Under the Unincorpo-roted Business Tax Law, any per-son doing business in the State has to pay an annual 3 per cent tax on his net income. This is separate from the State income tax

The law has been nn the books for some years, but in recent weeks the State, in searching for-new income, came to the conclu-ion that many actors, working as independent contractors, have neither filed such a tax nor regis-tered under the Unincorporated Business Law. WASHINGTON, June 28.—May sales at seasonally adjusted eat and drink establishments totaled 5098 million, or 532 million more than sales for May of last year, according to revent Commerce Department figures. The May to-tal was also \$19 million over total sales reported by seasonally ad-justed eat and drink places for April of this year.

April of this year. April sales at unadjusted sal-eries and drinkeries reached \$952 Inillion, as compared with May sales of \$990 million at the un-adjusted establishments. The May total at unadjusted eat and drink spots was \$22 million over that of the same month last year.



WASHINGTON, June 28.-Ed-weational TV will get a nation-wide plug from President Truman in a forthcoming public talk, it was indicated this week as the result of an unprecedented White House conference by the presi-dent with members of the Federal Communications Commission.FCC Chairman Paul Walker said the President congratulated the com-mission on setting aside 242 TV channels for non-commercial edu-cational stations, describing it as a for-reaching step. Chairman Walker informed the President that the channels cannot be re-served indefinitely and that it is up the educators to apply for them.

The white educators to apply for them. The White Hause visit, credited largely to Commissioner Frieda S. Hennock (see Washington Once-Over), produced a start of activity at the joint committee on educational television, which quickly sent renewed pleas to educational institutions to file applications. Meanwhile, the FCC this week announced a revision in TV application forms so that groups seeking non-commercial channels will supply full informa-tion concerning their non-profit status, sources of funds and so forth.

The Commission was prodded into Its latest study by a petition Monday (23) from the Mölion Picture Association of America, Inc., and the National Exhibitors Theater Television Committee, reminding the FCC that the hearing altready has been postponed six times in aine months and that the delay has placed "a heavy burden on par-ticipants. 

private industry, would obviously be prohibitive cost-wise. Produced basically for televi-slon, these xeligio.s films utilize series of puppets which are out-standing in their characteriza-tions. While no attempt is made to use different voices for the various character, the narrator. Alex Scourby, a radio film and stage actor, tells the complete story as the puppets spell out the action. Authentic costumes of the times are used, and the pilot film shown at this special screen-ing for station execs, was in color, thus heightening the effect. Only obvious weakness in the final stages of the fight of the Jews from Egypt, was in "he writing, with the marrator plung-ing immediately into the story without covering any of the events leading up to the action, and the closing, which was too abrupt.

abrupt. Minute detail to the puppets, however, and their well-planned action, more than made up for writing miscues. There has been considerable money, planning and care in con-nection with the filming of this series to date. In addition to the three quarter-hour pic rams cov-ering the story of Moses, there are two episode: devoted to Joseph, and four to the Parables. There is no doubt they will all find wide usag: via 'elevision outlets nationally. 

The English fans are very polite and attentive, and their en-thusiastic applause at the conclu-sion of each number just bowls the artist.over. In fact, it has got-ten so that Val Parnell has to warn American artists working the Palladium not to go overboard drooling about their receptions, since the applause is so startling that the artists tend to find them-selves making long speeches of thaks. thanks.

It is to be hoped that more and more American artists will find time to play engagements in Eng-land and on the Continent, since they have a definite function as good will ambassadors. Their help in improving our relations with people abroad can be viewed as sort of a "Musical Marshall Plan" and can really increase the effec-tiveness of the funds we are send-ing overseas.
