The Price Problem

One of the problems vexing the operators thruout the nation are the prices for the post-war equipment. In almost every case, when ops gather 'round, this subject is brought to the fore.

Yet, these very same operators are paying more for their food, clothing, rent and various other daily necessities and don't seem to pay too much attention to the differential between the pre-war and post-war prices of these commodities.

Will lowered prices mean more sales?

That is now a question which occupies the minds of a great many in the trade. The first answer, without too much thinking, seems to be, "yes".

But, after some thought is given to the subject and questions are asked—it also seemes that a large number of operators are happy that prices are high. They claim, "Only high prices will keep away cheap competition like we had to endure before the war."

One noted operator explains, "When machines were cheap and easy to buy—we were forced to endure competition that almost knocked us out of business. Every day in the week we were being phoned by one location after another asking why we charged so much commission when some guy was just in there willing to give them the same machine and increase their share of the percentage? This was only possible because every Tom, Dick and Harry could get into the business with a few hundred bucks and call himself an operator."

It is well known in the trade that the average location owner doesn't think too hard about what "service" means. All he recalls, when the time comes, is that someone comes into his place every week (or maybe twice a week) and puts new records in the machine or does this or that or shines it up, etc., etc.

He seems to forget all about the fact that this sort of service costs money. That his operator works without his thanks. Just keeps on giving him the lion's share of the profits week in and week out—and does all the work to help make those profits bigger and better for him. The trouble with the average operator is that he doesn't "sell" the location ower on what he is doing to earn him profits. He doesn't "merchandise his business". He goes on his way and prays that the location will remain his long enough to get him "out of the red," if he has just placed a new machine, or "long enough to at least see a few bucks from the spot".

Until that time, tho, it may be to the best advantage of the operators that prices are where they are. They are being protected while production is low. They are now being given the opportunity to buy whatever machines they need to fill all the open locations in their territories so that they will be fully prepared for the day when new machine production really gets under way.

Price re-adjustment will come of itself when production at last equals demand.

LOOK TO NEW SALES ERA TO START AFTER LABOR DAY

Believe this Will Point Way to New Methods for the Industry. Expect Biggest Buying Season.

NEW YORK—The general consensus is to the effect that the greatest sales for this industry, provided all other surrounding factors equalize themselves, will start right after Labor Day.

The reason for this statement, certain coinleaders explain, is the general belief that production should get going on a large scale right after the Labor Day holiday. This is not only their opinion, they state, but the opinion of the nation's largest manufacturers and economists who have studied and closely watched the resultant effect the major strikes had on manufacturing.

Whatever new machines, jobbers and distributors report, that were delivered to them, during these past Summer months, were immediately sold. And, they also say, they will continue to sell all new equipment as it is delivered to them.

There was a slump experienced in the sale of used machines, these men state, but even this is expected to pick up rapidly as the trade seeks to cover all the open locations.

The slump was occasioned by surrounding factors and not by the members of this industry. With beer and liquor short in many territories, coinmen's collections were down and they hesitated to purchase equipment until they once again saw an upsurge in their businesses.

But, even with the slump in effect, they did not hesitate to buy new machines and especially those machines which proved profitable to them, regardless of price.

In short, then, opinions are all to the same line — that coinmen will start buying in large quantity (new as well as used machines) as the Fall and Winter seasons get under way and will be prepared to greet the opening of the first coin machine convention since before the war with complete control of a majority of locations in their territories.

Another factor which will make for increased buying, one noted coin machine leader says, is that many operators throughout the nation have arranged to better their commission basis and are now in position to use whatever equipment they can get and profit from this use.

This, regardless of all other factors,

is of greatest importance to the operator for, whether he buys new or used machines, he must be sure that his commission set-up is such that he will profit from the placement of these products.

Again, the old story of resort and summer spots also enters into the picture. Many ops claim that they did not pay too much attention to buying merchandise during the summer season for they were engaged with resort locations.

In such locations, they explain, they are able to use whatever equipment they had on hand. But, as they return to their city spots this fall season, they will need the best equipment they can obtain to assure them of continuous play—which they must have to profit from the machines they are now purchasing.

It shall be interesting to all the trade to note the business upswing "after Labor Day". This will once again prove to the majority of coinmen that the industry is anxious to get on ahead with the growth and development which it knows is in store for it. Page 6

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NEW YORK—The belief expressed by many coinmen thruout the nation, since the fact became apparent that a better commission basis must be arranged for that, "10c play is the answer," has stirred a great deal of arguments—pro and con.

The idea that the coin machine business is a "nickel business' has been brought to the fore time and time again in such arguments by many coinmen. Others completely disagree. What is your opinion?

Remember—once upon a time beer was only 5c a glass—today it's 10c. Once a shoe shine was never more than a nickel—today it's 10c and 15c in many places.

Once pin games were only produced with 1c chutes — today no one would dream of running a pin game on less than 5c—and many believe that the number of balls should be cut down so that a complete game will actually cost 10c.

The first consoles that were presented were 5c. The same for slots. Today they are in combinations (consoles) at 5c, 10c and 25c—and reports have it that there will also be 50c chutes on consoles. Slots come in complete sets of 5c, 10c, 25c, 50c and \$1 play.

Once upon a time street car fares were only 5c—today they are 7c, 8c and 10c, depending on the locality. Even the New York Subway, which is a traditional 5c ride, is now asking that this be changed to 10c.

Candy bars of all types were 5c, today the public pays 7c, 8c and more. Ice Cream cones were always a nickel —they're higher today.

Is this, the coin machine industry, a "nickel business"?



HAS THE PUBLIC LOST THE THRILL OF PINBALL PLAY?

Has Intricate and Tricky Scoring Driven Away the "Every-Day-Just-For-Fun" Type of Players? Should the Simple, "Easy-to-Play" Type of Games be Revived?

CHICAGO—Away back in the days of the simple, easy-to-play and just as easy-to-understand pin games, cartoonists would, every so often, pop into print with a drawing of a housewife whose arms were loaded with bags and bundles from her shopping expedition—playing a bagatelle game.

But, from then on—the manufacturers began to vie with each other as to which one could make the game more colorful, more intricate, more electrical and more non-understandable because of a system of multi-scoring which, tho it completes, adds and tabulates the amounts in scores, re-plays, etc., is still beyond the ken of the average man.

Pinball was once called "a relaxation." In fact, many doctors believe it to be one of the finest cures for mental therapy cases.

The modern pinball is anything but relaxation. Today, it's a systematic method of scoring for winners. The average game has from three to four and more different methods for obtaining winners. No longer does the housewife amble up to the machine in a grocery store, while waiting for the clerk, and just pull the plunger to see what happens, after she inserts her coin, and then have someone in the place gleefully inform her, even tho she, herself, didn't realize it, that she had "hit a winner". What's happened to pinball? Has it become too intricate for the average man? Has it passed beyond the stage of a "game of relaxation" and become a game for "scoring"? Has it passed out of the "fun" class?

One noted manufacturer who has a great many pin game hits to his credit —told *The Cash Box* that he believed the industry would be better off if it would return to the old fashioned, simple type, easy-to-understand, easy-to-play pin games. Games like the "Whiffle", "Ballyhoo", "Five Star Final", "Contact", "Bumper", etc.

It is his claim that not only did 'he operators earn more, even tho it took the players an extra minute or so to add their scores, but more players played the games. In fact, he claims, they stuck to the machines longer—individually and collectively.

Of course, the entire trade knows that today there are what can be called, "pinball fanatics". Games can't be made too intricate for these people. But, are they the majority or the minority? Will building more and more intricate machines, just for the benefit of these pinball fanatics, earn the operators more money?

This manufacturer does not believe that by speeding up the action of pinball—to 3 balls for 5c (actually 5 balls for 10c) that this will mean any great increase in profits to the operator. He claims that, after long experience, he has found there are just so many pin game playing hours and that the answer is—in making the players stick to the games—not leave them idle for as many hours as they now do.

Then—that being the case—is the operator better off if the manufacturers return to more simple pinballs? Will this once again revive interest of every type of player — not just the skillful plunger wielder? Will it mean lower prices for machines and more play action at the same time?

This manufacturer believes that it will. He also believes that the trade will more greatly benefit by a return to the "fun" type of pin game that anyone can play—than continuing on ahead with intricate, multi-scoring machines which have become anything but relaxation for the player for they force him to study and to think before each shot—instead of just pulling the plunger and having a lot of fun so doing.


In short, the player is now actually operating an intricate and delicate mechanism, instead of enjoying himself immensely and completely relaxing at the play of a game which started out, and was at one time, advertised to the public with this slogan: "Relax—Play Pinball."

What do you think? Should we go back to "Bagatelle?"

"Cool Water" "Have I Told You Lately That I Love You" Foy Willing & Riders of the Purple Sage (Majestic 6000)

• For a pair of really sock tunes directed especially for the western music fans, we recommend this plat-ter. "Cool Water" and "Have I Told You Lately That I Love You" are done by Foy Willing and his Riders of the Purple Sage, and they do them well. "Cool," a ballad straight from the saddle with just enough romantic interest to make it interesting, is capably interpretated via Foy's smooth chirping and the choral assist he gets from the Riders. "Have I Told You Lately," more heavily on the romance side, draws lots of attention because the tempo, the lyrics, the music and interpretation make it something "different" as a Westerner. If you have the locations, snatch a batch of these platters.

"Pitch A Boogie Woogie" Tab Smith and Orchestra (Hub 3026)

• For something that'll make your "race" locations jump, we refer your attention to this platter, "Pitch A Boogie Woogie," as done by Tab Smith's crew with Gloria Robinson handling the vocal. It's a hot platter that's served up solid by the small ork; and they're solid. The lyrics, it might be added, would never be permitted on the air: (Jack and Jill went up the hill, and Jill came down with a \$20 bill); but they'll draw trade if placed right. The platter is done in two parts, with our choice on the second side. But make no mistake, this platter is more than a novelty; the quality of Gloria's singing and the quality of musicianship exhibited by the crew are worthy of one's listening. Give it one.

"I Get The Blues When It Rains" 'Smart Little Fool" Jerry Sellers (Sonora 3019)

• For something good and something blue in a melody, "I Get The Blues When It Rains" rings the bell. But as it's interpreted here, something lacks. We believe it to be Jerry Sellers, but it may be somebody or something else. His interpretation is heavily dramatic, but he still has some lessons to learn in delivery and in enunciation. It tells in the disk. Not much better is the orchestral assistance provided by a crew under the direction of David Rhodes. They lack togetherness. On the backing, the song is "Smart Little Fool," and we've heard lots better. It's too slow to draw the customers to action, and all the faults noted in the first side appear in this one. The music op can take it from there.



HAL MCINTYRE

The top jump novelty for the week, and at the same time, the top platter of all, is this latest release by the Hal McIntyre or-chestra, "It's A Lie, It's A Lie, It's A Lie." Well known is the fact that the McIntyre crew really know how to give in jump tempo, and with this melody they hit a new high. Vocally, the tune is interpreted by Nancy Reed and Frankie Lester, with the entire crew joining in to give the lyrics a solid punch. You won't go wrong with it. On the flip, Hal offers "Among My Souvenirs," a standard with a new interpre-tation, and the result is a truly top romantic ballad that should see lots of action on its own. Hal takes a solo ride on his sax and he sends. The lyrics, beautifully handled by Frankie Lester, will draw listening at-tention. The arrangement served up by the lads with the music making tools is in a superior class, and the whole thing winds up with nickel grabbing effect. Grab a listening to the platter, and find out all the above for vourself.

"Walking Blues" "Rich Man's Blues" Dinah Washington with Lucky Thompson and His All Stars (Apollo 374)

• Here's a pair of sides cut from the familiar pattern of Dinah Washington's well known blues style. With the appeal of the platter limited by experience to the "race" locations and spots where her style has a definite demand. On "Walking Blues" and "Rich Man's Blues" she's definitely at her usual peak, and on both sides the assistance Dinah's vocal efforts get from Lucky Thompson's All Stars cannot be discounted. They really dig the track on which Dinah rides. If their previous platters have excited interest among your locations so will this one. Act accordingly.

"For Boobs Only" "Don't Blame Me"

Mixed Orchestra (Mel-O-Disc 113) • "For Boobs Only" is a little strong as a title, because the customers who like their music interspersed with heavy sax work will probably like it. The platter is completely instru-mental on both sides, with "Boobs" in a stepped up tempo, while "Don't Blame Me" is done up strictly in a slow blue mood. The best that can slow blue mood. The best that can be said for the whole offering is that Joe Thomas plays a good saxophone and the other members of the combo do right with their music tools. The disk is only for locations seeking "race" music for listening.

"A Little Kiss Each Morning" 'On The Boardwalk''

The Starlighters (Mercury 3023) • For a good side right for listen-ing or dancing, "A Little Kiss Each Morning" merits recommendation. It's a good romantic ballad, well done thru the vocal efforts of The Starlighters, assisted by Earl Hagen's ork. forthcoming film "Three Little Girls In Blue." It's a sound novelty, and appears to have possibilities if given the right push.

"Don't Blame Me" 'Okay For Baby' Jack McVea and His All Stars (Apollo 761)

• Whenever Jack McVea's name appears on a label it's a sound bet that something good is in the offing. That's the case with "Don't Blame Me," a soft, subdued number without being fluffy. It's done in drag tempo and has a steady rhythm background to provide the steady beat for the frequent solo flings by Jack McVea on his tenor sax and Bob Mosley on the ivories. It's tops for listening or dancing. Flipped, McVea and the boys offer "Okay For Baby," in stepped up pace and with more good solo work. A dependable disk to push up profits in "race" locations.

Should | Tell You | Love You" "I'd Be Lost Without You" Hal McIntyre Orchestra (Cosmo 491)

• Here's another waxing by the soaring-toward-national-acclaim Hal McIntyre orchestra. This time the offering is "Should I Tell You I Love You" from the Orson Welles' show "Around The World." The tune is well known around the land, and tho it set no houses to burning, it's a sound melody offered in sound style by Hal's crew. Frankie Lester handles the lyrics and his contribution adds up to good effect. Flipped, the plat-ter is supported by "I'd Be Lost Without You" another in the string of romantic ballads turned out by McIntyre. Nancy Reed does the chirping and her performance is worthwhile worthwhile.

"And Then It's Heaven" "I Guess I Expected Too Much" Harry James and His Orchestra (Columbia 37060)

• This week Harry James and his great organization give his fans two ballads that are very easy on the ears. "And Then It's Heaven" is a pleasant love song featuring Buddy Di Vito in the vocal department. The backing by the band is good and full and only occasionally rises to a really loud pitch. "I Guess I Expected Too Much" again stars Buddy Di Vito. Mr. James gets in a few licks to let you know he's still high priest of that golden trumpet.

"Spanish Polka" "Low Down Baby"

Billy Hughes' Pecos Pals (Fargo 1116) • "Spanish Polka" is a South-of-the-border hillbilly tune done up brown by Billy Hughes and his Pecos Pals. The rhythm, naturally, is polka and the boys really go to work on it. There's a rhythm instrument in the background that sounds very much like a washboard—and maybe it is. There's also a hot session with the guitar. Hughes supplies the vocal. The backing is "Low Down Baby." The boys open up the cellar door and dig down for a little jazz to pep up this number. Hughes once more works on the lyrics in his western style.

"What Will My Wife Say?" 'The Old Grav Mare'

Henry Patrick (20th Century 20-8)
"What Will My Wife Say?" has the emphasis on the vocal with the Billy Hays Orchestra providing the beat plus a brief instrumental insert between the choruses. Henry Patrick handles the vocal. The lyrics are a little off-color so watch this when placing it. The reverse gives us "The Old Gray Mare" and she's really decked out in a new saddle blanket. The boogie beat in the background is good stuff and it would be even better without the lyrics as they don't have much to offer. Henry Patrick sounds as though he has possibilities and we'd like to hear him do a straight number.

"If I'm Lucky" "One More Vote" Perry Como (Victor 20-1945)

Perry Como gives a very impressive performance on this waxing of two tunes from the new movie, "If I'm Lucky," soon to be released. The title tune is a dreamy number ex-pertly crooned by Como. He has a free and easy style that makes for free and easy style that makes for pleasant listening on any song. "One More Vote" is on the novelty side with tricky lyrics and a swingy melody. The Satisfiers and the Russ Case Orchestra back him up vocally and instrumentally to make this a top notch disk.





THE SMOOTHIES

• The top treat on wax this week is contributed by a neat vocal trio, The Smoothies, assisted by a top musical combination, Henry (Hot Lips) Levine and his orchestra. The tune is "Roll Me Over," as catchy a novelty as has been heard around in a long, long time. What's more, it has been around for no little while. Every Joe who crossed the pond to England and wherever they went from there knows it like his papa knew "Madamoiselle From Armentieres." The lyrics have been cleaned up from the way the GI's know 'em, but they retain enough sparkle to keep the platter off the air. The interpretation offered up by the Smoothies is in keeping with their name, and the instrumental support delivered by the Henry Levine crew is top deck stuff. On the backing they do the Irving Berlin classic, "Blue Skies," in stepped up style and the result wins honors. Henry Levine's support thruout, how-ever, should not be underestimated by any and all concerned. Ops can expect heavy play with this disk in any location where the boys who came back gather for beer and bull.

"This Is Always" "Somewhere In The Night" Jerry Sellers (Sonora 3013) • The moonstruck crowd will sup-

port this waxing of two love songs with lots of nickels as it's perfect hand-holding music. "This Is Always" is packed with sentiment and Jerry Sellers does a neat job on it. That boy practically purrs and on this type of song, the effect is good. "Somewhere In The Night" is in the same vein and Mrs. Sellers' favorite son gives the customers another listen to his romantic style. David Rhodes wields the baton and the musicians respond. Be sure to include this one in spots where Dan Cupid's deputies are at work.

"I Guess I Expected Too Much" "Sh-h, The Old Man's Sleepin'" **Dolores O'Neil** (Cosmo 497)

• A thrush with a voice worth talking about and listening to is Dolores O'Neil. She goes to town on "I Guess I Expected Too Much" and the result will get not one but several nickels from each of the customers. It's a romantic tune and she treats it with a caress in her voice. The orchestra conducted by Buddy Weed gives her a smooth background. She gives with a change of pace on the backing, "Sh-h, The Old Man's Sleepin' "—a swingy number full of bounce by the band and full of zing.

"Hey Bobby!" "Hymn to the Sun" Bobby Byrne and His Orchestra (Cosmo 492)

 Instrumental boogie with a slow drag beat is served up on this wax platter by the Byrne band in "Hey Bobby!" All the boys furnish the vocal and then they get busy on their instruments to turn out some first rate slow stomp. The backing, "Hymn to the Sun," is a swing adaptation of one of the classics by Rimsky-Korsakov. Bobby Byrne gets in some hot trombone sliding but he passes the solo flings around and the finale features the whole outfit.

'Baby, Baby, Please Come Home" "I Know Who Threw The Whiskey In The Well" The Four Bluejackets (Mercury 8017)

• The Four Bluejackets have a lot to offer in the way of close harmony and style of song presentation. In "Baby, Baby" the boys collaborate on a smooth ballad and come out with number that sounds like the Mills Brothers and the Ink Spots at the same time. But it'll click in spite of the similarity to those other well known combinations. The backing, "I Know Who Threw The Whiskey In The Well," has a lot more pep. The pattern is that of a fast spiritual with a faint tinge of boogie in the background. It's a novelty tune with a surprise ending.

'You Can Depend On Me" "Stormy Weather" Capitol International Jazzmen (Capitol 283)

• Here's a really great aggregation of artists playing under the name of Capitol International Jazzmen. "You Can Depend On Me" features one solo after another by Coleman Hawkings on tenor sax, Nat (King) Cole on piano, and Bill Coleman on trumpet, to name a few. It's true jazz and the fans of this type of music will set up a holler for more. The flipover, "Stormy Weather," is equally good. Kay Starr handles the vocal with ease and her interpretation is mighty fine. The same can be said for the instrumental tidbits.

Recently The Cash Box asked music ops to offer suggestions for bettering cooperation between the industry and the record manufacturers, and, of the flood of replies, one demand stood out like a bonfire in the night. It concerned price. According to the opinions expressed, music ops are becoming increasingly opposed to the purchase of a platter retailing for more than six bits. The majority refuse to buy anything above that list. Record makers, please note . . . According to latest reports as this issue goes to press, ARA is continuing in the biz until somebody comes along with the right price. A number of new cuttings are due for release early in September.

During this past week Cosmo Records ran a test on the number of plays to be expected from their recent pressings. According to word just received from prexy Harry Bank, Cosmo Records now claims that their platters have continued to give "top performance after 200 plays. And, Harry emphasizes, "our tests were made using a tone arm exerting 4½ ounces of pressure on each play!" . . . Ruby Hill, who did the "Come Rain or Come Shine" number in "St. Louis Woman," the click B'way musical, has been inked by Cosmo, it was triumphantly announced this past week . . . Frank B. Walker, chieftain of the soon to pop MGM label, is maintaining heavy silence on the progress being made. "It's slow but sure," he reports. Meanwhile other diskeries are watching everything, but closely.

Musicraft claims that if they could make 30,000,000 records per year they could sell 'em all. And that (you guessed it) was lipped by the sales promotion director for the firm, Mike Elliott, who actually smokes nothing stronger than tobacco... Motion picture biggies from all the top film firms are around ogling diskeries and huddling with independent record execs. Announcements that will align the film world with the wax world are not far in the offing ... Indications are that the platter biz is coming to life again after a summer lull, and the month of Sept. will see hordes of new releases competing for position in the nation's jukes.

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Ellison Sees Demand For 'Better Type' Music on Jukes

HOLLYWOOD, CALIF. — Ben Ellison, head of Hollywood International Records, emphasized his belief that, along with the juke box swing tunes, there will be a growing demand for better type music in the coin machine field and during this past week recorded the "Hollywood Concerto."

His faith that classical music on a juke box will draw heavy play stems from the days when he was a developer of youth activities for Los Angeles County and he was offered a bet that children from the slums would not enjoy symphonies. Ben took that bet and won. During a single year, in an arrangement with the Los Angeles Symphony, he took 1,000 underprivileged youngsters to hear and enjoy the music of the masters.

From that experience he went on to observe the demand for "better" music by countless numbers of GI's during the war. At that time Ben was connected with the USO and had the opportunity to note the musical tastes of the nation's youth.

So now Ben has taken his faith in "better music" in his hands and is betting his chips on "Hollywood Concerto." The orchestra he used was composed of 75 of the top musicians he could find. They interpet the music written by Alexander Laszlo. Constantin Bakaleinikoff held the baton.

And Ben Ellison? He, who wrote the rising hit "I Left My Heart In Mississippi" and managed Exclusive Records, and took poor kids to concerts, waiting for the people to justify his faith: That they truly want "better type music"—and would be willing to pay a nickel to hear it.

FOREWORD Many times, wide differences appear in the high and low prices of certain equipment. Like any true reporter The C.M.I. Blue Book can only feature the market prices as they are quoted. The C.M.I. Blue Book acts exactly the same as the market quotation board at the Stock Exchangeposting the prices as they are quoted for the past week, regardless of how much they may seem to be out of line. Some prices do not change for months. The C.M.I. Blue Book, rather than show no price, retains the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices continue to be very widely divergent these days. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, condition, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, etc., must all be taken into consideration. The C.M.I. Blue Book reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustment to fit the peculiantities of his own territory.

METHOD The C.M.I. Blue Book should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price for the week: Second price listed is highest price. Where only one price appears this should be considered lowest price.







Another Reason for a Nat'l Tax Council! Hightstown (N. J.) Slams Tax On Venders: Jukes & Pins **Hit First**

HIGHTSTOWN, N. J. - The long arm of taxation against coin operated equipment nailed new levies on vending equipment located in this township.

Pursuant to a recent ordinance passed by the local governing body, licenses were issued on all cigarette venders operated in this township, with a ten dollar tax being slapped on each and every machine.

The licenses, issued on an annual

basis, carry a June 30 expiration date.

Taxation directed against the cointrade is not new here, but it was not until a few weeks ago that venders became liable to annual levies. For some time now a fifty dollar per year tax has been in effect on all pin games, while juke boxes are currently subject to a \$20 per year fee.

JERSEY SURVEY SHOWS BIG MAJORITY OF MUSIC OPS TO CHANGE TO 75%-25% COMISH BASIS BEGINNING LABOR DAY

Music Guild of America Assists The Cash Box to Make Survey Among Its Membership. 17 of 21 Jersey Counties Report. Wired Music Ops Already Charging 10c Per Call.

NEWARK, N. J.—A poll just com-pleted by The Cash Box in cooperation with the Music Guild of America, music ops association of this state, reveals that the greater majority of the music merchants are changing to 75%-25% commission basis as of Labor Day and that almost everyone of the wired telephone music ops are already charging 10c per call, three for 25c.

Some weeks ago The Cash Box reported that, after a vote taken among the general membership of this organization, they had decided to change their present commission setup to 75%-25%. The vote was for the immediate counties surrounding the city of Newark — with other counties of the state to decide later.

The Cash Box therefore suggested that a poll be taken from among all the music ops in the state and LeRoy Stein, executive director of MGA, agreed.

Stein wrote The Cash Box, "Your cooperation and assistance in the campaign to increase the earnings for the music merchants is deeply appreciated. In aiding us, we know that you will be of service to all your readers."

A summary of the poll, taken in 17 of the 21 New Jersey counties, points definitely to the need for a better commission basis and the fact that New Jersey's music merchants are agreed that this basis should come into being on Labor Day of 1946. Essex County

Here 95% of the music merchants declared that with the cost of equipment up almost 400%; replacement parts up about 200%; with trucks, cars, automobile parts, insurance and other expenses increased in proportion, plus payment of the highest wages to union servicemen, it was impossible to offer the same commission to retailers in 1946 as was given them in 1936—ten years ago. As far as Essex County is concerned (the largest population county in the state) music merchants who want to continue to give good service, purchase new equipment and pay a living wage to their employees, can only offer locations 25% commission. (Wired telephone music goes to 10c per call on Labor Day by mutual agreement among these ops.) Union County

Operators in this county upped telephone music to 10c per call last year. Commissions to locations for straight machines will be reduced to an equivalent of 25%. Music merchants agreed that with the ever increasing cost of living, plus the additional increase in overhead, pre-war commissions are definitely out.

Passaic County

Merchants who operate telephone music systems advanced price to 10c in July, 1946. Commissions for music merchants are being reduced to an equivalent of 25%. A few oper-ators still cling to 50-50. Bergen County

A spokesman for Bergen County says that it is unfair to the location to operate on a 50-50 basis. Customers are entitled to get the latest records, the best equipment and efficient day, night, Sunday, and Holi-day repair service. "What with the cost of new equipment and Union wages to Union employees, plus in-creased cost of "request" records, locations will continue to receive poor service and lower income unless commission rates are adjusted to meet present ever rising costs. We favor a 75%-25% commission as an equitable basis for efficient operation and a fair return to our customers and to ourselves," he stated." Hudson County


"We have just read the report of Essex, Union, and Bergen Counties. There is nothing that we can add except to say that telephone music must go to 10c and that an equivalent of 75%-25% is the only fair arrangement at the present time-fair to us and profitable to our locations," music ops here reported thru a spokesman for their group.


Middlesex, Monmouth and Ocean Counties

"As manager for one of the largest music merchants in this resort area, I can assure you that we are making every effort to convince our customers that we can no longer operate on a 50-50 basis. It takes little convincing to prove to our locations that when the 5c hot dog went to 15c, the 5c hamburger to 20c, and all amusements upped their prices nearly 50%, that these increases were mad necessary by added cost of doing business. The music machine merchant is no exception-to-he must pay more for everything he buys and so he must earn more in order to render the best service at all times. We are working toward a 75%-25% commission rate, music ops here report.

Trenton, Camden Areas

"As a salesman of music machine parts, I come in contact with most of the music machine merchants, and I get the same story from each of them than it is in Essex County where music merchants have already cut their commissions to 25% and raised telephone music to 10c. If they want to continue in business, buy new equipment, pay decent wages, and give the best service, they've got to do the same in this area.





NEW YORK—At an informal meeting of distribs from many parts of the country in this city, this past week, there came to the fore the fact that, at long last, it seemed the "seller's market was dying" — and that, once again, the time for salesmanship had arrived.

This has been noticeable for sometime to a great many in the trade. The fact that sales have fallen off in certain branches of the field were only proof of the long awaited demise of a rampant, raucous, devil-maycare "sellers' market."

The used machines market will maintain itself for a great many months to come as the leading sales division of the field — only because production of new equipment is as yet so low that it will not be able to catch up with demand.

But, even in the used machines field, the need for salesmanship is now being felt by its largest exponents. These men have reached that stage where they realize they must "go out and meet the customer once again."

It is true that whatever new machines are received are sold without trouble and with speed. But, they are not arriving in sufficient quantities to maintain the average large distributor's organization. Therefore he must get the major share of his revenue from the used machine field. To do that, these days, he must have his men get out and sell the merchandise he is taking in trade, or that he is buying here and there about the nation.

The distribs who were present at this casual and informal meeting also agreed that they would be better off with salesmen covering their territories once again than they have been these past, hectic, fast-selling years.

Most of these men believe that a great many changes are coming about. They feel that routes will be sold and that new blood will enter the business and that certain coinmen will swing from one type of machine to another. Therefore, they agreed, the need for salesmen to note these conditions right out in the field is more or less imperative so that they keep fully informed of all such developments.

It has been noticeable for some months now that manufacturers, too, are recognizing the need for salesmen to get out into the trade. Those manufacturers who have been making some deliveries have already found that by using salesmen they have been getting a better reception from the trade generally. These men have been able to "feel" the pulse of the field and report it back to their factories so that the manufacturer has been able to ascertain just what he should continue to do for the future.

At long last, then, the trade is returning to a semblance of normalcy. It will, once again, have its smiling, gossipy, story-telling salesmen visiting with it — bringing news of other cities, towns, villages and states. Of what other coinmen are doing to increase their earnings and, generally, spreading good cheer and good information which helped in the past, and will in the future, to make this a greater and better industry.

The fact that the sellers' market is dying is not being mourned by anyone who likes to feel that blood-tingling thrill of competition. Who likes to get out on the highways and byways and meet with "the boys" once more and talk things over with them. Who feels elated when a sale is made that sticks, and when customers are created who continue to be "grand accounts" from then on in.

Perhaps the old swash-buckling. hard-drinking. loud-talking, bragging type of salesman will disappear in this more modern, educated era. But. he will still be the welcome visitor from the "other side of the world" who always had a good word, a new idea and a better system to tell his customers about. Page 43

PHILA. SUNDAY INQUIRER FEATURES BIG Story on \$600 million vending biz

Tells of Development from Candy Venders in Theatres in '30's to Present Large Concessions Doing Over \$15,000,000 Business Annually. Says Candy Machines Do \$25,000,000 Yearly. Also Tells About Cig, Photo, Popcorn, Beverage Venders and Juke Boxes.

PHILADELPHIA, PA. — Edgar Williams writing in the Philadelphia Sunday Inquirer (August 4) was given a feature page in the paper's roto section in an article entitled, "Bonanza From The Nibblers," devoted entirely to the vending machine and juke box business.

This is one of the best articles which has ever yet appeared regarding the vending machine business.

The writer advises that in the early '30's (as has appeared in *The Cash Box*) the vending machines opened the way in theatres to the present large, girl attended concessions. These do over \$15,000,000 worth of business yearly he reports.

He also stated that one large motion picture theatre producer is at present conducting a survey of his 450 houses with an eye to boosting his sales. He also writes, "Most large theatre chains handle their candy business thru concessionaires, receiving from 25 to 40 per cent of the gross sales. However," he continues, "one company which holds an interest in more than 1200 theatres, has conducted its own concession business for years."

He takes a suburban Philly theatre manager to task who called candy machines in lobbies "a fad" by stating, "Theatre owners who are reaping the harvest of nickels and dimes might point out that a \$15,000,000 annual business is a robust fad."

In addition to the threatre counter sales he reports that candy machines do over \$25,000,000 worth of business yearly in the country.

He also reports that, "More than 260,000 cigaret machines sell about 775,000,000 packs for more than \$100,000,000, accounting for 6% of the total cigaret sales."

In addition, he states, "More than a million penny peanut machines are to be found in public places thruout the nation."

He also reports on the fact that there are "upwards of 400,000 juke boxes" in the nation.

He also says, "More than 25,000 photographic machines bring in some \$3,000,000."

"These," he writes, "plus countless other dispensers, have made the automatic vending machine business one of the lustiest booming enterprises in the United States."

He claims that popcorn is turning into "another bonanza" for theatre owners. In a survey, he says, these men have learned that popcorn sells poorly in houses patronized by women, "and that theatres in the Middle Atlantic, New England and Middle Western states show the best returns."

He also writes, referring to theatre vending, "most houses handle only





Jersey Town to Put Midnight Curfew on Juke Boxes

Says Mixed Route Ops Will Not Cooperate on Obtaining 70% Comish

ST. AUGUSTINE, FLA.—R. L. Parks, Jr., of R. L. Parks & Son, who operate juke boxes as well as a very impressive music store here, report that one of the problems they have come across in changing their present 50%-50% commission to 70%-30% on all juke boxes here is the fact that their leading competitor also operates pin games and because of this will not change along with them.

Parks writes, "Each week I read 'The Cash Box' from cover to cover and, as an operator, I greatly appreciate your editorials on a new and better commission basis. The operator should get enough commission from his machines to net him a decent profit. But the trouble is that in each community there are different problems.

"In this locality," he continues, "my competitor and I cannot agree on a commission basis because he operates pinball machines. Therefore, in each location where he has a phonograph and a pinball, he will give 50 per cent on the phonograph becase he has a second hand pinball machine that probably only cost him about \$50. He can get a greater return on his pinball machine and, therefore, if he only gets \$5 or \$6 from the phonograph (which is worth around \$400) he is still making money.

"I'm sure this problem will be found in quite a few cities. Your ideas are all good, as far as the operators are concerned, but the manufacturers have to help and they are not doing anything in that direction."



Newspaper Appeals to Save Kids' Juke Box Op Comes to Aid

DELAND, FLA. — In an editorial appeal addressed to its readers, the "Sun News" of this city wrote: "Will you let them down?"

"An article in Wednesday's Sun News revealed that DeLand's 'Teen Town' is in dire danger of losing its' 'Juke' organ. Just exactly what the financial arrangements were in regard to paying for the device we do not know. We only know that the slim trickle of money which goes into the machine isn't sufficient to meet requirements, and unless some other means is found to pay for it the machine may be moved out.






SAINT JOHN, N.B. CANADA — Under consideration by a local coinman is the introduction of cigarette venders.



Rights to Build U.S. Games in **England**

LONDON, ENG.-It is reported here that Hawtins, Ltd. of Blackpool is on his way to the United States to arrange for manufacturing rights for American coin operated equipment.

Coinmen here believe that it will be sometime yet before the Foreign Exchange Control and the Board of Trade will allow importation of U.S. coin machines once again, and the use of the U.S. dollars for "such nonessentials."

The Cash Box correspondent writes, "The U. S. loan hasn't changed the previous situation. The Government are conserving it for food and other necessities. And you wouldn't blame them if you could see the privations of the masses here in food, clothing, etc. You'd think this country lost the war. Outside of Germany, and perhaps Italy, the people here are getting less food, etc., than any other country.'

Hawtins, Ltd. is today considered the large coin machine manufacturer in Great Britain. Some of his ma-

chines were published in The Cash Box a few months ago. His most outstanding machine for possible sales to the U.S. market is considered to be the "Clutching Hand" which is comparable to the International Mutoscope "Magic Finger" machine and also the "Novelty Merchantman" of the Exhibit Supply Company.

Other games of the Hawtins firm range from the whirlwind type counter game, which is known in England as a "standard" game, to scooters for amusement parks and even a juke box which resembles one of the old '39 phonos.


Red Navy Captain Wants to be Russian Bell Czar



CHICAGO — Coinmen here suggest that the name "slot" machine be changed from now on thruout the industry and that it become known, instead, as the "bell" machine.

The belief here is that this will prove of greater value to those who are constantly handling the "bell" machines for they have had to overcome the designation as "slot machines" in many instances and, in most cases, have found that this term is usually given to every type of coin operated device — whether it be a penny ball gum vender or an automatic phono by the public and the press.

This name, these men claim, will definitely designate the type of machine referred to by the coinman. As is also known, they point out, even in ordering reel strips, the term, "Bell-fruit" reels is used.

Therefore, they state, the name "bell" machine ties in perfectly with what the trade has long known as the "slot" machine and gives a better description to the machine itself.

Most manufacturers are now also referring to these machines as "bell" machines and this alone, it is hoped here, will help to popularize the name.

The average coinman, it is reported, has also come to refer to the "slot" as the "bell" machine.

The Cash Box agrees with the name "bell" machine as being more descriptive of the product itself and will use this term in its "C.M.I. Blue Book" beginning with the September 2, 1946 issue—already adopting it for its "new" machines column in the "Blue Book."
