The fact, as indicated in the story on this page, that none of them in any truly erective way has found a real answer to creating radio pro est show which may indicate severral weaknesses in radio's batile to est shows, may indicate several weaknesses in radio's
uphold its place as a number one advertising medium

For example, it may indicate that the networks have failed to give their AM program heads enough money to develop top enough man power, enough frecdom of action. Could be any of these things.
It could also be that, in the wake of a standstill on wot time and program salex, the emphasis has been put on mer chandising and sales gimmicks to such an overuhelming degre
Whatever the reasons, whatever the obvious difficullies inherent in the problem, it is plain that radio needs some truly great, some truly spectacular, audience-catching and audience
holding new shows. Dick Shafto of South Carolina, one of the ablest broadcasters in the business, recently told a group (and many others have eched his words) that the affilated station show and time money if the webs would perform their number one function, lie., preduce great stows, which local broadcast crs are unable to produce themscives. This year there were somewhst fewer very large operating companies participating in the Poll, with the result that the suerage number of boxes per operator declined from
85.5 in 1951 's Pold to 68.2 this year.

## COMMENT

Operatore participating in this year's Poll indicated they bonght more new boxts during the past year than the opera ported they purchased an average of 10.5 new boxes.

Figuring the average number of new box purchases against the average number of phonographs reported by each opera the percentage in 1950 . In 1950, the average operator replaced approxdmately 12 per cent of his route with new machines; lasi year, the average operator replaced approximately 23 per cent.

Part of the stimulation to buying unquestionably stemmed frem the fear of new machine shortages. By mid-1951, most operators were warned that production of new boxes might be curtailed The curtailment finally hit the industry in the last three months of the year, culting back over-all industry pro-
duction about 30 per cent.

Typical example of strong juke box numbers which were somewhat less inmportint to retallers are "Forever and Ever" and "Powider Your Face With Sunshine" in 1949 or "II Baked a Cake," "ol Can Dremm Can't 1?" and "Dear Hearts and Gentle People" in 1950 . The reasons for this disparity are often abvious-as is the disparity itselt? Juke boxes can very often keep record alive long after the big retail sales activity has subsided Secondiy, some disk artists are better juke box draws than retail sellers. Thirdly, there are always those records which are destined to became nickle-nabbers because of their baste appeal to groug udiences rather than to tolitary ain that In any case, it is cer ways do best with those records which are on the best-selling re. tail eharts It is, of course, equally certain that for the most part. viler buycr will most otten wan tailer buycr will most often want Specialized Moed
Dunng thas past year record manutacturers, distributors, art hist and even music publishers have taken ever-greater cogniz ance of the operators' need for special records. Apparently, the indualry is now convinced thet records can be made which have specifie uppeal to juke bux $2 u$ diences and which can be fi nancially succesful records for the manufacturer to produce. Again. the examples which can be pointed out are usually ob vious. There are thuse records elassitied as honky tonkers, the time instrumentals-all are almed at the coin machine industry. In nother instance, the artisis and repertolre brass have oflen seen It to "cover" hit on another label by turning out a short coin-catching rendition in hopes of getting the juke box business in lieu of some of the retail sales al ready gobble

## dime play debate results in a "split-price" business

THE JUKE box industry today is a spllt.price business and continuos are that the foresec. nble future.
There
There are numerous areas Where dime play has become firmly eatablished and other areas where it seems complctely unteasible or has been tried and failed. In still other sections the pricing plcture seems hopelessly
mixed -one side of the street ad-mixed-one side of the street ad
hering to the basic nickel-play and the other to the dime-m-tunc Numerous variations, depending on the locality and the stop, run the gamut from one play tor a nickel, six for a quarter, to five plays for a quarter, and onc for a dime. three for a quarter.
The eurrent situation centered around "should we or should we not" have dime play is at leas two ycars old and its roots are in the lazily spiraling inflation which followed World War II and whieh since has leaped under the inupetus of the Korean conflict.
However, dime play was es tablished on a limited basis within some sections more than 10 years mo. Norfolk is a striking example of this. A long standing port eity and an expanding naval cen-
ter in recent ycars, Norfolk has to spend freely. Consequently it is possible to find on a single is passibie to find on a single
street in Norfolk, one type of location with dime play juke location with dime play juke boxes and another catering to a
different patronage, with nickel differ
The annual poll of juke box operators by The Billboard showed this year that out of a cross-section of 357 operators. 54, or 15 per cent, said some of their boxes were on dime play. Two hundred and eighty $o$ one, or 79 per cent, soid none of their boxes were on dime play, and 22 , or $G$ per cent, gave no answer.
Thirty-two, or 9 per cent,
the same operators said they planned to convert to dime play this year. Of the remainder, 223, or 62 per cent, said they did not plan to change, and 102 , or 29 These statistics indicat
These statistics indicate that before the year has ended, a possible total of 24 per cent of the music machine operalors will have part or perhaps all of their Juke boxes on dime play. From this It would seem that the question
of dime play has moved from the questionable stage to a fact for
good portion of the industry. What are the reasons for the gitation toward dime play? Bas ically most operators point to the enormously inereased cost of new machines. The price of new equipment has practically doubled since the end of World War II Piled on top of this Increase, is the mushrooming influx of the 45 r.p.m. machine. Now operators are laced with the almost certainty of not merely replacing worn out equipment, but chang ing all their machines to the new speed.
Operator after operator, from all parts of the country, who attended the recent Coin Machine Institute convention, in Chiengo, emphasized that in view of risemphasized that in vie w of ris-
ing costs, dime play is a neccssity. However, it must be pointed out that altho far in the minority, out that altho iar in the minority, the CMI show who disclaimed any interest in dime play and felt it posslbly could kill the industry. Reports from various sections of the country, Central Texas for example, would indicate that probably at this time there are as many operators against dime play as are for it.
Cests of new machines are not
the only factors stirring th clamor for dime play. Increased of gasoline and transportation, and of all the other overhead items add up to a need for greater income in the minds of some.

At least for the present, any in rease in the price per play mus depend on the government.
In a recent ruling, the office of Price Stabilization apparently softened or liberalized the effect of the first controls it wrapped around juke box operators last year. Altho not in any way throw. ing open the door to wholesale price increases, the ruling did specify it was the Intent of OPS to provide "relief to the fullest practicable extent."
Because of the language used in the ruling a spokesman in the Chicago Distriet OPS office commented that it probably would be much easier now for operators to get increases. Any operator deiring to increase his price per pley must flle with his regional OPS office and each such case will be considered on its merits. In practice, however, it usually follows that once such an increase has been won by one or a few has
operators, a pattern is set that beWhat has-wide
What has been the result of dime play in areas where it is now in effect? Chicago has had dime play for more than a year and key operators report it has been an unqualified success and probably their salvation. These operators said that because of a fall-off in tavern trade and generally uneasy business conditions they probably would have lost moncy this year it dime play had not been effected
Altho the increased price cost Chicago operators a definite loss of customers, most feel that this has been offsel by larger collec. tions dollar-wise, less overhead, less service calls, and less wear and tear on machines, needles and records.
The success of dime play in Chicago, however, was the result of much ground work to con vince the public, tocation owners and the operators. Such devices as news releases explained to the public the reasons. Conversion equipment was bought and made avallable to all operators so they avalable to all operators so they
could put the new price into efiect ould put the new price into effect as soon as passible and a large cale public relations program was aunched to show the value of the w price to location owners.
However, despite the successe: in Chicago, there still are many reas where the public and loca. tion owners relusc to increase prices. And in many of these reas, operators still are making profit on the nickel play. Thus seems that until OPS ally recognizes dime play and until the public accepts such thinking. the juke box business to continuc on a split-price masis.

## juge box rain makers busy making a fro-speed trude

SOME 18 months ago a small cloud which had all the indications of growing into large thunderhead loomed over a juke box industry geared to 78 r.p.m phonographs. The cloud was the new 45 r.pun. record speed juke box. Almost immediately the juke box industry began churning in the problems of evolution
Now, a year and a half later, the juke box industry definitely is a lwo-speed business. The process of evolution-or conversionhas advanced to the point where most operators are substantlally involved in two parallel or duplieate modes of operation. Those operators who have not started ehanging to 45 's soon will.
What has this two-speed type of operation meant to the individual operator?
Bastcally four maln points stand out, according to two Chicago operators, Vincent Angeleri, of the Swingtime Music Company, and Frank Padula, of the Melody Musić Shop.

1. Most operators will be completely changed over to 45 r.p.m. juke boxes within five years and
all operators probably will be changed over within 10 years.
2. The No. 1 problem under the two-speed operation is record buying.
3. The No. 2 problem is record filing
4. The increased problems of handling and processing records of two different sizes and speeds has been reflected in added casts of operation.
Both Angeleri and Padula reported they now are definitely
running a two-speed business. Seven to $\begin{gathered}\text { a per cent of Angeleri's } \\ \text { a }\end{gathered}$ machines and one third of P2, dula's are 45 's. Both are typical in many ways of operators across the nation.
Taking the points listed above in order, here's what Angeleri and Padula think:
Point 1-Both men feel they now are well under way toward a complete change-over to 45 speed equipment and that most opera. tors are in the same position. Both expect that for them and other operators this change-dever will be finished within tive years.
Reports from other major metropolitan centers and regional
areas tend to support this conclusion. Surveys taken by The Billboard indicate that the pace of the change-over to 45 equip ment has speeded up considerably the last few months.
Limiting this conversion, both men said, is the fact that they and many operators purehased arge quantlties of postwar 78 speed maehines. It will take a number of years, they sald, for these machines to depreciate to the point where they can profitably be replaced with new equip ment.
Regarding the industry as a whole, both explained that some operators in non-metropolitan areas do not feel the necessity to change as rapidly with the times and that many of these operators purchase used equipment which at the present time is mainly 78 speed equlpment. However, as more 45 machines are thrown on
the used market and as these opcrators slowly add new equipment, both men feel that practically the entlre industry will be 45 ceared in another 10 years. Point 2-Both men sald without
reservation that record buying was the one "big headache." As Angeleri's firm buys 300 to 400 new records weekly and Padula's company 800 to a 1,000 , it is easy to understand their problem. Basically their troubles in this area boiled down to the following: The same song often is not obtainable in both speeds; what kind and how many of each speed to order; the added bookkeeping burden and greater problems of handling and processing the records.
The buying in Angeleri's firm is done by his routemen. Charts are kept of how much and what kind of records cach man buys. This bookkeeping problem has now increased with the addition of 45 records. Angelerl also pointed out that some record companics use different numbering systems for their different peed records and others use the same system for both speeds. This is an added bookkeeping problem. The record buying at Padula's company is handled by one man, Sammy Faruggia, who collaborates with the routemen as to suggestions. Now with two speeds Faruggia has to decide how many of each kind of record to buy and then see if the records are available. When the records are delivered, the problems of distributing and sorting so that each routeman gets what he wants, have jumped Iremendously.
Point 3-As Angeleri's firm stocks some 8,000 records and Padula's some 20,000 , the addition of 45 speed records has added new filing problems. These, of
course, are a projcction of the problerns tound under Point 2 Both firms not only have to decide how many records of a given song to stock but how many at each speed.

So far, both men reported they have iren able to incorporate the 45 records into their present system with a minimum of trouble and changes. The problem of filing the different speed records will become more acute, however, as the two firms continue their change-over.
Point 4-Both men said that the

Answer "Mystery" Charge
Juke box representatives did not appear before the subcommittee in October, but they got in the opening word February 4 when the hearings were resumed. and set about to set the issue stratght. An attorney representing the four major phonograph manufacturers stated the juke box Industry "is much less mysterious than the ASCAP orgenization which is the sponsor of this bill." This charge of "mystery" was the reason underlying the hearing's adjoumment from October to February, During that time, the juke box industry worked to marshall lacts to show in detail how the phonograph business operates and who the people are who make, sell and own juke boxes
To secure this information, the juke box comparies retained Price, Waterhouse \& Company. a national public accounting firm. Price, Waterhouse received replies to a mail questionnalre from 1,598 juke box operators. These operators had 98,375 (of an esti. mated total of 400.000 ) juke boxes which produced $\$ 31,639,742$ for the owner-operators Each ma chine averaged about so44, from which the operator received Which the operator received indicated the nation's averape mu indicated the nation's average mu
sic operator has approxdmately 50 sic operator has approxdmately 50

Did Congrest Know?
ASCAP's Herman Finkelstern brought forth an argument proponents of juke box licensing have used since the battle began many
have foreseen in 1009, Finkelstein said. the rise of the juke box industry. Juke box representatives answered this charge by pointling out that juke boxes date back to pre-1890, were popular in 1909. Certainly, the juke bor spokesmen declared, Congress knew full well the rursent and potential numbers of juke boxes.
ASCAP charced that juke boz operators get a "free ride," do not pay composers what they are entitled to. The opponents of the measure countered by saying that uke boxes pay the composers (hru the 4 -cent statutory royalty greement between composers, publishers and disk manufacturers) more than the composert recive from ASCAP. Each year, hey argued, juke boxes use 50,000,000 recorde-thus pay $\$ 2,000$, 000 in royalties, (wice the sum paid by motion pieture interests - ASCAP and nearly as mueh as the entire TV industry expects - pay the Society,

For a week, the House subcommittee listened to both sides of the argument, assured both proponents and opponents that it would make a "careful study" of he matter before taking action. Four Aliernatives

Report the Bryson Bill out fa. vorably in its present form; report it without a recommendaon (tantamount to an unfavorble report); work out a revised version of the bill, or simply let the bill die in committee without vote.

With the culbacks that his the industry late in 1951, juke box manufacturers turned out approximately 45,000 Einished units3,000 under the previous year. What kind of total production the industry will be able to muster during 1932 is a question which no one can answer. NPA itself has declared the manufacturers have done a remarkable job conserving critical materials by using alter nate, non-controlled materials. But the juke box companies themelvis are unable to determine rom quarter to quarter whit kind of output they will have. NPA to buy; they somply a licket to buy; they don't ruarantee dehvery. As a result the major companies have expediters on the road constantly scartog up the materials they are allowed and the alternate materials they have designed into their new production. On numerous occasions, spokesmen for NPA have pointed out that they want to make certain Juke box manufacturers slay in business. keep their factory force logether and are reaty force logether, and are ready in the event their facilines and inients are needed for defense or wat work
The Juke Box Advisory Conmittee told NPA that 2.500 people wre directly employed in the man-

Actually, the juke box manuacturers have been plagued with shortages for longer than the govermment has had metais under allocations. For most of the major companies, shortages of some component parts date back to carly in 1951. Speakers were especially troublesome in that period since coublestame in that perjod, since speaker production-was beine drained off by jet plane produc drained off by jet plane produc lion and other vital defense uses Loter, a shortage of tubes devel oped, so that the manufacturers have found themselves in the po sition of scrabbling for one part or another for at least 12 months As a resull of these spotity shortages. manufacturers sel up materrals conservation programs of their own. Many of them becan working with alternales-al tho a satisfactory alternate to copper as a conductor of current has still to be found. When the tov sill to be found, When the gov ernment clamped down on stain less stecl, most switched to earbon steel. In place of bronze and alu minum. juke box designers began working in stect and plasties.
Long-range, juke box manufacurers have been told the short age in copper and aluminum will contjnue thruout 1952. Steel-important to the production of phonographs but not nearly so vital as copper-is expected to be selaLively plentiful this summer. Until NPA releases its quota 1 g gures for each succeeding three-month period, the manufacturers are unable to determine how many unils they can produce. But as of now It appears fairly certain they won' hit ai production figure approach ing normal for at least the nex nine months.
