This 12 -inch disk cantians the entire repertoire of Chopin Conard Pennario. The pianist's techn in ex is brilliant and sensitive. well-suited to the lyric magic of the pieces. From an engincering point of view, the Capitol disk ia ercellent, regislering Pennario's subtle tonal nuances. This alburn of course. uns up agninst very strong competition. Victor has the walires recorded by Brailowsky on a 12 -inch LP, and Columbia

## Put It in Writing!

During the past four weeks. The Blllboard published a series of articles dealing with written contracts between music operators and their locations. A survey, made before the serics started. disclosed that fewer than one out of five phonograph companies- 17 per cent by aetual count-use written agrec. sid they belleved written agreements should be used. We, too, beljeve music operators ourhi put their location agreements in writing. We believe they should for these reasons:

Why Written Agreements?

1. Written agrecments help protect the operator's invest-
ment. Wratten arreements help avoid misunderstandings between the operator and the account.
