





# 1950: A SOLID MARKET

All signs point to firm gains in music during 1950 as industry works toward realistic goal.

By DICK SCHREIBER

tions in the juke box industry—
indicate the music business has more confidence in its future in 1950 than it has had at anytime since the lush months of 1946

Distributors and operators are in sound financial condition.

Operator buying, while not spectacular, is steady and the general consensus among manufacturers, distributors and finance companies is that the average operator has become more business like in his content. come more business-like in his route management.

### New Sales Records

Manufacturers have not relaxed their sales efforts, but high-pressure tactics and sales without down payments have virtually disappeared. Despite this, manufacturers report sales to the nation's 7,500 operators set new records in many plants at the end of 1949 and the first two months of 1950.

months of 1950.

For one thing, the average operator, who bought heavily in 1946 and 1947, has had an opportunity to liquidate a major portion of his accounts and is in better financial condition to buy. Manufacturers, who crowded their distributors with monthly quotas which were impossible to meet without such high-pressure tactics as sales without money down, have revamped their production goals and scrapped sales programs which pushed operators beyond their financial limitations. financial limitations.

Bank Attitude Changed

Bank Attitude Changed

This changing attitude, forced on
the industry after two years of overproduction and nearly two years of
leveling-off, is credited with putting
since the end of the war. Even
in commercial banking circles, where
the juke box business was eyed 12
months ago with something close to
complete mistrust, a new attitude
is apparent. Deals involving juke
box paper are not passed as quickly
and easily as they were in 1946 and
1947. But financing companies and
banks are advancing sizable amounts
on a conservative, selective basis.

Collections on installment sales are

Collections on installment sales are better than they ever have been, according to officials of finance companies who deal nationally and on a regional basis. Most equipment is being sold on time-payment plans, but the current average time is 18 months rather than 24 months-periods common in 1948 and early 1949.

With greater selectivity in the new
models, operators expect to sell locations which have never before had
juke boxes. It is doubtful whether
this will appreciably increase the
number of phonographs now on location—approximately 400,000. But
handling the replacement market
means a healthy chunk of business
every 12 months.
During the peak production years

every 12 months.

During the peak production years of 1946-47, an estimated 200,000 phonographs came off the lines. Equipment prices and operating costs limited the number of locations in which new equipment could be placed profitably. During the 1939-1940 period, by way of comparison, juke box manufacturers made and sold an average of 60,000 boxes each year.

No one has been able to estimate what percentage of the 200,000 boxes produced during 1946-47 changed hands at least once. Many manufacturers' inventories and distributors' showrooms held the overflow of this production until early 1949.

Supply and Demand

Over-production affected the erating picture in several ways. Because supply exceeded demand, and some distributors were pressed for some distributors were pressed for capital, phonographs were sold at a wide variety of prices. The price on both new and used equipment varied so greatly that the problem of trade-ins was complicated to a point where distributors shied away from trade deals.

Finance companies, which often had full routes on their books, found operators simply walked away when their unpaid balance on individual boxes was larger than the price of a new phonograph.

During the last half of 1949 and the first two months of 1950, these unhealthy conditions have been cleared up. Operators indicated they would buy more boxes this year than last, but most had established the percentage of phonographs they could profitably buy each year.

In still another question, the operators were requested to write in the number of new phonographs they expect to purchase in 1950. They indicated they would purchase, on the average, nine each. It should be noted that only 215 of the 410 operators filled in this particular question. question.

# **Location Promotion Pays Off**

On-the-spot plugging increases in importance us established ops prove value with upped grosses

ing greater emphasis by juke box operators during recent months, has played an important part in the gradually rising grosses noticeable since last fall. Various forms of play-stimulating activities and programs, directly and indirectly affecting location profits, have been devised by operators in different parts of the country. A survey of operators by The Billboard resulted in the compiling of a 10-point check-list of the most profitable and proven methods of play stimulation now being used

of play stimulation now being used (see accompanying check-list).
Realizing that location promotion is a form of advertising, and that the right kind of advertising pays off, operators are using these plus-promotion ideas with good results. While a juke box with good disks, clean, working efficiently and correctly spotted will draw satisfactory play, it takes a "little something extra" to earn extra dollars.

### Mystery Record

A play-stimulator that has added from 15 to 18 per cent to normal weekly grosses from most locations where it is used has been devised by Charles Wiloth, Tri-County Music, Chicago. For the past year, the idea has paid steady extra dividends, he

reports. In practice, Wiloth, or his servicemen, select an old record (one without a vocal) and place a corresponding title strip on the selection panel with the words "Mystery Tune" instead of the song title and artist's name. The same mystery record is not placed in more than one location at a time, however. With the mystery record goes a quantity of cards, proat a time, however. With the mystery record goes a quantity of cards, providing space for the customer's title guess, his name, etc. These are left with the location owner, along with a large placard for wall mounting.

The wall sign, calling attention to the mystery record also carries to

the mystery record, also carries the good news that the person properly identifying the song will win a cash award. The mystery record is only left in one location four weeks, after which it is removed and another substituted whether it has been identi-

stituted whether it has been identified or not. The cash prize is increased from \$1, the first week, to \$2, \$3 and \$4 for each succeeding period.

Each week, Wiloth's servicemen pick up the accumulated "guess cards" and if a winner or winners appear, the proper award money is left with the location. The identity of the different mystery tunes are known only to Wiloth and his servicemen.

Disk Jockeys-Hit Tune Posters

On an association level, members of the Washington Music Gulld (WMG) are plugging a local disk jockey and his pick of the "top tune" of the month, along with posters listing the top 10 tunes of each month. The disk jockey selection features a picture of the jockey, a well-known local figure; his choice of hits are usually good for strong advance play even before the tune makes the big time. In return, the jockey plugs the city's jukes on his programs, and features a onceweekly "top 10 records" program as taken from the juke box selection panels.

The poster program, using compact placards, has been used successfully for over two years. Citing one inplacards, has been used successfully for over two years. Citing one instance of plus-play resulting from poster use, Hirsh Coin Machine Corporation quotes an average \$8 per week increase in some locations. An advance on such appearances, the example advanced was that of one firm features the tunes, past and curstop averaging around \$12 weekly; rent, made famous by the visiting artitle week following installation of a lists. ### Hit-of-the-Week Selections

Another association sponsored play-Another association sponsored play-promotion program is that now in effect by the Amusement Machine Operators' Association of Greater Baltimore (AMO). Each week, each member operator selects three sides that he believes will catch the public's ear. These selections are then turned ear. These selections are then turned over to a panel of judges and they choose, from the approximately 200 titles, the sides to be plugged for the week. A disk jockey tie-in is also used, with a local jockey plugging the hit for the week on his program and mentioning it as a juke box selection. The operators follow thru with their own leastion promotion consisting of own location promotion, consisting of placing the record in the No. 1 spot and placarding the location.

Local Recording Artist Tie-Ins

Operators who have a recording artist in their own bailiwick are missing a good more-play bet if they don't ing a good more-play bet if they don't program his records on their machines, Toledo operators believe. To prove their point, most of the local music firms, 14 in all, have been spinning the newest releases of an up and coming local group, the Arv Garrison Trio.

With Toledo operators Clifford Braun, Automatic Sales Company, and Norman Fetzer, Eagle Music & Novelty, leading off on the local artist promotion program, seven others soon joined in Meanwhile, the trio's local appearances. radio interviews

The idea is to program sections of a high capacity machine (40 or more selections equipment is best, he states) using either current hits or standard pop favorites, or a combination of both, so as to furnish "musical messages" in song

With most tap evening customers With most tap evening customers coming in pairs, either one of the twosome will be a potential multiple-disk juke patron. Messages, spelled out in tune titles, are of the endearing term type, and (in test installations) have been promoted via a printed card or placard on top of the machine or behind the turntable compartment window. The card informs the player of the 'message' and gives one or two examples. The messages are paired up in two, four and five song titles. (See standard juke hit record list elsewhere in this issue, for programing ideas.)

record list elsewhere in this issue, for programing ideas.)

The operator cautions, however, against using the message idea on bar or wall selection boxes. The proper tune sequence is too easily lost when such multiple point-of-sale spots are available. To date, only promotion has been done on the juke box proper. But it can still be used in remote selector spots, with the cards and suggested messages used only on the machine itself.

Record Request Cards In Milwaukee, operators have been using "request cards." They are printed forms which patrons fill out with their requests for particular rec-ords which the juke does not contain at the time.

at the time.

Operators using this idea say that it serves to keep their customers happy and enables them (operators) to get a "per location" slant on the type of music preferred. While the general run of hit records are good in practically all stops, it is reasoned that to get that "extra nickel," some special record programing should be used in individual spots. And Milwaukee operators feel that they have solved such individual tastes, in a good measure, by their system of "you tell us and we'll try to please" protell us and we'll try to please" programing.

Pop Hillbilly Pairings

Following the pop-hillbilly tune pairings of a single song currently in vogue, Chicago operator Adolph Raymond, A & M Music Company, has realized some added spins by pre-senting these "double nickel deals." Raymond states that when he placed two versions of recent top hits, such as Room Full of Roses, Bluebird on Your Windowsill, Jealous Heart, etc., in pairs on a single machine, many patrons played both versions.

Even in normally non-oat tune spots, the dual presentation of poph.b. wax has paid off. It also works in reverse in primarily country tune locations, where customers will "put another nickel in" to hear the pop version of their favorite, Raymond states. Today's high record capacity juke boxes make such extra disk programing possible, as it will not mean leaving off high riding current hits. In effect, such double-disk placement does not cramp the "Top 10" program and really means that an extra playattraction has been added, he main-

# **Money-Making Promotion Ideas**

- Mystery tune. Using a "guess-the-name-of-this-one" approach, the offering of a prize for correct identification results in more repeat spins, brings customers back to location to "see if they've won." Ups juke play, location

The resolution is not complete—but is of a degree sufficient to permit the disk industry to operate at a healthy pace. Diskerles in general, for instance, went into the new year with sales at an all-time high—proving beyond a doubt that the consumer is no longer flab-bergasted or apathetic because of the introduction of the new speeds. bealers, many of whom a compara-tively short time ago were desper-ately attempting to move stock, are now doing a handsome business.

The situation, of course, is indicative of one over-all point; namely, an increasingly amount of standardization has gradually come about, with an ever-growing list of manufacturers adding either one or both of the new speeds to their regular

### Public Acceptance

The acceptance of Columbia's LP record, of course, is an old story. But one of the major developments within recent months is the sudden within recent months is the sudden consumer and dealer acceptance of RCA Victors' 45 system. Reasons for the acceptance of the new speeds are obvious: they contribute distinct advantages from the standpoint of fidelity, wear, storage, etc., and the companies which introduced the disks backed up their innovations with promotion sufficient to dissipate whatever resistance consumers and dealers originally had originally had.

These promotion campaigns are ill going forward. RCA's recently still going forward. RCA's recently announced new 45 push will carry into May. Meanwhile the disk is selling so well that the company is faced with a merchandise and production problem—distributors and duction problem—distributors and dealers can't get enough of the dough-nut-sized disks.

Columbia's recently announced plans call for promoting the company's seven-inch microgroove record. considered a member of the LP family, the diskery for a long time did not promote the platter, but instead devoted its energies to the 10 and 12-inch LP as a vehicle for classical and show album music.

### Disk Advantages

To the juke box trade, of course, the promotion of the seven-inch microgroove as a competitive disk to Victor's 45 is one of the more interesting facets of the speed situation. Both disks, from the standpoint of operators, have distinct advantages when compared with regulation 78. As of now, of course, 45 would have the

rosters of all companies making 45. Thus far only Columbia makes the seven-inch LP.

seven-inch LP.

Further standardization within the disk industry is expected. Key companies, of course, are Decca and Columbia. These majors thus far press only 33½ in addition to 78. It is expected, however, that Decca before many months will announce plans for adding 45 to its line. The diskery has indicated that it would make such a move if and when it conceived of 45 as a plus business; that is, a business which would not cut into 78 sales. Decca has indicated that it is en rapport with Columbia Records on this matter and that if and when the move is made both companies would act simultaboth companies would act simultaneously. Only time will tell. But currently two majors, RCA and Capitol, are pressing all three speeds, and the list of three-speed diskeries increasing weekly. A glang at is increasing weekly. A glance at the appended chart will show what the line-up is to date.

Equipment

On the equipment end of the business, the cause of standardization is being additionally advanced. ITH the problem of record availability rapidly disappropriate ability rapidly disappearing, juke box operators can now look to the future of placing machines featuring 78, 45 or 33 ½ r.p.m. disks on location. And that future is not too distant.

At this time manufacturers are divided on their thinking as far as 45 and 33½ r.p.m. usage is concerned, but most agree eventually there will be a standardization within the industry, with the seven-inch disk taking over. ### First Activity

That the juke box manufacturers have given many long months of thought, time and money to the question of the various disk speeds can be seen from the progress re-

The introduction of the converter for the Wurlitzer unit did not "just happen." Nor did the results of the Seeburg study just "fall into line" on an executive report. The battle of the speeds, as the situation has been called for the past year, brought much confusion to juke box manufacturing. This was the picture early in '49 when the manufacturers basis, are anxiously being started their intensive studies. ### Results

What, then, has happened with the studies made by other manufacture

AMI, which introduced its new Model C early this year, made no provisions for any speed other than the conventional 78 in this model. However, John Haddock, president, said that "when there is a need for a 45 mechanism, we will have it."

This firm had spent much time surveying the various speeds. The late Lindy Force, AMI manager of general sales, had conducted an intensive study into both the 45 and 331/3 r.p.m. mechanisms and had concluded that until record availability was no longer a factor, there was nothing to be accomplished by introducing a phono covering either of these mechanisms.

### Others Follow Sult

H. C. Evans & Company, after completing their study, came to approximately the same conclusions as those drawn by AMI. Lester C. Rieck, phonograph sales manager for the firm, said the firm will also have a 45 mechanism when the record has successfully proved it is the disk of

J. Raymond Bacon, executive vicepresident of Rock-Ola, reported that firm, after making its study, had just about decided to shelve the whole thing. Aside from the record availability situation, Bacon reported, there were mechanical difficulties which would have to be resolved.

There is little doubt that within the next 6 to 12 months the manufacturers will have had some reports on the actual operation of phonographs featuring both the 331/2 and the 45 speeds. With a unit now on the market which can handle these speeds, some location tests are already under way and others will follow.

Just what the outcome on standardactually brought out a phonograph ization will be is still a matter of conjecture. But the industry as a whole feels that the time is coming when the new speeds, and the smaller seven-inch records will be common in juke box locations from Coast to

# Programing Key to Better Take

П

Proper record selection can mean the difference between marginal and profitable juke operation

By NORMAN WEISER

HE UPHILL FIGHT for survival waged by the music operator dur-ing the past year brought home one lesson he will never forget. It proved programing the most important key to profits, and unless the operator devised a workable method of record selection, he was batting with two strikes against him from the

Programing was one factor in juke box operation which was, in many cases, completely overlooked by veteran operators who had entered the business when music machines offered as few as 12 or 16 selections. It was comparatively easy to pick a dozen best-selling records, install them in a phonograph, then sit back and wait for the nickels to roll in. Even when for the nickels to roll in. Even when the manufacturers stepped up selectivity to 20 and 24 numbers, programing remained a minor consideration to the average operator.

When music grosses hit bottom in the summer of '48, and it appeared they would remain there unless something descriptions are done the selection.

thing drastic was done, the selection of records began to take on new imof records began to take on new import. Aptly enough, it was the buying of disks which brought the first light to the cperators. With their income slashed from an abnormal postwar high to a subnormal low in a matter of some 30 months, and with labor, cquipment and record prices higher than ever before, the buying of new platters had to be curtailed. Out of this there emerged the first glimmer of the importance of properly, programing a juke box.

### Multi-Selections Grow

While the buying of records for jukes took on added importance in the campaign to save a penny here and 2 cents there, the growth of multi-selections in new machines was making it possible for the operator to offer the patron so much music he was almost forced to spend more than one nickel in order to hear all the disks he liked in a given location. And these 40, 48 and 100-selection units were also destined to eventually affect the recording company in its

units were also destined to eventually affect the recording company in its pairing of songs on its releases.

There still are many problems facing the operators who seek an answer to their programing routine. Many of these are answered here in relaying the experiences of those operators who have found ways and means of regulating their programing and thereby upping their grosses. Too, several manufacturers, headed by the J. P. Seeburg Corporation, have given much thought to the situation, and hope to come up with op aids in this respect.

hope to come up with op aids in this respect.

Basically, however, a check of music operators thruout the country seems to indicate that while programing is unquestionably the No. I factor in juke box operations today, only a handful of operators have made real progress in setting up a workable programing plan.

# Scope

Programing covers a great deal of territory. It includes such widely separated factors as the music pub-lisher in New York; the artists who are selected to record certain numare selected to record certain numbers; the quality and quantity of the recording resulting from the selection of the talent; the method of presenting the finished platter to the operators on one hand, and to the public on the other; the regional and local tastes. recording-wise, of the juke box patrons; timing of record placements, and finally, the wclding of all factors into a coin-attracting selection panel on a juke box in a given location.

Also affecting the programing of juke boxes are the financial restrictions placed on the purchasing of records per machine, the methods in which the purchases are made and by

which the purchases are made and by whom the orders are placed.

The music publisher is important because he, above all others, determines whether a song will be a hit. It is the promotion he puts into a song which also determines whether a tune will be one of the lucky 50 out of thousands published each year to hit the top. hit the top.

### Artist Preferences

Artists are equally important in considering a juke box program. Ter-ritorial favorites must be considered, for it has been proven that whereas Bing Crosby's recording of a tune may be the national favorite, a disk of the same song by Frankie Laine may outdraw the Crosby disk in, for example, Cleveland by as much as four to one.

Record quality has always been important from the economic viewpoint. Now it becomes equally important from the programing view. For if a record does not adequately reproduce a singer's voice, or an orchestra's rendition, no natter how big a hit the song may be, the patron will not pay to hear the distorted platter. Too, the to hear the distorted platter. Too, the volume of records released by a diskery, and the methods of promoting those disks (via trade papers, placards, mailings, etc.) may well determine whether or not it will find public favor on a large enough scale to make it a money winner for the operator.

## Financial Factors

Just as any successful business must carefully check its expenditures, so the juke box operator must keep within certain limits in his spending. Thus, most ops have arrived at a percentage of their gross which they feel can be spent for new disks. This figure might run 10 per cent, as it does in the case of Hirsh de la Viez, Washington, who points out that to make money on this basis, he must get at least 150 plays per disk. Therefore, he can not make mistakes in selecting the records which the 10 per cent figure buys. Personalities can not enter into the picture. He must disregard personal feelings toward given record reps and artists and, instead, pick only those Just as any successful business must artists and, instead, pick only those tunes which he knows will appeal to

tunes which he knows will appeal to the listeners in his locations. By following this rule, together with keeping close tabs on the upcoming "plug" tunes of the publishers, and by using the Hit Parade record service and following The Billboard, he says, operators buying disks intelligently, can shave 25 per cent off their record costs—a worthwhile saving when it is realized that the average operator buys approximately 156 age operator buys approximately 156 records a week.

### Regional Planning

An operator who has a widespread route, encountering many unusual circumstances is Mike Imig, Yankton, S. D., whose route takes in seven counties in the Southeastern part of throut the country who are not in the state. his State.

In order to properly program his machines, Imig made a personal study of each location on his route. In this way he determined the type of patron who frequented the spot, the musical

quarantee the greatest number of plays? Do you make it a habit to determine patrons' musical tastes? Likes and dislikes, record-wise, will vary from one location to the next.

Determining these tastes means extra profits.

machines early enough to assure the full run of the tune's popularity, and thus guarantee the maximum earning power per each disk,

Do you watch trade paper ads and editorials? This has been established as the most imporant source of record news, and guide to record buying, available to the music machine operator today.

Do you watch both sides of a record? With the new multi-selection machines now on the market which play both sides of a record, it is important to watch both the A and B sides of new releases to get the greatest value in your record purchases.

Do your record expenditures pay off in profits? Every secord you buy should be a money earner.

In the Eastern portion of his ter in the Eastern portion of his ter-ritory, Imig found a majority of the juke box customers were Scandana-vians, whose musical tastes ran al-most exclusively to waltz or hillbilly

vians, whose musical tastes ran almost exclusively to waltz or hillbilly tunes. The Western section of the route, with many customers of Bohemian descent reported, favored poptunes cut by Fess Fitchie, Six Fat Dutchmen, Eddie Skeets and Lawrence Duchow, all of whom have made frequent personal appearances. Hillbilly tunes were also found important in the Western part of the Imig route, with a large Indian population showing a definite preference for this type of song.

With all these facts to go on, Imig was able to set up a schedule of the type of selections to be used in each of his phonographs. In this planning he took one other factor into consideration, the owner and/or help in a location. At least one of their favorites go into each juke. The reasoning behind this is simple. No matter ing behind this is simple. No matter how perfectly a juke box is programed, it is all lost unless the phono is operating and attracts the patron's attention. By putting in the owner's favorite, the operator knows the machine will be in operation, and the customers going to the instrument will find several favorites of their

Imig, like so many other operators thruout the country who are not im-mediately available to a distributor of records, has one important problem facing him 52 weeks a year. That is the timing of record placements.

Unless a "hit" disk can ride the full who frequented the spot, the musical tastes of the proprietor and his help, the artists most preferred by the patrons (this thru pay checks), and the artists and bands which were promoted in the territory (via personal appearances, placards, etc).

Armed with this information, he then determined the amount he could had reached its maximum earning spend on records to keep on top of power and was nose-diving.

To overcome this problem, Imig carefully scans the record reviews in The Billboard each week. He spots disks in the releases column, and reads the reviews. And he keeps close tabs on the disks being cut by those musicians and vocalists who are especially popular in the territory.

### Double Pay-Off Sides

With more and more phonographs playing both sides of a record, operators are now paying attention to both sides before making their purchases. Jack Cohen, president of the Cleveland Phonograph Merchants' Association, said that while Frankie Laine's recording of Mule Train had hit first in his city, about 50 per cent of the operators purchased the Bing Crosby version because the reverse side was, in their opinion, another potential hit, Dear Hearts and Gentle People. "In this particular instance," Cohen said, "we guessed right."

Many of the operators are now convinced that there can be no dead spots on their selector panels. In this regard, it is imperative to pick hit records with an eye peeled to the No. 2 side, so as to attract as many nickels to the reverse side as possible. This feeling is growing every day, so much so that it is being felt by recording firms which also are now watching their pairings more carefully.

Here, too, operators have reported they can catch these "double winners" by keeping close tabs on The Billboard charts.

There is still much to be done in the programing field. Undoubtedly the operator, in addition to the help he receives from recording firms, distributors and trade paper advertising and editorials, will receive additional aid from the juke box manufacturer in the future.

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

of the albums to most customers over a four-day of the albums to most customers over a four-day stretch. The 15 cents may sound like a small bonus, but it added up for the girls and it did the trick for us."—Gathright's, Pine Bluff, Ark. . . "We have contests between our record clerks, challenging them to sell a certain quantity of one particular pop tune. The one who sells the most or makes her quota of the number is treated by the other clerks at the local ice cream parlor."—R. J. Szydlowski, Music Mart, Burlington, Wis.

Benton Harbor, Mich., reports having run a successful Saturday afternoon autograph party at which the local bobby soxers had a chance to meet band leader Dick Jurgens and his vocalists. Pictures of Jurgens were used in the windows in polka-dot fashion and served to attract plenty of disk buyers. Jurgens's band played the Crystal Palace, Coloma, that same night.

MERCHANDISING TIPS . . . In addition to running a weekly ad in the local paper. Zentz Radio & Service Company. Elmore, Minn. uses an advertising slide that plugs the new disks on the local theater screen. . . The Conkling Music Store, Baltimore, has an amplifying system with a 10-watt speaker on the roof of the store building. The music can be heard for two blocks and brings in many a customer. . . Frank Mazza, Katz Drug Store No. 6, Des Moines, reports good results by suggesting tunes that were popular years ago. . . ord Rack.





Comment: Decca Records in the course of the past year sensationally improved its all-round service to juke box operators, according to The Billboard's Third Annua! Juke Box Survey. Diskery smashed thru with 600 points to take first place, comfortably leading Victor, which tallied 472 points. In last year's poll Decca totaled 190 points and placed fourth.

Victor this year is in the same relative position as last year—second place. Capitol, last year's winner, is third this year. Columbia, in third place last year, dropped to fifth.

Mercury came up during the past year, edging out Columbia for fourth place. In last year's poll Mercury was fifth, behind Decca. MGM and King hold sixth and seventh positions, the same relative spots they held last year.

Comment: Decca Records, which scored tops in giving operators the best all-round service, also takes the nod as having the most helpful salesmen, according to The Billboard's Third Annual Juke Box Survey. Diskery scored 227 as against Capitol's 203. Victor, in third place, tallied 130, just about edging out Mercury, which scored 129. MGM, with a total of 94, beat Columbia's 79 for fifth position.

Of the operators answering, 94 stated they were visited about every other week, and 111 indicated about once a month. Fourteen operators say a salesman visits them less than once a month.

Comment: Juke box operators, voting in The Billboard's Third Annual Juke Box Survey, gave RCA Victor an overwhelming vote as the company which turns out the best all-round record with regard to wearing and reproduction qualities. Company scored 684 points as against Decca's 466. In last year's poll relative positions of these companies were the same—Victor first and Decca second. Third place in this year's poll goes to Mercury, with a score of 302 as against Capitol's 251. Mercury's position represents a tremendous improvement since the last poll, at which time the diskery scored seventh. Cap was third last year. Columbia, fifth this year with 193, was fourth last year. MGM, sixth in the current poll, beat out London. Latter diskery last year scored fifth, ahead of MGM.

Comment: With programing becoming one of the most important facets of juke box operation, and record costs still a major operating expense, there is a growing trend among operators to handle all record purchases. And the wisdom of this trend is obvious.

Whereas many operators during the abnormal war and postwar years were prone to leave practically all record selection to their servicemen and office personnel, and to lose much of the close contact with locations which had built up their routes, the coming of multi-selection phonos offering from 24 to 100 selections meant a return to the methods which had built the automatic phonograph into a big business.

The return to "grass roots" operating, with the operator personally contacting his locations, no matter what the size of his route, and taking a keener interest in the programing of his equipment, is more than just a little bit responsible for the upsurge in the music field during the past

QUESTION 2:	Where Do You Buy Your Records?
ANSWER:	Wholesale from distributors

Comment: Despite the fact that operators find themselves neglected, sales-wise, by distributors, most of the juke box firms buy the vast majority of their records thru distributing companies.

The answers to this question supplied no explanation for the number of operators who said they bought records from retailers, nor did the response indicate in what quantity operators bought from retailers. In all likelihood, operators do business with retailers when they are too remote from distributors, when distributor service does not measure up, or when distributors are unable to furnish copies of hits in needed quantity.

Comment: Perhaps the weakest link in the music machine chain is the one connecting the record distributor and the operator. In this regard the questionnaire figures speak for themselves.

Practically all operators of music have, for a long time, been decrying the manner in which they must buy their records. Record distributors have, according to these complaints, ignored the operator as far as personal contact is concerned, caused them to lose untold profits by late shipments, and have, in general, proven a hindrance instead of a help to one of their major consumer sources.

Manufacturers are cognizant of this situation and some have already started to do something about it. Many operators, in answering this question, indicated that a step in the right direction had been taken by Decca when that firm named a sales manager for music operators. They expressed the hope other labels would follow suit.

Comment: What is probably the most significant fact to come out of the Third Annual Juke Box Poll was the answer to this query. And with trade paper information holding a two to one lead, operators revealed that actually its importance was much greater. For example, many of those listing "actual machine count" as their guide for buying records admitted they first received information on new platters from trade papers, then inserted test disks on some machines, finally using the count to determine future purchases.

With only a small percentage of the country's operators in close enough contact with their record sources to rely on the latter for information, practically all operators have turned to the one source that gives them up-to-the-minute information, advertising and editorial-wise, on the records coming up. By following this method they are able to get the quickest information on the new releases and can place orders early enough to get the greatest amount of play from disks earmarked as hits by competent reviewers.

The trend toward trade paper importance as the No. 1 guide to record purchases has been growing stronger in the past few years and, according to operator comments, will continue to grow even more quickly now that programing has assured such an important role in profitable operations.

QUESTION 5: **Approximately How Many** Records Do You Buy for Your **Entire Operation Each Week?** 

ANSWER: Average purchase per operator, 156 records.

Comment: The importance of the juke box operators as consumers of records can be seen from the fact that in 1949 approximately 20 per cent of all records produced were sold to this group. And with selectivity increased in new juke models, this percentage is almost certain to increase during 1950.

Based on figures received from established operators, the average route includes 72 machines, for which 156 disks are purchased weekly. This figures out to approximately 2.2 records per machine per week. Whether the records are purchased via a set amount of money per machine per week, or by setting aside 10 to 20 per cent of the gross as a record budget, this 2.2 figure holds up right down the line.

This means that the 400,000 juke boxes now on location take approximately 900,000 records weekly and again proves that the juke box operator is an important and consistent purchaser of records as well as an unmatched source of song and record exploitation.

QUESTION 6: Do You Believe the New Low-Price Record Labels Have Materially Reduced Your Over-All **Record Costs?**

Comment: While a considerable number of operators reported lower-priced records had helped them cut their disk costs, the majority answered to the contrary, thereby bearing out the repeated fast that it's the "names" that bring the most consistent nickels to music machines.

Actually, the lower-priced labels are more or less disappearing from the national scene, with Bluebird, an RCA product, still holding up, but here, too, the trend seems to be to advance artists to the higher-priced label after starting them on the lower priced disks.

Operators are becoming increasingly aware of the fact that they cannot sacrifice quality. When a lower-priced, and perhaps lesser-knowl label brings out a good record which the operator feels can make the grade in his machines, he will buy it. But his first interest is in the proven stars who have been consistent money winners.

Intelligent record buying, in the long run, will offer the average operator his greatest savings. Selecting the right disks for his locations, watching both sides for the greatest potential play on any given record and gearing his purchases to his needs without deviations for personal likes or dislikes are methods given by operators for effecting the greatest possible savings in disk buying.

Comment: Introduction of the light-weight tone arm on postwar phonographs somewhat lessened the importance of longer-playing records, since the decreased pressure and better needle quality made all records last longer.

Tone arm and needle manufacturers, the operator response to this question proves, have succeeded in providing pick-up equipment which not only saves on record costs but furnishes better reproduction,

Operators have reasoned it is cheaper to wear out a needle than to shorten the life of every record in the box, so needle manufacturers—aided by tone arm producers—have worked to deliver a product which combines the best features of less record wear with longer-lived needles.

Altho operators were asked to check only one of the three answers, a number checked two or more, which accounts for the fact that more than 410 operator replies are represented.

QUESTION 8: How Do You Dispose of Used Records?

Comment: Every nickel counts in the juke box business, and the sale of used records has come to represent a sizable portion of the aggressive operator's income. Most operators, as the questionnaire results show, have facilities for selling used records directly to the public. And a great many (see question and answers below), handle new records as well.

Again there is duplication, since operators use more than one method for disposing of their records. The relatively high percentage of operators who give old records to charitable institutions shows that operators are conscious of public relations gestures designed not only to help a good couse but build good will



Comment: The fact that one out of five juke box operators have a retail
record business in addition to their routes may come as a
surprise to some quarters. For the past 10 years, however, there has been
sprowing trend for operators to branch into record retailing.

Part of this practice grew out of the operator's disposal of used records (see preceding question). A natural follow-up was the addition of new disks.

In some instances operators have set up stores to handle and service a complete line of electric appliances in addition to new and used records. And in a few instances retail record dealers have become music operators, again demonstrating the close tie between record retailing and juke box operations.

IN WHAT has come to be generally recognized as the music-record industry's most authentic and exhaustive tabulation of song and record popularity, The Billboard in its January 14, 1950, issue for the fourth consecutive year presented its recapitulation of its weekly music popularity charts, thus tabbing the year's top songs, records and artists.

On this and the following pages, The Billboard editors have reprinted much of the material that was published in the January 14, 1950, issue, but with the help of The Billboard's Music Research department, have carried many of the tabulations further down so that specific types of artists have been spotted and listed.

The results of the recap speak for themselves, and no effort is made to editorialize or qualify results. However, it must constantly be borne in mind by readers that this is a summary of votes by juke box operators for the calendar year only. A top record or song that reached its popularity ratings prior to January 1, 1949, but maintained its popularity well into 1949 will obviously not compare in this poll to songs and/or records whose entire popularity cycle (rise and fall) occurred within the calendar year. Similarly, songs and/or records that reached popularity in 1949 but are still high in the polls as of January 1, 1950, will not compare favorably.

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


