PRAISE FLOODS IN FOR SURVEY

Letters continue to flood in from all over the nation praising the survey now in progress to determine a standard for jobber and distributor recognition. Not only have the leading jobbers and distributors enthusiastically and energetically joined in to help in this survey, but letters have been received from numbers of coinmen from all over the country stating that this should have been done years and years ago.

Each one of these letters strongly urges that this effort on the part of The Cash Box be carried out to an absolute and successful conclusion. Everyone seems to want a line of demarcation drawn somewhere down thru the vitals of this industry so that the trade, especially now that it is anticipating entering into this coming hectic post-war era, will know just where it is at - at least as far as the wholesaling factors of this industry are concerned.

One noted leader writes that if such a survey had been conducted years ago and a recognition bureau created, the trade would have been in perfect position to completely and intelligently answer any of OPA's, or for that matter, anyone else's questions as to the wholesale element of this industry. He also claims that credit would have been much more easy to obtain from leading financiers years ago. He believes that this industry would have moved much further ahead for greater general recognition from all American business. He also states that the manufacturers would have been in a better merchandising position for they would have then known just how to proceed regarding volume sales of their products.

Many ask The Cash Box to assume the duties of such a recognition bureau. In ananswer to these men, let it be known that The Cash Box feels that this would be beyond the call of publishing duty. But The Cash Box will make every effort to help get such a bureau started. And will promise at this time to completely cooperate with such a bureau for the future better welfare of this entire industry.

The coinmen who piled so much praise on The Cash Box for this daring and courageous move also claim that this is the first time in the history of this industry that someone has come to the fore to attempt, in logical and intelligent fashion, to cure this great failing. Everyone of these men is of the belief that this survey should be broadcast as far and wide as is possible- so that even those who are only as yet contemplating future wholesaling activities will know that this industry is already under way with plans to help such firms to correctly establish themselves.

As yet there have been no radical changes suggested to The Cash Box aside from the questions now appearing in the survey sheet as enclosed with this issue. This will be the third consecutive week in which this survey sheet has been included as a prominent part of The Cash Box. Those who have already filled out the survey and have mailed it in are now urged to get everyone else they know in the industry to do the same. If they know of any firms who are among the "self-announced" jobbers or distributors, it would be to their complete advantage to turn the survey over to such firms. In this way a most complete survey can be brought into being.

When The Cash Box believes that the greater majority of the returns are in it will, at that time, announce the complete results. No one man will be embarrassed. All individual survey reports will remain confidential. They will be placed before the trade as collective and not individual opinions.

And at that time The Cash Box will announce an even more daring and more courageous plan to help make such a recognition bureau a national possibility.

WHOM ARE YOU KIDDING?

This item is addressed to a few firms thruout the country who have, or seemingly have, forgotten all about good business practise. These are the same coinmen who would go running to their naborhood hardware store were this retailer to send them a defective $5\not$ bolt. They would not only return this nickel bolt, but would raise hell with the hardware dealer and attempt, in a few heated words, to teach him the lesson of good business practise. "And furthermore", they would yell, "if you want to keep me for a

customer you better not try to hand me that kind of stuff in the future. Just remember the war won't last forever."

To these men, then, is this item being written. The same men who will make life hard for any business man in their home town who attempts to give them anything but what they ordered. The men who, when approached as individuals, always talk of the glowing machines they ship, and complain about machines they receive.

This is a tragic era. The kind of an era when almost anything goes. People are told that complaints are out of order. Yet the fact that there may be fewer complaints certainly should not deter anyone from continuing to give his best to build for the future. Those men who because they feel the other man did so they, too, can do so, and ship out a machine that hasn't even had the dirt cleaned from the glass, not to speak of being gone over by a mechanic, are simply kidding themselves.

It would probably amaze these same men to learn that The Cash Box (as well as a great many others thuout the country) have been told all about them. And sometimes tho they do not receive a direct complaint, they can be assured that indirectly a complaint has been registered and that many look upon them with suspicion. The kind of suspicion that travels with vicious speed across the nation by word of mouth and affects them tragically just when they need commendation and not condemnation.

Those men who have forgotten the tenets of good business practise and simply shove everything and anything at other coinmen thruout the country who, in good faith, order merchandise from them, are hurting no one as much as they are hurting themselves. At this time when this industry is so much smaller these men, of their own good and free will, can practise good business ethics in every regard. This is the time when they can help to establish a standard for used merchandise that will meet with national approval, not only for today, but for the future as well. This is the time when such men should stop announcing that they have certain equipment on hand when these machines aren't as yet even a gleam in their eyes. They should stop kidding themselves, to be conclusive.

For many months The Cash Box has courageously stepped to the fore where others have feared to tread, and has openly talked about deposit grabbers and what should be done to stop them. The Cash Box has urged the men in this industry, time and time again to help clear out nefarious practises. It has also been the first to fight any evils which might, in any fashion whatsoever, endanger this industry. Once again The Cash Box dares tell the truth, and tell it with sound logic.

The one and only way in which each coinman can better himself for tomorrow is to help better this entire industry. Only then can he be assured that there is a better future for him in this business. Just to believe that his own operation will always take care of him isn't logic. Each man in this industry is dependent upon the other man. If all will act right and do right then this industry will go ahead. If the postal authorities, better business bureaus, police departments, courts of law and all other outside organizations continually receive complaints regarding members of this industry, then this business has hurt itself to a tremendous extent. For the leaders of civic life will never then come to the fore to help this industry when their help is needed.

Because of this the good work done by those men who have donated thousands of dollars worth of equipment to the armed forces will fall by the wayside. The actions of others who have given much to charities and institutions and other commendable causes will mean little in the final accounting. The actions of this minority, it is sad to relate, are always remembered by these outsiders. This minority brings anything but good will to this industry. This is the minority that brings down upon this industry - notoriety.

There have been some pitiable cases during this tragic war period of poor business practise on the part of a few in this industry. Most of these, tho they may not as yet realize it, have established a very poor name for themselves throut the trade. Visitors hear about them and spread the word. Salesmen in their travels tell about their actions. Others condemn them openly. All this reacts with disfavor upon everyone in this industry, not only upon these few.

Therefore The Cash Box once more appeals to the leaders of this business to openly and without fear expose any and all evil business practise. Not complain to courts of law or other bureaus thuout the nation so that all this business suffers. These are the problems of this industry and this industry alone. These are the problems that must be cured within the trade. They should never be brought to the attention of outsiders for then this business suffers the kind of black eye which is extremely hard to eradicate.

It is a well known fact thruout the trade that The Cash Box has refused and continues to refuse the subscriptions of certain firms in this industry. Their actions are so abominable that even attempts to bring them into the fold and thereby educate them to better business practises have failed. As a last resort in such cases, The

Cash Box can only refuse their subscriptions so that at least, in this fashion, the subscribers of The Cash Box will not be hurt. The fact that every now and then some of these firms do obtain a copy of The Cash Box and make use of it for buying or selling is then the fault of one of the subscribers who does not realize that by allowing such people to glance thru The Cash Box they are actually hurting their own fellow coinmen.

Months ago The Cash Box urged the creation of a better business bureau for the industry. It also urged local bureaus be created in leading coincenters. It asked the men to get together. To call a meeting. And that The Cash Box would help with all its energies to make such a meet successful. A better business bureau for coin machines men would be able to prevent much of the poor business practises that some have fallen into.

Some of these men only do this sort of thing because, they claim, others have done it to them. This is just about the poorest excuse in all the world. But because there is no agency to whom they can appeal, because there is no one force in the trade that will work for them, these men have no other alternative, they believe, than to stew in the angry juices which accumulate in their systems because of broken, dirty machines shipped to them and deposits held up for months, and seek for revenge in due time. In attempting to get revenge they simply start this vicious circle all over again.

The Cash Box has settled more disputes, has had more deposits returned, and has arranged for much better understanding, than any other medium in all the history of this industry. This is no boast. It is hard to conceive, to any outsider, that a publication, which should be devoting itself entirely to its own problems, must also act as a better business bureau, a general complaint department, judge and jury and goodness knows what else. The Cash Box, in an attempt to cure some of the evil being practised by these few, even went to the unheard of extent of offering free deposit insurance, the first time this has ever been done by any publication.

But this is not the story of The Cash Box. It is, instead, a story about those few men thruout the country who are actually kidding themselves and no one else. They must be made to change their ways. They must be made to see straight. They must be made to realize that this industry can only continue on successfully as an industry when each and every man engaged in it works for the best interests of all. They must be made to realize that complaints, finding their way into courts of law and into the hands of other authoritative agencies, are not helping this industry and that some day will blow up with a violent explosion.

Before this happens, before those decent men who are using this industry as the medium for their livlihood and for the few dollars they desire to accumulate for their later years can suffer, the men in this industry must get fighting mad - so fighting mad that they will go out of their way to abolish any such firms from this business whose sole intentions and ambition are a quick clean up and then disappearance.

U.S.E.S. GIVES COIN HELP LAST

Reports have been filtering in from coinmen located in critical labor shortage areas that the U.S. Employment Service, where all avilable manpower in such areas must register, gives help to coinmen last. These reports have been received by The Cash Box for some time. One noted coinman reports that in contacting U.S.E.S. he was advised that all avilable help was being shifted into war plants and other allied essential industries first. He was told that if there was anything left after that, he would possibly be informed. Yet, he is forced to go to the U.S.E.S. for help, because this is the ruling in such critically short manpower areas.

Cutbacks and rollbacks of war materials orders have eased this situation to some extent in certain territories. In others, where war contracts have suddenly been shifted because of changing needs, these conditions have been placed into effect by the War Manpower Commission and the shortage of labor for such work as this industry becomes extremely acute.

This has had its effect as far as operations are concerned. At the same time in such territories many coinmen fathers, subject to draft, have gone into war plants. They have therefore been forced to cut down on their routes because of the hours they must put in at war plants. This, in addition to lack of help, and the further fact that they simply cannot give the route the attention it requires, has decided them on smaller, more highly concentrated operations within an efficient area. This has brought machines to market. It is generally believed that this condition will become more actte as the summer comes on and the demand for more armed men to displace casualties of the invasion comes into effect. The machines now on many locations will be sold. Routes will be chopped up and parts of routes will be sold as going businesses. More machines are therefore certain to find their way to market.

"Jalking Out Loud"

High School Phonos

The following newspaper item was mailed to us by one of our Norfolk, Va. subscribers. The headline reads: "Jive in School". The story: "The Blair Junior High School has installed a juke box in the gymnasium for free dancing during lunch period.

"Grayton Daughtrey, gym instructor, said a light session of jive would aid digestion, encourage the boys and girls to learn to dance and enable them to have a good time on school premises under supervision of their teachers."

(Here's one school that is helping cultivate a taste for juke box music. Since the item was sent thruout the nation over the AP wires, coinmen should take advantage of this fact and contact high schools to see whether phonos can be installed. These should be loaned to the school. Developing juke box players will help music men, especially for the post-war era. There are plenty old 12 record jobs around for this work.)

Industry

MANUFACTURE STARTS: WPB has just lifted the curb on the manufacture of brewery, ice cream, winery and certain types of beverage machinery equipment. Under a quota plan about \$80,000,000 worth of the above will be manufactured. The manufacturers of this equipment will be allowed to make from 10% to 25% of their output during the pre-war years from '39 to '41.

FIRST SURPLUS SALE: A display of over 5,000 items by large Eastern aircraft manufacturers will open at the Hotel McAlpin in New York City on March 27th. These are the excess inventories of these aircraft manufacturers. This will mark the first step of a large joint effort between Government and industry to redistribute into trade channels large holdings of critical items that heretofore have been held for prospective aircraft needs of the armed services. With many engineering and design changes dictated by combat requirements these items are no longer needed.

NEW AUTOS: Ray Chamberlain, executive vice-president of the National Automobile Dealers Assn., in an interview at the Hotel Roosevelt in New York City, told the press that there would be a partial resumption of passenger auto production within 6 months. Chamberlain is in New York to attend a meeting of the Eastern regional auto dealers who are preparing for the post-war era.

(The above three items, in addition to the fact that WPB has already listed the position of this industry in resumption of manufacture among the first 20 industries, should cause the trade to realize that postwar planning should be speeded.)

Advertising

C. J. Durban, advertising and sales promotion manager of the United States Rubber Company, reports that the firm is undertaking one of "the most ambitious advertising campaigns" in several years.

He stated, "The company must build its name in the public mind soundly against the time that competition will hit us."

(And that's a good idea for a great many in this industry, too.)

Crating

The following note received from E. Geo. Bennett of M. A. Pollard and Company, San Francisco, Calif., describes one of the evils that infest this business where men don't pay careful attention to crating of merchandise prior to shipping. The note reads: "I would appreciate it if you would make mention in your column that precautions should be taken when shipping out merchandise to this area. A recent shipment of five phonographs was received in a most terrible state. Plastics were broken. Glass broken. No cash boxes or keys. In packing these, nails were driven thru the cases and into the phono cabinets. In fact, we are obliged in many instances to spend a considerable amount of money to put such equipment in working order for resale purposes."

Jobbers - Distributors

H. M. Jones of Jones Coin Machines, Stephenville, Texas, write: "Here is just one man's opinion of jobbing and distributing coin machines. I am just about the average large sized operator. Have several branch offices; in Brownwood, Brady, Cleburne and Jacksboro, Tex., with my main office here in Stephenville. Naturally I could get my machines at a discount, but I don't think that would be the way to handle it at all.

"I believe that jobbers and distributors should not operate for several reasons. I notice that several large operators are playing up to the manufacturers trying to get franchises to distribute. I don't like the idea. I do think the large ops should get 10% discount when they buy 10 machines and 15% discount when they buy 25 machines at one time and pay cash for them. I don't mean send in an order for them, one or two at a time, but pay for them all at once.

"The discounts I mention should be given besides the regular 10% discount given on music machines for all cash. I believe that the music machine manufacturers should build better machines at higher prices and give 20% off for cash so as to keep out the 'small time chiselers' as much as possible."

Stocks

Whether you have ten bucks or one hundred thousand dollars tucked away you are probably interested in what the "big boys" are doing on the stock market. According to the National Assn. of Investment Companies, 90 investment trusts (who employ the best trading talent and are faced with the constant problem of employing their cash) are investing heavily in oil stocks, especially Standard Oil of N. J.

They also have large stakes in Montgomery Ward, General Motors, Chrysler, International Nickel, Texas Co., General Electric, North American Co., Socony Vacuum and American Gas & Electric. Next to the oil industry they favor the utilities.

Since the war started they have gone in for railroad bonds on a broad scale but have cut their holdings in mining issues in half. They've bought bank, food, rubber and movie stocks, but slashed off in chemicals, steels and aircraft shares.

At the end of '43 these 90 companies had less than 8% of their total assets in cash.

Guessers

Now that quite a sizable batch of envelopes have accumulated, we spent a few interesting minutes making a check of the dates coinmen believe the European war will end. We found that the ratio of those who believe that the war will end in '44 as against those who believe that the war will end in '45 is better than 2 to 1. (We do hope that those men who picked 1944 as the end of this European war will get into post-war action now.)

The earliest date so far picked in '44 is that of Sid Stewart of Stewart Novelty Sales Co., Colorado Springs, Colo., who guesses that this European war will end at 10 A.M., May 23, 1944. And so far the guess for the latest date in '44 is that of M. M. Rutherford of Rutherford Enterprises, Pampa, Tex., who guesses that 11 A.M. on November 28, 1944 will be the wind-up. (It continues interesting to note how many men chose the month of November, probably influenced by the Armistice of the last war.)

The 1945 guessers also have a very wide range. M. T. Duff of Royal Amusement, Winchester, Va., guesses that June 15, 1945 at 4 P.M. will see the end of the war in Europe. But Abe Miller of Confection Vending Co., Charlotte, N. C. (who is up to this writing our leading long distance guesser) claims that the war will end on December 11, 1945 at 11 A.M.

(If you haven't yet made a guess, dig back into the Spring Special issue you received, fill it out, and maybe you'll be the one to win that 100 bucks. You have until April 1.)

It Pays To Attend

Every once in a while we get invitations to attend a meeting of coinmen. Most of the time we try to dodge, but sometimes we get the urge to attend, if just to chew the fat with the old gang.
