Sure it happens. It happens every day. Even in the biggest city in the world. In New York City. The metropolis of America. The glittering entertainment mecca. And right down on 14th Street, too.

It pays to stroll along. To walk into places (locations) and to just gab with the guy who owns the joint. Why? Because that's how you learn more about your business than you ever would just covering "certain locations that are my own and I don't pay any attention to any others".

Well, down on 14th Street-there's a little place called "Frank's Tavern." Frank is one helluva nice guy. Frank owns the juke box in his place.

When Frank has a customer who's beginning to get a little bit whoozy drinking some of the firewater he serves and puts a bill or two or three down to pay his tabFrank usually gives lots and lots of change Why? Because Frank then says to this slightly fuzzy customer, "Go on-put your change in the juke box-like a good sport."

The customer usually does. And Frank's juke box just keeps blasting away all day and far into the night while Frank smiles discreetly up his sleeve and slyly winks at friends who may be present.

He has outsmarted the operator who used to have the juke box in his place. Now Frank gets all the profits.

Yes, Frank's a pretty smart guy. He's also got a nice business. He has a shuffle board in his place (that's not coin operated) and which attracts some nice customers around that 14th Street area who have nothing to do of an evening but slide those weights down the length of this board while drinking a whiskey or a beer or two. And that helps to keep the register in Frank's Tavern ringing at a pretty merry clip.

Frank owns his juke box. He does pretty good with it, too. He bought it thru an ad he saw in a magazine. He's made plenty of money with that juke box. It's a permanent fixture in his joint.

Guess that Frank wouldn't like it very much if his customers could get their beers and whiskies at the same
price he pays-and direct. But the beer and whiskey people protect their customers. The'yve got laws.

So - here we are - in the biggest city in the world New York - the city of a million wonders - and strong associations and powerful unions - and Frank owns his juke box.

Maybe there's some kind of a moral in this thing. Maybe some of the coinmen ought to think about that moral. Maybe they should sort of get together with themselves and begin to realize that if Frank can buy his own juke box from an ad in a magazine-that other storekeepers can do the same.

Maybe there ought to be a law. But there just ain't any laws of this kind. So maybe the guys that are out there working like hell to make a living operating juke boxes should kinda get together on the idea of stopping guys from advertising machines with prices in such magazines where tavern keepers like Frank can buy juke boxes

## Biggest Years Ahead

NEW YORK - The outlook for the coin machine industry is the most terrific it has ever faced.

As the months go by the pent up backlog demand for new equipment, instead of diminishing, continues to grow greater.

New equipment is being introduced the like of which this industry has never before seen.

More and more men, bringing in new and fresh capital, are entering into all divisions of the field-as operators, distributors, manufacturers and suppliers.

The industry is winning ever greater recognition from all other business as well as from the public.

Merchandise machine men believe that their division of the field will lead the growth parade. Already their new machines, cigarette, beverage, frankfurter broilers, frozen food venders, etc., etc., are hitting the front pages of the nation's newspapers and creating good comment.

The juke box industry is growing with leaps and bounds. A few years
ago a survey conducted by The Cash Box showed that approximately $87 \%$ of the people engaged in the industry were interested in juke boxes in one way or another. The juke box trade looks forward to a million locations by 1938.

The amusement machine division of the field has also made rapid strides. The equipment being presented is far superior to anything ever shown the trade. The machines are better designed and much better mechanically. From pin games to slots the amusement machines field has risen tremendously above its former level and the interest in amusements hasn't waned a bit. If anything, it has grown with such leaps and bounds that all the industry now believes. it will continue on to gain greater recognition than ever before in its history.

The service machines haven't as yet come out in any noticeable quantity but these, too, are expected to show tremendous improvement and gain great followings.

The cry for more scales can be heard clear across the nation.

From every viewpoint the coin machine industry's outlook for the balance of this year and for the coming years can only be described by the word-"terrific".

The operator himself is in a better financial position than he has ever before been in all the history of this industry.
The distributors and jobbers are constructing beautiful buildings and are thereby tremendously raising the level of the field.

The manufacturers have awakened to the fact that this industry needs much more than just equipment. They are now, thru the CMI and NAMA, developing public relations programs to win greater good will for all this business.
The action-the zest-is apparent from the smallest operator to the largest manufacturer. All are working harder-doing more-and looking forward to the greatest years in the history of this industry.


NEW YORK - It's almost four years now that The Cash Box has been urging the juke box operator to adopt a new commission basis of $30 \%$ to the location owner and $70 \%$ to himself.

This new commission arrangement becomes more imperative with each passing day. This past week (March 4,1946 ) issue. The Cash Box published a survey of increased overhead costs.

Now that the new music equipment is being presented, juke box men learn that prices for the new machines are higher than pre-war. And this is to be expected for materials and labor costs have increased and with the possibility that an era of
inflation may be on the way, these costs are liable to increase even more.

It therefore behooves every single juke box operator in the nation to listen to the rumblings now emanating from the nation's economic wizards who claim that inflation is already here and growing every day.

If this is the case and costs of supplies, materials, labor, general overhead, equipment and all else that is today needed to run a juke box operation rise accordingly, then the operator will definitely need more money to run his business. And the one and only way to get that additional income is by increasing his commission from his locations.

There are only $1 \%$ or $2 \%$ (at the
most) of any number of locations in any territory where the $50 \%-50 \%$ commission basis can continue to bring the operator a decent profit. The rest do not require the $50 \%$ commission they receive for their take doesn't warrant such a commission.

It is up to every juke box operator to call in his accountant and sit down to a set of "cost" figures with him and then decide whether he can continue to amortize the new machines he will buy, plus the increased overhead he is enduring (and which will continue to increase with the present inflationary trend) and give $50 \%$ of the income from his machines to location owners.

## Some New Recordings Turn to

 Double Meaning Angle. Leaders Warn Trade "Throw 'Em Out". Growth of Industry Can Be Halted by Bluenoses Hearing These and Yowling Heads Off
## in the Nation's Press

NEW YORK - There seems to have again developed a definite trend toward the "smutty" side, as far as many of the records now being produced are concerned.

Tho most of these are "race" records, yet the trade realizes what this can mean to its future, should it allow these pressers to get away with the first batch of recordings of this type.

There is no reason for recordings with "double meanings" at this time. The average man and woman in any location are asking for more "sweet music" than anything else.

To simply cater to the wants of a very few who like the "double meaning" recording is a very short sighted viewpoint on the part of those record manufacturers who seek to advance in this field.

Furthermore, exeryone in the juke
box business realizes that the most glaring blackeye that this trade can get-is from "smutty" recordingseven if just carefully blended into a double entendré angle.
The juke box industry, because it is rising in esteem so rapidly thruout the nation, should be as carefully protected.
This is surely not the time for the members of this division of the field to go hog-wild.
Just because they find a double meaning recording available does not mean that they have to use it-even in the sort of location which might appreciate it and put more coins into the phono if it were used.
There is a drive on at this time by leading government agencies to curb juvenile delinquency and to also cut down on all sorts of mishehaviours. to have any of these men, ever hear
such a recording, even if by just chance alone, would mean a virtual death blow to this industry.

Furthermore, and for some long years now, there have been bluenoses who, seeking to get their crusading ideas and names on the front pages of the nation's press, would simply tear into all the nation's automatic music were they to hear even an inkling of a tune which would give them the opportunity to smash down on the juke box field.

The trade must halt the further production of any double-meaning recordings and do so immediately.
It must absolutely eliminate even a pretense at "smut" in records.

If these are being made-let them be bought by retailers-but don't let members of the juke box industry even think of using them.

# OPS BACK PLAN for A "public OPINION SURVEY" 

 Agree This is Only Way to Learn Whether Public Favor Return of Games in Closed Territories. Ask for "Gallup Poll" in One City TestNEW YORK - In response to the proposal of certain leaders of the industry (which appeared in this past week's March 4, 1946 issue of The Cash Box) that the trade arrange for a "public opinion survey" in closed territories to learn whether the public in these areas favor the return of coin operated amusements, came dozens of letters from coinmen from all over the nation rallying to this plan.

Each one of these men urged that the idea of a "Gallup Poll" be undertaken. The belief is that such a poll should be taken of one city first to note what reaction would result. Furthermore, the results of this poll to remain secretive and to only be known to those coinmen who helped to arrange it.

In this way, these coinmen believe,
the trade in various closed cities, such as New York, Detroit, Cleveland, Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Louis and others, would know whether it would pay to petition officials (should the public react favorably to an authentic survey such as Gallup would make) to ask that games of certain types, acceptable to the community, be again allowed to operate.

There is no doubt in the minds of those coinmen who have already written to The Cash Box, regarding the plan for a "Gallup Poll", that sooner or later some move will have to be taken to arrange for the opening of much closed territory.
"Why then," asks one leading coinman, "shouldn't we make arrangements immediately, especially first thru a 'public opinion survey' and learn whether it would pay us to go
ahead and try to open some of the cities which are now completely closed to many types of amusement devices such as novelty pinballs?"
"The facts are that the manufacturers themselves would find tremendous markets for their production if we are able to open clossed territory", one coinman stated. "It simply means", he continued, "that all will profit. Therefore, this work should first be undertaken by a combined group of coinmen in the closed area plus the public relations bureau of the CMI."

This logical procedure in determining whether closed territory can or cannot be opened would save much heartache on the part of coinmen already in the area. It would also decide the future course for public relations work for this industry.

# CALIF. PRESS ASK STATE LICENSE \& LEGALIZE SLOTS 

## Editors and Publishers Ask Governor Warren and Legislature to Legalize and License State's Slots

SAN JOSE, CAL. - As a direct result of the Sheriff Emig trial, the editor of the Mercury Herald News of this city, Elystus L. Hayes, in an open editorial, advanced to Governor Warren and the Legislature that the state legalize and license slot machines.

Since publication of this editorial in the Mercury Herald News there has been a very favorable reaction from the general public. Letters have flooded the offices of this and other newspapers in surrounding communities agreeing with Hayes and the Mercury Herald News that slots be licensed by the State of California.

The Facts, newspaper of Redlands, Calif., inserted the following editorial. "Slot machines should be legalized, licensed, taxed and state inspected." The editorial continues and is addressed to the Governor: "For the purpose of discussion, and not with any idea of offering an inflexible program, I make the following suggestions:
"1. Legalize slot machines in which coins no larger than a dime (or perhaps a quarter) are played. For most people there is as much amusement derived from a nickel machine as a dollar machine, and evils are more likely to arise when big money is involved.
" 2 . The operator of every establishment in which machines are placed should be the outright owner of the machine. Much of the temptation arises because large sums are involved in the collection of rentals. At present the efforts of one operator to put his machines in establishments
where another's have been may lead to graft, corruption, even bloodshed.
"3. Minors should not be allowed to play machines.
"4. All machines should be licensed, taxed and inspected by government officials, city, county or state."

Following this editorial comes that of the Times of Los Gatos, Calif., which reads, "At last, the San Jose newspapers are following the lead of at least two or three other Santa Clara County newspapers in proposing that slot machines be legalized and licensed as a means of putting an end to racketeering between operators and corruption or attempted corruption of public officials.
"That has always been the contention of the Los Gatos Times and we have said so time and again. At least one other and perhaps more papers in the country have advocated the same thing."

The editorial also states, "They can be legally controlled if licensed, if only the public can bring itself to realize that it is better to admit they exist and control their use, than to refuse to consider any possible solution on the grounds that slot machines are gambling devices, therefore they are sinful and should not be tolerated under any condition. That is a wholesome thought, but it won't eliminate the evil, and when that proves impossible, the next best thing is to keep it under honest control."

The Mercury Herald of San Jose,

Calif., which started the ball to rolling on getting slots legalized and licensed, carried an 8 column streamer headline reading, "Readers' Opinions Differ On County's Slot Machine Problem."

This was in addition to the editorials which have been appearing in this paper regularly.

In this big story the Mercury Herald reprinted letters from various people from "the editor's mailbag", which is reported to have been jammed with favorable letters regarding the Hayes' editorial, and wherein the public themselves approve of legalizing and licensing slots in the State of California. Many of these people appeal directly to the governor thru this paper, to legalize slots as fast as the legislature can get around to taking such action.

## COINMEN WEEP AND TAVERN OWNERS HOWL AS BREWERS CUT MARCH DELIVERIES OVER 30\%

## Brewers May Only Sell Bottled Beer and Cut Deliveries 45\% by May. New York Tavern Owners Assn Blame "Drys". Coinmen Foresee Big Loss This Summer.

NEW YORK - As reported in this past week's issue of The Cash Box and now confirmed by the action of brewers here (and thruout the rest of the nation) deliveries to taverns of draught and bottled beer have been cut over 30 per cent.
It is the opinion of many brewers that deliveries will be cut even further. Perhaps as much as 45 per cent by May. All this is the result of the President's grain conservation order.
Placing the blame directly on the shoulders of the "dry" lobbyists in Washington, John Daly, speaking for 2,000 members of the United Restaurant Liquor Dealers, this city, said, "The dry powers are behind it all. They have been cutting in for a long time trying to reduce the amounts of liquor and beer in any way they can."
Carl Badenhausen, president of $P$. Ballentine \& Sons, Newark, N. J., announced this past week that his firm would lay off 500 full time employees and 600 seasonal workers who are normally hired for the summer months would not be employed this summer in view of the current situation.

In the meantime coinmen all over the country are worried about the closing down of their tavern locations. This past summer many a coinman suffered thru the quota distribution of beer to his many taverns and for days at a time his machines remained idle for the tavern would
close to gather up as much beer on its quota as possible and then sell all during the weekend.

Just exactly what to do few coinmen yet know. Some believe that the situation may be solved by the taverns selling other beverages than just beer. Some claim that soft drinks may save the situation. All believe that the machines in the taverns will get good play if the taverns will remain open.

Coinmen are therefore consulting with tavern owners on the premise that these men will keep their places open regardless of whether they will, or will not, have a sufficient supply of beer.

## LOUISVILLE HAS 263 SLOTS LICENSED

LOUISVILLE, KY. - The Internal Revenue office here reported that a total of 263 machines have been licensed by 173 tax payers this year in comparison to taxes on 221 machines licensed by 141 persons at the close of the fiscal year on June 30, 1945.

The Internal Revenue office also reported this past week that 16 additional slots have just paid $\$ 100$ taxes in this city.

KATE SMITH AGAINST NEWSPAPER VENDERS
NEW YORK - Kate Smith, noted songstress of the air waves, has gone on record in opposition to newspaper venders. Kate complains that it takes the romance out of buying a newspaper. She claims that a machine cannot be as attractive as a boy or a cheerful news vendor.

She adds that even the inventor of the machine thinks it robs news vending of its romance, fun and excitement.

## BAD PUBLICITY SLAMS S. CAROLINA SCALE OPS

ANDERSON, S. C. - Coming like a thunderous echo was the full page story which appeared recently in The Cash Box, (February 18, 1946 issue) concerning the sale of weighing machines direct to location owners.
In an eye-filling layout, complete with photograph, this newsman headlined his story, "DROP IN YOUR MONEY AND TAKE A CHANCE."
"You may turn out to be a fat man or a midget," this reporter cracked, "it all depends into which of the penny scales around town you happen to deposit your coin."

This newsman invested two-bits worth of pennies for his survey, in which just about every type of scale
in the business was given a try. Here's what he found.

His weight ranged from 80 to 226 pounds. An accurate set of postal scales said 176 pounds was correct.

Four pairs of scales accepted the pennies and then balked.

Taking a parting shot at the scale ops, this reporter advised his readers, "If you plan to learn your weight, your best bet is to stick to scales, that concentrate on weights and do not throw in horoscopes on the side." Three of the scales that failed to function entirely were of the latter variety. The fourth had a device attached that purported to return the money if the weigher guessed his exact weight.
"One reluctant pair of scales," the article continued, "gradually inched up a few pounds at a time until they registered 80 on the dial. Another set, a half block away, immediately made up for the deficiency by hitting the 300 -pound mark

Here go the scale operators with newspapers tearing apart the finest division of the trade because of absolute out and out neglect on the part of the op himself. There is no earthly reason why scale ops should neglect their scales in this manner.
Is it any wonder that storekeepers want to buy their own scales when the operators themselves will not give them the proper attention?

## UNCLE SAM ENTERS COIN MACHINE OPERATING BIZ

WASHINGTON, D. C. - America's coinmen will soon be welcoming a new operator to the industry, none other than Uncle Sam-the United States Government!

Fitting itself to the times, the Post Office Department is about to become one of the largest operators of vending machines in the world, with the establishment of coin-operated stamp machines in all first class postoffices in the nation.

According to post office department witnesses who appeared recently before the House Appropriations Committee here, the federal government proposes to spend $\$ 1,500,000$ during the next fiscal year on coin-operated equipment. Two thousand stamp vending units and

350 coin-operated postage meter machines (Mailomats) will be bought in the 1946-1947 period.

Installation of the equipment, scheduled to begin with the start of the next fiscal year on July 1, 1946, will feature machines differing from those now being operated by coinmen.

In describing the new units before the congressional committee, postal officials said the new automatic stamp vending machine had been known to take only one wrong coin during a four year test held in a Philadelphia department store. The "wrong" coin accepted by the machine was a South American piece with exactly the same metallic con-
tent, weight and resiliency as the U. S. nickel.

The machine puts every coin inserted through an amazingly thorough series of split second tests. Iit passed for size, a control magnet checks the magnetic properties of the coin (U. S. coins are non-magnetic). Then come tests for weight, metallic content and resiliency. If everything checks, the machime "pays off." Officials further testified that the machine has never been known to jam.

No profit will be made from the sale of stamps by these machines, but postal officials believe they will more than pay their cost by encouraging greater use of the mails.

## JERSEY PRESS WARNS INVESTORS BEWARE

JERSEY CITY, N. J.-The "Jersey Journal," leading newspaper this city, warns small investors who will be approached by what this paper calls "sharpshooters" to beware of making any investments before arranging a complete investigation.
An editorial appeared sometime ago in The Cash Box warning coinmen to beware of making any investments in wild schemes.
The Jersey Journal writes, "With per capita savings higher than ever before, the easy money boys are on the loose and estimates of the 'take' con men harvest in fake gold mining stock alone range upward to one million dollars per week?
Most important to the cointrade is this paragraph which appears in the Jersey Journal editorial, "Then there is the vending machine game directed especially toward returning GI's anxious to get into business on their own. Surely, vending machines produce good returns, as promised but, the desirable places where vending machines may be placed in 'protected territory' are non-existent. They've long since been contracted for."
(Only a "Public Relations Bureau" can arrange to clear these matters up with newspapers such as the Jersey Journal. The NAMA and CMI should immediately contact such phould immedadiate and advise that they will work with them to protect all of their reader-investors.)

## MICHIGAN LIQUOR COMMISH DELAYS tavern game ban

LANSING, MICH.-The Liquor Control Commission ban on all types of games, cards, etc., from taverns in this state seems to have been held up according to various newspapers thruout this state.

As yet the situation is rather confused. The Port Huron "TimesHerald" reports, "State Liquor Board Delays Pinball Ban," and continues, "Commissioner Felix H. H. Flynn told a committee enforcement officers would be instructed to see that such machines as pinball and similar devices were not used in licensed establishments but that they need not be removed until the licensee had an opportunity for a hearing before the commission."

The Bay City "Times" reported the same as above. The Traverse City "Record-Eagle" made a similar report and even mentioned slot machines. The Niles "Star" reported the same but wrote rather a lengthy article and stated therein that, "Confusion as to the enforcement of the ban on games and pinballs in establishments serving liquor continued."
The St. Joseph "Herald-Press" went the opposite way from these other newspapers and headlined, "Liquor Commish To Crack Down," with a sub-head reading, "Pinball Machines Banned From Taverns.'

## DALLAS FIRM TO MFR DRINK \& TICKET VENDER AND COIN CHANGER

# IDAHO MAY LEGALIZE SLOTS 

Special Session of Legislature Will Discuss this as Revenue Raising Measure. Slots in Non-Profit Clubs Legalized by Last Legislature.

BOISE, IDA.-There is a better than even chance that legislation legalizing liquor by the drink, pari-mutuel horse race betting and slot machines will come before the forthcoming special session of the Twenty-eighth Idaho Legislature.

The so-called moral issue measures would be allowed to come before the legislature as revenue raising bills, amply provided for in the ninth section of the governor's call.

That section commands the legislature "to consider and enact any necessary and needful legislation to provide revenue."

The last legislature enacted a law legalizing and licensing slot machines in non-profit clubs. Comparatively speaking, however, only a small number of machines are licensed and some groups hold that licensing and legalization should apply to all such devices.

The need for additional revenue is predicated on the assumption that the legislature will accede to the governor's requests for additional appropriations to many state departments for both construction and operation expenditures.

Estimates of additional expenditures total in excess of $\$ 4,000,000$. The regular session of the legislature provided revenue to build up the free balance on the assumption that funds would be used for post-war institutional construction. The governor included in his call provision for emergency construction at the state's three mental hospitals and four educational institutions.

The need for revenue to also take care of the highway department, tax commission, raise teachers' salaries and finance a teachers' retirement program and to activate a state tuberculosis hospitalization program. The amount falls far short of what is actually needed by the state.

Should slots be legalized under this necessary revenue raising measure it would mean the complete opening of the entire state with what coinmen here believe will be a high license fee, in addition to whatever fees may be applied by cities and counties and, naturally, the $\$ 1(9)$ federal slot tax.

## ASKS PHILLY OPS TO GET RECORD LABELS CHANGED



RAY BERNHARDT
PHILADELPHIA, PA. - Ray Bernhardt, president of the Phonograph Operators Association of Eastern Pennsylvania and Southern New Jersey, asked the members of this organization at a meeting this past Thursday evening. (March 7) to put all the pressure they possibly could on the record companies to get the present record labels changed.

Bernhardt is in full agreement with The Cash Box, he reports, that the reading on the present record labels is such that it leaves the juke box operator liable to all sorts of legal entanglements.

These labels should be especially arranged for the juke box industry


Bernhardt claims, and should read, "For use in coin operated musical instruments."

At present the reading on all record labels is that these records are to be used in homes only and not for commercial purposes.

Juke box ops have long been asking that the record manufacturers arrange for this change. This would eliminate the trouble which was endured in the past by the trade in suits with ASCAP and especially in the Buckley Bill, which, by the way, is still in the House Patents Committee in Washington.
