"The Coin Machines Merry-Go-Round"

For some weeks now our opening editorial item has been in reference to the forthcoming Second Wartime Conference of the coin operated machines industry. Today, we open these same editorial pages - at the Second Wartime Conference in the Hotel Morrison, Chicago. For these three memorable and we do hope historical days, November 15, 16 and 17, 1943, there will be gathered together many hundreds of coinmen. Some will be meeting each other for the first time. Others will renew acquaintanceships which have long been idle.

This Second Wartime Conference is directly attributable to those men who came together in the First Wartime Conference of this industry at the Hotel Waldorf-Astoria in New York City, August 16

and 17, 1943. This was an emergency meet. It was called together hurriedly. It could not possibly attract the large number of men who would have liked to attend. There wasn't sufficient time given for most of the men to obtain rail and hotel reservations. But many, many telegrams and letters arrived asking that another conference be called and that more time be given to assemble the coinmen from all over the nation. Those that were present at the First Wartime Conference also agreed to this, unanimously. The Second Wartime Conference was therefore activated into being by The Cash Box at the request of these men from all over the nation.

Here, gathered together at the Hotel Morrison, are the men who believe that this is the greatest and grandest business in the land. These men are gathered together to work on the theme of this conference: "CREATER AID TO THE WAR EFFORT", so as to, if at all possible, remove the stigma of "non-essential" from this industry. These men have already done much for the war effort. They are continuing to work harder for the victorious finish of the war each and every day. They have the satisfaction of knowing that everyone of their manufacturers are engaged 100% in war work. They know that others have already done much remarkable work for the War Bond drives by the letters these men have received from the Treasury Department. Not only that, but the Army and Havy, too, have paused in their busy efforts to compliment the men of this industry for what they have already done to help bolster and maintain the morale of the armed services in this country and thruout the far flung battlefronts of the world. The theme for this Second Wartime Conference, which makes this a most important meet for all engaged in this industry, is the theme that all the men want.

The program has been so arranged for these three days that the men will hear from the Army, Navy, Treasury Department and from such noted speakers as Irving Pflaum, Foreign News Editor of the Chicago Times. And all this is but the opening parade for the Open Forum meets of the second day. And the third day has been granted to the pleasure of the men themselves and will be known as "Get Together Day".

Here, in open forum, and for the first time in the history of this industry, will meet operators, jobbers, distributors and manufacturers, as well as many of the allied trades. They will be able to talk to each other openly. They will be able to, as a national group, discuss the varied problems of this industry. They may bring about solutions for these problems. They may even create here the beginning of better business meetings for the national membership of this industry thru a series of committees wherein the leaders of this industry, acting on these committees, will be able to help guide the footsteps of the men engaged in this business to greater heights than ever before attained.

Here is the opportunity to create that all important backbone for the trade that has long been lacking. Here, unselfishly and with energy and intelligence, can the men of this industry arrange for a finer future welfare for themselves. Here they can lay the groundwork to gain greater national acceptance. Gain better understanding of their business. Arrange for services to various good and noble causes. Gain the confidence and cooperation of their fellow coinman for the future, greater growth of this industry.

Here, all present, can help plan ahead for the coin machines world of tomorrow. Gain the understanding of legislative bodies and officials everywhere in the nation. "The Coin Machines Merry Go-Round" Create a code of ethics. Combine the efforts of all divisions of this industry into an efficient, workable unit for the future welfare of all concerned. Overlook various small and personal foctors and jealousies and get together in the work necessary to future growth. Cast out any personal misunderstandings or bickerings and make way for the fact that this industry is going to reach outstanding, and even gigantic proportions, in the post-war era. Its present small, and highly concentrated membership now has a most glorious opportunity to do something that will live forever afterward in the history of this industry.

The Second Wartime Conference eagerly and even anxiously holds out to all the men gathered at the Hotel Morrison the possibility of great achievement. It wants to most anxiously give the laurel wreath of recognized accomplishment to those men who comprised this industry in the war year of '43. Perhaps then, we shall see as a result of this Second Wartime Conference a new and greater and finer industry. An industry of which you can forever be proud.

EQUITABLE TAXATION

The time has arrived when some sort of move must get under way to arrange for more equitable taxation. The arcade owners tried to get their tax set-up changed in Washington. The A.O.L.A.C. of Los Angeles also appeared before the House Ways & Means Committee. A more concerted, completely national move is now necessary to bring about a more liberal understanding of this industry to legislative bodies so that more equitable taxation will result.

There is no politically prominent personage at the present time who will take the stump in Washington, or anywhere else for that matter, to get coin machines taxation or any other industrial taxation reduced. Such political action will have to wait for the post-war period, when gradually, as the great force of men now in the armed services are disbanded, as the many initialed organizations in Washington disappear, someone with sufficient courage can go to the front to have industry's taxes reduced so that private enterprise will again be able to function unfettered. This industry, being aware of the nation's need for as much funds as it can possibly accumulate to correctly conduct the war, is not going to ask that taxes be lowered, but instead, must ask that some arrangements be made whereby present taxation will be more equitable.

The pin games men thruout the nation face an unusual problem. They are paying \$10.00 per machine, where no awards of any kind are being made, and must pay for the entire year's license in advance. This license is then issued in the name of the location owners. Yet, in most cases, it is actually paid for by the operator in cooperation with the location. Yet, should the operator remove his machine in 10 days or even less, he loses his entire year's license fee. Therefore some arrangement should be made wherein the license reverts back to the operator and also allows him to pay on a quarterly basis if necessary, especially where he has little confidence in the location's lasting power. In this way he can always be assured the full valuation of the license he purchases. Surely, when a man does not do business for an entire year, and yet is charged for the year, he should be given the protection of a pro-rata arrangement so that the fee he pays covers the actual period in which he operates, not for something that does not take into fair consideration the actual cost for the license for the period issued.

Most coinmen purchase full year licenses for their locations where they know they are more or less assured a full year's run. Other locations, such as for example, a new arcade, can be a great risk when it fails after a very short period of time. The arcade owners went to Washington with this problem. They explained that the seasonal arcade had only a brief, two month life out of the entire year. Yet these seasonal arcade men were forced to pay the same full year's price for their individual machines licenses as did those arcades that continued to do business all year 'round. This inequitable tax situation should be instantly changed. It simply does not make sense. It is attributed to a poorly written and even more poorly interpreted tax bill. Surely there is enough logal talent available to help reverse such an inequitable measure.

It is certainly not the intention of the national government to collect the same tax twice in the same year from the same place. Yet this has just happened to a new arcade in New England. And the only relief that could be suggested by the Internal Revenue Department of Boston to the seller, who just 28 days before had paid for the complete yearly licenses required, was to pay again, under protest, and then appeal to Washington. Instead, something much more definite should be done now. Arrange for a body of men chosen on a national basis from this industry and have these men work for equitable taxation with our Federal Covernment.- thru its various agencies, and thereby bring about a better understanding of the requirements of those engaged in this industry.

Another complaint emanates from Cleveland. One of the operators in that city has just been called in by the local Internal Revenue office and advised that he must pay a 10% tax on all parts he purchases for use in his operations. This probably comes as a surprise to all. How did this 10% parts tax come about? By whom and when? In short, here again is something in taxation that flashed right past the greater ma-

jority of those engaged in this industry and now creates a new problem for these men. This most definitely demonstrates the need for a body of the leaders from this industry to take an active part in the formation of a "tax council". This becomes more imperative each day. The new taxes that are now being cruated in Washington will make this even more necessary. And with local governments following the lead of the na. tion's capitol, then most certainly the need for a coin machines "tax council" is here.

There are a great many men in this industry who know how to create such a council. These men can arrange for regular meetings and also have a paid representative inform them of new taxes arising anywhere in the nation in regard to this industry. The creation of a "tax council" is today an absolute necessity. Until such a council is created, with headquarters probably in Washington, this industry will continue to suffer inequitable taxation.

TWO DEPRESSION YEARS

There is a growing belief among many leading economists that this country is going to enter into two severe depression years, from 1944 to 1946. Such leading statisticians as Leon Henderson, former head of OPA, report that the European War is scheduled for its finish in the Fall of '44 and the Japanese scheduled for their downfall the following year. A great many changes are therefore bound to occur in the present manufacturing set-ups and these will bring about great unemployment gauged to reach as high as 12,000,000 unemployed by '46, when the turn is then expected to come.

There is also no doubt that even with the European war finished in '44 no new coin operated equipment will appear on the market. As these economists report, manufacturers will swing over to rehabilitation products for those nations hardest hit by the war. So much is required by these nations that the plants which can furnish materials of this kind, for example plumbing and electrical and rail equipment, etc., will be extremely busy, whereas textiles and other lines of this nature, will once again start to return to somewhat normal production. But the steel and other metals needed for coin machines will be taken up by the needs of the distressed countries which this nation will help to return to normal.

As all coinmen, who operated in this industry in '29 to '33, when the worst depression in the history of this nation was in effect know, the earning power and popularity of coin operated equipment, because of its economical entertainment value, zoomed to new and greater heights during the depression and was the cause for the greatest growth for this industry. During these depression years a very large number of new men entered into this industry. Pin games were born during these years. And this, too, acted as a great incentive for new blood. There is no doubt, then, that coinmen can look forward to '44 to '46, if these statisticians are right, for a rebirth of coin operated equipment popularity.

<u>"e" awards</u>

Every industry in the nation is striving to prove its merit at precision production so that when the war is over they can come to the fore and remind the nation once again of what superior craftsmanship they gave to the war effort. Yet, in no other industry that we can think of have such a large percentage of "E" awards been made as in this coin operated machines industry. We can all be mighty proud of this achievement on the part of our factories.

Look at this first roll call of awards, and there are more on the way: Stoner Manufacturing Company; Watling Manufacturing Company; J. P. Seeburg Corp.; Packard Manufacturing Corp.; The Rudolph Wurlitzer Company; Lion Manufacturing Corp.(Bally Manufacturing Company). These have already received their Army & Navy "E". This is a mighty high percentage of "E" awards in comparison to the complete number of factories working in this industry. There is no doubt anymore but what this percentage will continue to grow greater as the months roll by. It is our sincerest and fondest hope to believe that the day will arrive when each and everyone of the active factories in this industry will receive an "E". This is sure to be the greatest day in the history of this coin operated machines industry.

A few weeks ago we wrote, "You can be mighty proud of your manufacturers". Today, with the fact that such a mighty percentage of the number of factories engaged in this industry has already won their "E" - you can be even more proud of your industry. We've got a great industry. The war is proving it. Our men are in there, every minute of the day, hitting harder than hell at the enemy. Let's all of us get back of them.Let's give all and everything to GREATER AID TO THE WAR EFFORT - the theme of the Second Wartime Conference.

HAT'S it all about — this thing we call a coin machine? It's just a gadget that someone thought up and in which someone else saw opportunity and there came to be an industry. Building a coin machine is like putting on a show. In well guarded, hidden, factory nooks, away from all else, sit busy men who saw and file and draw and think and argue and calculate and eventually produce the first handmade – a coin machine. And then it is model of fearfully viewed by the manufacturer and his engineers and production experts and his advertising and merchandising staff. Just like drilling the chorus and rehearsing the stars and listening to the new songs and building the stage settings. And then, after many, many thousands have been spent, the curtain is raised. And there, presented to all is — a coin machine. And it either reaches the top or becomes a flop on the say-so of those small and big town critics who buy it, guide it, and attempt to earn with it.

And what about those men who baby it? Who are called out of their warm beds at midnight because Joe Doak's Tavern needs \$2.00 worth of nickels? And return home tired and disgruntled? And somewhere on a lonely road in some dingy honky-tonk another coin machine has stopped functioning. And up he gets again. And once again he starts to drive. Sleepy, tired, grouchy and all for what? For this thing we call a coin machine. He lives it. He eats it. He dreams it. He trades and deals and argues and chisels and buys and sells and somehow keeps on going for this thing we call—a coin machine. "What a life," he cries in disgust.

He continually howls about being "gypped," about "junk being shipped to me," about "machines that won't work," and about "manufacturers who don't care a damn about you after you're sold." and about "distributors that are just after your money," and about "locations that are always griping" and about "parts that you never get when you order 'em," and about a thousand and one things more. But — he loves it — loves this thing we call — a coin machine.

"Damn taxes are getting higher," he laments, "storekeepers are getting too smart." he wails. And he cries, "who in the hell wants to be in a business where locations disappear overnight" and "where you don't know whether you are in or out of business when you wake up" and "where legislators and politicians and cops and sheriffs and every monkey's uncle wants something or other from you" and "when you think you're making a buck along comes another new gadget and you've got to buy it whether you like it or not or lose the spot" and "you've got to take some jerk's guff and like it" and "you listen to complaints that make you sick and you've got to smile thru it all.³

"And," he groans, "you run into debt and the finance companies holler and your jobber yells and they put collectors on your tail" and "when you want a Sunday off along comes some location and tells you he's having a wedding and won't you bring some machines around for the guests to play free'' and "when you're all set to take a vacation some new monkey busts into your territory and starts offering loans and crazy percentages to get the spots" and "you're all set to quit and the offers they make you for your equipment almost knock you cold, everything they sold you is suddenly N.G. and lousy and old, and you just bought the stuff" stuff" . . . "so what the hell else is there to do?" . . . "You're stuck, so you may as well stay stuck." . . . "After all, it ain't such a bad business, you know." . . . "This thing we call - a coin machine."

Most certainly this is not the time to flash or even to discuss bankrolls. Not the time to gather large crowds in front of offices and talk business on sidewalks. Not the time to shout about the "take."

The men engaged in this industry at this time are much better off to proceed carefully, conservatively, as their bankers do. As is well known, only a handful of men, comparatively, are now operating the machines of this industry from coast to coast. There is no value in attracting the attention of outsiders to this fact. Stop attracting unnecessary attention to yourself and your firm. There are many, many reasons why. It would take a great many columns like this one to write about all of them.

This is the time to clean up all trucks and cars. Some of these feature extremely large lettering and flashy drawings of machines in colors. It is just as well that with tires and gasoline being so used (for what certain government agencies prefer to call a "non-essential industry") not to have your business so conspicuously flashed in front of the general public. It is just as easy to conduct business without such flashy trucks. Just as easy for servicing, collecting and general hauling operations. Loud, flashy lettering helps very little to give better service.

Many have large open display windows. These were attractive during the period preceding the war. They may prove all the more necessary when the war is over. But at this present time, they are simply of no value whatsoever to the average man in this industry. These large, open display windows, featuring machines only give the public and its officials an inside, unnecessary peek, into this business. Having your industry declared "non-essential", it is best that such windows be completely covered. Venetian blinds can make these windows appear just as attractive. Some like paint. But whatever is done, it is certain most will agree that this is not the time to attract attention to window displays of coin operated equipment of any type.

One type of carelessness which has always created comment has been that of many firms allowing their men to drop off machines on the sidewalk in front of their quarters. This even developed to the stage where, many times, mechanics would actually repair the machines right there on the sidewalk. No other business uses such tactics. The businesses that do aren't considered the type the average man in this industry wants to be connected with. This bit of thoughtlessness is something that should most definitely be eliminated by those that have been guilty of it.

Certain government agencies are rather disturbed by the fact that this industry employs a number of highly skilled mechanics. They feel that these men should be in war plants. The majority of such men are already in war work. More are going each day. Therefore it surely isn't necessary to feature the fact that the few of these men who are left, and who are so extremely necessary to the continuance of this business, aren't as yet at work in some war factory. Most of the mechanics want to remain right where they are. They realize that when the war is over they will probably be in charge of large repair departments. They also realize that they are extremely necessary now and want to prove their loyalty to their employers who aided them when jobs weren't so free and easy. They want to insure themselves for tomorrow. They want to work where they know they can be assured of a livelihood for years to come and perhaps even go up the ladder in their organizations to a much better position when the war is won.

To keep your valuable, skilled men with you, do not attract undue attenion to yourself and your firm. Work quietly, conservatively, without fuss or fanfare. This is not the time to have the type of suggestive calendars printed to attract attention to your firm. This is not the time to even "flash" the name of your firm too prominently. Your customers surely know you by this time. Certainly they know where to reach you when they need you.

When your machines are in transit, a few dollars invested in a tarpaulin will help tremendously to keep attenion away from them. Cover machines in transit. Keep them covered. Work quietly. Be sure that some "blue-nose" in your town doesn't see any coin operated equipment in transit, using up rubber and gasoline, and then have him start a "crusade" against you. There is no need to flaunt in his face the fact that you do use truckmen and skilled mechanics, etc. He will live just as happily not knowing these facts.

With the tremendous drive on against juvenile delinquency — keep your machines away from where children can get to them. Get your location owners to work with you in this respect. Make sure that you prominently display signs that advise the public that children are absolutely and definitely not welcome at these games. If you are running money machines, then most certainly you want to pay even more careful attention to this fact. Remember, the nation's leaders are back of this drive to curb juvenile delinquency and you want to work with them most wholeheartedly. Thank goodness, coinmen have proven that their equipment does not foster juvenile delinquency and have worked to aid the authorities in every instance.

This is the time for more quiet conservatism than ever before in the history of this industry. Quiet will prove of tremendously great value to all concerned. You have your trade medium here. You can tell your story here - quietly and confidentially. It was for that very purpose that The Cash Box was created. The Cash Box realized long, long ago, that the best actions for all the men in this industry for their future welfare, as the war came into being, was to adopt an attitude of quiet conservatism and to communicate with each other thru a confidential, truly trade medium. The great growth of The Cash Box is in itself convincing proof that all the leaders in this industry have also realized this necessity. Spread this one word thruout all the industry — "QUIET."

THE INSIDE STORY

For sometime now The Cash Box has been collecting facts and figures on this coin operated machines industry which are certain to prove of great interest. Our participation forms for the Second Wartime Conference brought out many new and interesting facts regarding the changes in equipment popularity which have come about in this business. These participation forms were checked and tallied against the facts already in the possession of The Cash Box. These proved extremely interesting for they showed that the swing of this industry was toward certain types of equipment which previously did not command such dominating positions.

It is of interest to the trade to check these facts and figures as collected in this survey. We believe that they prove that this industry has turned the corner of conservation and that regardless of the large number of men engaged in all types of machines operation, the outstanding equipment now being operated, reflects the new era for this industry when the war is won.


This does not mean that the field will remain dormant. Nor does it mean that today's leading equipment can retain its present position after the war without constant promotion and greatly increasing popularity. These survey figures can best be broken down by the simple fact that they indicate a war trend in equipment. They will prove of most unusual interest a few years after the war. It will then be of factual interest to all concerned to note when, why and how and also what may have caused any changes in the lineup.

Note that music continues to lead, but that the percentage of leadership has been tremendously increased. Pinball seems to retain its past percentage of adherents as well as its position regardless of the fact that so much territory closed. Pinball hasn't been shaken up too much by the war trend. This no doubt means a great deal to all those manufacturers and others considering this field for the post-war era.

The greatest surprise occurs in the arcade equipment field. Over half the men engaged in this industry at this time are either operating, jobbing or distributing arcade machines. Also interesting is the fact that 15% of the men engaged in this industry today are arcade owners. Whether this tremendous jump in percentage will hold up after the war will be very interesting to note. There are many who believe that it will and just as many who believe otherwise.

Consoles, slots and one-balls also show a definite increase. For a time there these machines were down low on the popularity list. It wasn't that the field did not want to use them but couldn't. These seem to have opened territory and are gaining in popularity. Scales are also among the great surprises, jumping into quite a commanding position and their popularity continues to grow. Merchandisers naturally tumbled due to a great many factors. The most outstanding being that of obtaining sufficient merchandise to continue them in profitable operation.

THE great developments that are under way at this time portend a marvelous future for those men who will be engaged in the coin machines industry — tomorrow. Electronic developments which may eliminate the use of a great many materials such as records and needles and change amplification and create other miracles in the music field. Cigarette machines which will accept coins of large denomination,

make change, and deliver packs of cigarettes without the need for pushing or pulling handles or working gadgets. Amusement devices of a new type never before dreamed about, incorporating the lessons the factories have learned thru use of new manufacturing processes and electrical advancements.

Everyone concerned with this industry wonders what equipment will look like after the war. Just to think that the manufacturers will return with modifications of the machines we know at present, wouldn't be rightful thinking on the part of anyone who reads what tremendous and progressive strides have been made by all manufacturers so far during this war. A great many of the discoveries and short cuts which have come about will greatly affect the equipment that will be produced in the future, post-war world. We have lived in a ground-hog age and now we're in the great air age. People today think in terms of air space and air speed. This change in human outlook will mean new equipment to attract these people.

More intricate mechanisms will appear. Ideas which we cannot as yet express, but which we, ourselves, have created thru our demand for more and still more highly complex machines of war will eventually be worked out into coin operated equipment. Most of the first equipment which will be produced will follow the pre-war pattern. But, while this is in the process of production new and more complex and extremely more modern machines will be on the drawing boards of engineers and in the experimental rooms and probably in the dies and tool stages. There will therefore be a most complete and revolutionary turn in the coin operated equipment field which may well change the entire present operating picture.

These and many more surprises are being prepared for the future. For the day when the war will end and the firms who have long considered this coin machines industry a lucrative field will enter with all their great manufacturing and financial power to build this division of America's entertainment industries to new and undreamed of heights.

During '40, '41 and the early part of '42, this industry saw the entrance of much new and powerful finance, mainly concentrated in the music and merchandisers fields. Now this finance has also progressed to the arcade field, and is each day advancing further into this industry. But all this will be but a drop in the proverbial bucket to what will be placed into this field when the war is over. With many large, international bankers already casting interested eyes this way, there is no doubt that by their influence they will arrange for acceptance of certain equipment on a huge, international basis. And the profit from financing as well as distributing and operating such equipment will prove greater than even they dream.

Nor are these statements just dreams — or hopes. But facts. Facts that each and every day make themselves more and more apparent. Facts that are gradually becoming known to many leaders as they enter into consultation on products they only dreamed about a few years ago. With these new products will be required the development of new and larger type markets. This will bring about a complete revolution in the present sales picture.

complete revolution in the present sales picture. Just what turn this will take will depend entirely upon the cost of the new equipment that will be produced. There is no doubt tho, that this new equipment will be costly. Because of this manufacturers will want to be better assured of sales quotas. No more gambling on what can be sold thruout the country. If one avenue of merchandising cannot accommodate the necessary volume another will be found to take over. The picture from the sales standpoint will therefore be revolutionized by its own progression. Factory agencies are sure to arise everywhere in the country. Other distribution factors will play an important part. Direct public appeals will also be put forth in future sales programs to get the basic player market into instant action so that demand will thereby be created for the eventual purchase of new equipment. This will mean sales organizations acquainted with and geared to complete merchandising and sales promotion understanding of all fields and methods. Many surprising changes are coming about in the sales picture which will be truly surprising in their scope.

The coin machines world of tomorrow will be a new and different and better business. A more highly developed and possibly much more complex industry. It will perhaps have to make way for a great many new leaders who will start it off on a path it had always hoped for. It will look intimately into the foreign markets that are now accumulating vast cash reserves in this country as the trade balance swings their way.

The the coin machines industry was gradually assuming international prominence as an industry, prior to the war, because of larger and still larger exports, it will really reach an internationally important stage within a few years after the war is over. Equipment will reach far into Asia and Europe. This will create an international exchange of machines. This equipment will be so well financed, not only by American but by foreign bankers, that it promises to wield a mighty influence in international commerce. Samples will be shipped by air routes now charted and tested by international airlines. Complete shipments to points many thousands of miles away will be made with a speed that will amaze those now engaged in this industry. Sales action all over the known world will come within the speed of American methods.

These are the reasons that cause The Cash Box to hit harder than ever to gain the necessary type of business ethics which will allow for those firms now engaged in this industry to best benefit from the developments that are so certain to come about when the war is over. The coin machines world of tomorrow — the better business world all the leaders in this industry are striving for — that world is a surety. It's sure to be a new world. A speedier, better, grander, bigger world for those men who know the way to merchandise and to develop and to promote and to market. It's a world worth working and waiting for.
