"The Coin Machines Merry-Go-Round" By Bill Gersh



POST-WAR PLANNING FOR CUSTOMERS A great many millions of words have been written about post-war planning. Most of these have largely centered about the type of acuimment at well as what each and every industry in the nation

equipment as well as what each and every industry in the nation could expect from the post-war period as far as future growth, advancement, improved business practises, financial aid, etc., are concerned. But very few, if any, have thought about customers. That human relationship equation which makes all business possible for today as well as post-war.

A great many coinmen are neglecting this closer human relationship in their postwar program. A great many at this time are not only irritating good accounts, but actually antagonizing them with curt statements and continued poor service. This can most definitely kill any business regardless of how strongly it is entrenched.

Every coinman and his employees, who are constantly contacting location owners, now have the opportunity to make lasting friends which will become imperishable assets for the future. This is the time to give extra effort to each location. This is the time to smile and to explain quietly, intelligently and courteously why certain services or parts are so difficult to obtain.

This is not the time to growl over the telephone and tell customers to "just try somewhere else" as some are doing. This is instead the time when the service man and the collector, as well as the owner, should be out on the route more closely commenting relationships with locations and developing a friendship that will mean the difference between profit and loss in the post-war era.

This industry is in a better and more solidified position than most other industries where rising taxes, due to the war, have driven all thought of profits away. This industry, because it is giving the public just what it needs and wants during these trying and nerve wracking days, is gaining ground faster than ever before in its history. It should continue that gain by getting closer to the location owner. It should win his good will and his friendship and gain greater respect and prestige in his eyes.

In years gone by coinmen realized the importance of having the retailers back of them when arguments, legal or otherwise, arose with the city's suborities or any others in the community. This backing from the retailers proved invaluable to the trade. This will again be one of the programs for the post-war era of every large organization. It is absolutely essential to gain the backing of the retailer for all coin machines effort.

To do that the trade must first have the good will of these merchants. It can build that good will now. It can gain the prestige and the necessary respect from its locations by serving those locations with that extra bit of better service and that additional smile, as well as the gentlemanliness which is necessary to win over these locations, and cement them to itself for tomorrow.

Remember, you present coinmen, tomorrow is most definitely bringing in a floodtide of new blood. Not only coinmen who have left for the armed services and for war production plants, but people who have never before been in this business and want to enter into it with the money they have saved during this war. Mistreating locations now simply means losing these locations tomorrow.

To keep your locations, the one best and decent way is to use this trying wartime period to build good will. It isn't always necessary to just see how many dollars can be earned from each location. More important is the good will you build up with the location owner for the better products of which you are assured tomorrow.

There is no doubt that most coin machines firms are understaffed and are harried with a great many irritating problems, taxes, etc., these days. So are the retailers. So are all business men today. Therefore little acts of courtesy and thoughtfulness to locations will mean more, because they are so many more times magnified today, than

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they will mean after the war.

While a lot of thoughtless coinmen are taking advantage of current shortages to kick their customers around, this is therefore an opportune time for coinmen with fore-sight, kindliness and imagination to establish long term competitive advantages.

Of course if you intend to get out of this business right after the war is over, then just continue kicking your customers around. Keep shouting at them each time they phone - that you can't get them new records, that you haven't any nickels around, that they'll have to wait to get their machines serviced until one of your repairmen is ready.

But, if you intend to remain in this business long after the war, you'll adopt a policy of kindliness and thoughtfulness and politeness and you'll strictly enforce such a policy with your servicemen and collectors, too. You'll put your foot down to everyone in your offices that answers a telephone. You'll get back of the idea to do the job and do it right.

You'll take time out to carefully explain to each account, politely and thoughtfully, just why you or your service men can't get there in five or ten minutes. But you won't growl down their throats and you won't offend them by a curt, short reply.

Better than thinking about the post-war period as far as the type of machines that will be manufactured are concerned, even better than thinking about whether to increase the size of your offices and showrooms and throw overboard what you're now doing to start into a new division of this business, better than all this for the postwar era - is a definite plan, carefully thought out, to build good will with your locations for a long term competitive post-war pull.

And see to it that from now on in you and your employees win the respect and the prestige and the close friendship of each and everyone of your accounts.

Don't growl - smile. Don't be short - be thoughtful. Don't holler - be polite. Do those little extra courteous acts, regardless of how harried and upset and busy you are. Just because you haven't the help, nor the time, nor the supplies, nor the machines, nor the materials; pause, build good will, that's worth more to you right now for the post-war era than the extra hundred bucks take you can gross this week.

INTEREST IN MERCHANDISERS GROWS For many months now The Cash Box has been advising its readers that interest in auto-

For many months now The Cash Box has been advising its readers that interest in automatic merchandisers is growing by leaps and bounds. The trade is of the belief that some of the largest and most outstanding of the nation's manufacturers are ready to plunge into this division of the industry with everything they have on the ball to get the first flush sales.

Rumors have sprung up that some of the large automobile manufacturers will be in this field. Whether this is or is not true the near future will soon tell. Some rumors to the effect that certain of these large manufacturers will build automatic merchandisers that will actually be like grocery stores and restaurants and that these will be distributed thru their present organizations, not by men now engaged in this industry, have also disturbed some in this business.

There is the possibility that firms such as Standard Brands can use Fleischmann's Yeast and Chase & Sanborn Coffee venders to their good advantage in apartment houses and even in their present retail outlets, because of the super display, the surer purchase, and many other tremendously favorable sales factors connected with automatic merchandising which would prove extremely attractive to firms of this caliber. But as yet no announcements to this effect have been forthcoming from such firms. Also no action seems to have been taken by them to get into the automatic merchandising field.

Because of these rumors, and the reasoning behind them is logical, interest continues to grow greater in automatic merchandisers. The tremendous success enjoyed by the automatic beverage venders has won a great many new converts. Most of these men are awaiting the arrival of the new drink dispensors to quickly get into this field.

It is well to remember, prior to plunging into any automatic merch and ising machine, that these must vend nationally recognized, advertised and accepted products to be successful. Such a product as Coca-Cola was sure to gain favor. It is already well accepted and recognized and furiously advertised nationally.

Prior to all serious thinking about this field a most complete study should be made of it. This isn't anything like any other field in the industry. It does not have the speed action and take of the amusement field. It does not require the same

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type of effort as the automatic music field. It is an exceptional field that needs the services of keen merchandising specialists who have the financial power to continue on a small profit basis until reaching that dominance where they can continue on without further financial backing.

MANUFACTURE

The majority of the men now engaged in this industry are extremely interested in the manufacturing future of this business. It will prove stimulating as well as gratifying to these men to learn that the average manufacturer has made great progress.

The average factory has expanded, not only in size, but in engineering knowledge and skills. The factories have learned a great deal from their war products manufacture. They are in a position today to better service this industry than ever before. It is believed that many will be manufacturing other products as well as coin operated equipment.

Experimental departments are still intact. The manufacturers are prepared to rapidly re-convert to domestic production when the time arrives and will offer the trade the finest of equipment. Machines, in time, are certain to appear of types never before seen by the industry.

Large staffs of employees are geared to high speed as well as careful precision workmanship. The manufacturing division of this industry is completely prepared for a glorious future.

LABOR LOOSENING

Reports have come thru from more and still more coinmen that they are now finding it possible to again hire sufficient help. This is attributed to the roll-backs and cut-backs of war materials production in these areas.

The new Selective Service ruling that men over 26 won't be called until late Fall '44 and that those over 30 have a long way to go before being called for the armed services has also helped. This has assured some now working on shorter schedules, and therefore not receiving their former earnings, that they can take on an additional job.

Labor once again loosening up means that coinmen will be seeking more equipment. Those in the trade who were planning to cut down on their routes are now beginning to pull in machines to take advantage of this fact. Prices that are in vogue at this time may not be had a little later on when labor becomes easier to obtain.

Certain territories, of course, are not as yet affected by this loosening up of the general labor situation. Only a few territories so far have found it easier to hire mechanics and laborers.

Whatever the result there is no doubt that some coinmen are breathing a lot easier incertain sections of the country now that help is once again becoming more plentiful.

To obtain full advantage of this situation, coinmen have reported that they are taking on new equipment. The sellers, who realize what this means, are letting go of equipment at this time to catch the higher prices on the market. There are sure to be a great many machines suddenly pushed onto the market very soon as this situation becomes more conspicuous thruout the country. And, as the games appear, there is no doubt that prices will begin to fall because demandmay not keep step with offerings of long used machines.
