# JACKPOT!

Essential New Music—As chosen by NMR's editorial staff. These records demand your attention.

### Jackpot!

MEKONS Rock 'N' Roll (TwinlTone, c/o A&M, 1416 N.LeBrea Ave., Hollywood, CA 90028)—The many incarnations of the band called the Mekons have traveled a rough and ragged road from their origins in the punk uprising of 1977 to this sprawling rock manifesto of spirited anarchy. Last year's wonderful So Good It Hurts let us in on a side of these hooligans no one would have guessed existed, and Rock 'N' Roll, their seventh album, is another step beyond. From the roaring guitars of "Memphis, Egypt"—sorta like Motorhead meets Richard Thompson to moan about Elvis—to the meldings of fiddle and accordion throughout that scream of the country and Cajun music they love, this is a darkly sinister yet exhilarating trip. Special mention must be made of "Learning To Live On Your Own," a haunting song distinguished by the mesmerizing vocals of Sally Timms, and "Empire Of The Senseless," a rousing attack on the state of the union. Led by founding members Jon Langford and Tom Greenhalgh, the Mekons have finally given us their take on Rock 'N' Roll, and while they may not re-invent it, damn, it still sounds great.

EAT Sell Me A God (Mercury, c/o PolyGram, 825 Eighth Ave., New York, NY 10019)—Brewing one of most mysterious and heady concotions to emerge from England in recent years, Eat stirs some delta mud and a twist of Butthole Surfers or The Fall, into the resin of heavy Cream and Zeppelin blues comingling in their cauldron, bubbling up a molten hot mixture of heavy, droning ether ragas and dark, drenching riffs. While lurching, thundering, lulling drums battle it out with wailing, soul-screeching guitars and dripping slide, lead singer Ange twists everything with an eerie, sinister bent and his menacing, Midnight Rambler persona. Sometimes Eat manages to rub the goopy muck off and emerge from the fog to unleash some unrelenting, upbeat funk ("Stories," "Things I Need"), but even then they owe more to "Trampled Underfoot" than to anything else. Copping the feel of Zep without needing a screeching blond-maned vocalist or borrowing hokey Valhala imagery—what emerges is real weight, heavy body music that sways and shakes you, that physically feels good to listen to. Somewhere in the distorted, distended guitar licks and evil, descending sounds of "Tombstone," "Mr. And Mrs. Smack" or "Electric City," weird swamp gasses bubble to the surface of black waters, death deals are cut in back rooms, and shadowed figures stand with guitars at the windblown crossroads, waiting. Eat also wins the prize for the Seriously Weirdest Lyric Of The Month: "I saw the fatman do the shimmy/And he shimmied like he didn't give a shit."

JOE STRUMMER Earthquake Weather (Epic, 51 W. 52nd St., New York, NY 10019)—Except for some largely forgettable sound-tracks and an aborted acting career, it's been a while since we heard from Joe Strummer, but now he's returned to pick up the torch where The Clash let it drop after Combat Rock, melding politics, punk and the roots of black music. Strummer's voice, drenched in slapback echo a la London Calling, remains both as unmistakable and unintelligible as ever, acting as guide to 12 diary-like sketches, a travelogue of desert motel rooms, Chinatown sweatboxes, third world embassies, and the back seats of plush limousines. The raw, rough sound works in Strummer's favor, giving the songs an edge to match the venom of his impassioned vocals. Like an old Stones album or The Clash at their peak, Strummer brings together an astounding diversity of styles and pulls it off, island-hopping from reggae ("Ride Your Donkey") to funk ("Slant Six," "Boogie With Your Children") to soul to lounge-jazz (a Tom Waits nod on "Leopard Skin Limosines") to calypso, all without losing his distinctive sound. From the seediest red light district in Hong Kong to the pale neon of the Strip, from tenements to the conference rooms of world powers, Strummer makes you feel like you've been there, and turns in his strongest music since the days that made him famous.

GLASS EYE Hello Young Lovers (Bar/None, c/o Restless, 11264 Playa Ct., P.O. Box 3628, Culver City, CA 90231-3628)—Now realigned in their original line-up (Saga: drummer and bassist quit the band, then their replacements quit, and the originals subsequently rejoined and everybody was happy), Glass Eye spins twisted pop that positively bristles with looseness and genuine eccentricity. Half a jazz fusion version of Game Theory, half Austin's version of the Minutemen, Glass Eye continues to defy easy categorization—even trying to pinpoint influences as each song progresses from verse to bridge to chorus can be tricky. Bringing a twangy, funky, almost art-rock sensibility to their jagged, unorthodox pop structures—a straight, quirky post-collegiate pop song suddenly will break down into a noodly jam, which will gradually meander and twist its way back into the tune—the Eye bedazzles and confounds, even weaving in the spontaneity and free expression of jazz to brighten up the second side. Whether it's a slow, violin-laden, bluesy chugger like "In The Glass" or a wigged-out fIREHOSE jazzbo jam like "Land Of People," Glass Eye leapfrogs styles with unpredictable, gleeful abandon. Noodliness aside, the Eye still crafts great melodies that nab the listener hook, line and sinker, as one listen through "White Walls" or "Hoedown" shows.








SLINT Tweez (Jennifer Hartman, P.O. Box 409302, Chicago, IL 60640)—The last time we checked, there were at least a dozen bands (including Squirrel Bait itself) that could claim at least one Squirrel Bait alumnus among their membership. Judging on the strength of this LP, Slint is one of the finest of the clutch, their debut surfacing as one of most numbingly splendid on this year's map. Tweez is a deliberate, rangy, precisely calculated and primarily instrumental spree, lumbering with robotic stealth over an emotionally repressed plane, filling the heart up with a pitiless logic and the ears with a righteously stern, crisp metal groove; in fact, the determined, knife-twisting pace and terse rhythms owe as much to something like Gore as to the bands they've played in or around in indie U.S.A. The vocal stream-of-mutter is used as acerbic narration superimposed upon music, which often splits from its armor-clad path into clear, surefooted and repetitive flight, marching into improvised, almost jazzy-sounding realms while retaining a clinical feel, the factors in Slint's chemistry making them too odd and nerdy for the strictly metal-minded, but too symmetrically powerful to fit within the "grunge" axis. Both guitarists play with a Bodhisatva's inner calm while drums and bass are straight and cold as a dead pulse, reverberating boldly forward. Distant, glittering and perfect as a distant sun, Tweez expands and fills with each listen. Top cuts: "Charlotte," "Warren" and "Ron."

WILL AND THE BUSHMEN Will And The Bushmen (SBK, 1290 Ave. of the Americas, New York, NY 10104)—Drawing from their Southern roots, Will And The Bushmen combine the influences of rock, blues and soul to form their singular pop style. Hailing from Mobile, AL, the original trio were joined by drummer Bryan Owings upon their move to Nashville, and have steadily been winning over fans on the roadhouse circuit ever since. With almost five years on the road and a self-produced album behind them, Will And The Bushmen have made the big move to the majors with this eponymous SBK debut filled with the exuberance that garnered so much attention in their home turf. While the sound is not overbearing or overpowering, it is solidly crafted with a tamed rowdiness sometimes reminiscent of Jason And The Scorchers, with a joyful side that recalls the humor and pop smarts of the Turtles. Produced by Richard Gottehrer, who has credits dating back 20 years (he's worked with Blondie, Marshall Crenshaw and Royal Crescent Mob), Will And The Bushmen have created an inspired collection of songs that come across with a good time feel. Check out "500 Miles," "Typical World," "Kimberley Stews," "Blow Me Up" and "Three Girls From Detroit."

KANDA BONGO MAN Kwassa Kwassa (Hannibal, c/o Carthage, P.O. Box 667, Rocky Hill, NJ 08553/609-466-9320)—He's big, he's bad, he's the Kanda Bongo Man—and he's also the biggest star of soukous, the hottest, newest, most rapidly rising dance music craze out of Africa. Driven by the peppery pulse of a hypnotic percussive attack and fueled by the nimble fingers of guitarist Diblo and his agile, bouncing guitar breaks (his own solo LP on Shanachie was reviewed in NMR #179), soukous combines elements of rhumba, juju and pop into a groove-heavy rhythm invention that's notoriously irresistible. On top of ten utterly infectious neo-African melodies with simple, repetitious basslines just built for the dance floor, Kanda Bongo Man leads the way with his soaring, lyrical singing topping the call-and-responses of the other singers (but why, oh why, isn't there a lyric sheet with decent translations?). The non-peppy need not apply, but if you've got any blood at all pumping in your veins, chances are you'll dig the hypnotic, swaying soukous beat, too. In his homeland of Zaire, Kanda Bongo Man is quite the local legend from his fervent live performances with his band Loketo (the name loosely translated means "shake your hips"), and now the time has finally come for Kanda and Co. to spread the soukous gospel far and wide. Shake your hips to "Sai," "Lela-Lela," "Lowazo" or "Ebeneza."





CHRISTY MOORE Voyage (Atlantic, 75 Rockefeller Plaza, New York, NY 10019)—In his home country, Irish singer/songwriter/protest singer Christy Moore is regarded almost as highly as fellow poet/songsmith Van Morrison; when it comes to melodic, topical, lyrically pointed songwriting, Moore is one of the few names we've ever encountered who could share the same stage (or even the same sentence) and receive favourable comparisons with the almighty Van The Man. While many still tend to think of Moore as a more traditional Irish folk bard, here he steps slightly away from that image (note the difference between the cover art of his last LP and the almost Anton Corbijn-like photos on this LP), stepping confidently into a fuller, more modern sound. Aided by cameos from sources as unlikely as Sinead O'Connor ("Middle Of The Island") and Elvis Costello ("Missing You"), Moore branches out from his more folkish roots to take the aged, weatherbeaten forms into the future. On songs like the fine "Musha, God Help Her," "The Mad Lady & Me," or the Chernobyl-inspired "Farewell To Pripchat" (one of the best anti-nuclear protest songs ever penned), Moore moves between wistful lyricism and the outright feistiness of protest, accompanying his deeply resonant, thickly-accented voice with accordion, harmonica, mandolin, and ever-present, ever-melancholy acoustic guitars.

NEIL YOUNG Freedom (Reprise, 3300 Warner Blvd., Burbank, CA 91510)—Riding high on the crest of a wave of notoriety for his elusive, ultra-obscure Japanese CD-only job, significantly titled Eldorado (don't even bother calling Reprise; it's strictly a Japan-only disc with no imminent release date here—some smuggled copies have been seen for sale at over \$75!), Neil has instead chosen to release Freedom here, and both show that Young is clearly on a roll these days—both releases show him returning to peak form. While Eldorado glistens of gold, cranking electric guitars to decadent, deliciously sinful highs, Freedom is more varied, subdued and acoustic in flavor, as Young the balladeer turns in several winsome Harvest-like melodies, strumming heartily on his battered acoustic and warbling away in that familiar, instant-cringe voice, as on the lengthy, convoluted and Dylanesque "Crime In The City" or the quiet "Ways Of Love." Meanwhile, the electric single version of "Rockin' In The Free World" and one or two of the few songs which appear on both (like "Don't Cry") show Neil the rocker kicking out the jams the hardest he has in years. We also dig the piano-soaked "Wrecking Ball" and be sure to check out the ultra-mega-heavy cover of "Broadway," but still, you'll have to strike gold and find an import to hear the real prize, the killer "Cocaine Eyes."

SLY AND ROBBIE Silent Assassin (Island, 14 E. 4th St., 3rd Floor, New York, NY 10012)—If they could ever figure out a way to program a drum machine or computer to lay down a groove as full of machine-like precision and pumping blood as Sly And Robbie do, someone would make themselves very rich indeed. Arguably the world's tightest rhythm section, Sly Dunbar (drums) and Robbie Shakespeare (bass) have turned in dozens of stellar performances on albums by the likes of Grace Jones, Joan Armatrading, Black Uhuru and the Rolling Stones, and have provided the pulse for literally countless reggae sessions. While in the past Sly And Robbie have always exuded a mean hitman-style toughness, this time they augment their street-mean image and Prohibition-era gangster suits by bringing in streetwise rappers like Young M.C. and KRS-One (who produced the LP and ends up stealing much of the limelight for himself) to add their toughness and savvy on top of the rhythm killers' chops and deep grooves (though points are deducted for a handful of utterly inane raps like "Everybody wave your hands in the air like you just don't care and say 'Hell, YEAHHHH' '). More grooves than actual songs, we dug into "Steppin" (which cops a lick from the Meters), "Rebel" and "Adventures Of A Bullet." Look out, homeboys and girls, Jamaica's hottest rhythm section has just turned it up another notch.

MEAT PUPPETS Monsters (SST, P.O. Box 1, Lawndale, CA 90260)—This one gets right back to where the Pups' heads should've stayed—detailing the miracles that often are found right where you prop your feet, noodling into Castenada horizons, and whereas before they'd simply travel for the trip itself, now they also think out the arrival. The Arizona trio has honed down and cleaned up, giving those sunsplashed guitars the room to diddle and roam, a reminder of how the Kirkwood brothers have made ornate instrumental breaks sound as effortless and unrushed as a summer brook, with a lazy, laughing inspiration that's immediately recognizable and welcome. That familiar Puppets hallmark joins Monsters' newly alert attention to writing, and on the bulk of the album the Pups scorch like nobody's business; they come on like ZZ Top in one song ("Flight Of The Fire Weasel") and ramble into a commercial-ready skydive like the title track or "Strings On Your Heart," in which they plug ticklish guitar parts into a direct-hit riff, successfully incorporating their sound into a hatful of songs that hammer too loud and fast to ignore. Monsters is more of a direct progression from Up On The Sun's addled good humor than the records that actually followed it, giving us plenty of reasons to applaud a return-to-form that also carries with it the wit and gumption to smash open previously unassailable ears.

TRACY CHAPMAN Crossroads (Elektra, 75 Rockefeller Plaza, New York, NY 10019)—In the wake of the triumphant musical and marketplace success of her self-titled debut, one would think it next to impossible for Tracy Chapman to again capture the hearts and minds of the public in such a strong and uncompromising fashion as she did last year—such was her acclaim that her downcast face and jumbo Spanish guitar became the instantly recognizable image of what to many was "the year of the female singer/songwriter." Well, sure enough, a year later she returns, honing and refining her art to produce a second batch of modern folk melodies that rivals and might even surpass the promises of her auspicious debut. Again produced with steady hands and a lot of heart by David Kershenbaum, Crossroads features some of Chapman's most hauntingly beautiful vocals to date (Joan Armatrading comparisons are inevitable), as she continues to address the deeply personal, soul-baring topics that first set her apart (the titles "Material World," "Freedom Now" and "All That You Have Is Your Soul" reveal the album's most prevalent subject matter) with only slightly more instrumentation than before—it's still not really necessary to her impact. More a reaffirmation and solidification of her vocal and songwriting stature than a move forward to new ground, Crossroads offers more of the startling honesty and urgency that made her debut so special.

MILES DAVIS Aura (Columbia, 51 W. 52nd St., New York, NY 10019)—Recorded in Copenhagen in 1984, one wonders after listening to this two-LP set why on Earth it remained unreleased for so long; not only does Aura present us with a fitting tribute to the man with the horn, but it also gives us an overview of the important (pardon the pun) milestones of Davis' career, and could very well rank as one of the best recent Davis LPs. Dispensing with his usual fusiony collaborator Marcus Miller, this set of ten pieces was composed by Palle Mikkelborg as a portrait of the legendary trumpeter (each is named "after a color in Miles' aura"), but more importantly it also serves as a recapitulation of Miles' entire musical career, underscoring in its compactness all of his gargantuan contributions to the world of jazz. From his cool days to his groundbreaking work with Gil Evans and later pioneering of fusion realms, Aura leads us through the dark labyrinth of Miles' universe, from the red heat at the heart of the sun to the stone cold of interstellar blue, touching all temperatures and moods in between. John McLaughlin shines again on guitar, adding eerily futuristic, icelike fills into the vacuum between Miles' disjointed trumpet blasts. Sounding his best in years, Miles' horn speaks, shouts, cries and breathes, a fine return for the most identifiable voice the trumpet has ever had.

GANG GREEN Older... (Emergo, 225 Lafayette St., Suite 709, New York, NY 10012)—Like your favorite bartender, Gang Green goes to work when everybody else's work is done, making sure that someone keeps the red, white and blue beer banner flying high. And like the corner watering hole they've gone beyond being just a beery bunch of puds in a postcore band to become, well, kind of an *institution* (regulars, we guess) in bars everywhere. Gang Green's records are not usually measured in terms of maturity, but in terms of passing the various sobriety tests they are confronted with every night—walking a straight line to the stage, somehow getting that guitar strap around their shoulder, standing upright for 45 minutes, and the like—but, this time, dare we say it, the boys who adopted the Budweiser logo as their own show there's more to life than just the party—there's the reason you party, as Boston's favorite beer-swilling buddies return with their most ambitious and foamy project yet. However transparent this newfound maturity may seem, and though we'd still hesitate to call them "sensitive" or "artistes," the Greenies show their maturity by even tackling a "Ballad"—well, actually, it's more like they kinda grab it weakly by the knees. Raise your mugs in a toast to these hits: "Tear Down The Walls," "Bedroom Of Doom," and "Church Of Fun."



7 SECONDS Soulforce Revolution (Restless, 11264 Playa Court, P.O. Box 3628, Culver City, CA 90231-3628)—Once you got them to listen to the lyrics, this could be one postcore album that you could probably even get your parents to like. In the slam pit of early '80s post punk, only Naked Raygun could come up with better hooks or more socially conscious "whoa-oh/whoa-oh" lyrics, but 7 Seconds, like an ultra-positive, polar-opposite twin to the stark cynicism and disturbing vision of the Raygun, offers fresh air and hope shining even in the darkest of slam melees. On Soulforce Revolution, we find this straightedge-tightened popcore trio turning in 11 rousing anthems for clean living, injecting their music with high-powered funk venom, furious speed, and an urgent, almost desperate message of optimism—one almost gets the feeling that the reason why they play so fast is because they're really worried that the world might end before they finish their set. Steve Youth hollers his rousing, breathless call-to-arms vocals over the pink fuzz of his hyperflanged post-Husker guitar lines, and there're plenty of "whoa-oh-oh"s and "yeah-yeah"s for you to bellow along with; while they also turn in the occasional sensitive ballad ("Soul To Keep"), the Seconds are at their best when they just let the riffs rip out and work up a positive sweat as they do on "Swansong," "Satyagraha" and "I Can Sympathize."

EGGPLANT Monkeybars (Dr. Dream, 60 Plaza Square, Orange, CA 92666)—Out of step, singular, unconcerned with fashion, and cutting totally against the grain, Eggplant aren't concerned with the trends, they're just too busy filling their own little niche to worry about the the toys of the other kids on the playgound. They also somehow manage to resemble their purplish, lumpy namesake in the vegetable kingdom, in that while there might be lots of things that are kind of close, there still isn't anything else out there quite like them—one could go on making comparisons all day. Kinda goofy, kinda sarcastic, awfully playful, and kinda endearing in a funloving, geeky kind of way (a Young Fresh Fellows influence is obvious), Eggplant infuses a wistful, poppy melodicism with a childlike naivete that recalls Jonathan Richman's more recent penny arcade, ice cream-truck records. Specializing in sprightly melodies set to light, strummy guitar accompaniment ("Rolling Stones," "Goin' To Maine") or the occasional Meat Puppets-gone-on-luau feel of "A Sunder On The Sun," Eggplant's California Camper Van Quirkiness sometimes takes that zaniness out to the end of the tether, reaching almost Uncle Bonsai-ish extremes, most notably on their semi-straight cover of Lou Reed's "Vicious."

WORLD OF POOH The Land Of Thirst (Nuf Sed Lubrication, P.O. Box 591075, San Francisco, CA 94159)—World Of Pooh is a state of being shared by three Bay Areans; Barbara Manning, Brandan Kearney, and powerhouse drummer Jay doing more than his share of pounding. WOP's first record, two years in the making (with parts also found on a hard-to-find cassette), is a six-legged holiday of sweetly insistent songs, alternating between fragility and effervescence with brains and heart pushed way out front, a simple affair of interlocking, assertive rhythms that pulsate and pounce on a joyous beat. Every song has a sparkling, catchy quality somewhat similar to The Clean or the bouncier Flying Nun groups, that snatch and pester in the brain rather than coax and simmer in a more subdued Feelies way, while there's also a healthy Rain Parade breeze within the weaviness and the boy/girl doublecroon of Barbara and Brandan that finds its East Coast kin in the warbling of Yo La Tengo. Playing in the chain-link manner but writing songs that are pointed and bright, World Of Pooh are uncategorically fresh and very human within the bounds of post-paisley underground strum, pulling together songs that consistently ring true and never venture too far into jangle or brood territory, but strike their own peculiar wobble that never hits a wrong note. Our favorite pieces of Pooh are "Playing One's Own Piano," "Somewhere Soon," "Scissors" (originally on Barbara's recent solo LP) and "I'm On The Wrong Side."

COLD CUT What's That Noise? (Tommy Boy, c/o Reprise, 3300 Warner Blvd., Burbank, CA 91510)—"This is a journey into sound" was Cold Cut's calling card throughout the summer of 1986, as it wormed its way through their famous Ofra Haza-heavy remix of Eric B. & Rakim's "Paid In Full." Now England's most popular dynamic duo of mixologists (of records, not drinks) are back with their own debut LP, and sure enough it features more samples than the Fuller Brush man (The Jetsons? Flip Wilson? Isaac Hayes? Tarzan?), and more cuts than the NFL pre-season. You want Cold Cuts? Try these slices: start with "Stop This Crazy Thingi" (featuring Junior Reid) or "Smoke Dis One" (with Queen Latifah), a couple of the hipper recent Cold Cut creations—but whatever you do, don't just pigeonhole this as another rap/dance record—check out the serious weirdness of Mark E. Smith's cameo on "(I'm) In Deep" or the dada mambo collage of the title track, and you'll quickly see that there's a lot more here than just beats and scratches and lengthy remixes. Also dig on "Beats And Pieces," a "Close (To The Edit)"-style assortment of big booming beats and sampled snippets culled from God-knows-where, and, as a bonus, the CD contains the first-ever digital appearance of the ever-popular Cold Cut mix of "Paid In Full," here slyly retitled as "Not Paid Enough."

DIE WARZAU Disco Rigido (Mercury, c/o PolyGram, 825 Eighth Ave., New York, NY 10019)—Now that Ministry's Alain Jourgenson seems to have turned in his industrial-strength samplers and synth grooves for a sadomasochistic metal guitar crunch, Die Warzau could be poised to fill the void on dancefloors bereft of the robotic, ear-bleeding technogrind that Jourgenson pioneered and much of the wiry-haired, black-clad nocturnal Chicago underground still craves. Though not always as heavy or grating as their Wax Trax and Play It Again Sam counterparts—only a few of these songs conjure images of bodies being dragged through the teethy metal gears of some hideous machine—there's still a bit of a jarring edge to the vocals and militant factorylike beats of "Jackhammer" or "Shakedown," and any song with a title like "Man Is Meat" obviously ain't no moon/June lullaby. While there are a few more commercial-ready exceptions like "Welcome To America," most of this album takes place within the landscape of a bizarre netherworld of windowless buildings, grinding, humming, punchcard-run machines, and disembodied, robotic voices—Die Warzau rips and shreds and grates with the metallic fury and fervor of a cannery run amok. Top cuts: "Welcome To America," "National Security," and the CD and cassette bonus track "Free Radio Africa."

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DANIEL LANOIS

CHEB KHALED WITH SAFY BOUTELLA Kutche (Intuition, c/o Capitol, 1750 N. Vine St., Hollywood, CA 90028)—At last, music from outside the U.S./U.K. axis finally stands a chance of passing beyond fad status or the hands of a handful of transplanted North Africans and explorative music cognoscenti; tracing its roots from songs of nomadic Bedouin herders of North Africa, rai music is one of the fastest-breaking new sounds to sweep the west from foreign shores. While much of Algeria's rai output often degenerates into cheesy disco, Cheb Khaled's Kutche stands tall as music on its own ground; cuts like "La Camel," "Kutche," "Baroud" or "Hana-Hana" have more in common with Peter Gabriel's So or a mid-period Talking Heads project than they do with most international music of today. Never mind that on first listen you can't understand anything Khaled (the Cheb preface simply means "young") might be singing about, and never mind the strangeness of the minor-key scales with which he intones his limber, rapid-fire vocal gymnastics; just focus on the grooves, the beats, the sounds, and the unbridled passion and soul of the singer. Remember, in a culture built upon deeply traditional views stretching back almost 1000 years, with a youth population of almost 75% rising up to question that system, rai is fueled by the same rebellious spirit and body-conscious beat that moves rock and roll. Ya Rai!

BEAT HAPPENING Black Candy (K, Box 7154, Olympia, WA 98507)—Beat Happening's third LP finds them as winsome as ever and durably ensconsed in the same gingerbread house that's sheltered them so well in the past, only now they've upped the amplification to shake some icing from the ceiling. The sound of this album is immediately recognizable, their warm and helplessly individual nature croaking out of Calvin's and Heather's voices, singing lyric forms as distinct and memorable an image as a childhood snapshot. Their songwriting has taken strides every record, with every release getting a bit testier, and Black Candy is no exception, Calvin's guitar whipping around some fiendishly fuzzy gyrations and misbehaving with slithery glee. A few songs get recklessly close to prehippie Pac Northwest shimmy ("Pajama Party In A Haunted Hive" or the title track) but the candor and simplicity that's the husk and kernel of Beat Happening isn't disguised for an instant, the increase of distortion and the naughtier tone merely resulting in a change of mood, not a bend in genre. The morning dew charm of "Cast A Shadow" will melt the foam off your milkshake, beer or antacid, stripped-down guitar and drums pinning down small and elusive moments of importance, and although they don't go for coyness or preciousness, they do crystallize the ordinary pleasures of everyday life and allow you to value their music as highly as they value those overlooked treasures.

DANIEL LANOIS Acadie (Opal, c/o Warner Bros., 3300 Warner Blvd., Burbank, CA 91505)—Between recording the Neville Brothers' and Bob Dylan's last albums, producer Daniel Lanois (it's pronounced "Lan-wah") took up residence in a weatherbeaten blue house in New Orleans' Garden District to lay down solo tracks in his "Studio On The Move," and invited a stellar cast of his alumni and friends—among them Brian Eno, Mason Ruffner, Aaron Neville, and the rhythm sections of U2 and the Neville Brothers—to help out. The word here is ambiance (so much that headphones are almost a requirement to soak it all in), as each track offers up thick atmospheres heavily laden with humidity and swampy echo. Though it's interesting to hear Lanois apply his echo-drenched cathedral sound to several serene, vaguely Cajun and French-feeling melodies, Acadie's real joy lies in trying to figure out whose influence pulls and plays on which tracks—for instance, the brooding "Still Water" reveals shades of U2, while "The Maker" is driven by a distinctive Neville groove. Whether he's cutting through the frostscape of "Ice," steering a pirouge through the steamy, sultry heat of the bayou ("Joli Louise"), or basking in the white light of Aaron Neville's angelic falsetto on "Amazing Grace" (basically an outtake from Yellow Moon), Lanois paints pictures that reveal his own identity, no matter who or where he may be recording.





TEARS FOR FEARS The Seeds Of Love (Fontana, c/o PolyGram, 825 Eighth Ave., New York, 10019)—After one of those extended four-year hiatuses that tend to follow mega-platinum successful second LPs, the nebulous outfit of Roland Orzabal and Curt Smith—now expanded with the contributions of bassist Nicky Holland and others—returns triumphantly to the scene with a mature, warm LP that proves itself to be well worth the wait. Aided and abetted by such luminaries as Phil Collins and Manu Katche (drums), Robbie McIntosh (guitar) and Jon Hassell (trumpet), TFF have advanced beyond their original sound—almost the only thing that identifies this band as the same one from "Shout" and "Pale Shelter" is Roland Orzabal's distinctive, instantly recognizable vocals (and even those have changed, growing deeper and more resonant, and augmented by several charismatic and chilling background vocals from Oleta Adams). The only real drawback would be their aversion to editing (even the single "The Seeds Of Love" clocks well over five minutes—it would have been perfect at three and a half) and a tendency to let songs run too long (but then again, if you spend four years working on eight pop songs, presumably you get a lot of ideas!). Though they've never officially broken up or been away, The Seeds Of Love is a welcome return of one of the '80s most celebrated songwriting teams.

JIMMY CLIFF Images (Cliff, c/o Vision, 13385 West Dixie Highway, North Miami, FL 33161/305-893-9191)—It's refreshing, after dabbling with several widely commercialized attempts at hybrids of reggae and slick radio pop—something he's been guilty of as far back as 1970—to hear Jimmy Cliff returning to the more classic, groove-conscious style of pure reggae that he helped pioneer so long ago. The opening moments of "Turning Point" herald his return to a simple, classic sound; this is the vintage Cliff of the days of "The Harder They Come," and this spiritually and bodily uplifting reggae shows him in the best form he's had in years. Produced by Cliff with the steadfast Ansel Collins (himself almost as crucial a name as Cliff's), even the album's more commercial tunes (such as "Rebel In Me") wear their roots conspicuously, and are flavored just as heavily with traces of the calypso and ska origins of reggae as they are with nods to commerciality and the marketplace. Though occasionally Cliff slightly misses the mark, when he hits ("Turning Point," "No Justice," a re-recording of "Johnny Too Bad," originally from *The Harder They Come*), it's with an impact and force that shows he's still among the best; 22 years on, Cliff is still a contender, both an inventor and preserver of real reggae as it heads out of the '80s and toward its first quarter-century mark.

ADULT NET The Honey Tangle (Fontana, c/o PolyGram, 825 Eighth Ave., New York, NY 10019)—With a revolving troupe around her, Brix Smith, formerly of The Fall and nuptial partner of Mark E. Smith, has created the Adult Net, a band designed to give her more creative freedom than she had as a member of a full band. On her debut album, Smith revels in a girl-group-type sound with Bangles-like harmonies—layers of her own voice, actually—surrounding a largely acoustic backing. Her voice helps brings to mind the Primitives or Darling Buds, sans the powerchords that propel those outfits—this is a breezier, sunnier affair. While the effect doesn't stand up too well over the length of a full album, there are some tracks that would help make a drive through the chilling temperatures a bit more bearable, perhaps even bringing the temperature up a few degrees. "Take Me," which starts off the record, is one of those shining moments; others to check out are "Waking Up In The Sun," "August" and "Tomorow Morning's Daydream."

CHET BAKER My Favourite Songs: The Last Great Concert (Enja, c/o Mesa/Bluemoon, P.o. Box 5510, Glendale, CA 91221)—In an eerie, freakish set of coincidences, exactly two weeks to the day before his untimely and enigmatic death falling from a two-story window in Amsterdam, jazz trumpeter Chet Baker (whose life was recently documented in the movie Let's Get Lost) recorded a retrospective concert program for Radio Hamburg, returning to Baker's own personal favorite selections from throughout his career, rearranged and augmented by the support of both a big band and the austere Hannover Radio Orchestra. Here on Volume One, Baker starts out loose, blowing Miles Davis' "All Blues," warming up with style and effortless grace, then moving on to "My Funny Valentine," the tune which first gave the young trumpeter the spotlight in 1952. His hoarse voice glows like embers, exuding the warm romanticism that was his most popular trademark. This set of Monk, Brubeck, and Gershwin standards shows (sadly, now in retrospect) that Baker indeed was returning to form, playing again with the spirit and vigor of his youth. Though one may try and divorce these performances from the tabloid-ready events of two weeks later, the sad irony of this "dream concert" recording still looms, giving Baker's rasping vocals and mournful, sudbued trumpet cries a ring of even greater underlying sorrow and loss.

HELIOS CREED The Last Laugh (Amphetamine Reptile, 2541 Nicollet Ave. S., Minneapolis, MN 55404)—Helios Creed is back in time for the Chrome revival, flaring in the hands of a few influential types endowed with hindsight (Helios was the fearless guitarist/space explorer, just like now). This is his first LP since 1985's X-Rated Fairy Tales, although another LP recorded about a year ago should be released on Subterranean someday, and while this isn't as frighteningly dense, Mr. Creed has shadows of paranoia, strangers and hostile lands flickering from his strings, his icy-fingered touch accomplishing what a snuff movie and a faceful of mushroom spores would if you could stomach both simultaneously. Using past distortion pedal strategies that have transported him into alien dimensions so fluidly, Helios zooms into areas of greatest gravitational pull, flying heedless until the fuel tank runs dry. The songs are basically broken up jam sessions, with minimal vocals that are disorted beyond human recognition, and Jason Finn (drums) and Skin Yard's Daniel House (bass) provide much-needed anchoring to keep the bits from disappearing into the abyss. The squealing landscapes are completely fascinating, a whole world created for the listener to get completely disoriented in, an album that could've spilled over into hours without growing mundane. Radio waves: "Nirbasion Annasion," "Late Bloomer" and "Where The Children Are."

# JACKPOT! PLUS

KATE BUSH "Love And Anger" (12") (Columbia, 51 W. 52nd St., New York, NY 10019)—After what seems like years and years of expectation and waiting (could 1985's Hounds Of Love really have been so long ago?), at last it's here; after a lengthy exile and period of inactivity, Kate Bush is poised to unleash The Sensual World, a record which may yet prove to be the finest in her already illustrious career. Unlike much of Hounds Of Love's icelike hush or the muffled rumblings of "Experiment IV" (her last studio work to date), this track from The Sensual World bristles with vigor, electricity and life, showing one and all that Kate's not afraid to raise her voice when it comes to matters of love and anger. Fuelled by cascades of crashing guitars and a huge chanting chorus of backgound vocals hearkening back to The Dreaming, "Love And Anger" captures the power and sweetness of Kate Bush's voice and music.

HALO OF FLIES "Death Of A Fly" (7") (Amphetamine Reptile, 2541 Nicollet Ave. S., Minneapolis, MN 55404)—Screeching and squalling announces the death of Halo Of Flies, at least in the form appearing on this single, their last with drummer John Anglim. And while guitarist/vocalist Tom Hazelmyer leads his troops through thrusting, raw rock in a similar fashion to before, although this one seems just a little harsher than any previous tracks, (i.e.: "Fuck you, you ain't shit"). "Death Of A Fly" flexes the Flies' chaotic style of pulling together fuzzy, directional lunacy at the last possible moment before losing control. Like an accident about to happen, Halo Of Flies will level you!

PALE SAINTS "Barging Into The Presence Of God" (12") (4AD (UK), c/o 4AD, 611 Broadway, Suite 311, New York, NY 10012)—The first British signing in some time for the 4AD label, Pale Saints exemplify the kind of Brit-pop we expect will help carry us into the next decade. With razor-sharp guitars slicing through a bed of cotton candy vocals, "Sight Of You" surfs through the mind as if fueled by psychocandy, so seemingly blissful it's easy to look past the desperation concealed in the lyrics. The flip, "She Rides The Waves," picks up where Byrds-style beach blanket bingo left off, and the closing track, "Mother Might," has the dissonant hum of a beehive. The influences here are not uncommon ones in many an aspiring anglo or Anglophilic combo (the Slaughter Joe-involved Creation singles seem to be a launching point), still, the end result is quality pop for a new generation. Pale Saints overhaul pop of the past while meshing sounds for the future into the weave, and it's easy to get lost in its pallid trance.

THE TRAGICALLY HIP Up To Here-Let's not mince words. These guys could be rock 'n' roll greats. With just the right proportion of dangerous renegade attitude, an unbreakable band chemistry and oodles of raw talent that includes a frontman who recalls Jagger and Morrison in natural charisma and Iggy and Westerberg in passion. Canada's The Tragically Hip have the fixings to be HUGE. For their States de debut album (forget that self-produced teaser EP that came out earlier), this five man, two-quitar and teams with producer Don Smith (Keith Richards' Talk Is Cheap) for what has to be one of the best pure rock 'n' roll debut all ums since U2's Boy or The Pretenders. Even though this album's full of radio-ready AOR singles, college radio shouldn't overlook the Hip's unpretentious approach, gutsy, dowr 'n' dirty energy and intelligent songwriting-consider these guys a thinking man's Guns N' Roses with a sound that's deeply rooted in It's Only Rock 'N Rollperiod Stones but stripped of all the pomp. You like to rock? Well, if "Sha Didn't Know," "I'll Believe In You" and "Blow At High Dough" don't get yer ya ya's out then nothing will, and if the acoustic "Boots Or Hearts" doesn't touch you then maybe "Trickle Down" will make you "Happy." You can't possibly go wrong wherever you drop the needle, so jump in Up To Here and go deep.


NIHILIST Wall Of Hate (demo) (c/o Nihilist, 2180 Jane Lyle Rd., Smyrna, GA 30080)—In the past, Atlanta has been known for rock bands the likes of Mary My Hope, Guadalcanal Diary and Drivin' N' Cryin', with occasional underground jaunts by Neon Christ and DDT. Nihilist proves that not only is there a lot more to offer from Atlanta, but that it can be delivered in a meat truck. This bestial quartet unleashes brutality in European-styled thrusts of speed metal, with articulate lyrics to boot, and although the speed metal/crossover thing has been moon-stomped-on over and over in the past few years, Nihilist squeezes out some of the last originality left in this almost drowning scene. This four-song tape marks the debut of Zak Price actually singing, when in the past he rambled grunts, and of guitarist Joe Carpenter, who adds the metallic punch to the band. Also look for a previously-recorded track, "Infected," on Metal Blade's forthcoming Metal Massacre 10 compilation. Top cuts: "Warzone USA," "A.S.T." and the title track.

And don't forget to save those wrappers... Bazooka Joe is a trio of Baltimore sludge dabblers whose debut six-song EP, Two Thirds (Merkin, P.O. Box 16292, Baltimore, MD 21210), locks into a whole wall of the stuff and takes the plunge into a broody, discordant world where no one's at peace and no one's keeping it to themselves, either. Most of the songs lock onto one pulsation, like a combination of Loop's dazed repetitions and Trial's enveloping grayness, but there are scatterings of manic-depressive guitarwork by Jeffrey Caplin that add needed elaboration and articulation to the ensuing bad mood. On a few songs melody is approached tentatively, but for now we like them best when they grind out the migraine pain that gives a bottom to "Can Opener" and "Stephen"... Just don't call me... Late For Breakfast is an instrumental four-piece (with lots of "special guest" assistance) which creates a hybrid of funky perpetual beats that are kept up front and noticeable while a free and smooth horn section provides a modern jazz element. Box 4542, Arlington, VA 22204) flurries around with cornets, saxes, flugelhorns, etc., sweeping into almost conventional jazz mellowness only to toss in some eccentric keyboards or "incidental noise" (John Czlabotnik is responsible for that). These aren't ordinary students of the genre, with cuts like "Buffalo Wings" and "You've Got To Know Two Things To Be Confused" throwing about aerial improv and groundhumping grooves simultaneously, while "Blivit" rotates on a purer jazz cycle... Bring out your dead... Funeral Party carries on the old doom 'n' gloom mantle

on their self-titled demo, as per theirname, but they inject a sufficient amount of adrenalin into the gaunt old corpse to have it perform a new trick or two. Utilizing ringing, aloof Bunnymen-spawned guitar and keyboards to create a whirling dervish effect that has a certain pizzazz of its own, the songs are all quick-paced ("Battery Acid Prophet" actually cops the riff from the Dead Kennedys' "California Uber Alles"!) with the effect of a haunted merry-go-round ride. The most overwhelmingly goth aspect of the band lies in the sorcerer intonations of the lead vocalist, who never rises from his ominous register, with the lyrics likewise exploring the world of the macabre. On "She Dances," "Hunger" and "Pushing Up Daisies," they raise the Batcave spectre most effectively. (Available from Todd Sheehan, 85 Campbell Dr., Hampton, NH 03842/603-926-6514). . . It's a floorwax and a fanzine. . . The latest issue of Pseudo 'zine (c/o GGE Records, P.O. Box 5088, Kent, OH 44240) that we managed to unearth has an enclosed cassette that should appease any wanderers after that post-Ralph sound. The two bands featured, Plastic Eye Miracle and Art Control, have three songs between them that sing sweetly to hep 'n' happening larvae, with the former using an eerily cheesy combination of casio, cocktail lounge instruments, toys, ultramono recording quality and "They're Coming To Take Me Away" ish vocals to stir up images of a Cabaret/Eraserhead double bill. The latter group's one song ("Your Mother's A Hit") uses an epic movie musical riff as inspiration and climbs to a foaming pinnacle of hypnotic derangement somewhere between "Sex Bomb" and Renaldo The Loaf.





Ever try to picture a biker lost in a psychedelic acid trip while dreaming of some creepy horror movie which puts him In Heat? We didn't think so, but if you did, the Fuzztones horror movie which puts him In Heat? TIMBUK 3 Edge Of Allegiance (I.R.S.)

Emphasis Tracks: National Holiday, Standard White Jesus
"Bow down to the standard white Jesus on the cross/Then read the letters that the children write/To the standard white Santa Claus." That's the refrain from one of the most poignant songs from the latest Timbuk 3 long-playing sermon—a mix of bouncy, quirky and outright damning tunes that will make you think twice about living in America. The vision of Pat and Barbara K. MacDonald is one of "Acid Rain" and "Dirty Dirty Rice" rather than the squeaky clean image that's pushed by the government; while the duo's earlier efforts seemed humorous with a subversive underbelly, Edge Of Allegiance pulls no punches in its clear visions of the cracks in the system. The folky Austin duo makes a strong #44 debut at College/Non-Commercial and a 90-71 hop on the Commercial chart, making for a #42 CMJ Radio Top 100 debut—the #7 Radio Breakthrough. Record buyers seem to think that the *present's* so bright that the LP's gotta debut at #42 Progressive Retail. Emphasis Tracks: Dreaming Body, Fact Of Life
A great Hawaiian warrior in days long past was wandering among the Pacific Islands when he discovered something exciting. When he took the taro root and mixed it in water, cooked it, pounded it into a paste and let it ferment (just slightly), he had made one of the most delectible treats around—Poi. Unluckily, the warrior had left the tasty delicacy around his hut while he went out on a hunt and, when he returned, his faithful dog had gobbled up his creation, which left him pondering... This fairy tale brings to mind (conveniently) another great product of Hawaii, the Austin-based Poi Dog Pondering, whose debut major-label LP (a re-released combination of their indie EPs) has again captured the collective imagination of progressive radio programmers. The album has some impressive debuts: #50 College, #93 Commercial and #53 combined, this report's #11 Radio Breakthrough. PDP grabs the #12 Adventure Pick despite its less-than-brand-new status (quite a feat!), and the song "Living With The Dreaming Body" squats On Deck on the Top Cuts chart. Joining in on the luau are KCMW, KHDX, KLC, KSMC, KWBU, KWWC, WAKE, WARC, WBAU, WBGU, WBGN, WFUV, WHRW, WKDI, WPSU, WRHO, WRIU,

WRKC, WUTS, WVUR, WWUH and WXVX, who are all Pondering Top 15 placement.



### MY DAD IS DEAD The Taller You Are, The Shorter You Get (Homestead)

Emphasis Tracks: The Big Picture, Nothing Special
MDID has been performing thrillingly depressing music with little fanfare for five fine albums, the latest double opus providing a whirlwind of brilliant gray moods unparalleled by any other record on the charts. Hopefully Mark Edwards, who is the bulk of the band, will begin to earn the radio-generated fame, love and money that's been a bit late in coming to him, and gauging by these initial figures, he can afford to be a bit optimistic: College debuts the record at #53, with the combined splash at #63 good for the #14 Radio Breakthrough. Considering the weighty #2 Adventure Pick position the album also holds, the airplay outlook couldn't look much rosier. Being not quite as tragic as Hamlet, The Tragically Hip offer up their own bluesy prose on their debut full-length album, showing they can take rock 'n' roll Up To Here. While avoiding the comedic, this Canadian quintet attempt to make their own winter's tale, mixing a rebellious attitude with a grittiness that King Lear could have problems enduring. Programmers are helping give The Tragically Hip their mid-autumn's night dream, debuting the LP #59 College and #67 on the CMJ Radio Top 100, while commercial radio proves its waifness. On their Don Gehman-produced debut, their honest and straightforwardly soulful approach is winning over new legions of fans outside their Colorado/Louisiana base, as they concoct a homey potion that's bound to set toes and tambourines a-tappin'. Making a low-key bow on the Commercial chart at #67 (but then again, that's their style), the 'Dudes are also still just a murmur in the mainstream, but don't worry, they still grab a strong #70 slot combined, and are rapidly building up a strong grass roots following through their energetic live shows—look for them to undertake an extensive national tour in the near future. ### **FETCHIN BONES**

Rapp Arts Center, New York, NY, September 16

These love crushin', true rocking ambassadors of the New South have maintained that **Monster** has captured their live sound better than their previous three albums. It logically seemed to follow that since hitting the road in support of the LP, the ten new songs that were sewn together for their latest disc would consequently kick butt exponentially, and dem Bones, in their second appearance at this school auditorium-turnedoccassional rock venue this year, proved it a very sound assumption. Unaffectatiously decked out in multi-colored retro-garb on a stage adorned with brik-a-brak (even model dinosaurs on their amps—has Peter Buck set a trend?), the band stormed through a set which featured the entire new record as well as a handful of older favorites. "(I Feel Like An) Astronaut," with both its chickenscratch funk and dive-bombing guitars, and the linguistic somersaults that propel "Bonework" were highlights. The fun was epitomized by an encore cover of The Knack's "My Sharona," which they introduced as a song which they uncovered "My Sharona," which they introduced as a song which they uncovered in the Capitol vaults, and pulled it off with panache. Nassau Coliseum, Hempstead, NY, September 21 They'd been around the world since we saw them last spring, played everyplace except the bottom of the sea, touching the soil of four dif-ferent continents, and it showed: all four looked shaggier and scruffier, Mike Mills had quit wearing his trademark bottle-bottom spectacles, and Michael Stipe sported a dapper David Byrne-styled suit and a zingy '50s haircut. Looking like they'd just been woken up out of a sound sleep, the band strolled on stage cranking up a rousing arena-sized version of "Stand," and then rolling through a set that mixed equal parts hits ("The One I Love" and "So. Central Rain" restored to its original full band form) and older, odder R.E.M. nuggets ("Feeling Gravitys Pull," "King Of Birds," and a cover of Television's "See No Evil"). The Bottom Line, New York, NY, September 15 Caught in the middle of six (!) sold out shows at this premiere New York showcase club, this entrancing performance seemed like an easygoing visit to Nanci's house—real cool and comfortable. The set highlighted songs from her latest release, **Storms**, with the Blue Moon Orchestra providing stellar backup. James Hooker, David Halley and company helped to bring out the country edge in Griffith's strongest collection of songs yet, moving from down-home rockers like "Listen To The Radio" and "Love Wore A Halo" (done in a more boogie-ing style than the LP version) to airy romantic tales like "Once In A Very Blue Moon" and "If Wishes Were Changes" with a seemingly effortless grace. Always touching a new part of the heart, Nanci's personal, storytelling style was, as always, enchanting. The true highlight of the evening was the presentation of a platinum album to Julie Gold, who wrote the incredibly touching "From A Distance" (an international hit for Nanci a few years ago), who then helped to sing this wonderful ode, capping a marvelous night of songs and stories from America's sweetheart.

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


### Jackpot!

VARIOUS ARTISTS Siya Hambal: 1950s South African Country And Small Town Sounds (Original Music, RD1, Box 190, Tivoli, NY 12583)—Have a taste for the harmonica blues of the rural American South? The R&B jump of Louis Jordan or the jive of Slim Gaillard? Saxophone rave-ups and hand clapping a cappella? So, evidently, did the South Africans encountered by music archivist Hugh Tracy during his recording trips through Azania in the '30s, '40s and '50s. This record traces some of these influences on country (side A) and small town (side B) musicians of the period, styles that developed into modern sounds, and those that flourished and passed on. Side A is most interesting in that it covers a time when western instruments were widespread but the musical influences of radio and recordings were pretty much unheard, leaving the musicians to develop styles free from commercial nudges. Harmonicas played the tunes originally meant for mouth bow, and guitars were droning chords with no parallels. This music bears little resemblance to the township mbaqanga or vocal mbube sounds that are the roots of most modern Azanian music; side B is more familiar, with a smooth swing and a rocking jump

clearly influenced by American jazz. But where many copied jazz religiously in the rest of the world, these musicians seem to have understood its soul—they don't ape Louis Jordan, but rather adapt it to their own unique world. Voices play the sax parts in counterpoint Azanian music of today. This side of tunes swings as smooth and sweet as any New York band ever did, driven along by those choruses of voices riffing against the beat. John Storm Roberts has produced another album of truly "original" sounds, music that would otherwise be lost to time. "So dig it, cats and kittens!"

IVO PAPASOV AND HIS BULGARIAN WEDDING BAND Orpheus Ascending (Hannibal, c/o Carthage, 100 Jersey Ave. #302, New Brunswick, NJ 08901)—Some of the best jazz I've heard in years has come from Eastern Europe, notably Poland's Repotaz and Pick-up. Add to the list Ivo Papasov's band. "Stambolovo" means "wedding" in Bulgarian, and while the instrumentation—clarinet, accordion, guitars and drums—are the same as those bands from the union hall that you have nightmares about, this ain't them. This band is Billy Cobham, Miles Davis, Ornette Coleman and Artie Shaw in equal parts, plus the wild Balkan time Papasov modulating and trembling as only those mysterious "Voix Bulgares" can do, and you have the next wave in jazz. Tight, basic arrangements keep it structured, but at the same time make room for some wild and spirited improvising by the band, and especially by Papasov's clarinet, first melodic and sweet and then shrieking and whining at the top end of the register. In a time when American jazz is going to extremes to be either weird (Zorn) or newly accessible (the new age pudding is unlimited) these folks from Bulgaria are just doing it to do it. It's lively, it's entertaining, it doesn't seem to know the rules, so it goes where it pleases.

Orpheus Ascending should not be "filed under: world music/ethnic" but right in front of all the new jazz releases. From the eastern end of the continent that brought you "le jazz hot" comes some more fire.

CATCHING UP: Here's a taste of all the things I want to write about but haven't had the space for lately. A Mexican group living in Puerto Ricc records a Tex-Mex tune with a salsa flavor. It's slick, it's pop, it's almost disco, and it's great. It's Fenix, and their version of "Wooty-Bully" should be a hit if we all have any sense. (Mexcury, cip PolyGram, 810 Seventh Ave, New York, NY 1019). At the opposite end of the spectrum is a new one on Rounder, (One Camp St., Cambridge, MA 02140) called Nicaragua. Presentel Recorded by John McCutheon, Bill Nowlin and Paul Reisler on a recent trip to Nicaragua, it documents the real roots music of a struggling post-revolutionary nation who, in spite of adversity, is capable of incredible opinism—these are children, workers and farmers for whom music is part of their lives, not a commodity. Marrimba bands, new songs, guitar and volin from many parts of Nicaragua are all presented here as a small sampling of a culture flighting to keep its traditions and its freedom. Hannibal (address above) has reveleased a classic album of "new song," the revolutionary singer-songenter movement of Central America. The 1975 recording by Silvio Rodriguez of songs of Cubat tilled Dias Y Floras is still a masterpiece and a model of today's neuva cancione. Music of Bulgaria Republic, it offers not only an early taste of those mystenous voices, but also some great instrumental pieces by the orchestra. (Nonesuch, of Elektra, 75 Rockefeller Plaza, New York, NY 10019). On the Anglo-Cellite folk-rock scene, there are two notable new ones: Albion Band 198 has once again hit the streets. Give Me A Saddle And I'll Trade You A Car on Topic (50 Stroud Green Rd., London N4 3EF, England) is proof once again that Ashely Hutchings is some kind of twisted genius. JUDY NIEMACK WITH CEDAR WALTON TRIO Blue Bop (Free Lance, 32 Rue Alphonse Bertillon, 75015 Paris) and SHEILA JORDAN Portrait Of Sheila (Blue Note, 810 7th Ave., New York, NY 10019) and BLOSSOM DEARIE Blossom Dearie (Verve, c/o PolyGram, 825 8th Ave., New York, NY 10019)—In jazz, what counts is not the size of one's instrument, but what one does with it. None of these jazz singers qualifies instrument, but what one does with it. None of these jazz singers qualifies as a belter, yet each in her own way puts over a tune with passion and singular phrasing. And each lets the song, rather than her comfort zone, dictate the delivery. Judy Niemack, the youngest and least-known of the three vocalists, slaloms with streamlined precision through tricky bebop lines and changes. On her whopping 63-minute Blue Bop CD she twists, turns, scats, leaps and bounds with Olympian grace through 14 numbers (among them "Gee Baby," "Lover Man," "Love For Sale," "Moanin'," "Born To Be Blue" and "Dizzy Atmosphere"), displaying admirable control, balance and understatement. The Cedar Walton Trio (Walton, piano; Ray Drummond, bass; Joey Baron, drums; Curtis Fuller, trombone on three cuts), the ideal instrumental complement, is poised to catch her if she

Cuts), the ideal instrumental complement, is poised to catch her if she stumbles. But she never does. "Parker's Mood," the Charlie Parker line with words by King Pleasure, finds her honoring the late tenorman Warne Marsh, from whom she learned the value of singing Bird solos. Exquisite. At long last, Sheila Jordan's 1962 masterwork, Portrait Of Sheila, is back in print. Jordan, whose own infatuation with Parker remains intact after nearly four decades of devotion and diligent study, nestles into the loving embrace of a trio (Barry Galbriath, guitar; Steve Swallow, bass; Denzill Rest, dr. ims) for renditions—sometimes cone, sometimes compressed in the cone of Best, drums) for renditions—sometimes coy, sometimes comic, sometimes commiserating—of "Baltimore Oriole," "Willow Weep For Me" and "Falling In Love With Love," among 12 offerings. To this taste, her rendition of "Dat Dere"—in which she alternately portrays mother and daughter ("Hey, mama, can I have that big elephant over there?"), alternating authority with innocence—is pure magic. Blossom Dearie, the sagely New Yorker critic Whitney Balliett once wrote, "has a tiny voice ... without a microphone, it would not reach the second floor of a doll house." In its Vocal Classics series, PolyGram has reissued her self-titled late-'50s album, in which her piano and vocals are bolstered by Ray Brown's bass and Papa Jo Jones' drums. To her original album, a mixture of piano-jazz and cabaret numbers, PolyGram has added three previously unreleased tunes. All in all, these three singers, masters of pacing and inflection and hornlike expression, more than make due with their modest physical endowments, and thank goodness we have their CDs to enjoy.

JOHN ZORN Spy Vs. Spy—The Music Of Ornette Coleman (Musician, c/o Elektra, 75 Rockefeller Plaza, New York, NY 10019)—And now for something completely different. This acoustic-hardcore jazz pulls no punches and takes no prisoners as it pays tribute to the compositions of alto revolutionary Ornette Coleman. Putative leader John Zorn, he of the duck calls and quirky tributes to the likes of Sonny Clark, Ennio Morricone and Mickey Spillane, squares off with fellow altoman Tim Berne and the rhythm section of Mark Dresser (bass), Joey Baron (drums) and Michael Vatcher (drums) for a 17-song ode to Ornette. Make no mistake—these interpretations (many of them short, breakneck snippets) are not for the fainthearted or squeamish. Side-by-side comparisons of these tunes with the Coleman originals—the liner notes document the Coleman album sources—reveal the insidious methodology behind this quintet's gene-splicing. Zorn (right channel) and Berne (left channel) positively burn behind the churning rhythm section. As the liner notes attest, "fucking hardcore rules.

JOHN SCOFIELD Flat Out (Gramavision, 260 West Broadway, New York, NY 10013)—Jazz, rock, country and blues influences are so indelibly intertwined in guitarist John Scofield's overall concept that no one influence predominates. What's more, because he emphasizes playing over production, his albums retain a live, often raw feel. Of late the ex-Miles Davis band member (1982-85) has pared down his band to a guitar-contrabass-drums unit and de-emphasized, without discarding, the funk. Flat Out features the leader's Ibanez guitar in a trio context that segues engagingly from jazz standards ("Secret Love" and "All The Things You Are") to Scofield compositions (including the slow blues "Evansville" and the ballad "Science And Religion") to New Orleans-styled R&B (Huey Smith's "Rockin' Pneumonia" and the Meters' "Cissy Strut"). Bassist Anthony Cox, drummer Terri Lyne Carrington (Johnny Vidacovich brings his syncopated Crescent City swing to the R&B numbers) and (on four cuts) Hammond B-3 organist Don Grolnick lock in behind the leader, disdaining excess without tempering their own originality. At a time when fusion and new age have turned the airwaves into sensory-deprivation tanks (faddish mood rings for the ears). Scofield stands apart as a player—flat out.

ENJA INKS DISTRIBUTION PACT: Matthias Winckelmann's West German-based Enja label has signed a distribution deal with Mesa/Blue Moon in the U.S. Mesa/Blue Moon, which also handles Gramavision, will distribute Enja through CEMA, a Capitol company, in association with Rhino. Enja, which had until recently been distributed by Muse, is gearing up for a major fall release, according to New York rep Gust William Tsilis, himself a recording artist for the label (the vibraphonist's Pale Fire recording, featuring Arthur Blythe, contains some shimmering tone poems). On Sept. 23, according to Tsilis, Enja will issue My Favorite Songs, a live, large-ensemble recording that the trumpeter Chet Baker cut in Germany two weeks before his death in 1988; the recording will be available in all three formats. Also due are Mindif, a soundtrack by pianist Abdullah Ibrahim (Dollar Brand), and Secrets, a date by guitarist Leni Stern with saxist Bob Berg and fellow plectrists Wayne Krantz and David Tronzo. On Oct. 23 Enja will release Code Violations by saxist Gary Thomas and Underneath It All by Texas guitarist Mitch Watkins. Enja, which enjoys a good reputation among the cognoscenti for its well-produced recordings in the avant-garde realm, should be well served in the New York metro area by Tsilis, who, besides being a vibrist on the rise, is also the talent coordinator for Visiones, the Greenwich Village jazzspot that has become, along with the Knitting Factory farther downtown, an important showcase for New Jazz. Tsilis' firsthand knowledge of the scene, allied with his many contacts, should serve Enja well in the A&R area. (For more info on Enja doings contact Mesa/Blue Moon at 209 E. Alameda Ave., Suite 101, Burbank, CA 91502.)... CRINER'S CORNER: Those critics who sloughed off keyboardist-composer Clyde Criner as merely "a funk musician" on the basis of his 1987 Behind The Sun album for Novus-RCA had better be prepared for a reappraisal, because of Massachusetts), who recently cut most of the keyboard parts on Anthony Davis' opera *The Life And Times Of Malcolm* X (due on Gramavision), directs from behind a nine-foot Steinway his working quariet of Reggie Washington (bass), Emedian Rivera (percussion), Rodney Holmes (drums) and Craig Rivers (reeds); that this group has been together for 18 months is immediately apparent—the basic tracks glisten with the spontaneity and fluidity that only result from familiarity on the bandstand. Criner, who penned 13 of the 14 tunes on the CD (the 15-year-old marimba wunderkind Stefon Harris, who appears on four tracks, contributed one piece), employs synthesizer on this recording only as a textural agent; high-tech mavens will be interested to know that his synth, or "re-synthesizer," is the ACXEL, a brand-new (Criner claims to be world-premiering it here) state-of-the-art axe that "is able to duplicate the warmth and harmonics one gets with the sympathetic vibration on the plano." The ACXEL, which manipulates overtones, produces curious sounds similar to the lape effects and *musique concrete* of Stockhausen and Ligeti. What is most intriguing about the recording, however, is the manner in which Criner the composer welds musics of different centuries and continents (Gregorian chants and Sudanese rhythms, for instance, on "Divine Providence") without calling attention to his erudition and, more important, without robbing the music of its coherence. Criner's solid mainstream-jazz credentials—stins with Max Roach, Wynton Marsalis, Woody Shaw and others—set him apart from the New Age boy wonders who make blissed-out placebo music out of disconnected musical fragments. When most fusionoids try to stitich disparate elements, the net results are often analogous to the cheesy gladiator movies in which musclemen do battle in Rebeoks and speak in Brookhynese. To this taste, Criner's most tasty pieces are "The Blue Rose" (the pianist's solo echoing John Lewis's figure from "All The Things You Are" with the MJQ) and "Coincidence Watts and George Howard... On his new outing for Sonic Edge (14755 Ventura Blvd., #1776, Sherman Oaks, CA 91403), flutist Steve Kujala lifts The Arms Of Love. Kujala, whose fretless flute technique has commanded considerable attention, trots out nine originals along with a cover of the Beach Boys' "Good Vibrations," on which his flute carries both the melody and a background-choral-group effect... Another flute player, the Puerto Rico-born Nestor Torres, makes his debut this month. Torres' Morning Ride (Verve Forecast) breezes along with Latin funk and a semi-classical sound on "Seven Steps To Heaven," a tune most commonly associated with Miles Davis' version on the '60s album of the same name... From Vera Brandis' Capitol-affiliated Intution label comes Never Been There from the German group of the same name. Co-leaders Rudi Zapf and Wolfgang Neumann offer their unique stylings on the electro-acoustic chromatic hammer dulcimer. Over a backdrop of bass, drums and electric guitar, Zapf and Neumann craft what their bio calls a "contemporary world fusion" that suggests Balinese gamelan music, steel drums from Trinidad and koto music from Japan... Need an escape from the everyday? Try some of this.

Jackpot! -

BIG DADDY KANE It's A Big Daddy Thing (Cold Chillin', c/o Warner Bros., 3300 Warner Blvd., Burbank, CA 91510)—"Ohhhhhhhh yeah." You hear that smooooth voice coming through your speakers and you know the Kane is back-this time, more articulate than ever. As the main mouthpiece of the Cold Chillin'/Marley Marl axis, Big Daddy has always set the standard for other rappers with his forcefulness and charisma, evident here in a variety of settings thanks to diverse subject matter and some top-flight producers (Prince Paul, Marley Marl and Teddy Riley, to name a few). Taking a rare "unity" stance, Kane even tells other rappers to stop battling on "Another Victory," while his sensitive side makes an appearance on the thoughtful "Children R The Future." Those subjects might make us want to call this the mature BDK-until we get to "Pimpin' Ain't Easy," which shows he's still as homophobic and sexist as ever.

Despite that low point, Kane has created a loose, crazy mix of danceable funk, hardcore rapping and even some pop crossover possibilities that make for his strongest album to date. Top Things: "Smooth Operator," "The House That Cee Built" (which showcases his underrated DJ, Mister Cee), "On The Move" and the Teddy Riley-produced "I Get The Job Done."

CHILL ROB G Ride The Rhythm (Wild Pitch, 231 W. 29th St., New York, NY 10001)—Straight outta Jersey City and into your home is Chill Rob G, a key player in the Flavor Unit and a rapper who's on the brink of breakout success. As with his first couple of 12' singles, his rapid-fire lyrics are framed by one of the best producers (and perhaps the most innovative sampler out there), DJ Mark The 45 King. DJ Mark always seems to grab something funky and different (like the Police sample on "Let The Words Flow") to give each song a distinctive stamp. Chill Rob has the kind of clean, aggressive delivery that seems natural (not unlike Chuck D. or Rakim on their earlier works) but not overbearing. With the multitude of new hip-hop acts invading our local record stores, it's nice to hear a rapper who is as confident and comfortable behind the mic as Chill Rob G. Top Rhythms: "Court Is Now In Session," "Motivation," "Future Shock" and the title track.

COLDCUT What's That Noise? (Tommy Boy, c/o Reprise, 3300 Warner Blvd., Burbank, CA 91510)—This record is amazing because it is, without a doubt, the ultimate party record of the moment. It has it all: A disco-dance smash in "People Hold On"; a staticky jumble of fun in "My Telephone"; industrial screeching from The Fall's Mark E. Smith on "(I'm) In Deep"; a reggae/DOR/big band hybrid (if that seems impossible, you try to categorize it!) in "Stop This Crazy Thing," which features Junior Reid; and even an appearance by hip-hop's most promising female voice, Queen Latifah, on "Smoke Dis One." Whew! DJs Matt Black and Jonatha in More are Coldcut (not unlike S-Express, Royal House, et al), and their work with Yazz and Eric B. & Rakim has given them the impetus for these collaborations. While much of this has been released on import already, the new stuff is definitely not filler—there's a patchwork of genres, styles and rhythms that simply do not quit. This is truly a club DJ's wet dream.

TWELVE INCHES HIGH AND RISING: The tidal wave of dance singles is cresting, so let's get to it... It's no relation to the movie, but ICE-T has a new single called "Lethal Weapon" [120 BPM] (Sire, c/o Warner Bros., address above) that is more uptempo than most of his last album and serves as a preview of his next LP, The Iceberg/Freedom Of Speech... Just Watch What You Say (due out very soon). You'd be crazy to pass over the B-Side, a remix of "Heartbeat" from Power with the '70s funk kings, War... From the compilation The New Beat r/Evolution comes a single by GRUESOME TWOSOME, "Hallucination Generation" [123 BPM] (Netwerk, 1717 W. 4th Ave., Vancouver, BC V6J 1M2, Canada) that mixes industrial, acid house and new beat into a great dance stew... Also be sure to put the following 12" dance maxis on your "Most Wanted" list: DONALD-D "F.B.I." [114 BPM] (Rhyme Syndicate of a Fig. 51 W. 52nd St. New York, NY 10019), the first of Ice T's passe to bit the hightime, watch for his full LB. Netwigner. stew... Also be sure to put the following 12" dance maxis on your "Most Wanted" list: DONALD-D "F.B.I." [114 BPM] (Rhyme Syndicate, c/o Epic, 51 W. 52nd St., New York, NY 10019), the first of Ice-T's posse to hit the big time—watch for his full LP, Notorious; AWESOME DRE' "Frankly Speaking"/"Executioner Style" [120/118] (Priority, 6430 Sunset Blvd., Hollywood, CA 90028/213-467-0151), a Detroit rapper's first hardcore effort; Shep Pettibone's brilliant remix of THOMPSON TWINS "Sugar Daddy" [118 BPM] (Red Eye, c/o Warner Bros., address above); ARETHA FRANKLIN & JAMES BROWN "Gimme Your Love" [132 BPM] (Arista, 6 West 57th St., New York, NY 10019) with help from Prince on the 10:44 extended remix funk masterpiece; AJAX "Mind The Gap" [120 BPM] and FRONT LINE ASSEMBLY "No Limit" [126 BPM] (Wax Trax, 1659 N. Damen Ave., Chicago, IL 60647); SERIOUS TRIPP "I Like To Flow" [104 BPM] (Raindog, c/o Warlock, 200 Park Ave. South, Suite 1618, New York, NY 10003); Daddy-O from Stetsasonic reworks B-52'S "Love Shack" [134 BPM] (Reprise, address above); and last, but certainly not least, is DIE WARZAU "Welcome To America" [116 BPM] (Fiction, c/o PolyGram, 810 Seventh Ave., New York, NY 10019). Oops! I misinformed Beat Box readers in my YOUNG M.C. Jackpot! review, saying that Young was still studying at U.S.C.—he graduated last May in economics... Word has it that the PolyGram conglomerate is moving in on the hip-hop marketplace, with a buyout of Profile Records (Run-D.M.C., Rob Base, among others) a reportedly "done" deal, and PG is said to be setting its sights on Priority Records (NWA, Eazy-E, California Raisins) next... We outta here.

SHELLY THUNDER Fresh Out The Pack (Mango, 14 East 4th St., 3rd Floor, New York, NY 10012)-This sassy-but-sweet, no-nonsense Jamaican rapper busts out with an album full of rap, hip-hop and pop. She combines urban and dancehall sounds, addressing ragamuffins and B-boys alike. With production work by Sidney Mills of Steel Pulse along with KRS-One, Gordon and Jessie Williams, and some musical dubbing by Sly & Robbie, Shelly Thunder breaks out of the pack with some of the freshest sounds around. Some of her "dope" songs include "My Name Is Shelly," "Break Up" and "Working Girl." On the flip side, she's got some "dangerous" songs like "Dangerous," "Relation" and the updated "Kuff '89." In the all-too-often macho-man dancehall scene, Shelly Thunder is a force to be reckoned with

SHILO California Reggae (Hippodrome, 3111 Camine del Rio North, Suite 1105, San Diego, CA 92108)—New music on a new label from a band that's based in San Diego but apparently has members coming from Germany, Guam and St. Louis, as well. Not your typical roots reggae band, Shilo has a very polished sound, and seems to fill the gap between rock and reggae in a highly produced, easy-listening kind of way. They do a nice cover of "Under The Boardwalk" and fill the rest of the LP with originals. Stand-out tracks include: "Confrontation," "Runaround" and "Missionary Man."

It's mixed by Dennis Thompson and has one song from their new album All In One along with a favorite from last year's self-titled debut LP. Also watch out for the 1989 mix of Marcla Grifffith's "Electric Boogie," mixed and produced by the Jerks (the same folks responsible for the Miami Sound Machine sound). She also has an accompanying video. 




### Jackpot! -

LAW AND ORDER Guilty Of Innocence (MCA, 70 Universal City Plaza, Universal City, CA 91608)—Law And Order is a New York-area quartet that's been gigging around the City since late '86. They've played a lot of the same venues as Prong, White Zombie, Circus Of Power, etc., but they're a totally different kinda band (although there are some similarities with Raging Slab). They cover a lot of territory with their debut album: they're heavy enough to be considered hard rock, commercial enough to sell mass quantities, and different enough to stand out from the rest of the pack. Rather than going for an ultra-produced, glossy sound, the band (with producer Joe Hardy) has kept things raw, often leaving out rhythm guitar tracks (bassist Sean Carmody soars), and there's a live, rough feel to the record; they wisely avoid sounding too polished, and as the lead single, "We Don't See God' demonstrates, they're not afraid to say what's on their minds. One thing that really makes this band different is vocalist Shane and guitarist Phil Alocca's dive-bombing harmonies, which


drive home most of the songs' hooks and add a dimension that most hard rock bands don't have. While Law And Order's ambition sometimes over-reaches their ability and a couple of the songs aren't great, this is one of the strongest hard rock debuts of the year, and promises a lot. Picks: "No Love Lost," "Love Reality," "Soul Inside" and especially "Your Sister Does" and "We Don't See God."

NUCLEAR ASSAULT Handle With Care (In-Effect, 187-07 Henderson Ave., Hollis, NY 11423)—The Nukes are back, on their third label in as many records, but this one is a dandy and well worth the wait. Although the term "crossover" always seems to hang over this band, the Nukes have developed a sound and attitude all their own, one that rises above any real categories except "heavy"! Handle With Care continues in the Nuc-Ass tradition, but finds guitarists John Connelly and Anthony Bramante exploring different, more well-crafted channels with extremely hard-edged metallic riffs while bassist Danny Lilker rolls the thick hardcore bass sound—so thick you'd swear it had fur on it. And while John's vocals have always been, er, an acquired taste (I feed on his annoying squeals), they compliment the rest of the chaos perfectly. Easily their best effort to date, wake up and listen to one of the most aggressive street bands of today. Fallout: "New Song," "Critical Mass" (even though it cribs a bit from Excel's "The Joke's On You," but what the hell, Danny's help in promoting Excel has been immeasurable) and "Search And Seizure." [KS]

GOTHIC SLAM Just A Face In The Crowd (Torrid, c/o Epic, 51 W. 52 St., New York, NY 10019)—First of all, do not judge this band by the LP they released last year: for their big-league debut, Gothic Slam has revamped with hot production and considerable musical growth. The band's sound is built around heavy grooves with periodic plunges into fits of speed, and while Daniel Gomez's prevalent and distinctive vocals can grate after awhile, they work just fine in small doses. A surprisingly strong LP, Gothic Slam fits perfectly—with Suicidal Tendencies, Prong, etc.—into the Epic metal stable. Picks: "Keep The Faith," "Feel The Pain" and especially "Who Died"—the single of the latter features a non-LP cover of Thin Lizzy's "Thunder And Lightning"! [KS]

BABYLON A.D. Babylon A.D. (Arista, 6 W. 57 St., New York, NY 10019)—Hailing from the Bay Area, Babylon A.D. presents yet another strain of hard rock to emerge from that hallowed spawning ground. Representing neither the bloodthirsty thrash of Testament/Metallica nor the glam pop-metal of Vain, Babylon A.D. serves up accessible metal (Scorpions, Dokken, latter-day Kiss) that's hard enough to suit nearly any commercial metal show. Relying heavily on big riffs and chant-along backing vocals, the band displays an impressive songwriting depth, and Derek's (yeah, just Derek) got one *hell* of a voice. An impressive debut by a band from whom we're sure to hear a lot more. Picks: "Bang Go The Bells," "Crossfire," "Maryanne" and "Shot O' Love."

NAPALM DEATH Mentally Murdered (EP) and MORBID ANGEL Altars Of Madness and VARIOUS ARTISTS Grind Crusher (Earache, P.O. Box 144, Nottingham, NG3 4GE, England)—Oh my, did the sludge man drop a load on our doorstep! If you're not familiar with this label, the name explains what the hell's goin' on. So we'll take it one record at a time, starting with the latest EP from Napalm Death. N.D. are the grandaddies of this uncomfortable form of noisecore/metal, and unlike Scum and From Enslavement To Obliteration's short but sweet tunes (which vary between 1 and 90 seconds each), the songs—yeah, songs!—here generally rumble between three and four minutes each, and there's even an epic: a song over five minutes long! Mentally Murdered ain't their fastest (that's not to say that it crawls along), but it's definitely their most coherent slate to date. They still growl like rabid dogs, but they make an effort to set and stay within barriers. . . If you think Slayer is evil, Morbid Angel multiplies evil exponentially without regard to the "moral majority." Doomy they are, but unlike most tasteless death bands, they possess barbaric songwriting that leaves ya waiting with baited breath for the next avalanche. What kind of place spawned such a nasty bunch of boys? Just give 'em a holler in Florida! These Altars Of Madness are "brutal" with a capital "B"—which also stands for "beware," 'cause it will really aggravate your mother . . . Wrapping up the wax is Earache's Grind Crusher sampler that, for all you psychotic record collectors, contains a limited edition copy of the "world's shortest single"! This compilation flaunts the diversity of this label, while showing bands like Morbid Angel, Carcass, Godflesh and Bolt Thrower to be more than capable of restructuring your insides. Oh yeah, the 7" features two brilliant tracks—both of which are an astounding one second long! [KS]

"Progress is for the one that wants it." I have been reading CMJ in its varying forms since 1981, but things have not changed too much. Same bands, same ghettoization of "difficult to program" artists, same loss of hundreds of great records. People still bickering about what alternative means in a vacuum while artists, DJs, record companies and writers/publishers deal in the real (read: business) world. In that world there are too few Gerard Cosloys or Geordie Gillespies to go around, but way too many folks who are groupies rather than enthusiasts/missionaries. Too many resist the natural instinct to experiment or grow. As a DJ in a club whose typical patron is a white college student, I have a professional interest in college radio. My experience suggests that if a primary mission of college radio is to educate, then someone's been on extended sabbatical. Why do kids born in 1969 seem to know more about Erasure or the Smiths than Gang Of 4 or Parliament-Funkadelic? Which bands have been more influential? I'm not interested in a "whose playlist is cooler" mentality; the essence of "punk" or "alternative" is being able to exercise your own judgement, to explore in your own way. Music categories are arbitrary, merely intended to facilitate a purchase, based on a lowest common denominator mentality. Don't capitulate, INVESTIGATE! While many of today's PD/MDs don't know the Embarrassment, Au Pairs, Exploited, Individuals, New Age Steppers or Regressive Aid, they keep playing those Cure and R.E.M. bootlegs. Instead of feeling real good about myself because I know some bands, I'd rather SHARE WHAT I KNOW with the neophytes. It is important to preserve the tradition that gave rise to the groups I mentioned. This is a plea for CMJ, Gavin, NM\$, IBS, etc. to set aside space in their publications and time at their conventions to educate today's programmers about music, past and present. Last Dialogue I questioned the motives of independent labels putting out a flood of "tribute albums," thus contributing to the current wave of nostalgia sweeping today's music. Of course major labels are not blameless, but their method is a bit different. There seems to be a trend among the majors to re-release old songs in the hope of a CHR breakthrough. The first example I can think of is UB40's "Red Red Wine." It seems a couple of CHR powerhouses in the West decided to add the old song to rotation, they received a deluge of positive feedback, and the next thing you know A&M re-releases the single and it goes to the top of the charts. With that success, everybody jumps on the bandwagon. We get "Send Me An Angel '89" and other assorted moldie oldies that were "way ahead of their time" and are now fit for general consumption. A particularly heinous example of the re-release war is "Into The Night" by Benny Mardones. God only knows how old it is. When it was originally released it was a "hit" and now in 1989 it has topped the charts again in its original form. The traditional arguments for re-releasing things is that by doing so you introduce a song to the public that in the past it wasn't ready for, you are developing an artist, etc., etc. But the best thing about re-releasing a song is that it is very cost-effective. No production budget, and with name recognition, an easy promotion campaign—in other words, minimal risk. The wave of re-releases seems to mean one of two things: easy profits or a lack of quality new music. I think most of us know the answer to that one. Oh yes, I hereby swear on the American flag (it's more sacred than the Bible now) that in 20 years I will not buy a tribute album to the Pixies or R.E.M.

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
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

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## THE LAST WORD

STUFF: Those of you making travel plans to attend this year's CMJ Music and Metal Marathons (October 26-28) may want to arrive in New York on Wednesday the 25th, because there are several great showcases lined up for that night. Along with Exene Cervenka at the Pyramid and a JMT jazz night at the Knitting Factory, the Neville Bros. will be playing at the Palladium. Freebies are extremely limited, but the first ten people to call Carl Freed at Ron Delsner Enterprises (212-249-7773) will receive a pair of free tickets to the show. Musician Magazine is presenting their third annual Best Unsigned Band Contest. The top 12 artists will be featured on the annual Warner Bros. compilation CD, The Best Of The B.U.B.s, which will be distributed to industry execs, music journalists and hundreds of radio stations. The Grand Prize winner will receive a home recording studio featuring a Tascam 16-track recorder, JBL monitors and boards, and a complete wireless microphone system from Shure. This year's judges include Robbie Robertson, Lou Reed, Vernon Reid, Lyle Lovett and Branford Marsalis, and past finalists and Honorable Mentions include the Subdudes, Edie Brickell And New Bohemians, Tin Star, Love . From the "I thought up the pig! Remember that time we tripped at Glastonbury in Tractor and Velvet Elvis... '72?" department, Roger Waters is suing the members of Pink Floyd not only over use of the name, but also for using the famous flying pig in their shows. Waters' High Court suit in the U.K. claims that Waters is owed royalties for the use of the pig. . . Profile Records has expanded to include various world musics, and has appointed Murray Elias (who produced the way cool Reggae Dance Hall Classics LPs for Sleeping Bag) as A&R Manager, World Beat Showtime has announced the premier of an exclusive documentary called Paul McCartney: Put It There, set to air on Nov. 11 at 10 PM. The special was filmed in London while Paul and band prepared for their world tour and recorded Flowers In The Dirt ... As was previously reported, after 15 years with the band, bassist/vocalist Dee Dee has left the Ramones. He has been replaced by a 23-year-old ex-Marine from Deer Park, Long Island, named CJ Japan (featuring David Sylvian, Mick Karn, Richard Barbieri and Steve Jansen) has re-formed and is recording a new album for Virgin. The legendary English pirate radio station Radio Caroline was raided by Dutch police, even though the boat from which they broadcast was supposedly in international waters. The transmitters were smashed, 10,000 albums were seized, and the DJs reportedly battled with police! Station owner Ronan O'Rahilly said he plans to press charges of assault and criminal damage against Dutch officials. British and Dutch authorities claim Caroline interferes with essential services... Rumor has it that the Cocteau Twins will tour early next year. ... Finally, just when you thought it couldn't get any worse, The Who may be releasing a record of the live all-star Tommy performance in L.A., a recent article in Goldmine noted that while The Who only released 10 new albums between 1966 and 1988, there were 19 live, compilation and soundtrack albums. As if that wasn't bad enough, rumor has it that the Rolling Stones will play three nights in December for Donald Trump at Atlantic City's Convention Hall. The show will reportedly be billed as "The Rolling Stones And Friends" and will feature Stevie Wonder and Tina Turner, among others, reportedly, the final performance will be broadcast pay-per-view. We guess it's ultimately a good thing: people will get so tired of being ripped off by greybeards that a backlash is inevitable.

RECORD NEWS: Kate Bush's first new album in four years is called The Sensual World (subtle, eh?), features 10 tracks (11 on cassette and CD) and will be released by Columbia on October 17. Her last album, Hounds Of Love, sold over half a million copies, and the new LP features contributions from the Trio Bulgarka and Pink Floyd guitarist David Gilmour (who, incidentally, "discovered" 16-year-old Kate in 1976)... The new Psychedelic Furs LP is called Books Of Days and will be out Nov. 6; the new Blue Nile LP is called The Downtown Lights... 50,000,000,000,000,000,000,000 Watts Records has signed Men & Volts, whose new LP, Cheer Up, will be released late winter/early spring... Keep an eye out for I.R.S.'s Tenth Anniversary compilation, These People Are Nuts!, which features an unreleased John Cale track and lotsa way fun and hard-to-find stuff from I.R.S. annals... Tom Waits sang the title track to the new Al Pacino/Ellen Barkin film, Sea Of Love, but you'll have to see the film to hear Waits sing the unreleased song over the final credits.
