





UB40 Geffrey Morgan (A&M, 1416 N. LaBrea, Hollywood, CA 90028)—UB40 found U.S. success with an album of cover versions (Labour Of Love, over 350,000 sold, without much commercial airplay) and now faces the challenge of success on its own terms. Geffrey Morgan answers that challenge overwhelmingly: it's an LP full of political salvos, love songs, dub tracks and superb instrumentation which often goes beyond reggae into slick pop and pure studio magic. The single is "If It Happens Again (I'm Leaving)," a crisp pop track which is pretty self-explanatory. Also notable are "Riddle Me," with a wild synth opening; "Seasons," a gorgeous ballad; "You're Eyes Are Open," an upbeat rocker; and "D.U.B." And it all sounds great put together, too.

LOS LOBOS How Will The Wolf Survive? (Slash, c/o Warner Bros., 3300 Warner Blvd., Burbank, CA 91510)—Anyone who's seen Los Lobos in concert knows the heat these Mexican-Americans can generate. We now have our first full LP of their blistering rock, sure to melt needles, transmitters and radios everywhere. "Don't Worry Baby" stands to be the AOR breakthrough here—the tex-mex has been stripped off, leaving pure American rock 'n' roll. Fans should not despair, however, there is more than enough variety to the rest, bridging tex-mex, polkas, rock and a whole lot more. Our favorites: "Don't Worry Baby," "I Got To Let You Know," "I Got Loaded," "Matter Of Time," "Evangeline" and "Will The Wolf Survive?" which out Steve Winwoods (believe it or not) Steve Winwood. Just *try* and sit still through this one.

KATRINA & THE WAVES Katrina & The Waves (Attic, 624 King St. West, Toronto, Ontario, Canada MSV 1M7)—This is the second album from this Canadian based pop combo. Their debut Walking On Sunshine featured "Going Down To Liverpool," a Waves original covered by the Bangles on their hit LP All Over The Place—so take note! The band is led by the talented tandem of guitarist/songwriter Kimberly Rew (of Soft Boys fame) and singer Katrina Leskanich—who are versatile enough to be boppy and "poppy" (as on "She Loves To Groove"), soulfully bluesy (where Katrina's voice recalls Bonnie Raitt, as on "Cry For Me") or impressively hard hitting (as on "Maniac House"). The rhythm section (Alan Clarke on drums and Vince de La Cruz on bass—who contributes three songs to the LP) has a constant and accurate sense of timing and contributes to the overall success of the record. Which might also be attributed to the apparent common bond among the band members that enables them to go after each song with mutual understanding and commitment. Radio programmers will love this disc! Recommended: those mentioned above, "One Women," "The Game Of Love" and "He's A Charmer."

DEL-LORDS Frontier Days (EMI, 6920 Sunset Blvd., Hollywood, CA 90028)—Quintessential American rock 'n' roll; from the streets of New York through the clubs to you. The Del-Lords are like the early Stray Cats but without the pomp and circumstance: the feeling is tough yet joyous, slick but ragged around the edges. Give some credit to co-producer Lou Whitney, whose band The Morrells can be described in much the same way. Check out "I Play The Drums" (this year's rock anthem), "Feel Like Going Home," "How Can A Poor Man Stand Such Times And Live," "Get Tough," and "Shame On You."

FRED SCHNEIDER & THE SHAKE SOCIETY Fred Schneider & The Shake Society (Warner Bros., address above)—Fred, the male voice of the B-52's, strikes out on his own between works with the band. You'll find more of the pop art/popfun(k)/pop music that is traditionally associated with the B-52's. On this record Fred gets by with a little help from his friends: Patti LaBelle belts out some of her high pitched vocals on "It's Time To Kiss," the inimitable Kate Pierson (one of the bouffant sisters of the B-52's) adds spunk with her backing vocals, along with Bernie Worrell (keyboards) and Steve Scales (percussion) who add the funk element (these last two are part of the Talking Heads tour band) and John Cote who is primarily responsible (along with Fred) for the musical arrangements. The LP features "Monster" (great for Halloween), the likely candidate for a 12", "Summer In Hell," an hysterical ditty about continuing the eternal party in the fiery chambers of hell, and "Boonga (The New Jersey Caveman)"—need we say more? Others to shake and tumble with are "Wave" and "Cut The Concrete."

BRAVE COMBO World Dance Music (Four Dot, Box 233, Denton, TX 76201)—Looking for just the right band to celebrate the grand opening of that new shopping center in town? For Weddings, Bar-Mitzvahs, Proms or the dance for all the ambassadors to the U.N. try Brave Combo. They hail from Texas and play Dosey-Do Polka music with an Eastern European slant to it. Enjoy their versions of the Doors "People Are Strange," done as a psychedelic Hora, the theme from "Rosemary's Baby" (great to waltz to), or Tennesse Ernie Ford's "Sixteen Tons" done with a bopping rhumba beat. Other goodies are "Skokiaan" (ska), "Ice Machine In The Desert" (reggae rock), "Speak Up Mambo" (soca) and "Russian Doll" (traditional polka). World Dance Music by the Brave Combo is a good addition to any record collection. File under "C" for "Chutzpah."

DARYL HALL/JOHN OATES Big Bam Boom (RCA, 1133 Ave. Of The Americas, New York, NY 10036)—Hall & Oates stand above their pop contemporaries by keeping up they have moved through folk, blues, metal and synth-pop, embracing each into their sound and giving it a state-of-the-radio feel. Big Bam Boom takes them to the dance floor—Arthur Baker has been brought forth as "Mix Consultant & Addition Production," and his touch, tempered by Hall & Oates' pop sensibilities, is the magic one. Big Bam Boom is full of hits, but it's also more challenging than just about any pop record refreshing mix. Top cuts: "Method Of Modern Love," "All American Girl," "Some Things Better Left Unsaid," "Going Through The Motions."

SUZY SAXON & THE ANGLOS Gullt By Association (Brat, P.O. Box 157, Richmond, VA 23201)—Victims/beneficiaries of some of the cleverest promotions around, Suzy Saxon & The Anglos' debut three-song 7" spent three months on the singles chart, with 100+ stations eventually playing it. Their first LP includes those three songs, and five more which run the gamut from light pop to hard rock. Best of the new is "(I've Got A) Secret," an upbeat pop/rock song with a catchy chorus. "Bad Affair" and "Crybaby" rock a little harder, the former with a neat reggae-ish backdrop and the later with Suzy's best vocals so far. All in all, a well crafted LP with a good, distinctive style.



STEVE MILLER BAND

STEVE MILLER BAND Italian X Rays (Capitol, 1750 N. Vine, Hollywood, CA 90028)—A strange departure: Steve Miller shifts from guitar-based to synth-based rock. But this is not "Abracadabra"—it's more ethereal, with a smooth, steady base formed by a "sinclavier" computer. Innovative only in a pop context (there's no obvious choice for a single, just lots of candidates), Italian X Rays is still a rich, new experience, drawing from the past (Miller pioneered synth use in rock music back in the "Fly Like An Eagle" days) but most firmly set in the present. A pleasant surprise. Top cuts: "Shangri-La," "Who Do You Love," "Bongo Bongo."

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ALPHAVILLE Forever Young (Atlantic, 75 Rockefeller Plaza, New York, NY 10019)— The side of German synthesizer music we always expected existed but until now had never seen—yes, Virginia (and the rest of America) there is synth-pop in Germany. And it's pretty catchy, too. "Big In Japan" is big in the rest of the world, and sure to follow here. Also of note are "Forever Young" (a scared ballad questioning of world leaders), "Lies" and "Fallen Angel."

**DEVO SHOUT (Warner Bros., address above)**—You know what to expect—and you got it. A little denser sounding, this time, if anything. It's hard to go wrong when you go Devo. Top cuts: "Shout," "Are You Experienced?" (the latest in hip Devo covers), "The 4th Dimension" (replete with stolen "Day Tripper" riffs), "C'mon" and "Here To Go."

**PREFAB SPROUT Swoon (Epic, 51 W. 52nd St., New York, NY 10019)**—A sort of Irish version of Aztec Camera, Prefab Sprout plays a quirky, sorta folky acoustic pop music. Paddy McAloon's lyrics are stream-of-consciousness poetry that rhymes. They tell rambling stories of personal experience in a sincere and straightforward vocal and musical style. Nice. Top cuts: "Don't Sing," "Cue Fanfare," "Couldn't Bear To Be Special," "Green Isaac."

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. TOM ROBINSON "War Baby"/"Looking For A Bonfire" (LP cuts) (Geffen, c/o Warner Bros., 3300 Warner Blvd., Burbank, CA 91510)—Tom Robinson's Geffen debut, Hope And Glory, is highlighted by these two tracks. "War Baby" is an excellent single, with a Mark Ramsden sax solo that reminds one of old Billy Joel and Romeo Void's "A Girl In Trouble." "Looking For A Bonfire" is the LP's best rocker, with a steady beat, intricate guitar licks and Robinson's gruff vocals the highlights.

MINISTRY "All Day"/"Everyday (Is Halloween)" (12") (Wax Trax!, 2445 N. Lincoln Ave., Chicago, IL 60614)—After a split from Arista, Al Jourgenson uncovers the rough edges that were polished over on With Sympathy and emerges all the better for it. "All Day" has a gritty vocal, giving it a moody feel in counterpart to the synths' hypnotic groove. "Everyday (Is Halloween)" is almost a punk manifesto, putting down anyone who questions originality of style and dress. To our ears its the more exciting of the two, with an unorthodox backing track that maintains two (sometimes three) tempos and an angrier vocal. While we enjoyed Ministry's foray into the majors, this 12" and the original EP will stand out above the LP when all is said and done.

LOU REED "My Red Joystick" (12") (RCA, 1133 Ave. Of The Americas, New York, NY 10036)—Boy, is this fun! By moving the guitar to the middle and enhancing the rhythm tracks, Francois Kevorkian has turned a good rocker into a good-time dance/rock track which deserves club attention. The highlight of the original, the guitars add spice here, as they trade off with the horns. And check out the instrumental—it works quite well too.

CLANDESTINE featuring NED SUBLETTE "Radio Rhythm (S-I-G-N-A-L S-M-A-R-T)" (12") (Sleeping Bag, 1974 Broadway, New York, NY 10023/212-724-1440)—A natural for clubs, this dance track (mixed by Ned Sublette and David Van Tieghem) favors a steady, thumping, tribal beat with bits of techno flurries and percussion over Ned's vocal rap to display both the city and country boy elements in him. DJs will have fun mixing this with three other versions (best of which is the "Dub") and bonus beats which they choose to call "Extra Cheese." A zesty platter!

CARS "Hello Again" (12") (Elektra, 665 Fifth Avenue, New York, NY 10022)—This one's more a case of rescuing a seemingly lost cause than improving danceability. In its original form, "Hello Again" was Heartbeat City's disgrace—standard AOR-style shlock. Adding a few sound effects and stretching out the beat has made it into above-par dance floor material.

CAPTAIN BEEFHEART AND HIS MAGIC BAND The Legendary A&M Sessions (LP) (A&M, 1416 N. LaBrea, Hollywood, CA 90028)—Captain Beefheart holds the distinction of being the most brilliantly cryptic and wonderfully eccentric artist ever to record for (more than one) major record label. This session from 1966 features a very young Magic Band about to set out on a long, mysterious road that would eventually take C.B. far away from his Chicago and Delta styled blues/romp roots so apparent on these pristine recordings. More a novelty item and historical filler, the recordings will amuse Beefheart loyalists and could encourage a new sect of Beefheart lovers. If anyone in or near the Mojave desert is reading this, please tell Mr. Beefheart that our copy of Mirror Man is worn out—we could sure use re-inforcements.

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Big Country, Reducers, Billy Bragg, Laurie Anderson, Deep Purple, Danny Elfman, Frankie Goes To Hollywood, Culture Club, Milkshakes!, Madonna, Tom Petty, Van Morrison, Depeche Mode and Bronski Beat.

## JAZZ LINE

WYNTON MARSALIS Hot House Flowers (Columbia, 51 W. 52nd St., New York, NY 10019)—The title "Hot House," jazz buffs will know, is derived from a Tadd Dameron composition, itself derived from the Cole Porter tune "What Is This Thing Called Love?" Wynton Marsalis adds "Flowers" to make his meaning more precise. The "Flowers" part relates to the romance implicit in the standards he performs on this eagerly awaited album with a jazz quintet and an orchestra under the direction of Robert Freedman. The trumpeter's quintet—Branford Marsalis, tenor and soprano sax; Kenny Kirkland, piano; Ron Carter, bass; Jeffrey Watts, drums; and Kent Jordan, alto flute—takes primacy over the orchestral arrangements, largely strings, which lend coloration and depth without succumbing to sweeping, maudlin grandiosity. Marsalis' lyrical, serenading trumpet, so deft, so subtle, so elastic, elevates both the jazz and classical sensibilities and disproves their exclusivity. Charlie Parker and Clifford

Brown, among others, have incorporated classical arrangements into jazz recordings, but neither achieved the cohesiveness, opulent tonality and majestic swing that Marsalis manages here. The trumpeter's title track, the lone original, works splendidly alongside such evergreens as "Stardust," "Lazy Afternoon," "For All We Know," "When You Wish Upon A Star," "Django" and "Melancholia."

SONNY STITT The Last Sessions, Vol. 2 (Muse, 160 W. 71st St., New York, NY 10023)—Is it a coincidence that the concluding tune on The Last Sessions, Vol. 2 is "Bye Bye Blackbird?" Stitt, the late saxophonist to whom Charlie Parker supposedly passed "the keys to the kingdom," was for years stigmatized as a Parker sound-alike, but Stitt lived long enough to debunk the myth and beat the bum rap. On Vol. 2 Stitt covers the Parker-Jay McShann tune "The Jumpin' Blues" along with six other tunes that display his command of ballads and the blues.

ARCHIE SHEPP The Good Life (Varrick, One Camp St., Cambridge, MA 02140, distributed by Rounder)—Appropriately, the title track of tenorman Archie Shepp's first LP for an American label in a decade is dedicated to the late Sonny Stitt. Moreover, this tune marks Shepp's singing debut. More reverential than resonant, Shepp's voice is nonetheless serviceable and compelling. Like Stitt, Shepp was overshadowed somewhat by the brilliant light of a saxophone titan (Coltrane) and even more by a restive musical community in the midst of a creative ferment (the'60s New Thing). An outspoken political activist at the height of the civil-rights movement, Shepp threatened an establishment that saw things in black and white; Shepp spoke, with and without his horn, of things black, white and gray. Shepp, a music professor at the University of Massachusetts, remains a popular live performer, and on this recording he demonstrates the cohesion he has developed with his working trio—Kenny Werner, piano; Avery Sharp, bass; and Marvin (Smitty) Smith, drums. The six-tune program is highlighted by covers of "Moose The Mooche" by Charlie Parker and "Jordu" by Parker's onetime pianist, Duke Jordan. "Mama Rose" is rendered instrumentally here, but to these ears the longer version of this Shepp original, which features the tenorist's narration and electronic keyboards by Jasper Van't Hof (1982's Mama Rose on SteepleChase), is superior. The broad-toned fury of Shepp's tenor has been tempered by wisdom over the past 20 years, but his sound remains singular and stunning.

Vocalist Nancy Wilson teams up with Ramsey Lewis on the pianist's new effort for Columbia, The Two Of Us. ...Rare Silk, a jazzy vocal group, has signed with Palo Alto Records; Herb Wong is slated to produce. ...Guitarist Joe Carter and bassist Harvie Swartz are recording an album for Empathy Records with help from drummer Akira Tana and flugelhornist Art Farmer. ...Dr. George Butler is producing the Columbia Records' debut of the Widespread Jazz Orchestra. ...Marian McPartland's popular series for public radio, Marian McPartland's Plano Jazz, begins its sixth season on Oct. 6; her guest on the Peabody Award-winning series will include Steve Kuhn, Makoto Ozone, Dave Brubeck, George Wein, Dardanelle and Art Hodes. ...The Fantasy/Prestige/Milestone family of labels has released 50 more LPs in its Original Jazz Classics series, bringing the total to 150; the current batch of reissues includes The Thelonious Monk Orchestra At Town Hall, Tenor Madness from Sonny Rollins, Portrait Of Wes from guitarist Wes Montgomery, and a sampler of music originally released on Charles Mingus' Debut label.... Bob Summers' vinyl debut as a leader, Inside Out (Discovery Records), also showcases altoist Lanny Morgan and pianist Frank Strazzeri. ...Guitarist Peter Leitch will record his first album for Uptown Records in November. Joining him at Rudy Van Gelder's recording studio in New Jersey will be Billy Hart, John Hicks, Ray Drummond and Pepper Adams; the LP, slated for spring rel-ase, will consist of originals from the guitarist and a few Monk compositions....Palo Alto's Jazz Monterey four-sided set will spotlight key performances from the famed European festival over the past quarter-century. Included are never-before-issued performances from Jimmy Giuffre, Woody Herman, Toots Thielemans, Johnny Griffin, Canonoball Addertey, Jon Hecks, Elvin Jones and Buddy Rich with Dizzy Gillespie....Guitarist Pat Metheny and Lyle Mays, his longtime keyboardist, are writing and recording the soundtrack for the movie. 


**ARMORED SAINT March Of The Saint (Chrysalis,** 645 Madison Ave., New York, NY 10022)-This Los Angeles-based quintet shows quite an improvement since their self-titled EP on Metal Blade. They have developed a style that provides a strong melody delivered with pop and punch and finished with razor-clean production. But that doesn't make them lightweights-these guys are as metal as the armored suits they don on the cover. Lightning licks and riffs make this platter an overall winner. Try "Envy" or the Aerosmith-like "Can U Deliver." Also the title track and the superb "Mutiny On The World.'

FATES WARNING Night On Brocken (Metal Blade, 22458 Ventura Blvd., Suite E, Woodland Hills, CA 91364)—This bunch has all the right goods to deliver, but if the tracks were a bit shorter, this good album could've been a great one. A strong Iron Maiden influence (especially in the vocals) is apparent but they're still their own band. Listen closely when the two guitarists swap leads on "Buried Alive"—just killer! Also try "Kiss Of Death" and "Misfit."

TOKYO BLADE Night Of The Blade (Combat, P.O. Box 30561, Airport Station, Jamaica, NY 11430)—No, not a heavy metal album, but a perfect example of how to mix strong, accessible melodies with hard, driving rock. The result is similar to Def Leppard, but Blade roughs it up with fast and steamy axework and heavy, heavy vocals. In time, these lads could be huge, but for now enjoy the tracks "Unleash The Beast," "Lightning Strikes," "Night Of The Blade" and the great "Somebody To Love."

**OMEN Battle Cry (Metal Blade, address above)**—Good quality headbanging stuff here. Omen's approach might be fast but it's carried off with class. Kenny Powell's hot guitarwork gives this album extra zip. Strongly recommended: "Death Rider," "Battle Cry" and "Die By The Blade."

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

#### FREDDIE McGREGOR

FREDDIE McGREGOR Across The Border (RAS, P.O. Box 42517, Washington, D.C. 20015)— Freddle McGregor is a reggae singer who is perfect the way he is, but just isn't satisfied to settle into the limitations that strictly reggae music can connote. He continually explores new sounds, melodies and styles, while maintaining his roots and lovers rock base. Across The Border highlights Freddie not only as a singing star, (sounding more and more like Dennis Brown), but as a song writer, He checks out R&B sounds with "Work To Do Today" (shades of Captain Sensible's "Wot" are noted in the intro), traditional/MOR-style music with Jose Mattl's "Guantanamera" as well as his usual sweet, soulful reggae sounds with songs such as "Freddie" and the title track. This album could find freddie crossing musical borders—an Idea who's time has come!

UB40 Geffery Morgan (A&M, 1416 N. LaBrea, Hollywood, CA 90028) — When this Brit-based reggae group released their second album for A&M last year, many critics raved and said it was their best LP to date (sales figures and the Billboard album charts would agree). Long time fans, however, were somewhat dismayed at cover versions of reggae songs and were worried that UB40 had lost the rebeillous/political edge they had long been known for. Geffery Morgan, a title taken from grafitti the band noticed scrawled on the wall, in essence brings UB40 back to the streets, as they successfully combine politics, love/heartbreak, dub and accessible reggae-pop. They seem to have accomplished the impossible—the combination of authentic, roots sounds—dubwise—along with a commercially viable sound—kind of poppy, somewhat jazzy, very skankin' with a snakey sax that slithers throughout. The vocals of AU Campbell & Co. are fast becoming a pleasantly familiar and recognizable "voice" to the public. Highlights include: "Seasons," "If it Happens Again" (also available on a 12"), "D.U.B." and "Riddle Me."

It certainly seems so as Mr. Style & Fashion himself, **David Bowle**, joins that bandwagon. It is new LP, **Tonight** (EMI) includes a reggae-flavored song about "Shantytown" (co-penned by **Iggy Pop**), not to mention that *all* of side 1 has a third world feel to it. **...Arthur Baker** brings a reggae feel to the remix of **Bruce Springsteen**'s "Cover Me," currently available on a 12"... Is there any truth to the rumor that messrs. Baker and Springsteen will be producing **J. Cliff**'s next album? ... The **Gladiators** set out on a 5-week tour of the Midwest and West in support of their new LP on Nighthawk, **Serious Thing**... The third and latest **UB40** album on A&M (see Crucial!) is out. Here's hoping that it does at *least* as well as its predecessor, **Labour Of Love**, which, as of October 11, has reportedly sold over 350,000 copies. ... The **Force M.D.**'s, a current incarnation of a '50s doo-wop group, include a reggae cut on their new album, **Love Letters**. The song, "Don't Make Me Dance (All Night Long)," is on Tommy Boy Records at 1747 First Avenue, New York, NY 10128, (212) 722-2211. Tell them the *Reggae Route* sent you ....Garant Ltd., those nice distributors from New Jersey, have just released a slew of disco-45s and a couple of fine albums. Among the highlights is the 12" single by **Jackie Demerritt** with a reggae-cover of **Tina Turner's** "What's Love Got To Do With It?" Also available is **Al Campbell's Bad Boy** album on the British CSA label. To get your very own copies contact Ralph Vazquez at P.O. Box 519, 246 Herbert Ave., Closter, NJ 07624 or call him at (201) 784-0666.....The **I-Threes/Wailers** U5 **Legend Tour** will be continuing through Thanksgiving. Having recently caught their MYC show at the Ritz, it's somewhat of a surprise—along with **Judy, Rita, Marcia** and the musicians, **Bob Marley** 

Marley also appears on a larger than life video screen positioned like a stage backdrop. At times he "lead" the group in perfect syncopation. They performed all the songs from the Legend album—favorites which had the whole audience dancing and singing along, but it was dissapointing that there was no new material and none of the ladies performed any of their own songs. Still, the I-Threes were hot and scorching—behind them were the **Barrett Brothers, Junior Marvin** (guitar) and **Tyrone Downie** (keyboards) alternating lead vocals, **AI** Anderson, etc., etc. . . The **Second Annual New Music Awards** will be held that night at Studio 54. Finalists for the "Best Reggae LP Of The Year" have been annuonced: **BLACK UHURU Anthem, LINTON KWESI** JOHNSON Making History, BOB MARLEY & THE WAILERS Legend, STEEL PULSE Earth Crisis and YELLOWMAN King Yellowman. The presentations begin at 9:45 PM sharp. Be deh. . .

In my quest for the answer to this question, I have received many replys as to what it is which makes a record alternative. Many of us college programmers are blitzed by people in the industry to play their product because it is "alternative." To many people, these are the reasons why their record is superior: "commercial radio won't touch this record," "play the record 24 hours, instead of reserving it for specialized formats," or how about the old standby, "a progressive radio favorite"? The phrase "alternative" is becoming as cliche as, yes, "new wave"--whatever that means. As far as a purpose for alternative radio, I think that lies in the ears of our listeners who want to hear a particular sound, or type of music when they tune in. Sure, it may not be available on any other medium, but it is not the only. As music director, I must take all of this in when deciding what are the best in new releases--a very subjective process. And some of the stuff we play is available commercially, be it on radio or MTV. But the product, in determining its "airplayability," has to be good first, not just one or two tracks in. LPs which I consider to fit these prerequisites include the RED HOT CHILI PEPPERS, the X-TEENS, LOVE TRACTOR, and my ever-lasting favorite, the HODDOD GURUS. Sure, I may contradict myself in the above definitions, or in my playlists, but what's Dialogue for, anyway?

Cliff Carlton, KYMC, Program Director, Ballwin, MO (314) 227-7330 A time out from the usual Dialogue to simply state and defend the fact that A.O.R. is not dying. A.O.R. is being invaded by the current rock sound of Top 30/40 stations now being billed as "contemporary hit radio." Most people say that A.O.R. playlists look very similar to those of C.H.R. On the contrary, the C.H.R. playlist looks like A.O.R. Many hits such as "New Girl Now," "We're Not Gonna Take It," "Round And Round," and similar "hits" were broke on A.O.R. way before C.H.R. Top 30 stations are a reflection of the time. Years ago, Top 30 was playing A TASTE OF HONEY, LIPPS INC., DONNA SUMMER and others. Before that was DEBBIE BOONE, BARRY MANILOW, and others that we now term "adult contemporary." Do you see any C.H.R. station playing "You Light Up My Life" by Debbie Boone?" It was #1 in Billboard, but death awaits C.H.R. that plays it. As is evident, Top 30 is only a reflection of America's youth and is currently caught up in the apathetic party attitude that they/we share. Sooner or later, as songs start sounding the same and people want a new sound, it will change again--maybe even our way!! Either that or it will turn back to A/C or urban (which has already begun). Then, A.O.R. will thrive as it always has and always will with understanding and support. With the same understanding and support, our efforts on "college artists" can also filter through. If record companies would put a little more money into this forum and the research of the markets, maybe they would get more money back in return. Although I understand why they don't want to, face it, we're amateurs! As hard as we try, we have a lot to learn about music and radio. Maybe if we banded together to form a "progressive hit radio," more of our major artists could "filter" through to "real" radio.


