When It Falls (Quango-Palm) When Henry Binns and Sam Hardaker started working on the first Zero 7 disc, Simple Things, they thought they were making a record for people like themselves, who hung out at the same record shops and bought the same 12inches. Neither one is a singer, so

they pulled in vocalists to bring their soulful vision to life; they never thought they'd have to tour the thing. But Simple Things took off outside their circle of friends, selling 800,000 worldwide. The experience of taking their music apart to play it live-on record, samples commingle with new musical parts cut up like samples—is the difference between the brilliant Simple Things and the brilliant-but-different When It Falls. The new disc is more soulful by half; the songs feel lived-in, connected more by viscera and sinew than circuitry. Vocalists Mozez, Sia Furler and Sophie Barker are back, and newcomer

Tina Dico appears on the darker "Home." When It Falls is blissful, sexy, real, and a keeper. — Scott Frampton

GRETA GAINES

It Was Hot (Red Hat 22) When the phrase "athleteturned-musician" is uttered. the instantaneous mental image of Shaquille O'Neal armed with a microphone might send some into bouts of dry heaves. No such stomach discomfort occurs with crooner-cum-snowboard champion

Greta Gaines. Equipped with a six-string instead of a K2, Gaines' sophomore album, It Was Hot, goes down like a pro on fresh powder. Her viable rockabilly twang unites with crisp banjo, pedal steel, melodic verses and urban backbeats to give this Tennessee girl a sound unlike any other. Each song has its own personality and embodies another facet of Gaines herself. The title track gives off sparks of her spitfire attitude and independence, saying "You can leave me with what I've got/ 'Cause while it lasted, you bastard/ It was hot." In the poignant track "Blue Girl," she talks of revenge; the melodic "Devil-May-Care" embodies her unapologetic lifestyle. The biggest surprise on the album is a very effective, up-tempo

version of the Grateful Dead's "Sugaree," which further exemplifies Gaines' ability to tackle any mountain fearlessly. — Traci Reed


JOSH BENNETT Hopeful Fiction

(Private Music) When Josh Bennett is asked to describe his music, he calls it "a big maddening, creative clusterfuck of love." It's hard to argue with that description: The 13 tracks on the singer/songwriter's debut album, Hopeful

Fiction, range from four-on the-floor rock tunes to quiet ballads to alt-country barnburners, with each song expressing a genuine love for music. Bennett's not out to prove anything to anybody, he just picks up a guitar and plays what he feels, and that's what makes this potential genre-clash into a coherent album with focus and direction. The puppy-love anthem "Babydoll" might be miles away from the mock country of "Bad Ass," but they don't seem out of place on the same album. It can sometime take a performer their whole career to find their voice; Josh Bennett is a lot closer to finding that elusive prize

than most singer/songwriters on their debut, and that is something he can definitely be proud of. — Brad Filicky



In Rock (Yep Roc) In Rock, the new album from Scott McCaughey's Minus 5, is a formal release of an album recorded in one day in 2000. The band originally pressed 1,000 copies of the disc and sold them at shows, but they always felt it was a "real" record and now it

finally gets the royal digi-pack treatment. It's easy to see why the band felt that way: These songs may not be polished but they still shine. Scott and company (including Peter Buck and Bill Rieflin from a little band called REM) are masters of the simple pop song. "Lies Of The Living Dead" has an organ groove that gives the song a feel halfway between merseybeat and surf rock; "Cosmic Drive" has a thick, grimy guitar solo that sounds like it got lost on the way to a Deep Purple album circa '76. If you can't find some-

thing to like on this record, you aren't looking hard enough. - Brad Filicky

Putumayo Presents World

Reggae (Putumayo) Jamaican reggae has changed over the years from ska to ragga, then dub to dancehall (think Sean Paul with less cameos); what's unique about this Putumayo compilation is that its artists follow the original reggae mold created by originators like

Jimmy Cliff and Bob Marley, but incorporate their own locale's take. U.K. ensemble Más Y Más roll their r's, utilize string sections and have horns backing them up on "Agua," expertly blending traits of flamenco (their bandleader is of Spanish descent) into their reggae skank. Birmingham, U.K. resident Apache Indian, proud of his East Indian heritage, melds reggae with meditative Hindu sounds and flutes on "Om Numah Shivaya." Algerian group Intik's "Notre Devoir" incorporates hip-hop—which got its start in reggae—sounding similar to the guest artists on No Doubt's *Rock Steady*. Nigeria's Majek Fashek's cry for "African Unity" encompasses what

Rasta really means. It's exciting to see the world embrace both the old school and the new in such a unique and wonderful way. — **Kory Grow**

Yes To Everything (Lookout!) In the Golden Age of the dancepunk/garage-rock revival, bands like the Rapture, the Strokes and the White Stripes have made stars of themselves, and they owe a large portion of their success to their ability to properly mash together genres, mixing the catchy with the obscure. Now, Tampa's Washdown is

unleashing its own brand of dance-rock designed to make lying around impossible. Following the band's self-titled 2002 EP, *Yes To Everything* is a debut sure to grab the attention of both radio and the rhythm-starved. Titles such as

"Confusion...(Confusion?)" and "Pull. Out. Work. Space." hardly reflect the variety of tones that the songs bounce between, but they do show that, like ex-tourmates Hot Hot Heat and Bratmobile, the Washdown is probably about as insane as it wants its fans to be on the dancefloor. As tempos change at the drop of a hat, *Yes To Everything* consistently explodes with

melody, never falling short of wildly energetic. The dawn of the Silver Age, perhaps? — Vicki Siolos

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BRAD MEHLDAU'S LOVE ETTER

After collaborating with pop producer Jon Brion for studio-based mayhem of 2002's *Largo*, pianist Brad Mehldau returns with a somewhat subdued album of covers that proves, once again, that he can be a romantic when he wants to be.

here's a reason Brad Mehldau spends most of his time letting his piano do the talking.

He's got a new trio album with longtime bassist Larry Grenadier and drummer Jorge Rossy called *Anything Goes*, and he's excited about it; but let's just say hyperbole is not part of the Mehldau make-up, even if his mindbending piano chops and ever-probing style have sent jazz fans into paroxysms of rapturous wonder.

"I'd like to say this record was different from how we usually work, but it was pretty much the same as how all of our trio records are made," Mehldau says with a resigned laugh. "We like to document the material once it's gotten ripe, so to speak; once we've been playing it for a while."

Actually the new album is the partial results of two days work. The sessions went so well that Mehldau and producer Matt Pierson decided to split the material up. A forthcoming album will be originals from the sessions, while the newly released *Anything Goes* is dedicated to the works of jazz forefathers like Thelonious Monk, Mehldau favorites like Radiohead, and even a few surprises (such as Charlie Chaplin's theme song "Smile").

Two albums in two days is a lot of ground to cover, but Mehldau, ever the improviser, doesn't really think so. "A lot of times [the songs used are] either the first take or the second. Something might be a little unsteady on the first take, so we do a second. But most of the time, if you are comfortable with the material, the first take is the best. The next one may be different, but wouldn't necessarily be better."

Because of the way the double dip worked, fans will get a slightly different/skewed perspective on the pianist. *Anything Goes* is a relatively quiet and romantic album with short, emotional statements that lean toward reverie, nostalgia and a little bit of melancholy.

The pianist certainly inhabited this space when recording the album's three ballads. Just louder than a whisper, the silky "Dreamsville" floats on a cloud of sadness and yearning. The elegiac "I've Grown Accustomed To Her Face" is blue enough to lead one to wonder if Mehldau's interpretation implies that she's now gone. Hoagy Carmichael's "Nearness Of You" strolls along at an easy pace as Mehldau wrings out a spare solo, throwing in just a touch of Thelonious Monk's angular style.

There's quite a bit of Monk on this record, particularly on the more upbeat material. Anything Goes includes a cover of the relatively obscure Monk tune "Skippy," and the stuttered lines in 5/4 time on "Get Happy" recall the work of the master as well. Mehldau owns up to the fact that Monk is in regular rotation and always has been, but rightly points out that he's not the only one listening.

"There is a pervasiveness to Monk's work, which is interesting, because I think he's such a deep part of the music that his influence has cropped up in other musicians. He's the roots of the tree. He's one of the jazz musicians I listened

to right from the beginning and really got it."

Like the Monk tune, many of Anything Goes's songs come from Mehldau's formative years. Even as he studied classical as a kid and then got into jazz, Brad Mehldau has always loved pop music as well, covering his fair share of songs from the Beatles and artists like Nick Drake.

Sometimes, however, the methodology isn't based on typical weights and measures:

"With 'Still Crazy,' I have this memory of staying up late at a sleepover party when I was a kid and seeing Paul Simon sing that song while wearing a turkey outfit. So that's the reference I have for it. It was an early point in my life. Often the musical experiences are like other experiences, where you have some early ones that are very strong and sort of get in your gut somewhere. Early experiences can, for me, inform everything that comes after."

According to the pianist, the number of Mehldau-approved classics could fill a couple of notebook pages. While they come from all over the map, these are the tunes that take him somewhere emotionally.

"John Coltrane, a Beethoven string quartet, the Beatles, Bob Dylan: These really heavy people can resonate with you at different points in your life," he points out. "You hear a song when you are an angry teenager and that's what it's about. Then you hear it in your thirties and it means something more general. Who knows what it will mean in your forties. I'm pretty sure that some stuff will always give something to me. That's the stuff that I would call great."

These early influences and the songs he chooses to cover are the stuff that defines music for him and why he loves it. Like looking through an old photo album filled with still-vivid memories, the songs on Anything Goes are reasons why Brad Mehldau still loves music—sometimes for a particular song at a particular time, sometimes because it's a favorite influential artist... sometimes it's a turkey outfit.

While he's quick to cite favorites, Mehldau is not so interested in the history lessons that are such a prominent part of jazz. Over the years he's been saddled with such comparisons to legends like Bill Evans and Keith Jarrett, thanks to the former's delicate touch with a ballad and the latter's phenomenally limitless style; but for him, these projections seem strained.

"Why don't people make comparisons with your contemporaries? I don't understand this whole father/son thing in jazz where different generations are compared," the pianist says, shaking his head. "I've seen Danilo Perez's trio with Adam Cruz and Ben Street, and frankly, they've given me a few ideas of things I can do with my trio. Bill Charlap's trio: I heard them recently. And the things he does with arrangements and his approach, the general economy of what he is doing, it definitely influenced me. Actually it kind of messed me up for a few days. I realized I had to practice a little more piano, you know?"

Still fully engaged in learning, still in love with music—one gets the feeling that Mehldau couldn't have been happier when he realized that there was more to learn. **NMR**


200 Moves

fter multiple weeks riding the crest of the Radio 200 for multiple weeks, Sun Kil Moon tumbles down to No. 5, allowing Air's Talkie Walkie to slip into the driver's seat. Trailing closely behind, Stereolab soars up the chart like a kitten launched by a catapult, landing at No. 2 on the Radio 200 and No. 1 at Core. Dizzee Rascal's Boy In Da Corner (XL-Matador), meanwhile, leaps into the Top 10 at No. 7 — if you haven't spent some time with this disc, you're truly missing out. Also new to the Top 10 this week are impressive releases from Starsailor (15-8*), Camera Obscura (11- 9^*) and Electrelane (16-10^{*}). Outside of the Top 10, the Walkmen's Bows And Arrows makes an impressive debut at No. 12*, while the Frames' Set *List* joins the fun at No. 43*. 

wo years ago, Liars were the shimmying ambassadors of the Brooklyn hipsterati, launching a greasy funk-punk blitzkrieg on mainstream radio and leading the charge in what the press dubbed "neo-no wave" (anyone with half a working earhole can figger it was more stylistically linked to wiry, tightly wound groove-based post-punkers like Gang Of Four). Since then, Liars severed ties with both their rhythm section and their metropolitan ways, deserting a borough infested with unwashed artfucks for the forests of New Jersey. Their second album They Were Wrong, So We Drowned (Mute) drops everything funky, groove-based, hooky-fuck it, accessible-in favor of a hypnotic, mind-fudging, austere hodgepodge like Sonic Youth's Bad Moon Rising rolling the Black Dice. Entranced by sonic imagery culled from children's books, witchy yarns and folklore, vocalist/guitarist Angus Andrew, guitarist Aaron Hemphill and new drum clanker Julian Gross prepare for their befuddling second record to either cast spells or get burned at the stake.

When you guys were this weirdo dance-funk band in the middle of all this attention, what was the absolute strangest thing you had to do? Hemphill: Oh, Amsterdam. We did this thing where you play for radio... in reverse though. You play three songs and immediately after you play, you run to a couch and you're interviewed by their David Letterman. And we're all pretty faded. Usually two of us stay pretty straight so we can make sense of the interview, but we were all just faded. And it's all just broadcast, so it's not intimate like a show where people keep clapping or something. Angus and our drummer at the time went to this couch, 'cause they lost the bet. And then the band after us was this Hawkwind Amsterdam band that was awesome.

Well, if it was weird being on the radio and stuff, you're certainly not going to have any problem with mainstream radio play with the new album...

Hemphill: Well you know it, but then you don't, 'cause we also didn't think anyone would hear our first record.

Andrew: [Now] our first record sounds like the poppiest, most commercial, K-Rock... But we didn't think that at the time.

Hemphill: I'm not gonna say it's gonna give us much radio play, but —Interview By Christopher R. Weingarten

by the time our next record comes out it'll be, "Your last record was so boring and traditional."

Did Mute hear the record and go like, "Um... dudes?"

Hemphill: [Hemphill points to picture of Throbbing Gristle's Genesis P-Orridge] This guy puts out records on Mute. You can't top what they've done.

Andrew: It would be a lie to say that Mute didn't freak out when we told them we were gonna get rid of [bassist] Pat and [drummer] Ron and start the whole thing again from scratch. Obviously there was some ripple effect throughout the company because of that. I think it was a point where we had to really stick to our guns and tell them exactly what we were gonna do and once we got through that little bit, then everything else was fine. And so they had to make a leap of faith and we had to just change a few things, but overall we've never had a problem with them because they're so open-minded.

Why did you misspell the song "If Your [sic] A Wizard, Then Why Do You Wear Glasses?"

Andrew: That's no intention there. That's Julian's... uh... [laughs] Gross: I didn't even put that in there, actually. Or did I?

Andrew: It's just the bonus of working with someone who's not really that acclimatized to the English language... and more importantly, the rules that you follow.

Gross: And "to." I always have a problem with "to," wanting to put two o's. Look, I have "answer" written on my hand five times. Where

does that 'w' fit in there? I was doing this drawing and I was starting with "answer," and I was like "a-n-s... what? That can't be right! Answer? An-wer-swer?"

Andrew: I'll make a phone call right after this. Get some intern to write in all the apostrophes.

You already had to answer for this whole "post-punk nation" bullshit. If this record breaks, you'll have to answer for the whole noise scene-be ambassadors for Lightning Bolt or something... **Gross:** That's gonna suck.

Andrew: Then we'd have to make some freakin' pop record next and get ourselves out of that.

BRAD MEHLDAU

Anything Goes (Warner Bros.)

Pianist Brad Mehldau is one of those rare musicians who are able to walk the line as artistically challenging players with wondrous chops, while also carving out a successful career as a leader. After putting the Bill Evans comparisons to rest with the sonic exotica of 2002's *Largo* — on which he worked with rock producer Jon Brion and others — Mehldau returns to his long-running trio with bassist Larry Grenadier and drummer Jorge Rossy for *Anything Goes*. The three tackle tunes such as Harold Arlen's "Get Happy" and the Cole Porter-penned title track, but they also add some new blood into the mix with a simmering version of Radiohead's "Everything In Its Right Place" and a playful take on Paul Simon's "Still Crazy After All These Years." The tone here is more reflective than the fire of the live recordings, but that doesn't mean that the results are anything less than invigorating.

PERCY HEATH

A Love Song (Daddy Jazz)

Percy Heath's resume reads like a who's-who of bebop, as he's served both as the bassist of the Modern Jazz Quartet and a sideman for hundreds of other sessions. So, after all this time, it's hard to believe that *A Love Song* is Heath's first album under his own name. He opens with a solo rendering of the title cut, which he wrote for Milt Hinton's funeral, and it reveals a swingin' style that's wide open, but always in time. On the rest of the disc, Heath (on either bass or cello) is joined by his brother, Tootie Heath, on drums, as well as pianist Jeb Patton and fellow bassist Peter Washington. The seven-song set mixes excellent Heath originals with a notable cover of MJQ's famed "Django," plus a few others. This is an album that has been long overdue.

The Jazz world mourns the death of **Art Ensemble Of Chicago** bassist **Malachi Favors**, who passed away on Jan. 30, after a lengthy bout with pancreatic cancer. He was 66. The only bassist to play with the group in its 40 years together, Favors had been quietly battling the disease for the last few years, but chose to keep it from everyone, including his band members. While no reason has been given for his choice to keep his illness quiet, people close to the group suspect that the devastating blow they experienced when band member **Lester Bowie** died in 1999 (from liver cancer) prompted the decision. At press time, the wake and service for Favors were scheduled to take place on Feb. 5 at Love Community Church in Hazel Crest, a suburb of Chicago. The remaining band members, meanwhile, still planned to carry on and honor the dates the group has booked in 2004. JAZZ

CANNIBAL CORPSE

The Wretched Spawn (Metal Blade)

You know the drill. Cannibal Corpse's lyrics are so putrid, so pungent, so vile, that the group has been banned in Germany. You have to raise an eyebrow to wonder where this Florida death squad comes up with some of its scenarios. (How can we forget "Fucked With A Knife" from back in Cannibal's heyday?) Nevertheless, the Corpse is celebrating 15 years of gore by releasing their ninth studio album. Sure, the band is in the twilight of their career, but rigor mortis isn't setting in just yet. In fact, The Wretched Spawn is faster than most previous Cannibal Corpse releases. It's got speedy riffs, songs with abrupt endings, and, of course, those vomit-inducing lyrics that have become the band's trademark. The lyrical subjects are as outrageous as you'd expect, but they push the envelope to the point of being funny, as opposed to obscene - severed heads, crypts, disembowelments, and castrations are the order of the day here. And while Six Feet Under, the band that former singer Chris Barnes defected to, layers their death metal with groove, Cannibal Corpse spikes the metal punch not only with fresh, thick blood, but also with some thrashy elements. So, rev up the ol' chainsaw and start hacking at still-warm flesh with "Severed Head Stoning," "Festering In The Crypt" and "Nothing Left To Mutilate."

We do have a question, though: How do radio gurus **Andrew Sample** and **Kurt Briggs** handle it all? Kudos, gentlemen, on a job well done, and on having a great stable of artists to work with.

HART OF THE MATTER

esponse to last week's Manifest *despedida* was fantastic, but we couldn't let y'all have the last word when Manifest Discs And Tapes owner **Carl Singmaster** was offering a few of his own. Thanks, everyone... and thanks, Carl.

What's the response been since you made your decision to close Manifest?

The response has been beyond anything I would ever have anticipated. There's been a tremendous outpouring of every range of emotion you can imagine—some people being understandably bitter, angry and even expressing hatred; to people in the industry expressing everything from sympathy to congratulations! There's a lot of people that have felt a lot of pain in the last few years so for many, the idea of my graduating out and not being *too* damaged for it is something that they think is a smart move.

How long have you flirted with this decision?

Anyone who has substantial retail obligations, lease liabilities, etc. is aware that they need to be looking at their options yearly. Certainly, I started looking at this when the downturn began three, four years ago—when I started saying we had to design worst-case scenarios into our future planning. What really prompted this was the timing of our lease obligations. When that happens, in some cases you say, "I can stretch it for one more year," and in other cases you can't because you're asking yourself, "Am I going to re-up and extend my liabilities or is this an appropriate time to exit?" I had the good fortune of having the timing all set up in advance—there was a certain amount of planning that went into this about four years ago when I saw the downturn coming.

But throughout, I continued to hope for and crusade for the things I thought would open doors. The number one thing was the return of the single. Frankly, I thought it was fairly close to unanimous. We wanted the ability to have access to the same music that is being made available for electronic download legally and at the same price. I've been asking for that since eMusic first launched, but it didn't fit the economic model of the labels. It has not fit the model of an entrepreneur to be shut out of that music either. Logically speaking, they're going to say singles are available, and that those singles are selling better online than they are physically—but *of course* they are! They're only *available* online. If they can make money selling for 69 cents online, why can't they make money selling it at 69 cents to me while I absorb the cost of packaging it. That was my proposal. We could sell *tons* more music. We could have built things like the Manifest Mix CD Of The Week for all the hot urban hits, etc. That's what we lobbied for, the ability to build all kinds of custom compilations since this is the same music that is already being made available to consumers.

As an efficient retailer with retail systems, we found that it's very efficient to bake our donuts at a central facility and deliver them by the hundreds, ready-to-eat, to the stores; rather than have the customer come in and we spend twenty minutes teaching them how to bake their own. Ultimately [the labels] would get the same amount of money—I just wanted to be able to press a hundred CDs in my central warehouse. But the answer was "No, we absolutely can't do that!"

It's been the total unwillingness to address the issues from a customer's perspective. And that's where the frustration level became so high for me over the last few years that I didn't feel, as an entrepreneur, that I was getting the stimulation from the business that I needed even though I still frankly believe that I could find a way, as a retailer, to make money over the next five years. But I didn't get into this just to be a retailer. I got into it because I was juiced by music and I found out a way to make *some* money so that I could grow the business—and the growth *was* fun and exciting. But when it stopped growing and doors started getting slammed in my face that would prevent me from having future growth, I decided that this was not the career for me.

What will you miss the most?

I'm going to miss the other retailers I associated with and some great label people... and the customers, of course. It's the people I'm gonna miss the most.

So, what's next?

I have no idea. It's fulltime settling all this—two to three months—and then I'll sit back and see if my phone rings! I do not know what I want to do. I know people don't believe that, but I have not spent really any significant time addressing it. I do know that it has to involve either music or beer. I'm sure my friends at CIMS will be quite happy that I won't be there trying to drag them to various brew pubs. I love those people, and one of the most emotional parts and difficulties in departing is losing contact with those folks—'cause they are the best in the world. That'll be the first order of business, scheming how I can keep working with them! Thanks to everyone for all the kind words.



In 2003, the sales of ring tones-those tinny, irritating squeals bleating "Wanksta" from people's pockets while you're trying to watch a movie-have risen 40 percent. The public nuisances leaped up to \$3.5 billion-approximately 10 percent of the \$32.2 billion global music market.

ast the prickly pears and redbirds of Texas's highway, a drive to Houston will reveal a different kind of cactus... one standing taller than any saguaro. "We're Texas's oldest music company, established in 1933," says Quinn Bishop, general manager of Cactus Music And Video. "Our original owner was Pappy Daily, who was a record distributor and a wholesaler, and he opened up a record store called Daily's Record Ranch." In 1975, they opened Cactus (after the Ranch closed in the '50s), which Quinn has been operating with reverent 20/20 hindsight: "When you come in our front door, the first thing you see are photographs of Hank Williams, Sr., Hank Thompson and the stars of the Louisiana Hayride performing live in our store."

Having supported Texas-bred music since Cactus first sprouted, they always try to do whatever they can to further the sun-stroked cause. "It's our bread and butter," says Quinn. "As music retail is consolidated to a certain degree, we're the destination for people that are looking for these artists." By priding its state's music, and trying to meet the needs of his customers, Cactus remains a unique shopping Texperience. "We're just trying to make sure that we're a destination," says Quinn. "You know, a place where there's always something going on, and people can wander in and have a good time." Q&A with Quinn Bishop, general manager, Cactus Music And Video

What local press affects sales most?

We have two weeklies, one that is a *New Times* paper, which is the *Houston Press*. We have a close relationship with them; we sponsor the Music Awards each year. We have a recent upstart, which is called the *Free Press*.

What radio station affects sales most?

Well, the music programs on our Pacifica station, KPFT, have a great effect. We have some specialty shows on KRTS that appeal to fans of classic blues, jazz and post-war vocalists. Beyond that, Houston's airwaves consists mostly of Clear Channel, Cox and Infinity these stations are not pace-setters.



What's the difference between an SUV and a cactus? A cactus has pricks on the outside! Thanks, folks, we'll be here all night, enjoy the veal.

Do you have in-stores?

Over the years, we've hosted **Police**, **Ramones**, **Sarah McLachlan**, **Jeff Buckley**, **Patti Smith**, many others. Most Texas artists schedule a Cactus appearance to launch a new release. We have a minimum of eight or ten a month.

What is your most effective program?

LINCS

Our Cactus Picks Developing Artist program and our "Listen Up, Music Lover" guide are very effective; they feature print and listening station components. We run 20 titles in the Cactus Picks and 40-plus in Listen Up, which is a four-page center spread. The CIMS programs are a great way to turn our customers on to new music.

What other programs do you offer? Are any of them discretionary?

We do a tremendous amount of added-value promotions, especially in the first two weeks of an anticipated release. We offer discretionary listening posts, but those are generally reserved for titles we feel strongly about.

What types of non-traditional promotions have worked the best?

One of the very successful things we've done is venue sales, where the purchase of a CD is a ticket into the venue. We did that with **Rodney Crowell** recently, and it was amazingly successful; sold out the club.

What display materials work best for you?

We're using a lot of the 3'x3' and the 2'x2' foamcore artboards, as well as banners for our windows.

What records are your current and all-time favorites?

The Rodney Crowell record [*Fate's Right Hand*] was phenomenal. All time, *Runt: The Ballad Of Todd Rundgren.*

What's the first record you bought and where?

Elvis Presley, 50,000,000 Elvis Fans Can't Be Wrong at a Globe department store.

What's the best concert you've attended?

One of my favorites from a few years ago was **Dan Penn** and **Spooner Oldham** shows, and those were phenomenal. That Rodney Crowell thing we did was great
