# PREPARE FOR EMERGENCY! 

Foresight Now Can Relieve Music Operntors of Numerows Hemdaches in the Tighteming Supply Market

By IS HOROWITZ
Take that phonograph manual of the shelf, Mr. Operator, dust it off and start reading. For totimite knowledge of how your machlne works and how to diagnose
trouble can keep you operating trouble can keep you operating shortazes cut deep tato the income of the uninformed route owner.
No one knows how severe the supply problem whll become. Whlle the availability of most things will fluctuate as international tensions worsen or relax, operators, in common with all American business, are in for tightening of the supply belt.
So far, the most noticeable efteet has been in the avallability of
tubes. Certain types are becoming more dificult to obtain, especially those also used in ielevision sets. Probably no operator has yct been forced to take a machine off location for this reason and it is unlikely that he ever will, or for a long tirne to come. But he has already lost his discount pifvileges and, even at the higher price. can't buy all he wants.

Pile Un Supplimes
Whenever they have been able Lo, many operators have lald in a comfortable supply of tubes, storIng them away against the thme when they might be needed. And more than ever. cautious operators are laying to a fat inventory (depeadins on the depth of thelr pocketbooks) of other critical replacement fiems-plasties, bulbs, electrical componenta, crystal ptck-ups, speakers, etc.
But such buying is little ore than a temporary hedge against an uncertain future. The carcless

While these substitutes may no give your machine the best tone on the street and may not last as long. they will keep machines working And where the supply of these "hrst-cousin" tubes talls. other subs ean be made to work by proper wring changes in elee tronic assemblies

Imbriention
Ot all things affecting the uscful life of coin phonographs, lubrication ranks close or at the top. Oecasional and judicious use of No moving parts well pay plents of dividends in prolonged Hfe Altho hep mechanics have their own pet schedules calling for thoro lubricating jobs every three to six months, you can do no better than follow the explleft instruc tions in your manufacturer's manual.
Don't use any fuse of a higher amperage than the recommended rating in the factory manual. This usedut pops. rather than selling them or a few cents each, should they be required at some future date to return to the warlime praclice of turaing in old shellac with orders for new disks

Tane Arma
Even if you don't convert to a lighter tone-arm, you should check the arm weight occasionally. Arm springs lose their senslon readjusted to restore the attelal weight lack of such procalion will shortea the lire procaution will shorten the tife of your disks. as will neglect in changing needles periodically
Your juke cablnet should also get its share of specisl treatmeat in thesc uncertain times. You are probably carelul enough (oltho this doesn't hold true of all operacors) 10 locate th so that the sun doesn't beat on it, or so that 1 isn t too exposed to the cffects of dampness and temperature change

# Defense Plants New Stops? 

Program Started in World Wiar II Gaining Momentu"I as Industrial Locations Move Into Defense Work

## By FRED AMANN

Because some far-sighted music operators took an opportunity lo enter a new type jocallon during World War 11, placing machines in defense pland cafeterias and recreation rooms, the present stepped-up emphasis on military and alled production in many plants on a ruund-the-clock basis, is now offering the opportunity for further development of such operation.
Not only in such major war plants as Douglas Aireraft (now OHare Field) and Amertorp Corporation in the Chicago area, but in scoond and third-line detense factories having employec cafeterias coin phonographs were proflitably placed on both operator and worker counts during the last war. Two methods of placement were followed: Reguler commission basis and straight rental.
One vistiting operator, upon observing the two-and-a-halt hour stretch each noon and midnight when six different shifts passed thru the Douslas cafeteria, commented on his competitor's acumen in obtaining "the lareste aroup of pulential customers ever seen in any one location." The impressed operator, Charles Wilmoth, THCouncy Music, Chicago, is now planning his own plant catéteria placement as a result.

Torpecho Plant
Another defense plant music location from 1943 thru 1945 was the (often) seven-day week, 24 -hour day Amertorp torpedo factory in Furest Park, 9 il. Thls plant, then aperated by the American Can Company, is leading naval ord. nance plant now wholly under navy supervision. M. Hogen, public retations official, stated that

Acoustically, plant cafeterias and recreation areas present a more difficult problem than the usual location. Absence of draperics. carpeting and other sound-absorbIng furnishings plus the usual tile construction of walls and noors. mean that extra beakers must be used and must be strategically placed. Only trial and ertor will furnish the answer for each installation. In the Amertorp cateleria, for instance. size was on important factor. The room almost a block long and half $\rho$ block wide could have accommodated two machines, one at either end. Speakers for each unlt could have carried the music only to each end thitd portion of the cafcteria with the center third a "neutral zone."

First-line war plants, of course, will have the strictest rules, and this regulation will be true in varying degrees to the plant's importance to the defense effort But the initial hurdle has been overcome, In fael was overcome during the last war when vendins machine operators introduced suct equipment on the floors of defense factorics. And with plant officials having prior experi eace wih operatorm, the phono
graph serviceman presents no problem that has not been over. come by the vender.
Perhaps the most controlled, regulation rife area in the country, the atomic installations at Oak Ridge, Tenn, etill permits opcration of vending equapment in ite many plants, and this should be final proof to the music operafor that his equipment, too, can and is being oksyed for operation in the nation's delense industries.

## Servicing

Specific regulations affecting route men entry to the prevlously mentioned Amertorp Corporation thru 194s-45, when the juke box was in operation. follow. While they are perhaps among the more rigid of such regulations, compliance by the operator in most instances will not be difficull. As explained by the naval ordnance plant official, M. Hogen, the phonograph route men (as well as the vender servicemen) first had to be checked In by the operator and cleared by the plant. First requisite is that the man be United States citizen.
As in most other war plants, the noute man, after showing cillizenwhip papers, was photographed. This photo was then placed on a special visitor's badge which was kept at a designated gate where the man would enter and leave. Whlle fin the plant, he was required o wear the badge. Also. he would "sign in," hls handwriting furntshIng a further check on his identity Variations of this procedure are eurrently being used by the many defense planks over the country, and music operators will find such precautions no barrier to the inaintenance end servieing of their equipment.

## INCOME VS. COST CRISIS

## Dps Seeking Answers to Finumeinl Difemma-Will They Come About Thru 10e Ploy or Neso Commissions?

Perhaps at no other time in the history of the juke box indusiry has the operator been faced with a greater perlod of erisis, garnished with indectsion. than he is in this year of 1951. Not even during the early and mid $-40^{\circ}$ s, when the world was embrolled iz a global war, was the industry engaged in a financial battle for survival such as the one it now laces.
The facts are wrilten in bold letters for all to sce, and they are not plicity of the problems make simpuicity of the problems make the solution even more difficult. Prices of equipment, supplies and labor have reiched a new alllime high-just as have the bare
necessities of life, including bread, milk and even clothing. Despite efforts to freeze grices and wages by the government, there is cuery Indication within all industry that further lacreases will be forthcoming. To expect relief in the near future is like walling for the mountain to come to Mohammeda situation that has been closely allied with the industry for many years.

> Current Pie

Unlike the situation a decade ago, the operator today is not as concernce persionally wlth the draft and the stepped-up military expansion program as he is with the mulliplying problems of keeping his head above water in the business swim.
True, the draft will have an effect on his operation. Servicemen Wlll leave, either to enter the mill in defense work. But the heavy majority of operators are now past the draft age-and unless there is an all-out shooting war. they will probably not be called to the
colors again. (See other stories in this issue.)
Shortages of equipment loom but here ton the situation is not at yet vital, and, in some respects. operators actually find their routes increasing considerably in value as used equipment prices climb, However, new machines, on the record prices have gone up, and libor must be reckoned with as - major operating cost factor-no only for the prescnt, but in the foresceable future.

problem confronting the operators is how to Increase the weekly grosses of those machlnes on lo cation, and at the same time dis-
cover ways and means of aperatthe their business more efficiently.

phonographs' play. Some have|most tests being conducted are worked-others have been failures, but none have proven suecessful on a national basis. Because of these experiences, operavinced that if the weekly income s to increase, it must come from another mears. Two such method now loom as the mosl logical:
J. A variation of dime play
liminating entirely the nicke chutes.
2. Revision of the commission tructures.
It is to be siressed that operatorthinking is not entircly along om or the other line. There are a substantial number who are con-
vinced both methods can be wedded-and some have even started revamping their operation along these lines.

Dime Play
In the past few years it has no oen unusual to hear hysteried play on phonographs. Until recently, wilh ane majar exception,
much of this talk was disregarded. The public is used to payins nickel for a tune in a juke boxand nothing can change that habl was the answer. And when one nanufacturer brought out a machine featuring dime play, the rebeen interested in the experiment lost their taste for the rich dessert.
Today. with the almost certain
cholce of either raising income or going out of business staring them in the face, the talk of dime play has been revived-and the talk in
some cases has already graduated Into physical aetion. But there are varlations of the dime play-and more importanily, there is a vast segment of the industry which stil is not convinced that raising the price of

# Another Labor Problem? 

## While a Shortage of Workers Looms, <br> Industry Believes Guls, Newcomers Will Once Agmin Take Up the Slack

The the real scramble for mechanically trained workers for priate industry is still a few months Way, many gmall business frms of the pinch of the growing skilled labor shortage. Among them are musie machine operating com servicemen to either the armed forces or large and small indusrial planis which are converting to detense production. It is freely admitted by operators who taced
this same problern 10 years ago that this shortage of tralned servicemen may prove to be their ble gest headache if production of new equiprsent were to come to a complete stop.
From past experience in opcrating music boxes during a namany of their younter men wul be called up by the services and they realize it is something they have no control over. But they are more concerned over holding mre not immediately subject to the draft because of previous war duty and still others who have or will be deferred because of physleal handicaps. What many operators are now trying to work out is how aitractive inducements from defense industries. It is a known act that a man with mechanica skill in limes of defense production has unusual value. He can be used in aetual defense output or dittle or no experleace in mechanics. In elther case he has standing above the averake because his services are needed. Another point to be remembered that tralned mechanics know they can advance rapidly in newly and are anxious to get there quickiy to establish some sort of seniority. Finally, there is the pay incentive in delersse plants
for frequently there is the opportuntty to work for overtime pay which in the case of skilled workers can amount to a large extra sum in a sew hours. How can the dimín jshing labor market?

Since the operator will have an avestment in newly trained peronnel, he will have to use cauion in taking on trainees and probably ngure out incentive nethods for holding them. This incentive set-up would also seem logical move for experienced servicemen not subject to the draft. The form of the incentive plan would be up to the operator work out However, in recent nonths small Arms not in the trade ave come up with such ideas as substantial company pald insurnce policy; commission arrangements if permitted by the federal governmest or a combination of both. These appear to be practical in the music operating field. Women Sualfere
Another possibility is the use of romen for enther service calls or shop work. Women proved to be extremely efficient in most instances ln war plants in the early $1940^{\prime} \mathrm{s}$, so much so that when the

Naturally, many women wil again be employed in defens production during the present emergency. But there are many potential women workers who will igt want to work in plants far rom their homes of put in the lone hours that a sull lime plent job would necessitate. Many of these have children whom they will not want to leave for 10 o more hours at a time. For if they are small children it would be nec essary for them to have elther another mentber of the family to take care of the children or pas baby sifter on full-time basis during the worting weik. The atter solution could conceivabl ake much of the proft out of the O.

On the other hand, many of the potential women workers might be interested in a job working with an operating firm in their own neighborhood either on a full or part-tme basis. To co-operate with the women who are available for part-time work. operators might make arrangements to group Their service and collection calls into sour or five compact hours each day. As in the case of mal workers, there are many women workers who would prefer to be affilated with a small busines arm rather than just be a number who purches the time clock in one of the large defense planti. At any rate it scems. Litely point to consider women as possible service stallers as the manpower short age fncreases.

## Sareial Problem

Some operators contemplatin hiring women to train for service work have been skeptical of their ability to handle this type work They point out that the problem of musie operating vary almos with every location and they won der If a woman can cope with the cbanging problems. Actually, ther are more womes, moxly operators wives, engaged in the route record changing than in the service end But the fact remains there are some and they have worked ou well.
One such person is Pauline Smith, of the Smith operating firm Rock Lsland, III. Mrs. Smlth has actually been operatina in part nershlp with her husband for the past five years. In 1945 when her husband accepted a regular post with a local broadcasting statio at njeht, Mrs. Smith began han the firm continued to prosper under her efflicient service. She now able to handle any type of service call as well as any type of installation for jukes or game and has done so for as long as sevhusband was sick

At any rate already it is bestmning to look as tho womer will play an important role in the solving of the service problems of operators as he avallable market or servicemen shrinks in the emergency period

# Programing For Profits 

# Intelligent Recoral Purchasing, Placement Mean More Operntor \$ 

By HAL WEBMAN

More than at any previous time in the history of juke box husiness. the operator today is antorded his sreatest opportunity lo economically purchase records, and to generate a greater flow of coln into his machines thru intelligent programing. Whereas for time the Juke box operator had been corsidered of secondary importance in the record and music industry's scheme of things, new appreciation for the values, both promotional and economic. of the juke box and its operator has risen to the fore in the past several years.

The average music-record industry representative, for ycars operating on the bellef that disk jockeys were the sole influence in song and disk selling, has found that the radio salesmen's pitch still is a prime factor, their disk whirls are most effectively driven home with the strong additlonal influence of juke box spins. This realization has led to the greatest bateh of disk-musie industry promotion and romance that has been leveled at the juke ops in many years.

> Experimensle

All of the major diskeries, in the past year, have come up with experimental and permanent promotions designed to entice the operator. Musie publishers, perhaps the most practical of the industry's populace, have taken to personal and mail hypo tactics with the operator. Losal distributors, of course. have been on the tall of the operators in the most concentrated fashion thru all the years. Artists. especially thase who tour, have assumed more graceful rela. tions with operators.

The consequence of these several romantic barrages is that the operalor now is in the enviable position of having a virtual overabundanee of personally aequired information from which to sift those songs, artists and recordings which will mean a bicger buck in his particular territory.
Of course. the operator could just as casily be led astray by the multi-faceted romances being thrown at him. Actually, it boils down to a situation where the operator must sort the gems from the coal dust To meet this problem with complete understanding. the eperator should make use of every possible resource at his command. The most important single factor in molding this understanding is an alert, prudent and thoro knowledge of the likes and distikes of the various territories which comprise the route of an operator's machines.
This is not malter of generallties efther. He must keep on top of "trends" in tastes in his areas. For example, the infitration of country type artists and tunes In

Artists Inslances, the operator is aware of which are the hit songs. He also it a ware of which individual interpretation of this song is the national leader on the hit. In hls haste to get the song on his machines, the operator often overlooks the fact that a second version of the hit song by another artist may find greater favor on his route. This because this secondary artist is enjoying a boom in the operator's territory or the
in the area because of alert distributor activity in the environs. At any rate, buying the proper interprelation of the hit for the territory will insure the biggest return for the lavestment.
One of the common practices of the record musle businesses these days is the proposition whereby some diskers and/or distributors are successfully enticing operators into buying disks on "dcal $5_{0}$ " These "deats" usually involve giving the operator one free disk for every five they buy or allow special discounts for minimum purchases. It Is granted that these deals may on the surfoce have a dollar-saving

## apparance. But the operator

 should exercise discrimination and
aution in accepting them. There's not much sense in getting a free copy for every five of a platter which will draw barcly a shekel once they get into the boxes. In other words, the prime considcration for the operator is what's in the eroove. not how much does it cost and what can 1 get for free. The operator also has to consider the value of a disking as a wo-sided proposition. The secand side of a disk takes an equal stot on the selectivity list and showld atso be considered for lts worth in ftracting plays. Diskerz are wary of this situation, not only fram a juke point of view, but is consumer consideration at well. There still are those who believe in the "they'll buy the hits" philosophy and the operator must sting along with the hits, but wherc it is possible, a strong second side should oftimes be considered in the purchase of a rendition of a hit song.

The prosraming problem of the operator, at this polnt in a falirly fiexdble and comparatively simple state, appears to be heading for even brighter prospects. As the government's military and defense program begins to take shape, its effects on the disk business are likely to aid no end in more concentrated and more efficiently selective policy of recording at the diskery level. If a parallel can be drawn with the situation during World War $\mathrm{I}_{1}$ fewer records will be Yorthcoming and great etfort whll be exerited to milk the hits from the manufacturer's level on down. Consequences of such a program would be that only the top demand artists and top demand songs would be marketed.

He has had to expand his buying to fill the greater demands of the 40.48 and 100-play boxes. And, the moment, he is becorning involved in the record apeed problem. The tntroduction of 45-rpim. jukes creates the two-speed inventory problem for the operator and based on the to cope with it.

The operthor's personal rouch also is being reflected in more conseientious study of the demands of individual locations. In the abnomal perfods during and after the war the operator left selectivity usually in the hands of office help and servicemen and counted the profits. But now thal proxtaming has become in allimportant factor in attracting plays, the operator's personal observation of his locations and the programing requirements of them is a prime factor in the renewed upsurge of the music machline business.

There is a direet relatlonship between the buylng procedures used and the fact that so many operators do not get free sample records. Obvlously, it requires a visit to the distributor to bear the new disks.

Again. programing-conscious operators wre not willing to take chances on potential hits. It requires ereat deal of time and effort and serious listening for the operators to make the best possible selections for his locations. Last year's problem, however, still remains: Wil mapufacturera take definite steps toward keeping the operators better appraised of new record material? Strides were made in that direction last year when Decea named a sales manager for music aserators. There has been sertous thought and some action. too, on the part of other major labele about the adyisabluty of making a similar move. In the meantime the figures speak for thernselves in a most elaquent manner.

For about month now most been selling two tunes for a dime five for a quarter, by blocking ofs the nictel coin opening. Some 80 per cent have made this change on approximately 5,000 pbonographe and within two weeks we expect nearly 8.000 phonographs whll be
selling two sclections at time.
We did not want to make thit change in our boxes. But we had lo moke it in order to show a prorit. go to a dime per play. To maintain lop-notch service and entercinment, as well as show a profit, we know we must find ways of increasing revenue. We think two for a dime-perhaps eventually vial answer.
During the first two weeks we experimented with two tunes for a dime, our routes dropped an average of 5 per cent in dollar volume. By the third week, however, our routes were back to their
previous averakes and we have every reason to belleve our experi-ment-scheduled to lagt 90 dayswill be success.

It is to be noted here that many of the operators who started adding to their routes in the latter '40s have solidifled their tinancial posittons by paylog off those units, but because of the unsettled limes ahead, the increased cost of doine business and the Increased eost of equipment, growth of routes in the foreseeable future will be much slower.

It also is true that operators are now handling more new record lines than they did in the past, adding considerably to their volume by augmenting their used platter sales with new disk lines.

\section*{Dime Play Obstacles}

To Instigate dlme play on an operator's route involves many obstacles. The most importan thing to my mind is to edueate to accept this new innovation. We have tried dime play here in WashIngton. We know it will be ac-
cepted. We also know that the location owner loves it. Charlie Hannum, of Philadelphia. first started dime play in their astocia-
tion in Chester. Pa and after four or Itve months of actual operation. I know they are now 100 per cent on dime play.
The only suecess of any pioneer experiment is the result. This is the final result of dime play as wre
operate it. When we introduced dime play, the gross increased to about 55 per cent and our ne showed an iacrease of 25 per cent. The reason for the difference of our figures-we were receiving guarantee of our net. In other
words, we had a guarantee mintmura. After three months oper ation our net incressed. over 11 38 per cent and everyone here is happy-the operator, the location and the customer.
I eannot explain here how you must make the first approach to
dime play and follow thru. But one thing is certain: You cannol start dime play without talking to some experienced operator that has been successful with dime play There must be an education period as you can do more damage and
the thing will fizale without sueh a period.
