



Writer-producer Perry Wolff won the Peabody Award for 1950 with his Quier Answer, and is likely to put up a stiff fight for the 1951 prize with this docu-mentary on narcotics. It was primarily a collection of tape recordings of dope addicts' stories, tied together with narration by supnouncer Fahey Flyn, and some supplementary dialog by Actor Tony Parrish. The show moved extremely well.

There were eight or 10 tape recorded interviews with addicts. Most were brief, and were given with an authenticity that packed a ter-rific wallop. Wolff took his re-cording equipment into the State prison at Jollet, the woman's re-formatory at Dwight, the city jail, and the U. S hospital at Lexing-ton, Ky. NEW YORK, July 21. — Em-phasizing that radio will continue to be the No. 1 advertising mass medium, Columbia Broadcasting System's president, Frank Stanton, this week detailed his hopes to network affiliates of continuing the web's radio supremecy in the future under its new administra-tion.

Stanton punched home CBS's faith in AM by eiting some sallent facts about the job it is doing for advertisers. CBS reached 591 people per dollar, while magazines reach 387 and newspares 249; the average CBS client gets 964,000 more listeners at night and 545,-000 more listeners in the daytime than its second-place competition; there is 20 per cent more listening to CBS affiliates than to other net-work outlets; CBS billings are 9 per cent ahead of 1950 for the first five months of the year, and radio's net audience loss to television this year is not expected to exceed 8.5 per cent and may well be less.

### **Tips for Soldering Respectable Joint** By HOWARD P. SCHLEY

By HOWARD P. SCHLEY Most experienced coin machine rechanles soon learn to solder a respectable joint. Even if they learn from a book. These tips then arc meant to help the begin-ner, altho some of them may be helpful to the more seasoned mechanily. The first thing to remember in soldering is that the two pleces of metal to be joined must both be as hot as, the molten solder. Luckly, most jobs in the coin ma-chine route involve small pleces of metal that are easy to heat. So asmall iron will usually do the job. For heavy shop work, of course, a heavier iron or even a gat torch may be a handy tool. Coin mechine mechanles rightly favor the electric iron— and many of them prefer the "gulck-heat" type as was explained in last week's Work Bench.

week's Work Bench. Replace Tips Regularly Whatever the type used, replace the solderng tip regularly. Those tips are made of copper and the high temperatures they reach high temperatures they reach ne copper tip must be tinned when it gets dirty. Clean the tip until it is bright, then heat and eval with fresh solder. If it is before it is tinned. Wire type solder, with a flux

before it is tinned. Wire type solder, with a flux core, is easiest to use. For elec-trical work it should contain rosin rather than an acid flux. Acid flux attacks the metals and in time causes corrosion and a bad con-nection.

### Secure Terminals

Secure Terminuls On the coin machine route, the most common soldering job is re-placing a wire which has broken loose from its terminal. Since usually both the wire and the terminal have a solder coating, this is a simple job. But it can be made more permanent if time is laken to anchor the wire firmly to the terminal before re-soldering, attempt to splice the wires before

soldering, them-strip away an inch of insulation from each wire, wrap them together firmly, then heat and apply the solder. Shake off excess.
