



FRANKIE GOES TO HOLLYWOOD Welcome To The Pleasure Dome (Island, 14 E. 4th St., 3rd Floor, New York, NY 10012)—A challenge to your every expectation—this is grand rock and roll cabaret at its very best. On this musically conceptual and lyrically (often) off-the-wall project, FGTH parades its faults (whiny vocals, over-dependency on production to cover lack of depth) with as much audacity as its strengths (Trevor Horn's grander-than-possible production, often brilliant hooks and lyrics). And they often go over the edge, only to bounce back with a smile. Why cover "Born To Run"? "Do You Know The Way To San Jose"? "Ferry Across The Mersey"? "War"? WHY NOT? None are "great" but all are brilliant in their sheer conception and execution. As is much of the rest: "Relax" and the whole suite on side one (climaxing with the title track), plus "Two Tribes," which is just brilliant. Why play Frankie Goes To Hollywood? They do whatever they feel like and do it very, very well. They've got balls.

BIG COUNTRY Steeltown (Mercury, c/o PolyGram, 810 Seventh Ave., New York, NY 10019)—Musicians learn quickly that more is not necessarily better. Yet on Steeltown Big Country says to hell with that—piling on more guitar parts, heavier drums and even thicker Steve Lillywhite production—to surprisingly good effect. The only band member to show any subtlety whatsover is vocalist/songwriter Stuart Adamson, who sings with a little less hysteria, fewer yelps and knows when to shut up and let the music carry the day. And he's writing better lyrics, too, singing about love without mountains exploding or fields catching fire. Side two is where it all comes together—try "Tall Ships Go," "Girl With The Grey Eyes," "The Great Divide" and "Just A Shadow."

REDUCERS Let's Go (Rave-On, P.O. Box 1388, New London, CT 06320)—The Reducers haven't wasted any time in getting their 2nd album out. This time they've eliminated any quirky over-anxiousness that at times permeated their self-titled debut LP. The band has cleaned up and filled out their sound (e.g. sustained rhythm chords) without losing any of its fire. There's plenty here that ROCKS such as "Rocks," "Let's Go," "Maximum Depression," "That's Fine" and "Your Mother." The songs are treated in the concise, classic rock form (two or three minutes, keep the change) and speak of more of the same suburban, post-teen dilemmas pointed out on their first album. However, the subtle development in songwriting encourages the listener to want to hear more as they continue to grow.

SHADOWFAX The Dreams Of Children (Windham Hill, Box 9388, Stanford, CA 94305)—Shadowfax's previous LP made great strides in crossing jazz onto progressive formats—and The Dreams Of Children stands to do the same. The sheer talent showcased here is undeniable—the instruments long ago mastered, Shadowfax never lets one instrument get in the way of the "sound." Atmospheric at the base, various sounds are layered on: a soaring synthesized (?) flute on the title cut; various natural rhythms (from clay pots to rattles to a turtle shell) on "Above The Wailing Wall" and "Shaman Song;" violin and sax on the Metheny-ish "Snowline;" and stone flute on the multi-rhythmic LP opener "Another Country." Progressive rock stations may do best, however, with "The Big Song," which starts slow, but builds nicely and features a strong guitar solo at the end.

DREAM SYNDICATE This Is Not The New Dream Syndicate Album. . . Livel (EP) (A&M, 1416 N. LaBrea, Hollywood, CA 90028)—A fine way to keep the Dream Syndicate name out there, this is. Five songs recorded in Chicago (by WXRT) should satisfy the purists who still like the band better live, even if Medicine Show is (in our humble opinion) one of the LPs of 1984. Exquisitely recorded and performed, and it all sounds great; four are from Medicine Show ("Bullet With My Name On It," "Armed With An Empty Gun," "The Medicine Show" and "John Coltrane Stereo Blues") and one from Days Of Wine And Roses, "Tell Me When It's Over." A pleasant surprise, this EP should set an example for record companies: it's an easy way to keep fans happy and keep an artist's career moving between LPs.

DAVID JOHANSEN Sweet Revenge (Passport, c/o JEM, 3619 Kennedy Rd., South Plainfield, NJ 07080)—Davey Jo's solo career has spawned some cherished vinyl efforts (not to mention some great live shows) and one that even had a go at the commercial marketplace: the Animals medley backin 1982. And recently Staten Island's living legend has been sporting an alter ego in Buster Poindexter—appearing with the Banshees of Blue in a club/lounge act covering traditional and nostalgic ballads and blues classics with a refined hipster air to them. On his debut JEM release he updates his approach and sound, employing lavish production and stylish electronic instrumentation to disguise and augment an otherwise standard rock format. This record doesn't hit on just one listen; but play it through two or three times and the subtleties of the arrangements, the personality of the songwriting and the crispness of DJ's voice begin to jump out at you. It should satisfy both college and commercial requirements. Our favorites include "Big Trouble," the comedic rap "King Of Babylon" (a great segue with Steve Martin's "King Tut") and "The Stinkin' Rich." But the two standouts are the humble ballad "In My Own Time" and "I Ain't Workin' Anymore." What a concept.

JOHN CALE Comes Alive (Ze, c/o Island, 14 E. 4th St., New York, NY 10012)—Recorded live in London at the time Caribbean Sunset was released (early 1984), the sound here opens up (brightness and intensity, with a punch to the drums) as the studio constraints disappear. Cale uses the same line-up as on Caribbean Sunset yet chooses to stay away from those tracks. Instead we get a smattering of Cale's rockers including "Never Give You Up," the cold, slapping "Evidence," the Mott/Hunter feel of "Dead Or Alive" and the tres humorous "Ooh La La." We're also treated to a bumped-up version of his buddy. Lou Reed's "Waiting For The Man," as well as a desolate version of Elvis's "Heartbreak Hotel," featuring Cale solo on piano (where he is most effective). The album is well paced and enthusiastically executed. Credit goes to the musicians and the producer—John Cale.

DEPECHE MODE Some Great Reward (Sire, c/o Warner Bros., 3300 Warner Blvd., Burbank, CA 91510)—Strange to have Depeche Mode emerging from the British synth-pop pack as musically the most consistent while lyrically the deepest. While Some Great Reward is no great leap forward, it's full of catchy tunes and saturated with human concerns. Overall, another solid LP, but once again without that breakthrough U.S. single, but a few that come close: "People Are People," "Master And Servant," and "Someday" (real piano!) stand out. Also recommended: "Blasphemous Rumours," "Lie To Me"



BUCKWHEAT ZYDECO

HOT RIZE

BUCKWHEAT ZYDECO AND THE ILS SONT PARTIS BAND Turning Point (Rounder, One Camp St., Cambridge, MA 02140)—While touring as organist for Clifton Chenier, "The King Of Zydeco," in 1978, Buckwheat was so surprised to find out that people (in and out of his native Louisiana) responded and danced to the Zydeco sound, that he bought an accordion of his own and organized a band. Buckwheat Zydeco's Zydeco is a blend of cajun French two-step and soulful rock 'n' roll (here he covers Little Richard's "Tutti Fruitti"). The frollickin-rollickin' Fais Do-Do sounds are best represented by "Turning Point," "Zydeco Boogaloo" and "Buck's Boogie." There's also a slower waltz "Mon Papa," a swingin' two-step "Madame Pitre" and the bluesy "I'm So Tired." Some good edjumacation for you and your listeners. Le Bon Ton Roulet.

PHILIP BAILEY Chinese Wall (Columbia, 51 W. 52nd St., New York, NY 10019)—Bailey (the high voice in Earth, Wind And Fire) teams up with Phil Collins to produce one of the more intriguing soul/pop LPs of the year. Collins' drumming makes all the difference—it's powerful and seductive, one of the only truly distinctive drum sounds in pop music. And of course Bailey's vocals soar—at their best they are without compare. The two unique talents blend nicely—a welcome surprise. Top cuts: "Photogenic Memory," "Easy Lover" (a Bailey/Collins duet), "I Go Crazy," "Walking On Chinese Walls," "Time Is A Woman," "Children Of The Ghetto."

HOT RIZE In Concert (Flying Fish, 1304 West Schubert, Chicago, IL 60614)—With all the talk lately about the surfacing of great American rock 'n' roll bands, there's one form of American music that's been enjoying a revival of its own—bluegrass. Hot Rize plays an integral part in keeping the flames of down home music burning bright. Their LP highlights the quartet's dexterity on banjo, guitar, bass, fiddle and mandolin, and those deliciously sweeeet four part harmonies. They cook up such golden biscuits as Lester Flatt's "I'm Gonna Sleep With One Eye Open," Grandpa Jones' "I've Been All Around This World" and the traditional fiddlin' rave "Sally Goodin." Red Knuckles & the Trailblazers contributes some funny dialogue and two western-blues tunes (steel guitar) on side two, which concludes with Hot Rize's pressure cooker "Shady Grove." There's some authentic bluegrass in them thar grooves that would make for some good company with the abundance of countrified cowpop around these days.

AL GREEN Trust In God (Myrrh, c/o Word, P.O. Box 1790, 4800 West Waco Drive, Waco, TX 76796)—It's no secret Al Green "found religion" a few years ago, and has since produced a series of religious LPs. But this is the first one since where he sounds less like a preacher and more like the great soul singer he is (still singing religious songs). When he hits his stride, which he often does on Trust In God, the feeling is so intense and genuine it can give you the chills, and that's a feeling we've sorely missed from Al Green. Top cuts: "Up The Ladder To The Roof," "Ain't No Mountain High Enough," "Don't It Make You Wanta Go Home," "Lean On Me." Say Amen somebody.

KENDRA SMITH, DAVID ROBACK, KEITH MITCHELL Fell From The Sun (EP) (Serpent, c/o Enigma, P.O. Box 2896, Torrance, CA 90509)—Achingly beautiful, Kendra Smith's vocals top off the slow, semi-psychedelic music on this EP. The feeling is that of early Jefferson Airplane or Doors—mystical and seductive, never harsh and always entrancing. "Grains Of Sand" and "All Souls" (previously released under the name Clay Allison) are the most interesting, but "Fell From The Sun's" guitars may be the best for airplay on some staions. A wonderful change of pace to evoke a different feeling from your listeners.

BONZO GOES TO WASHINGTON "5 Minutes" (12") (Sleeping Bag, 1974 Broadway, New York, NY 10023)—By the time you read this, the odds are pretty good we will have seen Ronald Reagan re-elected President. If not, give some credit to Jerry Harrison for closing the spread a few points. He's taken the famous Reagan blooper "My fellow Americans, I'm pleased to tell you today that I've signed legislation that will outlaw Russia forever. We begin bombing in five minutes," and turned it into a wild free-for-all rap with musical help from Bootsy Collins. A wonderful concept, brought to bitingly funny fruition. And danceable too. Cast your vote for "5 Minutes."

VARIOUS ARTISTS Revenge Of The Killer B's (LP) (Warner Bros., 3300 Warner Blvd., Burbank, CA 91510)—It's hard to resist this stuff: a melange of semi-obscure tracks by stars of all magnitudes from the Warner Bros. hive. This LP's killers: a scathing live version of "Money" by the Pretenders recorded at the US Festival; Rank And File's "Post Office," less than two minutes of riotous fun—maybe their best; Marshall Crenshaw's rockin' "Somebody Like You;" and Fleetwood Mac's refreshing "Cool Water." Ever-so-slightly less exciting but still pretty damn cool: Depeche Mode, B-52's, Talking Heads, Echo & The Bunnymen, Tom Verlaine, Kid Creole And The Coconuts, Madonna and Aztec Camera. An, er, stinging collection

VARIOUS ARTISTS Better An Old Demon Than A New God (LP) (Giorno Poetry Systems, 222 Bowery, New York, NY 10012)—The Dial-A-Poem Poets are back again with another collection of song and spoken word. Highlights include David Johansen's "Imaginatin' Cocktail" (co-written by Huw Gower) and done with a fiery NY Dolls/Tim Curry delivery; John Giorno's "Exiled In Domestic Life," with his trademark quirky phrasing over an '80s synthesizer beat; Anne Waldman's re-mixing (guitars added) of her "Uh-Oh Plutonium," and "Alisa," a mysterious throb-piece by the experimental Arto Lindsay. The spoken word features an hysterical sermon by Richard Hell titled "The Rev. Hell Gets Confused." Also included are rather lengthy pieces by William S. Burroughs ("Dinosaurs") and Jim Carroll ("A Peculiar Looking Girl"). Fresh Fish in the Stream of Consciousness.

VARIOUS ARTISTS The Girls Can't Help It (LP) (Rhino, 1201 Olympic Blvd., Santa Monica, CA 90404)—Billed alternately as "13 swinging hits from today's grooviest gals" and "A modern girl group compilation," The Girls Can't Help It gathers together 13 girl-led groups: some pay homage to the early girl groups (Leslee Swanson, Dynette Se), some fit into the current U.S. pop sound (Wednesday Week, Sophisticated Boom Boom), some are more unique (Antoinettes, Jane Bond And The Undercover Men), and a few are tributes to '60s pop (Pandoras, Ru Carly, Tiger Lily). Take your pick.

ONIKE "Bush Woman" (12") (McConnie, 8306 Wilshire Blvd., Beverly Hills, CA 90211)—On "Bush Woman" Onike offers high-spirited Afro-Caribbean rhythms and a horn backing section that includes ex-P-Funkster Fred Wesley. The vocal chorus (rich and smooth with "tribal" overtones) propel this track, along with its succinctly wailing guitar licks. A dub version is offered as well as short and long versions (which don't really differ). Workable in any Latin, African or Reggae format as well as a nice surprise in any slot. Drop them a line.

MALCOLM McLAREN "Madam Butterfly" (12") (Island, 14 E. 4th St., 3rd Floor, New York, NY 10012)—How Malcolm McLaren makes this stuff work is beyond reasonable comprehension. But "Madam Butterfly" does work—a Puccini opera adapted for the dancefloor, replete with soaring operatic solos and a synthesized dance beat. Strange but exciting, and sure to elicit some response from dancers and radio listeners alike.

R.E.M. "(Don't Go Back To) Rockville"/"Catapult" (live) (12") (I.R.S., c/o A&M, 595 Madison Ave., New York, NY 10022)—An edit brings the chorus right up front on "Rockville," making it better for CHR, where it should have been all along. Too bad they had to cut such a great verse. The B-side is a new live version of "Catapult," recorded in Seattle. Great for Christmas gift giving in a nifty green and white sleeve.

FIONA "Love Makes You Blind" (12") (Atlantic, 75 Rockefeller Plaza, New York, NY 10019)—A pretty standard pop music track with an extraordinary vocal performance by newcomer Fiona—she ranges from intense power to a cracking, breathy whisper in a remarkably short time span and is totally convincing. Her voice has a gruff street feel like Kim Carnes' but with more purity and a wider range. A talent to most definitely watch.

This writer first heard the social-consciousness of the Flying Pickets on college radio—WNYU's Club 89 to be exact—it was their a capella cover of Yaz's "Only You" (#1 in England for five weeks late last year). Perhaps this type of local alternative airplay had groomed Washington DC's 9:30 Club audience for the Pickets' performance there two weeks ago. Said FP Red Stripe, "We were amazed. They knew all the words to our sones."

words to our songs."

A trio of Picket vids exist, the audio tracks of which are available on their '84 debut LP Lost Boys (Ten/Virgin (UK)) (A video of their recent gig at NYC's Irving Plaza, directed by Eric Acosta is also available, call 212-245-5590 for info.) Club programmers are obvious invitees for a look-see, but as the band is looking for a U.S. licensee, label execs might want to be first in line.

'So Close" (directed by Phillip Davey) is instantly striking for its polished high tech garb (a la the performance version of FGTH's "Relax")—grey suits and shades, plus the asymmetrical positioning of Pickets-and the way that crispness intrudes on audio's apparent gentility; with David Brett on lead vocals it sounds like a fluid doowop spate of ta-la's nestled under a streetlamp, but it speaks the reality of a romantic break-up based on political differences. The clip's post-industrial flavor fails, however, to provide an outlet for

"Young And In Love" (directed by Phillip Davey) is a credible aural soar despite the saccharine antecedents of the Lettermen original; the clip targets the Pickets' zaniness without sacrificing their political wallops. Half Maurice Sendak/Dr. Seuss, the clips are more spiritually akin to Peter Pan, but alas, Steven Spielberg holds the rights. The babybonneted FPs, freed of the confines of nursery beds, fly hand in hand through the universe only to find that upon return as adults their former abode is closed. (In actuality that hospital for sick children was operational through Barrie royalties; the present government has closed it down.)

"Only You" (director unavailable) is consummate Elving

"Only You" (director unavailable) is consummate Flying Pickets. Set in a bar/pool room with superb production values and cinematography, lead vocalist Brian Hibbard, mutton-chopped and fake leopard-adorned, sets the mood of ragged stoicism. The crescendo hits at the interlude with the sextet lined up against a bar; by clip's end, it's hard to tell if the smokiness is a visual version of the velvet doowops. Those vocal emissions prove startling as seen in the closeups which tune into the sobriety and wondrous dignity of the Pickets themselves. In majestic counterpoint, Rick Lloyd, responsible for the group's original material, applies resin to his cue as the whole lot vocalizes nonsense syllables. One would expect the group, all of whose members are political theatre veterans, to exercise control, but here the tautness is impeccable and the results transfixing.

The Trials And Tribulations Of Independent Label Video

Thirty years ago major labels watched from the sidelines as independents began churning out seminal grooves of R&B and rock 'n' roll. Today, as if in counter-reaction to the example being set by their bigger brothers, what the indies are not churning out are promotional music videos.

Since programmed music videos are a proven boon to ecord sales, most indies' clipless-by-choice stance seems, at first, highly impractical—until one learns that hardly an outlet is breaking its neck to show these smaller labels' video offerings. That's right, it's a marketing issue-and all along you thought the problem was a skimpy budget.

"It's been very easy to get a commitment from qualified people in the South who jump at the chance to make videos," says Altanta's DB/Press' Peter Dyer. "These people are says Altanta's DB/Press' Peter Dyer. "These people are looking to break into the field and are willing to work for nothing or a longterm payment plan." The first clip for DB's Love Tractor, "Spin Your Partner," cost \$7,500 and the label was able to amortize that expense over a period of time.

Joel Webber of UpRoar worked a similar deal with underground film director Beth B for his recent dance single "The

Dominatrix Sleeps Tonight." He recalls, "Dominatrix' cost a third of what most people consider low budget for a video. I went to Beth and she wanted to work. I told her my hiring her would not make her money but she'd get an immense amount of attention and press from it, which she has. She just recently finished a video for Joan Jett.

Webber cites clips for majors such as Van Halen's "Jump, which was executed by the group on a non-majors budget "The amount of money you spend on a video is in no way related to how it comes out," he notes. "There have been plenty of big-budget stiff movies. In the indie label business

you can't afford a big-budget stiff anything."

The Independent Label Coalition, a non-profit trade association, recently made a longform performance video of half a dozen indie acts at a benefit showcase, using the admission charge to pay production costs. Not even I.R.S., whose top-grossing act is the Go-Go's, is free of budgetary restrictions. "We occupy a weird, middle ground," says the label's Carl Grasso. "People expect certain (major label) things from us because of our visibility." Still, the label envisions release of no more than ten clips for this year. R.E.M.'s "So. Central Rain" cost \$15,000.

But even if financial ingenuity runs rampant among the indies, the most cost-efficient video is useless unless it has its audience. Some indies, in fact, are so sure of their buyers they don't feel a need to make videos at all. Tommy Boy's Monica Lynch admits that, "given our experience that no outlet other than MTV has impact for us," the label prefers to channel monies into "creating strong, live acts in order to insure the group's own longevity and profit-making potential."
"Let's face it," says Randall Grass of Shanachie, whose

artist roaster includes Rita Marley, the Raybeats and the Chieftains, "a lot of our records go to consumers who are very alternative and discriminating and who actively seek out this music. If the projected sales of an album or an artist are between five and ten thousand it's obvious a video isn't going to do much good.

Clips for the Raybeats' "Jack The Ripper" and Love Tractor's "Spin Your Partner," both instrumentals, did get national exposure on MTV. But while Grass believes venues exist for indie videos, DB's Dyer disagrees, saying, "The indie clip is essentially floating around looking for an outlet. The majors have leverage with the national networks and the few local cable outlets that exist. The indies don't.

Dyer cites being based in the South a video disadvantage. "Even Ted Turner's cable network—his office is six blocks away from ours—has its several hours of weekly music compiled in Los Angeles." Nor do Telegenics and Rockamerica, companies that service videos to clubs, return his

"We really do want to work with them," says Dyer. "We're looking to tailor our product to the marketplace. At least we'd like to know what we're doing wrong. It's difficult to have the interchange if there's no interest. I.R.S.'s *The Cutting Edge* is

interchange if there's no interest. I.R.S.'s The Cutting Edge is the only hole in the curtain for us—it's exceptional."

The philosophy of The Cutting Edge, which runs every fourth Sunday of the month on MTV, is to "kick people in the butt," says the show's producer Grasso. "It's all in the attitude of the act itself and how we present the act," he says, noting how a segment on Los Lobos was shot in one of the band member's backyards. "I get a ton of tapes and phone calls from groups who want to be on the program. But even if their tapes don't get used it gives them hope to know they do have an opportunity to get on television."

Dyer is unhappily resigned to the fact that working a video along local cable network is financially similar to pushing through college radio, an effort demanding increased through college radio, an effort demanding increased investment for distribution copies and follow-up. Bill Bentley of Slash, however, is philosophical. "When you're not really mainstream, you have to build up a regional market and come in through the back door," concedes Bentley, who welcomes vidplay on smaller cable shows. "Since a lot of the airplay we get is on college radio stations, we feel we can't turn our back on any possible visibility—even though it costs us more money

With most video formats "locked up," Dyer is not optimistic.

With most video formats "locked up," Dyer is not optimistic. "We made our own records because we didn't think a major would release them," he says. "In trying to get our video on the air the parallels to conventional radio are frightening." Still, despite the difficulties in presenting their videos, the indies, according to Webber, have no alternatives but to make every effort to make and place video product. "You don't know what the audience wants to hear—and now see—use! I be vive had a chance to hear or see it." he notes: "We're until they've had a chance to hear or see it," he notes. in the 1980s. Video is totally relevant. It's crucial."

And if getting an indie video tracked wreaks havoc with the budget, Webber's response is in no small way influenced by his pre-UpRoar promotional experience. "If you want to have a hit, you compete in the same arena as the majors," he advises. "Understand the real reason for making a video—to make the audience fall in love with the artist. Majors have stars, indies don't, so your indie has to be better than the majors." Especially better than other indie videos. "Most indie videos," says Webber soberly, "are terrible.

BIG COUNTRY

STEELTOWN

I DON'T think I've ever wished so much for an album to be great and strong and certainly never in my experience has an album fulfilled so many promises.

'Steeltown" is, simply, superb, everything Big Country ever said they were and everything we sort of hoped, with fingers crossed, they might be. There's no ifs or buts about it — no "if only they weren't so naive", no "if only we weren't so cynical", no "if only The Clash hadn't cocked it up so badly for everyone else", no "if only they didn't wear those check shirts", no if anything.

The sound that emanates from this album exhilarates - the power is internal, dynamic and emotional, not external cosmetic bluster. All the rockist arguments have been defeated, we never stop to consider this passion might be posturing. Thin Lizzy don't come into it, nor do those nagging doubts that the bagpipe guitars might be a gimmick. This is sheer purpose made practise, adrenalised action.

The debate whether Adamson is capable of reinvesting clichés with meaning is rendered redundant. The deed is done. Big Country, all four of them, have grown in stature and sensitivity and there are no failures here excused for their good intentions. There is

only the fact: "Steeltown" works.

It's grown in so many ways, so far from "The Crossing". The title track, with its dark images of busted industry and broken people, is far more politically explicit than anything Adamson's attempted before and you can't tell me that Reagan's farcical visit to Ireland and "Flame Of The West" coincidentally inhabit the same 12 months.

'Steeltown" is the bravest record this year. There's a growing confidence in Adamson's narrative style that exorcises any embarrassment we might feel at being forcefed homilies. "Come Back To Me", for example, is "Chance" grown up — the deserted housewife is now the pregnant girlfriend of a dead (Falklands?) soldier, left to face life alone while a local hero returns in triumph, intact. "I watched them gather round him/When he stepped down from the car/While tears fell on my cigarette/He handed out cigars.

Set in a lament not that far from Country & Western, "Come Back" is poignant and

singable, avoiding sentimentality. It's folk music for today and folk music, remember, is for and of the people, a usable companion, a social documentary, wisdom and woe handed down. It's unashamed honesty embroidered into myth, it eases pain in the telling and shares common experience.

Adamson's about as unselfconscious as a pop star can be nowadays, he sings a woman's words and he doesn't blush, he's turned himself over to his songs, to history, to

Lyrically, "Steeltown" is less exuberant than "The Crossing" but that's inevitable. Big Country have an audience now, the first struggle's over and there's no fear they'll spill their seed on barren soil. "Steeltown" needed to be explicit though, to ensure no complacency crept in. And there's no mistaking this album's intentions.

'Where The Rose Is Sown" is an anti-war anthem, a tale without blame. It works as Adamson always maintained a song should, on a human not polemic level. There are no rights or wrongs, only people. "If I die in a combat zone/Box me up and ship me home."

Surprisingly, there's no sign of the feared formula either, no evidence of relaxation or fatigue. "Raindance" is hard, eschewing one tradition (Scots) for another (almost hillbilly) with an ease that shows Big Country mining the source not the style. "Tall Ships Go" even straddles the sort of mechanical rumble you'd expect to confront in Cabaret Voltaire. Big Country, once a vision, are now a band.

There are no signs of strain, no stress in the structure. "Steeltown" sounds so natural that it's only an afterthought that the ballad "Girl With Grey Eyes" is, in fact, as tender and free from chauvinism as a love song has ever been. It doesn't try, it isn't forced, it just is, and there's the improvement, the mighty leap from the struggle and inspiration of "The Crossing" to insight and instinct.

It's during the monumental "East Of Eden",

a typical song of critical self-doubt cauterised by a rushing jig, that Adamson sings: "Some days will last a thousand years/Some pass like the light of a spark . .

Well, some records live forever. "Steeltown" is one of them.

While at the Convention, speak with programmers and other music lovers and find out what sounds they've been turned onto and what sources they use to track down the independent (local) records. The use of word of mouth and reliable recommendation can have a lot of impact. "What you give is what you get." While buzzing around Manhattan you may want to stop in the following stores for your indie taves and semi-obscure treasures: Bleecker Bobs, Midnight, Rocks In Your Head, Sounds and Tower. MAXIMUM AMERICA This Is Art (EP) c/o Bollard 11 Meadow Rd., Wayne, NJ 07470/201-696-1521)—An EP that captures the raw feel of this New Jersey based band who came to be from a jam in the basement of Max's Deli somewhere among the shopping malls of the Garden State (they appear on the EP as a trio but have since added a keyboard player). The two tracks on side 2 stand out—a gritty, charged reworking of the candy coated Cowsills' song "The Rain In The Park And Other Things" (disguised here as "Flower Girl") and "Maximum America," which they describe as "tribal chanting backed by white suburban reggae music." We look forward to the band coming up from the basement and showing the world more of their dynamic musicianship and unrequited rock 'n' roll. A commendable debut


SHORT TERM MEMORY Effect Of Excess (Fresh Sounds Inc., P.O. Box 36, Lawrence, KS 66044)—After a few cassette-only releases, Short Term Memory's

debut vinyl is here. The band's sound centers on electronics (gripe: if a band has to use programmed drums why can't they use equipment sophisticated enough to give them at least an inkling of heart) and creates an eerie mystique using various effects (clavinet, melodica, saxophone) and sequences that wash over the rhythm pattern. It is the effective application of these sound flurries that make this effort worthwhile. "Banzai," with its swirling tinkerings full of eastern intrique, is a prime example. They can also dig a groove as on the title track, held together by a dominant bass pattern and "I Don't Care" (which hints at Shriekback). Others range from the hypnotic atmospherics of "Freedom" to the tantalizingly bizarre "Hungry Dogs (Run Fast)" with a yo-yo-ing synth and contorted, alternating guitar and saxophone sweeps. This track bleeds into the nightmarish "I Think I'm Losing My Mind." Effect Of Excess is for those who like to take things beyond their intended, expected course—how far are you willing to go with it?

THE SCHEMERS (5 song demo cassette) (Big Bubble, 273 Promenade St., Providence, RI 02908/401-521-2521)—The Schemers (more important to Rhode Island's *POP*ulous than the America's Cup) won the WBCN Rock 'N' Rumble Battle of the Bands, with judges including Elliot Easton (Cars) and prizes including studio time at the Cars' Syncro-Sound Studio. And the Schemers make the most of their Rumble victory: their tape is of professional quality and should land them a record deal with a reputable indie or major label; the music they serve up is strictly American gee-tar rock 'n' roll with no frills (and *no* synthesizers) and recalls such rockin' romantics as Tom Petty, Steve Wynn and Jim Carroll (with the added attraction of timely and tasteful vocal harmonies). The first two songs—"Valley Of Love" and "Better Way"—are our faves and would both make great singles. The Schemers have survived through the strength of their live shows—everyone attending CMJ Music Marathon will have the opportunity to see them Thursday, November 8th at Trax. A tip o' the turban to John DePetro at WXIN for the help.

JOEY MISERABLE & THE WORMS (5 song cassette) (Nightcrawler Productions, 418 7th Ave., #2, Brooklyn, NY 11215/718-499-5971)Point of historical information: Joey Miserable & the Worms were Bo Diddley's back-up band in 1982. Now they are New York's jumpinest, jivenest, bumpinest, live act. (You can catch them at CMJ Music Marathon, Thursday, November 8th at Trax.) The Worms draw from a wide range of influences including Bo Diddley, A Roomful Of Blues and the J.B.'s, and have the charm and humor of NRBQ's second cousin. This sampler tape (a four year retrospective of the Worms) features such beauties as the funkfiled "Pooper Scooper," where they address the urban dilemma facing so many folks: "We're gonna jump down turn around/Gonna pick that poop up off the ground/Gonna put it in a paper bag/Like the mayor wants us to/Yeah do the pooper scooper rag." There's also "No Such Luck," told with a C&W singsong twist: "No such luck/Sometimes the wheel of fortune just gets stuck." The Worms ensemble is composed of the complementary guitars of Joey Miserable and Frank Sominex, a versatile rhythm section, and the spontaneous choreography of their three piece horn section. As they sum up on the lead track, "Rockin' is our bizness/Rockin' is what we do." Be an early bird and catch the Worms.

NATURAL SCIENTIST Anaesthetic Of Love (EP) (Dental, P.O. Box 7778, Silver Spring, MD 20907)—They're from England sure, yet Natural Scientist delivers the antidote to the syrupy, fluffy pop so prevalent in Brit-rock these days. A five man, guitar-based band, NS engages propulsive, powerful pop with the driving pulse of the drums mixed right up front. The vocals are aggressive but not abrasive, and work well with the hard (though melodic), quirky/jerky guitar rhythms, steady bass grooves and percussion (a la Feelies and A Certain Ratio). Side 1 is slanted towards hard hitting pop highlighted by "Pleasure," while side 2 is more danceable and insistent with "7 Not 17 Ways" and "(Let's Hear It For) The Natural Sciences." Treat your laboratory animals and colleagues to the Anaesthetic Of Love.

VARIOUS ARTISTS Jazz Monterey (Palo Alto, 755 Page Mill Rd., Palo Alto, CA 94304)—Live albums are more frequent in jazz than in any other music and the reasons stretch way beyond convenience and supposed low cost. Jazz is improvisors' music, and jazz sustains and renews itself in the presence of jazz lovers. The Monterey Jazz Festival, an ongoing institution since 1958, is celebrated on this 85-minute, four-sided retrospective on its 25th anniversary. In all their alfresco excitement, performances by Cannonball Adderley, Woody Herman, Dizzy Gillespie, Clark Terry, Toots Thielemans and Jimmy Giuffre, among others, are offered for the first time. The performances—ranging from the Jimmy Giuffre Three's "Doxie" in 1958 to the Joanne Brackeen Trio's "Remembering" in 1980—aren't presented chronologically, but the sequencing doesn't inhibit the cumulative power of the presentations. For 17 minutes the Buddy Rich Orchestra, with soloist Gillespie, rips through "Two Bass Hit/Ad Hoc Ham," the

set's longest selection. Jazz Monterey swings from one jazz genre to another and touches virtually every instrumental base in the process: trumpet (Gillespie, Terry, Nat Adderley), vocals (Jon Hendricks, Joe Williams), saxophonists (Joe Henderson, Benny Golson, Johnny Griffin) and drums (Elvin Jones, Rich). Money raised by the sale of this set will benefit the Monterey Jazz Festival's jazz education program.

DIANE SCHUUR "Deedles" (GRP, 555 W. 57th St., New York, NY 10019)—"Deedles" is both the nickname and the title of vocalist Diane Schuur's debut album. Schuur, you may recall, is the blind singer who created a stir in 1982 when she performed at the White House with tenorman Stan Getz and other jazz luminaries. "Deedles," a digital master (as are all GRP efforts), reveals that this native of the Pacific Northwest is a Schuur thing, a hearty singer with strong blues inflections, a flair for individual phrasing and flexible range that allows her voice many options. It remains to be seen, however, whether she will concentrate on jazz or veer in a more pop-oriented direction. On this LP she covers such jazzy standards as "The Very Thought Of You" and "I'm Beginning To See The Light," but the covers of Billy Joel's "New York State Of Mind" and Jackson Browne's "Rock Me On The Water" are predictable, and thus questionable, choices. The backing is both acoustic and electric, with GRP co-owner Dave Grusin handling most of the keyboards. Getz's tenor is featured on several selections.

TOSHIKO AKIYOSHI JAZZ ORCHESTRA "Ten Gallon Shuffle" (Ascent, P.O. Box 20135, New York, NY 10025)—The Toshiko Akiyoshi New York Jazz Orchestra has become a big band in the true sense of the word, according to its piano-playing leader Toshiko Akiyoshi, by completing a U.S. tour and then holding down a residency at Lush Life, a prestigious New York jazz club. Now the New York-based band, featuring reedman Lew Tabackin, is represented on its first disc, although, ironically, it was recorded on the West Coast. (Akiyoshi's earlier big bands have been documented on Salted Gingko Nuts and European Memoirs for her Ascent label.) "Ten Gallon Shuffle" is a five-tune affair featuring the leader's variegated compositions and arrangements for a 16-piece orchestra (four trumpets, four trombones, five reeds and three rhythm) that can soar as mightily as it roars. The pacing and dynamics on this recording, cut in late May of this year, are well-executed and often brilliant. "Fading Beauty" is an effective ballad feature for the altoman Frank Wess, and the album's magnum opus is the 16-minute "Blue Dream," a moodscape of shifting colors and perspectives. Akiyoshi, who composed and arranged all the music here, demonstrates once again why she is a frequent winner of critics' polls in the composing and arranging categories.

At Herb Wong's Palo Alto Records, A&R apparently begins the moment an artist signs on the dotted line. Palo Alto not only announced the signing of the acclaimed alto saxist Phil Woods, but outlined the first few Woods recordings they plan to release. The altoman's first effort for the label, as part of a multi-album deal, will be a live quartet date from New York, due in early 1985. The follow-up will be a quintet outing, featuring trumpeter Tom Harrell and consisting of Wayne Shorter tunes. With all this A&R. Woods isn't likely to get much R&R... The William Paterson College Sextet, winner of the outstanding-combo award at the Notire Dame Jazz Festival in April, will perform at the National Association of Jazz Educators convention in Dallas in January. The sextet representing the New Jersey college will be the only small group performing in the category of college, university and conservatory. Rufus Reid, the noted bassist and director of the WPC program in Jazz Studies and Performance, directs the sextet. Reid also appears on the most recent recordings by Jack DeJohnette's Special Edition, Album Album (ECM). Electric guitarist John Scoffeld, a member of Miles Davis's band (he co-wrote all three tunes on the B-side of the trumpeter's recent Decoy LP), is featured on his first LP as a leader for Gramavision, Electric Outlet. Regarding his composer's role in the famed trumpeter's band, the bearded guitarist told NMR: "Miles and Gill [Evans, the noted arranger] really got into this thing of taping solos (from live performances) and then transcribing the solos and using those for the heads. Miles tapes everything—gigs, rehearsals, everything—and he just finds the parts he likes. It justs o happened that he used the stuff from my guitar solos. There's a lot of stuff he's done from his trumpet solos, too, and they're in the can; they're real good."... According to Digital Audio magazine, two GRP albums head the jazz compact-disc chart. The Glenn Miller Orchestra's In The Digital Mood and keyboardist Dave Grusin's Ni

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

DEEP PURPLE Perfect Strangers (Mercury, c/o Poly-Gram, 810 7th Ave., New York, NY 10019)—What did you expect? When it comes to producing excellence in hard rock, you don't mess with the guys who invented it. Although Perfect Strangers combines the bluesy-Purple style with a touch of vintage Rainbow, it is not in the least dated. Guitarist Ritchie Blackmore is at his prime, adding his distinctive, classically influenced leads over John Lord's haunting array of keyboards. The incredible title track is the killer choice with "Knocking At Your Back Door" and "Hungry Daze" close seconds but everyone is bound to. If there were more so-called "dinosaur" bands like this, the species wouldn't be extinct.

MOTORHEAD No Remorse (Bronze, c/o Island, 14 East 4th St., New York, NY 10012)—This record stinks! Literally! The limited edition leather cover is definitely not the best air freshener for your record cabinet. Nevertheless, what counts is what's on the inside, which is all the reasons why Motorhead is one of the biggest forces in Europe. Included in this double set are all their classics—"Iron Fist," "Ace Of Spades," "Motorhead"—along with new tracks to boot. "Killed By Death" might hint a slight change of direction, but the LP still follows through with the Motorhead formula of rawness, power, raunch and mayhem. Add this album if you dare.

GIUFFRIA The Awakening (MCA, 70 Universal City Plaza, Universal City, CA 91608)—A good solid debut from the former leader of Angel. Strong vocals, accessible melodies and tight musicianship abound throughout. However, the brilliance of Gregg Giuffria's keyboard mastery really stands out. These boys are capable of belting out the hard rockers—"Don't Tear Me Down" and "Turn Me On"—as well as great ballads like "Call To The Heart." Check out the ivory tickling in the intro to "Do Me Right."

AC/DC '74 Jailbreak (Atlantic, 75 Rockefeller Plaza, New York, NY 10019)—For fans of vintage AC/DC, this is a must. Their classic blend of riffy hard rock, fast leads and boogie along with the raunch and sleaze of Bon Scott's vocals has been often imitated but never matched. Any one of these five tracks are airplay staples, but the title track and "You Ain't Got A Hold On Me" are personal favorites.



The rest of the line-up consists of keyboardist **Mark Stanway**, drummer **Robbie Brennan** and the guitar duo of **Laurence Archer** and **Doish Nagle**. Although no record deal has been signed, they have already completed an extensive U.K. tour. third week of January is too long to wait for the new Accept album. If this new one is only half as great as last year's **Balls To The Wall**, it is sure to put the German band over the top. . .**Motorhead's** video clip for "Killed By Death" is quite an epic. It features Lemmy driving a motorbike through a number of obstacles. Meanwhile, the band will set out on a U.S. tour at the end of the month with Mercyful Fate and Exciter in the opening slot. ..Los Angeles power-metal act **Metallica** has signed with Elektra Records. ..**Iron Maiden** has released "Aces High" as the second single from the Powerslave album. Of course it follows in the band's tradition of non-LP B-sides. On the seven inch you get Maiden's cover of the **Nektar** tune "King Of Twilight," while the twelve inch features "Number Of The Beast" recorded live as an extra bonus. It is only available on import. . . On the subject of imports, the band Warfare has released their version of the Frankie Goes To Hollywood mega-hit "Two Tribes." 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

TANSEY'S FANCEY Tansey's Fancey (Plant Life PLR 065, Available from Silo Records, P.O. Box 429, South Main St., Waterbury, VT 05676)—All the way from Down Under comes this gifted "multiethnic" band. There's everything here from Macedonian and Spanish tunes to traditional English and French ballads. One of the wildest tracks here, though, is "TWA Corbies," featuring Mara's starkly eerie vocal over staccato electric bass and chunky electric guitar. Perfect Halloween stuff! There's also a lovely old Latin song "Unicornsis Captivatur" and a fairly straight reading of "Cherry Tree Carol" with

some nice guitar licks. You can't get more eclectic than this lot—the ultimate crossover band!!

Linda Thompson's solo debut One Clear Moment is due from Warner Bros. late this year. . .John Prine's next LP is out soon on his own label. 



MESSENJAH Session (WEA Canada, 1810 Birchmount Rd., Scarborough, Ontario, Canada)—This Toronto-based reggae group has been called Canada's answer to Third World. While supporting the beliefs of Rasta, praising ganga, and defending the oppressed, they incorporate pop music which gives the LP a sound beyond that of strictly roots reggae. This group of youngsters is very popular in Canada and has already appeared on a number of TV shows there. Some of their vocals are reminiscent of the Mighty Diamonds, while their concept of progressive-reggae does indeed rival that of Third World. Certainly a band to watch. Stand out cuts include "Jam Session," "Abraham's Children" and "One Way Street."

Ah-So-Me Chat

Well, the summer slackness seems to have certainly faded away as more reporters are now calling the *Reggae Route*. This issue, in fact, seems to host many more Midwest reporters than ever before. This is very encouraging, indeed. Even if commercial stations aren't jumping on the rockers sounds, it's good to see college stations are!! A hearty Regaze Route welcome to the many new reporters and many thanks to those who have been with us all along. . .Which brings me to some observations and realizations about reggae music and its relation to the US music industry. For almost two years, the *Reggae Route* has attempted to spotlight reggae music—indicate which songs and artists are more sultable for commercial stations, which ones are rootsier and which songs are club oriented. We've attempted to strip away the mystery and stigma reggae seems to have and bring it more into the mainstream. The college radio network, as well as musicians, managers, producers and small indies that have united through these pages is unbelievable. The support and channels that have been established and developed are most rewarding and encouraging. However, the point of the *Reggae Route's* placement within the pages of CMJ New Music Report was to reach further—to go beyond the "roots" community and get through to major labels and commercial radio programmers. In that sense, the *Reggae Route* has *not* been a success, as I have discovered that many of these organizations simply don't care. They have more established artists on their rosters—more active and harmless. It is therefore not surprising that additional promotional support is not allocated for the reggae releases. They claim that reggae doesn't sell—but have they given it a fair chance? Has reggae product ever been given the attention and budgetary

promotion support that rock/new music acts get? I don't think so. It amazes me that labels continue to sign reggae acts and continue to go no further than that. What's the point? Who's kidding who? If you've gone to the trouble and expense to sign a group, then you should see it through to the latter stages of marketing and breaking it. In another sense, this brings us back to the whole question of college radio's impact. Perhaps the majors don't think that college radio counts, and that there's no need to service them with reggae product. Wasn't it a similar situation in the late '70s when college staions aired new music shows as only a small segment of their block programming. Bands such as the Police, B-52's, Talking Heads, Human League, Stray Cats, R.E.M. and UZ were discovered on these programs. The point is that there's already a network in existence, yet the majors seem to scoff at its ability to have any influence on the buying and listening public. Reggae music is always given a fight in this country—there are always roadblocks. To paraphrase a current reggae hit by Paul Blake & the Bloodfire Posee "We're just rub-a-dub soldiers fighting to keep the rockers alive." Why fight—Can't we all band together and give reggae music the fair chance it's been longing for for so long. If, after a concerted effort on the behalf of the labels, stations, promoters, etc., there's still no substantial sales figures, then, maybe then, I'll put my case to rest. Let's work together towards that day when reggae is treated like any other music. Take a course from Steel Pulse in "reggaetology." The education will blow your mind. ...for all those who've been supportive participants in the *Reggae Route*, give thanks.

Instead, this station will support those companies such as Warners, PolyGram, Arista, etc. which do not allow the big computer in the sky to run their firms. I'm sure the mechanical folks at CBS are literally shaking in their shoes at this dire threat from a little college radio station in Arkansas. But, if other college stations would join us in this boycott, CBS might listen. I'm tired of my jocks having to buy Columbia albums just so we can play the music our audience wants. HE LAST WORD

Welcome to New York—the only city where the convention follows the election. We have quite a lot planned for everyone this weekend—enough to keep you occupied 24 hours a day in the city that never sleeps. One bit of advice: make use of this convention, don't let it use you. There is much opportunity to learn and teach, and much fun to be had, but don't let one overwhelm the other. We want everyone to get a lot out of this weekend, and to go home satisfied, but not drained or exhausted. Have a good time, but get out alive.

In the spirit of the election, we seek to set the tone for the convention. We have always advocated "progressive" media concepts: those rooted in the present, with an understanding of the past, and looking toward the future. At the core of the progressive ideal is freedom—most specifically freedom of choice. It is a constant source of amazement and frustration to us that radio programmers everywhere have chosen not to choose their own style, air sound and records. By giving up that freedom they have willingly forfeited creativity and expression for easy profit, with nether a thought as to social consequences

The entertainment media—and rock and roll in particular—has a long-standing tradition of being at the forefront of change and social rebellion. It is those artists and critics who break from popular expectations and express themselves freely through the free media who earn their rightful place in history. While market considerations have always been there, they have rarely (if ever) served to completely stifle free expression in and of itself. Today, the lack of creative art and media that is available to the average entertainment consumer has fallen so low that it stands to numb an entire generation's perception of creativity—to the extent that creative, free expression is perceived as something undesirable, or bad.

When relating this to contemporary rock, we find most of the new bands emerging today have gleaned their chops from post-Led Zeppelin radio, and have little choice but to emulate that sound. The one breakthrough that occured over the last decade, the punk/new wave movement, was actively fought by a conditioned, frightened music industry until it went away or was co-opted to fit other modes. We are grateful for those few super-talented artists from that era who did break—they represent hope for the future. This is hardly a satisfying consolation, however. The digression from forward thought is so pervasive today that many bands have turned to the '60s, '50s and even '40s for inspiration, since there is so little to be found today. Must we go back nearly a half-century to satisfy our creative juices?

When Bruce Springsteen shouts "Let Freedom Ring" before launching into "Born To Run," he is not equating rock and roll with freedom. To him, rock and roll is freedom—of expression, of thought, of life—the free feeling he first felt seeing Elvis perform on TV in the early '60s and has embraced ever since

Owners, General Managers, Program Directors, Music Directors, club people, video people, press and DJs: think about freedom when choosing your formats, songs and reviews. The entertainment media has always been at the cutting edge of political and social movements for change. Give America's free thinkers—musicians, writers, artists and TV/video/filmmakers—the chance to express themselves: expose their wares! We are not advocating revolt here nor trying to be overly preachy; we're merely cheering activism: "vigorous action to achieve political or social goals." Media people who believe that freedom is not just to be used but to be exercised have a responsibility to themselves and their listeners, viewers and readers to express that philosophy. Freedom of expressionespecially in light of world affairs in the mid-'80s—is too precious a privilege to give up! Quoting Springsteen again: "You have to fight for [freedom] every day." It's the American Way. Amen.

STUFF: Our thanks to WSIA for putting together a very pleasant and constructive "Metro New York Radio Workshop" on October 27, attended by 100 or so area college radio people. Frankly, we were stunned by the vivaciousness of those in attendance. Nearly everyone had ideas and expressed them easily and articulately. For a first effort it ran quite smoothly, too. We look forward to more such gatherings. . . Kate Bush has (finally) announced the winners of last year's EMI sponsored "Win a trip to meet Kate" contest: they are Rick Winward and Brett Hallett of KXLU. . . Rock magazine has inaugurated a "Musician's Corner" in which recording artists review a current album of their choice. October's issue features Eddle Money reviewing Prince's Purple Rain; November will see Peter Buck of R.E.M. review the Replacements LP Let It Be; and in December David Bowie's album Tonight will be reviewed by Martha Davis of the Motels... Rock Photo magazine, a publication of Modern Photography magazine, has hit the stands. What separates this magazine from most is intelligence. There are features on ten top rock photographers: Lynn Goldsmith, Bob Gruen, Pennie Smith, Richard Aaron, Chuck mosts intelligence. There are reatures on ten top rock photographers. Lynn Goldsmith, Bold Grueri, Fettine Smith, Inchard Aaroli, Cridch Pulin, Deborah Feingold, Ebet Roberts, Andy Summers, Storm Thorgerson and Newil Zlozower; and most are quite well written, showing how some rely on traditional technique and others on pure instinct. There's also a pretty basic guide to rock photography covering cameras, lenses, upkeep, exposure and the like. And there's some great pictures, too....Video producer Ken Walz took two major prizes at this year's International Film and Television Festival for his work on Cyndi Lauper's "Girl Just Want To Have Fun" and "Time After Time." The "Grand Award Trophy Bowl" honored the best of all videos submitted, and he won the Gold Medal for "Best Videos in A Series," his third Gold. ... A 12" of Romeo Vold's "Stones" Sould "Irma Own," remixed by David Kahne and Francois Kevorkian, is due November 28. . . Rounder has signed Louisiana's "Queen Of Soul," Irma Thomas. An LP is due in early 1985. . . Columbia is planning a promotional Springsteen 12" with "Born In The U.S.A."
