winans, Da Brat, Monica, and Gladys Knight. MJJ/Epic recording artists Brownstone, performing with a new member, received a standing ovation for their performance of their hit single, "Grapevyne."



Nash Moves To Elektra

Richard Nash has been appointed sr vp, black music division for the Elektra Entertainment Group by chairman/CEO Sylvia Rhone. Previously, Nash was sr vp of Atlantic's black music division and over the past several years played a pivotal role in breaking such noted artists as LeVert, En Vogue, Troop, Gerald Albright, Brandy, and MC Lyte. Said Nash, "I look forward to the tremendous opportunity to work with Sylvia Rhone again, and the wonderful team she has assembled to lead Elektra in such an exhilarating time in its history."

Nash began his career as regional promo mgr for Atlantic in '80. In '85 he was named Atlantic "R&B Promotion Person Of The Year." In '88, he was appointed vp of nat'l promo for the black music division. In '90, he was appointed sr vp of promo/mktg for Atlantic.



Record Sales For Arista



This past fiscal year proved money making magic for Arista Records, with sales exceeding \$300 million in the U.S. alone. The fiscal year July 1, '94 to June 30, '95 was the most successful year in the label's 20 year history. The label has the #1 market share for singles and with the #2 label overall chart market share.

The announcement of the fiscal year success also noted "Even more impressive is Arista accomplished this with a fraction of the

releases shipped by other labels. Arista pres. Clive Davis cited the "Arista team and the diversity and depth of our artists' talent" for the success and that his team will "continue to keep our sleeves rolled up to maintain this exhilarating momentum."

Davis's commitment to black music through Rowdy, Bad Boy and LaFace, as well as his black acts on Arista has been a major force in this strong showing. The Whitney Houston driven "The Bodyguard" soundtrack album remains the best-selling soundtrack ever and the best-selling album of the '90s at the 15 million mark.

The platinum success of such debut artists as Monica (Rowdy) and Notorious B.I.G. (Bad Boy), who still after a year on the market is releasing hit singles, helped put the label at the top. B.I.G.'s "One More Chance" sold more than 80,000 copies in its first week of release. His *Ready To Die* album has already been certified platinum, headed for multiplatinum.

TLC's second album for LaFace *CracySexyCool* was certified five times platinum. Driven by the breakthrough video for their current single "Waterfalls," TLC is enjoying one of the biggest selling albums of the '90s, currently certified with their sixth gold single and fourth platinum single to date—the most ever awarded to a female group.

Monica's debut single "Don't Take It Personal," just went platinum. Davis noted the new fiscal year has scheduled some important releases including Bad Boy/Arista artist Faith, who is already receiving national attention for her fist single, "You Used to Love Me," and Deborah Cox, "a very special new artist."



BRE Names Promo Dir



BRE publisher Sidney Miller has named Curtis Mitchell as promotions director. One of Mitchell's first projects is the launching of Club BRE, which kicks off Aug. 13 at the Century Club (formerly Tripp's) in Century City. The inaugural show is a MoJAZZ & Motown salute to Phyllis Hyman. The dinner show, featuring Norman Connors & the Starship Orchestra, Impromp2, and Norman Brown, starts at 6 pm. More performances, by BLU, J. Spencer, and Wayman Tisdale, follow at 9 pm. Club BRE will take place every Sunday. Mitchell is also the president of the National Black Promoters Association.

Black Acts Score 95% of RIAA July Certs

In an unparellelled statistic, proving both the staying power and instant suc-

cess potential of black musicmakers, ten out of 11 of the gold singles and all five of the platinum single certifications in the Recording Industry Association's (RIAA) July awards went to black acts.

Three oldies-but-still-goodies from the Stax/Volt lineup, Sam & Dave, Eddie Floyd and the Bar-Kays earned certifications for records made between 25 and 30 years ago. "Hold On, I'm Coming," released on Sam & Dave Dec. 1, '69; "Knock on Wood," from Eddie

Floyd, released July 25, '66 and "Soul Finger," released by the Bar-Kays April 4, '67 all finally earned gold status.

The other certifications came for product between 60 and 120 days in release: Diana King's "Shy Guy," 2Pac's "Dear Mama," Naughty by Nature's "Feel Me Flow," Notorious B.I.G.'s "One More Chance," TLC's "Waterfall" and


Michael Jackson/Janet Jackson's "Scream." Also acheiving gold status

were Jon B "Someone to Love" and Total, "Can't U See."

Platinum single certification went to Monica. 2Pac, B.I.G., TLC and Michael Jackson/Janet Jackson for the song titles listed above. A pair of soundtracks and a Quik man earned gold albums certs. Safe + Sound, D.J. Quik; the Tales from the Hood and Panther soundtrack earned gold. Quik also earned platinum album status; as did 199Quad, 69 Boyz; Paid In Full,

Eric B & Rakim; Free At Last, DJ Talk; and Aretha Franklin's Greatest Hits.

As for multi-platinum, Barry White's *The Icon is Love* went to 2m; TLC's *Crazy-SexyCool* hit both 4 and 5m in the same month and Whitney Houston's *The Body-guard* remains the best selling sound-track ever and the best-selling album of the '90s racking up the 15million mark.

Arb Diary Deleted



Who: Margi Coleman

Album: Margi, on Soul Out/Priority Records

About The Album: "The album is based on the trials and tribulations of life," says Coleman, who co-wrote and co-produced half

the LP with producers Courtney **Branch and Tracy** Kendrick of Total Trak Prods. Margi also programmed and played instruments throughout and performed all Margi Coleman vocals on all but

three cuts—"Searchin'," "Let Me Down Gently," and "Herbs For Life" where Kim Ball and The Emotions handled the vocals. "Let Me Down Gently" also features Earth, Wing & Fire keyboardist/arranger Larry Dunn.

Bio: Music came into Coleman's life when she was only three years old. As a young girl she discovered the piano and song writing. After playing, entering, and winning talent competitions, Coleman eventually recorded for a major label but it didn't quite work out. "I didn't want to change my natural uniqueness for the sake of commercial acceptance," she says.

Influence: Marvin Gaye. In fact, "How I Miss You" is a tribute to the late great singer.

Style: Margi is respectful of and close to nature. On that note, she says she wears her hair naturally because "the Creator created it."

Where To Spot Her: Around L.A. shopping for organic food, herbs and oils to "anoint" herself with.

Bottom Line: "I'd like my music to be heard and unchanged...I've always wanted to give a message in my music...though I don't have all the answers, creating my album has been therapeutic." ⇒==


DAS EFX—"Real Hip Hop"—*EastWest*—One of hip hop's favorite duos, DAS EFX, has returned. And, as usual you don't know what they're going to hit you with. "Real Hip Hop" is a funky cut that features three versions. The first was produced by Pete Rock. The second, which is the album version, was produced by DJ Premier. The final was done by PMD and is the most laid-back of the three. Once again, DAS doesn't disappoint. This track is sure to have rap fans eagerly anticipating the release of their next album. Twinz—"Round & Round"—*G-Funk Music*—The Twinz have a smash single on their hands with "Round & Round." This sin-

Gary Taylor—The Mood Of Midnight—Morning Crew—
The soulful styling of Gary Taylor shines throughout this entire collection. On it, there are great musical and vocal arrangements, which expertly showcase Taylor's outstanding talent. MCA—The soon-to-be-released movie "Clockers" produces a soundtrack of all new rap, dance-hall and R&B songs. The first two singles to be released at the same time will be "Love Me Still" by incomparable Chaka Khan and "Return of the Crooklyn Dodgers" by the Crooklyn Dodgers '95, a trio of rappers formed by Spike Lee for his "Crooklyn" soundtrack (Chubb Rock, Jeru the Damaja and O.C.). This soundtrack also features new songs by Seal and Des'ree, who adds the smooth "Silent Hero" Buckshot Lefonque. There are a couple of dancehall tracks burning up the LP—"Sex Soldier" by Rebelz of Authority and "Bad Boy Go No Jail" from Mega Banton. The Clockers Soundtrack is equally as moving as the film. 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

Blues By-Laws

Last week at the grand opening of "Blues by the Sea, the main course was a hefty helping of blues and soulful pop dished out by **Eloise Laws** and other members of her musical family. The \$100 per plate affair, benefitting participants of Watts/Willowbrook Boys and Girls club, was filled-to-capacity with socialites and politicians who dined on chicken, beef and filet-of-sole at this posh setting nestled inside the California Yacht Club.

The cocktail hour preceding the show created the perfect mood for this night's array of entertainment. Laws hit the stage wearing a fire engine red, slit high on the thigh, sequined dress (a treat for male attendees).



She immediately established a rapport with the crowd giving credence to her agility for this type of setting. Laws' musical support was a five-piece band comprised of **Tony Mathews** (guitar), **Lee Miles** (bass), **Ed Mosley** (drums), **Walter Davis** (sax) and two female back-up singers all under the direction of pianist **Rohn Coleman**. When she sang blues classics by the late **Jimmy Reed**, the band played with the purity of those sidemen who once unobtrusively backed the old master himself. But, both the band's and Laws' true artistry was unveiled when they performed "Betcha By Golly Wow" as a tribute to the late **Phyllis Hyman**. Her rendition of "Natural Woman" was also a pleasant highlight to the evening's festivities.

Three quarters of the way into the set she brought sister **Debra Laws** to the stage. Sister Debra introduced brother **Ronnie**. This yielded another highlight to the evening as Ronnie accompanied Debra vocally and instrumentally on her hit single "Very Special." Listening to this brother and sister duet generates hope for more joint projects by these two. The show finale song was the classic Louis Jordan hit "Let the Good Times Roll," which set the audience finger snapping and toe tapping, putting the cap on what turned out to be a beautiful evening by the sea.

Lady Mac, L.A.'s premier female guitarist, was a perfect opening act and held the audience spellbound as she played the guitar behind her head (Jimi Hendrix-style) and highlighted her prowess by laying the axe on the floor and playing it with her foot.

The comic **Alex Thomas**, who for some reason was placed at the end of the show, challenged his spot with ease and proved that it was worth sitting it our to the very end. Thomas also writes for "Fresh Prince of Bel Air" and "Martin." No matter how upscale folks get, they can let loose with some bellylaughs at excellent material such as this. This kind of evening is just what the elegant clubgoers of L.A. need. Count on "Blues By The Sea" doing well if shows like this keep coming.



It's Not HIStory Yet

The coverage has been unprecedented. At the end of reports on the desperate situation in Bosnia, you half expect **Tom Brokaw** to say, "...**Michael Jackson**'s *HIStory* album continues

to drop on the charts."

At the news conference announcing the mega merger of Disney and Capital Cities/ABC, you could not have been too surprised if Disney head **Michael Eisner** looked into a camera and said, "By the way, that new Michael Jackson record isn't performing well right now."

And who could blame famed ABC-TV reporter **Sam Donaldson**, if, when asked how he feels after cancer surgery, replied, "I'm fine, but I'm much more concerned about the status of the *HIStory* project."

Michael Jackson's *HIStory* plummets! The next Geraldo! Whew.

Considering Michael Jackson's status in the entertainment universe, it figures that the mainstream media would pay special attention to the sales of *HIStory*. However, coverage seems to have taken on a rather spiteful slant. Whole stories in non-entertainment periodicals have been dedicated to the album's movement on the national charts. When the chart and sales success of other current records is reported, they are usually compared to the activity of *HIStory*. As if other records shouldn't be selling.

Then, of course, there are dire predictions from both media and industry insiders that, thanks to *HIStory*, Jackson is finished. Kaput. As if the performance of one record wipes out 30 years of record-breaking achievement.

Okay, so maybe Jackson and company brought a bit of this scrutiny upon themselves. Perhaps the promotional campaign could have been designed so that they didn't so resemble Marines hitting an enemy beach. And the public didn't have to know Sony is spending \$30 million to hawk the record.

Nevertheless, just because *HIStory* hasn't performed thus far to the expectations of bystanders doesn't make it a failure by any means. To sell seven million copies worldwide of a two-record set in six weeks is anything but chopped liver, and the single, "You Are Not

Alone", will further open up sales. Ever since the success of his Off The Wall LP, all of Jackson's LPs, in the first weeks of their

release, have had to endure the hype of it all, before they actually get down to real business. It ain't over until it's over, and since Sony expects *HIStory* to last at least two years, then I'd say the

party hasn't even begun.

But since everyone else has offered their advice, this column may as well add its two cents: "You Are Not Alone" should be followed by one of two tracks: "This Time Around" or "Money." Both are uncomplicated, impact records that recall Jackson's funkier side. But then again, what do we know?

Meanwhile, Back At The Ranch: When Sony act Michael Bolton decided he wanted to meet with members of the Black press to announce activities of his Michael Bolton Foundation, talk politics and simply open up a line of communication with the Black community at large, he called upon New York-based Columbia Media Director Yvette Noel-Schure to coordinate a junket of New York's Black press. Seeking sincerity instead of lookie-loos, Yvette told 20 journalists they were meeting Bolton at a restaurant-revealing that they were in fact headed to Bolton's Westport, Connecticut, estate only after they were on the chartered bus. Once there, Bolton announced his Foundation's Safe Place For Kids facility opening in September, the first of four shelters for kids at risk and battered women...Seal casually hopped out of a brand new Ranger Rover at the gas station on the corner Sunset & Fairfax in Hollywood, nearly causing a fan to faint... Taste The Love, singer/songwriter Leon Ware's album on the indie Kitchen label, is creamy, sophisticated pop/soul deluxe. Check out the sultry "Meltown", the sexy "Love Parts" and the Brazilian opus, "Telepathy." Ware also covers the dreamy "Musical Massage", which he originally cut in the '70s while at Motown...Seeing Bill Bray, Michael Jackson's omnipresent security man taking it easy at Le Dome, reminded me of my first encounter with the man-1972, in my native Oklahoma City at the Myriad Convention Center. I was 16 years old, and Bray was just doing his job: tossing

me out of a **Jackson 5** sound check. More than 20 years later, we're both still doing the same thing.





This means that based on only one hit film (and "Bad Boys" did not reach \$100 million in domestic box office), Lawrence's "quote" for film work has now reached the same level as Whoopi Goldberg—to get him

when he's got a guaranteed \$10 million at Columbia, another studio may have to ante up a like amount or more. And, we repeat, this is based on one hit film, a film he did not carry on his own (as opposed to, say, Jim Carrey and others whose fees skyrocketed after one big hit. What will Will Smith, the other star of "Bad Boys" now demand? And, did you also notice that it was Columbia that made this deal, not Warner Bros., although Lawrence does his FOX series through HBO Prod., which is a subsidiary of a division of Time-Warner, parent company of Warner Bros.? You mean that Time-Warner has let one of its stars slip into the hands of a rival? Don't you think that studio is going to try and come up with a property for Lawrence, especially when they are in the midst of selling his series into off-network syndication? The guy is on a roll. (And don't forget...Fox is developing "Seven Spell," a comedy by Takashi Bufford for Lawrence.)

Alan Dinwiddie has departed his post as vice president, special markets, the Walt Disney Co. He joined Disney in '90 from the advertising world with the mandate to broaden the audience for films released through the various studio umbrellas. Disney was the first studio to create an in-house marketing department focusing on "ethnic" audiences. Dinwiddie could be heading to Nickelodeon the kids' cable service.

Forget the buzz, published in this column, that **Damon Wayans** was being considered to portray Ralph Kramden in a motion picture version of "The Honeymooners." Now the word is **Tom Arnold** signed, sealed and delivered. If they were going to go in that direction, wouldn't **John Goodman** make a better choice?...

Warner Bros. TV Distribution is planning to launch "Living Single," the FOX Network series that is the top show among Black audiences, into off-network syndication as of September '97. Scuttlebutt is that the studio decided to sell the show this summer for '97 because come September "Living Single" will be pitted against NBC's "Friends," which could whittle away at the teen audience for **Queen Latifah** and Co. and tarnish its chances at a huge off-network payoff. Word is also that Warner Bros. will offer "Hangin' With Mr. Cooper," which airs on ABC, as a companion show for "Living Single"...Congratulations to

orlando Bagwell, Judy Richardson, and Martin Ostrow on their Emmy nomination (News sector) for "Malcolm X: Make It Plain," which aired on PBS' "American Experience"...Bowing to new political realities, the owners of M-Net, the South African pay-TV service, has put 10% of the company's shares up for sale to specifically Black investors...Until Next Time...Stay Focused.

man with a horn. A man who scat/sings. Good-looking. Slick. Cool cats down with the vibe. Sounds like a description of some ultra-hip jazz duo in the '30s. Not really. Actually, it's two men who are very much part of the '90s. At first glance, the pairing seems a bit unusual. Trumpet player and rapper. But while those words are accurate, somehow they fail to describe where these guys are musically.

Johnny B. and Sean E. Mac stand close together, brothers in the music that bonded them. These two are throwbacks perhaps, but only to the Marvin Gaye-time of sensual songs sung and played in a way that made you want to hug your radio. Motown's latest delicious duo delivers serious music that makes you smile, relax, groove and just plain-ole feel good. The album is called You're Gonna Love It.

The men who came together to make up Impromp2 are no up-starts, either. Johnny B. was trained at the Conservatory of Music in Versailles, France, where he studied trumpet and composition. After he returned to the U.S., he got his first music business break, thanks to Otis Williams from The Temptations.

Johnny became the group's musical director for three years and earned himself a reputation for musical excellence, touring on trumpet with David Bowie and singing background for Luther Vandross. Johnny's got a long list of credits and a short list of the kind of music he wanted to make. "I had this idea of music combining the flavor of

Marvin Gaye's ground-breaking '70s style, Miles Davis's jazz influence, and a modern day form of rap."

Enter Sean, eyes half hidden by the custom shades, who adds enough rap fluidity for a generation who likes its music with a rap attached. Big and buff, Sean could be taken at first sight as a tough guy, but in minutes he has everyone around laughing. It's natural, Sean was a stand-up comedian around L.A. after he had paired with his brother, as the rap group Rappinstine. They were featured on the very first album by NWA and signed to an ultimately-fruitless deal with Quincy Jones's Qwest label. The smile is replaced by intensity when he





talks about the music. You know it's no laughing matter up in here. "We wanted a live feel, we wanted our first album to have international appeal." It does and the feel is something like Sade, something like Marvin, but mostly like Impromp2.

The pair found Irish producer Steve Harvey, to give that "international flavor." To lock down that "live" feel, Impromp2 used producer Harvey on drums, percussion and keyboards; Isley Brother's bassman Sekou Bunch and two members of the Gap Band, guitarist Jimmy Macon and Roman Johnson on

Fender Rhodes and Minimoog. In addition to lead and background vocals with partner Sean, Johnny plays trumpet and flugelhorn on a number of tracks.

"This album is made with elements that appeal to a broad spectrum of musical tastes. There's something here for pop, jazz and R&B listeners to appreciate. There's enough jazz for people who dig it, but who may not be into rap," says Johnny.

Bruce Walker, Motown's A&R vp/gen. mgr MoJAZZ, thinks the pair have "the most innovative sound that has come forth in urban music in a long time."

A roll through the album reveals that innovation in sound that Walker says "is creating a stir wherever they go and perform." The first cut/first single is "Enjoy Yourself," a funky little number, that is perfect cruisin' music, linked with a sweet message inside the groove.

The music on "We Got It Goin' On" is soft and relaxing, the tasty jazz feel is enhanced by the jazz rap voice of Sean, sounding all Marvin-influenced in the groove.

"Lovin' You" is an up-tempo jam with a bouncy hook that will have you singing along. How sensual can you get on record? Ease into "Get Me Off" and listen to what Sean does with the Talk Box, the song will put you in the mood for love.

The second half of the eight-song CD opens with "Summer Nights," a perfect song for the August heat wave. The music is hot, the vocals sweet and mellow and Bobby Broom's guitar work is as steamy as the pavement in the San Fernando Valley this



time of year. In keeping with their concept of "live" music, the sample from "I Can't Help It," the Stevie Wonder/Susaye Greene composition, is actually replayed and also noted on the credits.

"My All" is a straight-up love song, about promises made and kept. Delivered with sass and style, enough to get you through any long night. The title cut, "Your Gonna Love It," displays just how smooth Sean's rap style really is. The song has enormous appeal, both for radio and the street.

"Get Down Mama" and "Pass It On" are for gettin' down and partyin'

down.

Asked to play a little something on the horn he keeps close, Johnny B. went where jazz lives and brought it back to an urban thing. It was tasty, so Sean smiled behind the glasses.

> They talk quietly about the reaction they're getting on their current 40-day tour, "We are getting requests for encores on shows with major acts. People seem so enthusiastic and we are so excited." Both

have been on enough shows to know the opening act is often just fodder for the crowd so they feel like they're getting their money's worth and openers usually get short shrift became

of it. Not in this case.

The act's manager, Bill
Dern, says "We are
breaking this act in
the old-fashioned
way. We're taking them
around

the country, letting the people see for themselves. The reaction has been phenomenal."

Phenomenal was the first reaction Motown had for the group, according to Steve McKeever, exec. vp talent and acqui-

sition, Motown, who signed them.

"They came into the office for a live audition. Johnny "showed off" on the piano and Sean moved effortlessly through his fresh "scat rap" while Johnny backed him up with haunting Marvin Gaye inspired background vocals."

The depth of this inspired debut album is impressive. A close look at the credits reveals the pair sang lead and background vocals on almost all the cuts and were only augmented on three selections; wrote all the cuts, either together or individually; constructed the vocal arrangements and have stepped up with some ground-breaking stuff all their own.

The two cats are cool; the music is hot. You're gonna love it. Pass it on.



TO THE EAST BLACKwards

A Shining Symbol


On an electric night in June, a park full of people were treated to something rarely seen today—live R&B music. **Roy Ayers**, vibraphone master, embraced his adopted hometown with an outdoor concert in Manhattan's Bryant Park. Humming on classics, new material and some welcome surprises, the space had all the spectacle of a big arena and all the intimacy of a night-club. It seemed like Brooklyn in the '70s again, where Roy and his legendary **Ubiquity** frequently performed, and "Black Is Beautiful" was thick in the mental.

"I don't know if you remember a place called 'The East' [A Black cultural center]," he reflects. "The vibe was really hip. Brothers and sisters were wearing African dress. They were speaking Swahili and Yoruba. They were teaching people things about Africa. There were Black coffeehouses and the whole consciousness level was hip and the music was right there stimulating everybody. I can remember during that period in different cities all over the United States, there was the same kind of vibe happening. And then it seems, all of a sudden, it just stopped. It's just strange, man."

Whether we'll see a resurgence of that atmosphere is for trend chasers to figure out. One thing is certain, Roy Ayers has resurged with a vengeance. Between the acid jazz heads who cop his style, the hip-hop heads who sample his tracks, and dancers who will forever groove on his records—"Running Away," "Love Will Bring Us Back Together," "Searching," "Everybody Loves The Sunshine"—Ayers is a permanent (and underappreciated) fixture in dance music.

After Ubiquity played out its string in the early '80s, and a

couple of lukewarm record deals, Roy's popularity exploded in the late—'80s. He was introduced to a newer, younger following via sampling, courtesy of artists like **Tribe Called Quest, O.C., Gangstarr,** and **Mary J. Blige.** "I'm honored they picked my music," Ayers gushes. "I didn't realize how deep my sound was to people. I've been rewarded in such dif-



ferent ways." Ayers worked on several new projects, too, such as **The Roots**' album, *Red*, *Hot & Cool* and **Guru**'s *Jazzmatazz* project.

Which brings Ayers full circle to his new album for RCA/Groovetown, entitled *Naste*. While the sounds and sytlings have been updated to reach his newer fans, the album is still quintessential Ayers. "Sometimes when people call me 'The King of Jazz/Funk' and all that stuff—I don't care," he says. "It's just a way for the general public to refer to it. I call it what I call it, and if somebody wants to call it something else, that's cool. But I know my music speaks for itself."

Served Hot And Fresh

"It's real exotic, you know what I'm saying," says **Chef Raekwon** about his new solo piece on RCA/Loud. Only Built 4
Cuban Lynx is an unflinching tour through hip-hop underworld by one of its most eloquent guides. "As you slide into each chamber, you get different emotions," he says. "I got joints to make you think. I got joints that make you want to jump up and drive your car fast. Joints to clear your head, slow your brain before it closes down. Joints for the girls."


Raekwon (rhyme-crime name "Lou Diamonds") is one of the latest chapters in the ongoing saga of the Wu-Tang Clan. Cuban Lynx is Chef's "baby," but it has the trademark Wu-sound, courtesy of The Rza, partner Ghost Face Killer, Method Man, Golden Arms, Master Killa, Inspektah Deck, and Blue Raspberry. Nas checks in on a track. Raekwon insists it's all part of the building process for the Wu-Tang Dynasty.

"Wu is invincible," Chef proclaims. "It's like a chess set. We came in peace, but we're prepared for war. We got different disciplines and styles, lives, reflections and mentalities and mix it all in one. Why sell ourselves short?"

Freestylin'

Corey Glover, former lead singer of Living Colour, blew up the spot in Brooklyn's Prospect Park with his new band, The Right Daddy Love & The Disciples. They're working on their first album...Mad heads checked in (I'm talkin' damn near safety hazard) for the listening party for Faith's self-titled debut album at the posh Manhattan club, Rouge...Priority held a press luncheon to promote their first R&B artist signed, Margi Coleman. Her album, Margi, is in the Des'Ree genre. Hope Black radio doesn't front on it like they did Des'Ree's (only to be caught sleepin' and embarrassed when it blew up on pop radio).

Dance Pool Downsizes


Karen Kennedy, owner of North Texas Dance





MRMA Confab a Success

The 5th Annual Midwest Radio & Music Business Conference held at the Doubletree Hotel in Chicago recent-

ly proved to be an overwhelming success. More than 200 people attended the confab, which featured seminars on the radio and recording industry. All seminars were filled to capacity and it proved difficult for those who attended to choose.

The conference kicked-off with the 5th Annual Billy Eckstine Memorial Golf Tournament with the proceeds benefiting the Lou Rawls Cultural Center. Rawls appeared in the golf outing along with Alderman Dorothy Tillman of Chicago. Cynthia Johnson of Columbia Records won her first golf trophy during the event. There were four par 3 holes worth \$10,000 each for a hole-in-one sponsored by Rip-It-Records. Network

Seminars ranged from covering the cutting-edge technology in the radio industry centered on DAB (digital audio broadcasting that will bring AM radio stations up to the same sound quality as FM) to how to enter a career in the jingles and voice-over market. On that note, the making of commercials is a very lucrative field but unfortunately participation by Blacks is very small. Other semi-

nars included: "Hits Without Radio," "Women With Attitude," "Marketing Opportunities in Black Entertainment," "In The Studio," "The Programmers," "Street Marketing" and "Radio, Records and Retail."

Among other events, Baker & Taylor Distributing hosted a buffet dinner that featured entertainment from all genres of Black music-hip hop

to classical. Guest appearances were made by Arista Records' new diva Faith and William Becton, who sang his hit gospel single "Be Encouraged."

The conference also featured a salute to Doug Banks at which comedian Bernie Mac and Next Movement

provided the entertainment. In all, there were three showcases that featured more than 35 recording acts, aspiring singers and rappers.



Arbs Are In

Arbitron's quarter ly ratings are in for the spring book and Florida's major markets are still hugging their Black stations. In Miami/Fort Lauderdale, WEDR (99 JAMZ) slipped to No. 2

across the board with a 5.7 in 12+, just a whisper behind WRMA, a Latin station which had a 5.8. IN 25-54, WRMA's 7.6 was tops again, with WEDR holding its own at No. 2 with a 6.3. WHQT (HOT 105) tags right behind with a 5.9. Black oriented with a dance tip, WPOW (POWER 96) grabbed the top slot in 18-34 demo with an 8.9. WEDR wasn't the top dog in the South Florida market. Jamos "T" Thomas says he won't be making any major adjustments. With Arbitron concentrating on pulling more adult makes (18-34) into its diary recording system (which are more apt to be attracted to rock and the Latin stations


in this market), and WEDR trending up in the last couple of monthlies, he has reason not to. But the station is running a promotion to give away a spanking new Ford Mustang.

> Up in Mickey Mouse land, a.k.a. Orlando, WJHM-FM (102 JAMZ) held onto the top spot in 18-34 with a 12 rating. JAMZ was second in 12+ with an 8.1. The summer's heating up for the station though, as it kicks in full gear to promote a "really BIG show," August 27, featuring the big man himself Notorious B.I.G., Immature, H-Town and Gyrl.



What's Next: "I'm working on something really big. People in Miami are not going to believe it. I've been meeting with City of Miami officials and the Downtown Development Authority." He's also talking to Emilio Estefan on producing material for some of his R&B acts, which include Jon Secada, Donna Allen, and LaGaylia Fraizer. ≡ ₹



Their Story: Bo-Rock, C-Knights, and 2 Scoop had been






