

WHAT WILL THE NEW MACHINES LOOK LIKE?

One of the most oft asked questions in the trade today is, "What will the new post-war machines look like?" As yet there is no one who can answer this question for the manufacturers have not as yet seen fit to announce their new products.

But from information which has been gathered here and there, in discussions with outstanding producers of coin operated equipment, the general belief is that the last known machines, the machines that were seen during 1941, will probably be the first machines off production lines with some changes and featuring new innovations, when manufacture once again gets started.

There is also a belief current thruout the trade that a great many of the manufacturers will avail themselves of what the distributors, jobbers and operators have learned during these war years and probably enhance the quality and value of their last known machines with many of the improvisations brought about during the war.

For example, one phono manufacturer's 1939 machines were found to meet with greater acceptance than his last known, 1941 models. This manufacturer knows these facts. It is believed that he is planning to make his new cabinet resemble these models to a great extent, tho, no doubt, the cabinet will be completely modernized.

The same is true of other phono manufacturers who found that certain of their models commanded a better price and received greater trade acceptance than did their last known machines. These manufacturers, too, are expected to somewhat alter the appearance of their last known models. Their new designs will probably correspond with these models which were found to be so popular during this wartime period.

Many changes are expected to take place in the amusement field. For example, the pinball revampers introduced one innovation after another. These the manufacturers are sure to use, and perhaps even better to some extent, because they will be working with more pliable and new materials.

Therefore, the amusement machines division expects to see some truly great advancements in machine manufacture. This field believes that the average manufacturer has carefully noted all the various alterations and innovations which went into the revamped games.

The slot machine and console fields remain in status quo. The only difference will be that the slot machine and console operators will be able to obtain new and original equipment at lower prices than what they paid for rebuilt machines.

The biggest changes are expected to come in the merchandise field. A great many coinmen eagerly await the introduction of the new cigarette, candy and beverage vend-ing machines. There is tremendous interest in automatic beverage dispensers thruout the trade.

The average merchandise machine operator has learned, and in most cases from bitter experience, that he passed up one of the most profitable machines ever introduced to this business when he did not buy beverage venders. These units are bound to attract a great deal more attention than any other merchandiser that will be introduced.

There are arguments for and against the three different types of beverage dispensers; the "bottle"vender, the "pre-mix" machine and the "mixer" type dispenser. The first is well known to the trade. The second is manufactured exclusively by one firm in the industry. But the latter is certainly going to be introduced by a dozen and more firms. And each one will probably prove more interesting than what has ever before appeared on the market.

Already unique and beautiful designs are seen here and there on drawing boards for this type of merchandiser. There is no doubt that the bottlers will be tremendous-

ly impressed with the beautiful craftsmanship which is going into these new machines, as well as the unique and modern designs which the nation's leading industrial designers have created for beverage venders.

Arcade equipment, too, is expected to be more modern in design and in play appeal than ever before. There is a good market for ray guns, but many new ideas are expected in these from the old type guns that were introduced. At the same time, prices are expected to be much lower than what is now being asked for these machines. Interest in this one arcade unit is capturing much attention through the nation.

Scales, too, are expected to come in for a rebirth of design and appeal to the public. Interesting at this time is to note that a great many scale operations changed hands and new ones came into being during this wartime period. After the war, it is believed the scale will prove itself one of the best sellers in the trade. A great many new people are expected to enter into this division of the business.

So that there will be no sudden surprises in what will first be forthcoming off production lines, it is safe to state that the last known machines, with some improvisations, will be introduced.

After this will come the machines which this industry looks forward to so eagerly. But these will only become fact when materials are completely loosened up and when manufacturers have no further war work to hamper their efforts or divide their attentions.

POST-WAR - AND USED EQUIPMENT As post-war production becomes an ever nearer possibility there arises the

As post-war production becomes an ever nearer possibility there arises the question, "What will happen to the used machines market?"

Naturally, this is an extremely important question to a great many now engaged in the industry. These men have invested a great deal of money in used equipment of all types. In fact, every machine that an operator has on location today can be considered "used equipment". Therefore, these men would like to know just where they will stand as the new machines start to come off production lines.

There is a general belief that regardless of what happens this year of 1945 the average manufacturer will not be able to seriously dent the present used equipment market. This seems to be borneout by the fact that many very critical items and materials are being held back while the war is yet in progress. In addition, much machinery is needed by certain manufacturers to swing back to peacetime production.

It is a known fact that the average manufacturer in this industry could start into production tomorrow were it possible for him to obtain sufficient materials and labor to do so. The great majority of coin machine factories are still deep in war work. Yet, even this, it is claimed, will not interfere too much with these plants getting into peacetime productive action when they can get what materials they need, for they have the space available.

The problem, therefore, of the status of the used machine market resolves itself down, not to when the manufacturer will be able to get into production once again, but should instead be considered in the light of the manufacturer already being in production. Just what effect new machines will have on the used equipment market is the problem many are now thinking about.

In the first place, it is a well known fact that every operator, jobber and distributor wants new machines. This makes for progress. This starts the sales field into action. But what will then happen to used machines? That's what the average man in this industry would like to know.

As far as the average operator is concerned, the machines that he now has on location have long ago been amortized. Therefore, even if they were to all be replaced without any trade-in valuation to him, he could still continue on ahead. In short, he has, in the majority of cases, taken all the possible profit that he can out of the average machine he has on location, from an amortization or depreciation standpoint.

New machines step up collections. The average coinman also realizes that new machines will enliven the entire industry. This, too, is extremely important to the trade. It means that with the industry swinging back into speed action again, there is every possibility for the greatest development and growth which this industry has ever experienced becoming fact.

The used machines will still prove valuable. There will not be enough new machines produced the first full year of peacetime production to seriously affect the tremendous vacuum that has been created in this field. It will take many thousands of various types of coin operated machines to begin to even cover the surface of the tremendous backlog demand which has accumulated during this wartime period.

Therefore, used machine sales will continue, and probably at more normalized prices, to make such purchasing more interesting to all buyers.

Operators have learned that it isn't the machine so much as the location that counts today. They must continue to keep their locations completely satisfied by seeing to it that the spot has a machine in it to capture the play and keep it at top peak while new machines are being awaited.

This, then, opens a new perspective to the average coinman. It means that even while the new machines are being sold, there will still be a good market for used equipment. The fact that the export field is sure to demand a great share of many types of used machines will help keep this market in balance.

Post-war production will probably normalize used machine prices. Therefore, if prices come down to a more normal level on used equipment, there is sure to be a continuance of sales while the country is rushing to buy whatever new machines will be produced.

The average coinman should plan today to continue his used machines business. He will find that this part of his general effort is sure to carry along at a grand pace. There is much territory where the new machines will not create any sort of furore for a long time.

Likewise, there will be territories where the word will spread like lightning among location owners that new machines are being placed. This, in itself, will create a tremendous demand from the retailer for the new machines.

In short, the crux of the entire situation will rest with how rapidly the news of the new machines will spread among the storekeepers. This is what will create the demand for new machines to replace the equipment on locations at the present time.

The increase in take may not be so much greater as to warrant replacement on some locations. But the fact is that a new machine featuring new mechanism will not only stand up better, but will gain the greater cooperation of the retailer, as well as the public. There is nothing like a new machine to enliven a location.

In the meantime, the used machines field will continue selling just as it always has. Sales may increase with a greater percentage gain if prices become normalized. As in pre-war days, used machines can offer competition to new equipment in certain territories where the take is below average because of the price differential between the new and the used.

No one is reallygoing to get caught short in this coming post-war market. The fact is that when real production does get under way, it will give the trade plenty of time to clear away its present equipment. As production gains speed, prices are bound to gradually normalize themselves on the used machines market. And as production of new machines goes all out, with all bans lifted, and all materials available, the markets will once again divide themselves, as in former days, and used machine sales will continue to help out wherever new machines won't take held.

There is not expected to be an immediate and great rush for the new machines. The average coinman will not order in large quantity. Even if he did, he probably would be given only a small quota of the machines he ordered. As he orders, he will make way for the new machine, and will either trade-in, sell off, or place the used equipment in some other spot.

Every division of the field is, therefore, intent on tying up as many spots as possible in its territory so that they will have locations to handle the new machines. This is the one really great job, especially for men who cut their routes down to the bone during this wartime period. And this is something they must do immediately to protect themselves for tomorrow.

"TALKING OUT LOUD" COINMEN ASK MANUFACTURING DATA RUMORS THAT NEW MACHINES WILL SOON BE SEEN CAUSES BIZ TO SLOW UP. SEE LOSS FOR MANY WHO CURTAIL BUYING AND SELLING. AWAIT WORD FROM MANUFACTURERS ON APPROXIMATE DATE FOR NEW EQUIPMENT.

NEW YORK — Coinmen everywhere in the nation are writing in to ask when manufacturing of new machines will become fact. They claim that the manufacturers should be able to give them some idea as to just when they can expect to see new equipment, so that they can continue on with their business in a more certain manner.

Many believe that buyers and sellers will show losses unless the manufacturers release "official" information the trade needs to halt any preconceived notions that new machines are "just around the corner."

The average coinman writes "We realize that it isn't easy for the manufacturer to tell us definitely just when his new machines will be coming off his production line or even when he will be permitted to start manufacturing machines again, but we do believe that most of the manufacturers in the coin machines business, as has been done in other trades, can give us some idea of the *approximate* time when we may expect to see new machines again."

An expression of this kind seems to be the general request of all the trade. Some distribs and jobbers report that buying and selling is at a very low ebb in their territories because of the uncertainty. They state that reports have been circulated thruout the South at this time that new phonos will be seen very soon. In other sections, such as the Midwest, the rumor is that slots are being produced, and will be released when a sufficient stock has been accumulated.

These unconfirmed rumors have been hurting business. A great many coinmen report that they could use many more machines if they only were given some idea by the manufacturers, officially, as to just about when they could expect to see new machines. They could then decide whether they should or should not buy the used equipment their routes require at this time.

Recently a rumor spread thru the country that certain pin game manufacturers were producing equipment. This rumor grew with great rapidity. Many coinmen rushed out to Chicago, and many more phoned. The manufacturers squelched this rumor, but only those who contacted them were advised of the correct situation.

The trade believes that the manufacturers have much more information than has the average coinman, and are in a better position to make any announcements, definitely advising just about when they believe they will be able to get back into production of new equipment. "Such a statement at this time", one coinman writes, "would stop the slump this business has fallen into. There is good reason to believe that if the manufacturers were to make official announcements, as a group, or individually, as to when they believed they would be able to get back into production of coin machines, it would halt the present standstill and would give many the incentive and interest to continue buying and selling as well as increasing their routes."

A suggestion offered by one coinman was that the manufacturers get together and arrange a statement on a possible reconversion date, and that the entire industry be informed of this period now, so that it could conduct its business intelligently.

It is the hope of many in this field, at this time, that the manufacturers arrange to announce, individually or as a group, just about when they believe the trade can once again expect to see new machines coming off the production lines.

TRUCK TIRES SUPPLY OFF

WASHINGTON—With the allocation of truck tires by the War Production Board already running far behind requirements for the first[®] six months of the year, the ODT has just received an allotment for the three months beginning July 1 that is estimated to fall 29% short of the total number of tires needed.

The situation is most acute in heavy duty tires. "Eligible commercial motor vehicle operators using smaller sized tires, 7.50 and under, should not find serious difficulty in obtaining replacements for essential use." claimed Col. J. Monroe Johnson, Director of the Office of Defense Transportation.

Col. Johnson warned tire users not to "project any optimistic hopes" as to the number of tires that may be made available during the coming fall, winter and spring, when the Pacific campaign is expected to be at its full impact.

TRAFFIC MOVES WEST RAIL LINES MAY SOON HAVE TO CUT DOWN DRASTICALLY ON CIVILIAN TRAVEL AND FREIGHT SHIPMENTS

WASHINGTON — Coinmen who had any idea that the railroad situation would ease up after V-E day, will have to change their thinking. The present redeployment job threatens to bring on the country's worst transportation jam before the year is out.

Military equipment and personnel are scheduled for cross-country movement in such quantity and number as never before seen. The Army has informed railroads that it expects to return about 3,000,000 men to this country between now and next May. Some of the men will be wounded and will need transportation to hospitalization centers. Others will be demobilized and will have to be sent home. The large majority will be transported to the West coast for disposition in the Pacific, while others will be sent to camps throut the country for reserve. Coinmen will have to cooperate with this desperate situation and curtail all unnecessary travel.

However, the most important problem will be shipments of equipment thruout the country. The Office of Defense Transportation thinks this problem so grave, it is permitting a meeting of the Great Lakes Regional Advisory Board to meet in Toledo, O. to consider ways and means to facilitate shipping. For quite a while now, it won't be "What about the new machines?", but "Can I get used equipment in time to protect my locations?"

The railroads in May unloaded cars totaling 17% over May 1944. Altho unloadings at North Atlantic ports fell off by 18%, those at Pacific coast ports had increased 66%. Most war production in our plants thruout the country will now have a different destination than it had a year ago. Materials will now be moving in great quantities to the West coast. In addition to the war materials, food will be moving both east and west . . . west for our Pacific soldiers and east for transportation to the European countries.

Therefore, coinmen think their problem for the next months won't be whether or not new equipment will be available, but how to transport those used machines they need in order to protect their going business. They will also have to allow additional time for equipment to reach its destination, as civilian freight will, no doubt, be taken care of only after the important war and food material is shipped.

TRADE WITH EUROPE STILL A YEAR OFF

NEW YORK — A survey conducted by the "New York Times" brings out the fact that altho the war in Europe is over, commercial relations between the United States firms and those in Europe are restrieted by a number of factors.

The Cash Box pointed out in its July 3 issue that Britain refuses export licenses to American companies due to their feeling that the scarcity of American dollars for exchange would harm them in their financial set-up. The survey of the "New York Times" points out additional obstacles. The chief restrictions are the lack of space for cargo going either way, and for transportation of individuals who may wish to make the trip in order to sell their products.

It is the judgment of trade experts that competition from products manufactured in European countries is quite a long way off. American products that move to Europe these days are practically shipped under control of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration or the Foreign Economic Administration. The private trader does not get into the picture.

On the over-all resumption of private goods shipments between this country and Europe, the best guesses by the export experts are that it will take at least a year and more, probably eighteen months.

LEE RUBINOW OPENS FLORIDA OFFICES AS SEEBURG DIST.

MIAMI, FLA. — Lee Rubinow, popular music coinman, opened offices at 839 W. Flagler Street, Miami, Fla., this week under the name of Florida Automatic Sales Corp. where he will distribute the Seeburg line for the entire state of Florida.

Rubinow has been associated with music as an operator in New York City, and headed the operators' association in that city. In addition, he has many friends thru the Florida territory.

When Rubinow left New York City on Thursday to take up permanent residence in Miami, the good wishes of the city's operators were ringing in his ears.

"My object will be to serve the music operators of Florida in the best possible way" he stated, "and my modern offices and service departments will be available to all."





FOREWORD

Many times, wide differences appear in the high and low prices of certain equipment. Like any true reporter The C.M.I. Blue Book can only feature the market prices as they are quoted. The C.M.I. The C.M.I. Blue Book is to be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price for the week: Second price listed is highest price for the past week. Where only one price appears this should be considered lowest price.
