This is the identical order of finish in the first poll. three months ago.Among distributors of films máde especially for television, the leader again was Ziv Televion Productions. Once more, United Television Programs was second. and Snader Telescription Sales repeated in third place, tied this time by CBS Television Film Sales.
Station film executives decided that two firms were equal in the quality of thetr theatrical film packages. from the standpoint of salability to sponsors. audience response, etc. The Television and Peerless Produc. tions, Inc. Peerless led the pack in the voting a quarter ago. in the MPTV rose from a sixthplace finish in the last survey. The tendency for leading firms to hold their places carried over to producers of nonnetwork news series made esstation execs confirmed itheir choice of three months ago by making INS-Telenews a repeat winner. Second honors went to United Press-Movietone. with NBC News rated third. These latter two firms changed places
with each other from the order of finish in the previous study.

## Film Producers Discuss Main Prôblems on Financing Shows

The Elllboard surveyed TV film producers on their opinions of studies on the field's problems. Here are producer opinions in this important arein
Banks are of little help in the financing of TV film series. Produeers embarking on a series for gyndication are finding it next to impossible to get a bank loan since the banks regard this type of operation as too speculative. method of financing video film is the private loan. In this ar. rangement the investor gets part ownership riphts to the product and shares proportionately in the return.
Some producerg have been
fortunate enough to get ad. iortunate enough to get adested in getting themselves a film show, and a very few have even made outright kales in ad. vance to national advertisers. But in deneral the financing ased in TV film production goes
pretty much mlone the lines so preng used in the legitimate theater.
Producers polled by The Bill.
board were divided on which board were divided on which
direction they should pull to
solve their profit and loss prob-
lem. Half thought the answer lay in cutting their own produc. tion costs in every way possible. And half thought the answer lay in retting blager budgets from the advertiser.
One major producer said that the TV film maker has to keep his costs in eheck because once they start growing the cost to the advertiser might become
prohibitive. "Concentrate on prohibitive. "Concentrate on story and performance, he went They don't mean a thing on TV anyway."
Another
Annther producer whose ad. vice wias to cut costs said: "Long-range planning leading to practical direction leading out of the present chans." The strongest argument for hiking the budget went as
follows: Production costs are so stabilfzed due to unjons. set processing charges, etc., that alnost anybody can figure the posslble to go and stlil get into production. Therefore, increased budgets are the only answer." Another producer pointed out
that in view of union demands
production costs can only go up romplained on. Several producers complained that the ad agencies erate with the producer, often forced the ultimate cost up There was widespread plem from the producers for the agen cies to plan in advance and avoid last-minute changes. Several producers remarked that resulting in inferior products. A third way out hinted at wion that the producer might retajl the residual rights in the series

## Standardized ID's Campaign Pays Off

Dire need for standardization of station identification speciflcations was graphically lllustrated in The Billboard's First TV Film Quarterly in June, via detailed chart which listed a for practically every one of the 109 stations. In the same issue, McCann-Erickson exec Don McClure expressed the hope that this chaotic condition would eventually be solved thru the combined efforts of a standardthe National Association of Radio and TV Station Representatives and a number of leading advertising agencies

Since then this group has conducted a vigorous campaign to get all stations to zdopt a single
set of ID standasds (see box). Results have been gratufying beyond all expectations. To date the NARTSR has recelved written or verbal acceptances from more than hall of the stations, including the National Broad. casting Company's owned and tions, and the Columbia Broadcasting System's odo's.
On the basis of these returns, NARTSR managing director T. F. Flanagan is now confident that universal standardization of Flanagan is particularly pleased that he has received a number of inquiries from TV stathons not yet on the air. That the potential of a given television show is enhanced conslderubly by the presence of per formers of stature and repute can hardly be contested. The value of "names," properly used has always increased the mass appeal of any given product appeal of any given product This to in no way intended to deny that a so-called "unknown" actor or actress cannot and will not achicve popular acclaim and success. Howeve, it is hardly conceivable that week after week incxperienced players can maintan the level of performance that can be expected from players. The younger players must be carefully selected and presented. It plays performed by these unknowns are then interspersed with those of the
stars, the benefit of appearing in the same company as these known performers would tend to increase the acceptance by

## Trailer Firm Founded on Broken Romance

Marshfield Company Started When Elmer Frey Took a Bride and Sold a Dream

Journal Special Correaponalence

Marthfield, Wis. - When Theima Rustad agreed to marry Elmer Frey, dollal trailer coach manufacturing business would be one of the byproduets of their romance.
That's an unusual way to siart a, business. Frey admits with a chuckle. But that was how the Rollohome Traiter five million dollars next year, came into being.

That was in December. Things were prett slack on the farm. Elmer decided that it wouldn's be a bad idea to build a fcw trailet coaches for sale. His three
brothers and a brother-in-law agreed jo iry it, too-each to build one and keep the individual profits from sales.
